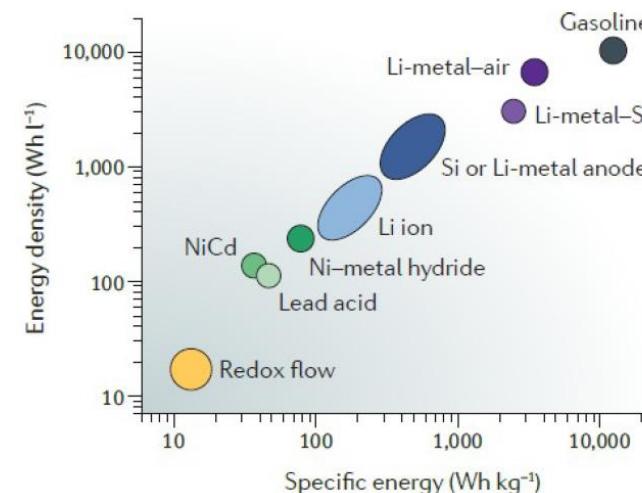

1- Introduction : Solid Polymer Electrolytes

- **Context**

Need to develop high energy density and safe batteries [1]



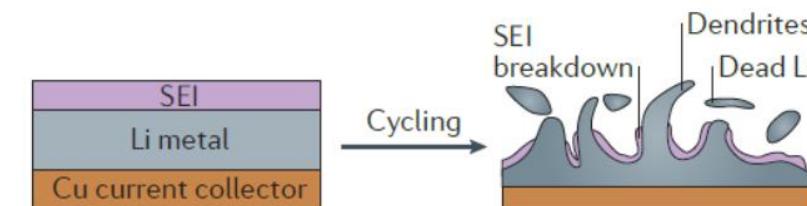
- **Perspective**

Reliable battery with a negative electrode in Li metal

- **Issue**

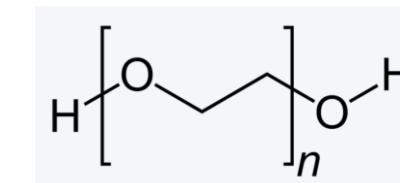
Li metal with conventional liquid electrolytes

→ Short-circuit hazard:
flammable electrolyte and dendritic growth [1]

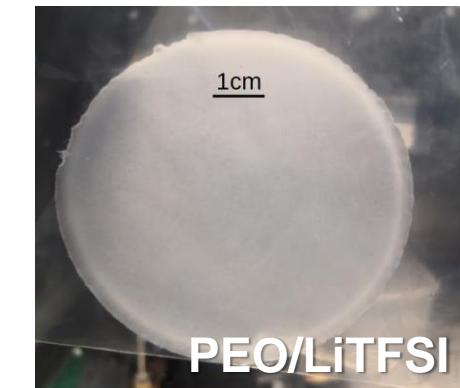


- **Solution** [2]

Replace liquid electrolytes with
Solid Polymer Electrolytes (SPE)

- Single-ion:

High transference number
 $t^+ = 0.85 - 0.95$ [1]

Great interest in preventing dendrite growth
 and addressing the limited power delivery [2]

- Crosslinked:

Increase the mechanical properties

- Silica network:

