The authors regret a writing error in a paragraph of the Methods section (2.4. Freely moving telemetry video-electroencephalography), which we only recently noticed. We recognized that, during the manuscript assembly in 2020/21, we inadvertently included method text from an older document that referenced a discontinued practice.

Current one states:

Animals were anesthetized using a intraperitoneal injection with chloral hydrate and xylazine. Animals were placed on a heating pad during the procedure ensuring a physiological temperature.

Below is the amended text reflecting the correct and routine method

we used. The text should read:

For microelectrode implants, animals were in a sterile environment and deeply anesthetized using an intraperitoneal injection of ketamine/ xylazine (100mg/kg; 10mg/kg) in sterile saline. Buprenorphine (subcutaneous, 0.05 mg/Kg) was used for analgesia and lidocaine for local anesthesia. During surgery, animals were placed on a heating pad, ensuring a physiological temperature and continuously controlling the adequate depth of anesthesia.
