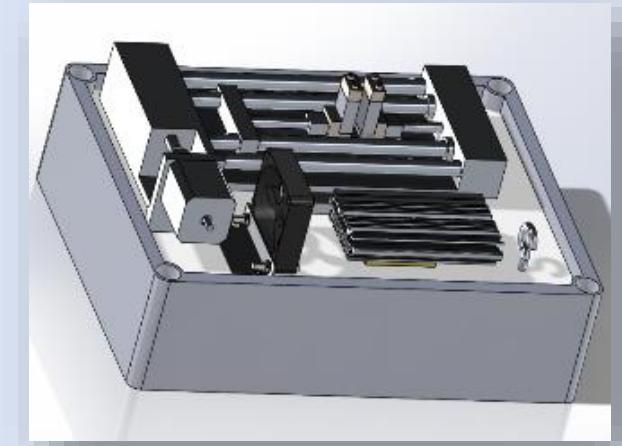

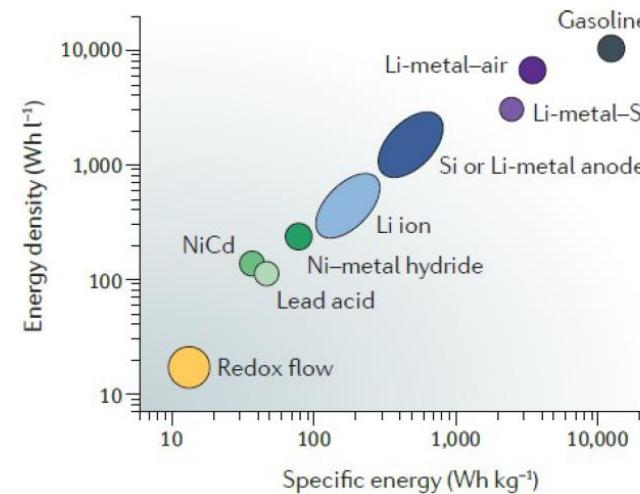

- **Context**

Need to develop high energy density and safe batteries [1]



- **Perspective**

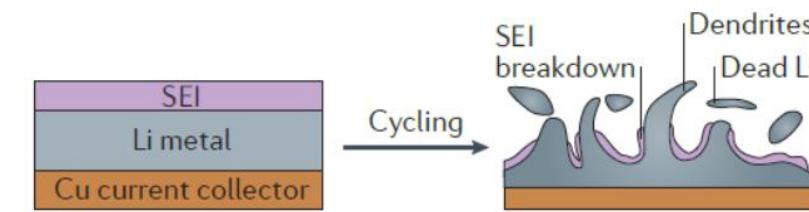
Battery with negative electrode compatible with Li metal



- **Issue**

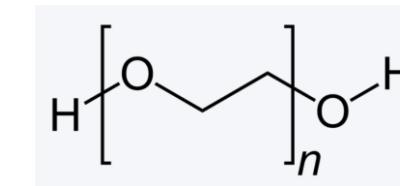
Li metal with conventional liquid electrolytes

- Short-circuit hazard: flammable electrolyte and dendritic growth [1]

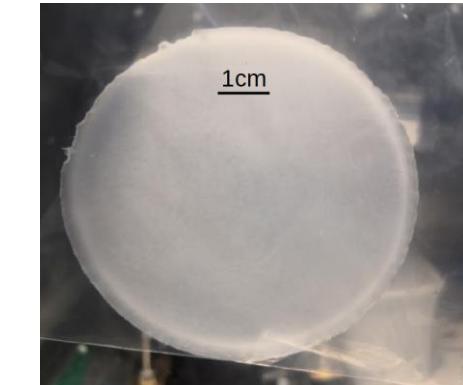


- **Solution**

Replace liquid electrolytes with Solid Polymer Electrolytes (SPE)



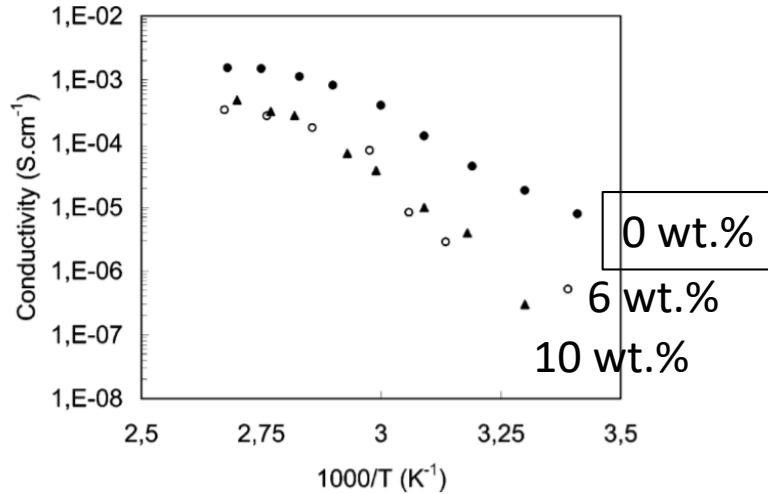
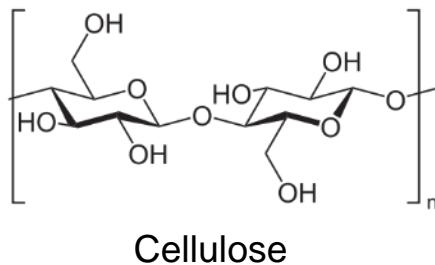
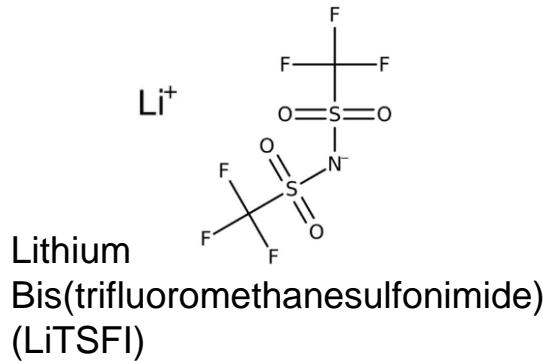
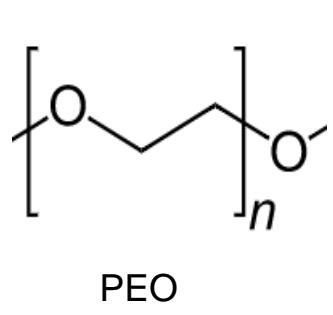

