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## Context

PhD about wind instruments

- Accurate models
- Stable and efficient numerical methods
- Applications : instrument design, preservation of ancient instruments, artistic creation...

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$$Z_{\nu}(\ell)\hat{U}(\ell) + \frac{\mathrm{d}\hat{\rho}}{\mathrm{d}\ell}(\ell) = 0, \qquad \qquad Y_{t}(\ell)\hat{\rho}(\ell) + \frac{\mathrm{d}\hat{U}}{\mathrm{d}\ell}(\ell) = 0,$$

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Lossless acoustics

$$Z_{\nu}(\ell) = \frac{i\omega\rho_0}{S(\ell)}, \qquad \qquad Y_t(\ell) = \frac{i\omega S(\ell)}{\rho_0 c_0^2},$$

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Acoustics with viscous/thermal effects

$$Z_{\mathsf{v}}(\ell) = \frac{1}{1 - \mathsf{K}_{\mathsf{v}}(\ell)} \frac{i\omega\rho_0}{\mathsf{S}(\ell)}, \quad Y_t(\ell) = \left(1 + (\gamma - 1)\mathsf{K}_t(\ell)\right) \frac{i\omega\mathsf{S}(\ell)}{\rho_0 c_0^2},$$

with  $K_v$ ,  $K_t$  known for *cylinders*.

## Base model (3D)

Linearized Navier–Stokes<sup>2</sup>

$$i\omega\hat{\rho} + \rho_0 \nabla \cdot \hat{\boldsymbol{u}} = 0,$$
 (1a)

$$\rho_0 \, i\omega \, \hat{\boldsymbol{u}} = -\nabla \hat{P} + \mu \nabla^2 \, \hat{\boldsymbol{u}} + \left(\zeta + \frac{\mu}{3}\right) \nabla (\nabla \cdot \, \hat{\boldsymbol{u}}), \tag{1b}$$

$$\rho_0 C_p \, i\omega \, \hat{T} = \kappa \nabla^2 \, \hat{T} + i\omega \hat{P}, \tag{1c}$$

$$\frac{\hat{P}}{p_0} = \frac{\hat{\rho}}{\rho_0} + \frac{\hat{T}}{T_0},\tag{1d}$$

Small variations of : density  $\hat{\rho}$ , air speed  $\hat{\boldsymbol{u}}$ , pressure  $\hat{P}$ , temperature  $\hat{T}$ . Air at rest :  $(\rho_0, \boldsymbol{u}_0 = 0, \rho_0, T_0)$ . On the wall :

$$\hat{\boldsymbol{u}} = 0 \quad \text{and} \quad \hat{T} = 0.$$

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## Simplifying assumptions<sup>4</sup>

(A1) Planar pressure waves

 $\hat{P}(\boldsymbol{x}) = \hat{\boldsymbol{p}}(z)$ 



Figure – Straight tube

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## Expressing v and T as functions of p

Solutions to a diffusion equation with oscillating source :

$$\begin{cases} \psi(\alpha, \mathbf{x}) + \frac{R^2}{\alpha} \nabla_c^2 \psi(\alpha, \mathbf{x}) = 1 & \text{inside the domain } \mathbf{x} \in \Omega, \\ \psi(\alpha, \mathbf{x}) = 0 & \text{on the wall } \mathbf{x} \in \Sigma, \end{cases}$$
(3)

where  $\nabla_c^2 = \nabla^2 - \frac{\partial^2}{\partial_z^2}$  Laplacian on cross-section.

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where  $\nabla_c^2 = \nabla^2 - \frac{\partial^2}{\partial_z^2}$  Laplacian on cross-section. Viscous and thermal effects use respectively

$$\alpha_{\nu} = -is^2 = -R^2 \frac{\rho_0 i\omega}{\mu} \qquad \qquad \alpha_t = -i\sigma^2 s^2 = -R^2 \frac{\rho_0 i\omega C_p}{\kappa}.$$
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Separation of variables :

$$\hat{v}(x, y, z) = -\frac{1}{\rho_0 i \omega} \frac{\mathrm{d}\hat{\rho}}{\mathrm{d}\ell}(z) \psi(\alpha_v, x, y),$$
$$\hat{T}(x, y, z) = \frac{1}{\rho_0 C_\rho} \hat{\rho}(z) \psi(\alpha_t, x, y).$$

