



# Simultaneous H/D/T and <sup>3</sup>He/<sup>4</sup>He absolute concentration measurements

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## Motivation

- > Optical Penning gauge is almost universally used for the measurement of  $H_2/D_2/T_2$  fuel isotopic composition [1] and He/D<sub>2</sub> concentration [2] in the neutralized particle exhaust of fusion devices.
- > An Optical Penning detection system has already been used in JET on

## 2. Spectroscopic analysis of emission from the Optical Penning Gauge

Fibers from the Penning Gauge are connected to a high resolution spectrometer to measure isotope ratios and a low resolution survey instrument aimed at concentration measurements from line ratios.

## High resolution spectrometer

> H and D well separated. D and T resolved, but will require fitting of the hotter molecular component.

we assume that for mixtures this conversion still holds, or at least that the intensity ratios are conserved. A calibration using gas mixtures, is planned to be carried out in the future.

The helium concentration is calculated as if the gas in the Penning gauge and baratron would be fully ionised, i.e.  $c_{He} = n_{He}/n_e = p_{He}/2(p_{He} + p_{H2+D2+T2})$ .

<u>Right</u>: D I (top) and He I (bottom) line intensities as function of pressure measured on a nearby baratron. The black data points come from stable phases of JET discharges, the blue helium data points come from gas injected into the torus. The fit only considers the linear phase as we have not operated helium discharges at high enough subdivertor pressure to see the roll over.

### 4. Utilisation limit and recommendation

- <sup>3</sup>He concentrations down to 0.1% have been detected, consistent with ITER study of Ref. [3] for He/D<sub>2</sub> detection with  $\lambda$ -resolved OPG
- <sup>4</sup>He detection limit depends on presence of neon. For JET-ILW, charge exchange spectroscopy (CXS) requires the use of neon (Ne) injection.
- > The Ne I: 6678.28Å emission line is very close to the <sup>4</sup>He I: 6678.152Å line ( $\Delta\lambda = 0.128$ Å  $\rightarrow$  unresolved even with the hi-res spectrometer ! ).

 $\succ$  Overlaying two pulses with <sup>3</sup>He and <sup>4</sup>He injection shows that the isotopic shift (0.5 Å) can be resolved. > Detection limit of <sup>4</sup>He dependent on presence of neon (see Section 4) and intensity. Detection limit of <sup>3</sup>He is only signal limited.

## 3. Measurement during 2019 JET <sup>3</sup>He experiment

The first absolute measurements of the <sup>3</sup>He partial pressure were performed during the JET 2019 and 2020 campaign in mixed D/<sup>3</sup>He plasmas with the three-ion scheme ICRH experiments.



- > Long-term, one can extend the spectral range to include the He I line at 7065.190Å, which is free of Ne I 7059.108Å line interference
- Total pressure needs to be less than 5E-1Pa to avoid non-linear behavior of spectroscopic signals from the Penning plasma source.

## Conclusion

The present arrangement on JET, prepared to extend into DT operation, allows to simultaneously measure the hydrogen and the He isotopes, thus getting maximum measurement capability during the valuable plasma pulses of the DTE2 campaign. This is the first known use of the Optical Penning technique for such simultaneous measurement.

 $\succ$  This method will enable scenarios with combined H/D/T & <sup>3</sup>He/<sup>4</sup>He in JET DTE2 and will pave the way for ITER on this same type of ICRF-heated scenarios



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
