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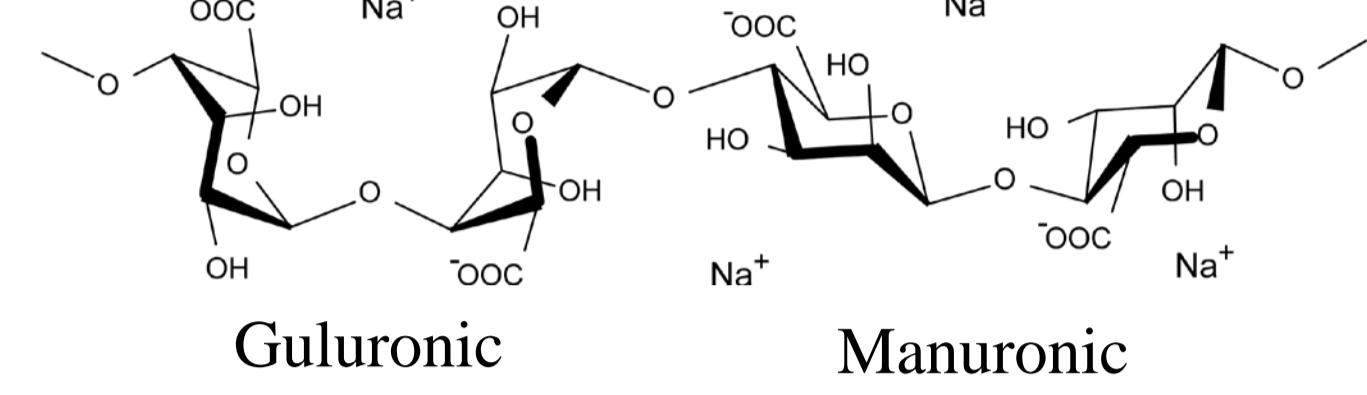
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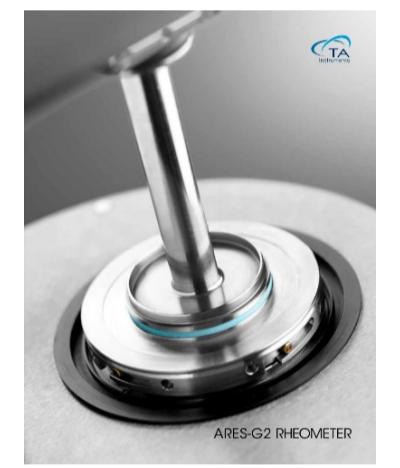
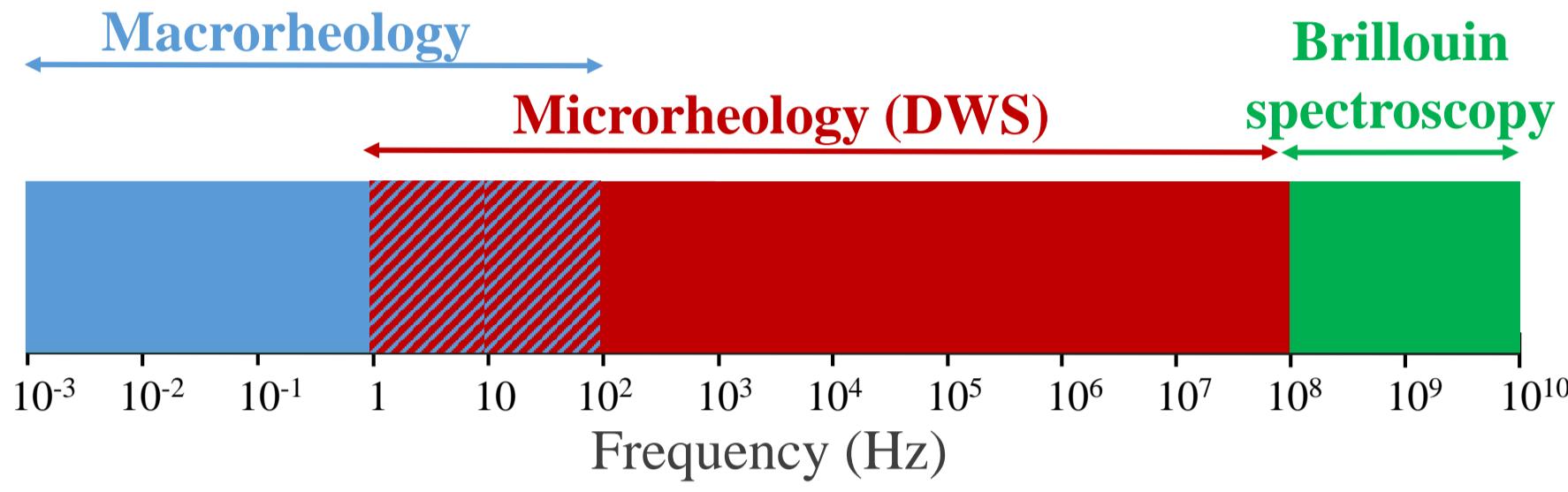
Objectives

