# WEBER'S CLASS NUMBER PROBLEM AND $p$-RATIONALITY IN THE CYCLOTOMIC $\widehat{\mathbb{Z}}$-EXTENSION OF $\mathbb{Q}$ 

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#### Abstract

Let $K:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), n \geq 0$, be the $n$th layer in the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell^{-}}$ extension of $\mathbb{Q}$. It is conjectured that, for all $\ell$ and $n, K$ is principal (especially for $\ell=2$, a conjecture due to Weber). Many studies (Ichimura-Morisawa-Nakajima-Okazaki...) go in this direction, as the Miller use of the Cohen-Lenstra-Martinet heuristics. Nevertheless, we examine in what circumstances a counterexample may be possible. For this, computations show that the $p$ torsion group $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ of the Galois group of the maximal abelian $p$-ramified pro-$p$-extension of $K$ is not always trivial. This questions the relevance of the conjecture since $\# \mathscr{T}_{K}=\# \mathscr{C}_{K} \cdot \# \mathscr{R}_{K} \cdot \# \mathscr{W}_{K}$, where $\mathscr{C}_{K}$ is the $p$-class group of $K$, $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ its normalized $p$-adic regulator, $\# \mathscr{W}_{K}=1$ for $p>2$, $\# \mathscr{W}_{K}=2^{\#\{v, v \mid 2\}-1}$ for $p=2$; nevertheless, no counterexample has been found so far, even using the reflection theorem giving $p$-ranks equalities between $\mathscr{C}_{K}$ and a suitable component of $\mathscr{T}_{K\left(\mu_{p}\right)}$. When $n$ increases, some relative components $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{*}$ may appear for large $p$. We give a method (Theorem 4.6), for testing $\# \mathscr{T}_{K} \neq 1$, allowing larger values of $\ell^{n}$ than those of the literature. Finally, we consider the subfields $K$ of the composite $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ of the $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$-extension and give programs finding again some rare cases of non-trivial class groups (Fukuda-Komatsu-Horie) due to genus theory in connection with a deep link involving $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ (Theorem 6.2) in relation with Greenberg's conjecture as initiated, via $p$-adic zeta-functions, by Taya. In all attempts, Jaulent's logarithmic class group $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}, K \subset \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$, governing Greenberg's conjecture for $K$ and $p$, was trivial.


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## 1. Introduction

Let $\ell \geq 2$ be a prime number and let $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), n \geq 0$, be the $n$th layer in the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell^{-}}$-extension $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$ of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\right.$ with $\left.\left[\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right): \mathbb{Q}\right]=\ell^{n}\right)$. We draw attention on the fact that we use $\ell$ (instead of $p$ in the literature) since we need to apply the $p$-ramification theory to the fields $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), p \neq \ell$, which is more usual.
The purpose of our study is to see in what circumstances the $p$-class group of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ is likely to be non-trivial for some prime $p$. Of course, the direct computation (or some deep analytic studies) of the class number has been done by many authors without complete success because of limitation of the order of magnitude of the degree $\ell^{n}$; for instance, the results given in [43, 44, Tables 1, 2] only concerns $\ell^{n}=$ $2^{7}, 3^{4}, 5^{2}, 11,13,17,19,23,29,31\left(2^{7}, 3^{4}, 29,31\right.$ under GRH). Using PARI/GP [53] programs, any "serious" computation needs the instruction $K=\operatorname{bnfinit}(P, 1)$ (giving all the basic invariants of the field $K$ defined via the polynomial P , whence the whole class group, a system of units, etc.), few values of $\ell, n$, may be carried out. Some approaches, by means of geometry of numbers, prove that some of these fields are euclidian (see, e.g., 5 about $\mathbb{Q}\left(2^{2}\right) \mathbb{Q}\left(2^{3}\right)$ ); but this more difficult and broad aspect needs other techniques and we are in a class field theory context. For these reasons, we will use the following trick.
Let $K$ be a number field and let $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ be the torsion group of $\mathscr{G}_{K}^{\mathrm{pr}}:=\operatorname{Gal}\left(H_{K}^{\mathrm{pr}} / K\right)$, where $H_{K}^{\mathrm{pr}}$ is the maximal abelian $p$-ramified (i.e., unramified outside $p$ and $\infty$ ) pro-p-extension of $K$; for $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, we have the identity:

\# \mathscr{T}_{K}=\# \mathscr{C}_{K} \cdot \# \mathscr{R}_{K} \cdot \# \mathscr{W}_{K},
$$

where $\mathscr{C}_{K}$ is the $p$-class group, $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ the normalized $p$-adic regulator and $\mathscr{W}_{K}$ an obvious factor (see Lemma 2.1 about $\mathscr{W}_{K}$, in general trivial). Since Leopoldt's conjecture holds in $K$, we have, for any prime $p, \mathscr{G}_{K}^{\mathrm{pr}}=\Gamma_{K} \oplus \mathscr{T}_{K}$, with $\Gamma_{K} \simeq \mathbb{Z}_{p}$. So, as soon as $\mathscr{T}_{K}=1$, we are certain that $\# \mathscr{C}_{K}=1$; otherwise, we may suspect a possible counterexample.
Of course, the good new is that the test on $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ does not need $\mathrm{K}=\operatorname{bnfinit}(\mathrm{P}, 1)$; it will be explained Section 3 and yields Theorem 4.6. Before we shall compute, in Subsection [2.3, some $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ by means of a classical program (using $\mathrm{K}=\operatorname{bnfinit}(\mathrm{P}, 1)$ ) to show that this $p$-torsion group is non-trivial in some cases of small degrees $\ell^{n}$.
Now we recall some classical properties of these invariants.
1.1. $p$-class groups in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$. We denote by $p$ a prime number and by $\mathscr{A} \simeq$ $A \otimes \mathbb{Z}_{p}$ the $p$-Sylow subgroup of any finite abelian group $A$ (e.g., the class group $C_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ giving the $p$-class group $\left.\mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}\right)$.
Chevalley's formula [6, p. 406] (1933) for class groups $C_{K}^{\text {res }}$ and $C_{k}^{\text {res }}$ (restricted sense), in any cyclic extension $K / k$ of Galois group $G$, is in whole generality:

\#\left(C_{K}^{\mathrm{res}}\right)^{G}=\frac{\# C_{k}^{\mathrm{res}} \cdot \prod_{\mathfrak{\imath}} e_{\mathfrak{l}}}{[K: k] \cdot\left(E_{k}^{\mathrm{pos}}: E_{k}^{\mathrm{pos}} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{K / k}\left(K^{\times}\right)\right)}
$$

where $e_{\mathfrak{l}}$ is the ramification index in $K / k$ of the prime ideal $\mathfrak{l}$ of $k$ and $E_{k}^{\text {pos }}$ is the group of totally positive units of $k$. When $K / k$ is totally ramified at some prime ideal $\mathfrak{l}_{0}$, the formula becomes the product of two integers:

\#\left(C_{K}^{\mathrm{res}}\right)^{G}=\# C_{k}^{\mathrm{res}} \cdot \frac{\prod_{\mathfrak{l} \neq \mathbf{l}_{0}} e_{\mathfrak{l}}}{\left(E_{k}^{\mathrm{pos}}: E_{k}^{\mathrm{pos}} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{K / k}\left(K^{\times}\right)\right)}
$$

Applied to $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}$ the formula gives $\left(C_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{\mathrm{res}}\right)^{G}=1$ since $\ell$ is the unique (totally) ramified prime and since $E_{\mathbb{Q}}^{\mathrm{pos}}=1$. So $\mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{\text {res }}=1$, a classical result often attributed to Iwasawa instead of Chevalley (or more precisely Herbrand-Chevalley, the Herbrand quotient of the group of units of $K$ being the key for the proof). In the sequel, we implicitly assume $p \neq \ell$.
1.2. $p$-torsion group of abelian $p$-ramification in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$. The analogous "fixed points formula" for the $\ell$-torsion group $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$, in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}$ (i.e., $\left.p=\ell\right)$, gives also $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}=1$ for all $n$ [27, Appendix A.4.2]; which justifies once again the assumption $p \neq \ell$ and that the notation $\mathscr{T}$ always refers to a $p$-torsion group.
The invariants $\mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ and $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$, for all $p \neq \ell$, are the fundamental invariants of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ and one may ask if the arithmetic of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ is as smooth as it is conjectured (for $\left.C_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}\right)$ by many authors after many verifications and partial proofs 4, 10, 11, 12, 13, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49]. The triviality of the $\mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ has no counterexamples as $\ell, n, p$ vary, but that of the $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ is, on the contrary, not true as we shall see with various numerical experiments.
These invariants of $p$-torsion were less (numerically) computed than class groups, which is unfortunate because they are of basic use in Galois cohomology since, for all number field $K, \mathscr{T}_{K}$ is the dual of $\mathrm{H}^{2}\left(\mathscr{G}_{K, p}, \mathbb{Z}_{p}\right)$ [52], where $\mathscr{G}_{K, p}$ is the Galois group of the maximal $p$-ramified pro- $p$-extension of $K$ (ordinary sense); then we have the local-global approach defining the first and second Shafarevich-Tate groups in the simplest framework of $p$-ramification (see [42, Theorem 3.74]):

Ш_{K, p}^{i}:=\operatorname{Ker}\left[\mathrm{H}^{i}\left(\mathscr{G}_{K, p}, \mathbb{F}_{p}\right) \longrightarrow \underset{v \mid p}{\bigoplus^{1}} \mathrm{H}^{1}\left(\mathscr{G}_{K_{v}}, \mathbb{F}_{p}\right)\right], i=1,2,
$$

which essentially depend on $V_{K, p} / K^{\times p}$ where:

$$
V_{K, p}:=\left\{\alpha \in K^{\times},(\alpha)=\mathfrak{a}^{p}, \alpha \in K_{v}^{\times}, \forall v \in S\right\},
$$

giving the Shafarevich formula (see some generalizations with ramification and decomposition in [15, II.5.4.1] as well as in [38], after pioneering works of Haberland-Koch-Neumann-Schmidt); this depends on the $p$-rank of the $S$-class group $C_{K}^{S}:=$ $C_{K} / d_{K}(S)$, where $S$ is the set of $p$-places of $K$. Then the reflection theorem obtained by "Kummer duality" gives a precise relation with the p-rank of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ ([19] and [15, II.5.4.5 and Theorem III.4.2]).
More generally, if one replaces the notion of $p$-ramification (in pro- $p$-extensions) by that of $S$-ramification (in pro-extensions), for any set of places $S$, the corresponding Shafarevich-Tate groups have some relation with the corresponding
torsion groups $\mathscr{T}_{K, S}$, but with many open questions when no assumption is done on $S$ (see [31] for an up to date story about them and for numerical examples).
When $\mathscr{T}_{K}=1$ under Leopoldt's conjecture, one speaks of $p$-rational field; in this case, the Shafarevich-Tate groups are trivial, which has deep consequences as shown for instance in [2] in relation with our conjectures in [20]. For more information on the story of abelian $p$-ramification and $p$-rationality, see [27, Appendix A] and its bibliography about the pioneering contributions: K-theory approach [18], $p$-infinitesimal approach [38], cohomological/pro-p-group approach [50, 51]. All basic material about $p$-rationality is overviewed in [15, III.2, IV.3, IV.4.8 ].
Finally, the orders and annihilations of the $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ are given by $p$-adic $L$-functions, the two theories (arithmetic and analytic) being equivalent (this will give the testing of $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)} \neq 1$ from Theorem 4.6 using a suitable algorithm).
All these principles on Shafarevich-Tate groups exist for elliptic curves and this is at the origin of a question of Coates [8, Section 3] about the possible triviality of the $C_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ and more generally the behavior of the class groups in the composite of the $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$-extensions of $\mathbb{Q} \cdot 1$

## 2. Abelian $p$-RAmification theory for totally Real fields

Recall the context of abelian $p$-ramification theory when $K$ is any totally real number field (under Leopoldt's conjecture for $p$ in $K$ ).

