### Studies of <sup>123</sup>Ag $\beta$ -decay at ALTO

Abstract The neutron rich <sup>123</sup>Ag nucleus was pop-31 1 ulated via induced photofission of  $\mathrm{UC}_x$  at the ALTO  $_{^{32}}$ 2 ISOL facility. Its  $\beta$ -decay properties were studied by  $_{33}$ 3 means of detecting  $\beta$ -delayed  $\gamma$  and neutron activities. <sup>34</sup> Δ The measured half-life  $T_{1/2} = 0.350(20)$  s agreed with  $_{35}$ 5 the earlier data; the  $\beta$ -delayed neutron emission branch-  $_{36}$ 6 ing  $P_{1n} = 1.01(24)\%$  was reestablished using  $\gamma$  and neu-37 7 tron counting. 8 38

#### 11 **1 Introduction**

The delayed neutron emission probability  $(P_n)$  and the <sup>46</sup> 12 half-life are the two key ingredients of  $\beta$ -decay that de-47 13 pend on the integrated quantities of the nuclear struc-<sup>48</sup> 14 ture. The half-life provides information on an integrated  $^{49}$ 15 total strength function, whereas  $P_n$  value probes the 50 16 part of the strength function above the neutron sepa-<sup>51</sup> 17 ration energy  $(S_n)$ . Therefore, measurements of these <sup>52</sup> 18 values in experiments often provides the first insight 53 19 into the nuclear structure. Although the mechanism of <sup>54</sup> 20  $\beta$ -decay of nuclei is in principle understood, develop-<sup>55</sup> 21 ment of a satisfactory description coherent with new 56 22 data sets for neutron-rich species is highly required. A 57 23 significant experimental effort is currently underway to 58 24 reveal the role of neutron excess in the shell evolution <sup>59</sup> 25 in these regions [1]. The current experimental study of <sup>60</sup> 26  $\beta$ -delayed (multi) neutron emission in the regions of the <sup>61</sup> 27 chart of nuclides, which are important from the astro-62 28 physical point of view, is facing a new era: pure beams 63 29 of neutron-rich nuclei of hard-to-reach mass regions of <sup>64</sup> 30

<sup>78</sup>Ni and <sup>132</sup>Sn, have become available at radioactive ion beam facilities [2].

Reliable knowledge of the nuclear physics properties for the extremely neutron-rich nuclei along the rprocess path are needed to interpret the observational data in the framework of proposed astrophysical models [3–5]. As the neutron excess increases near the drip line, we expect the properties of the giant resonances and of the low-lying collective states to be dramatically affected at extreme N/Z ratios [6]. The formation of a neutron-skin may introduce a new type of collective mode in neutron-rich nuclei corresponding to an out-ofphase vibration of the skin against the neutron-proton inert core [7]. The concentration of the electric dipole (E1) strength around the particle separation energy is commonly called the pygmy dipole resonance (PDR). The occurrence of non-negligible low-lying E1-strength can influence the radiative neutron capture cross section by orders of magnitude and, consequently, also the rate of the astrophysical r-process nucleosynthesis (see details in ref. [8]). In case of the neutron-rich nuclei in the vicinity of  $A \approx 130$ , the E1 strength could be significantly more important than in nuclei close to the valley of  $\beta$ -stability.

In this context, the  $\beta$ -decay properties of heavy Ag and Cd isotopes are ideal candidates for such studies. Particularly, in very neutron-rich Ag nuclei the total energy released through beta-decay,  $Q_{\beta}$ , can go beyond 10 MeV (in case of <sup>130</sup>Ag, for example,  $Q_{\beta} =$ 15.42(30) MeV [9]) and subsequently even deeply bound neutrons can decay into protons. When the Cd daughter nucleus is produced in a high-energy configuration above the neutron separation energy  $(S_n)$ , it usually de-excites through the neutron emission. On the other hand, the rearrangement of nuclear matter could proceed through collective modes of de-excitation in the

daughter isotope, involving also the most superficial nu-120 67 cleons. Namely, microscopic calculations by refs. [10,121 68 11] showed that the Gamow-Teller (GT) transitions of 122 69 deeply-bound neutrons can trigger coherent dipolar os-123 70 cillations (like the PDR), which in turn engender a sig-124 71 nificant emission of E1  $\gamma$ -radiation. It is worth men-125 72 tioning that the inclusion of the coupling terms with<sub>126</sub> 73 more complex configurations than 1p - 1h ones sub-127 74 stantially enriches the low-energy spectrum of nuclei in<sub>128</sub> 75 the  $A \approx 130$  mass range, see, e.g., ref. [12]. 76 129

