- EDF plans to generalize the introduction of absorber rods of hafnium not sheathed in the 12 assemblies positioned in the core periphery in order to reduce the flux received by the vessel (900 MWe)
- $Hf + 2H_2O \rightarrow HfO_2 + 2H_2 : \Delta_r H^\circ (1500^\circ C) = -611 \text{ kJ/mol}$
- In SA, possible existence of a runaway temperature of the reaction between Hf and H<sub>2</sub>O ?
  - This runaway could lead to an early acceleration of the oxidation phenomena of the surrounding materials (and in particular the Zry-4) with increased hydrogen production and heat release.
- Hf/H<sub>2</sub>O interaction investigated in the past
  - Most studies at LT (< 700°C)</p>
  - Only one study in steam at 700-1200°C by D'yachkov (2006)
  - Indicative of better resistance of Hf than Zr
- Hf/H<sub>2</sub>O interaction tests at KIT and at IRSN
  - KIT objective : to prepare the QUENCH-debris test
  - ➢ 600°C to 1400°C
  - Different materials (disc, rods and tube)

Oxidation temperature range: 600-1400°C - Isothermal tests up to 60h

Hafnium rods, dics and tubes



Weight gain, metallography, EPMA, hydrogen measurements







Weight gain: comparison of furnace and TGA experiments



Good agreement between furnace and TGA experiments





Large difference in oxidation kinetics between Hf rods and tubes....



### **Oxide microstructure:** comparison of Hf rod and Hf tube's results

### …..linked to a difference in oxide microstructure

## **Oxidation of Hafnium discs**

The oxidation rate is not parabolic above 700°C

The higher oxidation rate seems to be associated to hydrogen pickup (>600 ppm after oxidation at 900°C for 22h)

## K<sub>p</sub> rate constant and oxygen diffusivity : Hf versus Zy4

The oxygen diffusivity in hafnium and in Zircaloy-4 is of the same order

However, the parabolic rate constant is much lower than in Zircaloy-4

- The oxidation rate of hafnium in steam was determined in the temperature range 600-1400°C,
- The parabolic rate constant and the diffusion coefficient in the metal were estimated for hafnium rods/discs,
- Clearly, the oxidation rate depends on the surface conditions of the samples
- However, it remains well below the oxidation rate of Zircaloy-4
- First calculations show little impact on accident progression but, interactions between hafnium and core materials should be investigated to confirm this result.
