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# Unique Continuation for the unperturbed discrete Maxwell operator 

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## 1 Introduction

### 1.1 The Discrete-Maxwell Operator

Let $\mathbb{T}^{d}$ be the $d$-dimensional real torus, let $U$ be the unitary transform between $L^{2}\left(\mathbb{T}^{3}\right)$ and $l^{2}\left(\mathbb{Z}^{3}\right)$ :

$$
\begin{aligned}
\hat{f}(n)=(2 \pi)^{-\frac{3}{2}} \int_{\mathbb{T}^{3}} e^{i n x} f(x) d x \equiv(U f)(n), & n \in \mathbb{Z}^{3}, \\
f(x)=(2 \pi)^{-\frac{3}{2}} \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}^{3}} e^{-i n x} \hat{f}(n) \equiv\left(U^{*} \hat{f}\right)(x), & x \in \mathbb{T}^{3} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Position: $n=\left(n_{1}, n_{2}, n_{3}\right) \in \mathbb{Z}^{3}$, Momentum: $x=\left(x_{1}, x_{2}, x_{3}\right) \in \mathbb{T}^{3} \approx(\mathbb{R} /(2 \pi \mathbb{Z}))^{3}$. We also write

$$
\hat{f}=F f .
$$

We consider the unperturbed Maxwell operator $\hat{H}_{0}=U H_{0} U^{*}$ as bounded in $\left(L^{2}\left(\mathbb{Z}^{3}\right)\right)^{6}$ and defined from the bounded operator $H_{0}$ in $\left(L^{2}\left(\mathbb{T}^{3}\right)\right)^{6}$, such that

$$
\left(H_{0} u\right)(x)=H_{0}(x) u(x), \quad x \in \mathbb{T}^{3}, \quad u \in\left(L^{2}\left(\mathbb{T}^{3}\right)\right)^{6},
$$

where

$$
H_{0}(x)=\tilde{H}_{0}(\xi) \equiv\left(\begin{array}{cc}
0 & M(\xi) \\
-M(\xi) & 0
\end{array}\right), \quad x \in \mathbb{T}^{3},
$$

with

$$
\xi=\left(\xi_{1}, \xi_{2}, \xi_{3}\right), \xi_{j}=\sin x_{j},
$$

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and $M(\xi)$ is the following real anti-symmetrical $3 \times 3$ matrix:

$$
M(\xi)=\left(\begin{array}{ccc}
0 & -\xi_{3} & \xi_{2} \\
\xi_{3} & 0 & -\xi_{1} \\
-\xi_{2} & \xi_{1} & 0
\end{array}\right)
$$

Then the operator $H_{0}$ acts on $u=(E, H) \in\left(L^{2}\left(\mathbb{T}^{3}\right)\right)^{3} \times\left(L^{2}\left(\mathbb{T}^{3}\right)\right)^{3}$ :

$$
H_{0}(x) u=(M(\xi) H,-M(\xi) E)
$$

Let $\mathcal{H}=L^{2}\left(\mathbb{T}^{3}, d x ; \mathbb{R}^{6}\right)$ which can be written as the hilbertian sum

$$
\mathcal{H}=\int_{\mathbb{T}^{3}}^{\oplus} \mathbb{R}^{6} d x
$$

We then have

$$
H_{0}=\int_{\mathbb{T}^{3}}^{\oplus} H_{0}(x) d x
$$

It is clear that $H_{0}$ is a bounded self-adjoint operator on $\mathcal{H}$.
We are concerned with the unique continuation property (UCP) for $\hat{H}_{0}$.

### 1.2 Spectrum of $\hat{H}_{0}$

We denote by $\sigma(A)$ the spectrum of an operator $A$. We introduce the following notations:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\xi=\sin x: \quad \xi_{j}=\sin x_{j} \tag{1.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

Let $A$ be the following real symmetrical matrix:

$$
A=\left(\begin{array}{lll}
1 & 1 & 1  \tag{1.2}\\
1 & 1 & 1 \\
1 & 1 & 1
\end{array}\right)
$$

Lemma 1.1. Putting $p(x ; \lambda)=\operatorname{det}(H(x)-\lambda)$, then

$$
\begin{equation*}
p(x ; \lambda)=\tilde{p}(\xi ; \lambda) \equiv \operatorname{det}\left(\lambda^{2}+M(\xi)^{2}\right)=\lambda^{2}\left(\lambda^{2}-\xi^{2}\right)^{2} \tag{1.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

with the eigenvalue

$$
\tau(\xi)=\xi^{2}, \quad \text { multiplicity }=2
$$

associated with the eigenvectors (when they don't vanish)

$$
w_{1}=\left(-\xi_{2}, \xi_{1}, 0\right), \quad w_{2}=\xi \times w_{1}=\left(-\xi_{1} \xi_{3},-\xi_{2} \xi_{3}, \xi_{1}^{2}+\xi_{2}^{2}\right)
$$

Proof: exercise.
We put

$$
\lambda_{+}=\max _{[-1,1]^{3}} \sqrt{\tau(\xi)}=\sqrt{3}
$$

Theorem 1.2. 1) $\sigma\left(H_{0}\right)=\left[-\lambda_{+}, \lambda_{+}\right]$.
2) The purely point spectrum is $\sigma_{p p}\left(\hat{H}_{0}\right)=\{0\}$.
3) The limiting absorption principle holds on $\left[-\lambda_{+}, \lambda_{+}\right] \backslash\{0\}$ : the limits $\lim _{\varepsilon \rightarrow \pm 0}(H-\lambda+i \varepsilon)^{-1}$ exist in $B\left(\mathcal{B}_{s}, \mathcal{B}_{s}^{*}\right)$ for $s>\frac{1}{2}$, (where $\mathcal{B}_{s}$ are Besov spaces).
4) The singular continuous spectrum of $\hat{H}_{0}$ is empty.