### 2.1. Main definitions and notations - The $p$-invariants of $K$.

(a) Let $E_{K}^{1}$ be the group of $p$-principal global units $\varepsilon \equiv 1\left(\bmod \prod_{p \mid p} \mathfrak{p}\right)$ of $K$. Let $U_{K}^{1}:=\oplus_{\mathfrak{p} \mid p} U_{K_{\mathfrak{p}}}^{1}$ be the $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-module of $p$-principal local units, where $U_{K_{\mathfrak{p}}}^{1}$ is the group of $\mathfrak{p}$-principal units of the $\mathfrak{p}$-completion $K_{\mathfrak{p}}$ of $K$. Denote by $\mu_{\kappa}$ the group of $p$ th roots of unity of any field $\kappa$ and put $\mathscr{W}_{K}:=$ $\operatorname{tor}_{\mathbb{Z}_{p}}\left(U_{K}^{1}\right) / \mu_{K}=\left[\oplus_{\mathfrak{p} \mid p} \mu_{K_{\mathfrak{p}}}\right] / \mu_{K}$.
(b) Let $\iota:\left\{x \in K^{\times} \otimes \mathbb{Z}_{p}, x\right.$ prime to $\left.p\right\} \rightarrow U_{K}^{1}$ be the diagonal embedding. Let $\overline{E_{K}^{1}}$ be the closure of $\iota E_{K}^{1}$ in $U_{K}^{1}$ and let $H_{K}^{\mathrm{nr}}$ be the $p$-Hilbert class field of $K$; then we have $\operatorname{Gal}\left(H_{K}^{\mathrm{pr}} / H_{K}^{\mathrm{nr}}\right) \simeq U_{K}^{1} / \overline{E_{K}^{1}}$. The Leopoldt conjecture leads to the (not so trivial) exact sequence:

1 \longrightarrow \mathscr{W}_{K} \longrightarrow \operatorname{tor}_{\mathbb{Z}_{p}}\left(U_{K}^{1} / \overline{E_{K}^{1}}\right) \xrightarrow{\log } \operatorname{tor}_{\mathbb{Z}_{p}}\left(\log \left(U_{K}^{1}\right) / \log \left(\overline{E_{K}^{1}}\right)\right) \rightarrow 0
$$

(c) Let $\mathscr{C}_{K}$ be the $p$-class group of $K$, isomorphic to $\operatorname{Gal}\left(H_{K}^{\mathrm{nr}} / K\right)$.
(d) Let $\mathscr{R}_{K}:=\operatorname{tor}_{\mathbb{Z}_{p}}\left(\log \left(U_{K}^{1}\right) / \log \left(\overline{E_{K}^{1}}\right)\right)$ be the normalized $p$-adic regulator [23, §5]; recall that for $p \neq 2$, $\# \mathscr{R}_{K}=\frac{R_{K}}{p^{d-1}}$ and $\# \mathscr{R}_{K}=\frac{1}{2^{s_{2}-1}} \frac{R_{K}}{2^{d-1}}$ for $p=2$, where $R_{K}$ is the classical $p$-adic regulator, $d=[K: \mathbb{Q}]$ and $s_{2}$ is the number of 2-places in $K$ (see [7, Appendix] giving the link with the residue of the $p$-adic zeta function of $K$ ).
(e) Let $K\left(p^{\infty}\right)$ be the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-extension of $K$ and let $H_{K}^{\mathrm{bp}}$ (called the Bertrandias-Payan field) fixed by the subgroup $\mathscr{W}_{K}$ of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$; the field $H_{K}^{\mathrm{bp}}$ is the composite of all $p$-cyclic extensions of $K$ embeddable in $p$-cyclic extensions of arbitrary large degree.

[^0]2.2. The case of the fields $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$. In that case, some simplifications arise.

Lemma 2.1. One has $\mathscr{W}_{K}=1$ for all $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, except for the case $p=2$ in which case, $\mathscr{W}_{K} \simeq \mathbb{F}_{2}^{\delta_{K}-1}$ where $\delta_{K}$ is the number of primes $\mathfrak{p} \mid 2$ in $K$.

Proof. For $p \neq 2$, the $p$-completions $K_{\mathfrak{p}}$ of $K$ (unramified of $\ell$ th power degree) do not contain $\mu_{p}$ since $\mathbb{Q}_{p}\left(\mu_{p}\right) / \mathbb{Q}_{p}$, of degree $p-1>1$, is totally ramified at $p$; thus $\mathscr{W}_{K}=1$.
For $p=2, K_{\mathfrak{p}}$ does not contain $\mu_{4}$ but $\mu_{2}$ and $W_{K} \simeq \mathbb{F}_{2}^{\delta_{K}}$, thus $\mathscr{W}_{K} \simeq \mathbb{F}_{2}^{\delta_{K}-1}$.
For $p=2$, the case $\delta_{K}>1$ is very rare and occurs only when $2^{\ell-1} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{n+1}\right)$, e.g., $\ell=2093$, 3511, for $n=1$, but these values of $\ell$ are out of range of practical computations. Thus $\mathscr{W}_{K}$ is in general trivial.
Since $K\left(p^{\infty}\right) \cap H_{K}^{\mathrm{nr}}=K$ for $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, we have the following diagram:


Remarks 2.2. (i) If $\mathscr{W}_{K}=\mathscr{C}_{K}=1$, we have $\mathscr{T}_{K}=\mathscr{R}_{K}$, the normalized padic regulator, which is not always trivial as we shall see, even if we have conjectured in [20] that, for any number field $K, \mathscr{T}_{K}=1$ for $p \gg 0$.
(ii) One may think that interesting examples occur only for larger values of $\ell^{n}$ and probably more easily when $p$ totally splits in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right)$ (i.e., $p \equiv 1$ $\left.\left(\bmod \ell^{n}\right)\right)$; see §2.4.
This explains the result of [36] and [37] clamming that \# $C_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ is odd in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$ for all $\ell<500$ and that of [35, 48, 49]; indeed, for $p=2$ or any very small $p$, the residue degree $\rho_{n}$ of $p$ in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right)$ fulfills the condition $p^{\rho_{n}} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{n}\right)$, giving $\rho_{n}>\frac{n \log (\ell)}{\log (p)}$, unbounded as $n \rightarrow \infty$, which means that if the order of the relative class group $\mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}=\operatorname{Ker}\left(\mathrm{N}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)}\right)$ is non-trivial for $n$ large enough, then it is divisible by $p^{\rho_{n}}$ due to the Galois action on a non-trivial p-class of $C_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}$, which becomes oversized (see $\S 2.4$ for more details showing that $\mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}=1$ for $n \gg 0$ does exist for any prime $p \geq 2$ from a non-trivial result of Washington [56]) and explicit deep analytic computations by [4, 9, 10, 13, 34, 35, 36, 37, 45, 46, 48, 49] (e.g., [13, Corollary 1]).
2.3. General computation of $\# \mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$. We shall use the following PARI/GP programs giving the structure, of abelian group, of $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$, for small values of $n$, from the given polynomial $P=$ polsubcyclo $\left(\mathrm{el}^{\mathrm{n}+1}, \mathrm{el}^{\mathrm{n}}\right)\left(\right.$ or $\left.\mathrm{P}=\operatorname{polsubcyclo}\left(2^{\mathrm{n}+2}, 2^{\mathrm{n}}\right)\right)$ defining the real field $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ (they are simplified forms of the general program written in [25, Programme I, $\S 3.2$ ]). The parameter N must be such that $p^{N}$ is larger than the exponent of $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$; taking $N=2$ for $p>2$ (resp. $N=3$ for $p=2$ ) gives the $p$-rank of the group. Program I is specific of the case $\ell=2$ (the Weber context), Program II works for any odd prime $\ell$ :

These partial results show that the $p$-ramification aspects are more complex since, for instance, for the case $\ell=2$, the divisibility by $p=29$ only appears for $n=2$ and, for $p=13$, the 13 -rank and the exponent increase from $n=1$ to $n=2$ (see the next Subsection 2.4 for more explanations).
Unfortunately, it is not possible in practice to compute easily beyond $\ell=17$ for various $p$. So, as we have explained in the Introduction, we shall give Section 3 another method to test $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)} \neq 1$ for larger $\ell$ and $p$.
2.4. Algebraic and analytic aspects. When $\ell$ and $p \neq \ell$ are fixed, the transfer maps $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)} \rightarrow \mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}, \mathscr{R}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)} \rightarrow \mathscr{R}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}, \mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)} \rightarrow \mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$, are injective and the arithmetic norms $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)} \rightarrow \mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)}, \mathscr{R}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)} \rightarrow \mathscr{R}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)}, \mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)} \rightarrow \mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)}$, are surjective since $p \neq \ell$; so $\# \mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}, \# \mathscr{R}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}, \# \mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ increase as soon as appear relative submodules in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)$.
Let $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}, \mathscr{R}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}, \mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}$, be the corresponding kernels of the arithmetic norm $\mathrm{N}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)}$ (or of the algebraic norm $\left.\nu_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)}:=\sum_{\sigma \in \operatorname{Gal}\left(\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)\right)} \sigma\right)$; then $\# \mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}=\# \mathscr{R}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*} \cdot \# \mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}$, since $\# \mathscr{W}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}=1$, except in the case $p=2$ when 2 splits beyond $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)$, giving $\# \mathscr{W}_{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}\left(\ell^{n}\right)=2$ (Lemma 2.1).
2.4.1. Galois action - Relative modules. Let $\left(\mathscr{M}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}\right)_{n \geq 0}$ be a family of finite $\mathbb{Z}_{p}\left[G_{n}\right]$-modules, where $G_{n}=\operatorname{Gal}\left(\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\right)$, provided with natural transfer and norm maps having the above properties (this will apply to the modules $\mathscr{T}, \mathscr{R}$, $\mathscr{C}, \mathscr{W})$, and let $\mathscr{M}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}$ be the kernel of the algebraic norm $\nu_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)}$ so that $\mathscr{M}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)} \simeq \mathscr{M}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)} \bigoplus \mathscr{M}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}$.