- Addition of nanocharges

For example: Cellulose [1]



- Nanocharge wt.% increase
 $\sigma (\text{S.cm}^{-1})$ decrease



- Nanocharge wt.% increase
Storage tensile modulus E' increase

➤ Main optimum:
 $\sim 2 \times 10^{-4} \text{ S.cm}^{-1}$ at 90°C with 6 wt.% of nanocharges

For example: Cellulose [1]

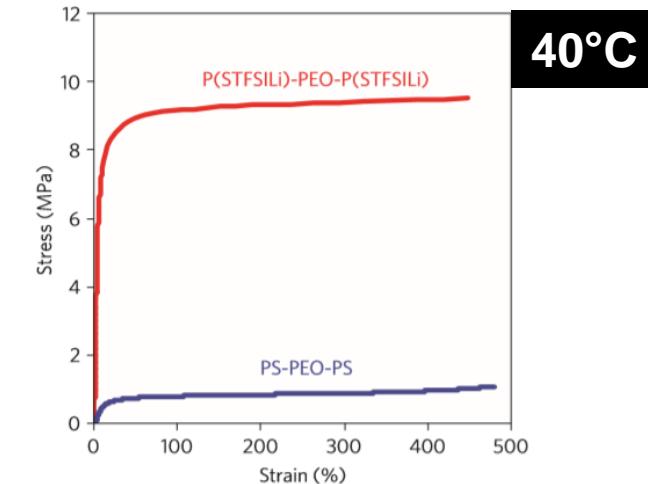
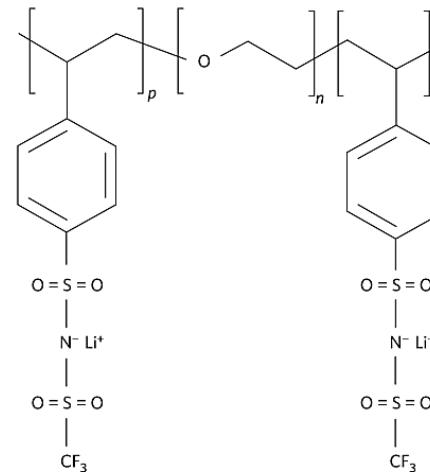
- Cross-linked polymer [2]

- Synthesis of block copolymers

For instance: PS-PEO (Poly(styrene)-PEO) [3]

- Single-ion copolymer [4]

Single-ion conductor triblock
P(STFSILi)-b-PEO-b-P(STFSILi) [4]



Main result:

- 1.3×10^{-5} S/cm at 60°C and $t^+ > 0.92$

Great interest against the dendrite growth and the limited power delivery [4]

