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Behavior of three cast chromium-rich cobalt-based alloys in oxidation at 900°C in a 100% water vapour atmosphere


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Beside the famous single-crystalline γ/γ' superalloys other metallic alloys retain high interest for some high temperature applications. This is for example the case of the foundry-made cobalt-based superalloys family. These alloys may offer to the users high mechanical strength in service at elevated temperature as well as correct resistance against oxidation by gases and corrosion by molten salts. A typical example of use is as the constitutive material of glass working tool for shaping molten glass. The oxidative gaseous milieu in which cast cobalt-based superalloys work the most often are dry or wet air, or mixtures of burner gases. However there are applications, notably in the nuclear power field, in which hot gases may contain very high quantities of water vapour and for which cobalt-based superalloys may be considered. Their behaviour in such water-rich gaseous environment seems to be never investigated and this is the reason why testing a little series of cast cobalt-based alloys in pure water vapour was decided here.





Description of the VAPOX apparatus (CEA/LECNA)



Sample path between Institut Jean Lamour and CEA/LECNA








Microstructures of the alloys in their as-cast states










ed for the Co-10Ni-30Cr alloy exposed to 100%H2O at 900°C for 46

The three cobalt-based alloys appeared thus as rather resistant on long time against the atmosphere made of exclusively water vapour for this temperature of 900°C. Oxygen is particularly oxidant (it was present here too, in very small quantity) but water vapour is also known to be an oxidant gas. Water vapour is furthermore favourable to the volatilization of oxide species (unfortunately including the protective chromia and also alumina). This last aspect was not really studied here but may be later specified by using thermogravimetry techniques and by applying numerical treating methods. Sometimes cited for its beneficial effect on the resistance against spallation in thermal cycling, water vapour did not demonstrate this in the present study. It can be thought that such effect exists for some alloys different from the three present ones, or that too much water vapour may have the opposite effect. These are many questions which merit to be further