Put $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), n \geq 1$, and $k_{i}:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{i}\right), 0 \leq i \leq n$; since $G_{n}=\operatorname{Gal}(K / \mathbb{Q})$ is cyclic of order $\ell^{n}$, the rational characters $\chi_{i}$ of $K$ are in one-to-one correspondence with the $k_{i}$; we shall denote by $\theta_{i} \mid \chi_{i}$ the irreducible $p$-adic characters; each $\theta_{i}$ is above a character $\psi_{i}$ of degree 1 and order $\ell^{i}$. We have the decomposition:

$$
\mathscr{M}_{K}=\bigoplus_{i=1}^{n} \mathscr{M}_{K}^{\chi_{i}}=\bigoplus_{i=1}^{n} \mathscr{M}_{k_{i}}^{*}=\bigoplus_{i=1}^{n}\left[\bigoplus_{\theta_{i} \mid \chi_{i}} \mathscr{M}_{k_{i}}^{\theta_{i}}\right] .
$$

Then $\mathscr{M}_{K}^{*}$ (or any of its component $\mathscr{M}_{K}^{\theta_{n}}$ ) is a module over $\mathbb{Z}\left[\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right]$, hence isomorphic to a product of $\mathbb{Z}\left[\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right]$-modules of the form:

$$
\mathbb{Z}\left[\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right] / \mathfrak{p}_{n}^{e}, \quad \mathfrak{p}_{n} \mid p \text { in } \mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right), e \geq 1
$$

whose $p$-rank is a multiple of the residue degree $\rho_{n}$ of $p$ in the extension $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right) / \mathbb{Q}$ (i.e., $\rho_{n} \geq 1$ minimal such that $p^{\rho_{n}} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{n}\right)$ ) and whose order is $p^{e \rho_{n}}$; thus $\rho_{n} \rightarrow \infty$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$, which is considered as incredible for classical arithmetic invariants that we shall investigate below, and leads to analytic proofs of the triviality of $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{*}$ for some $p$ if $\ell^{n} \gg 0$ (Remark (2.2).
2.4.2. $p$-class groups in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$. Washington's theorem [56] gives a limitation of the increasing of $\mathscr{C}_{K}$, as $n \rightarrow \infty$; it claims (with our notations) that for $\ell$ and $p$ fixed, $\# \mathscr{C}_{K}$ is constant for all $n$ large enough, whence $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{*}=1$ for all $n \gg 0$. This only applies to the $p$-class groups, but in all the tower. Other analytical studies, as we have mentioned, give some principalities (or p-principalities) under some limitations of the parameters. In [4], a conjecture (from "speculative extensions of the Cohen-Lenstra-Martinet heuristics") implies $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{*} \neq 1$ for finitely many layers $K$ (possibly none).
These theorems may be easily understandable from the previous observation on the $p$-ranks. Thus it is natural (but non-trivial) that $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{*}=1$ (hence $\mathscr{C}_{K}$ constant) for all $n \gg 0$. But this does not give an heuristic for $\operatorname{Prob}\left(\not \mathscr{C}_{K}^{*}=1\right)$ when $n$ varies.
2.4.3. Torsion groups in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$. Concerning the case of the torsion groups $\mathscr{T}_{K}$, we observe that in general the solutions $p$ for $\# \mathscr{T}_{K}^{*} \equiv 0(\bmod p)$ fulfill the relation $p \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{n}\right)$, which is in some sense a strong form of Washington's result because the reflection theorem that we shall recall later in Section 55, in the layers $L_{n}:=K\left(\mu_{p}\right)$, the $p$-rank of $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{*}$ is bounded by that of $\mathscr{C}_{L_{n}}^{*}$ (in fact of the $\omega$ component where $\omega$ is the Teichmüller character). Thus Washington's theorem may be fulfilled by the torsion groups in the $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$-cyclotomic tower of $\mathbb{Q}$.
2.4.4. Regulators in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$. One can wonder what happens for the regulators $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ and the relative components $\mathscr{R}_{K}^{*}$, due to the specific nature of a regulator as a Frobenius determinant and regarding the previous observations. So, recall some algebraic facts about the $\mathscr{R}_{K}^{*}$ that we can explain from heuristics and probabilistic studies given in [20, § 4.2.2].
Indeed, for any real Galois extension $K / \mathbb{Q}$, of Galois group $G$, the normalized $p$-adic regulator $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ may be defined via the conjugates of the $p$-adic logarithm of a suitable Minkowski unit $\eta$ and can be written, regarding $G$, as Frobenius determinant $\mathrm{R}_{p}^{G}(\eta)=\prod_{\theta} \mathrm{R}_{p}^{\theta}(\eta)$, where $\theta$ runs trough the irreducible $p$-adic characters, and $\mathrm{R}_{p}^{\theta}(\eta)=\prod_{\psi \mid \theta} \mathrm{R}_{p}^{\psi}(\eta)$ with absolutely irreducible characters $\psi$. Then (loc. cit.):

$$
\operatorname{Prob}\left(\mathscr{R}_{K}^{\theta} \equiv 0(\bmod p)\right)=\frac{O(1)}{p^{\rho \delta^{2}}}
$$

where $\rho$ is still the residue degree of $p$ in the field of values of $\psi$ and $\delta \geq 1$ is a suitable multiplicity of the absolutely irreducible $\theta$-representation (in our case, $\rho=\rho_{n}$ and $\delta=1$ ).
Contrary to the class group of $K:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ (for $n$ fixed) which is finite, the primes $p$ such that $\mathscr{R}_{K} \equiv 0(\bmod p)$ may be, a priori, infinite in number (we have conjectured that it is not the case, but this is an out of reach conjecture). Nevertheless, some very large primes $p$ may divide $\# \mathscr{R}_{K}^{\theta_{n}}$, which indicates other probabilities conjectured in [20, Théorème 1.1]. Thus, this analysis also confirms that, for $\ell$ and $p$ fixed, $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ may be constant for all $n$ large enough.
So, we have forced some programs to search only primes $p \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{n}\right)$ hoping more examples of non-trivial $\mathscr{T}_{K}$.
2.5. Logarithmic class group. We may also consider another $p$-adic invariant, the Jaulent's logarithmic class group $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}[39]$ which is linked to Greenberg's conjecture [29] for totally real number fields $K$ (i.e., $\lambda=\mu=0$ for the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-extension of $K$ ), the result being that Greenberg's conjecture holds if and only $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}$ capitulates in $K\left(p^{\infty}\right)$ [40. Of course Greenberg's conjecture holds for $p=\ell$ in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$ for trivial reasons, but we have few information for the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-extensions of $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ for $p \neq \ell$.
We have computed (for $\ell^{n} \in\left\{2^{6}, 3^{3}, 5^{3}, 7,11,13,17,19,23,29\right\}$ ) the order of $\tilde{\mathscr{C}}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ for all $p \in\left[2,2 * 10^{5}\right]$ (from [3]), and we have no non-trivial example; this means that the logarithmic class group behaves as the ordinary p-class group in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$, but not as the $\mathscr{T}_{K}$, as we have seen. So it is possible to state the conjecture that, for all $p$, the logarithmic class groups $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}$ are all trivial. This is not too surprising since if $\mathscr{C}_{K}=1$ and if $p$ is totally inert in $K$, then $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}=1$ for obvious reasons (see [40, Schéma § 2.3] or [28, Diagram 4.2]); and this is almost the case in our computations.
We refer to [41, Théorème 4] giving the property of annihilation of $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}$ by means of the Stickelberger pseudo measure and its image by the Spiegel involution that we shall recall and use for the annihilation of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$.

## 3. Definition of $p$-ADIC measures

We recall the main classical principles and apply them in the particular case of the fields $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), \ell \geq 2$ prime, $n \geq 1$, with $p \geq 2$ prime distinct from $\ell$.
3.1. General definition of the Stickelberger elements. Let $f>1$ be any conductor and let $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)$ be the corresponding cyclotomic field. We define (where the integers $a$ are prime to $f$ and where Artin symbols are taken over $\mathbb{Q}$ ):

$$
\mathscr{S}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}:=-\sum_{a=1}^{f}\left(\frac{a}{f}-\frac{1}{2}\right) \cdot\left(\frac{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}{a}\right)^{-1} .
$$

The properties of annihilation need to multiply $\mathscr{S}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}$ by an element of the annihilator of $\mu_{f}$, which contains $f$ and the multipliers $1-c \cdot\left(\frac{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}{c}\right)^{-1}$, for $c$ odd prime to $f$. This shall give integral elements in the group algebra.
Definition 3.1. Since $\frac{f-a}{f}-\frac{1}{2}=-\left(\frac{a}{f}-\frac{1}{2}\right)$, $\mathscr{S}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}=\mathscr{S}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}^{\prime} \cdot\left(1-s_{\infty}\right)$, where $s_{\infty}:=\left(\frac{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}{-1}\right)$ is the complex conjugation and:

$$
\mathscr{S}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}^{\prime}:=-\sum_{a=1}^{f / 2}\left(\frac{a}{f}-\frac{1}{2}\right) \cdot\left(\frac{\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{f}\right)}{a}\right)^{-1}
$$

Put $q=p$ (resp. 4) if $p \neq 2$ (resp. $p=2$ ). For any real abelian number field $K$, let $L=K\left(\mu_{q}\right)$; we consider $K\left(p^{m}\right):=K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$ then put $L\left(p^{m}\right):=K\left(p^{m}\right) L=$ $K\left(\mu_{q p^{m}}\right)$ for all $m \geq 0$; so $K\left(p^{\infty}\right)=\cup_{m} K\left(p^{m}\right)$ is the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{p^{\prime}}$-extension of $K$ and $L\left(p^{\infty}\right)=\cup_{m} L\left(p^{m}\right)$ the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-extension of $L$.
Note, once for all, that the index $m$ is relative to layers in cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-extensions contrary to the index $n$ used for the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$-extension, $\ell \neq p$; indeed, in the particular case $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), K\left(p^{m}\right)=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$.
When $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, all this is summarized by the following diagram where $G_{m}:=$ $\operatorname{Gal}\left(L\left(p^{m}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\right) \simeq \mathbb{Z} / \ell^{n} \mathbb{Z} \times \mathbb{Z} / p^{m} \mathbb{Z} \times \mathbb{Z} / \phi(q) \mathbb{Z}, \phi$ being the Euler function:

3.2. Multipliers of Stickelberger elements. For $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, put for short $L_{m}:=L\left(p^{m}\right)=K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$; the conductor of $L_{m}$ is $f_{L_{m}}=\ell^{n+1} \cdot q p^{m}$ for $\ell \neq 2$ and $2^{n+2} \cdot p^{m+1}$ for $\ell=2$. To simplify, put $f_{n}^{m}:=f_{L_{m}}$. Let $c$ be an integer, prime to $f_{n}^{m}$, and let $\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{c}:=\left(1-c\left(\frac{L_{m}}{c}\right)^{-1}\right) \cdot \mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}$. Then $\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{c} \in \mathbb{Z}\left[G_{m}\right]$; indeed, we have:

$$
\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{c}=\frac{-1}{f_{n}^{m}} \sum_{a}\left[a\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1}-a c\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{c}\right)^{-1}\right]+\frac{1-c}{2} \sum_{a}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1}
$$

let $a_{c}^{\prime} \in\left[1, f_{n}^{m}\right]$ be the unique integer such that $a_{c}^{\prime} \cdot c \equiv a\left(\bmod f_{n}^{m}\right)$ and put $a_{c}^{\prime} \cdot c=a+\lambda_{a}^{m}(c) f_{n}^{m}, \lambda_{a}^{m}(c) \in \mathbb{Z}$; then, using the bijection $a \mapsto a_{c}^{\prime}$ in the summation of the second term in [] and the fact that $\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a_{c}^{\prime}}\right)\left(\frac{L_{m}}{c}\right)=\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)$, this yields:

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{c} & =\frac{-1}{f_{n}^{m}}\left[\sum_{a} a\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1}-\sum_{a} a_{c}^{\prime} \cdot c\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a_{c}^{\prime}}\right)^{-1}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{c}\right)^{-1}\right]+\frac{1-c}{2} \sum_{a}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1} \\
& =\frac{-1}{f_{n}^{m}} \sum_{a}\left[a-a_{c}^{\prime} \cdot c\right]\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1}+\frac{1-c}{2} \sum_{a}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1} \\
& =\sum_{a}\left[\lambda_{a}^{m}(c)+\frac{1-c}{2}\right]\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1} \in \mathbb{Z}\left[G_{m}\right] .
\end{aligned}
$$

