Conclusion

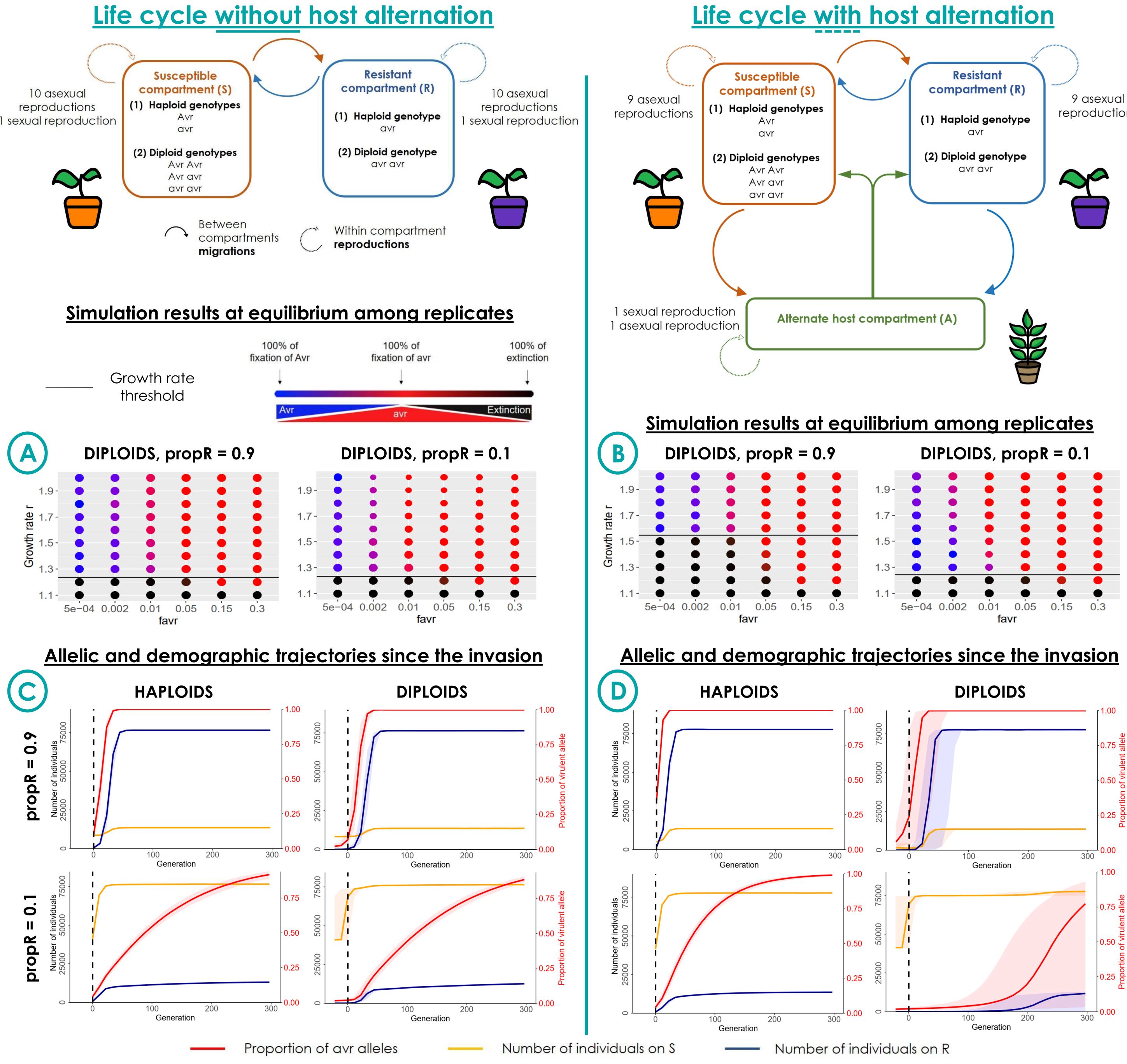
Impact of the ploidy:

 \rightarrow Ploidy has a strong impact on evolutionary trajectories, with much greater stochasticity and delayed times of resistance breakdown for diploids. This result emphasizes the importance of **genetic drift** in this system: as the virulent avr allele is recessive, positive selection on resistant hosts only applies to homozygous individuals, which may lead to population collapse at low frequencies of the virulent allele.

