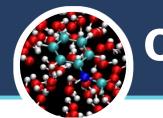
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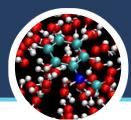

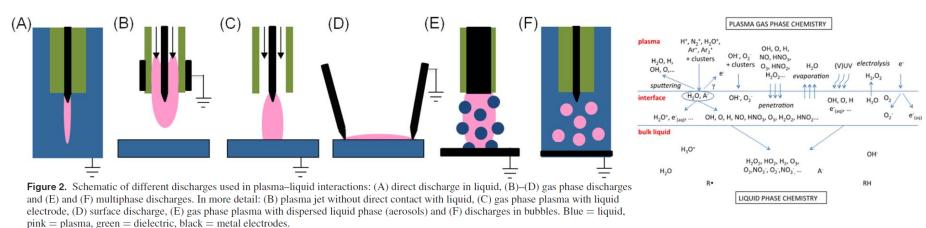

# Plasma (NTPA) degradation of organic pollutants in water

Within the scope of plasma-liquid interactions



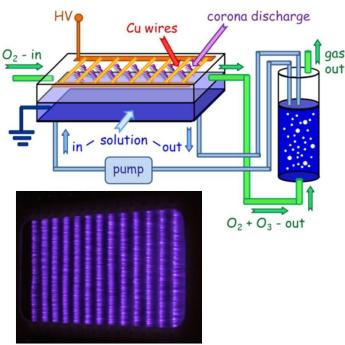
- Non Thermal Plasma at Atmospheric Pressure (NTPA) is creating oxidizing species (RONS) expected to interact with organic pollutant in water
  - Efficiently degrade the parent molecule to non-toxic products
  - Optimize (plasma) process: requires knowledge of oxidation chemistry in water : reactants, reaction products, pathways and selectivity
    - $\rightarrow$  molecular simulations ?

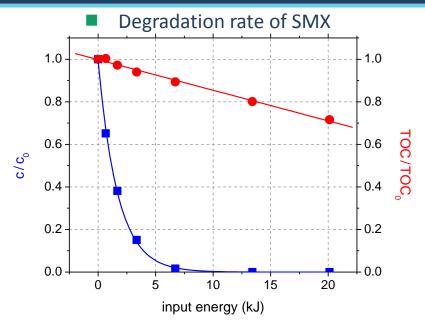

## Plasma (NTPA) degradation of organic pollutants in water: INFLPR experiment

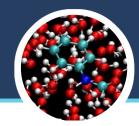


- High voltage electrode: array of 20 Cu wires
  - (F = 100  $\mu$ m, L = 36 mm, d<sub>i-i+1</sub> = 6 mm)
- Ground electrode: Al tape (46 x 160 mm)
- Discharge gap ~ 5 mm
- Liquid depth ~ 5 mm
- Gas: oxygen, flow rate 300 mL/min
- Solution: volume 330 mL, conductivity 300  $\mu\text{S/cm},$  pH 7.1, solution flow rate 160 mL/min



- Almost complete degradation after 20 min treatment
- Degradation efficiency
  - 67 g/kWh at 50% degradation
  - 33 g/kWh at 90% degradation
- Slow mineralization: TOC decrease 28.4% after 60 min treatment
- N-containing and S-containing organic products still present in the treated solution after 60 min

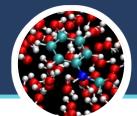

### Molecular simulations: Quantum Chemistry (+ MD)

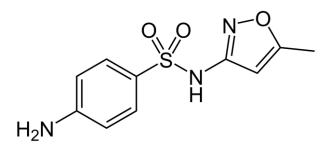
- For geometry optimization of pollutants molecules and basic data (Mulliken charges, bond lengths and angles, electronic levels, IR frequencies, etc)
- For calculating and sorting all internal bond energies of pollutant molecules
  - identifying weak bonds thus able to break efficiently
  - When surrounded with water and active species, checking bond energy evolution: weakening vs tightening.
- Ab-Initio Molecular Dynamics → for solving Newton equations of motion, the interaction potentials can be calculated using quantum methods, such as Hartree-Fock, Hückel, DFT(B), etc
  - Necessary if bond-order reactive semi-empirical potentials are not available for MD simulations
  - Take account of electron processes (charge transfer, etc)
  - But at the expense of increasingly computing time





