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# On the automorphisms of the Drinfel'd double of a Borel Lie subalgebra

#### Abstract

Let $\mathfrak{g}$ be a complex simple Lie algebra with Borel subalgebra $\mathfrak{b}$. Consider the semidirect-product $I \mathfrak{b}=\mathfrak{b} \ltimes \mathfrak{b}^{*}$, where $\mathfrak{b}^{*}$, the dual of $\mathfrak{b}$, is equipped with the coadjoint action of $\mathfrak{b}$ and is considered as an abelian ideal of $I \mathfrak{b}$. Given an automorphism $\gamma$ the extended Dynkin diagram of $\mathfrak{g}$, we construct an automorphism of $I \mathfrak{b}$ of the same order.

In type A, these automorphisms were recently constructed by Dror Bar-Natan and Roland Van Der Veen in [Bv20] (where $I \mathfrak{b}$ is denoted by $I \mathfrak{u}_{n}$ ). Their construction is by hand and they ask for an explanation: this note fully answers the question.


## 1 Introduction

Given any Lie algebra $\mathfrak{a}$, one can form its "inhomogeneous version" $I \mathfrak{a}:=\mathfrak{a} \ltimes \mathfrak{a}^{*}$. It is the semidirect product of $\mathfrak{a}$ with its dual $\mathfrak{a}^{*}$ where $\mathfrak{a}^{*}$ is considered as an abelian Lie algebra and $\mathfrak{a}$ acts on $\mathfrak{a}^{*}$ via the coadjoint action.

Here we consider the case when $\mathfrak{a}=\mathfrak{b}$ is the Borel subalgebra of some complex simple Lie algebra $\mathfrak{g}$. In this case, $\mathfrak{b}^{*}$ can be understood differently. Indeed, let $\mathfrak{n}$ be the derived subalgebra of $\mathfrak{b}$ and $\mathfrak{b}^{-}$be the opposite Borel subalgebra of $\mathfrak{b}$ (relatively to some fixed Cartan subalgebra). Now, $\mathfrak{b}^{-}$identifies with $\mathfrak{g} / \mathfrak{n}$ and hence inherits from a structure of a $\mathfrak{b}$-module. Then $\mathfrak{b}^{-}$identifies with $\mathfrak{b}^{*}$ as a $\mathfrak{b}$-module.

Consider now the affine Kac-Moody Lie algebra $\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}$, its center $Z\left(\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}\right)$ and its Borel subalgebra $\mathfrak{b}^{\mathrm{KM}}$. Let $\mathfrak{n}^{\mathrm{KM}}$ denote the derived subalgebra of $\mathfrak{b}^{\mathrm{KM}}$. By killing the semidirectproduct and the central extension from the construction of $\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}$, one gets

$$
\begin{aligned}
\tilde{\mathfrak{g}} & :=\left[\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}, \mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}\right] / Z\left(\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}\right) \\
& \cong \mathbb{C}\left[t^{ \pm 1}\right] \otimes \mathfrak{g}
\end{aligned}
$$

and

$$
\begin{aligned}
\tilde{\mathfrak{b}} & :=\left(\mathfrak{b}^{\mathrm{KM}} \cap\left[\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}, \mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}\right]\right) / Z\left(\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}\right) \subset \tilde{\mathfrak{g}} \\
\tilde{\mathfrak{n}} & :=\left(\mathfrak{n}^{\mathrm{KM}} \cap\left[\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}, \mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}\right]\right) / Z\left(\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}\right)=[\tilde{\mathfrak{b}}, \tilde{\mathfrak{b}}] .
\end{aligned}
$$

We identify $\mathfrak{g}$ with the subspace $\mathbb{C} \otimes \mathfrak{g} \subset \tilde{\mathfrak{g}}$.