Lemma 3.2. We have the relations $\lambda_{f_{n}^{m}-a}^{m}(c)+\frac{1-c}{2}=-\left(\lambda_{a}^{m}(c)+\frac{1-c}{2}\right)$ for all $a \in\left[1, f_{n}^{m}\right]$ prime to $f_{n}^{m}$. Then:

\begin{equation*}
\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}^{\prime}}^{\prime c}:=\sum_{a=1}^{f_{m}^{m} / 2}\left[\lambda_{a}^{m}(c)+\frac{1-c}{2}\right]\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1} \in \mathbb{Z}\left[G_{m}\right] \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

is such that $\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{c}=\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{\prime c} \cdot\left(1-s_{\infty}\right)$.
Proof. By definition, the integer $\left(f_{n}^{m}-a\right)_{c}^{\prime}$ is in $\left[1, f_{n}^{m}\right]$ and congruent modulo $f_{n}^{m}$ to $\left(f_{n}^{m}-a\right) c^{-1} \equiv-a c^{-1} \equiv-a_{c}^{\prime}\left(\bmod f_{n}^{m}\right)$; thus $\left(f_{n}^{m}-a\right)_{c}^{\prime}=f_{n}^{m}-a_{c}^{\prime}$ and

$$
\lambda_{f_{n}^{m}-a}^{m}(c)=\frac{\left(f_{n}^{m}-a\right)_{c}^{\prime} c-\left(f_{n}^{m}-a\right)}{f_{n}^{m}}=\frac{\left(f_{n}^{m}-a_{c}^{\prime}\right) c-\left(f_{n}^{m}-a\right)}{f_{n}^{m}}=c-1-\lambda_{a}^{m}(c)
$$

whence $\lambda_{f_{n}^{m}-a}^{m}(c)+\frac{1-c}{2}=-\left(\lambda_{a}^{m}(c)+\frac{1-c}{2}\right)$ and the result.
3.3. Spiegel involution. Let $\kappa_{m}: G_{m} \rightarrow\left(\mathbb{Z} / q p^{m} \mathbb{Z}\right)^{\times} \simeq \operatorname{Gal}\left(\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{q p^{m}}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\right)$ be the cyclotomic character of level $m$, of kernel $\operatorname{Gal}\left(L_{m} / \mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{q p^{m}}\right)\right)$, defined by:

$$
\zeta^{s}=\zeta^{\kappa_{m}(s)}, \text { for all } s \in G_{m} \text { and all } \zeta \in \mu_{q p^{m}}
$$

The Spiegel involution is the involution of $\left(\mathbb{Z} / q p^{m} \mathbb{Z}\right)\left[G_{m}\right]$ defined by:

$$
x:=\sum_{s \in G_{m}} a_{s} \cdot s \longmapsto x^{*}:=\sum_{s \in G_{m}} a_{s} \cdot \kappa_{m}(s) \cdot s^{-1} .
$$

Thus, if $s$ is the Artin symbol $\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)$, then $\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{*} \equiv a \cdot\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1}\left(\bmod q p^{m}\right)$.
We shall use the case $m=0$ for which we have the congruence $\kappa_{m}(s) \equiv \omega(s)$ $(\bmod q)$, where $\omega$ is the usual Teichmüller character $\omega: G_{0}=\operatorname{Gal}(L / \mathbb{Q}) \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}_{p}^{\times}$.
Thus, from Lemma 3.2, we have obtained $\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{c *}=\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{\prime c *} \cdot\left(1+s_{\infty}\right)$ in $\left(\mathbb{Z} / q p^{m} \mathbb{Z}\right)\left[G_{m}\right]$.

## 4. Annihilation theorem of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$

Recall that $K_{m}:=K\left(p^{m}\right)$ and $L_{m}:=L\left(p^{m}\right)=L K\left(p^{m}\right)$. For the most precise and straightforward method, the principle, which was given in the 60's and 70's, is to consider the annihilation, by means of the above Stickelberger element, of the kummer radical in $L_{m}^{\times}$defining the maximal sub-extension of $H_{K_{m}}^{\mathrm{pr}}$ whose Galois group is of exponent $p^{m}$, then to use the mirror involution giving a $p$-adic measure annihilating, for $m \rightarrow \infty$, the finite Galois group $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ (see [17, 22] for more history). The case $p=2$ is particularly tricky; to overcome this difficulty, we shall refer to [16, 30].
In fact, this process is equivalent to get elementarily an explicit formula of the $p$-adic $L$-functions "at $s=1$ ", avoiding the ugly computation of Gauss sums and $p$-adic logarithms of cyclotomic units [56, Theorem 5.18].
We have the following result with a detailed proof in [22, Theorems 5.3, 5.5]:
Proposition 4.1. For $p \geq 2$, let $p^{e}$ be the exponent of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ for $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$. For all $m \geq e$, the $\left(\mathbb{Z} / q p^{m} \mathbb{Z}\right)\left[G_{m}\right]$-module $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ is annihilated by $\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{\prime c *}$.
From the expression (1) of $\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{\prime c}$, the image by the Spiegel involution yields:

$$
\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{\prime c *} \equiv \sum_{a=1}^{f_{m}^{m} / 2}\left[\lambda_{a}^{m}(c)+\frac{1-c}{2}\right] a^{-1}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right) \quad\left(\bmod q p^{m}\right)
$$

defining a coherent family $\left(\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{\prime c *}\right)_{m} \in \underset{m \geq e}{\lim }\left(\mathbb{Z} / q p^{m} \mathbb{Z}\right)\left[G_{m}\right]$ of annihilators of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$.
One obtains, by restriction of $\mathscr{S}_{L_{m}}^{\prime c *}$ to $K$, a coherent family of annihilators of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$,


$$
\mathscr{A}_{K}^{c}:=\lim _{m \rightarrow \infty} \sum_{a=1}^{f_{m}^{m} / 2}\left[\lambda_{a}^{m}(c)+\frac{1-c}{2}\right] a^{-1}\left(\frac{K}{a}\right) \in \mathbb{Z}_{p}[\operatorname{Gal}(K / \mathbb{Q})]
$$

is a canonical annihilator of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$.
Remark 4.2. Let $\alpha_{L_{m}}^{*}:=\left[\sum_{a=1}^{f_{m}^{m}}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)^{-1}\right]^{*} \equiv \sum_{a=1}^{f_{m}^{m}} a^{-1}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)\left(\bmod q p^{m}\right)$; then: $\alpha_{L_{m}}^{*}:=\sum_{a=1}^{f_{m}^{m} / 2} a^{-1}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)+\left(f_{n}^{m}-a\right)^{-1}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{f_{n}^{m}-a}\right) \equiv \sum_{a=1}^{f_{m}^{m} / 2} a^{-1}\left(\frac{L_{m}}{a}\right)\left(1-s_{\infty}\right)\left(\bmod f_{n}^{m}\right)$,
which annihilates $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ and is such that, by restriction to $K, \alpha_{L_{m}}^{*} \mapsto 0\left(\bmod q p^{m}\right)$ since $K$ is real. We shall neglect in $\mathscr{A}_{K}^{c}$ the term $\frac{1-c}{2} \cdot \alpha_{L_{m}}^{*}$ and we still denote:

$$
\mathscr{A}_{K}^{c}=\lim _{m \rightarrow \infty}\left[\sum_{a=1}^{f_{n}^{m} / 2} \lambda_{a}^{m}(c) a^{-1}\left(\frac{K}{a}\right)\right]
$$

Lemma 4.3. For $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), \psi_{n}$ of order $\ell^{n}$ and conductor $\ell^{n+1}$ (or $2^{n+2}$ ),

$$
\psi_{n}\left(\mathscr{A}_{K}^{c}\right)=\left(1-\psi_{n}(c)\right) \cdot \frac{1}{2} L_{p}\left(1, \psi_{n}\right) .
$$

Proof. This comes from the classical construction of $p$-adic $L$-functions (e.g., 17, Propositions II.2, II.3, Définition II.3, II.4, Remarques II.3, II.4], [14, page 292], [56, Chapters 5, 7]). For more details, see [22, § 7.1].

Proposition 4.4. Let $K:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ of Galois group $G \simeq \mathbb{Z} / \ell^{n} \mathbb{Z}$ and conductor $\ell^{n+1}\left(\right.$ or $\left.2^{n+2}\right), n \geq 1$. Then, for the $p$-adic character $\theta_{n}$ above a character $\psi_{n}$, of order $\ell^{n}$ of $K$, the component $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\theta_{n}}$ is annihilated by $\left(1-\psi_{n}(c)\right) \cdot \frac{1}{2} L_{p}\left(1, \psi_{n}\right)$. Moreover, from the principal theorem of Ribet-Mazur-Wiles-Kolyvagin-Greither on abelian fields, $\frac{1}{2} L_{p}\left(1, \psi_{n}\right)$ gives its order.
Since in the practice, taking $c=2$ in the programs, we obtain the annihilation by $\left(1-\psi_{n}(2)\right) \cdot \frac{1}{2} L_{p}\left(1, \psi_{n}\right)$, where $\psi_{n}(2)$ is a root of unity of order dividing $\ell^{n}$, $\left(1-\psi_{n}(2)\right)$ is in general invertible modulo $p$, except for $\psi_{1}(2)=1$ and $\ell=1093$, $3511, \ldots$ In these cases, one must choose another $c$. If $p=2$ an odd $c$ must be chosen.
Lemma 4.5. We have $\mathscr{A}_{K}^{c} \equiv \sum_{a=1}^{f_{n}^{0} / 2} \lambda_{a}^{0}(c) a^{-1}\left(\frac{K}{a}\right)(\bmod p)$ [22, Corollary 7.3 (iii)], where $f_{n}^{0}=\ell^{n+1} \cdot q$ for $\ell \neq 2$ and $2^{n+2} \cdot p$ for $\ell=2$.

Thus, we have obtained, putting $f_{n}^{0}=: f_{n}$, a computable characterization of nontriviality of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ :

Theorem 4.6. For $p \geq 2, \ell \neq p, n \geq 1$ fixed, let $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), L=K\left(\mu_{q}\right), q=p$ or 4. The conductor of $L$ is $f_{n}:=\ell^{n+1} q$ for $\ell \neq 2$ (resp. $2^{n+2} p$ for $\ell=2$ ). Let $c$ be an integer prime to $f_{n}$. For all $a \in\left[1, f_{n}\right]$, prime to $f_{n}$, let $a_{c}^{\prime}$ be the unique integer in $\left[1, f_{n}\right]$ such that $a_{c}^{\prime} \cdot c \equiv a\left(\bmod f_{n}\right)$ and put $a_{c}^{\prime} \cdot c-a=\lambda_{a}(c) f_{n}$, $\lambda_{a}(c) \in \mathbb{Z}$.
Let $\mathscr{A}_{K}^{c}:=\sum_{a=1}^{f_{n} / 2} \lambda_{a}(c) a^{-1}\left(\frac{K}{a}\right)$; let $\psi_{n}$ be a character of $K$ of order $\ell^{n}$ and let $\theta_{n}$ be the p-adic character above $\psi_{n}$. If $\psi_{n}\left(\mathscr{A}_{K}^{c}\right)$ is not a p-adic unit, then the $\theta_{n}$-component of the $\mathbb{Z}_{p}[G]$-module $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ is non-trivial.
4.1. Numerical test $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*} \neq 1$ for $\ell>2, p>2$. We have, from $\S[2.4$ by induction, $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}=\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*} \bigoplus \mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n-1}\right)}$. For a character $\psi_{n}$ of order $\ell^{n}$ of $K$, the condition $\psi_{n}\left(\mathscr{A}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{c}\right) \equiv 0\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}\right)$, for some $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \mid p$, is equivalent to the nontriviality of $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}$, due to the $p$-adic character $\theta_{n}$ above $\psi_{n}$. We compute $\psi_{n}\left(\mathscr{A}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{c}\right)$ $(\bmod p)$ and test if the norm of this element is divisible by $p$; this characterize the condition $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*} \neq 1$ :