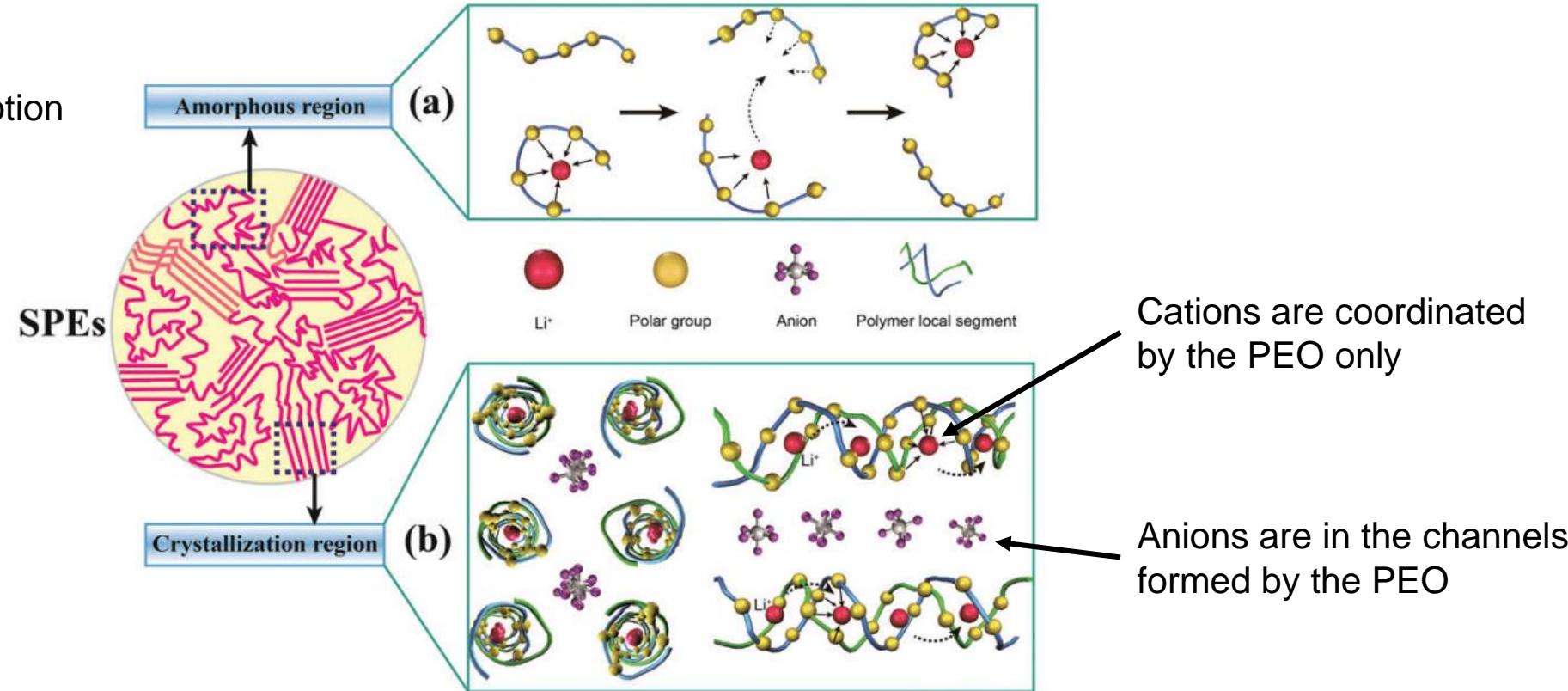

- Different mechanisms in the **amorphous** and **crystallized** phases (ordered phase) [1]