➤ Entangled aqueous solutions of sodium alginate

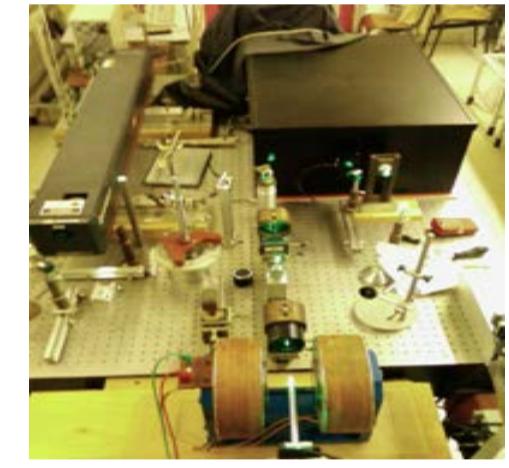

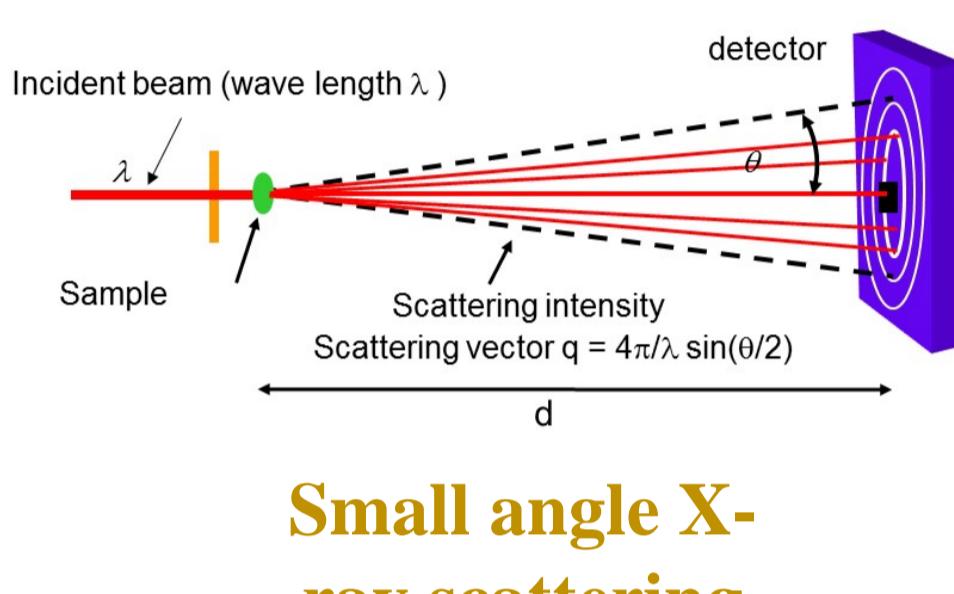

