# BACKGROUND AND MOTIVATIONS

## ➤ Background and motivations

- $\text{UO}_2$  and  $\text{UO}_{2+x}$ : **fuel oxidation** – necessary for the fuel cycle study
- Key synthesis of oxidation: **oxygen interstitial defects** in uranium oxides

### • Defects (clusters) in uranium oxides:

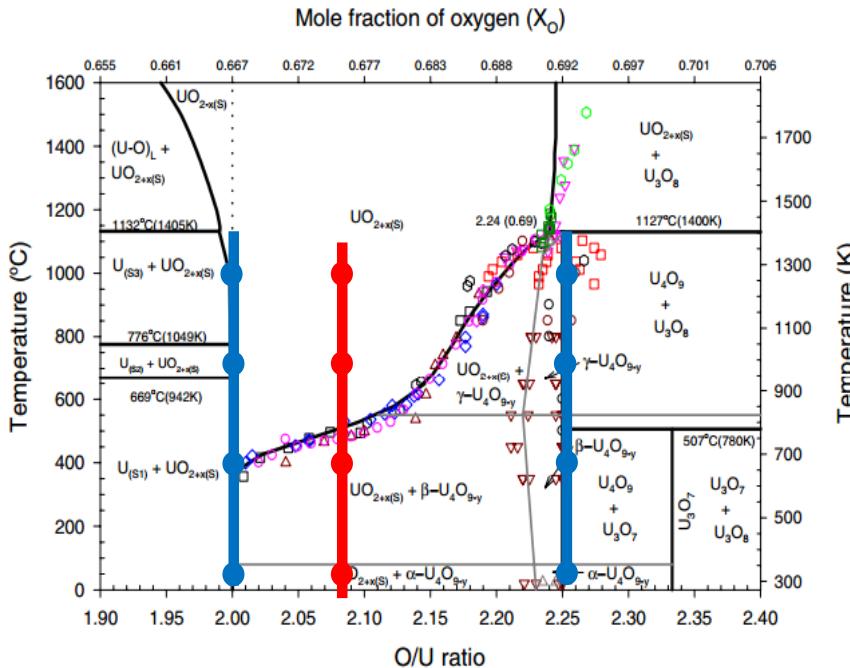
- $\text{UO}_{2+x}$ : Willis' 2:2:2 cluster [1]
- $\text{U}_4\text{O}_9$ : cuboctahedron cluster structure [2]
- Do: defects start to cluster at small deviation-from-stoichiometry [3]

### • Objectives:

1. Basic research on  $\text{UO}_2$  crystalline structure as a function of temperature
2. Defects (clusters) – change along with phase transition: i.e. @HT **the dissolving of long-range ordering of cuboctahedron or Willis' structure for large-x samples ( $\text{UO}_{2.12}$ )?**

## ➤ Why neutron diffraction?

- Relatively more accurate determination of O positions (comp. to readily available X-ray Diff.) [4]

# EXPERIMENT METHODOLOGIES

## ➤ Experiment details

- $\text{UO}_{2+x}$ ,  $x \approx 0.03$ , **sintered** samples, 27 1mm-disks prepared in CEA Cadarache with  $\text{H}_2/\text{H}_2\text{O}$  equilibrium of an oxidizing environment
- D4c diffractometer at the Institute Laue-Langevin (ILL), Grenoble, France
- Furnace temperature range: ambient to 1000°C; Goniometer range:  $0 < 2\theta < 138^\circ$
- New measurements on  $\text{UO}_2$ ,  $\text{UO}_{2+x}$
- Preliminary data process: diffraction pattern collection, background subtraction, Placzek correction, Fourier transform to real space data



## ➤ Diffraction data refinement plan

	Rietveld method (JANA2006) [1]	Pair Distribution Function (PDFGui) [2]
Principle	Non-linear mean square algorithm (atomic average structure from diffraction peaks in reciprocal space)	Pair distribution function (local and average structure refinement in real space [2])
Nature of information retrieved	Unit cell parameter, O&U positions and Temperature factor / Atomic Displacement Parameter	