Simple and innovative
 one-step chemistry

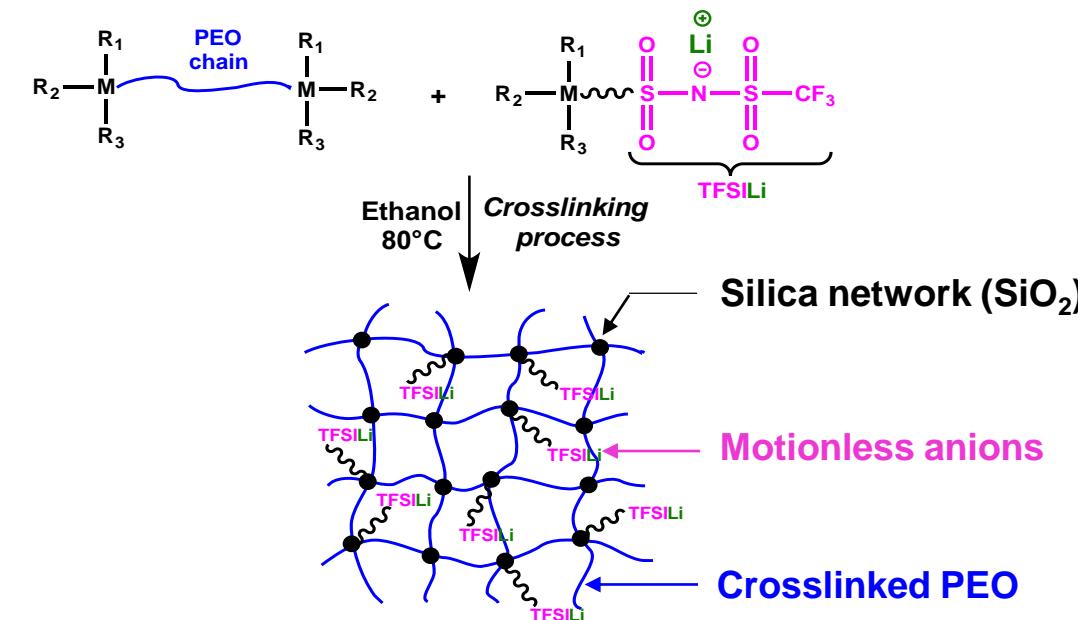


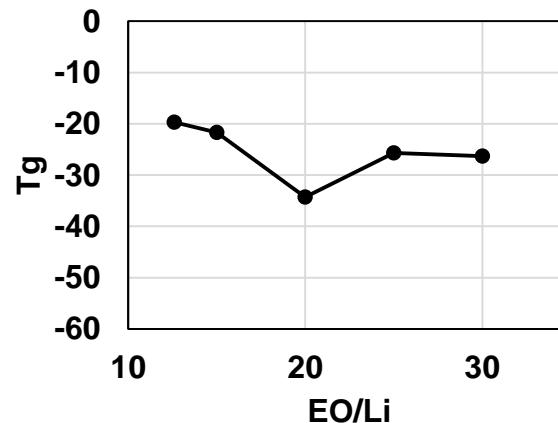

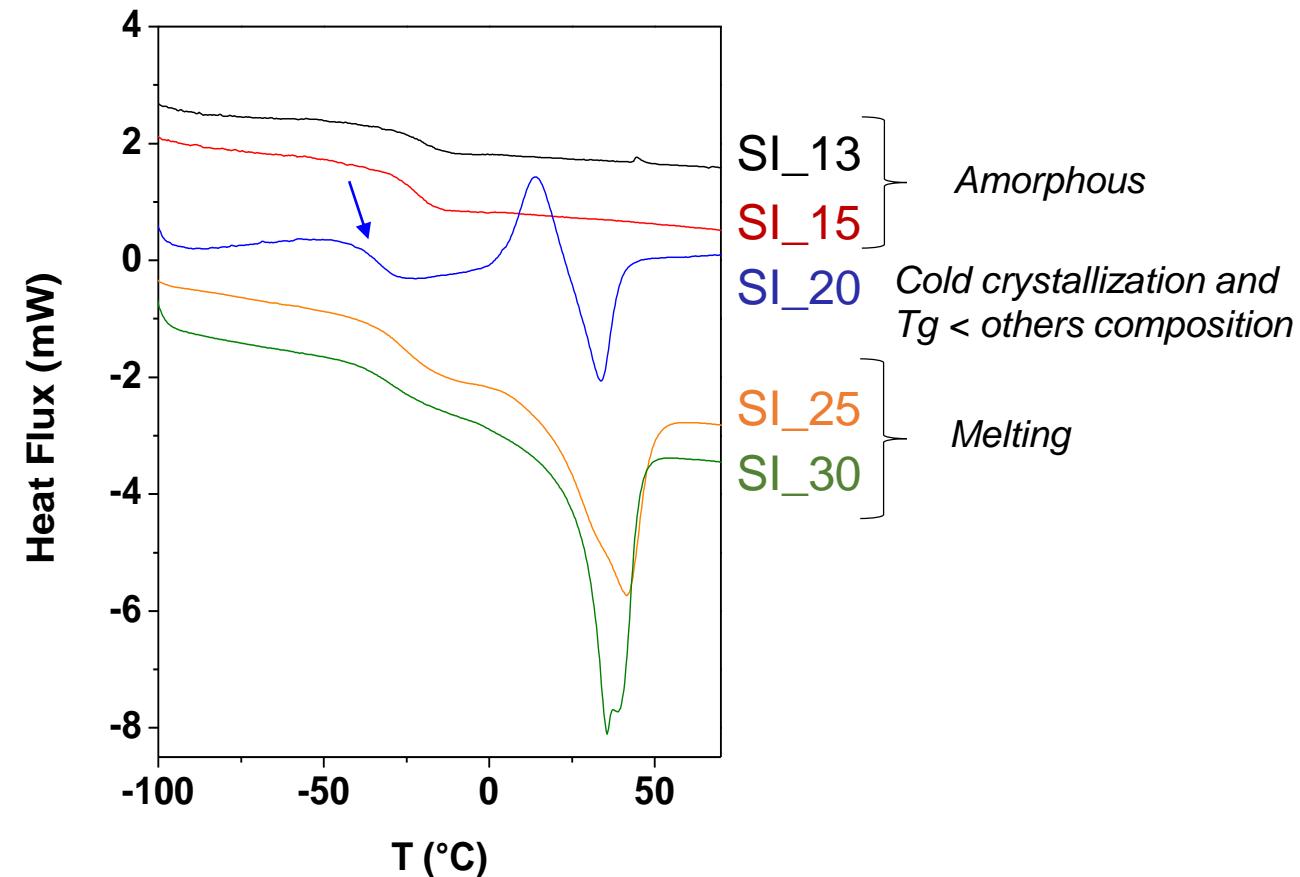
- **DSC**
- Heating scan from -110 to 130 °C at 20 °C/min
- T_g determined as the pic of the derivative curve



Samples	SI_13	SI_15	SI_20	SI_25	SI_30
EO/Li	12.6	15	20	25	30
T_g (°C)	-20	-22	-34	-26	-26

- T_g presents a minimum at $EO/Li = SI_{20}$
- Behavior different from PEO/LiTFSI.^[1]

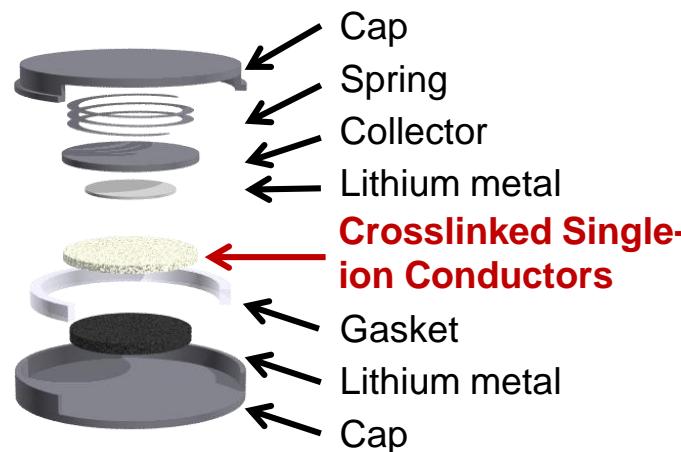

- Electrochemical Impedance Spectroscopy (EIS)

Symmetric cell



$$\sigma = \frac{e}{R_{el} * S}$$

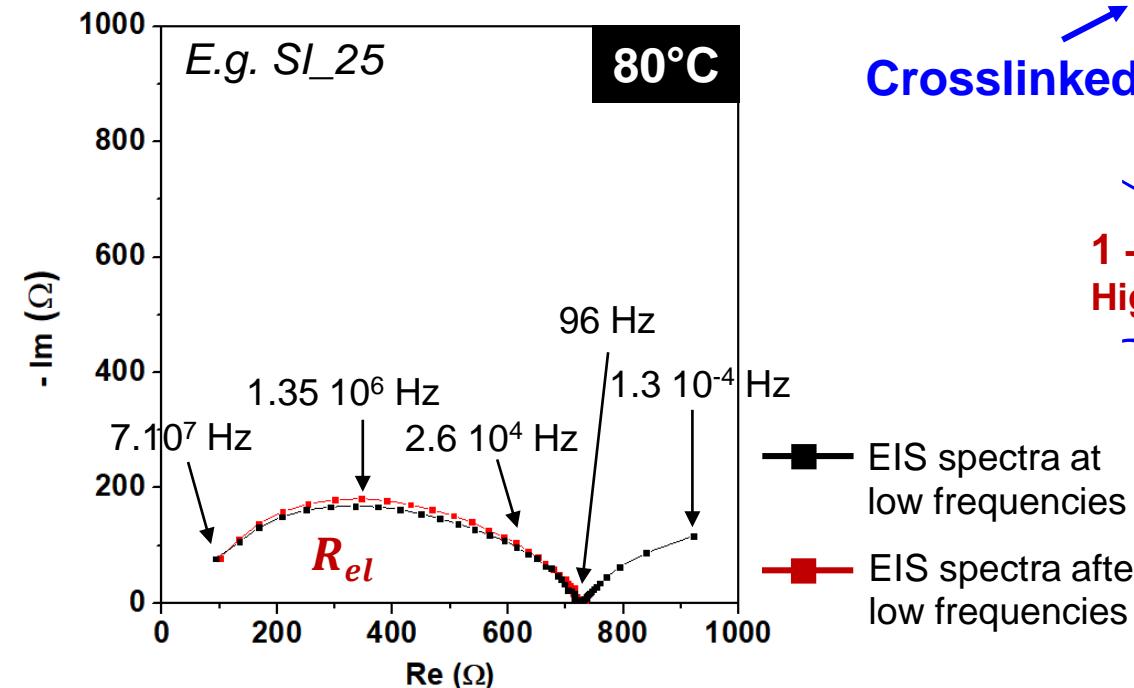
σ : Ionic Conductivity ($S.cm^{-1}$)