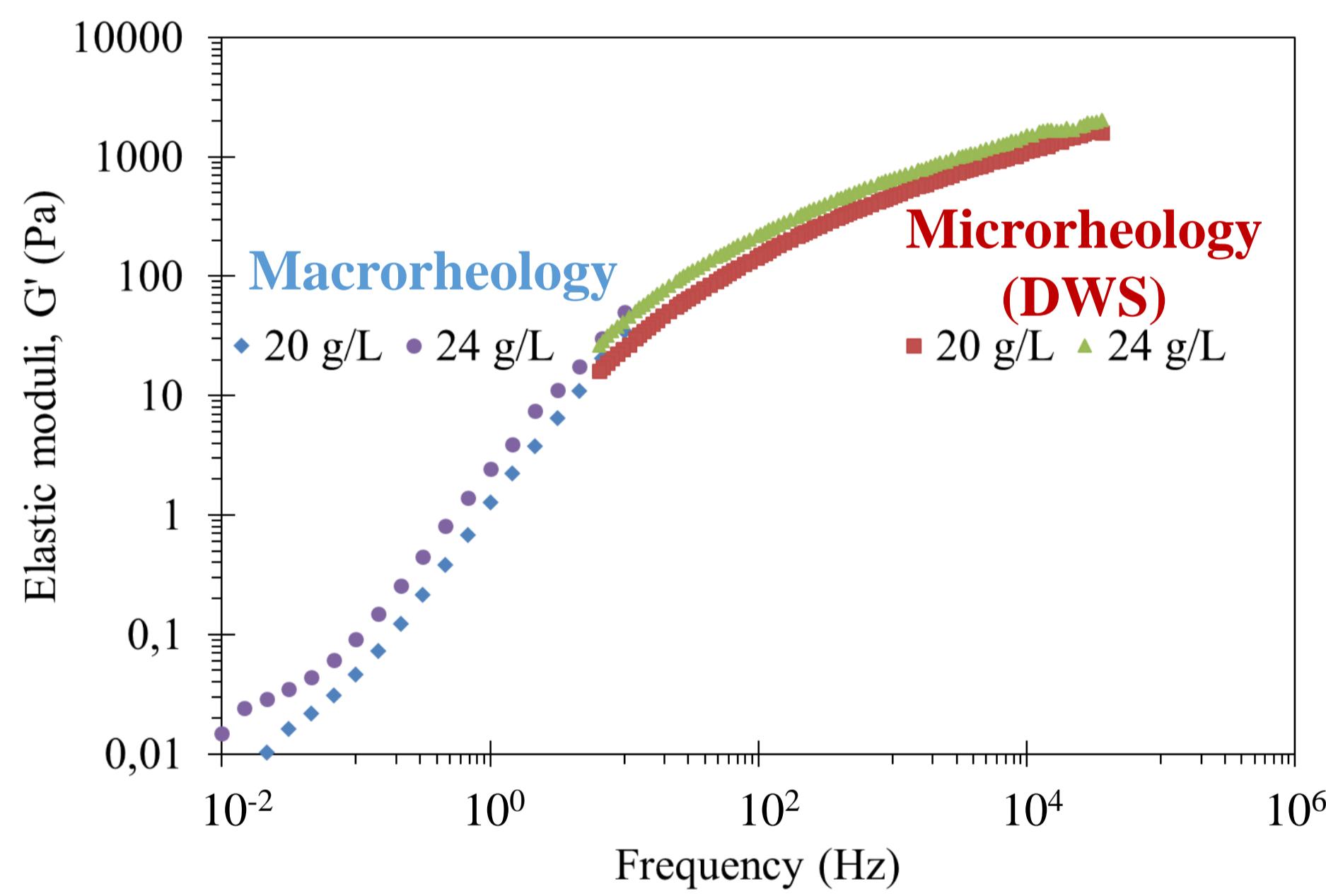

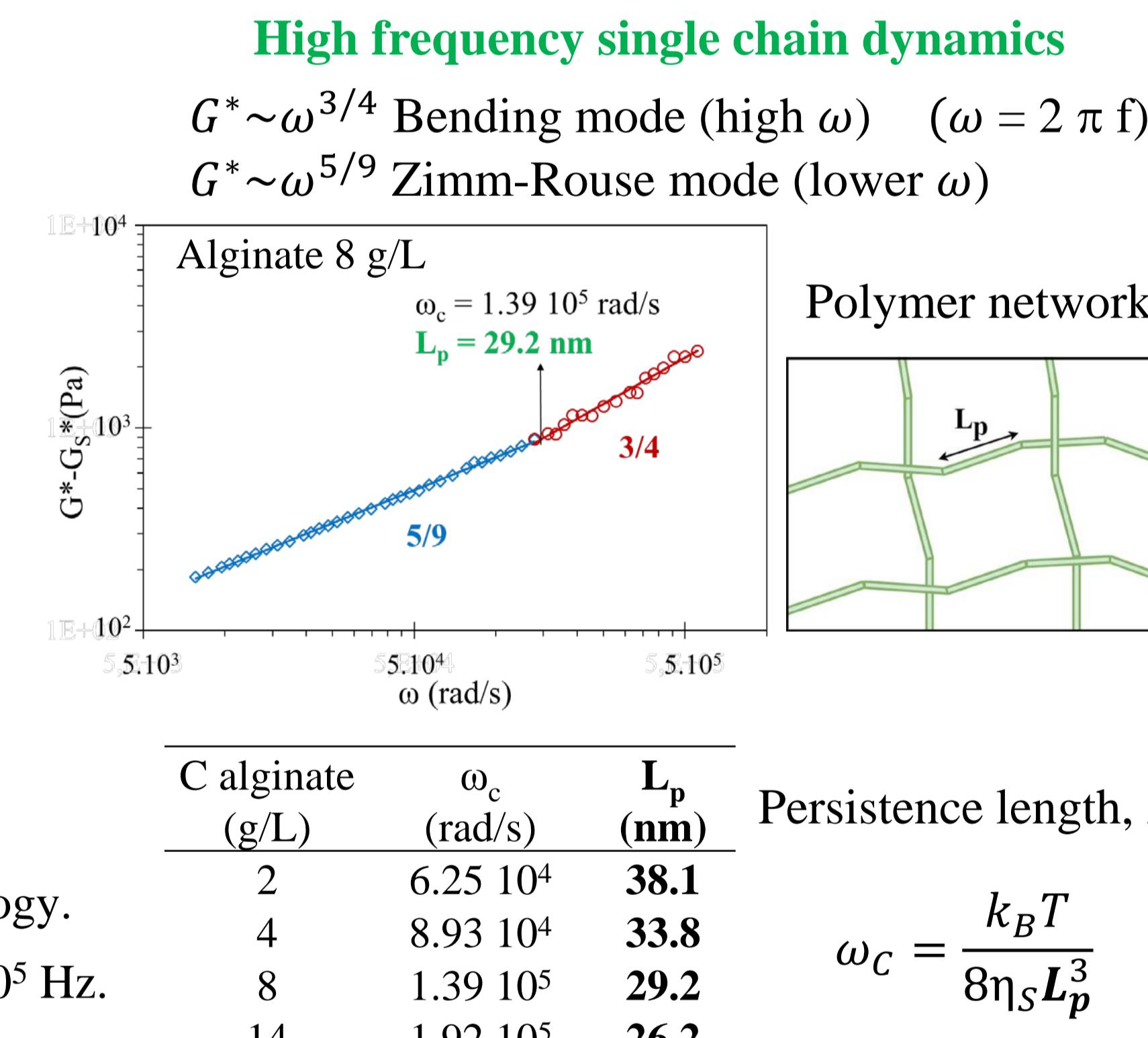

Macro/micro rheology

