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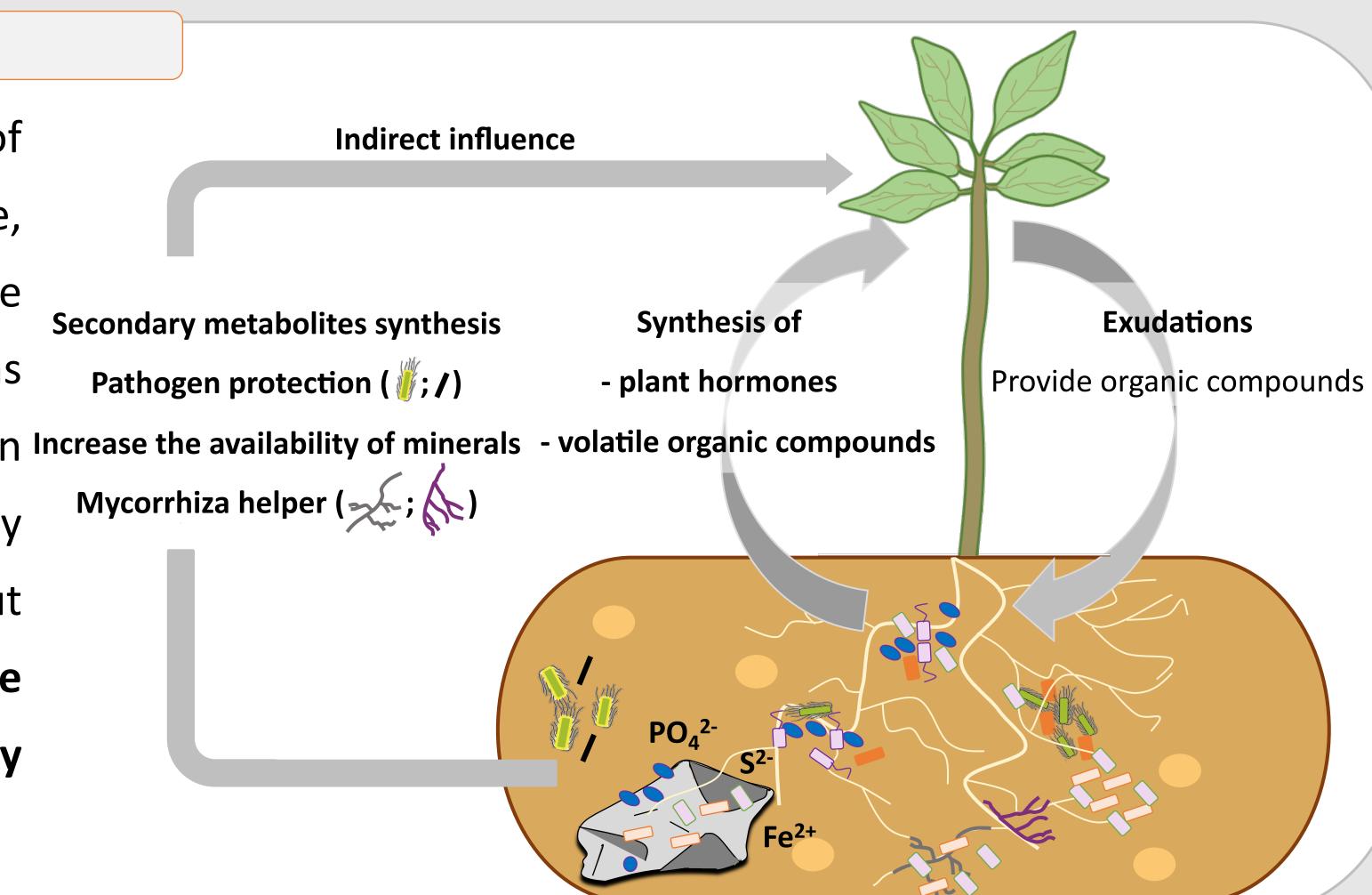
Interplay between lateral gene transfer and rhizosphere functioning

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The rhizosphere and its microbiota

The rhizosphere microbiota contributes to the growth, health of plants and resilience of forest ecosystem [1]. In the rhizosphere, bacteria can influence the plant directly or indirectly and take advantage from **root exudates** in return [2;3]. Until now, it was considered that a bacterial species isolated from a given Increase the availability of minerals environment is a homogenous related cells characterized by identical functions. Yet, bacteria in soil are not single clones, but are structured in populations (sympatric strains of the same species but with different functions) that might act in synergy to achieve a function.

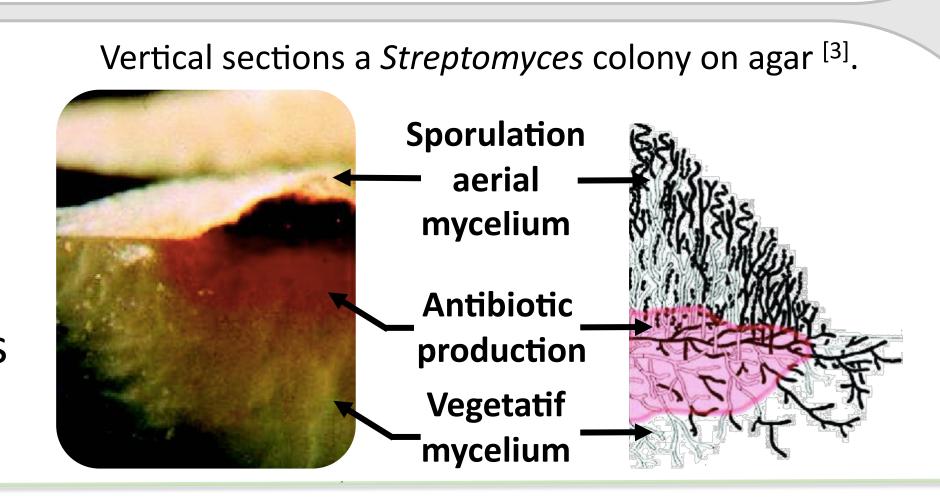

Horizontal gene transfer (HGT) promotes functional diversity.

