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### Aging, cognitive performance and exercise

#### Normal cognitive aging

- Information processing speed (Salthouse, 1996)
- Episodic memory (Isingrini & Taconnat, 2008; Kraik & Salthouse, 2011)
- Executive functions (Albinet et al., 2012; Collette & Salmon, 2013).

#### • Regular physical exercise may reduce these cognitive declines:

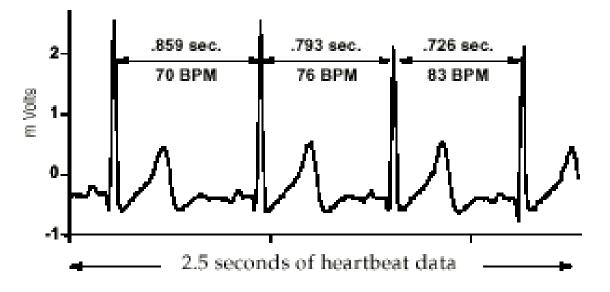
Particularly concerning executive control processes (Abou-Dest et al., 2012; Boucard et al., 2012; Colcombe & Kramer; 2003; Kramer et al., 1999).

Related to brain structure and functioning improvements (cf. C. Voelcker-Reaghe this afternoon).

# Aging, resting heart rate variability (HRV) and exercise

- Resting HRV is a marker of cardiac autonomous activity (ANS; Task Force, 1996)
  - Greater HRV and mortality

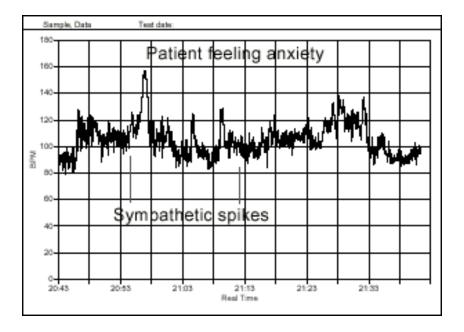
reduced risk of cardiovascular disease

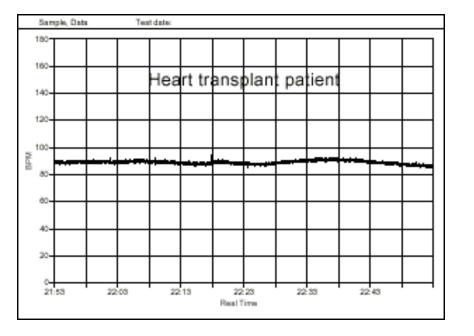


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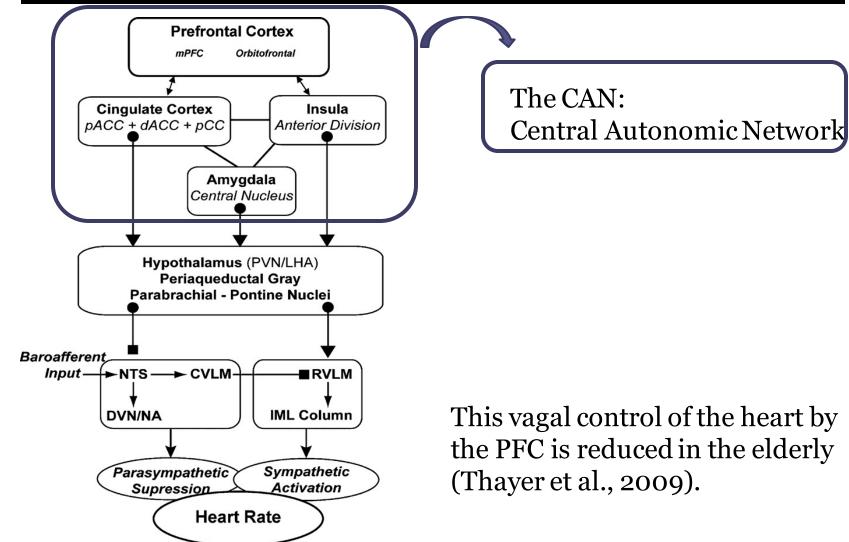
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- Resting HRV decreases during normal aging (De Meersman & Stein, 2007; Kim et al., 2006).
- Resting HRV increases with regular aerobic exercise (Albinet et al., 2010; Buchheit et al., 2004).
- Resting HRV as an index of the relationships between
  - The ANS and the CNS
  - Physiological and psychological processes
  - Cardiac activity and PFC activity

# Objective

- To evaluate the effects of a 5-month aerobic training program (aquaerobics and swimming) on:
  - Executive functions performance
  - Resting HRV
  - Psychological state
  - Aerobic fitness
- To evaluate the relationship between the potential improvements in executive performance and in vagal indices of resting HRV.