The r-process abundance region around  $A \approx 110^{130}$ 77 prior to the A = 130 peak, is one of the regions of<sup>131</sup> 78 intense interest, where the astrophysical models under-132 79 estimate the abundances by an order of magnitude or<sup>133</sup> 80 more [13]. The newly measured  $P_n$  values in this re-<sup>134</sup> 81 gion will directly affect the final r-process abundance<sup>135</sup> 82 pattern between the abundance "trough" the region<sup>136</sup> 83 (A = 114 - 120) and the onset  $(A \approx 123)$  of the  $A = 130^{137}$ 84 138 peak region. 85

The  $\beta\text{-delayed}$  neutron emission of  $^{123}\mathrm{Ag}$  has been  $^{^{139}}$ 86 reported previously from the OSIRIS mass-separator  $in^{140}$ 87 refs. [14, 15]. The mass separated heavy fission products<sup>141</sup> 88 have been studied using a neutron counter comprised of  $^{^{142}}$ 89 30 <sup>3</sup>He tubes. The weak neutron activities seen at the  $^{\rm 143}$ 90  $122 \ {\rm and} \ 123 \ {\rm masses}$  were assigned to the silver isotopes.  $^{144}$ 91 Consequently, due to 390(30) ms half-life measured for<sup>145</sup> 92 the 123 mass the neutron activity (still weak) was as-93 signed to decay of  $^{123}$ Ag. Later at the TRISTAN on-line<sub>146</sub> 94 isotope separator facility at Brookhaven National Labo-95 ratory, the half-lifes and  $P_n$  values have been measured<sup>147</sup> 96 for <sup>121–124</sup>Ag [16]. In a single set of experiments, us-148 97 ing mass-separated fission fragments, the neutron and<sub>149</sub> 98  $\beta$  growth (decay) curves were measured simultaneously<sub>150</sub> 99 at masses 120-124 and at 127. The neutron decay curve<sub>151</sub> 100 resulted in a 300(10) ms half-life which was assigned to<sub>152</sub> 101 decay of <sup>123</sup>Ag. The  $P_n$  value of 0.55(9)% was deter-153 102 mined as a ratio of the neutron to  $\beta$  saturation activi-154 103 ties, corrected by the corresponding efficiencies. Neu-155 104 trons were straight detected by 40 <sup>3</sup>He proportional<sub>156</sub> 105 tubes embedded in polyethylene. The more recent mea-157 106 surements of the  $\beta$ -delayed neutron emission branching<sub>158</sub> 107 for neutron-rich Ag isotopes, populated in a fragmen-159 108 tation reaction, have been done at the National Su-160 109 perconducting Cyclotron Laboratory at Michigan State<sub>161</sub> 110 University [17]. The yielded half-life of 272(24) ms was<sub>162</sub> 111 derived using time difference between the ion implan-163 112 tation and the correlated  $\beta$ -decay. The half-life was<sub>164</sub> 113 slightly shorter than reported previously [15,16]. The165 114  $P_n$  value was determined as 1.0(5)% based on the num-166 115 ber of  $\beta$ -neutron coincidence events divided by the num-167 116 ber of  $\beta$  decays following the implantation of <sup>123</sup>Ag<sub>168</sub> 117 heavy ions. Neutrons were detected by the NERO array<sub>169</sub> 118 consisting of 60  $^{3}$ He and BF<sub>3</sub> counters. 170 119

Regardless the numerous studies the <sup>123</sup>Cd level scheme populated in the decay of <sup>123</sup>Ag was only reported in the study performed at the Buenos Aires Tandem accelerator facility [18]. The <sup>123</sup>Ag nuclei was produced as a mass-separated fission product from the fast-neutron fission of natural U. Then  $\gamma$ -spectrometry measurements were performed using two Ge(HP) detectors. Spins and parities for the most important states were suggested upon log(ft) values obtained from measured  $\gamma$ -ray transition intensities.