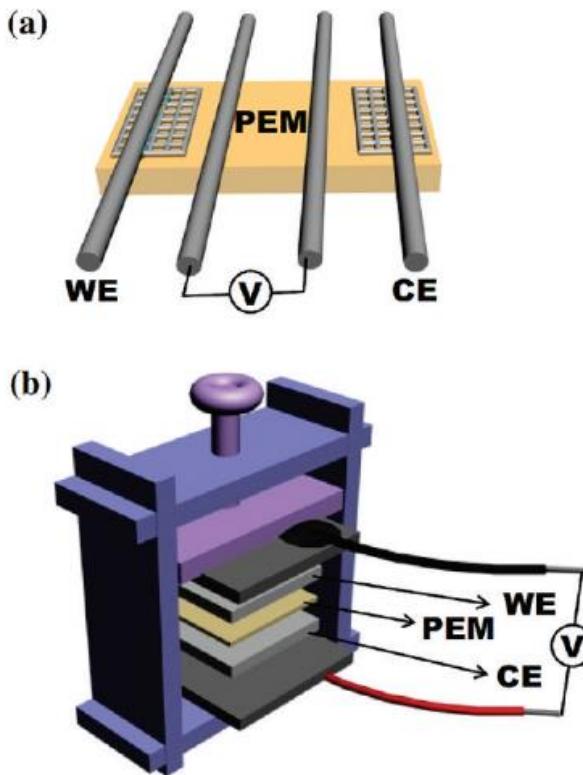
- Polymer chains motion / Hop of Li^+



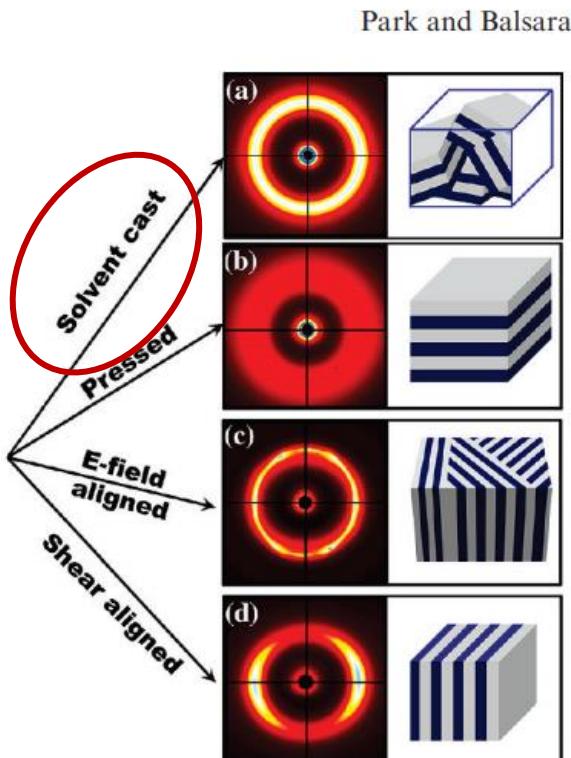

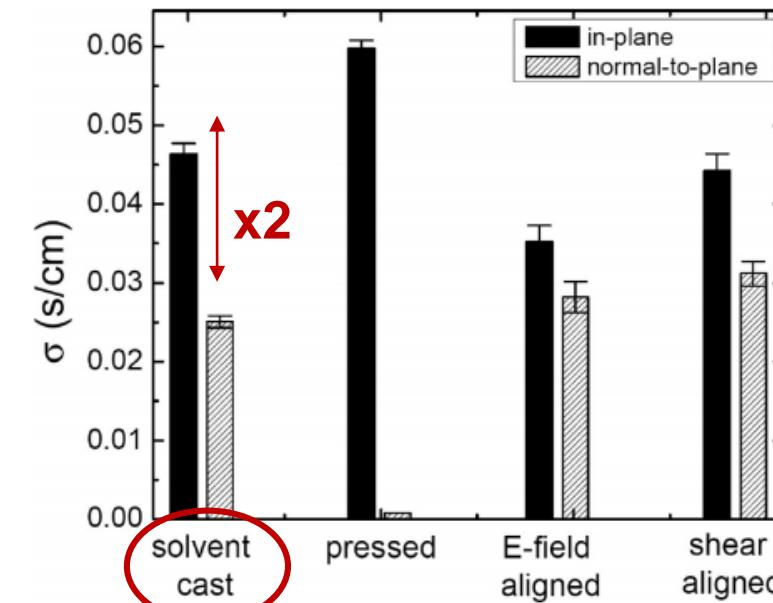
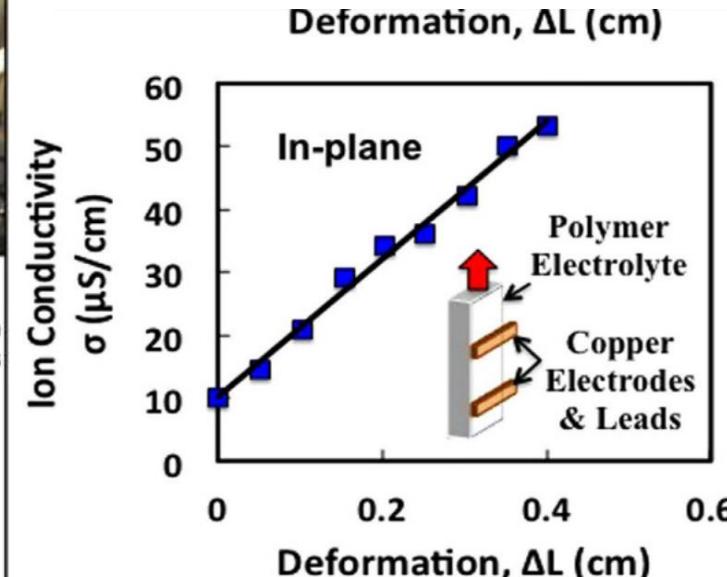
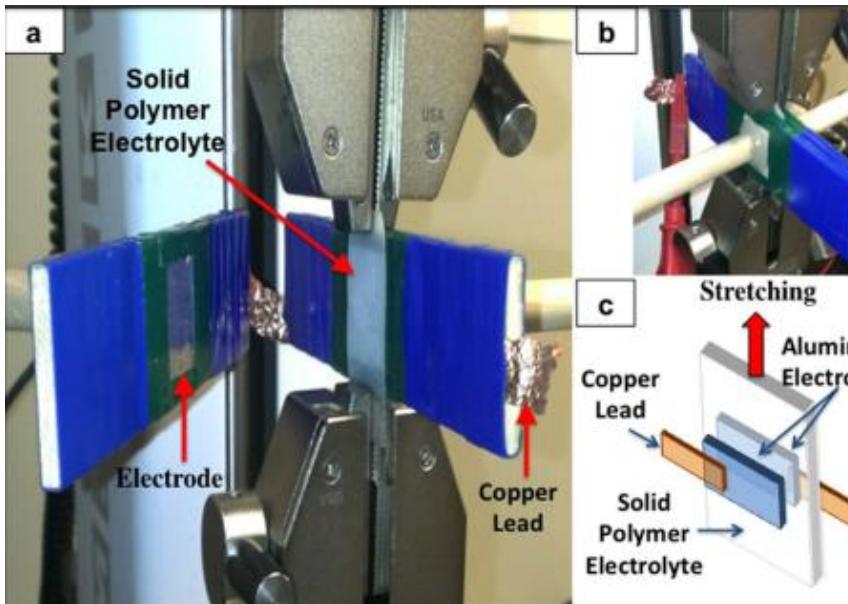


Figure 7. The equilibrium in-plane and normal-to-plane conductivity values of as-cast and aligned samples.

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- Elongation of membrane [1-2]



- Air → Humidity : electrical and morphological properties are modified
 - At room temperature
- What happen when $T > T$ melting point?

Material PEO (6 000 kg/mol) ; Salt : LiClO₄ OE/Li ~ 16

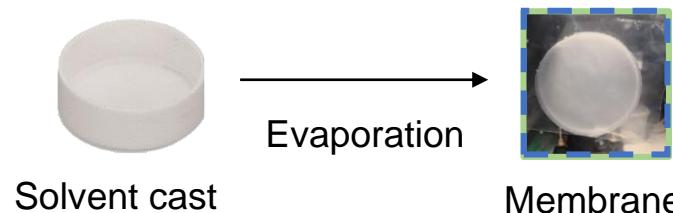
- Main result at $\Delta L = 0.3$ cm
- $1.10^{-5} \text{ S.cm}^{-1} \rightarrow 4.10^{-5} \text{ S.cm}^{-1}$
- +½ decade on σ at 25°C

2- Solid polymer electrolyte by solvent cast: ionic conductivity σ_{\parallel} & σ_{\perp}

