Develop a custom Biotribocorrosion test rig taking into account the biological, mechanical and chemical factors Understand the role of synergistic interaction of wear and corrosion in the case of CoCrMo/PE implants



Schematic biotribocorrosimeter set-up developped by Mateis and LaMCoS.

CoCrMo surface (green)

PE transfer film

Biotribocorrosion sequence

Electrochemical meas. : Evolution of open circuit potential EOCP and voltage drops.

Biological meas. :

Visualization of living cells and acidification: specific sensor of endocytic (ions) and phagocytic (debris) internalization.

Surface and debris analysis (SEM, IFM)





Murine macrophages RAW 264.7 Human osteoblasts hFOB 1.19 Cell seeding density : 5.104 cells/cm²





Mechanical sequence : Init : Initialization phase, CSR : Compression Stress Relaxation, **Rh** : Rheology, **Slid** : Sliding phases. V_{slid} : 0.5-2 mm/s)

Tribology



Numerous and round particles ejected out of the contact due to rough rugosity of CoCrMo. PE layer adherent and pulled. Adhesive wear



Roll-shaped particles that are crushed and little ejected. Thick third-body acting as lubricant. Hydrodynamic effect



significant dissolution of CoCrMo.

Biology





Acidification of endocytic compartment or/and phagosomes. Hallmarks of endocytosis, pinocytosis or/and phagocytosis.

Fluorescence does not differ significantly during testing (6h).

Fluorescent intensity of pHrodo indicator after internalization by living macrophages. Green intensity represents acidification (pH 4.7-5) in acidic endosomes, lysosomes and phagosomes.

> Acidification of endocytic compartment. Maybe revelation of the endoplasmic reticulum that is chemical reaction site

No difference during testing (6h).

Fluorescent intensity of pHrodo indicator after internalization by living osteoblasts. Green intensity represents acidification (pH 4.7-5) in acidic endosomes and lysosomes.

Test N°1: PE adhesive layer, adhesive wear **Test N°2** : Third-body thick, hydrodynamic Confirmed by :

COF 1 (0.076) > COF 2 (0.054)

 V_{Wear} 1 (0.019 mm³) > V_{Wear} 2 (0.009 mm³)

Test N°1 : Slow ionic dissolution. Low V_{slid} induces an accumulation of electrostatic charges on PE pin **Test N°2** : High V_{slid} causes dissolution and then repassivation of worn track. lons ++

Conclusion

Revelation of acidification: ions internalization by endocytosis, pinocytosis. Phagocytosis? Provide follow-up after 24, 48 hours of incubation.

Biotribocorrosion

Development of a biotribocorrosion apparatus to understand the synergistic effects between mechanical, chemical and physiological reactions:

Mechanical contact identical to that of a prosthesis: PE/CoCrMo

Direct contact of metal ions and wear debris with the cells

Cell culture conditions fulfilled with fluorescence monitoring of living cells
