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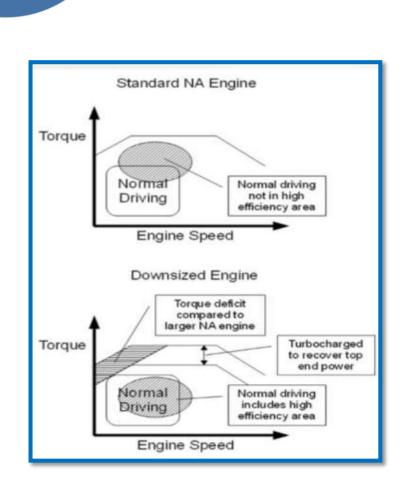
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Introduction

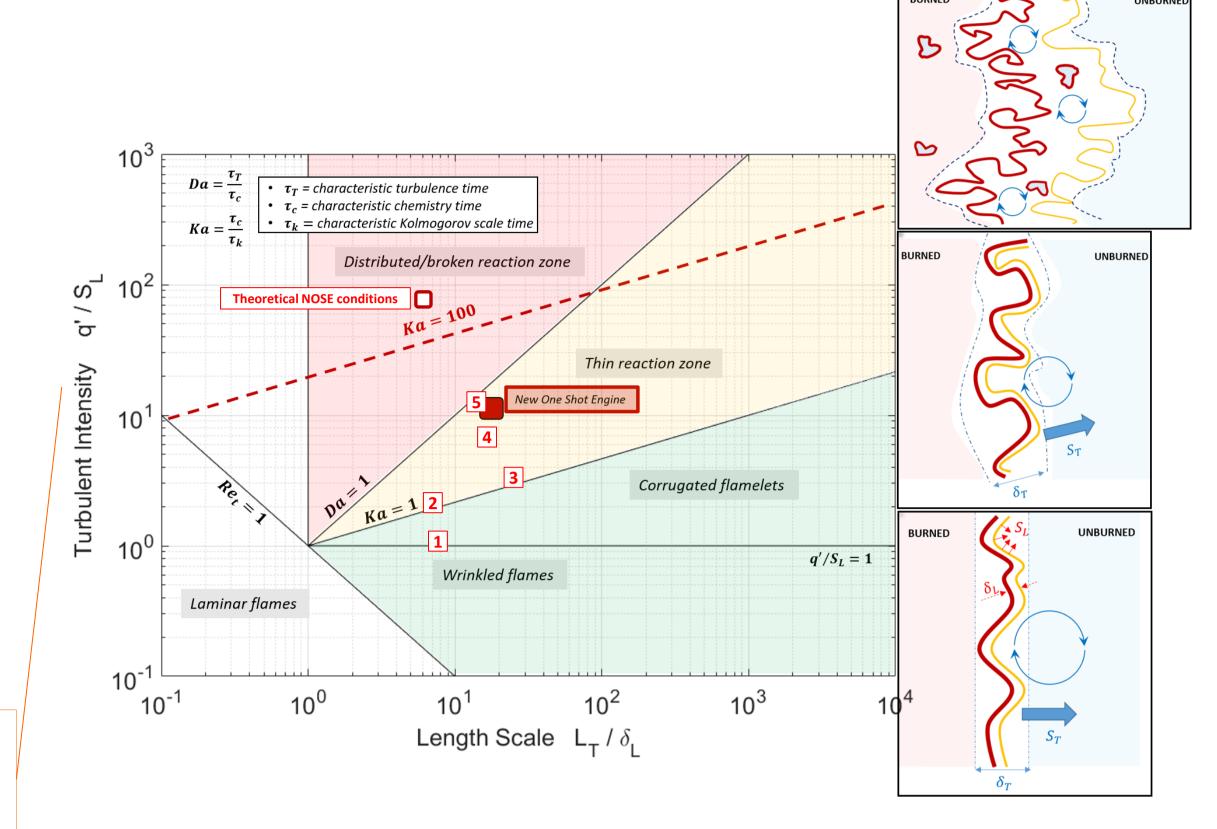
- Nowadays, one of the main challenge in the automotive sector concerns the increase internal combustion engine (ICEs) efficiency in order to improve the fuel economy and cut the pollutant missions
- Road Railway Other EU-28 ■ Civil Aviation 80% Domestic Maritime
- The main reason is due to the great impact of transport sector on Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions. Particularly due to the light vehicles
- **Downsizing** is one of the most exploited solution: reducing the displacement by maintaining the performance through a turbocharger. Downsizing means reduced friction, thermal losses and mass moved, boosting fuel economy and cutting CO2 • A turbo provides the engine with the mass
- of air needed to ensure highly efficient and **clean** combustion
- The higher intake conditions lead to an increase of the abnormal combustions
- High dilution rates may be used in order to mitigate such phenomena