We find again the cases $(\ell=3, p=7)$, $(\ell=3, p=73),(\ell=5, p=11)$ and ( $\ell=5, n=2, p=101$ ), of Table 2.3,
An interesting case is $\ell=5$ and $n=2,3$ giving $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(5^{2}\right)} \simeq \mathbb{Z} / 2251 \mathbb{Z}$ and $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(5^{3}\right)} \simeq$ $\mathbb{Z} / 2251 \mathbb{Z}$; which implies that $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(5^{3}\right)}$ contains $\mathbb{Z} / 2251 \mathbb{Z} \times \mathbb{Z} / 2251 \mathbb{Z}$.
We have computed the structure of $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$ for $\ell=3, n=3, p=109$, which is much longer and needs an huge computer memory; we get as expected:
el=3 $n=3 \quad \mathrm{p}=109 \quad \mathrm{rk}(\mathrm{T})=1 \quad \mathrm{~T}=[109]$
Whence, we can propose the following program, only considering primes $p \equiv 1$ $\left(\bmod \ell^{n}\right)$, so that $p$ splits completely in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right)$ which allows to characterize, once for all, a prime $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \mid p$ by means of a congruence $\mathbf{z} \equiv \mathrm{r}\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{\mathrm{n}}\right)$, where $\mathbf{z}$ denotes in the program a generator of $\mu_{\ell^{n}}$ and $r$ a rational integer, then avoiding the previous computation of $\mathrm{N}=$ norm(s) in Programs III-IV which takes too much time. We then find supplementary examples, taking $n=1$ for $\ell>11$ :

4.2. Numerical test $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)} \neq 1$ for $\ell>2, p=2$. In the case $p=2$, taking $c=3$, we have the exceptional prime $\ell=11$ for which 3 splits in $\mathbb{Q}(11)$, whence $1-\psi_{1}(c)=0$ giving a wrong solution with the following program. Moreover, the character $\psi_{1}$ cannot be of degree 1 in practice since 2 is inert in $\mathbb{Q}(\ell)$ except for the two known cases of non-trivial Fermat quotients of 2 modulo $\ell$; so we are obliged to test with the computation of a norm in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{\ell}\right)$ but in the inert case, one finds $\psi_{1}\left(\mathscr{A}_{K}^{c}\right) \in 2 \cdot \mathbb{Z}\left[\mu_{\ell}\right]$.

4.3. Numerical test $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(2^{n}\right)} \neq 1$ for $\ell=2, p>2$. We have only to modify the conductor $f_{n}=p 2^{n+2}$ of $L=K\left(\mu_{p}\right)$ where $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, then note that we must choose another multiplier for the Stickelberger element and the generator $\mathrm{h}=\operatorname{Mod}\left(5, \mathrm{el}^{(\mathrm{n}+2)}\right)$ (for $p=3$ one must take $C=5$ giving the solution el $=2 \mathrm{n}=3 \mathrm{p}=3$ ); to obtain a half-system for $a \in\left[1, f_{n}\right]$ we can neglect the subgroup generated by complex conjugation -1 in $\operatorname{Gal}\left(\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{2^{n+2} p}\right) / \mathbb{Q}\right)$ :

4.4. Test on the normalized $p$-adic regulator. A sufficient condition to get the divisibility of $\# \mathscr{C}_{K}$ by $p$, when we have obtained $\mathscr{T}_{K} \neq 1$, is to establish that the normalized $p$-adic regulator $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ is a $p$-adic unit; if it is not the case, this only gives that very probably $\# \mathscr{C}_{K}=1$. Since with PARI/GP the computation of units implies that of the class number (because of $K=\operatorname{bnfinit}(P, 1)$ ), there is no interest to test the $p$-divisibility of the regulator instead of looking at K.no (the class number), except to verify that the computation of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ (with Programs I, II 2.3 computing suitable ray-class groups) is exact.

The following programs compute (for $\ell>2, n=1$, then $\ell=2, n \geq 1$ and $p$ given) the $p$-rank of the matrix $M$ obtained by approximation (modulo $p$ ) of the $p$-adic expressions $\frac{1}{p} \log _{p}\left(\varepsilon_{i}\right)$, written on the $\mathbb{Q}$-base $\left\{1, x, \ldots, x^{\ell^{n}-1}\right\}$ of $K$, for a system of fundamental units $\varepsilon_{i}$ given by PARI/GP; then $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ is a $p$-adic unit if and only if $\operatorname{rank}(M)=\ell^{n}-1$ :

4.5. Conjecture about the $p$-torsion groups $\mathscr{T}$. The annihilation Theorem 4.6 allows us to test the non-triviality of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$, for the fields $K:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, when direct computation of the structure of this group is out of reach, giving possible non-trivial class groups, because of the identity:

$$
\# \mathscr{T}_{K}=\# \mathscr{C}_{K} \cdot \# \mathscr{R}_{K} \cdot \# \mathscr{W}_{K}
$$

(see Lemma 2.1, Remark [2.2(i), about $\mathscr{W}_{K}$, in general trivial). More precisely, all computations or experiments depend on the relative components $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{*}$ whose orders are given by $\frac{1}{2} L_{p}\left(1, \psi_{n}\right)$, for $\psi_{n}$ of order $\ell^{n}$ and conductor $\ell^{n+1}$ (or $2^{n+2}$ ).
Indeed, we do not see why $\# \mathscr{C}_{K}$ should be always trivial for an "algebraic reason", even if it is known that $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ may be, a priori, non-trivial whatever the order of magnitude of $p$. Moreover, an observation made in other contexts shows that, when $\# \mathscr{C}_{K}^{*} \cdot \# \mathscr{R}_{K}^{*}$ is non-trivial, the probability of $\# \mathscr{R}_{K}^{*} \neq 1$ is, roughly, $p$ times that of $\# \mathscr{C}_{K}^{*} \neq 1$. Moreover, the Cohen-Lenstra-Martinet heuristics (see [4, 43, 44 for large developments of this aspect) give low probabilities for non-trivial $p$-class groups, even in the case of residue degree 1 of $p$ in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right) / \mathbb{Q}$.
As for the question of $p$-rationality of number fields, when $K$ is fixed, the number of $p$ such that $\# \mathscr{T}_{K}^{*} \equiv 0(\bmod p)$ may be finite as we have conjectured; whence the rarity of these cases. Nevertheless, we propose the following conjecture claiming the infiniteness of non-trivial relative groups $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*}$ when all parameters vary.

Conjecture 4.7. There exist infinitely many triples ( $\ell, n, p$ ), with $\ell$, $p$ primes, $\ell \neq p, n \geq 1$, such that $\frac{1}{2} L_{p}\left(1, \psi_{n}\right) \equiv 0\left(\bmod \mathfrak{p}_{n}\right)$, for some $\mathfrak{p}_{n} \mid p$ in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{\ell^{n}}\right)$, where $\psi_{n}$ is a character of $K$ of order $\ell^{n}\left(\right.$ whence $\left.\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}^{*} \neq 1\right)$.

We have seen that, in general, the solutions $p$ are of the form $p=1+\lambda \ell^{n}$ giving, possibly, a class group of $K$ roughly of order $O\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, which is very reasonable since the discriminant of $K$ is such that $\sqrt{D_{K}}=\ell^{N}$, where $N=O\left(n \ell^{n}\right)$, whence $\sqrt{D_{K}}=\left(\ell^{n}\right)^{O\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$, whereas the class number fulfills the following general property $\# C_{K} \leq c_{\ell^{n}, \epsilon} \cdot{\sqrt{D_{K}}}^{1+\epsilon}$ [1] and (conjecturally) the $\epsilon$-conjecture $\# C_{K} \leq c_{\ell^{n}, \epsilon}^{\prime} \cdot{\sqrt{D_{K}}}^{\epsilon}$. Finally, if we assume that the $p$-class group $\mathscr{C}_{K}$ and the regulator $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ are random and independent, the Weber class number conjecture is possibly false for some $\ell_{0}, n_{0}, p_{0}, \ell=2$ being not specific. But one may easily conjecture that the counterexamples (if any) are of zero density.

## 5. Reflection theorem

The reflection theorem can be used to compare directly the $p$-class group $\mathscr{C}_{K}$ of $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ with a suitable component of the $p$-torsion group $\mathscr{T}_{L}$ of $L:=K\left(\mu_{p}\right)$; these equalities of $p$-ranks show that, roughly speaking, all these invariants have analogous $p$-adic properties. But, as $p$ increases, the computations take place in a too large field to get significant examples (if any).
Denote by $\operatorname{rk}_{p}(A)$ the $\mathbb{F}_{p}$-dimension of $A / A^{p}$ for an abelian group $A$ of finite type.
5.1. Case $p=2$ for class groups and 2-torsion groups. Consider, once for all, the case $p=2$ with $\ell>2$. The reflection theorem works in $K$, with the trivial character; applied with the set $S_{K, 2}$ of prime ideals of $K$ above 2 , it is given by [15, Proposition III.4.2.2, § II.5.4.9.2], where $\mathfrak{m}^{*}=(4)$ and where $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{(4)}$ denotes a ray class group modulo (4):

Theorem 5.1. We have, in $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, for any $\ell>2, n \geq 1$ and $p=2$ :

$$
\begin{align*}
\mathrm{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }}\right) & =\mathrm{rk}_{2}\left[\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {res }} / \chi_{K}^{\text {res }}\left(S_{K, 2}\right)\right]+\# S_{K, 2}-1,  \tag{2}\\
\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }}\right) & =\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left[\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {ord }} / c C_{K}^{\text {ord }}\left(S_{K, 2}\right)\right]+\# S_{K, 2}-1,  \tag{3}\\
\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}^{(4) \text { ord }}\right) & =\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {res }}\right),  \tag{4}\\
\mathrm{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}^{(4) \text { res }}\right) & =\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {ord }}\right)+\ell^{n} . \tag{5}
\end{align*}
$$

Thus, $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }}=1$ (i.e., $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {ord }}=\mathscr{R}_{K}^{\text {ord }}=\mathscr{W}_{K}^{\text {ord }}=1$ ) if and only if 2 is inert in $K / \mathbb{Q}$ and $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {ord }}=1$ (or 2 is inert and $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {res }}=1$, or 2 is inert and $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{(4) \text { ord }}=1$ ).
Proof. If $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }}=1$, then $\# S_{K, 2}=1$ and 2 is inert in $K / \mathbb{Q}$; since in that case $\mathscr{W}_{K}=1$ and since $H_{K}^{\text {ord }} \cap K\left(2^{\infty}\right)=K$, we get $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {ord }}=\mathscr{R}_{K}^{\text {ord }}=1$ (in other words, the ordinary 2 -class group of $K$ is odd and the normalized regulator is trivial, which can be written $\left.\overline{E_{K}^{1}}=U_{K}^{1 *}:=\left\{u \in U_{K}^{1}, \mathrm{~N}_{K / \mathbb{Q}}(u)= \pm 1\right\}\right)$. The reciprocal is obvious. Whence the other claims.

Remarks 5.2. Let $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$, for any $\ell>2$ and $n \geq 1$.
(i) If $p=2$ is inert in $K$, $\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {res }}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {ord }}\right)$ (from (2), (3) $)$. This does not apply for $\ell=1093,3511$ and (unknown) primes $\ell$ such that the Fermat quotient of 2 modulo $\ell$ is non-trivial. For $\ell=1093$ and from:

$$
\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {res }} / \mathcal{C}_{K}^{\text {res }}\left(S_{K, 2}\right)\right)+1092=\operatorname{rk}_{2}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {ord }} / \mathcal{C}_{K}^{\text {ord }}\left(S_{K, 2}\right)\right)+1092,
$$ we have verified that the norm of $\left(1-\psi_{1}(3)\right) \cdot \frac{1}{2} L_{p}\left(1, \psi_{1}\right)$ is exactly $2^{1092}$; this means that 2 annihilates $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }}$, whence that $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{S_{K, 2} \text { res }}=\mathscr{C}_{K}^{S_{K, 2} \text { ord }}=1$ and that $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }} \simeq(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{1092}$. This only proves that $\mathscr{C}_{K}$ is generated by the classes of the 1093 prime ideals above 2 in $K$.