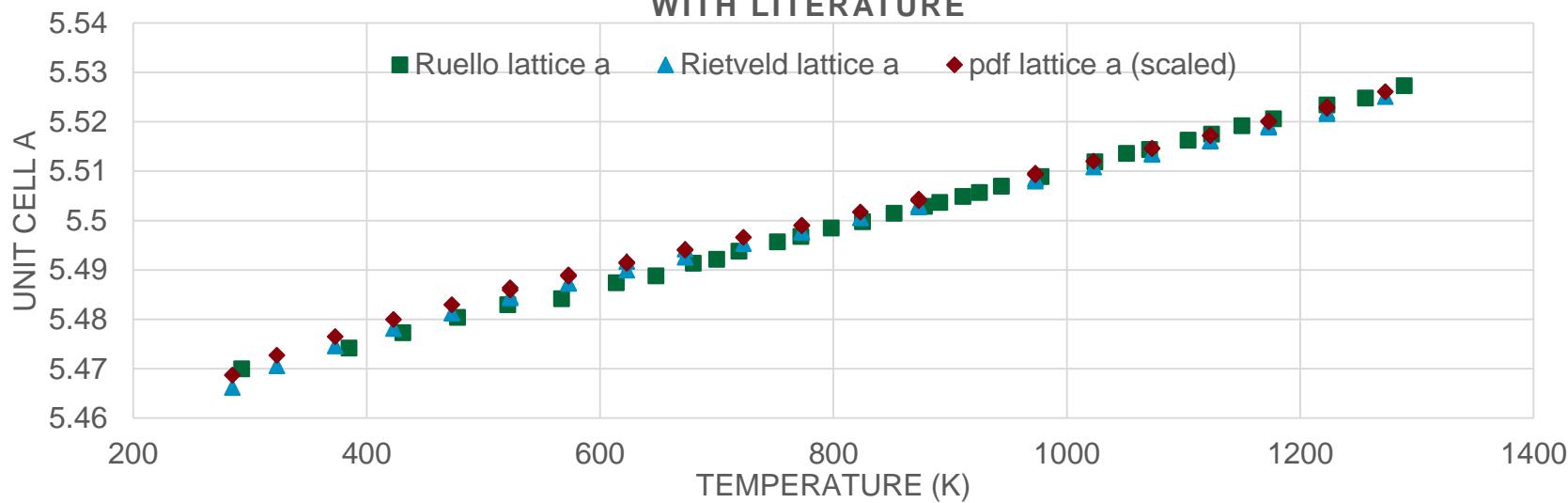
# RIETVELD AND PDF REFINEMENT ON UO<sub>2</sub>

➤ Rietveld refinement results of UO<sub>2</sub> - Structural parameters

1. Structure information

- Unit cell parameter
- Temperature factor (atomic displacement factor)

**UO<sub>2</sub> LATTICE PARAMETER BY RIETVELD AND PDF METHOD COMPARED WITH LITERATURE**



- Same lattice para. Obtained from both Rietveld and PDF
- A linear thermal expansion between RT and 1000°C – consistent with previous result<sup>[1][2]</sup>.

# RIETVELD AND PDF REFINEMENT ON UO<sub>2</sub>

## ➤ Rietveld refinement results of UO<sub>2</sub> - Thermal motion (Debye-Waller factors)

Structural factor [1] :  $V(x, y, z) = V_0 + \frac{\alpha_0}{2}(x^2 + y^2 + z^2) + \beta_0 xyz$

The equation  $V(x, y, z) = V_0 + \frac{\alpha_0}{2}(x^2 + y^2 + z^2) + \beta_0 xyz$  is shown. Two arrows point from the terms  $\frac{\alpha_0}{2}(x^2 + y^2 + z^2)$  and  $\beta_0 xyz$  to the words "harmonic" and "anharmonic" respectively.