### 1.3 UCP

We analyse the UCP for the discrete unperturbed Maxwell system. Let $\lambda \in$ $(0, \sqrt{3})$.

We denote $\hat{u}=\left(\hat{u}^{E}, \hat{u}^{H}\right)=\left(F u^{E}, F u^{H}\right)$. Let $\Omega \subset \mathbb{Z}^{3}$ a bounded set of the form

$$
\Omega=\Pi_{j=1}^{3} \Omega_{j}, \quad \Omega_{j}=\left[a_{j}, b_{j}\right] \cap \mathbb{Z}
$$

Let us consider the following relation:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(\hat{H}_{0}-\lambda\right) \hat{u}(n)=0 \quad \text { in } \quad\left\{n \in \mathbb{Z}^{3} \mid n \notin \Omega\right\} . \tag{1.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

We write $u \sim 0$ at infinity if the following holds:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\lim _{R \rightarrow \infty} \frac{1}{R} \sum_{n: R_{0}<|n|<R}|\hat{u}(n)|^{2}=0 \tag{1.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

We claim:
Theorem 1.3. Assume that $\left(\hat{H}_{0}-\lambda\right) \hat{u}$ has support in $\Omega$, and that $\hat{u} \sim 0$ at infinity. Then $\operatorname{supp} \hat{u} \subset \Omega$.

Proof. From the Rellich property, we can assume that $\hat{u}$ has compact support in some bounded $\Omega^{\prime}$ containing $\Omega$.

Let $P(x)$ be the orthogonal projection of $\mathbb{R}^{3}$ onto $\xi$, for $\xi \neq 0$ :

$$
P(x) u^{E}=\frac{1}{\xi^{2}}<u^{E}, \xi>_{\mathbb{R}^{6}} \quad \xi, \quad u^{E} \in \mathbb{R}^{3}
$$

We then define the operator $P \in \mathcal{B}(\mathcal{H})$ which is multiplication by $P(x)$, and so, it is the orthogonal projection on $\xi(\cdot) \in \mathcal{H}$. We then write:

$$
\begin{gathered}
u=\left(u^{E}, u^{H}\right), \quad u^{E / H}=v^{E / H}+w^{E / H}, \\
v^{E / H}:=P u^{E / H}, \text { so that } w^{E / H}(x) \perp \xi, \\
v=\left(v^{E}, v^{H}\right), w=\left(w^{E}, w^{H}\right),
\end{gathered}
$$

(We also set $v(0)=0, w(0)=u(0)$ for example).

Put $\hat{f}=\left(\hat{H}_{0}-\lambda\right) \hat{u}$. Since $H_{0}(x)$ is self-adjoint, it range is $\xi^{\perp}$ for $\xi \neq 0$. We define by $H_{0}^{\perp}(x)$ the restriction of $H_{0}(x)$. to the stable subspace $(\xi \otimes \xi)^{\perp}$.

Let us observe that $H_{0} P=P H_{0}=0$. Then $v, w \in \mathcal{H}$ satisfy:

$$
-\lambda v^{E / H}+\left(\left(H_{0}-\lambda\right) w\right)^{E / H}=f^{E / H} \quad \text { in } \quad \mathbb{T}^{3}
$$

Writing $f^{E / H}=a^{E / H}+b^{E / H} /, \quad a^{E / H}:=P f^{E / H}, a=\left(a^{E}, a^{H}\right), b=\left(b^{E}, b^{H}\right)$, we obtain

$$
\begin{array}{r}
-\lambda \hat{v}=\hat{a} \quad \text { in } \quad \mathbb{Z}^{3}, \\
\left(\hat{H}_{0}^{\perp}-\lambda\right) \hat{w}=\hat{b} \quad \text { in } \mathbb{Z}^{3} . \tag{1.7}
\end{array}
$$

We observe that $\xi^{2} a^{E / F}, \xi^{2} b^{E / F}, \xi^{2} v^{E / F}$ and $\xi^{2} w^{E / F}$ are trigonometric polynomials, and $F\left(\xi^{2} a^{E / F}\right), F\left(\xi^{2} b^{E / F}\right)$ have support in $D_{2} \Omega$ where we put

$$
D_{1} \Omega=\left\{n \in \mathbb{Z}^{3}, \quad n \sim \Omega\right\} \cup \Omega, \quad D_{k}=D_{1}^{k}
$$