(ii) We have used, in reflection theorems, the relation $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {res }} \simeq \mathscr{T}_{K}^{\text {ord }} \bigoplus \mathbb{F}_{2}^{\ell n}$ [15, Theorem III.4.1.5], valid under Leopoldt's conjecture for $p=2$.
5.2. Case $p \neq 2$ for class groups and $p$-torsion groups. The application of the reflection theorem needs to consider $L=K \mathbb{Q}\left(\mu_{p}\right)$ for $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ with the group $\operatorname{Gal}(L / K)$.
Let $\omega_{p}=: \omega$ be the Teichmüller character defined by $\zeta^{s}=\zeta^{\omega(s)}$ for all $\zeta \in \mu_{p}$ and all $s \in \operatorname{Gal}(L / K)$; then any $\mathbb{Q}_{p}$-irreducible character $\chi$ of $\operatorname{Gal}(L / K)$ is of degree 1 of the form $\omega^{k}, 1 \leq k \leq p-1$. We denote by $\operatorname{rk}_{\chi}(A)$ the $\mathbb{F}_{p}$-dimension of the $\chi$-component of $A / A^{p}$; whence $\mathrm{rk}_{1}(A)=\mathrm{rk}_{p}(A)$.
Let $S_{K, p}$ and $S_{L, p}$ be the sets of $p$-places in $K$ and $L$, respectively. Since $p$ is totally ramified in $L / K$ one has $\# S_{L, p}=\# S_{K, p}$. In $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$ this number is given by $\ell^{g_{p}}$, where $p^{\ell-1}=1+\lambda \ell^{g_{p}+1}, \ell \nmid \lambda$, in the case $\ell \neq 2$, then $\pm p=1+\lambda 2^{g_{p}+2}, \lambda$ odd for $\ell=2$ (see $\S(2.4)$, whence $\# S_{K, p}$ if $n<g_{p}$.
Let $\ell_{K}\left(S_{K, p}\right) \subseteq \mathscr{C}_{K}$ and $\mathscr{l}_{L}\left(S_{L, p}\right) \subseteq \mathscr{C}_{L}$ generated by the classes of the prime ideals dividing $p$ in $K$ and $L$, respectively; we have $\ell_{L}\left(S_{L, p}\right) \simeq c \ell_{K}\left(S_{K, p}\right)$.
Theorem 5.3. Let $p>2$ be a prime distinct from $\ell$. Consider, for $n \geq 1$, the layer $K:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ and put $L:=K\left(\mu_{p}\right)$. We have the following equalities:

$$
\begin{align*}
\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{T}_{K}\right) & =\operatorname{rk}_{\omega}\left(\mathscr{C}_{L}\right)  \tag{6}\\
\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left[\mathscr{C}_{K} / d_{K}\left(S_{K, p}\right)\right] & =\operatorname{rk}_{\omega}\left(\mathscr{T}_{L}\right)+1-\# S_{K, p}  \tag{7}\\
\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}\right) & =\operatorname{rk}_{\omega}\left(\mathscr{C}_{L}^{\mathfrak{P}^{*}}\right)+1-\ell^{n}  \tag{8}\\
\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left[\mathrm{~N}_{L / K}\left(\mathscr{C}_{L}^{\mathfrak{P}^{*}}\right)\right] & =\operatorname{rk}_{\omega}\left(\mathscr{C}_{L}\right)+1 \tag{9}
\end{align*}
$$

where $\mathfrak{P}^{*}=\left(\prod_{\mathfrak{P} \mid p} \mathfrak{P}\right)^{p}=(p) \cdot\left(1-\zeta_{p}\right)$ in $L$, and $\mathscr{C}_{L}^{\mathfrak{P}^{*}}$ is the ray class group of modulus $\mathfrak{P}^{*}$.

Proof. It suffices to consider the general formula of [15, § II.5.4.2 and Theorem II.5.4.5] in $L / K$, with the character $\chi=\omega$, hence $\chi^{*}=1$ giving $p$-ranks. The formulas are obtained, varying the parameters of ramification or splitting and exchanging the characters $\chi$ and $\chi^{*}$.
The computation of the $\omega$-component $\mathscr{T}_{L}^{\omega}$ of $\mathscr{T}_{L}$ is not easy from the direct computation of $\mathscr{T}_{L}$, except for $p=3$ since, in this case $\mathscr{T}_{L} \simeq \mathscr{T}_{K} \oplus \mathscr{T}_{L}^{\omega}$; thus this reduces to the computation of the 3 -ranks of $\mathscr{T}_{L}$ and $\mathscr{T}_{K}$. The following program illustrates the formula (7) of the theorem and computes:

$$
\operatorname{rk}_{\omega}\left(\mathscr{T}_{L}\right)+1-\# S_{K, 3}=\operatorname{rk}_{3}\left(\mathscr{T}_{L}\right)-\operatorname{rk}_{3}\left(\mathscr{T}_{K}\right)-\# S_{K, 3} ;
$$

note that 3 splits in $\mathbb{Q}(\ell)$ if and only if $3^{\ell-1} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{2}\right)$ (the only known primes are $\ell=11$ and $\ell=1006003$ ); whence a particular line for $\ell=11$ and in general 3 is inert and $\ell_{K}\left(S_{K, 3}\right)=1$ which yields $\operatorname{rk}_{3}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{\omega}\left(\mathscr{T}_{L}\right)$. Of course, the program does not consider the cases where $\mathscr{T}_{L}=1(\mathrm{LL}=\operatorname{List}([]))$; but we have no counterexamples $\left(\right.$ Delta $=0$ for $\left.\ell=11 \operatorname{means}^{\operatorname{rk}_{\omega}}\left(\mathscr{T}_{L}\right)=0\right)$ :

Unfortunately, for $p>3$, the computations in $L=K\left(\mu_{p}\right)$ of any $\mathscr{T}_{L}$, for an imaginary field needs the determination (with PARI/GP) of $\operatorname{bnfinit}(\mathrm{Q}, 1)$ for a field of degree $\ell^{n}(p-1)$ (conductor $\ell^{n+1} p$ for $\ell \neq 2,2^{n+2} p$ for $\ell=2$ ). Which gives a serious limitation of the parameters $\ell, n, p$.
5.3. Illustration of formula (8) of Theorem 5.3. We can compute, for $p \neq 2$, the structure of the whole group:

$$
\mathscr{C}_{L}^{\mathfrak{P}^{*}}=\bigoplus_{i=1}^{p-1} \mathscr{C}_{L}^{\mathfrak{P}^{*}, \omega^{i}}
$$

The parameter \#zp gives the number $\ell^{n}(p-1) / 2+1$ of $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-extensions of $L$, but the cyclotomic extension of $\mathbb{Q}$ does not intervene because its conductor is $p^{2}$ larger that $\mathfrak{P}^{*}$; thus, \#zp $-1-\mathrm{rk}(\mathrm{Hp})$, where Hp is the ray class group, measures the $p$-rank of the torsion part (e.g., $\ell=2, p=11,13,19$ ).
But the character of this torsion part is unknown; for each odd $\omega^{2 i+1}, i=$ $0, \ldots, \frac{p-1}{2}-1$, the $p$-rank of the $\omega^{2 i+1}$-part of the composite of the $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-extensions is $\ell^{n}$, whence the formula (8) for $\omega$. This suggests that these $\omega^{2 i+1}$-ranks may be nontrivial for any $i$ since these odd characters play, a priori, the same role (except that $\omega$ is "not any character" in many circumstances).

5.4. Probabilistic analysis from the reflection theorem. Consider the reflection theorem in the following form [15, II.5.4.9.2, formula (4)]:

Proposition 5.4. For $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right), \ell \geq 2, n \geq 1$, and $L=K\left(\mu_{p}\right)$, $p>2$, we have $\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(Y_{L, \text { prim }}^{\omega}\right)$, where $Y_{L, \text { prim }}^{\omega} \subseteq Y_{L}^{\omega}:=\left(\left\{\alpha \in L^{\times},(\alpha)=\mathfrak{A}^{p}\right\} \cdot L^{\times p} / L^{\times p}\right)^{\omega}$ is the $\omega$-component of the subset of $Y_{L}$ of p-primary elements $\alpha$ (i.e., such that $L(\sqrt[p]{\alpha}) / L$ is unramified and decomposed over $K$ into a cyclic subfield of $\left.H_{K}^{\mathrm{nr}}\right)$. Thus $\mathrm{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{L}^{\omega}\right)$ or $\mathrm{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{L}^{\omega}\right)-1$.

Proof. We have, from the general formula (loc. cit.):

$$
\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{L}^{\omega}\right)+1-\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(Y_{L}^{\omega}\right)+\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(Y_{L, \mathrm{prim}}^{\omega}\right)
$$

Put $Y_{L}^{\omega}=\left\{\alpha_{1}, \ldots, \alpha_{r}\right\} \cup\left\{\zeta_{p}\right\}$ modulo $L^{\times p}$, the $\alpha_{i}$ being non-units and independent modulo $L^{\times p}$, and where $r$ is the $p$-rank of $\mathscr{C}_{L}^{\omega}$. Since $\zeta_{p}$ is not $p$-primary, one gets $\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(Y_{L, \text { prim }}^{\omega}\right)=\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\left\langle\alpha_{1}, \ldots, \alpha_{r}\right\rangle_{\text {prim }}\right)$. Due to the $p$-adic action of $\omega$ on the $\alpha_{i}$, it is immediate to deduce the last claim.

The condition $\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}\right) \geq 1$ is then equivalent to the existence of a $p$-primary $\alpha \in Y_{L}^{\omega}$ such that $(\alpha)=\mathfrak{A}^{p}$, with a non-principal $\mathfrak{A}$. The Program IV gives cases where necessarily $\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{L}\right)=r \geq 1$ (probably $r=1$, otherwise we should have $\operatorname{rk}_{p}\left(\mathscr{C}_{K}\right)=r$ or $r-1 \neq 0$ ); one computes easily that the probability to have $\alpha$ $p$-primary is (in a standard point of view) $\frac{1}{p}$.
The computation of the class group of $L$ is out of reach and we have only been able to compute $\mathscr{C}_{L}$ for $\ell^{n}=3$ with $p=7$ giving $\mathscr{C}_{L} \simeq \mathbb{Z} / 7 \mathbb{Z}$; we do not know $\alpha$ so that we cannot verify that it is not 7-primary (which is indeed the case since we know, from $\S 4.4$, that the regulator of $K$ is not a 7 -adic unit).