R_{el} : Electrolyte resistance

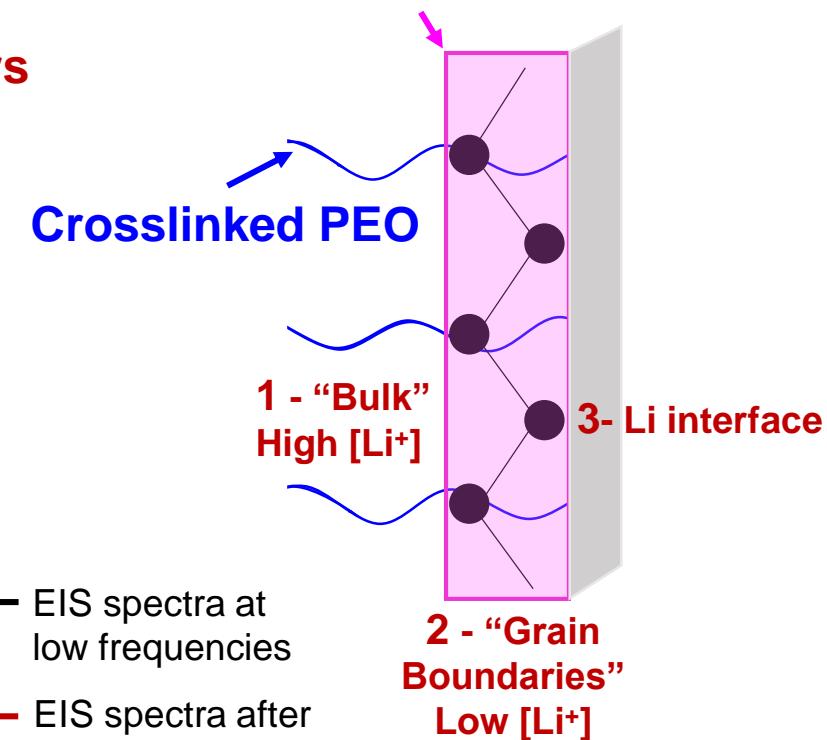
e : Thickness of the electrolyte

S : Surface of the electrodes

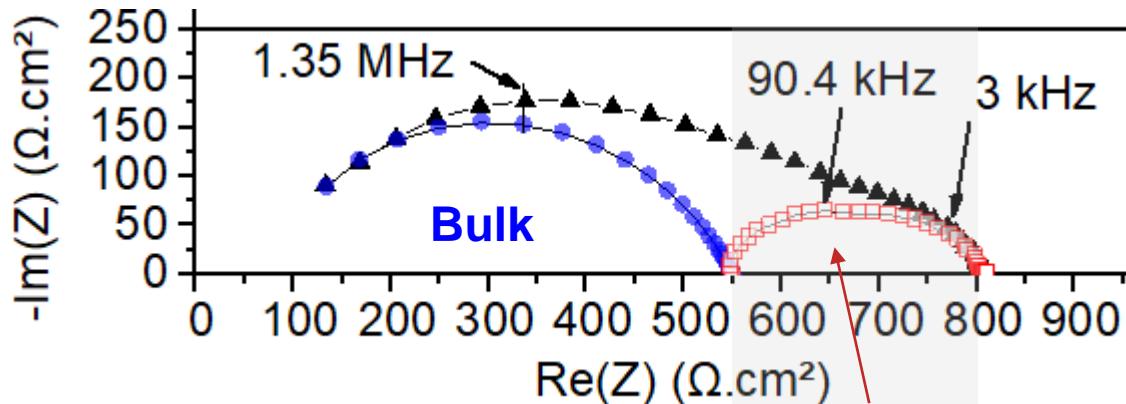


Silica network,
Motionless anions

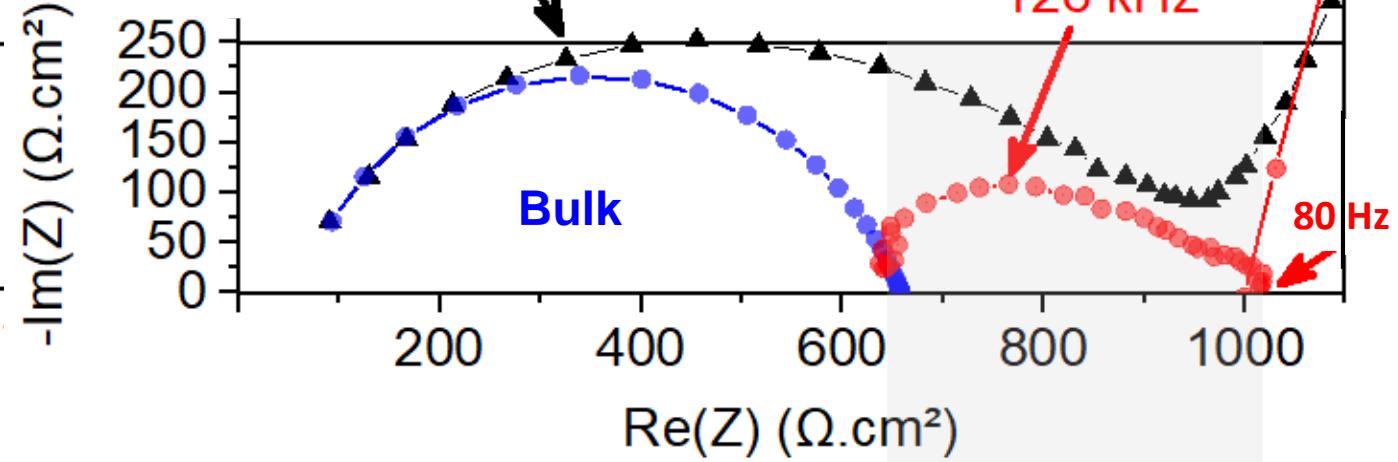


→ EIS Spectra: very distributed in frequencies with **3 main** contributions

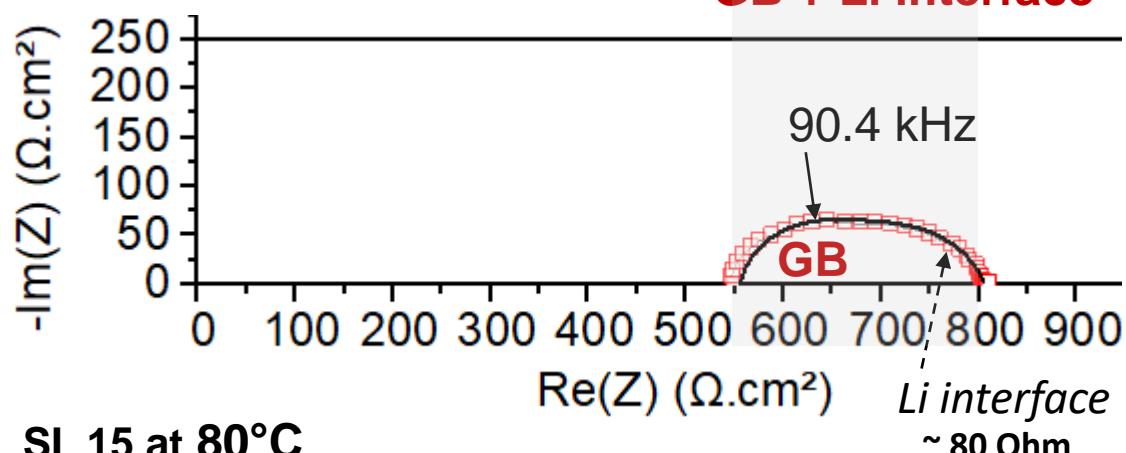
➤ Li/SI/Li cell



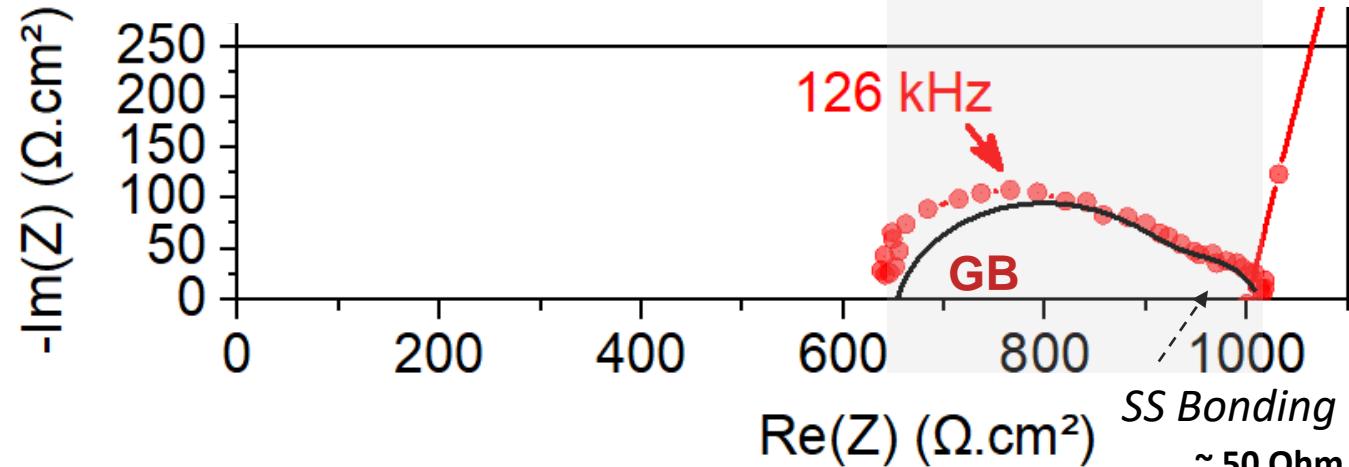
➤ SS/SI/SS cell 1.31 MHz