Theorem 1. The map

$$
\begin{aligned}
I \mathfrak{b} & \longrightarrow \tilde{\mathfrak{b}} /(t \tilde{\mathfrak{n}}) \\
\xi+\zeta & \longmapsto \xi+t \zeta,
\end{aligned}
$$

with $\xi \in \mathfrak{b}$ and $\zeta \in \mathfrak{b}^{-}$is a well defined isomorphism of Lie algebras.
Consider now an automorphism $\gamma$ of the extended Dynkin diagram $\tilde{\mathcal{D}}_{\mathfrak{g}}$ of $\mathfrak{g}$. Since $\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}$ is canonically defined from its Dynkin diagram, $\gamma$ induces an automorphism (still denoted by $\gamma$ ) of $\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}$. Moreover, by construction $\gamma$ preserves both the Cartan subalgebra of $\mathfrak{g}^{\mathrm{KM}}$, its Borel subalgebra $\mathfrak{b}^{\mathrm{KM}}$ and $\mathfrak{n}^{\mathrm{KM}}$. Thus it induces an isomorphism $\bar{\gamma}$ of $\tilde{\mathfrak{b}} /(t \tilde{\mathfrak{n}})$.

Corollary 2. The above construction induces an injective morphism from $\operatorname{Aut}\left(\tilde{\mathcal{D}}_{\mathfrak{g}}\right)$ to $\operatorname{Aut}(I \mathfrak{b})$.
At the end of the paper, a table sums up the $\operatorname{groups} \operatorname{Aut}\left(\tilde{\mathcal{D}}_{\mathfrak{g}}\right)$ for $\mathfrak{g}$ simple.
Comments. This note was first sent to the authors of [Bv20]. We thank Dror BarNatan and Roland van der Veen for their prompt answers. In doing so, we learned that they were already informed by A. Knutson that very similar connexion was made in KZJ07, Sections 2.1 and 2.3], at least in type A.

## 2 Proof

The proofs are simple checkings. First, it follows from the constuction of the affine KacMoody algebra that we have the following decompositions

$$
\begin{aligned}
\tilde{\mathfrak{b}} & =\mathbb{C}[t] \mathfrak{b} \oplus t \mathbb{C}[t] \mathfrak{n}^{-} \\
\tilde{\mathfrak{n}} & =\mathbb{C}[t] \mathfrak{n} \oplus t \mathbb{C}[t] \mathfrak{b}^{-}
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\mathfrak{n}^{-}$is the derived subalgebra of $\mathfrak{b}^{-}$. Then, it is obvious that $t \tilde{\mathfrak{n}}$ is an ideal of $\tilde{\mathfrak{b}}$ and that $\tilde{\mathfrak{b}} /(t \tilde{\mathfrak{n}})$ is a Lie algebra. These decompositions imply that the linear map from Theorem 1 is well defined.

Consider the quotient map $\pi: \mathfrak{g} \longrightarrow \mathfrak{g} / \mathfrak{b} \simeq \mathfrak{b}^{-}$.
Let $\xi, \xi^{\prime} \in \mathfrak{b}$ and $\zeta, \zeta^{\prime} \in \mathfrak{b}^{-}$. Then, computing in $\tilde{\mathfrak{b}}$, we get:

$$
\left[\xi+t \zeta, \xi^{\prime}+t \zeta^{\prime}\right]=\left[\xi, \xi^{\prime}\right]+t\left(\left[\zeta, \xi^{\prime}\right]+\left[\zeta^{\prime}, \xi\right]\right)+t^{2}\left[\zeta, \zeta^{\prime}\right]
$$

Its class modulo $t \tilde{\mathfrak{n}}$ is

$$
\left[\xi, \xi^{\prime}\right]+t \pi\left(\left[\zeta, \xi^{\prime}\right]+\left[\zeta^{\prime}, \xi\right]\right)
$$

This implies that the map is a Lie algebra isomorphism.
Finally, a diagram automorphism $\gamma$ is characterized by the induced permutation of the root spaces of $\mathfrak{g}^{K M}$ associated to simple roots. Since these root spaces survive in $I \mathfrak{b}$, the injectivity statement in the corollary is clear.