Turbo + Small Engine = Fuel Economy

Increasing dilution, turbulence and pressure may cause the shifting from the actual flamelet **regime** to the **thin reaction zone**

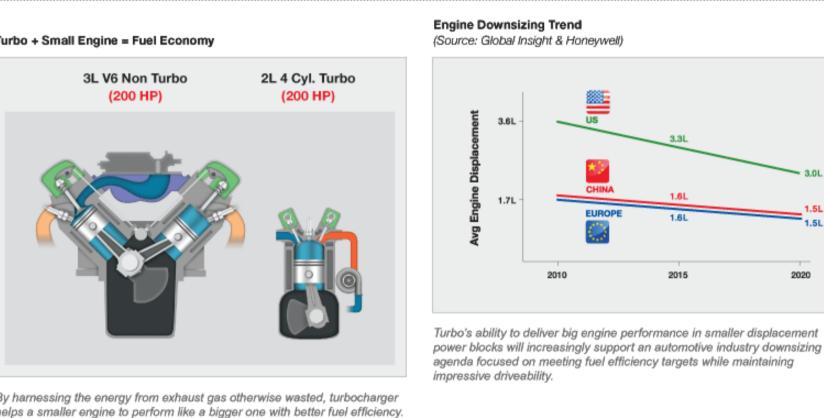


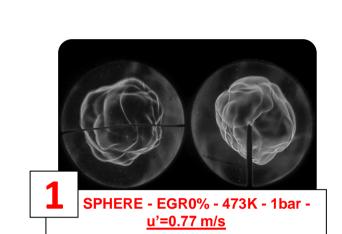

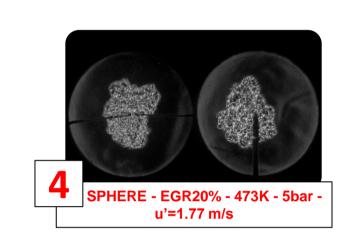


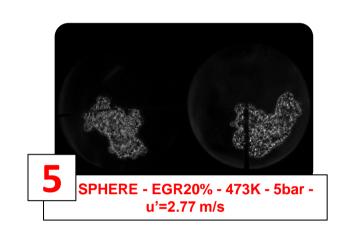


Spherical Vessel reference conditions:





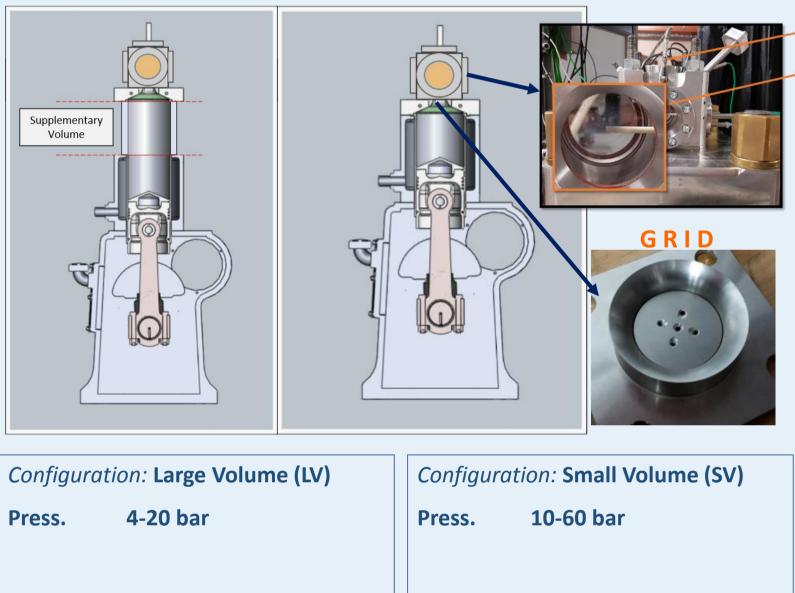




Experimental setup

Innovative Turbulent Vessel:

- Previously unexplored experimental points of high pressure and high temperature
- Testing the inflammability limits with increasing dilution
- Flow field characterization (turbulent and *pseudo-laminar* conditions)
- Investigation of well-known monocomponent fuels and characterized gasoline surrogate



373-573 K 550-900 K Temp. → Turbul. ~ 0.5-1.5 m/s *NO-GRID* → *Turbulent Flow (due to NO-GRID* → *Pseudo-Laminar Flow* the compression, not interesting)

──→ Turbul. ~ 2-2.5 m/s

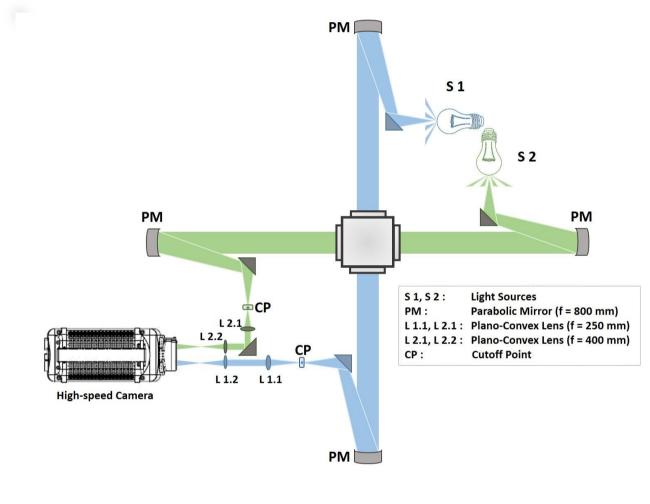

Double-View Schlieren

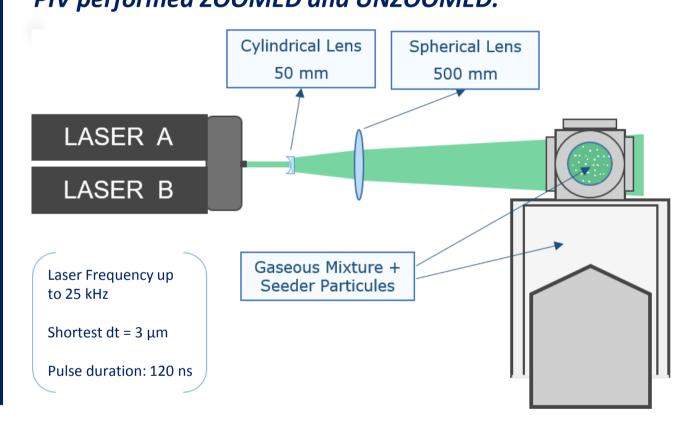
Optical techniques:

Direct optical access from two views allows flame speed propagation and a tridimensional vision of the flame shape.



PIV and Tomography

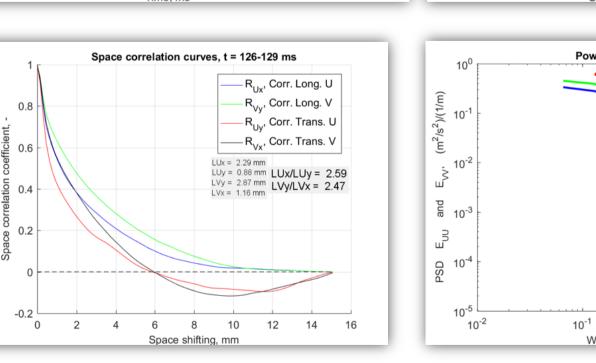
Great spatial and temporal resolution, allowing the flow characterization during compression and plateau phases. Possibility of performing tomography to detect flame contour. PIV performed ZOOMED and UNZOOMED.