GB + Li interface



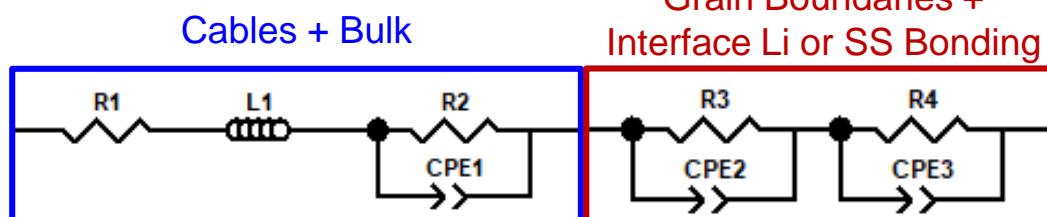
Li interface
~ 80 Ohm

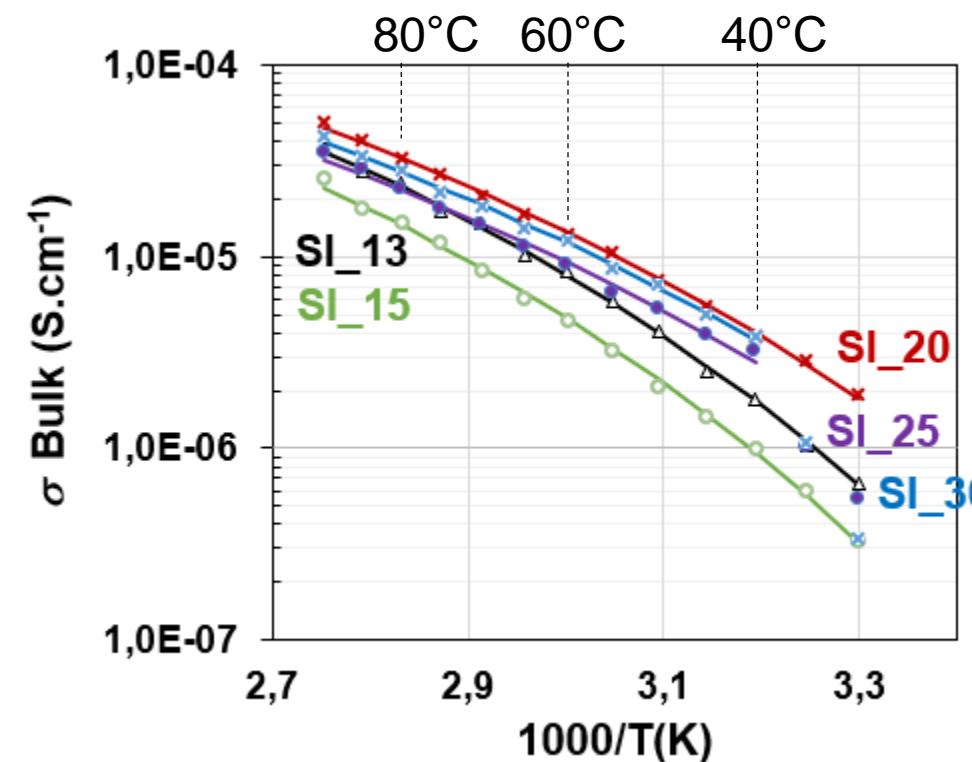


SS Bonding
~ 50 Ohm

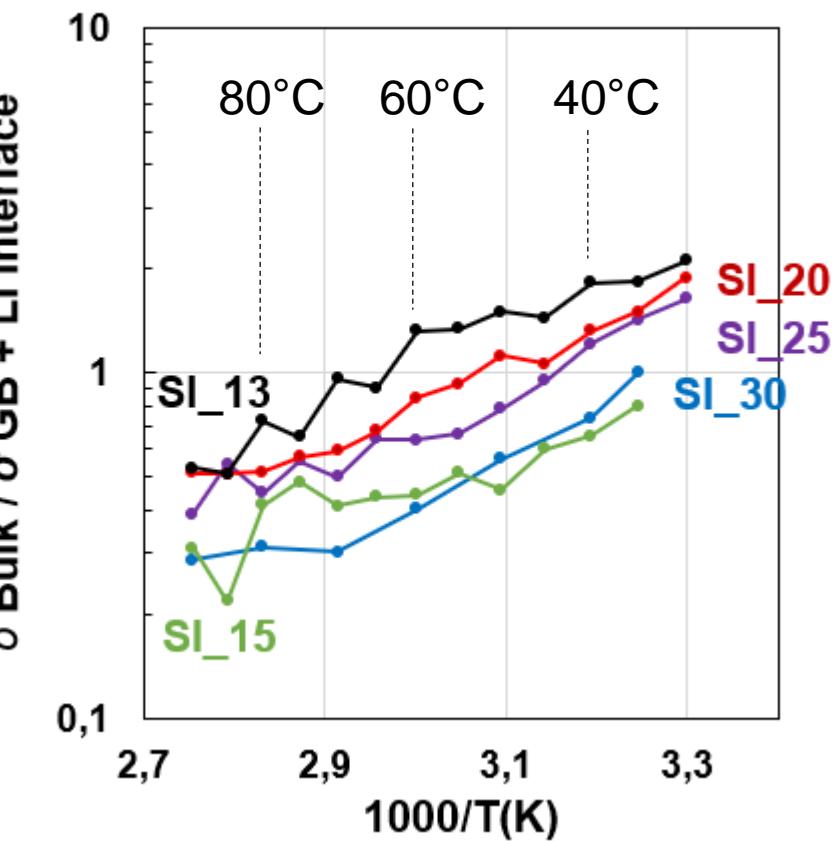
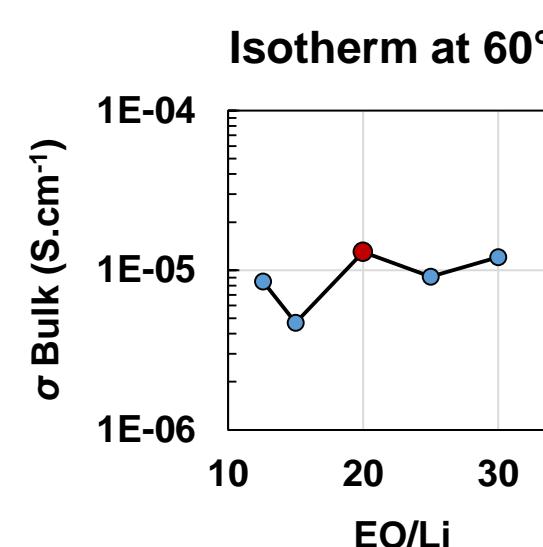
SI_15 at 80°C

- Frequencies are similar
- SS and Li values of the **GB** & **Bulk** are identical
- Very small **Li interface**





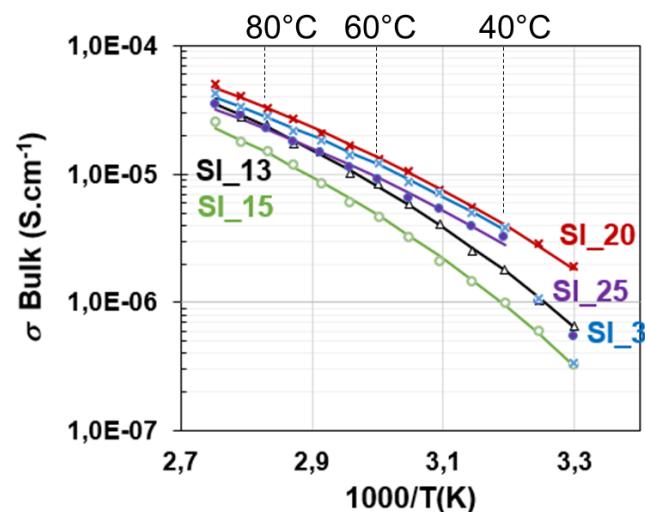
Ionic conductivity σ Bulk max for **SI_20**