Here, $n \sim \Omega$ iff there exists $m \in \Omega$ such that $n-m \in\left\{ \pm e_{j}, j=1,2,3\right\}$. Equation (1.6) gives

$$
F\left(\xi^{2} v\right)=\frac{-1}{\lambda} F(<\xi, f>\xi) \quad \text { in } \quad \mathbb{Z}^{3} .
$$

Then $F\left(\xi^{2} v^{E / H}\right)=F\left(<\xi, u^{E / H}>\xi\right)$ and $F\left(\xi^{2} a^{E / H}\right)=F\left(<\xi, f^{E / H}>\xi\right)$ have same support, included in $D_{2} \Omega$. Put

$$
g=\xi^{2} b=\xi^{2} f-<\xi, f>\xi, \quad q=\xi^{2} w=\xi^{2} u-<\xi, u>\xi
$$

Equation (1.7) is then written

$$
\left(H_{0}^{\perp}-\lambda\right) q=g \quad \text { in } \quad \mathbb{T}^{3}
$$

that is,

$$
M(\xi) q^{H}(\xi)-\lambda q^{E}(\xi)=g^{E}(\xi), \quad M(\xi) q^{E}(\xi)+\lambda q^{H}(\xi)=-g^{H}(\xi) \quad \text { in } \quad \mathbb{T}^{3}
$$

We obtain:

$$
\begin{align*}
q^{E}(\xi) & =\frac{1}{\lambda} M(\xi) q^{H}(\xi)-\frac{1}{\lambda} g^{E}(\xi),  \tag{1.8}\\
\left(M(\xi)^{2}+\lambda^{2}\right) q^{H}(\xi) & =M(\xi) g^{E}(\xi)-\lambda g^{H}(\xi) \text { in } \mathbb{T}^{3} . \tag{1.9}
\end{align*}
$$

Since the non-zero eigenvalue of $M(\xi)^{2}$ are $-\xi^{2}$ with multiplicity 2 , then the restriction of $M(\xi)^{2}$ to $\xi^{\perp}$ is $-\xi^{2} I_{d}$, and (1.9) provides

$$
q^{H}(\xi)=\frac{1}{\lambda^{2}-\xi^{2}}\left(M(\xi) g^{E}(\xi)-\lambda g^{H}(\xi)\right) \quad \text { in } \quad \mathbb{T}^{3}
$$

Let us use the following

Lemma 1.4. 1) Let $r \in \mathbb{R}$, $\hat{q}$ with compact support in $\mathbb{Z}^{3}, j \in\{1,2,3\}$, and $m_{j} \in \mathbb{Z}$ such that $F\left(\left(\xi^{2}+r\right) q\right)(n)=0$ for all $n$ such that $n_{j}>m_{j}$. Then $\hat{q}(n)=0$ for all $n$ such that $n_{j}>m_{j}-2$.
2) Let $\hat{q}$ with compact support in $\mathbb{Z}^{3}$ such that $\operatorname{supp} F\left(\left(\xi^{2}+r\right) q\right) \subset \Pi_{j}\left[c_{j}, d_{j}\right]$, where $d_{j} \geq c_{j}$ for all $j$. If some $d_{j}<c_{j}+4$, then $\hat{q}=0$. If $d_{j} \geq c_{j}+4$ for all $j$, then $\operatorname{supp} \hat{q} \subset \Pi_{j}\left[c_{j}+2, d_{j}-2\right]$ and $\operatorname{supp} F\left(\left(\xi^{2}+r\right) q\right) \subset D_{2}\left(\Pi_{j}\left[c_{j}+2, d_{j}-2\right]\right)$.

Proof. 1) The polynomial $\left(\xi_{1}^{2}-\lambda^{2}\right) q$ in the variable $e^{i x_{j}}$ has degree $m_{j}$ at most, and so $q$ is polynomial in the variable $e^{i x_{j}}$ with degree $m_{j}-2$ at most. The conclusion follows.
2) is straight consequence of 1 ).

We apply Lemma 1.4 to Equation 1.9. Remember that $\Omega$ is the rectangle $\Pi_{j}\left[a_{j}, b_{j}\right]$. The support of $\hat{g}$ is included in $D_{2} \Omega$, so the support of $F\left(M(\xi) g^{E}(\xi)-\right.$ $\left.\lambda g^{H}(\xi)\right)$ is included in $D_{3} \Omega \subset \Pi_{j}\left[a_{j}-3, b_{j}+3\right]$. Consequently, $F q^{H}$ has support in $\Pi_{j}\left[a_{j}-1, b_{j}+1\right]$. Similarly, $F q^{E}$ has support in $\Pi_{j}\left[a_{j}-1, b_{j}+1\right]$. Thus, $F\left(\xi^{2} v+\xi^{2} w\right)$ has compact support in $D_{2} \Omega$. From Lemma 1.4 again, we have $\operatorname{supp} F\left(\xi^{2} v+q\right) \subset \Omega$, and so, since $\hat{u}=F\left(\frac{1}{\xi^{2}}\left(\xi^{2} v+q\right)\right)$ has compact support, then $\hat{u}$ has support in $\Omega$.