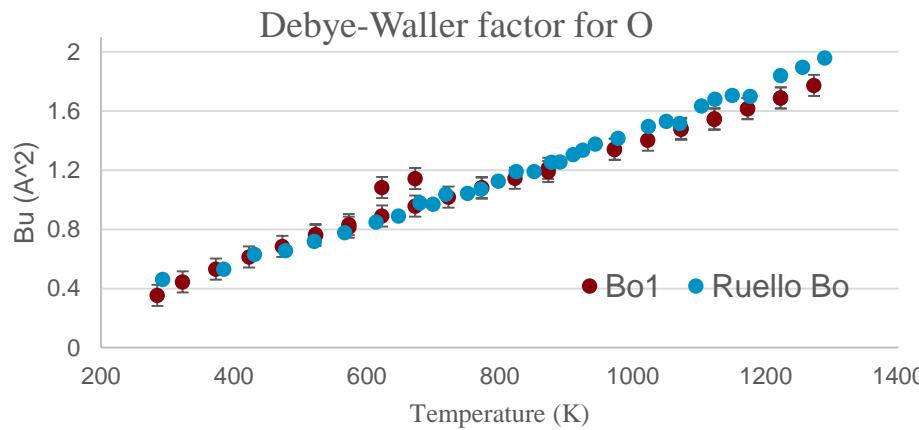
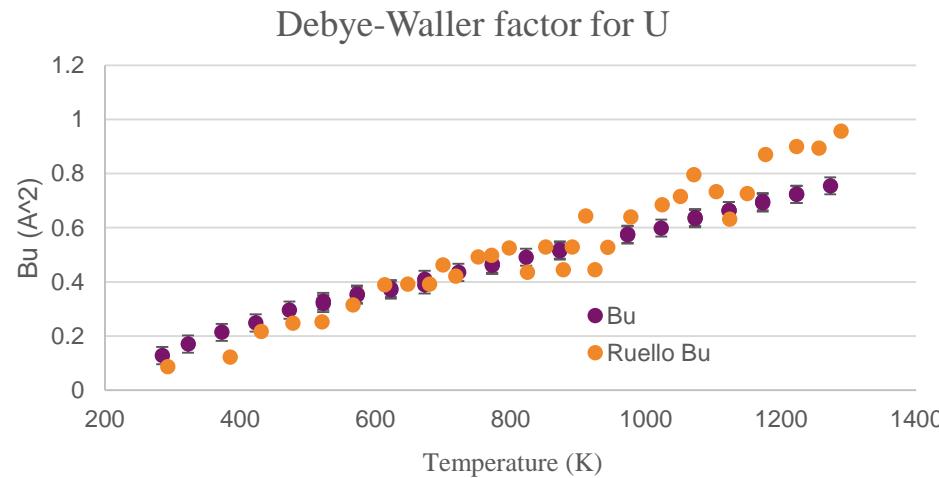
- An isotropic harmonic potential characterized by the harmonic constant  $\alpha$  to predict atom harmonic thermal motion:

$$B_0 = \frac{8\pi^2 kT}{\alpha_0} = \frac{8\pi^2}{3} \langle u^2 \rangle$$

- Uranium: linear temperature-dependent Bu – consistent with previous research [2].
- Oxygen atom: involve the consideration of an ***anharmonic*** component for the odd reflections