σ Grain Boundaries / σ Li interface
shows similar curves

→ Similar behavior between
compositions

Materials characterization: Model Vogel-Tamman-Fulcher (VTF)



$$\sigma = \frac{A}{T^{1/2}} e^{-\frac{B}{T-T_0}} \text{ (VTF)}$$

σ : Ionic conductivity (S.cm^{-1})

T : Temperature (K)

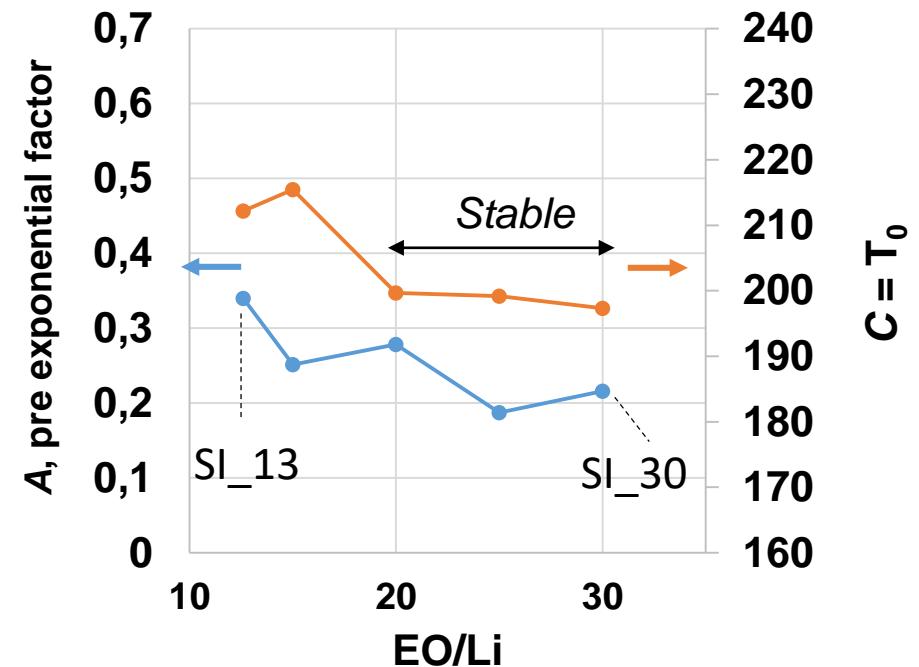
A : Pre exponential factor

B : Pseudo energy of activation

$T_0 = T_g - 50$, T_g glass transition temperature

Samples	SI_13	SI_15	SI_20	SI_25	SI_30
EO/Li	12.6	15	20	25	30

Conditions : σ Bulk, B ($Ea = 7.8 \text{ kJ/mol}$)



→ A and T_0 are consistent with the literature [1]

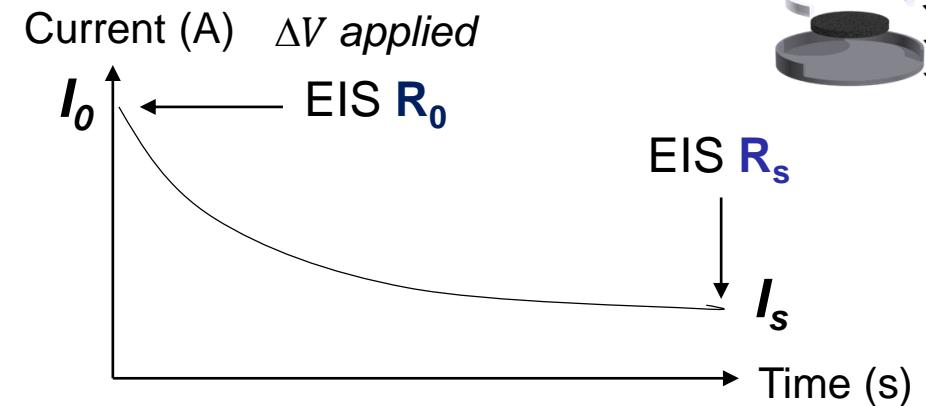

- Diffusional impedance at low frequencies ($10 - 10^{-4}$) Hz [1-2]

$$t^+ = \frac{\mu^+}{\mu^- + \mu^+} = \frac{R_e}{R_e + R_d}$$

μ^+, μ^- Mobility of the ions

R_d Diffusional impedance (Warburg element)

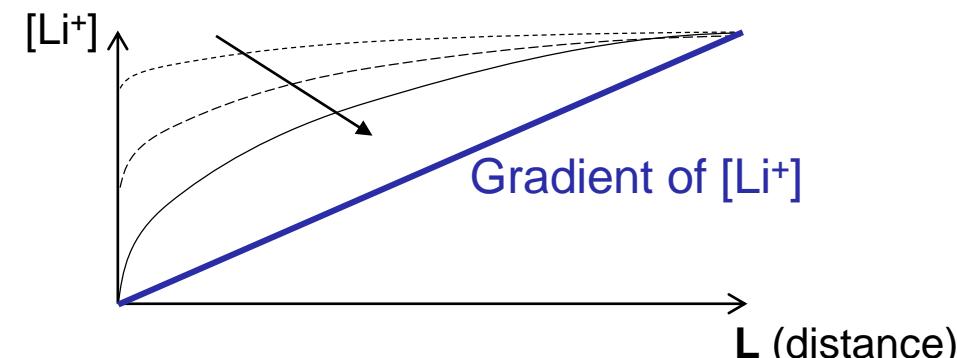


- Impedance and potentiostatic polarization ΔV [3]