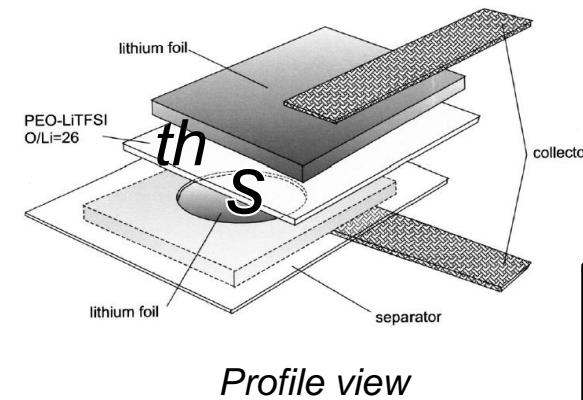
▪ Process of elaboration



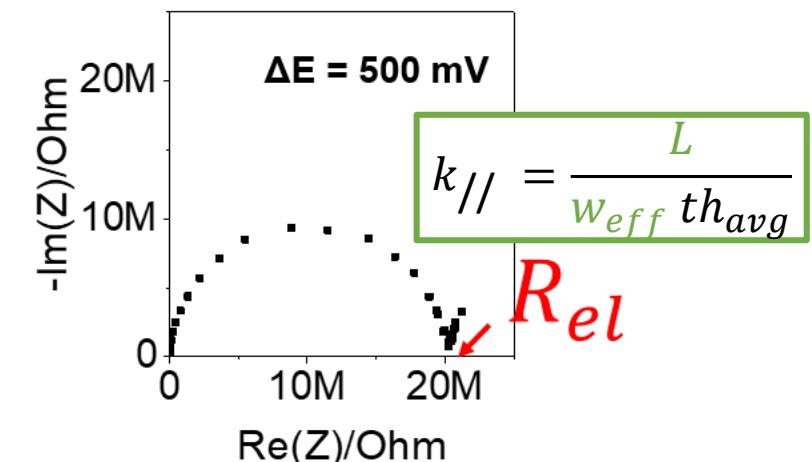
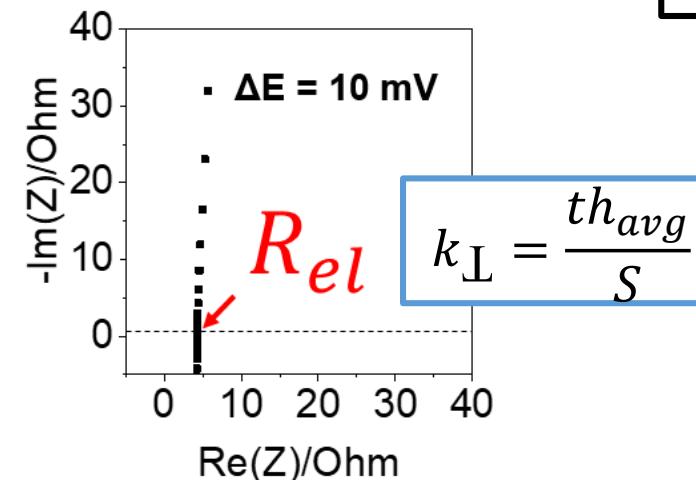
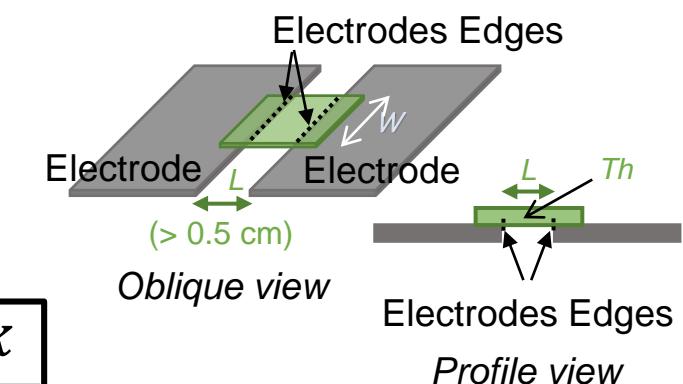
- Electrolyte: Polymer + lithium salt
- Solvent: dimethylformamide (DMF)
- Evaporation: room temperature & 60°C
- Membrane storage: dry glove-box (no solvent)

▪ Cell types & Impedance spectroscopy method

In-Plane configuration σ_{\perp} **Through-Plane configuration** σ_{\parallel}



$$\sigma = \frac{k}{R_{el}}$$

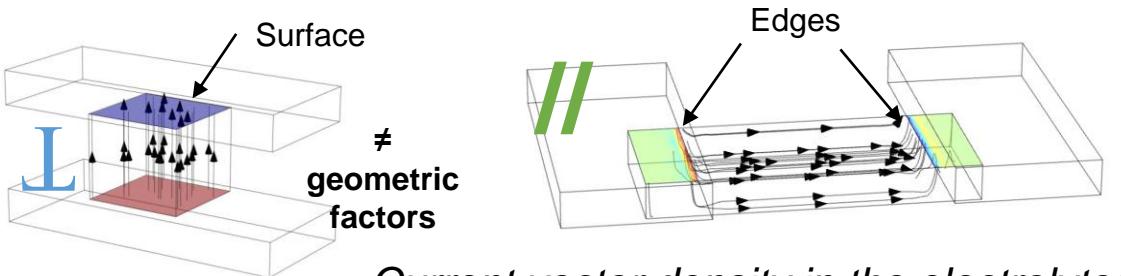


Method

Stationary electric current in conductive medium under



→ Ohm's law $J = \sigma E$
with J current density (A/m^2).

→ Current density of the electrolyte (A/cm^2)