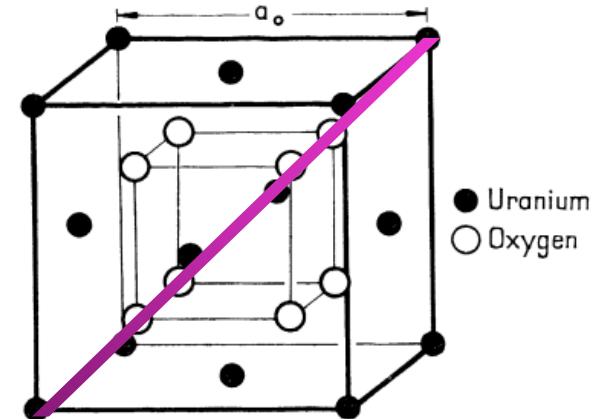
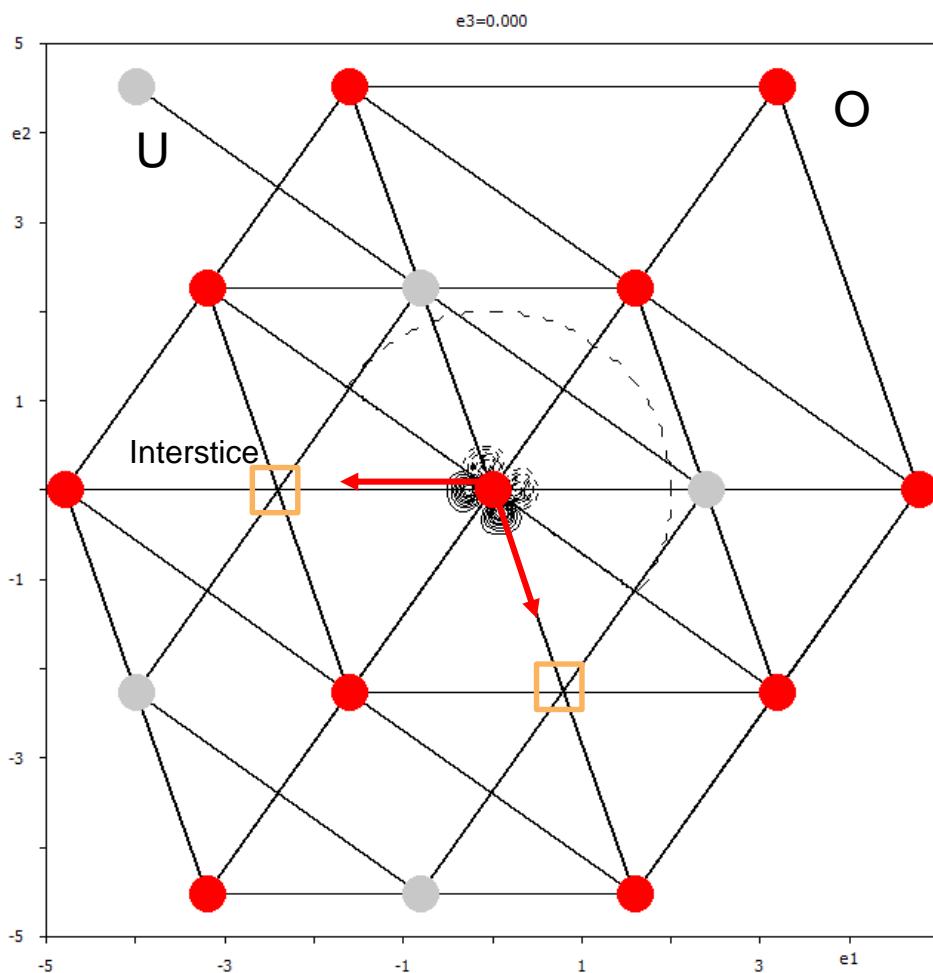
$$c_{123}^0 = \frac{8\pi^3 k_B^2 T^2}{a_0^3 \alpha_0^3} \beta_0$$

- Atomic displacement factors with **PDF** method – unavailable now with the PDFgui



# UO<sub>2</sub> – OXYGEN ATOM THERMAL MOTION

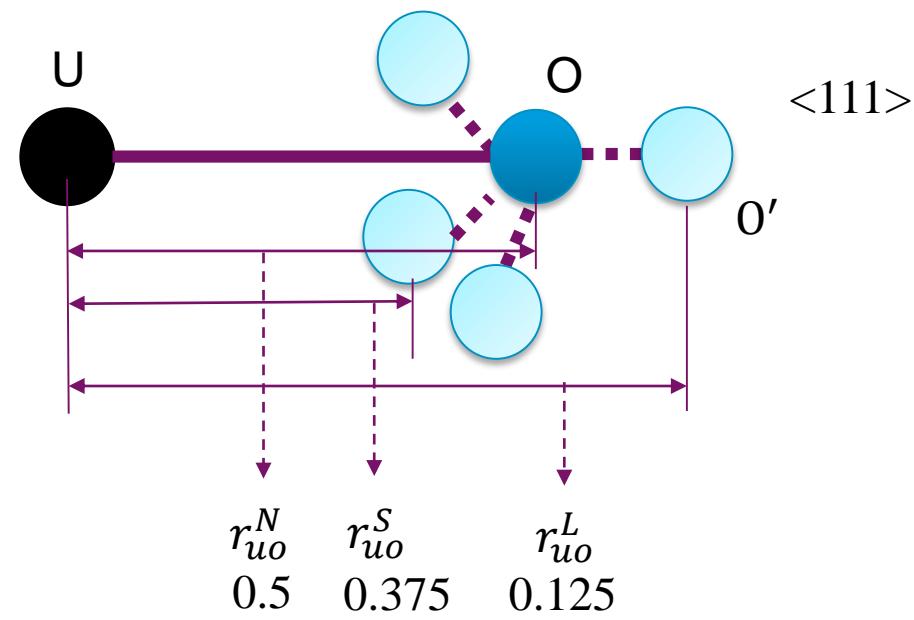
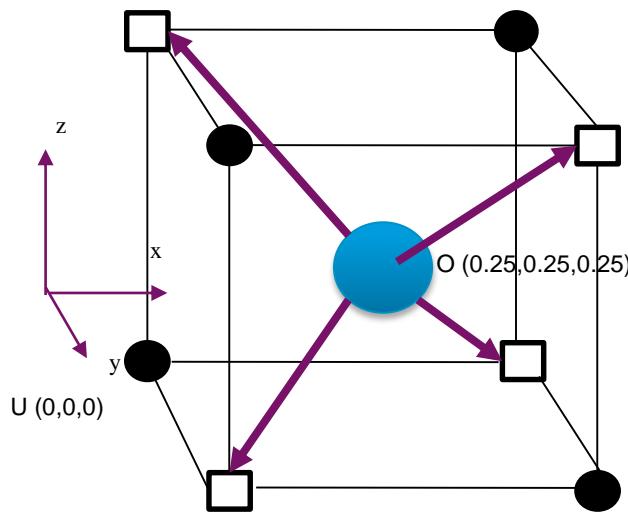
- Rietveld refinement results of UO<sub>2</sub> - Oxygen Probability Density Function map of 3<sup>rd</sup>-order anharmonic thermal motion of (110) plane