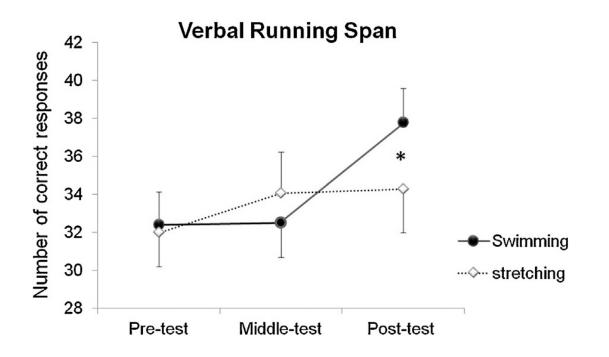

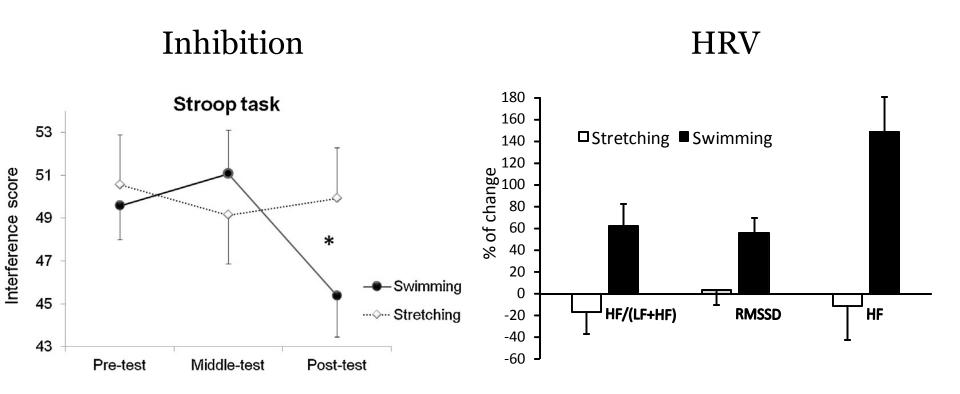

# Main Results

- Psychological evaluation
  - Positive main effect of the 2 programs on depression, selfefficacy, decisional balance.
- Cardiorespiratory fitness evaluation
  - Positive main effect of the 2 programs on VO<sub>2</sub>max.
- Executive functions evaluation
  - Positive main effect of the 2 programs on the 2-back task
  - Only the Swimming group improved performance on:
    - The verbal running span (updating of WM)
    - The Stroop task (inhibition)

#### Updating of WM





Significant relationships between changes in Stroop performance and changes in vagal indices of HRV (r  $\approx$  .35; p < .05)

## Discussion

- 5 months of aquaerobics program to see executive improvements in Inhibition and Updating.
- Only the swimming group showed increases in vagal indices of HRV.
- Improvements in Inhibition and in HRV seem to be functionally related.
- Brain regions of the CAN also implicated in cognitive inhibition and in conflict monitoring (Aron, 2007; Miller, 2000) and improved by aerobic exercise (Colcombe et al., 2004; Weinstein et al., 2012).
- Functional network preferentially boosted by the cardiovascular benefits of aerobic exercise?

# Open questions

- Why not all the experimental tasks sensitive to aerobic training?
- Is the link between physiological inhibition (of brainstem acceleratory circuits) and cognitive inhibition robust?
- Measurements in a large survey (+200 persons) of resting HRV and cognitive inhibition at home: the PRAUSE survey.
- Combining HRV measures and neuroimaging measures (fMRI) to directly test their functional relationships.