$$t^+ = \frac{R_{bulk}}{\frac{\Delta V}{I_s} - R_s}$$

R_{bulk} Bulk resistance

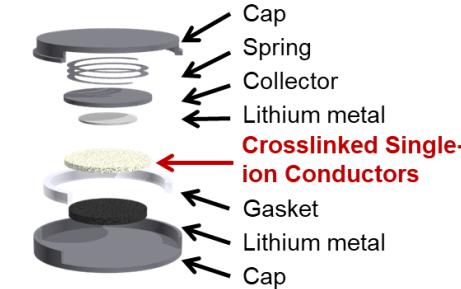
R_s Interface resistance

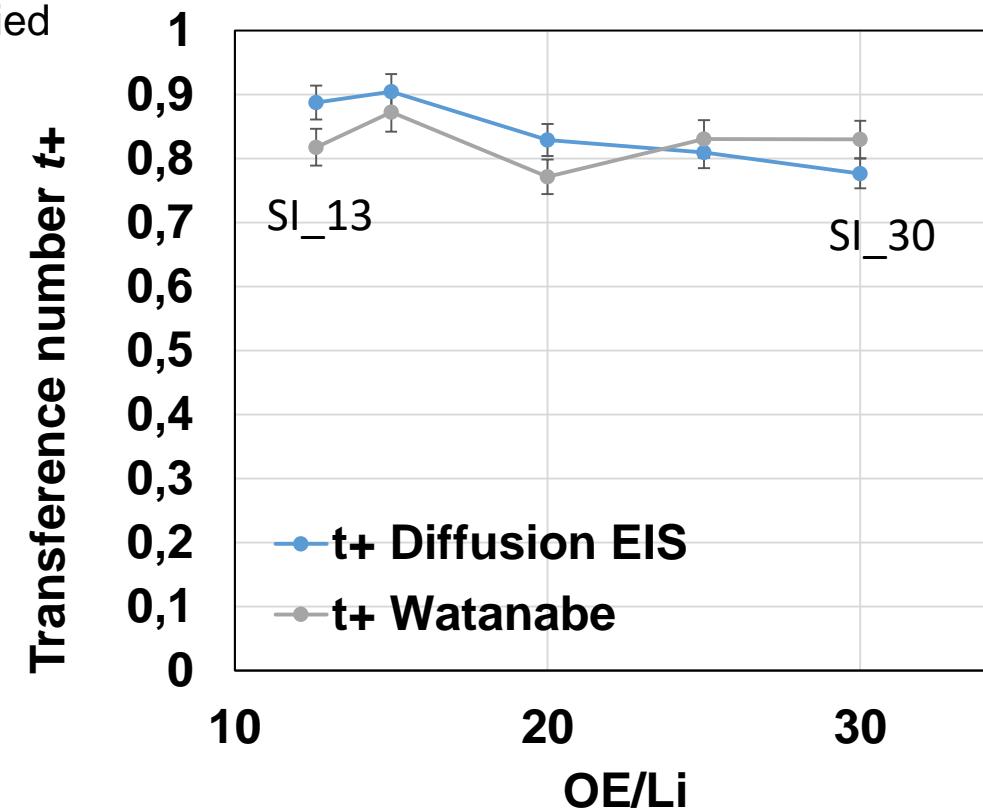

Parameters:

- $T = 80^\circ\text{C}$
- EIS Amplitude: $\Delta E = 30 \text{ mV}$
- ChronoAmperometry applied
 $E = 80 \text{ mV}$

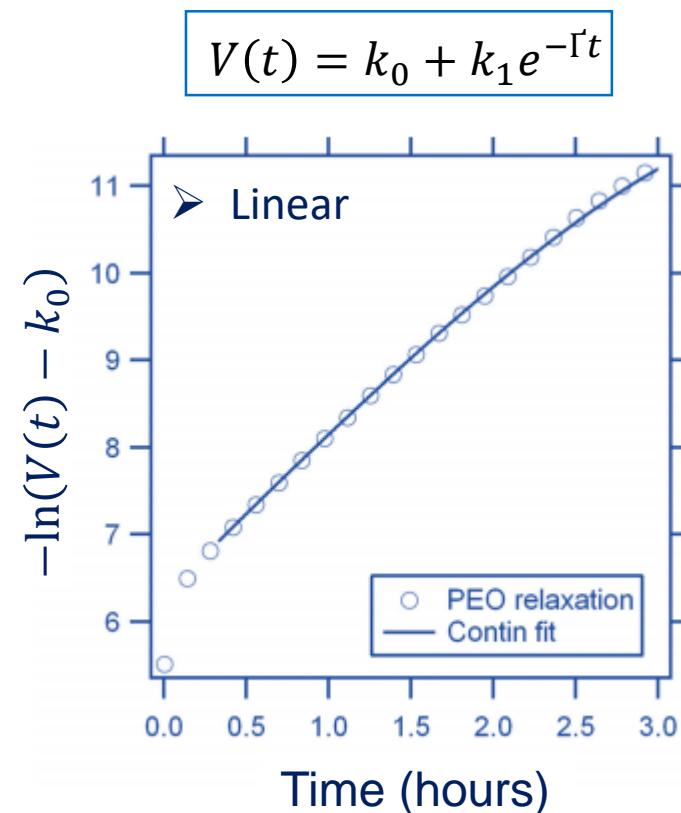
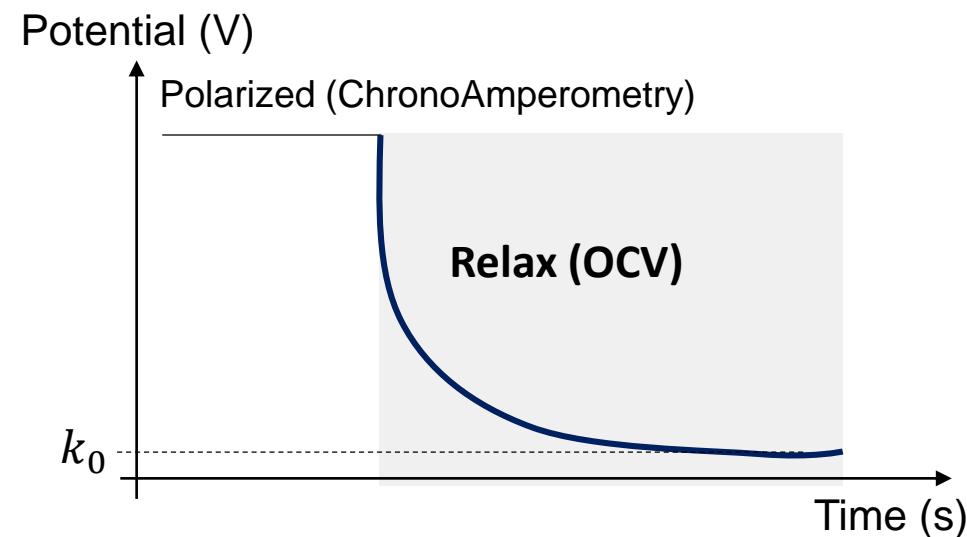
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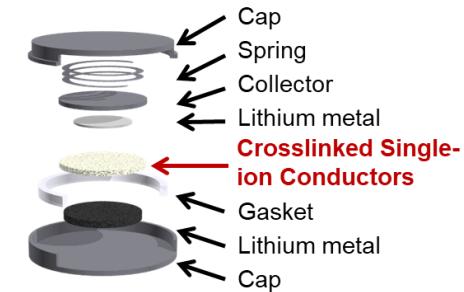
- t^+ is about 0.8 – 0.9
- not equal to 1 because of the interface reactions with the SPE [1]

- Polarization followed by a relaxation [1-2]

(ex : PEO + LiTFSI)