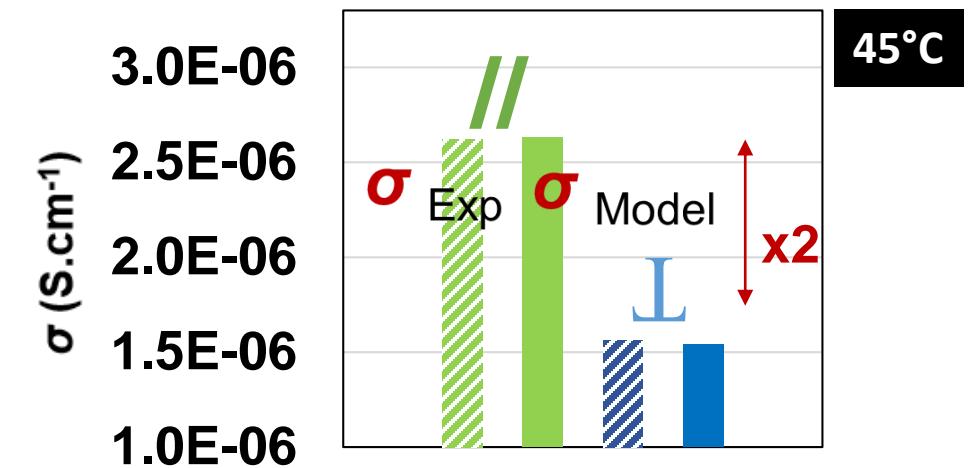

Cross section surface of the SPE (cm^2) = I

$I / U = R_{el}$ in modeling

R_{el} in experiment $\leftrightarrow R_{el}$ in modeling → σ Exp vs. σ Model

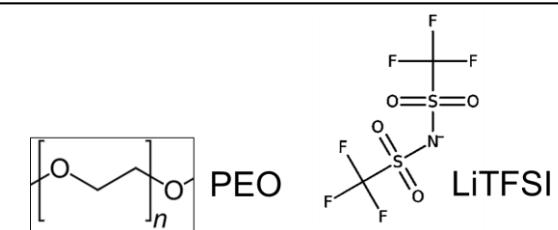
Results

Case of a PEO/LiTFSI membrane

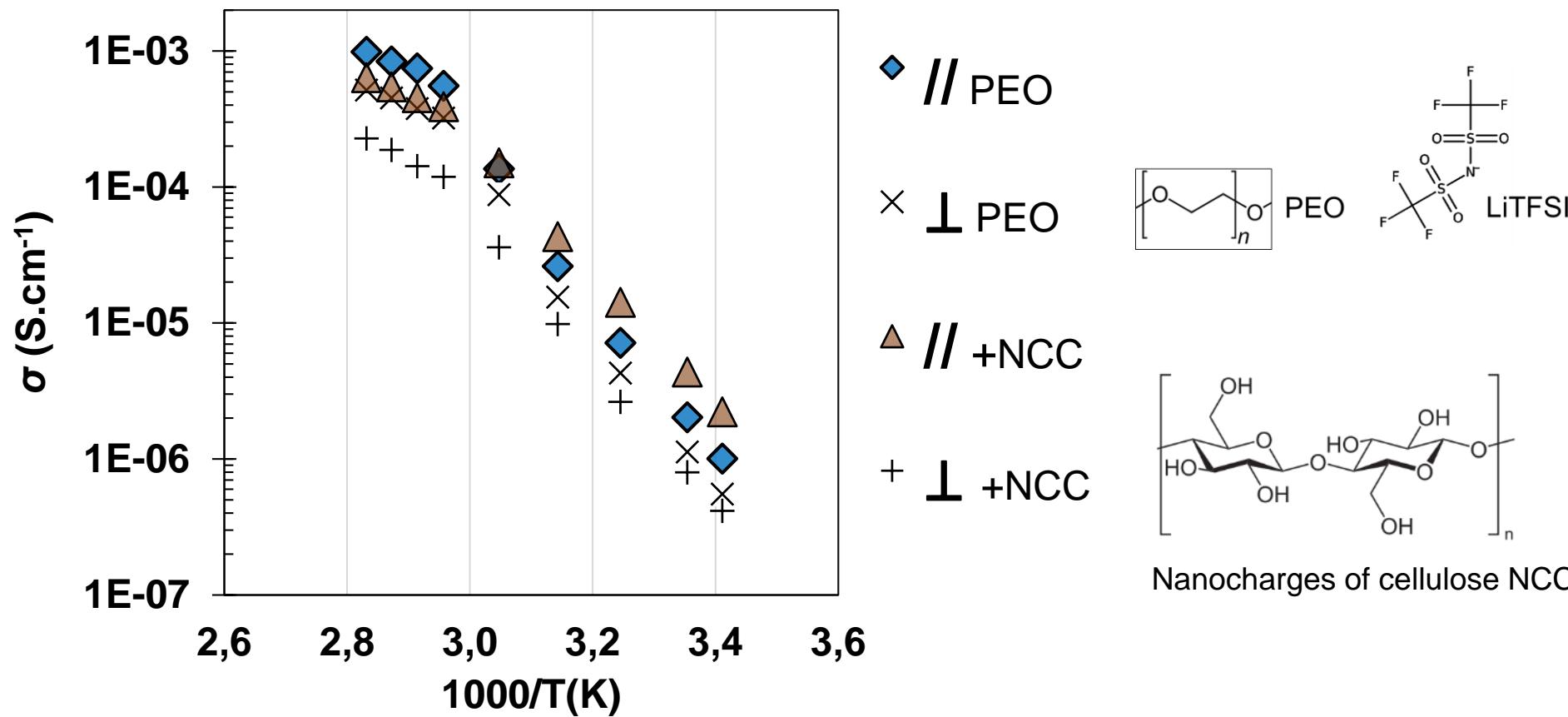


- σ Exp and σ Model are identical
- Edge effect in the cells is negligible

➤ Methodology is valid



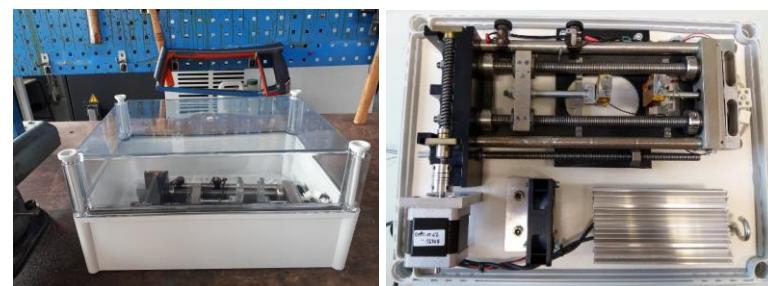
▪ Ionic conductivity measurements



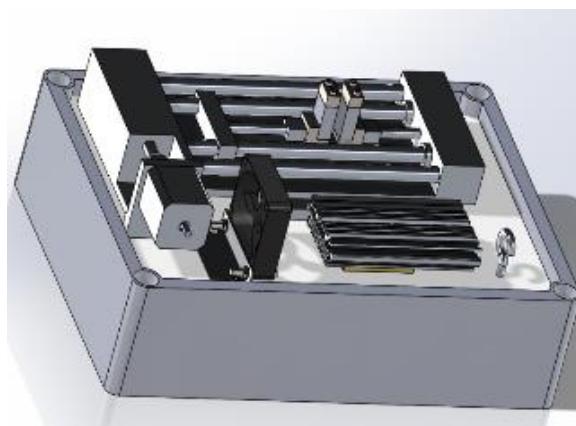

σ (S.cm⁻¹)	$7,5.10^{-4}$	$3,8.10^{-4}$	$4,5.10^{-4}$	$1,4.10^{-4}$
$\sigma_{//}/\sigma_{\perp}$	$1,98 \sim 2$		$3,17 \sim 3$	