- Oxygen is expected to move to the **interstice** site in **<111> direction**
- To understand the oxygen thermal behaviour by modelling the bond lengths of U-O and O-O with Rietveld method
- To verify the knowledge obtained with the Radial Distribution of lattice measured in real-space PDF

# UO<sub>2</sub> – OXYGEN SPLIT ATOM MODEL

- In real space within harmonic approximation, the thermal vibration effect can be described as a convolution of atom potential at equilibrium state and a Gaussian statistic distribution of atomic displacement. [1]
- ∵ Anharmonic – a convolution of equilibrium potential and distorted Gaussian function → mathematically difficult to calculate  
 ∴ Split the O atom of one site to two sites and assuming both have isotropic thermal motion and the O' at the second site moves along <111> direction.



Q-space split-atom model – two isotropic O and O'

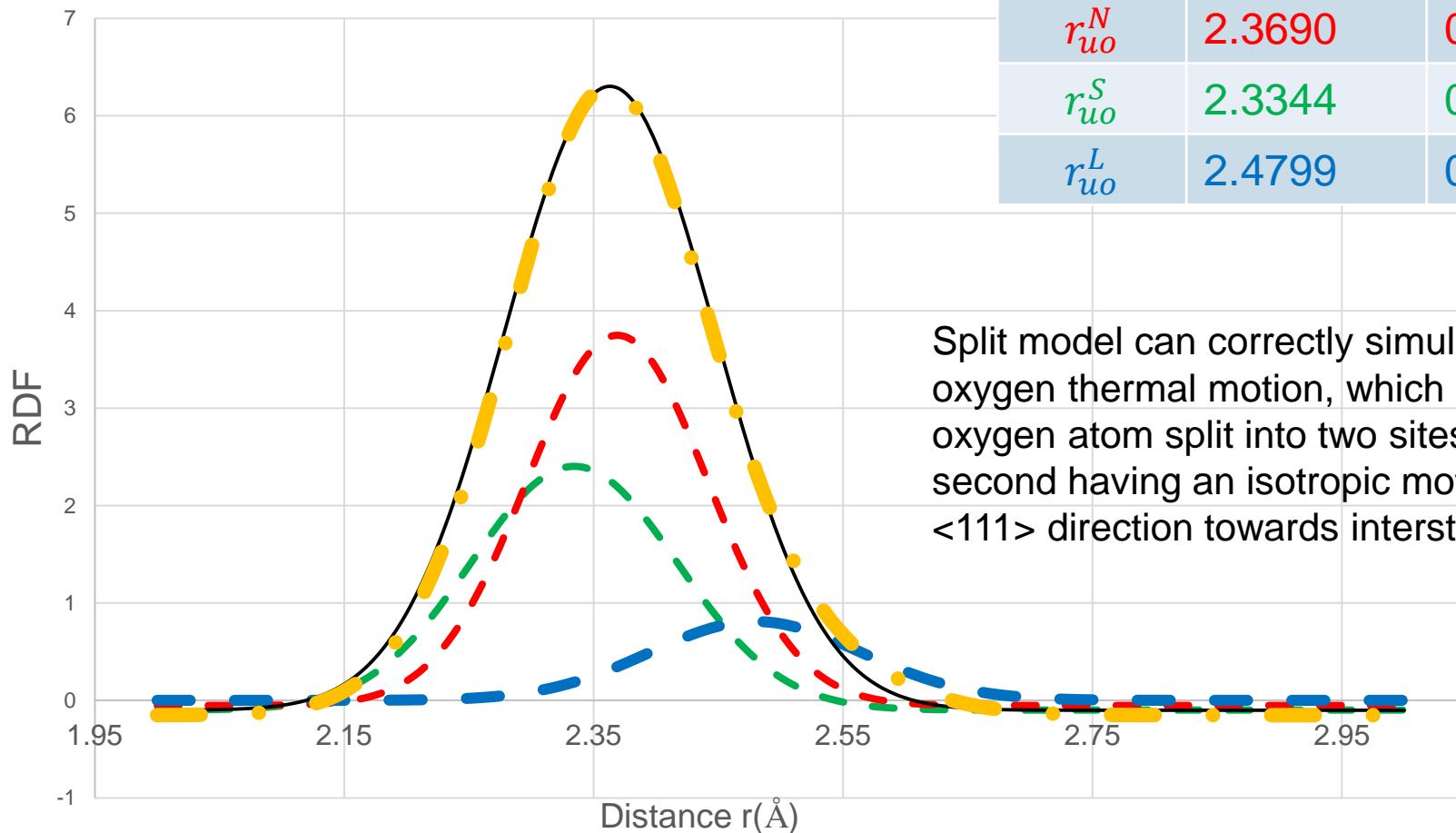
Relative occupancy and position of O'