## 6. Generalizations and open problems

A natural generalization of the previous study is to consider the composite of $N$ fields $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell_{i}^{n_{i}}\right), n_{i} \geq 1, \ell_{i}$ distinct prime numbers, and to fix a prime $p$ (see [47] for analytic results of non-divisibility). Such a composite can be written:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathcal{N}}\right), \quad \mathscr{L}=\left\{\ell_{1}, \ldots, \ell_{N}\right\}, \mathscr{N}=\left\{n_{1}, \ldots, n_{N}\right\} \tag{10}
\end{equation*}
$$

with an obvious meaning; this field has by nature a cyclic Galois group and lives in the cyclotomic $\widehat{\mathbb{Z}}$-extension $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ of $\mathbb{Q}$, composite of all the $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$-extension $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$. The pro-cyclic extension $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ is the direct composite over $\mathbb{Q}$ of $\mathbb{Q}\left(p^{\infty}\right)$ and the composite $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}$ of all the $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$, for $\ell \neq p$.
Two cases then arise: the question of the $p$-class groups of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathcal{N}}\right)$ when $p \notin \mathscr{L}$ and the opposite case that we shall write as composite $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathscr{N}}\right) \cdot \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right), m \geq 1$.
In the first case, we are in the strict generalization of classical conjectures related to Weber's problem and we may think that the result is analogous.
In the second one the problem is in some sense related to Greenberg's conjecture [29] for which one very strongly admits that, for $n$ fixed, $\# \mathscr{C}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)}$ is constant for all $m \gg 0$ (i.e., the invariants $\lambda, \mu$ of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ for the prime $p$ are zero); see for instance [9, 28, 40] for some developments.
6.1. Decomposition groups in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}} / \mathbb{Q}$. Let $p$ be a fixed prime number. It is clear that $p$ is totally ramified in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}} / \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}$; thus the Frobenius of $p$ in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*} / \mathbb{Q}$ fixes a field $D_{p}$ such that $p$ totally splits in $D_{p} / \mathbb{Q}$. An out of reach question is the finiteness (or not) of this extension $D_{p}$ which is necessarily of the form $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathscr{N}}\right)$. Since the number $\ell^{g_{p}}$ of prime ideals above $p$ in a single $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell^{\prime}}$-extension $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$ is finite and
given by $p^{\ell-1}=: 1+\lambda \ell^{1+g_{p}}$ for $\ell \neq 2, p=: \pm 1+\lambda 2^{2+g_{p}}$ for $\ell=2, \lambda \not \equiv 0(\bmod \ell)$, the integers $n \in \mathscr{N}$ are finite numbers but not necessarily the set $\mathscr{L}$.
For example, if $p=2$, the only known primes $\ell$ such that 2 splits in part in $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{\infty}\right)$ are 1093 and 3511 ; so if there is no other case, the decomposition field of 2 in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}} / \mathbb{Q}$ should be $D_{2}=\mathbb{Q}(1093) \mathbb{Q}(3511)$. Of course, if $p$ varies for $\ell$ fixed, the integers $g_{p}$ are unbounded (e.g., $p=1+\lambda \ell^{1+r}$, with arbitrary $r \gg 0$ ).
6.2. The $p$-torsion group of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathcal{N}}\right)$. Since there exist many fields $\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ with non-trivial groups $\mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)}$, these $p$-torsion groups remain subgroups of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ for the composite $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathscr{N}}\right)$ and give larger groups. We give some computations of the structure of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ for composite fields $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(q_{1}\right) \mathbb{Q}\left(q_{2}\right)$, for which one gets always $C_{K}=1$; then we give the case of the sole computation of $\mathscr{T}_{K}^{*}$. The general programs are the following, with suitable polynomials of definition; after each program the reader may verify the result (for not to large degrees), using the basic PROGRAMS I, II, § $£ 2.3$.

Remark 6.1. The composite $F$ of $K=\mathbb{Q}(2) \mathbb{Q}(3)$ with $\mathbb{Q}(7)$ for $p=7$ has some interest since $\mathscr{T}_{K} \simeq(\mathbb{Z} / 7 \mathbb{Z})^{2}$ (from the second example above); so we know that $\mathscr{T}_{F}^{\operatorname{Gal}(F / K)} \simeq \mathscr{T}_{K}$, but with $\mathscr{T}_{F} \simeq(\mathbb{Z} / 7 \mathbb{Z})^{2} \times\left(\mathbb{Z} / 7^{2} \mathbb{Z}\right)^{2}$, showing that for $p$ ramification aspects, genus theory gives often increasing p-torsion groups contrary to p-class groups as we shall see in the next Subsection.
Since $\mathrm{N}_{F / K}\left(\mathscr{T}_{F}\right)=\mathscr{T}_{K}$, we have $\mathscr{T}_{F}^{*} \simeq\left(\mathbb{Z} / 7^{2} \mathbb{Z}\right)^{2}$. The groups $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ and $\mathscr{T}_{F}$, annihilated by $\mathrm{N}_{F / \mathbb{Q}(2) \mathbb{Q}(7)}$, are modules over $\mathbb{Z}\left[\mu_{3}\right]$ in which $p=7$ is inert; whence the residue degree 2 and the structures obtained.

6.3. The $p$-class group of $\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathcal{N}}\right) \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$. In this part, the set $\mathscr{L}$ can contain $p$ (subject to having $m$ large enough); but, in practice, we shall only consider the case $p \notin \mathscr{L}$ and $m=1$.
6.3.1. Use of genus theory. The analog of Weber's problem in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ is very doubtful in that case because of the Chevalley formula (or genus theory in the cyclic case) in the extension $F / K$ with $K:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathcal{N}}\right)$ fixed in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ and $F:=K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$, in which $p$ is totally ramified $\left(m \geq m_{0}+1\right.$ if $\left.K \cap \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{\infty}\right)=\mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m_{0}}\right)\right)$ :

$$
\#\left(C_{F}^{\mathrm{res}}\right)^{\operatorname{Gal}(F / K)}=\# C_{K}^{\mathrm{res}} \cdot \frac{p^{\left(m-m_{0}\right)\left(t_{p}-1\right)}}{\left(E_{K}^{\mathrm{pos}}: E_{K}^{\mathrm{pos}} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)},
$$

where $t_{p}$ is the number of prime ideals $\mathfrak{p} \mid p$ in $K$.
So $\mathscr{C}_{F}^{\text {res }}=1$ as soon as $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {res }}=1$ and $p$ does not split in $K / \mathbb{Q}$; if $t_{p}>1$ the right factor of the formula may be a power of $p$.
Consider the general diagram [28, Diagram 3] in which $\mathscr{G}_{K}$ is the union of the genus fields $H_{K\left(p^{m}\right) / K}$ (maximal abelian $p$-extensions of $K$, unramified over $K\left(p^{m}\right)$ ):


We have the following result about $\frac{p^{\left(m-m_{0}\right)\left(t_{p}-1\right)}}{\left(E_{K}^{\mathrm{pos}}: E_{K}^{\text {pos }} \cap \mathrm{N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)}$, in relation with Greenberg's conjecture (see [21, Theorem 4.7], [26, Section 3] or [28, Proposition 3.3] for more information after the pioneering work of Taya [55, Theorem 1.1]).

Theorem 6.2. Let $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathcal{N}}\right)$ fixed in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ with $p \notin \mathscr{L}$ and let $F:=K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$. Then the factor $\frac{p^{m\left(t_{p}-1\right)}}{\left(E_{K}^{\mathrm{poss}}: E_{K}^{\mathrm{pos}} \cap \mathrm{N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)}$divides $\# \mathscr{R}_{K}^{\mathrm{nr}}$. If $p$ totally split in $K$, then for all $m$ large enough there is equality ([28, Theorem 1]).

Corollary 6.3. If $p \neq \ell$ totally splits in $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ (i.e., $p^{\ell-1} \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{n+1}\right)$ or $\pm p \equiv 1\left(\bmod 2^{n+2}\right)$ ), there exists $m \geq 0$ such that the $p$-class group of the composite $K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$ is non-trivial, if and only if $\mathscr{R}_{K}^{\mathrm{nr}} \neq 1$.

Remarks 6.4. (i) When $p$ totally splits in $K$, the subgroup $\mathscr{R}_{K}^{\mathrm{ram}}$ is generated by the inertia groups $U_{K_{\mathfrak{p}}}^{1} / \overline{E_{K}^{1}} \cap U_{K_{\mathfrak{p}}}^{1}, \mathfrak{p} \mid p$; the test $\mathscr{R}_{K}^{\mathrm{nr}} \neq 1$ is equivalent to the computation of the rank of $a \mathbb{F}_{p}$-matrix with PROGRAMS XV-XVIII.
(ii) Under the assumption $\mathscr{C}_{K}^{\text {res }}=1$, the condition $\mathscr{C}_{F}^{\text {res }} \neq 1$ is equivalent to $\frac{p^{m\left(t_{p}-1\right)}}{\left(E_{K}^{\text {pos }}: E_{K}^{\text {pos }} \cap \mathrm{N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)} \neq 1$; in the simplest case where $p$ totally splits in $K$ and $m=1$, then $E_{K}^{\text {pos }} \cap \mathrm{N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right) \subseteq U_{K}^{p}$.
(iii) We observe that most of the case $\mathscr{T}_{K} \neq 1$ are such that $p \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{n}\right)$, which may give smallest $p$-ranks, but $p \not \equiv 1\left(\bmod \ell^{n+1}\right)\left(\right.$ or $\left.\left(\bmod 2^{n+2}\right)\right)$, which implies the non-total splitting of $p$ in $K$, whence a less probability of non-trivial $\mathscr{C}_{F}, F \subset K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$. The exceptional case where $\left(\ell^{n}, p\right)=$ $\left(2^{8}, 18433\right),\left(2^{10}, 114689\right),(3,73),\left(3^{4}, 487\right),\left(5^{2}, 2251\right)$.

Any composite gives huge conductors limiting computations of class numbers. We have done the following ones (in the restricted sense when 2 intervenes):

(i) $K=\mathbb{Q}(2), F=K \mathbb{Q}(7), p=7$, is the minimal case with splitting since 7 splits in $K / \mathbb{Q}$, but $\frac{7}{\left(E_{K}: E_{K} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)}=1$. Same results replacing $p=7$ by $p=17$ (with more computing time). In that cases, $\mathscr{T}_{K}=\mathscr{T}_{F}=1$.
(ii) $K=\mathbb{Q}(2), F=K \mathbb{Q}(3) \mathbb{Q}(5)$, all the decomposition groups are equal to $\operatorname{Gal}(F / \mathbb{Q})$ and the $p$-torsion groups of $F$ are trivial for $p=2,3,5$.
(iii) $K=\mathbb{Q}(2), F=K \mathbb{Q}(3) \mathbb{Q}(7), 7$ totally splits in $\mathbb{Q}(2) \mathbb{Q}(3)$ and $\# \mathscr{T}_{\mathbb{Q}(3)}=7$.
(iv) $K=\mathbb{Q}(11), F=\mathbb{Q}(11) \mathbb{Q}(3), p=3$ splits in $K, \frac{3^{10}}{\left(E_{K}: E_{K} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)}=1$. Note that as $\mathbb{Z}\left[\mu_{11}\right]$-module, $E_{K} / E_{K} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)$is, a priori, isomorphic to $\left(\mathbb{F}_{3^{5}}\right)^{h}, 0 \leq h \leq 2$ since the residue degree of 3 in $\mathbb{Q}\left[\mu_{11}\right]$ is 5 .
(v) $K=\mathbb{Q}(5), F=\mathbb{Q}(5) \mathbb{Q}(7), p=7$ splits in $K / \mathbb{Q}, \frac{7^{4}}{\left(E_{K}: E_{K} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)}=1$; a priori, $E_{K} / E_{K} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right) \simeq\left(\mathbb{F}_{7^{4}}\right)^{h}, 0 \leq h \leq 1$.

