Context - Aims

- THOR dummies in preparation for consumer testing (NCAP...)
- Submarining and abdominal injuries remain issues (rear occupant, new seating in future automated vehicles...)
- Objectives: improve dummy response, submarining and abdominal injury prediction for the small occupant (future 5th percentile female THOR) and current THOR 50th percentile male
- Collaborative project 2016-2020

Methods

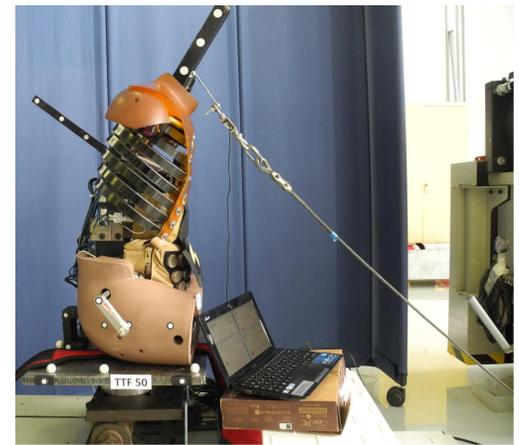
- Formulate dummy specifications for pelvis, lumbar spine and abdomen (biomechanical requirements)
- Develop CAD & prototypes (with Abdominal Pressure Twin Sensors)
- Evaluate prototypes of the 50th male and new 5th female THOR dummies in various testing at multiple partners
- Propose submarining predictors and abdominal injury criteria

LBMC Results

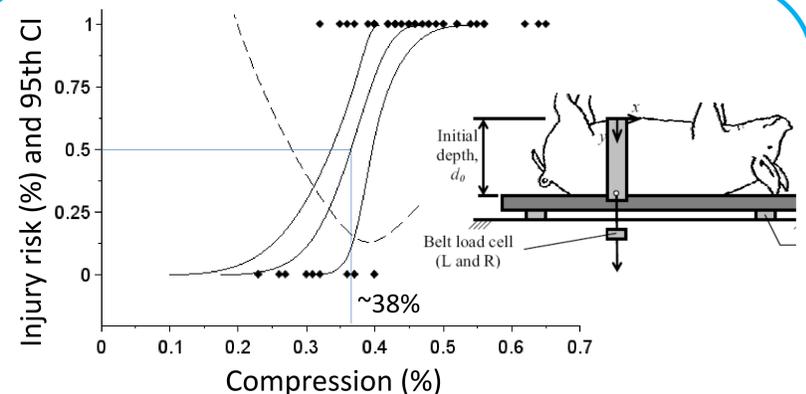
- Characterize the sensitivity of the response and injury predictors to the loading conditions (magnitude and orientation)
 - Including a preliminary simulation study
 - 50th male completed. 5th female in preparation
- Perform matching test to prepare the definition of abdominal risk curves

Related project: ENOP (2019-2021)

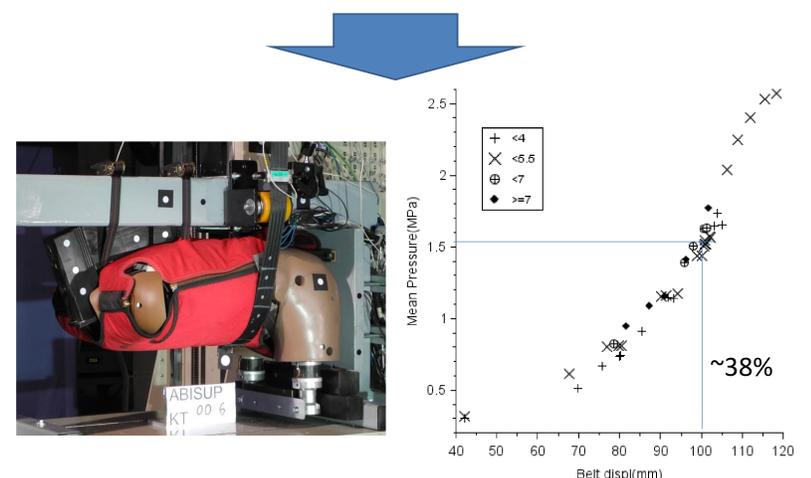
- Enable New Occupant Postures: assess submarining and injury risk in seating configurations possibly used in future Highly Automated Vehicle**
 - Collect data in tests with PMHS (Post Mortem Human Surrogates) in **Swiveled** and **Reclined** configurations
 - Use results to **validate HBM responses** (coll. SURCA) and **specify Thor modification kit** for new postures
 - Evaluate new prototype
- Same partnership + Autoliv Research, BaST and close collaboration with NHTSA funded similar effort