Real space UO, UO' distance with probability p

Gaussian Function – Integrated area = Probability

UO<sub>2</sub> – OXYGEN SPLIT ATOM MODEL

Radial Distribution Function of UO bond @RT

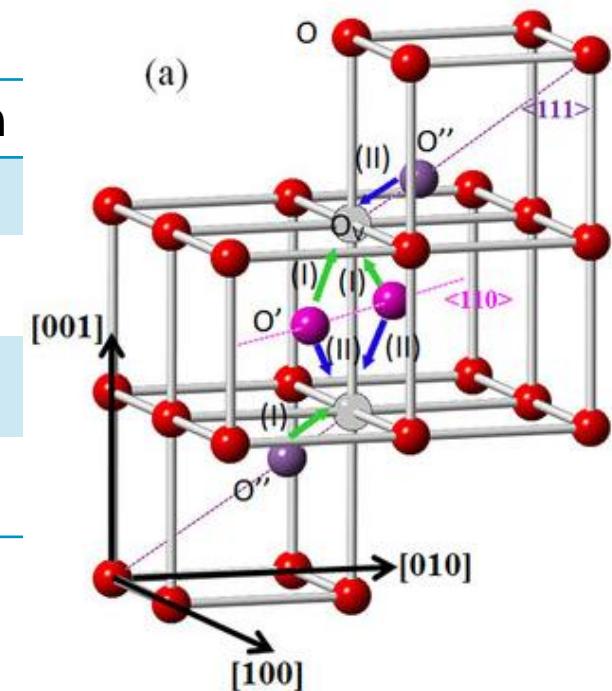


# UO<sub>2+x</sub> – HIGH-T RIETVELD REFINEMENT

- Willis [1] and Murray [2] : UO<sub>2+x</sub>, x=0.12, 0.13, 0.14
  - Expect to determine the type of defect structure – cuboctahedron/Willis'
  - Conclusion: defect cluster type is highly dependent on the sample treatment
- Rietveld refinement results of UO<sub>2+x</sub>, with small deviation-from-stoichiometry
  1. Willis' cluster structure built-up [1]

Atom	Coordinates	Composition
Uranium	0,0,0	1.00
Lattice Oxygen O	$\frac{1}{4}, \frac{1}{4}, \frac{1}{4}$	1.97
Interstitial O'	$\frac{1}{2}, \frac{1}{2} + v, \frac{1}{2} + v$	0.0148*
Interstitial O''	$\frac{1}{2} + w, \frac{1}{2} + w, \frac{1}{2} + w$	0.0148*

