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A GNSS-R MULTIROTOR UAV FOR SOIL MOISTURE DETECTION AND ALTIMETRY



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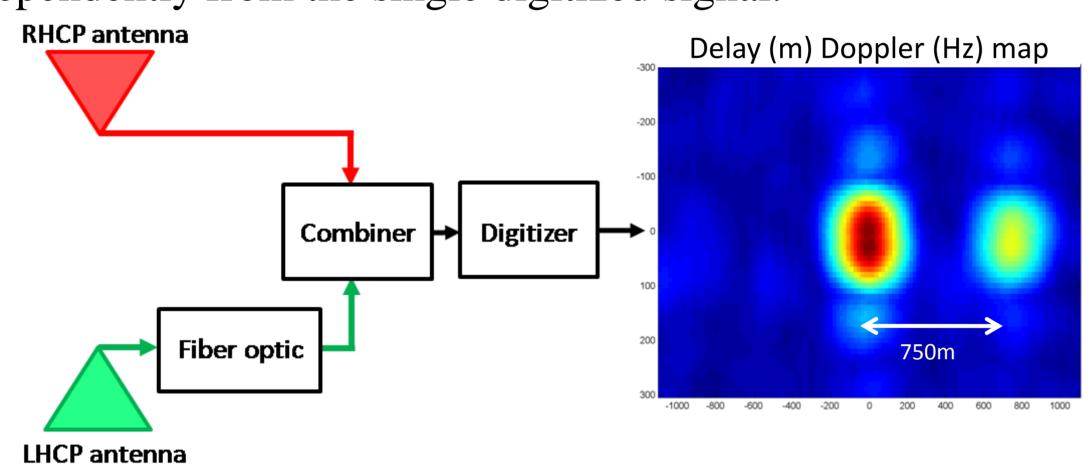
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Context and objectives

GNSS-Reflectometry studies in the framework of the MARCO (Marine Research at Côte d'Opale) project focus on techniques for inundation monitoring. In this context, it is important to fastly reach the area of interest where the soil moisture content [1] and the water level (e.g. of rivers and lakes) [2] shall be monitored. A GNSS-R setup onboard an Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) is expected to meet all these requirements. A GNSS-R setup of reduced size and weight has been developed for this application, allowing synchronously digitizing GNSS signals from two antennas on a single mono-channel bitgrabber.

GNSS-R setup principle

The GNSS-Reflectometer consists of an up-looking right hand (RHCP) and a down-looking left hand (LHCP) antenna, a light-weight one channel GNSS digitizer and a 750 meters fiber optic coil. The coil delays the LHCP antenna signal before it is combined with the RHCP antenna signal, effectively separating the two signals in the time delay domain so both can be analyzed independently from the single digitized signal.

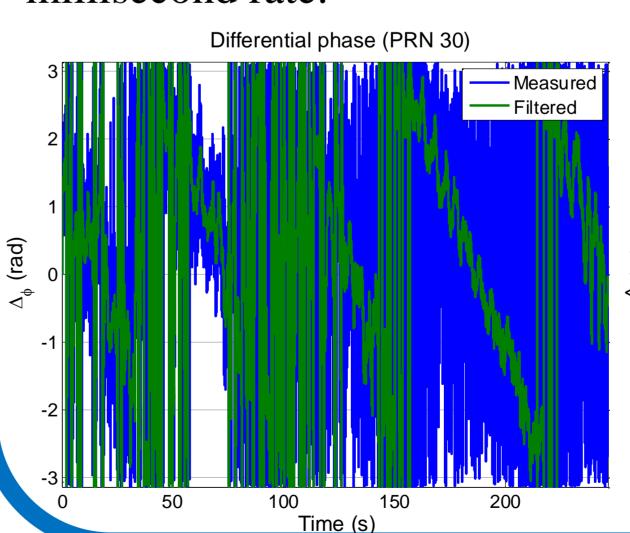
- o Added payload up to 3kg

- Multi-rotor UAVs allow for high maneuverability

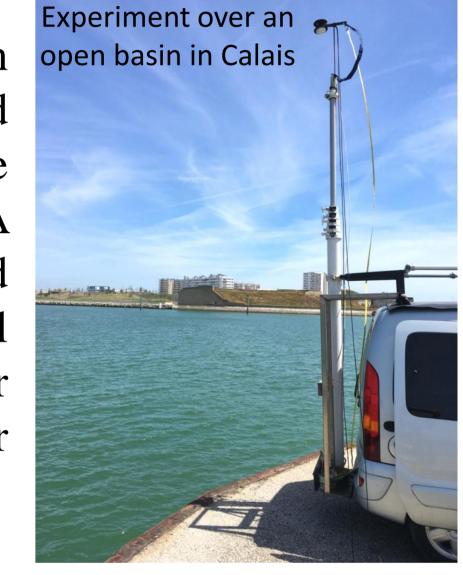


Preliminary results

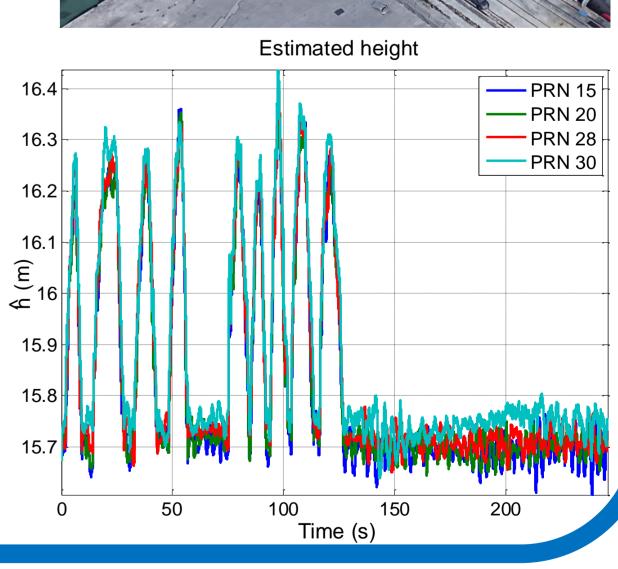
Several experiments have been realized in order to assess and calibrate the GNSS-R setup prototype before its use onboard the UAV. A number of these experiments focused on amplitude estimation for soil moisture contents study [1]. Other experiments were realized over water and ground for phase altimetry.

A circular filter [3] was used in order to smooth the differential phase observations. A phase ambiguity technique was developed in order to provide absolute height estimates at a millisecond rate.

Conclusion

A GNSS-R multirotor UAV is being developed for inundation monitoring applications. A specific GNSS-R setup and the associated signal processing techniques have been developed and successfully tested through ground experiments with moving platforms. The project currently deals with compatibility issues between the GNSS-R setup and the UAV during flight.

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