Impact of the life cycle:

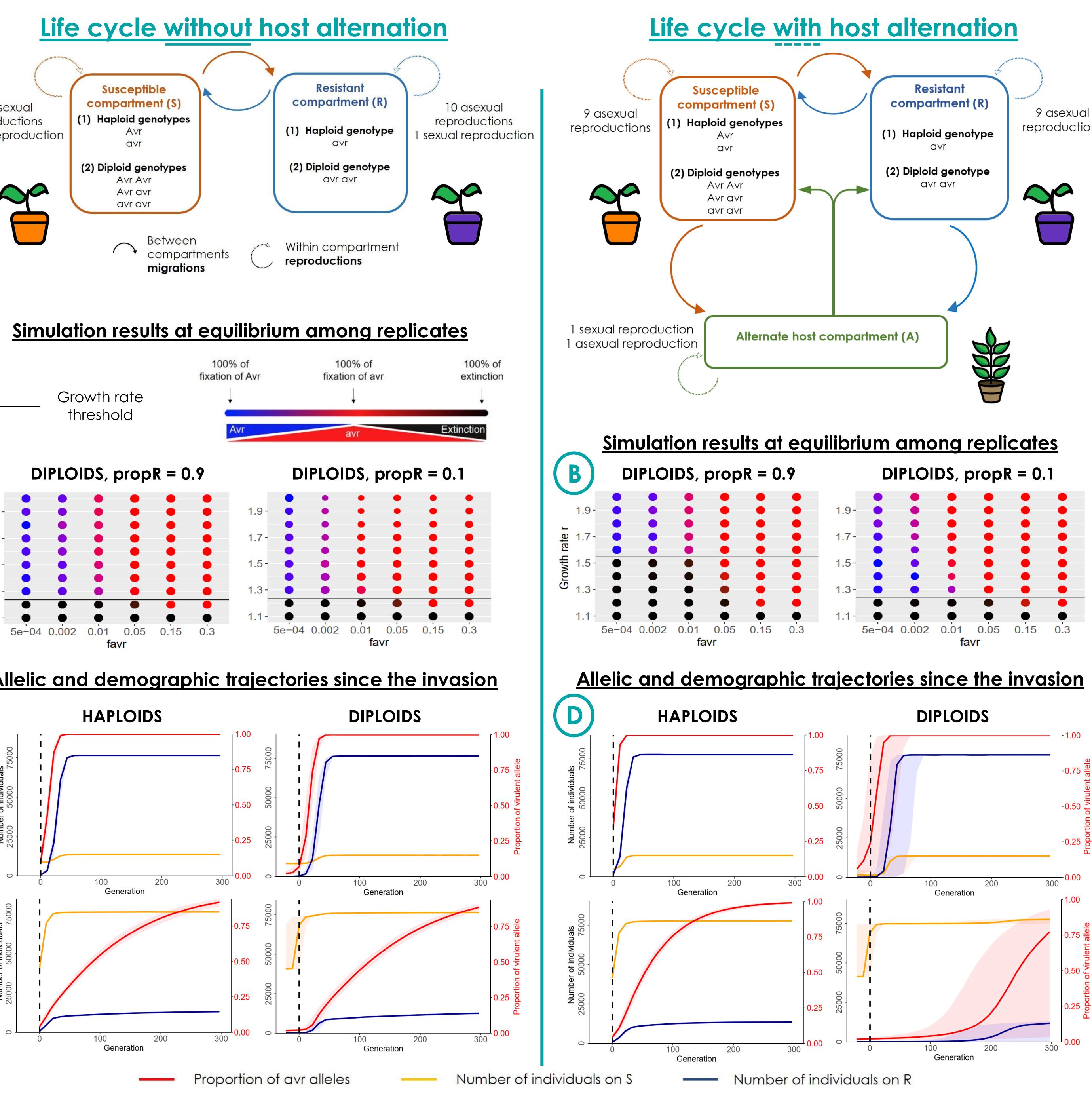
 \rightarrow With host alternation, the probability that the pathogen population collapses strongly increases with the proportion of resistant hosts in the landscape. Therefore, resistance breakdown events occurring at high proportions of resistant hosts frequently amount to evolutionary rescue.