- **AICE** = *Actinobacteria* integrating conjugative element
- Mobilization of chromosomal locus (/)

Conjugative DNA transfer visible to the mere eye (pocks)

Recipient strain growth delay

Lawn of recipient cells

The transfer of AICE triggers a growth and sporulation delay (pock) in the recipient cell [4].

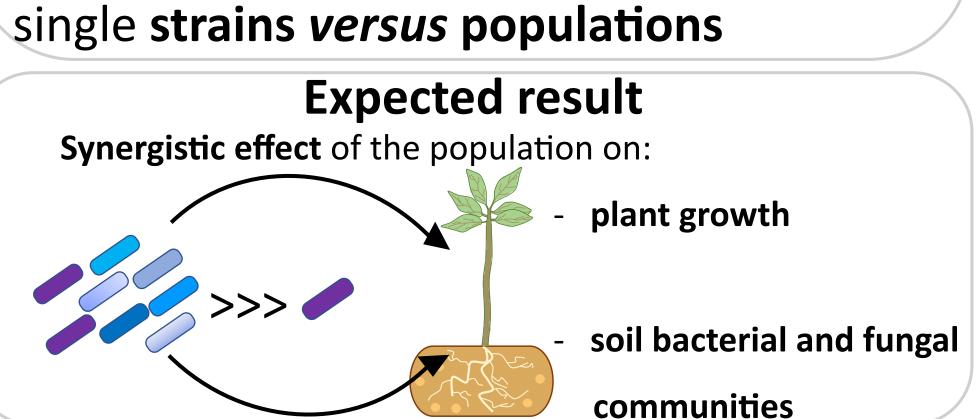
Effect on the HGT in presence of:

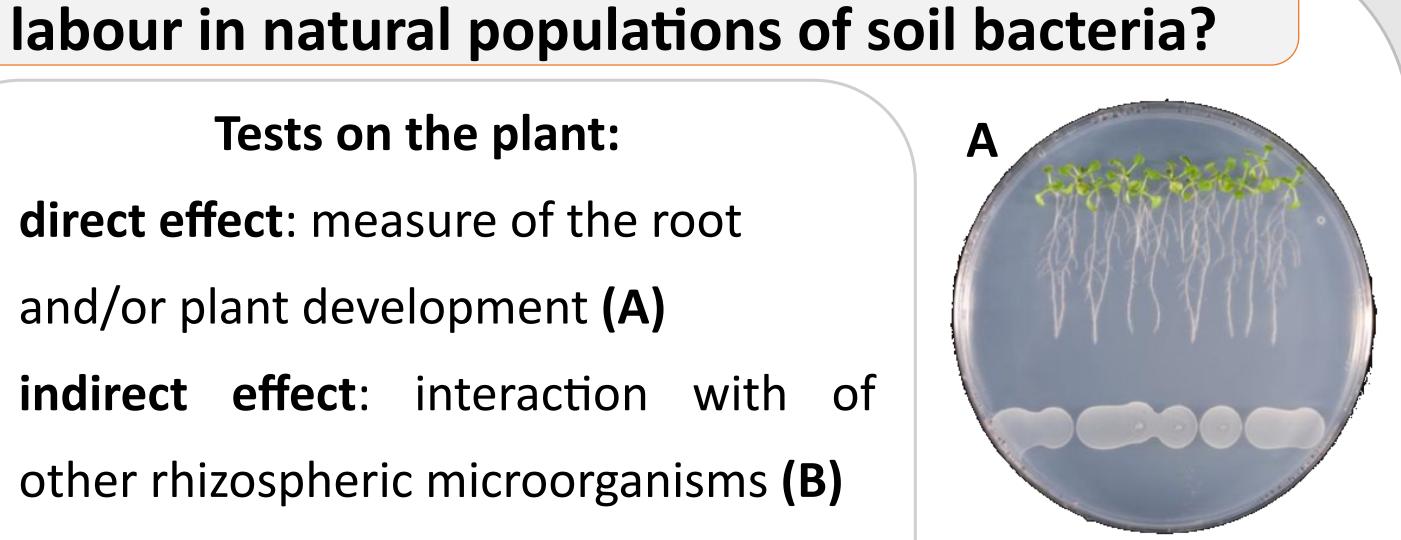
- root system

- specific compounds (trehalose, flavonoids, chitin, cellulose ...)

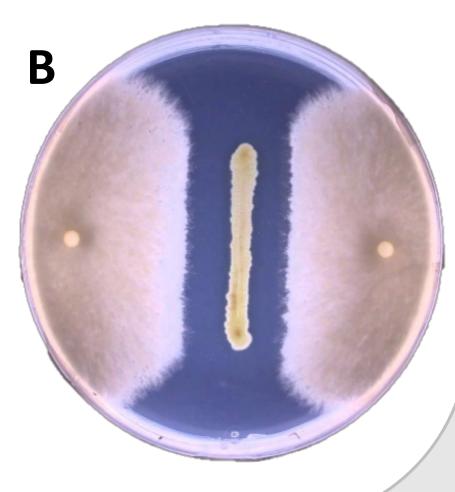
Expected result