## Case of cylinders

In a circular tube of radius R the solution is

$$\psi(\alpha, r) = 1 - \frac{J_0(\sqrt{\alpha}r/R)}{J_0(\sqrt{\alpha})}.$$

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Loss coefficients  $K_v, K_t$  are obtained by averaging on a disk :

$$K_{\mathbf{v},t} = 1 - \langle \psi(\alpha_{\mathbf{v},t}) \rangle = \frac{2J_1(\sqrt{\alpha_{\mathbf{v},t}})}{\sqrt{\alpha_{\mathbf{v},t}}J_0(\sqrt{\alpha_{\mathbf{v},t}})}$$



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## Generalization to cones

(A1) Spherical pressure waves

 $\hat{P}(\boldsymbol{x}) = \hat{\boldsymbol{p}}(r)$ 



(A2) Longitudinal diffusion is neglected

$$\nabla^2 - \frac{\partial^2}{\partial r^2} \approx \nabla^2$$

 $\left| \left( \zeta + \frac{\mu}{3} \right) \nabla (\nabla \cdot \hat{\boldsymbol{u}}) \right| \ll |\nabla \hat{\boldsymbol{\rho}}|.$ Calculate  $\psi$  on a spherical cap, and average to obtain  $K_{\nu,t} = 1 - \langle \psi_{\nu,t} \rangle.$ 

## Express v and T as functions of p.

The shape function is now defined on a spherical cap. For circular cones of half-angle  $\Theta$  :

$$\begin{cases} \psi(\alpha, r, \theta) + \frac{R^2}{\alpha r^2 \sin \theta} \frac{\partial}{\partial \theta} \left( \sin \theta \frac{\partial \psi(\alpha, r, \theta)}{\partial \theta} \right) = 1 & \text{for } 0 \le \theta \le \Theta, \\ \psi(\alpha, r, \Theta) = 0. \end{cases}$$

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Equation of spherical harmonics. The solution uses Legendre function  ${\cal P}_\eta$  of complex order :

$$\psi(\theta) = 1 - rac{P_{\eta}(\cos \theta)}{P_{\eta}(\cos \Theta)}.$$

By averaging on the spherical cap we obtain :

$$K_{\mathbf{v},t,\Theta}(\ell,\omega) = \frac{\sin^2 \Theta}{1 - \cos \Theta} \frac{P_{\eta_{\mathbf{v},t}}'(\cos \Theta)}{\eta_{\mathbf{v},t}(\eta_{\mathbf{v},t}+1)P_{\eta_{\mathbf{v},t}}(\cos \Theta)},\tag{5}$$

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Stokes number

$$s = R \sqrt{\frac{\omega \rho_0}{\mu}}$$

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Usual choice : radius of the circle at distance  $\ell$  from the apex.

$$R_{circle} = \ell \sin \Theta$$

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## High frequency correction : hydraulic radius

 $|\omega| \rightarrow \infty \Longrightarrow$  losses depend on surface-to-volume ratio <sup>5</sup>.

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## High frequency correction : hydraulic radius

 $|\omega| \rightarrow \infty \implies$  losses depend on surface-to-volume ratio<sup>5</sup>. Using the hydraulic radius corrects this effect.

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## Causality and passivity of the immitances

In the complex plane, with Laplace parameter  $\mathfrak{s} = i\omega \in \mathbb{C}$ , operators  $Z_v$ and  $Y_t$  are *positive real* :

- $\operatorname{\mathsf{Re}}(Z_{\nu}(\mathfrak{s})) \geq 0$  for  $\operatorname{\mathsf{Re}}(\mathfrak{s}) \geq 0.$
- $Z_{\nu}(\bar{\mathfrak{s}}) = \overline{Z_{\nu}(\mathfrak{s})}$
- $\rightarrow$  Causal and passive operators.



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## Comparison with other models

Comparison on short, closed cone (small Stokes number).



- Reference : 3D Kampinga<sup>6</sup>
- Zwikker-Kosten<sup>7</sup> (with length correction)
- Proposed model : K<sub>v,t</sub> of spherical caps

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## Conclusion and prospects

Does conicity influence acoustic losses?

- Generalization of Zwikker-Kosten model to cones
- Formula for  $K_v, K_t$  parametrized by  $\Theta$
- Similar coefficients, especially when using hydraulic radius
- Passive operators
- Correction amplitude 10 to 100 times smaller than difference with 3D

- More numerical comparisons
- Influence of wall porosity/roughness