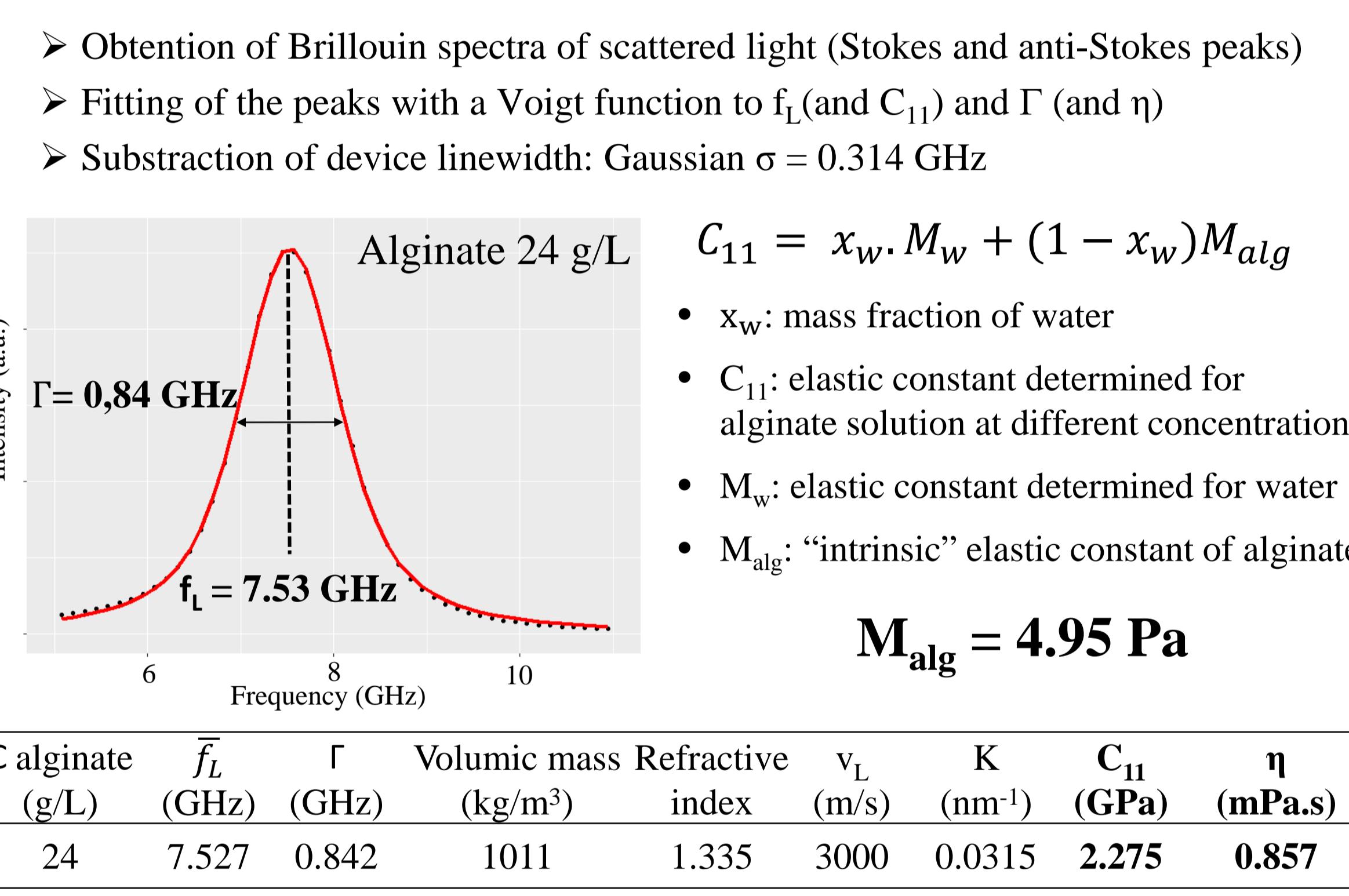


- Good agreement between the results of macro and micro rheology.
- Continuous study of the viscoelastic properties between 10⁻²-10⁵ Hz.

Bending mode and Zimm-Rouse mode (DWS)

