Neuromorphic computing is promising for the processing of massive data with an extremely low power consumption. After the discovery of memristors the research has been focused on the study and development of novel artificial neuromorphic devices, including ferroelectric-based ones.

Ferroelectric Tunnel Junction (FTJ) type memristors based on zirconium-doped hafnium oxide (HfZrO<sub>2</sub> or HZO) have shown synaptic learning capabilities. HZO processes are already integrated in Si CMOS industry and its ferroelectric properties allow to obtain oxide layers thinner than 10 nm. Nevertheless the endurance properties should be improved for industrial applications and the nucleation and stabilization of the ferroelectric phase (f-phase) is not yet well understood.

# Impact of ultra-thin Ti buffer layer: structural analysis for different thicknesses of HZO

## **Post-annealing the Ti turns into TiO<sub>2</sub> which:**

- Stabilize ferroelectric layer in HZO
- Increase oxygen vacancies in the HZO barrier
- Creates defects at the electrode/HZO interface