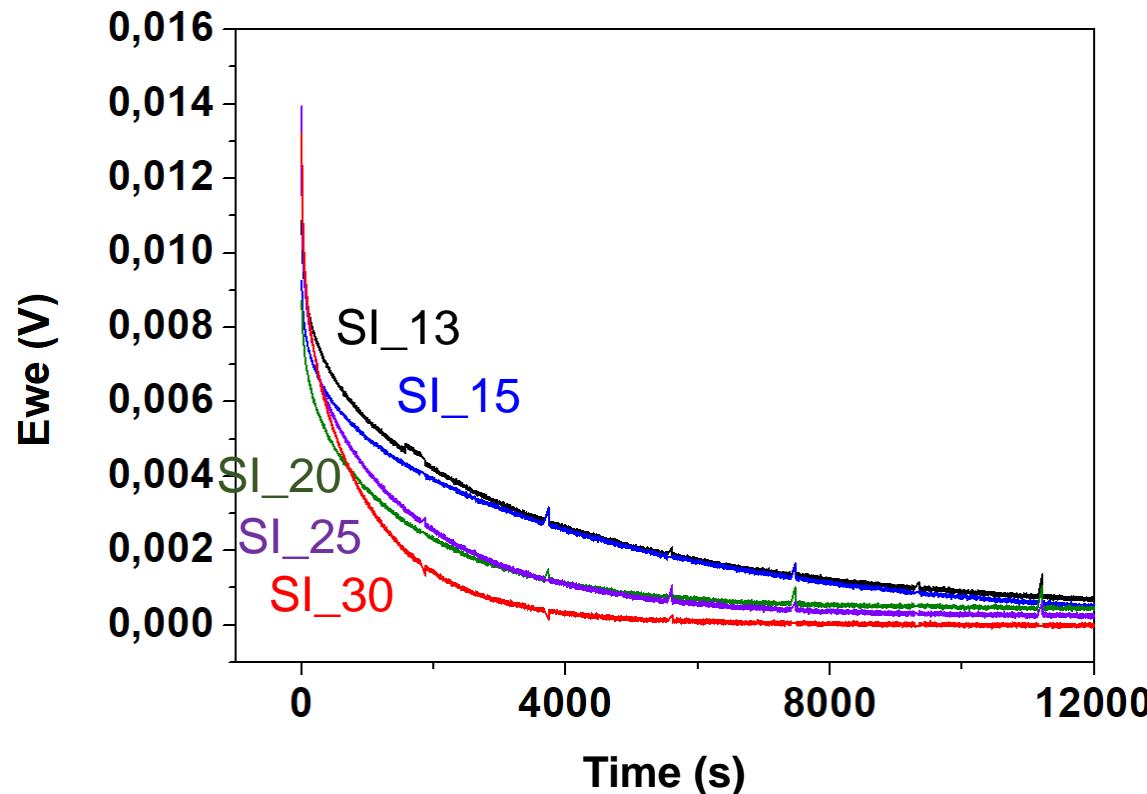


with $\Gamma = D_{amb} \pi^2 / L^2$

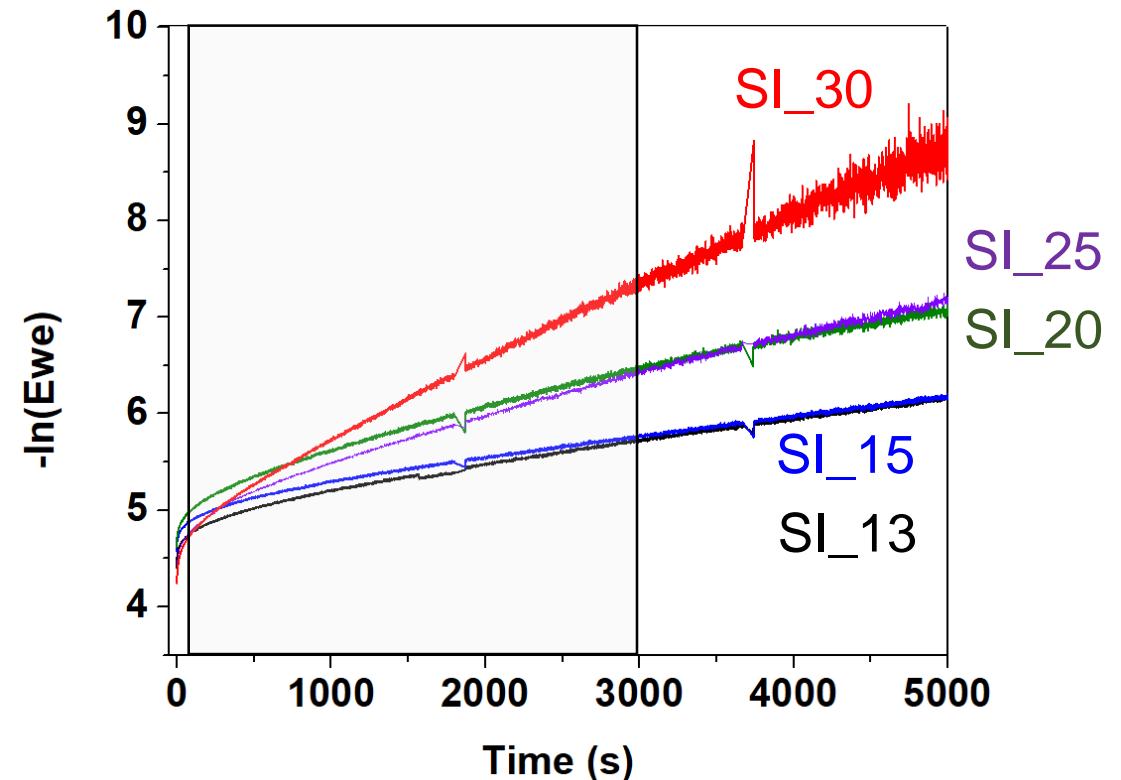
L : thickness of the electrolyte

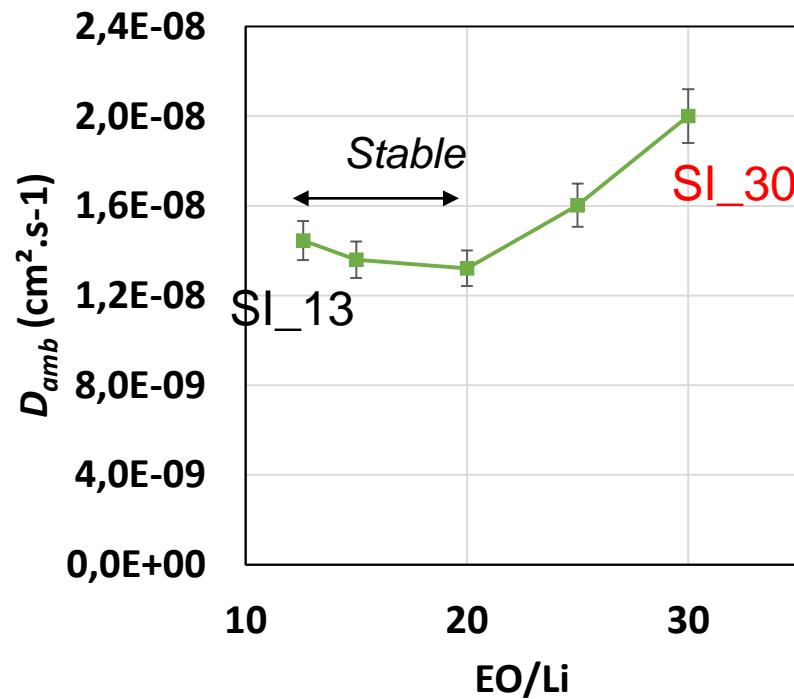
- Relaxation after polarization at 80°C



- Linear domain : up to $\sim 3\ 000$ s

$$V(t) = k_0 + k_1 e^{-\Gamma t}$$

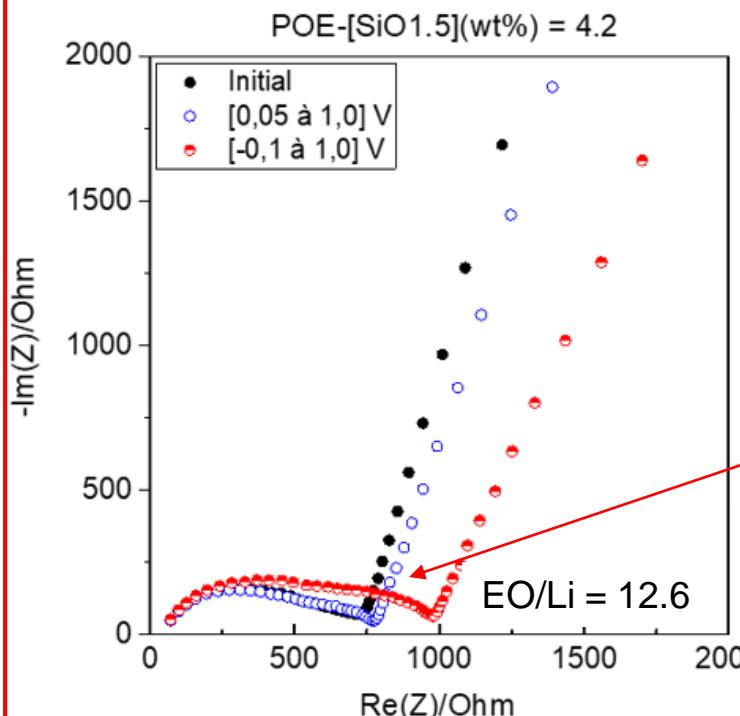
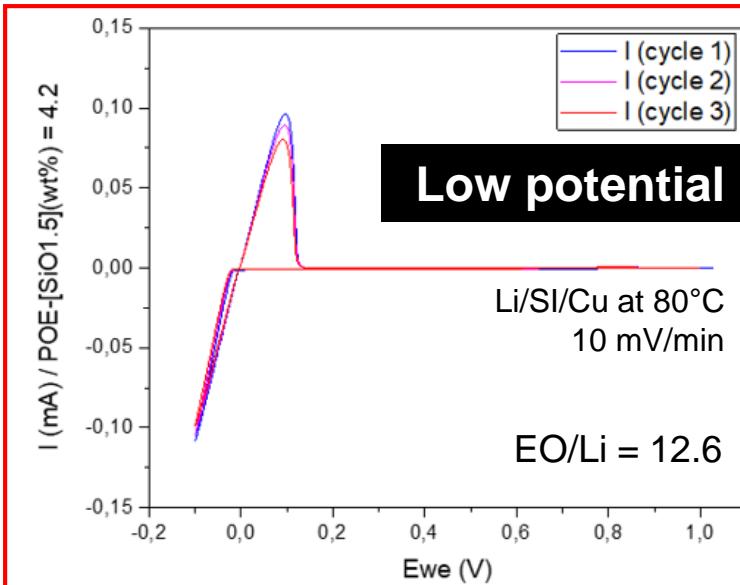
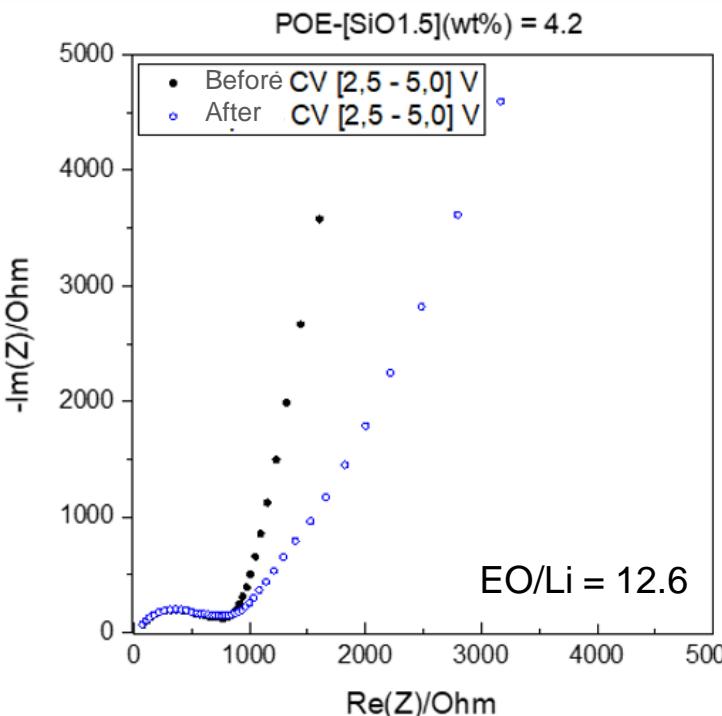
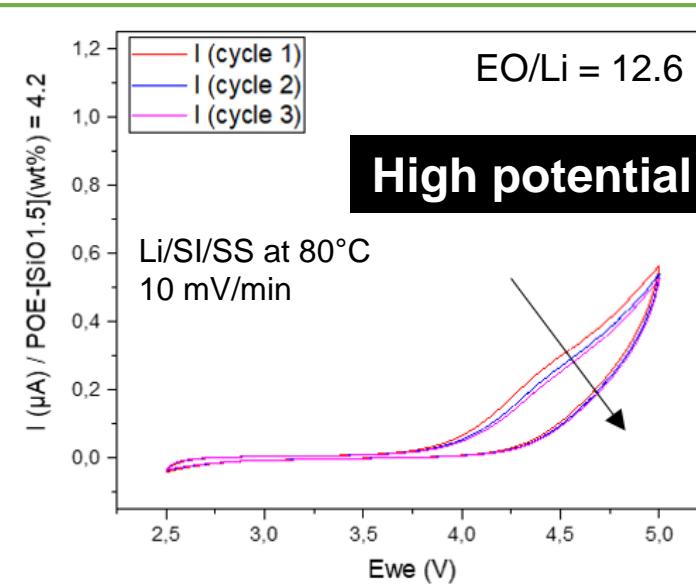
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- EO/Li [13; 20] D_{amb} stable
 - EO/Li [25; 30] D_{amb} increase
- ↓
- Less crosslinked

- Values similar at a copolymer PEO-PS ($\sim 2 \times 10^{-8} \text{ cm}^2 \cdot \text{s}^{-1}$ [1])
→ D_{amb} is dependent on the chain dynamic

