Introduction

- **Structural change** : complementary and interrelated changes in various aspects of the economy : *sector composition of output and employment, industrial organization, technical change, demand and trade patterns,* etc.
- A key driver of energy consumption and GHG emissions (Blanco et al., 2014; Schäfer, 2005; Voigt et al., 2014)
- Shapes abatement potentials and barriers/opportunities for climate change mitigation (Jakob et al., 2014; Savona and Ciarli, 2019; Ciarli and Savona, 2019)
- Is associated with main socio-economic impacts of climate policy : sectoral costs and economic risks (Mercure et al., 2018) and opportunities (Dai et al. 2016); employment and job re-locations (Fragkos et al, 2018); purchasing power, income distribution, inequalities and poverty (Campagnolo and Davide, 2019)
- Implicit in IAM baseline scenarios (eg SSPs : Riahi et al. 2017) (with risks of bias in energy/GHG projections (Grubb et al. 2015))
- Specific studies with multi-sector economic IAMs

 \rightarrow A lens for systemic analysis of key socio-economic aspects of climate change scenarios and related issues : transformation pathways, SDGs, political feasibility, just transition, etc.

Main drivers of change

- Sectoral productivity (factor specific inc energy, TFP)
- Inter-industry relationships (Input-Output coefficients)
- Consumption patterns (income distribution, savings, income elasticities, changes of preferences, etc.)
- Trade patterns (inc. competitiveness)
- Investment patterns

A first multi-model study

Two objectives

- Measuring and comparing structural change in a baseline scenario
- Assessing incremental structural change in a 'standard' mitigation scenario
 - Three multi-sector IAMs (E3ME, GEM-E3 and IMACLIM) capable to model endogenous structural change through comparable main mechanisms
 - Baseline scenarios based on SSP2 and harmonization of key parameters/variables (regional population and GDP, technology and ressources availability, etc.) *except specific structural change drivers*
 - A 'standard' mitigation scenario : similar 2015-2050 CO2 budgets (850-950 GtCO2); supply and market-driven policies (inc. carbon price)

Conclusions and further research

- Uncertainty range for future structural change under same SSP baseline scenario
- Incremental macro-structural change in a 'standard' mitigation scenario of *second order* compared to baseline in general
- However significant structural change for specific sectors/industries
- Strong regional disparities

Further research

- Develop structural change scenarios within the SSP framework (cf Leimbach and Marcolino, 2020)
- Develop multi-sector IAM analysis :
 - More robust structural change baselines (including post-COVID trends) : key drivers and implications for energy and emissions
 - Macroeconomic impacts of climate policy and implications for SDGs (growth, employment, etc.)
 - Structural change dynamics for key sectors (e.g fossil fuels)
 - Structural change in alternative low energy demand scenarios