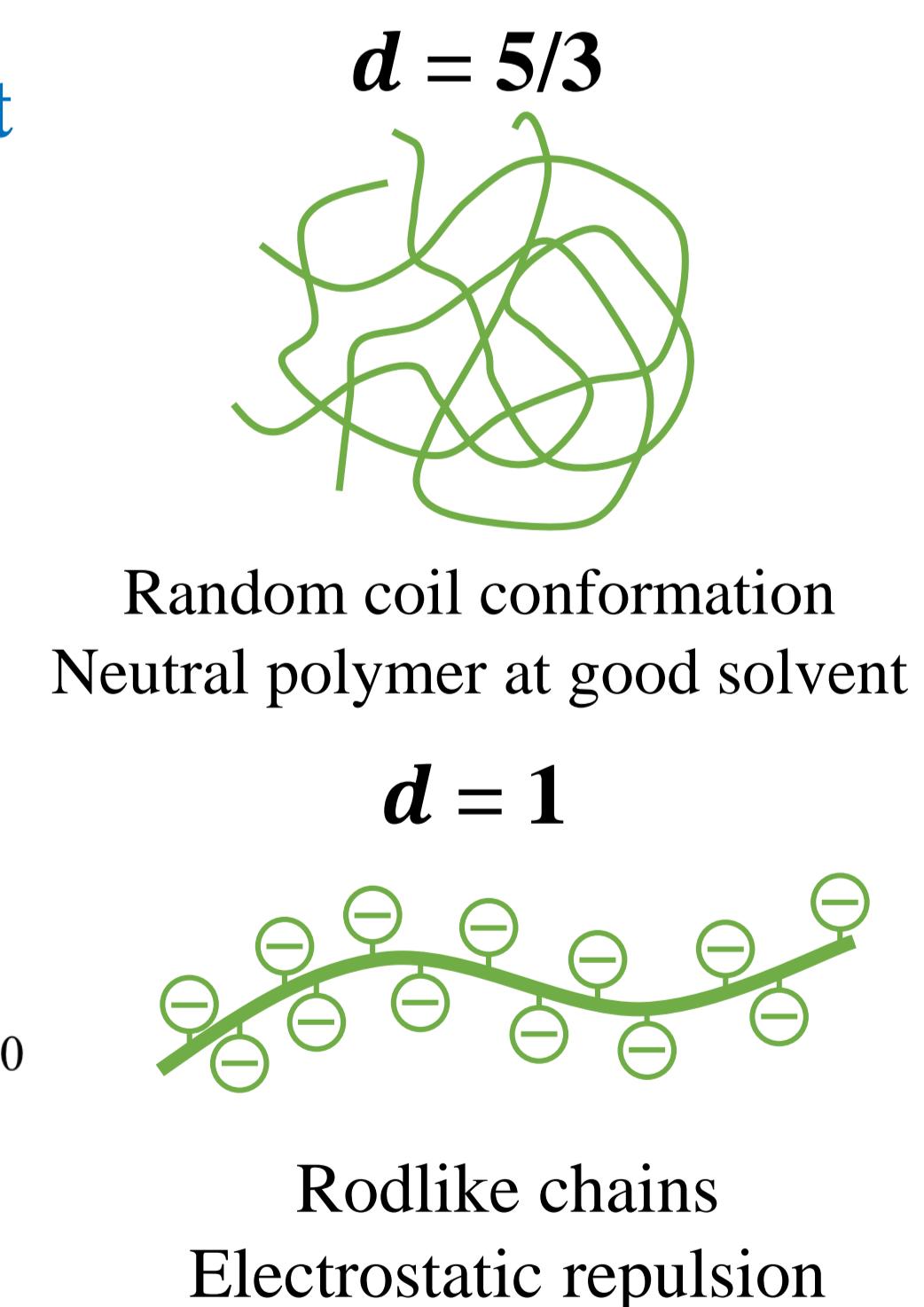