In the work presented here the neutron-rich  $^{123}Ag$ nucleus was revisited to study for the first time its  $\beta$ decay by simultaneous detection of  $\beta$ -delayed neutronand  $\gamma$  activities. The heavy Ag nuclei were populated using induced photofission of uranium at the ALTO ISOL facility [19,20] and measured at the BEDO  $\beta$ decay tape station [21] equipped with the TETRA neutron detector containing 80 proportional counters of <sup>3</sup>He [22]. Up to now at ALTO the studies were concentrated in the region of heavy Ga nuclei crossing the N = 50 neutron closed shell: competition of the neutron emission process with the emission of high energy  $\gamma$ -rays [10]; population in  $\beta$ -decay resonance lowenergy structures [23]. In the present paper we report the first measurement of  $\beta$ -delayed neutron precursor in the <sup>132</sup>Sn region performed at ALTO.

#### 2 Experimental details

Neutron-rich isotopes were produced via induced photofission at ISOL facility ALTO [19,20]. A 50 MeV, ~ 7  $\mu$ A electron beam was applied to a UC<sub>x</sub> production target heated up to 2000 °C to obtain low energetic beams (~30 keV) of radioactive isotopes. Photofission products were extracted from the target with a hot plasma universal ion source FEBIAD (Forced Electron Beam Induced Arc Discharge) [24] with 1+ charge state and delivered to the mass separator PARRNe. The resolution (m/ $\delta$ m  $\approx$  1500) was high enough to provide isobaric selection of A = 123. The members of the isobaric chain such as Pd and Rh were refractory metals whose efficiency to release from the source was very low.

The modular detection system equipped with the BEDO tape station [21] was installed behind the mass separator PARRNe and was operated in the neutron detection configuration. It consisted of highly efficient neutron detector TETRA [22]; a  $\sim 4\pi \beta$  scintillator and a High-Purity coaxial Germanium  $\gamma$ -ray detector (EUROGAM-1 type [25]). Mass-separated beams were collected onto an Al-coated Mylar movable tape at the geometrical centre of the array. TETRA is one of the long-neutron counters constructed at JINR Dubna originally for spontaneous fission studies [26] but modified to allow  $\beta$ 

delayed neutron measurements. TETRA response to 171 the  $\beta$ -delayed neutron is fully understood by means of 172 MCNP simulations [27] and by the reference measure-173 ments of  $\beta$ -decay of heavy <sup>96,97</sup>Rb isotopes [28]. The 174 neutron efficiency  $\epsilon_n = 53(2)$  % was measured with a 175  $^{252}\mathrm{Cf}$  source. The Ge(HP) detector was calibrated us-176 ing standard sources of  $^{60}$ Co and  $^{152}$ Eu. The absolute 177 efficiency measured for 1.3 MeV  $\gamma$ -rays was  $\epsilon_{\gamma} \sim 0.6$  %. 178 The efficiency of the  $\beta$  detector  $\epsilon_{\beta} = 37(4)\%$  was de-179 termined using ratios of area under peaks for identified 180 transitions in  $\beta\text{-decay}$  daughters in the direct  $\gamma$  and  $\beta$ 181 gated  $\gamma$ -spectra using the coincidence method described 182 in ref. [22, 28]. 183