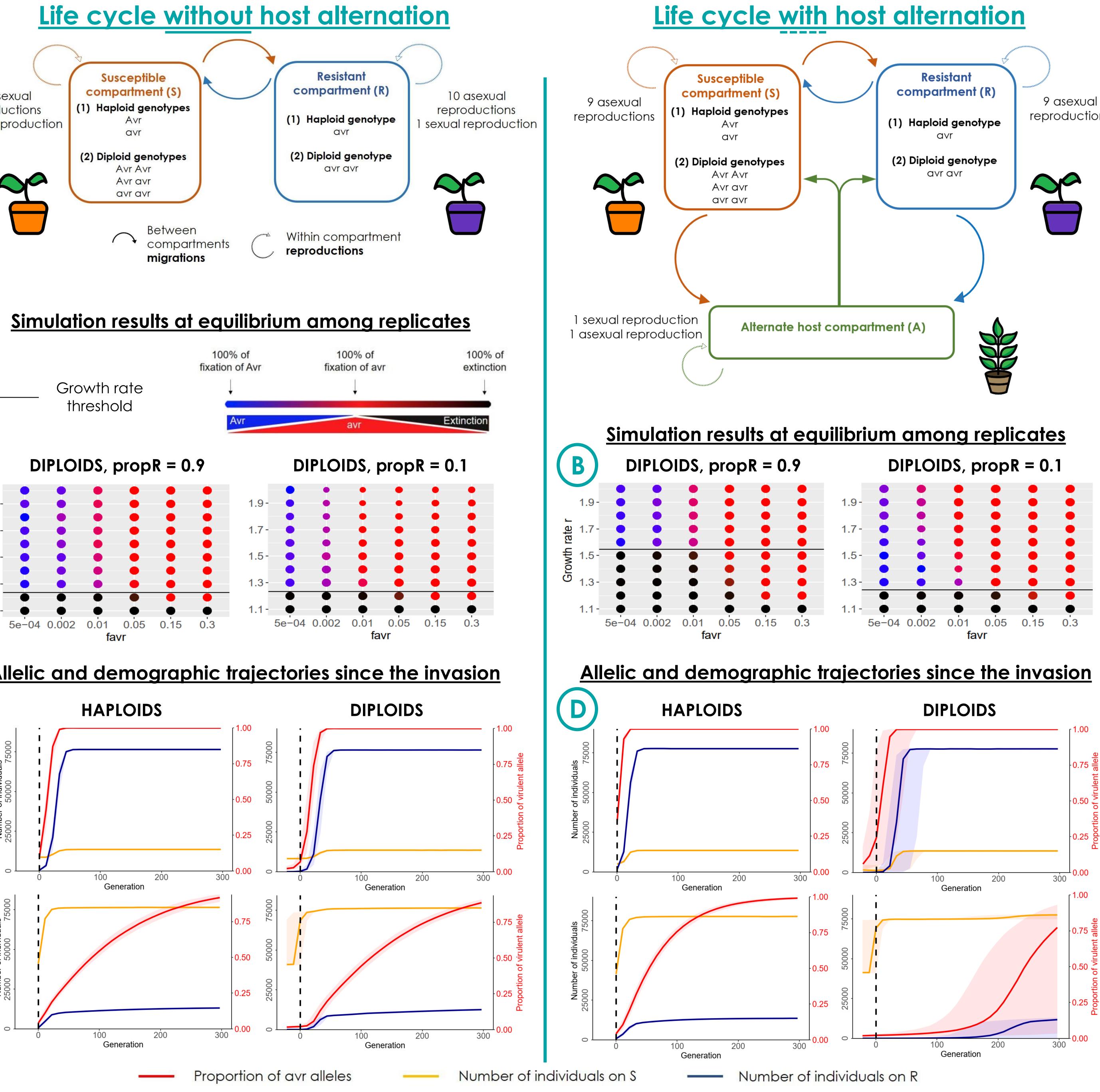
 \rightarrow Life cycles correspond to two selection without host alternation (soft regimes: the resistance breakdown is selection mainly driven by the migration rate. Conversely, host alternation (hard selection) resembles an all-or-nothing game, with trajectories caused by stochastic the redistributions the allele recurrent on alternate host.