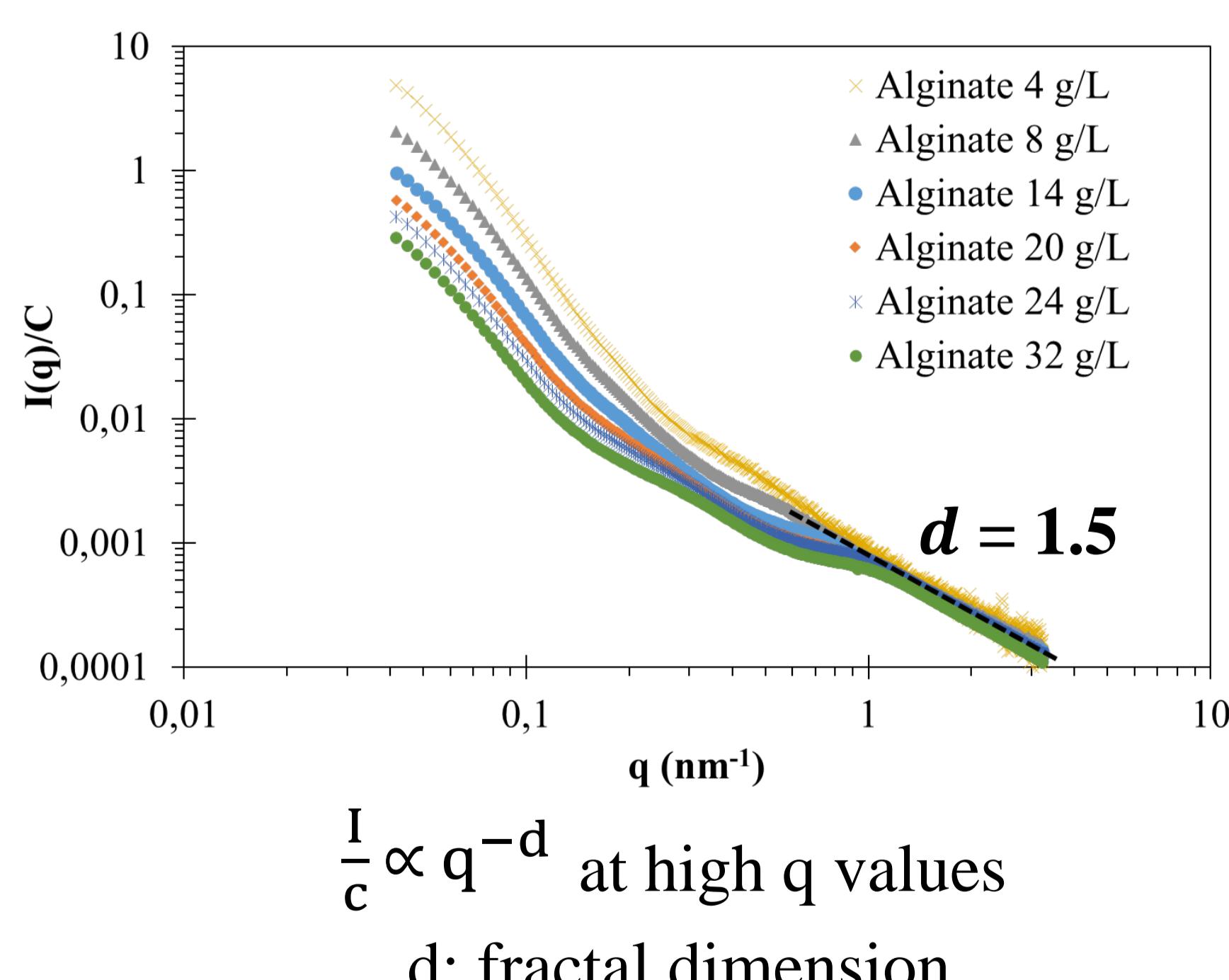