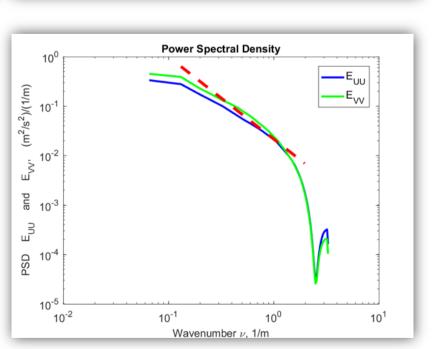

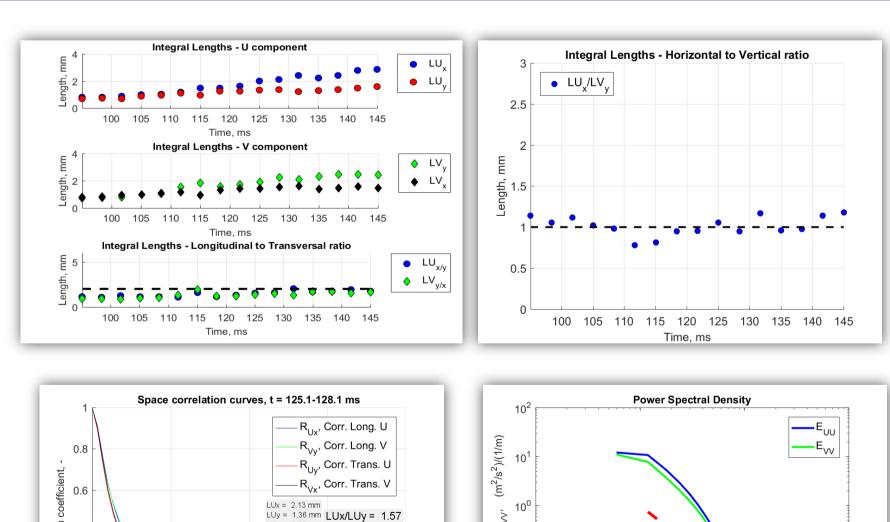

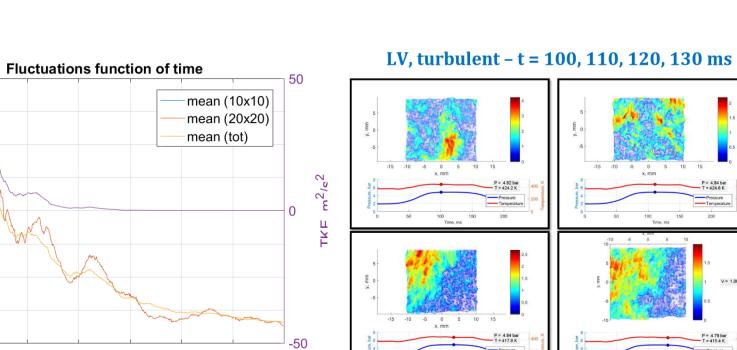

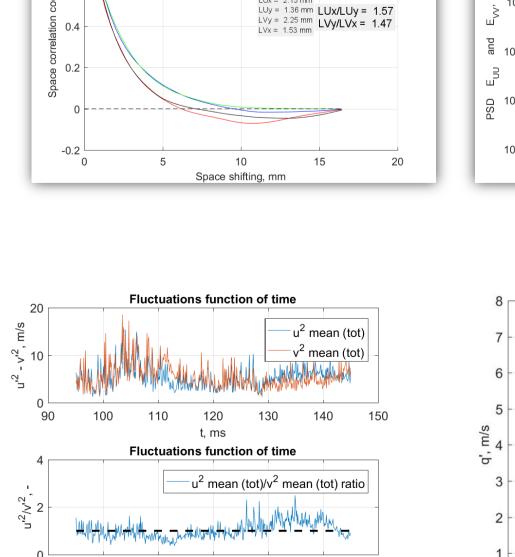

Conclusions

No-grid configuration:

- Large volume setup allows to reproduce laminar-like flow conditions during the temperature and pressure plateau.
- In the small volume the high compression ratio promotes the early insurgence of the turbulence (not interesting due to the possibly flame shifting).

Grid configuration:

Large volume:

- Turbulence may be considered homogeneous and isotropic.
- The turbulence intensity strongly decreases during the plateau, but it does not show significant oscillations.

Small volume:

- Turbulence may be considered homogeneous and isotropic as well.
- During the plateau the turbulence intensity mean value is constant or slightly increases, even though it presents a lot of oscillations.
- High turbulence intensity values, combined with small integral lengths, allows to reach high Karlovitz number and, thus, investigate the Peters-Borghi diagram unexplored zone.

Next future steps

- Validate the NOSE measurements by testing experimental points in common with the sphere in turbulent and laminar case.
- Test the dilution limit of the TRF-E with increasing temperature and pressure.
- Obtaining turbulent burning velocity measurements from NOSE using Double-View Schlieren and Tomography.
