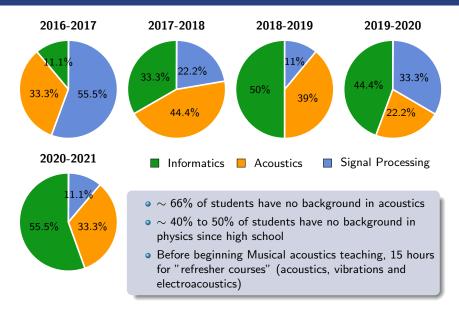

Students background



Limits of the traditional education

State of the situation 2012-2015

- Students appear to be less interested in acoustics (than signal processing and informatics)
- Increasing gap between hopes of the teacher and the students' results (low marks at the final evaluation)
- Lack of motivation in learning, passive students, use of other students' knowledge
- Wide diversity of student backgrounds, traditional education is limited: prerequisites, in-depth study, difficulties for understanding

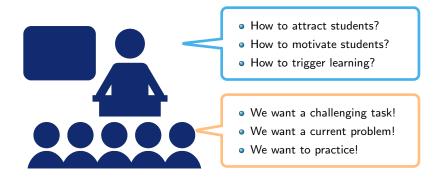

Looking for another teaching approach



Let's start from the student's point of view!

→ Building of a new teaching unit centered on challenging and current problems and projects

Problems and projects definition



- → Sound synthesis by physical modelling
- are challenging and current topics which are adapted to the ATIAM curriculum with a direct link to signal processing and informatics

→ Experimental identification of physical parameters

Problems and projects defined by instrument family

- Percussion: glockenspiel & kettledrum
- Strings: damped string & Kora
- Winds: trumpet & clarinet
- Room acoustics & sound recording

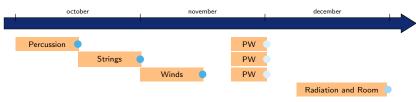


- → Increasing the scientific complexity, from free to forced oscillations, integrating progressively damping mechanisms and couplings between structures, radiation in a room
- → Identification of learning outcomes shared with the students (contract)

Teaching implementation

Sequencing



- For each instrumental family:
 - 2 Problem-Based Learning in 2 weeks → define problems that lead to specific learning outcomes
 - 1 Practical Work → compare models to actual instruments (complexity)
 - Evaluation on learning outcomes + report
- Radiation, Room acoustics & Sound recording
 - 1 Project-Based Learning in 2/3 weeks → including experimental data gathering and processing; model implementation
 - 2 lectures used as references for the problem
 - Oral presentation + evaluation on learning outcomes
- Final evaluation at the end of the semester

Practical Teaching and project

Practical teaching linked to selected problems

- First modes identification of a glockenspiel and a vibraphone and a kettledrum
- Model and measure mobility of a classical guitar in low frequencies
- Study losses due to viscous and thermal effects when propagating in a recorder

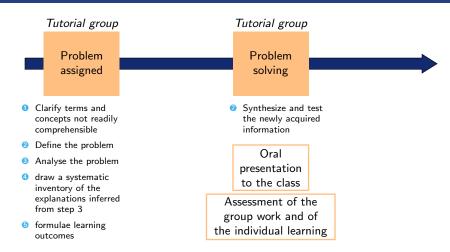
Room acoustics project

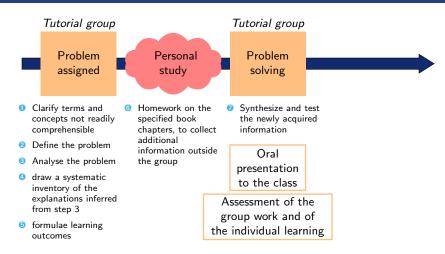
Students are asked to synthesise the impulse response allowing, by convolution of the anechoic recordings, to obtain a result comparable to the sound recording they made in a concert hall.

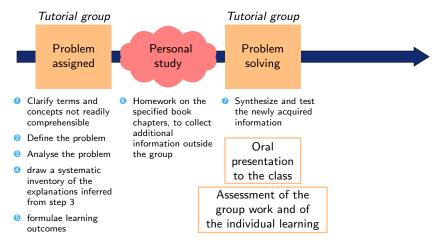




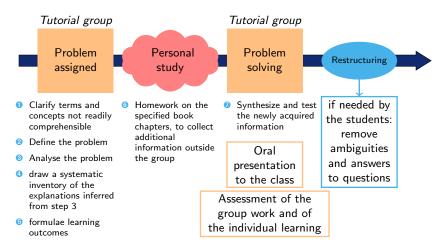








- → The problem/scenario is the key-point of this teaching method
- → Each student has a role (Scribe, Chair, etc) and the teacher is a tutor



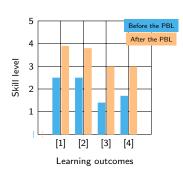

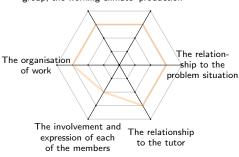

The atmosphere in the The group's group, the working climate production



- Approximate time devoted to homework between the two sessions reported by students 2h30
- Overall time devoted to homework has significantly increased (8 to \sim 32 h)
- The involvement of students is spread throughout the teaching unit

Advantages

- Define detailed learning outcomes (instead of a program)
- Define sequences regularly assessed to record the students progress
- Improve the teaching alignment
- Significant increase the student's time devoted to the learning
- Students develop a sense of ownership of their learning and knowledge
- Significant improvement the student' skills at the end of the teaching unit

Drawbacks

- Questioning the teaching work
- Significant amount of time to set up (problem design, training of teachers)
- Requires the collaboration of colleagues from others units during the same period for side effect: time-slots devoted to student personal study
- Few students do not play the game (less and less over years)



Conclusion

Take home message

- Active learning method is now used by ATIAM' students to study Musical Acoustics
- The teacher's new role as a tutor requires a learning that is, over time, extremely inspiring: the knowledge is in the book chapters given to the students, the tutor only has to focus on the students' difficulties
- In addition to technical and scientific knowledge, the students acquire complementary skills (communication, teamwork, problem solving, information sharing ...)