- $\sigma_{//} > \sigma_{\perp}$ for PEO LiTFSI and with NCC
- Can be linked at the study of free volume theory (VTF model, E_a), calculations are ongoing

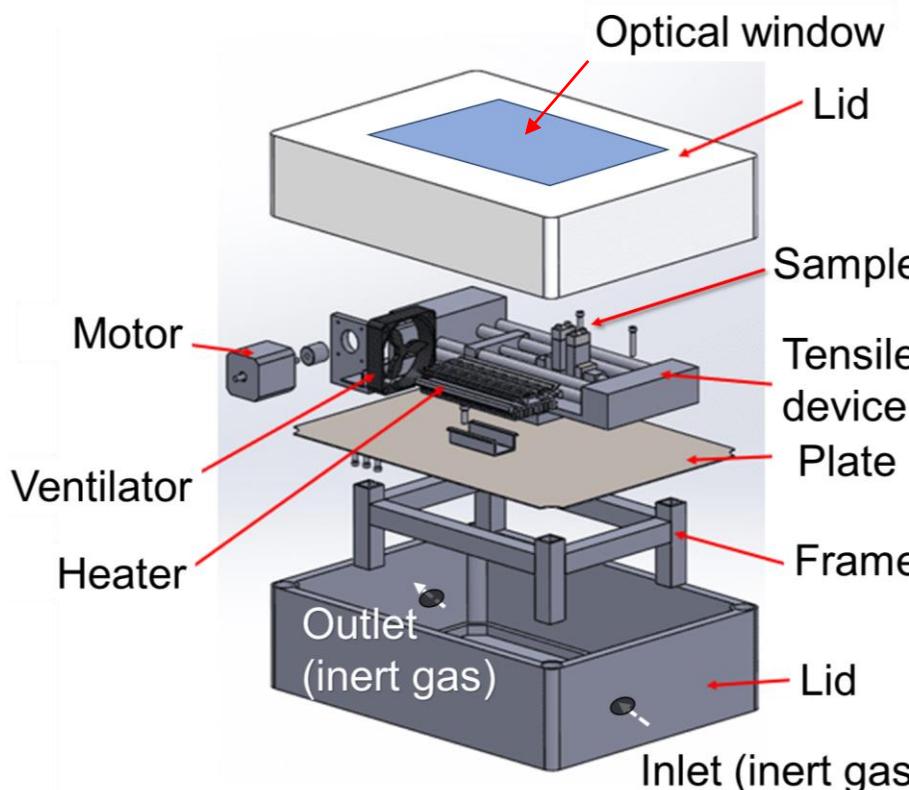
Copolymer PEO-PPO



- $\sigma_{//}$ pouch cell = tensile box

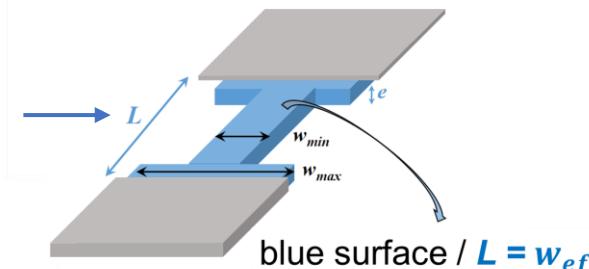
➤ Sample environment is under temperature controlled & in dry condition

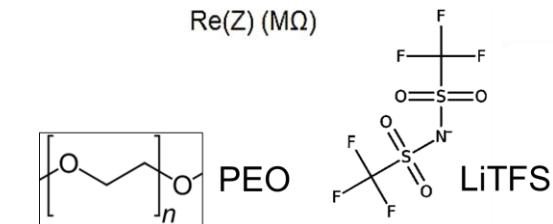
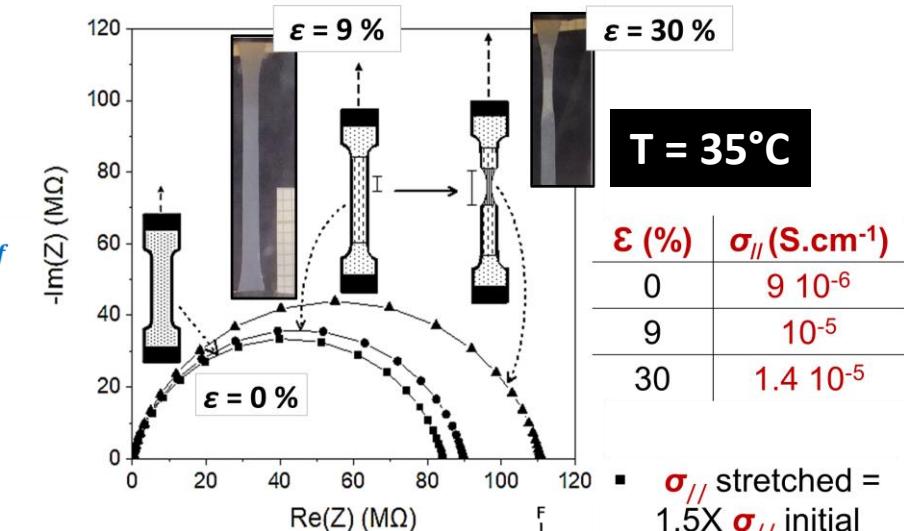