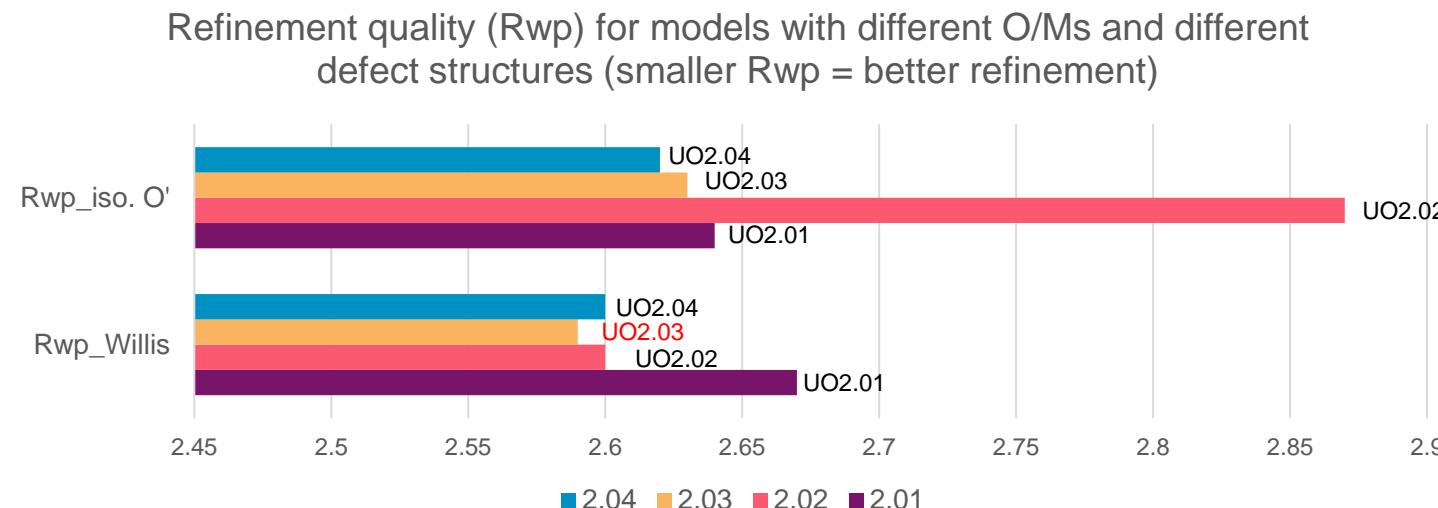
$$v = 0.02064, w = 0.121$$



# UO<sub>2+x</sub> – HIGH-T RIETVELD REFINEMENT

- Rietveld refinement results of UO<sub>2+x</sub>, with small deviation-from-stoichiometry

2. Determination of the stoichiometry  
Sample preparation condition → estimated O/M ration ~ 0.03
3. Check the possibility of isolated mobile interstitial oxygen model



4. Refine the composition between O' and O''
5. Check the possibility of dissolved cuboctahedron cluster - poor refinement
6. Rebuild the model with supercells - similar refinement results

# CONCLUSION AND PROSPECTS

- Rietveld and PDF refinement results of  $\text{UO}_2$ 
  - Results of atomic structure and temperature factors are consistent with literature
- RDF and Split-atom model study of  $\text{UO}_2$  oxygen atom thermal motion
  - Rietveld PD map illustrates the anharmonic thermal vibration
  - Split-atom model to solve the difficulties of simulating atom anharmonic motion.
  - Split-atom model results shows the consistency with the Radial Distribution Function measurement
- Rietveld refinement on  $\text{UO}_{2.03}$  diffraction measurements at high temperature
  - Willis 2:2:2 defect structure model is applicable for our  $\text{UO}_{2+x}$  with smaller deviation-from-stoichiometry
  - We performed refinement with different defect structures and modelled different composition ratios between U and O, and O' and O'' to find the best fit
- Prospects
  - Continued refinement with  $\text{UO}_{2.03}$  at low T (two-phase zone)
  - Neutron diffraction experiments on  $\text{UO}_{2+x}$  with different x and dopants