The measurement cycle was divided into three stages. 184 The data was collected for  $T_{meas} = T_{beam} + T_{decay}$ : 185 after the accumulation of a source during  $T_{beam}$ , the 186 beam was deviated to allow counting the decay of the 187 source for  $T_{decay}$ . At the third stage the data acquisi-188 tion system was stopped and the tape was rewound for 189 2 m to transport the source, accumulated on the tape, 190 outside the detection system. Adjusting the  $T_{beam}$  and 191  $T_{decay}$  parameters, see Table 1, it was possible to favour 192 detection of decay radioactivity from <sup>123</sup>Ag. Since the 193 half-life of <sup>123</sup>Ag is in a hundred ms range, in the of-194 fline analysing procedure for every cycle, only the data 195 collected within  $\tau_{meas} = \tau_{data} + \tau_{bg}$ , defined as in Fig. 1 196 was sorted. The  $\gamma$ -ray spectra incremented within  $\tau_{data}$ 197 and  $\tau_{bg}$  were denoted as  $\mathbf{S}_{data}$  and  $\mathbf{S}_{bg}$  correspondingly. 198 Figure 2 (top), displays the  $\beta$  gated  $\gamma$ -spectrum 199  $(\mathbf{S}_{data}^{\beta})$  which reveals transitions characterising  $\beta$ -decay 200 of the A = 123 isobaric multiplet (Ag, Cd, In). Whereas 201 the background spectra  $S_{bg}^{\beta}$ , Fig. 2 (middle), shows tran-202 sitions only in the longer lived In and Sn. The subtrac-203 tion of both spectra resulted in  $S^{\beta}_{sub}$  spectrum plotted in 204 Fig. 2 (bottom). In this spectrum transitions in  $^{123}$ Cd 205 were favoured to be on the positive part of the scale 206 whereas the  $\gamma$ -ray transitions in the longer-lived daugh-207 ters are "reversed" to the negative part. This method 208 allowed us to clearly observe five transitions previously 209 attributed to <sup>123</sup>Cd [18]. The relative intensities mea-210 sured in both  $S^{\beta}_{data}$  and  $S^{\beta}_{sub}$  are in agreement with the ones quoted in ref. [18], see Table 2. The high pro-211 212 duction rates of Cd and In isotopes together with a 213 small  $P_{1n}$  value for <sup>123</sup>Ag as well as large neutron coin-214 cidence window (100  $\mu$ s due to the neutron moderation)<sup>225</sup> 215 resulted in a fact that the neutron tag did not lead to 227216 further purification of the recorded  $\gamma$ -ray spectra. 217

#### <sup>218</sup> 3 $P_{1n}$ extraction procedure

<sup>219</sup> The  $P_{1n}$  value of a neutron precursor (A, Z) is the ra-<sup>232</sup> <sup>220</sup> tio of the number of decays to the  $\beta$ -delayed neutron<sup>233</sup> <sup>221</sup> daughter (N<sub> $\beta$ dn</sub>) to the total number of  $\beta$ -decays of the<sup>234</sup>

precursor  $(N_{total})$ . The experimental methods to derive  $P_{1n}$  differ in a way how  $N_{\beta dn}$  and  $N_{total}$  are inferred. In the present measurements  $N_{\beta dn}$  was assumed to be equal to the number of neutrons detected by TETRA corrected by the background events and the neutron efficiency  $\epsilon_n$ . The integrated neutron activity curve accumulated over 63 cycles for the A = 123 mass separator settings is presented in Fig. 3. The neutron background was of the magnitude of  $\approx 20$  n/s thanks to the boron polyethylene shield of TETRA and to the additional separator shielding (see ref. [22]). Due to a negative  $Q_{\beta n}$  window for other members of the A = 123 isobaric multiplet the recorded neutron activity was solely at-

tributed to the Ag<sup>123</sup>  $\xrightarrow{\beta-n}$ Cd<sup>122</sup> decay or background<sub>268</sub> activity. The half-life found fitting the neutron activity<sub>269</sub> curve resulted in 0.350(20) s.

The total number of <sup>123</sup>Ag decays (N<sub>total</sub>) was de-271 rived using the observed  $\gamma$ -ray transitions, listed in Ta-272 ble. 2, and known, from ref. [18], absolute intensities273 of  $\beta$ -decay to the <sup>123</sup>Cd excited states. Thus for a *i-th*<sub>274</sub>

 $\gamma$ -ray transition in <sup>123</sup>Cd characterized by the I<sup>i</sup><sub> $\beta$ </sub> transition probability, the p<sup>i</sup><sub>1n</sub> can be found as:

where  $A_{\gamma}^{i}$  is the number of counts under the corresponding peak in the  $S_{data}^{\beta}$  ( $S_{sub}^{\beta}$ ) spectra,  $\epsilon_{n}$ ,  $\epsilon_{\beta}$  and  $\epsilon_{\gamma i}$  are efficiencies of neutron,  $\beta$  and  $\gamma$  (for *i*-th transition) detection respectively and  $T_{\gamma}^{dead}$  is the dead time of the  $\gamma$  electronic channel. The dead time was estimated by monitoring the occupation fraction of the channel. The average dead time over  $\tau_{meas}$  was  $T_{\gamma}^{dead} = 34(6)\%$ . The adopted  $P_{1n}$  value then was calculated as the weighted average of  $p_{1n}^{i}$  extracted for different transitions.