$\sigma_{//}$ upon stretching

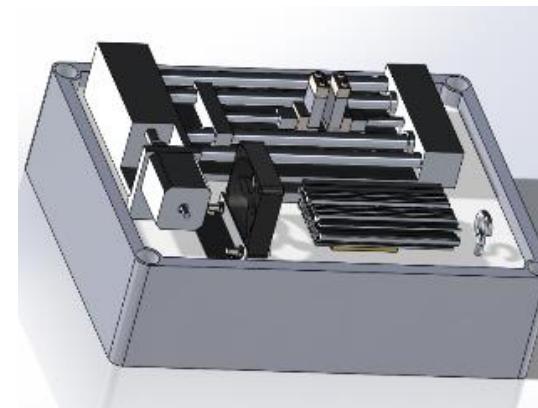


➤ When $T < T_{melting}$
 $\sigma_{//}$ stretched for PEO LiTFSI is higher than $\sigma_{//}$ initial

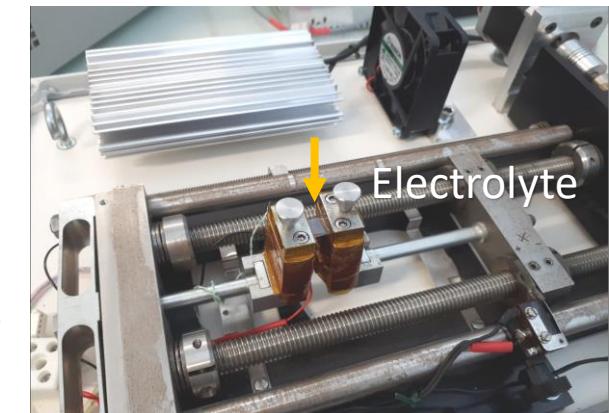
Instrumentation

Design of a setup to couple:

- Electric measurements
- Elongation as a function of temperature and under inert gas

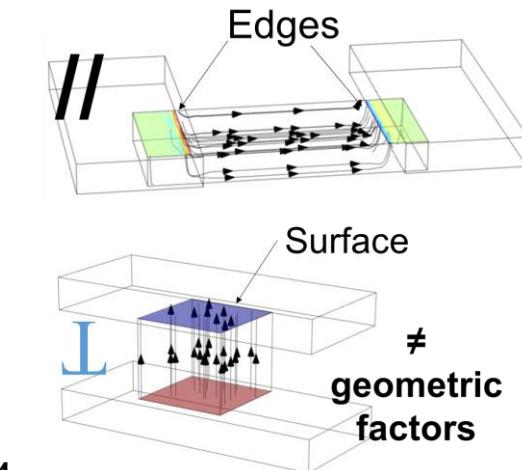
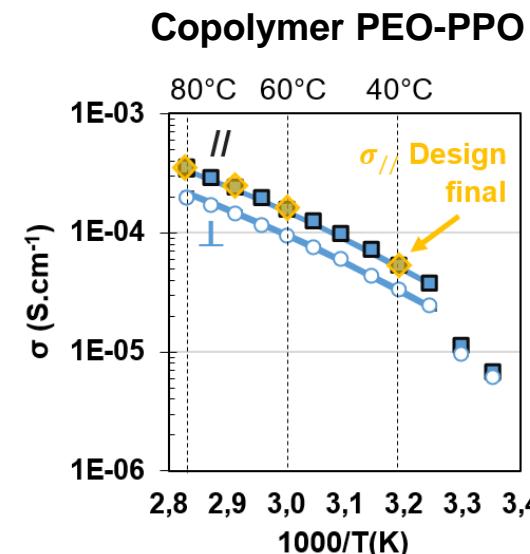
Electrochemistry measurement

- $\sigma_{//} > \sigma_{\perp}$ for all PEO based SPEs (homopolymer, composite, statistical)
- Modeling captures the experimental behavior

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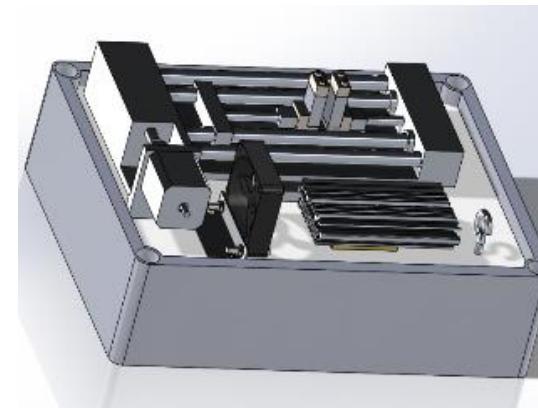

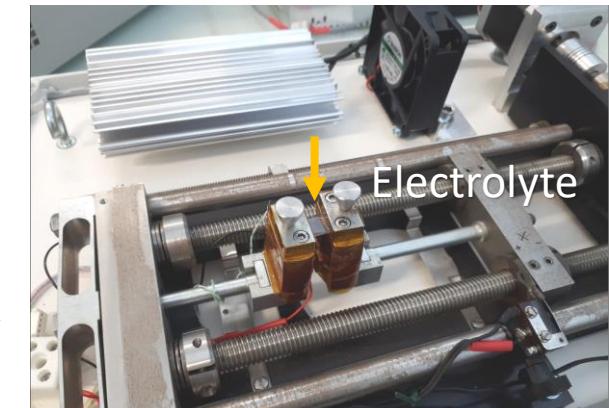
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