High potential scan up to 5V vs Li⁺/Li

- After 3.8 V the degradation of the electrolyte starts (μA) but I decreases
- EIS spectra evolve slightly
Passivation

Li reduction & oxidation scan down to -0.1 V vs Li⁺/Li

- From -0.1 to 0.2 V current is about ± 0.1 mA
- EIS spectra evolve
Li interface and Grain boundaries increase

- *Crosslinked Single-ion Conductor Polymer Electrolytes*

Synthesis: simple and in one-step

Organosilicon Nanocharges – charge carrier vs. organic chains synthesis (PEO based)

Electrochemistry: similar to a “single-ion PEO” electrolyte

Thermodynamic, ionic transport, and electrochemical stability

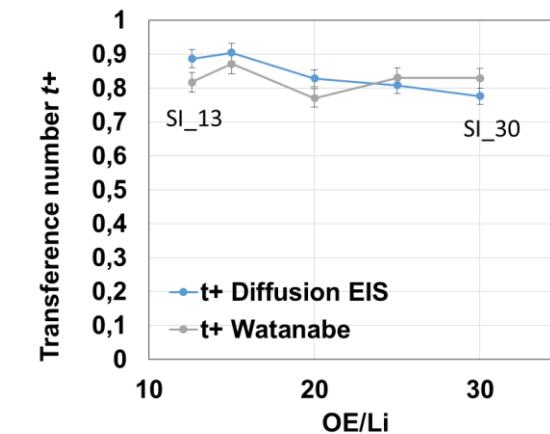
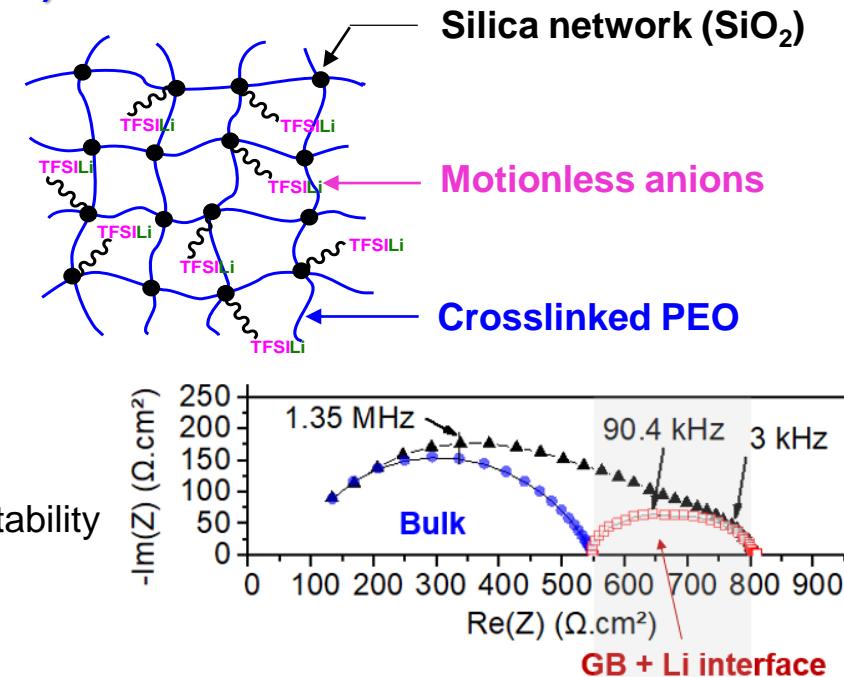
Difference: “Silica network & PEO”