This procedure was applied twice to derive the  $P_{1n}$ value using  $S^{\beta}_{data}$  and  $S^{\beta}_{sub}$  spectra. In case of  $S^{\beta}_{data}$  the  $N_{\beta dn}$  was measured as the number of neutrons detected within  $\tau_{data}$  and corrected for the neutron background. In case of  $S^{\beta}_{sub}$  the  $N_{\beta dn}$  was defined as the difference between the number of neutrons detected within  $\tau_{data}$  and  $\tau_{bg}$ . The 1.01(24) % and 1.03(36) % values for  $P_{1n}$ , obtained using  $S^{\beta}_{data}$  and  $S^{\beta}_{sub}$  spectra respectively, are consistent within the error bars. The adopted values  $P_{1n} = 1.01(24)$  % (as the most precise) and  $T_{1/2} = 0.350(20)$  ms are in good agreement with the results of different experiments cited in Table 4.

After determining  $P_{1n}$  and  $T_{1/2}$  the <sup>123</sup>Ag production yield ( $\Phi$ ) was estimated to be  $\approx 7700 \text{ s}^{-1}$  from the equation:

where  $A^{beam}(t)$  and  $A^{decay}(t)$  are the activity of <sup>123</sup>Ag during the collection and decay measurements respectively defined using the Bateman rules:

where  $\lambda$  is the decay constant of <sup>123</sup>Ag.

The production yields of <sup>123</sup>Cd, <sup>123</sup>Cd<sup>*m*</sup> and <sup>123</sup>In, delivered with the beam in the present experiment and reported in Table 3, were estimated by using sets of Bateman equations similar to Eq. 2 and 3, known halflives and the absolute intensities of  $\beta$ -decay to excited states in daughter nuclei cited in the literature [32].

#### 275 4 Conclusions

The paper reports on the first measurement of a de-<sup>328</sup> 276 layed neutron precursor in the neighbourhood of  ${}^{132}Sn^{329}_{_{330}}$ 277 produced at ALTO facility.  $\beta$ -decay of the neutron-rich<sub>331</sub> 278 <sup>123</sup>Ag was investigated using a A = 123 mass-separated<sup>332</sup> 279 beam delivered to the neutron detector TETRA set up<sup>333</sup> 280 at the BEDO tape station. The detector  $\operatorname{arrangement}_{335}^{335}$ 281 allowed simultaneously recording of  $\beta$ -, neutron- and  $\gamma$ -336 282 radiation accompanying the decay of  $^{123}\mathrm{Ag}$  for the first  $^{_{337}}$ 283 time. In addition to the  $^{123}$ Ag ground state, the iso- $^{338}_{339}$ 284 meric and ground states in  $^{123}$ Cd and  $^{123}$ In were  $also_{340}^{339}$ 285 populated by induced uranium photofission. The iden-341 286 tification of the isotopes was reliably performed based<sup>342</sup> 287 on the recorded  $\beta$  gated  $\gamma$ -spectra. Due to the fact that  $^{^{343}}_{_{344}}$ 288 neutron emission was not energetically possible in the<sub>345</sub> 289 members of the A = 123 isobaric multiplet, other than<sup>346</sup> 290 Ag, the observed neutron activity was attributed to the  $^{\scriptscriptstyle 347}$ 291  $\beta$ -n decay of <sup>123</sup>Ag. The half-life measured from the<sub>349</sub> 292 detected neutron activity agreed with values reported<sub>350</sub> 293

from previous experiments. It is worth noting that, in general,  $T_{1/2}$  for <sup>123</sup>Ag obtained by using neutron activity tends to be slightly longer in comparison to  $\beta$  and ion counting techniques. The  $P_{1n}$  value was found as the ratio of detected neutrons (background subtracted, efficiency corrected) to the total number of  $^{123}$ Ag  $\beta$ -decays determined from the  $\gamma$ -rays observed. The adopted  $P_{1n}$ agreed within the error bars with results of another experiments where  $P_{1n}$  was derived directly by  $\beta$ - and neutron- countings. This agreement provided the indirect proof of the accuracy of the  $\beta$ -decay intensities to excited states in <sup>123</sup>Cd daughter. The results prove the ability of TETRA to be an effective tool using massseparated beams extracted using the plasma ion source. In the particular case of this experiment, as the yield of Pd was negligibly small, and due to the fact that Ag was the only neutron precursor on the isobaric chain, the parameters of  $\beta$ -decay could be still properly measured. Similar techniques will be adopted to study decay of heavier Ag and Cd isotopes to be reported in a forthcoming publication.