A this step we did not find counterexamples because of the use of $F=\operatorname{bnfinit}(Q, 1)$ limiting degrees and conductors. But in fact the literature does contain few counterexamples (see Coates [8, Section 3], from Fukuda-Komatsu, Horie [32, 33], also using genus theory). We shall examine these cases by computing Hasse's normic symbols in $F / K$ in the Chevalley formula.
6.3.2. Numerical counterexamples. Let $K=\mathbb{Q}(\ell), \ell \geq 2$, and let $p \neq \ell$ totally split in $K / \mathbb{Q}$; let $F:=K \mathbb{Q}(p)$. The computation of the index $\left(E_{K}: E_{K} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{F / K}\right)$ is easy and only needs to compute $K=\operatorname{bnfinit}(P, 1)$ instead of $F=\operatorname{bnfinit}(Q, 1)$ to get the units of $K$. The Remark 6.4 gives a mean to compute this index, but the test of local $p$ th power may be replaced by that of local normic Hasse's symbols. Then, following the practical method described in [15, II.4.4.3], the normic symbol $(\varepsilon, F / K)_{\mathfrak{p}}$ for a unit $\varepsilon \in E_{K}$ and a ramified $p$-place $\mathfrak{p}$, requires to find, for each $\mathfrak{p} \mid p, \alpha$ such that (the conductor being $p^{2}$ ):

\alpha \equiv 1 & \left(\bmod \left(p^{2} \mathfrak{p}^{-2}\right) .\right.
\end{array}

Then $(\alpha)$ is an ideal, prime to $p$, whose Artin symbol in $\operatorname{Gal}(F / K)$ characterizes the normic symbol; the image of this symbol in $\operatorname{Gal}(\mathbb{Q}(p) / \mathbb{Q})$ is given by the Artin symbol of $\mathrm{N}_{F / \mathbb{Q}(p)}(\alpha)$, seen in $\left(\mathbb{Z} / p^{2} \mathbb{Z}\right)^{\times}$.
Finally, taking into account the "product formula", the $\mathbb{F}_{p}$-rank of the matrix of this symbols gives the result $\left(\left(E_{K}: E_{K} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)=p^{\ell-1}\right.$ if and only if this rank is $\ell-1$ ).
Various programs are given; the variables M1, M2 denote the modulus $\mathfrak{p}^{2}$ and ( $p^{2} \mathfrak{p}^{-2}$, the variable $\mathrm{m}=\mathrm{M} 1+\mathrm{M} 2$ allows the above congruence (6.3.2) satisfied by $\alpha$ (in Z). The last programs assume that $C_{\mathbb{Q}(\ell)}=1$, which allows computing with cyclotomic units (as given in [56, Lemma 8.1 (a)]) without the function bnfinit $(\mathrm{P}, 1)$, unfeasible for $\ell>17$; thus we can compute the $\mathbb{F}_{p}$-rank of the matrix M for larger primes $p$.

We note that for these three counterexamples, $\# \mathscr{T}_{K}=p$, which indicates that $\# \mathscr{R}_{K}=p$ since $\mathscr{C}_{K}=1$ (see Section (4.4). The case $\ell=3, n=1, p=73$ may be elucidate in more details; indeed, with the defining polynomial $P=x^{3}-3 x+1$, the units are $\left(\varepsilon_{1}=x^{2}+x-1, \varepsilon_{2}=x-1\right)$ and fulfill the relation:

\left(\varepsilon_{1}^{33} \cdot \varepsilon_{2}^{5}\right)^{72} \equiv 1+73^{2} \cdot\left(2 x^{2}+59 x+69\right) \quad\left(\bmod 73^{3}\right)
$$

with $2 x^{2}+59 x+69 \in \mathfrak{p} \mid 73$. Thus the inertia groups $\operatorname{tor}_{\mathbb{Z}_{73}}\left(U_{\mathfrak{p}_{i}} / \overline{E_{K}} \cap U_{\mathfrak{p}_{i}}\right)$, $i=1,2,3$, are trivial as expected.
In the case $\ell=5, n=2, p=2251$ of total splitting, some partial computations in $E_{K} / E_{K}^{2251}$ (of order $2251^{24}$ ) indicate, as expected from the previous matrix rank computation, that the $\left(\varepsilon_{i}\right)^{2250}$ are of the form $1+2251 \cdot \alpha_{i}$, with non-independent $\alpha_{i}$ modulo 2251, which implies that the inertia groups tor $\mathbb{Z}_{2251}\left(U_{\mathfrak{p}_{i}} / \overline{E_{K}} \cap U_{\mathfrak{p}_{i}}\right)$, for $1 \leq i \leq 24$, generate $\mathscr{T}_{K}=\mathscr{R}_{K}$ of order $p$.
This shows that a direct computation on the units is hopeless contrary to the use of local norm symbols.

For $n>3$, the case $p=31$ no longer appears since $31 \equiv-1\left(\bmod 2^{5}=2^{3+2}\right)$.
We have performed such computations (for $\ell=2,3,5,7,11$ up to $p \leq 10^{9}$, $\ell=13,17,19,23$, up to $p \leq 2 \cdot 10^{5}, 41$ up to $p \leq 7211$, and some other in smaller intervals, for instance for some powers of 2 , when $p$ splits in $K$ ) without finding new solutions. This enforces [8, Conjecture D] in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$. More precisely, if one considers heuristics in the Borell-Cantelli style, using standard probabilities $\frac{1}{p}$, we have, possibly, infinitely many examples, but this does not seem realistic; in [20, Conjecture 8.4.] we have given extensive calculations and justifications of an opposite situation giving, as for the well-known Fermat quotients of small integers $2,3, \ldots$ some other probabilities suggesting solutions in finite number with the particularity of giving very few solutions, including sometimes a huge one!
6.3.3. On the conjectural triviality of the logarithmic class groups in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$. The following result of Jaulent [39, Theorem 4.5, Remarques] (that we restrict to our context) is perhaps a key to understand some phenomena in the composite $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ of all the $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$-extensions of $\mathbb{Q}$, regarding Greenberg's conjecture.

Theorem 6.5. Let $K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\mathscr{L}^{\mathscr{N}}\right) \subset \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}, \mathscr{L}=\left\{\ell_{1}, \ldots, \ell_{N}\right\}, \mathscr{N}=\left\{n_{1}, \ldots, n_{N}\right\}$ and let $K_{m}:=K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$ be a layer in the cyclotomic $\mathbb{Z}_{p}$-extension of $K(\ell, p \geq 2, p \neq \ell$; under the Leopoldt and Gross-Kuz'min conjectures for $p$ ). Since the extension is unramified, in the logarithmic sense, we have $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K_{m}}^{\operatorname{Gal}\left(K_{m} / K\right)} \simeq \widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}$. Whence $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K_{m}}=1$, for all $m$, if and only if $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}=1$.

This gives many cases of triviality; moreover, we know that $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}=1$ implies that Greenberg's conjecture holds true in $K\left(p^{\infty}\right)$ for the $p$-class groups $(\lambda=\mu=0)$. For the base fields $K=\mathbb{Q}(2)$ and $K=\mathbb{Q}(3)$, the logarithmic class groups $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}$ are trivial for $p=31$ and 73 , respectively:

So, even if in our computations, for $K_{1}=\mathbb{Q}(2) \mathbb{Q}(31)$ and $K_{1}=\mathbb{Q}(3) \mathbb{Q}(73)$, the ordinary class groups $\mathscr{C}_{K_{1}}$ are non-trivial for $p=31$ and 73 , respectively, it follows that the $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K_{1}}$ are trivial for all the tested primes $p$, including 31,73 .
6.4. Conclusion and questions. The use of genus theory has succeeded to give few non-trivial class groups in composite subfields of $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$, but there are not enough computations to give more precise heuristics since it is not possible to use PARI/GP with higher degrees. This invites to ask for some questions about the arithmetic properties of $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$; for fixed $p$, we shall consider the composite $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}$ of the $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$-extensions for $\ell \neq p$ and study $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}} / \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}=\widehat{\mathbb{Q}} \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}\left(p^{\infty}\right) / \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}$ :
(i) Let $p$ fixed; is the decomposition group of $p$ in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}} / \mathbb{Q}$ of finite index in $\operatorname{Gal}(\widehat{\mathbb{Q}} / \mathbb{Q})$ ? We have conjectured this property in (loc. cit.). Of course, this seems linked to the order of magnitude of $p$ since, taking a prime $p=1+\lambda q_{1}^{a_{1}} \cdots q_{s}^{a_{s}}$, with primes $q_{i}, a_{i}>1$, this gives unbounded indices; but for $p=2$, only two primes $\ell$ are known such that 2 splits in $\mathbb{Q}(\ell)$.
(ii) Let $K \subset \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}$ of finite degree and let $F:=K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right), m \geq 1$; is the set of primes $p$ such that $\left(E_{K}^{\text {pos }}: E_{K}^{\text {pos }} \cap \mathrm{N}_{F / K}\left(F^{\times}\right)\right)<p^{m\left(t_{p}-1\right)}$ finite in number, where $t_{p}$ is the number of $p$-places of $K$ ?
If so, this gives new heuristic/conjecture about the behavior of the units in $\widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ and is related to Greenberg's conjecture [29] for the subfields $K \subset \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}^{*}$.
(iii) In the context of (ii), we have obtained in previous sections that in the following cases, where $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ is non-trivial with a trivial $p$-class group (see Subsections 4.14.3:

$p$ splits totally in $K:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)$ and the $p$-class group of $K_{1}:=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right) \mathbb{Q}(p)$ is divisible by $\frac{p^{\ell^{n}-1}}{\left(E_{K}: E_{K} \cap \mathrm{~N}_{K / K_{1}}\left(K_{1}^{\times}\right)\right)}$, only depending of the $p$-adic properties of $E_{K}$ (or of the group of cyclotomic units), but our PARI/GP programs do not succeed in proving if $p$ divides or not $\# C_{K_{1}}$.
What is for instance the order of the logarithmic class group $\widetilde{\mathscr{C}}_{K}$ for the above three fields of too large degrees ?
(iv) Let $K \subset \widehat{\mathbb{Q}}$ of finite degree and consider $K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)$; what are the Iwasawa invariants of $\underset{m}{\lim _{m}} \mathscr{T}_{K \mathbb{Q}\left(p^{m}\right)}$ ?
$(v)$ In [54, Silverman proves, after some other contributions (Cusick, Pohst, Remak), an inequality between $R_{K}$ (regulator) and $D_{K}$ (discriminant) of the form (in the context $\left.K=\mathbb{Q}\left(\ell^{n}\right)\right): R_{K}>c_{K}\left(\log \left(\gamma_{K}\left|D_{K}\right|\right)\right)^{\ell^{n-1}(\ell-1)}$. A $p$-adic equivalent would give a solution of many questions in number theory, as a proof of Leopoldt's conjecture! However, we have proposed, in [24, Conjecture 8.2] a "folk conjecture" about $\# \mathscr{R}_{K}$, by means of $\mathscr{T}_{K}$ equal to $\mathscr{R}_{K}$ for all $p$ large enough, and justified by extensive computations:

Conjecture 6.6. Let $\mathscr{K}$ be the set of number fields; for $K \in \mathscr{K}$, let $D_{K}$ be its discriminant and $\mathscr{R}_{K}:=\operatorname{tor}_{\mathbb{Z}_{p}}\left(\log \left(U_{K}^{1}\right) / \log \left(\overline{E_{K}^{1}}\right)\right)$ be its normalized p-adic regulator (see §(2.1). There exists a constant $C_{p}>0$ such that:

\log _{\infty}\left(\not \mathscr{R}_{K}\right) \leq \log _{\infty}\left(\# \mathscr{T}_{K}\right) \leq C_{p} \cdot \log _{\infty}\left(\sqrt{\left|D_{K}\right|}\right), \text { for all } K \in \mathscr{K}
$$

where $\log _{\infty}$ is the complex logarithm. Possibly, $C_{p}$ is independent of $p$.

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