Brillouin spectroscopy (GHz)

Biocompatibility

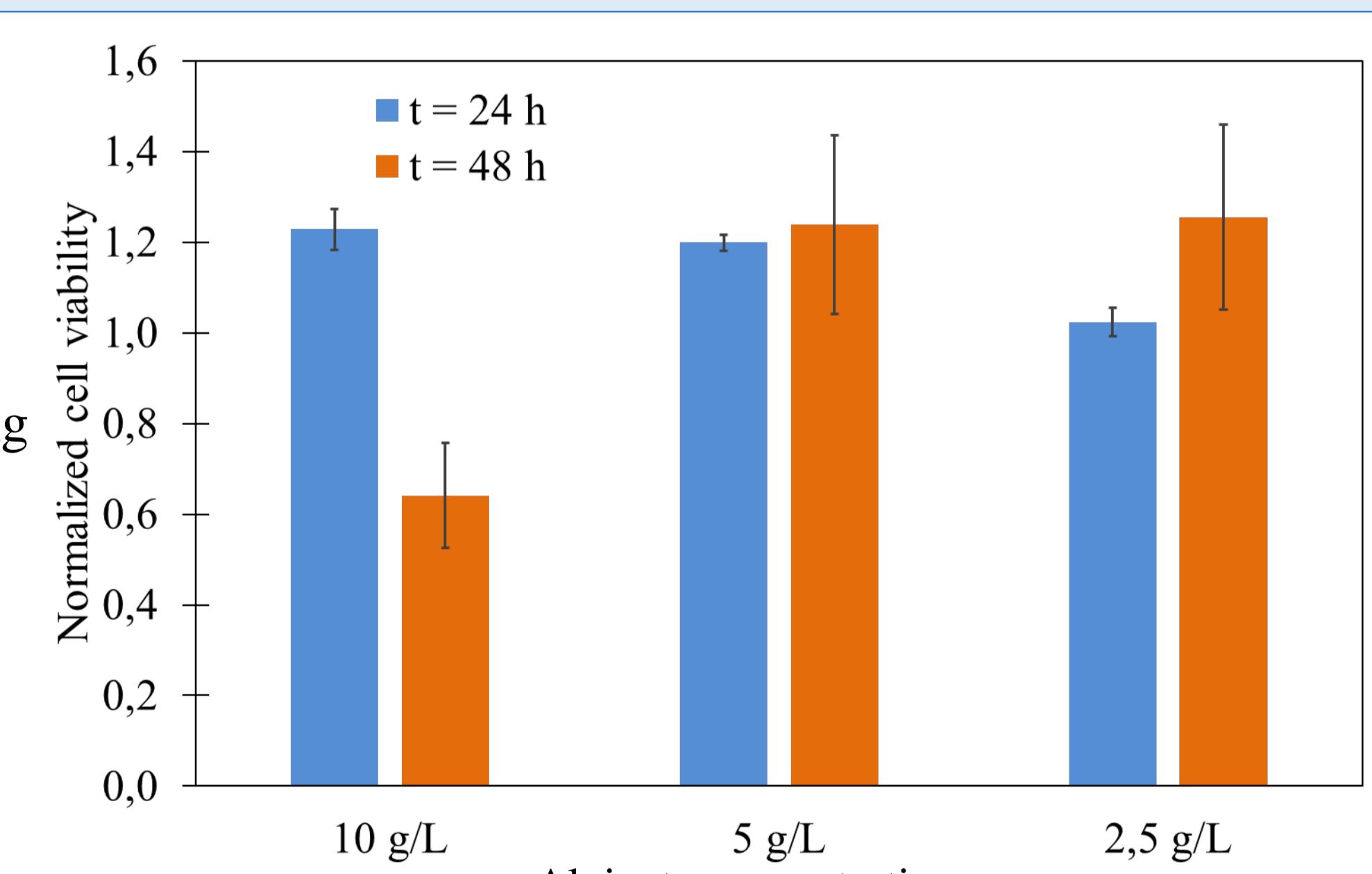
- Type of cells: fibroblast NIH 3T3

- Concentration: 25.000 cells/well

Colorimetric assay for cell viability using Tetrazolium salt (WST-1) reduced by living cells to form colored formazan

Number of metabolically active cells

\propto
Formed formazan dye determined by absorbance



- No cytotoxicity for concentrations of alginate 5 and 2.5 g/L at 24 or 48 h.
- No cytotoxicity for concentrations of alginate of 10 g/L at 24 h.
- Low cytotoxicity for alginate concentration of 10 g/L at 48 h.

Conclusions

- Results obtained by macro-rheology and Diffusing-Wave Spectroscopy (DWS) in a reasonably good agreement to investigate viscoelastic properties of aqueous solutions of sodium alginate over 7 frequency decades (10⁻²-10⁵ Hz) with a transition from viscous to elastic behavior as the frequency is increased.
- The complementary results of Brillouin spectroscopy confirms a viscoelastic behaviour at 10⁹ Hz range dominated by an elastic behavior.
- Estimation of a fractal dimension from SAXS measurements
- Aqueous solutions of sodium alginate present a good biocompatibility as confirmed by cell viability assay