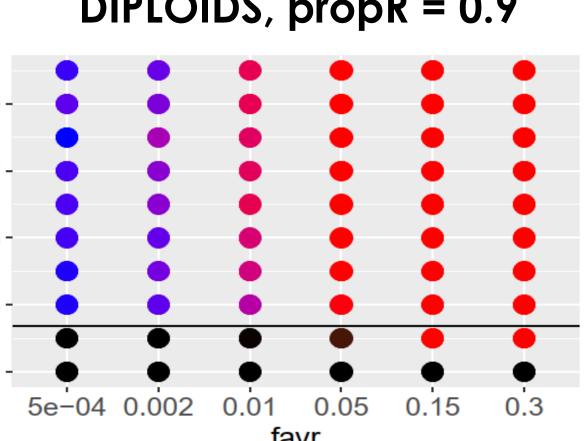


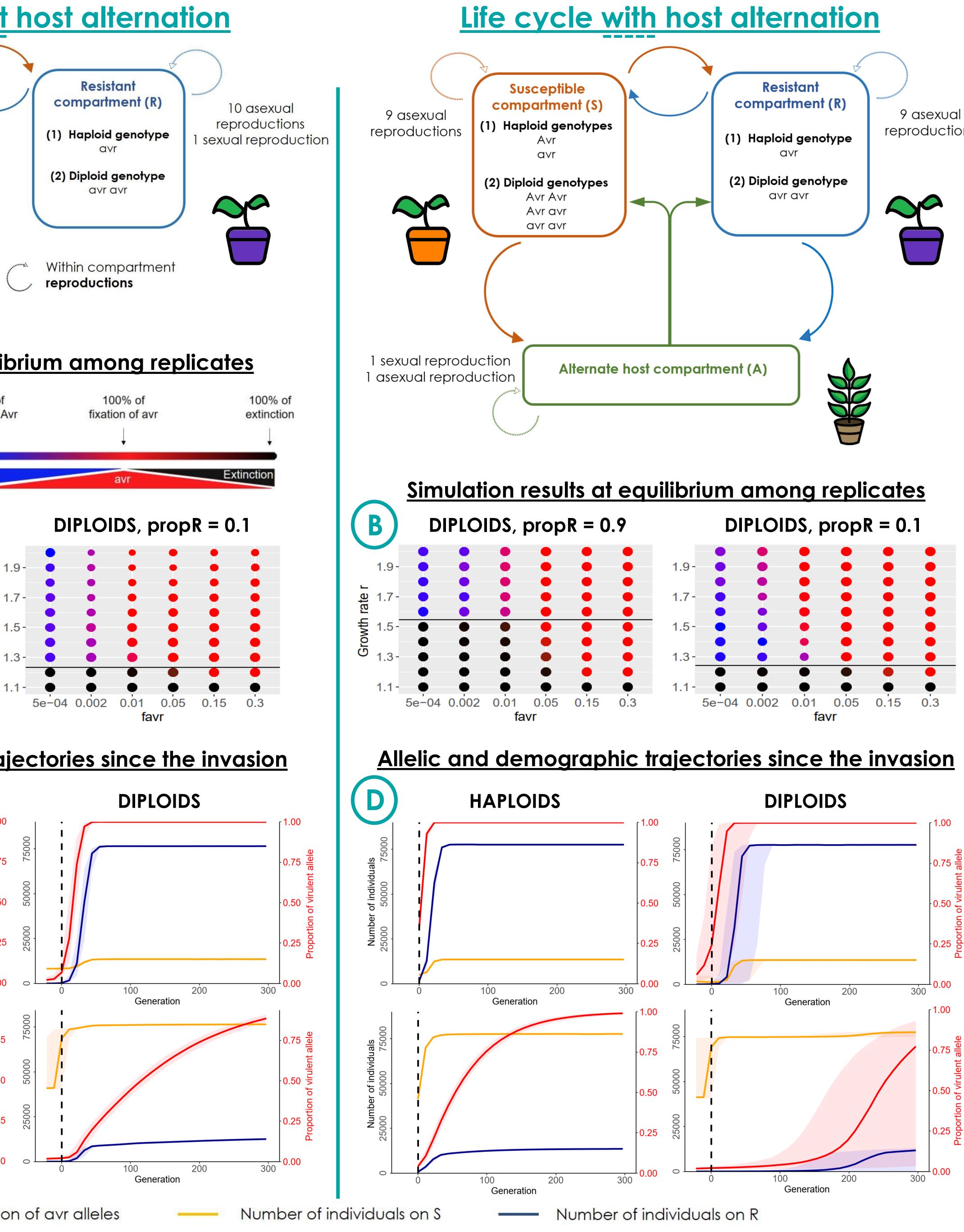
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Generation 0 corresponds to the generation of invasion of the R compartment. Colored intervals correspond to the 95% confidence intervals.

Parameters

propR : proportion of resistant hosts in the landscape

favr: initial proportion of virulent avr alleles in the population

Results

- \rightarrow 3 equilibria (A, B):
- 1) Fixation of the
- avirulent Avr allele
- 2) Fixation of the virulent avr allele
- 3) Extinction of the pathogen population
- \rightarrow Growth rate threshold (A, B)below which we observe either extinction of population or fixation of avr in cases of evolutionary rescue
- \rightarrow Higher probabilities of extinction for diploids with host alternation (A, B)
- \rightarrow Higher dependency on propR with host alternation (A, B, C, D)
- \rightarrow Higher stochasticity in the resistance durability for diploids with host alternation (C, D)
- \rightarrow Higher speed of increase in the virulent avr allele for high propR (C, D)