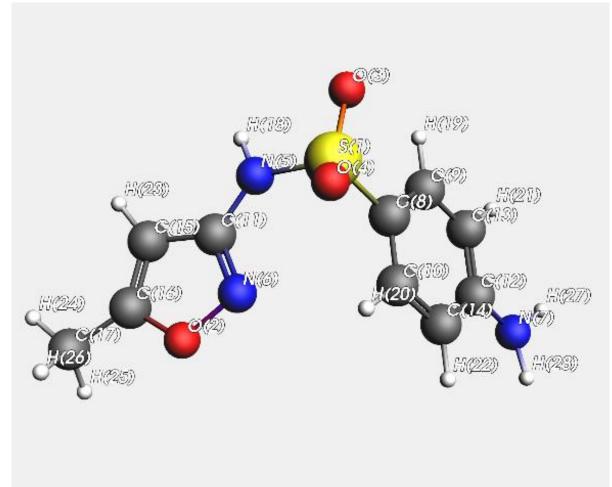
## Pollutant molecule of interest: SMX

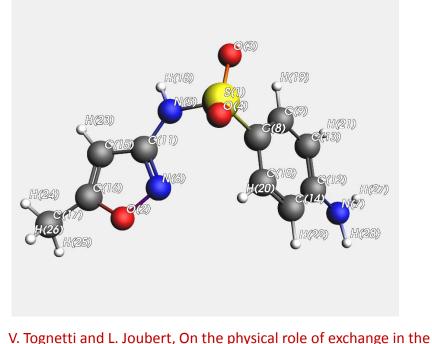
No reactive FF (S-N bond) -> DFTB - MD





## **Energy Decomposition Analysis**

- Calculation of all bond energies in a molecules. Using Internal Quantum Atom (IQA) method, it is now possible to establish, if the interaction between two atoms is energetically stabilizing or not, and to conclude about its nature (electrostatic, covalent, etc.).
  - Sulfamethoxazole isolated and with H<sub>2</sub>O (1g.cm<sup>-3</sup>)



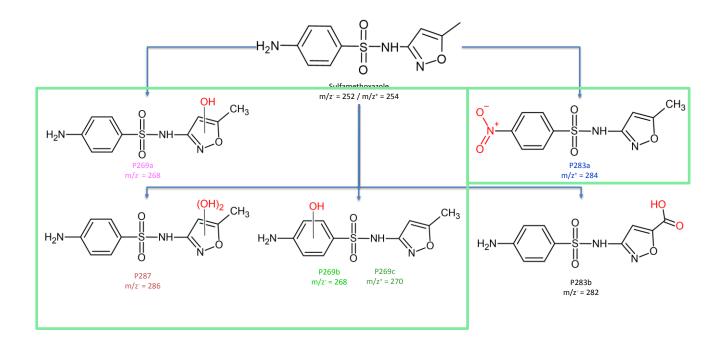

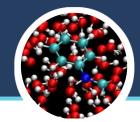


## Sulfamethoxazole degradation in NTPA experiment (at short time)

electrospray ionization tandem mass spectrometry (+/- ESI-MS/MS) experiment (M. Magureanu, F. Bilea, C. Bradu)

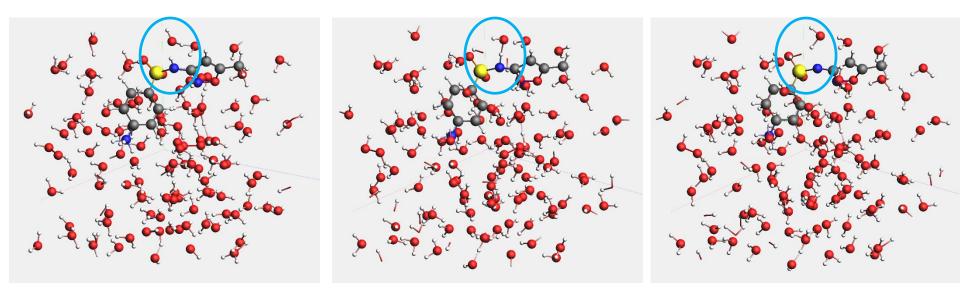


OH interaction places consistent with EDA calculations
→ Weaker bonds

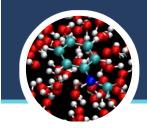


## **Quantum Chemistry + MD**

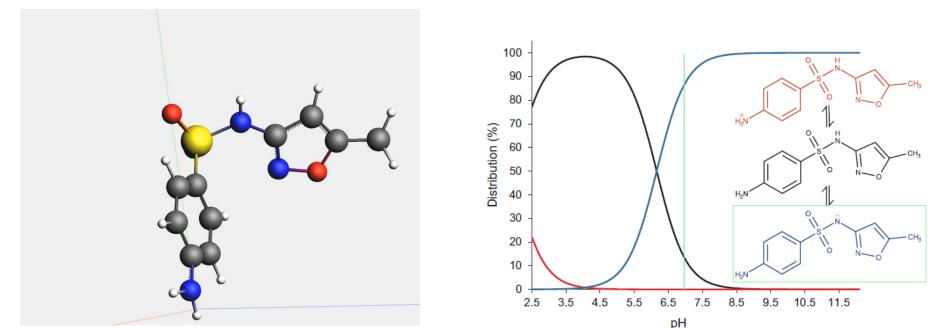
- 100 H2O +  $\frac{10 \text{ OH}}{10 \text{ OH}}$  + SMX  $\rightarrow$  what is it in reality ?
- Calculating interaction potentials using DFTB SCC scheme
- T = 300 K



#### ■ -S-NH-C (SMX) + HO $\rightarrow$ -S-N-C (SMX) + H<sub>2</sub>O



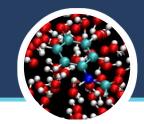
## Quantum Chemistry + MD

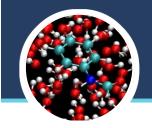
### Conclusions

- Molecular simulations can provide insights into oxidation process of plasma degradation of organic pollutants in water
- High throughput simulations are required for scanning a wide range of pollutants and active species.
- NTPA is a valuable technique for organic pollutant degradation.
- Availability of high-resolution analysis of degradation products allows comparison with simulation predictions.

### **Future work**

High throughput reactive molecular dynamics for unravelling reaction pathways of a large set of pollutants and direct comparison to NTPA experiments -> Amoxicillin, glyphosate and Endocrine Disruptor Chemical (EDCs).
