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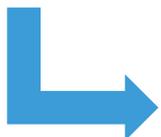
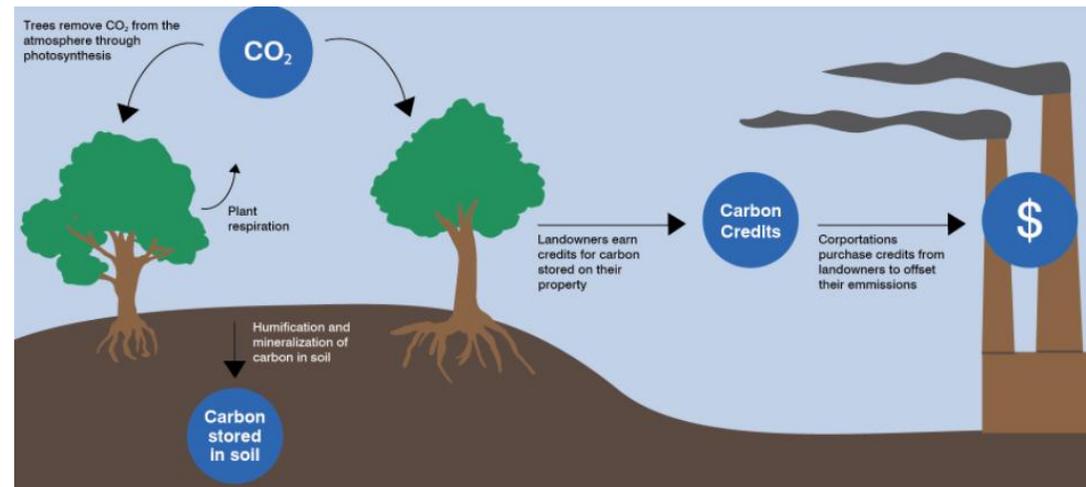

Satellite observation dataset within a larger systemic/holistic observatory

Hot semi-arid biomes and their soils as sinks of global C:

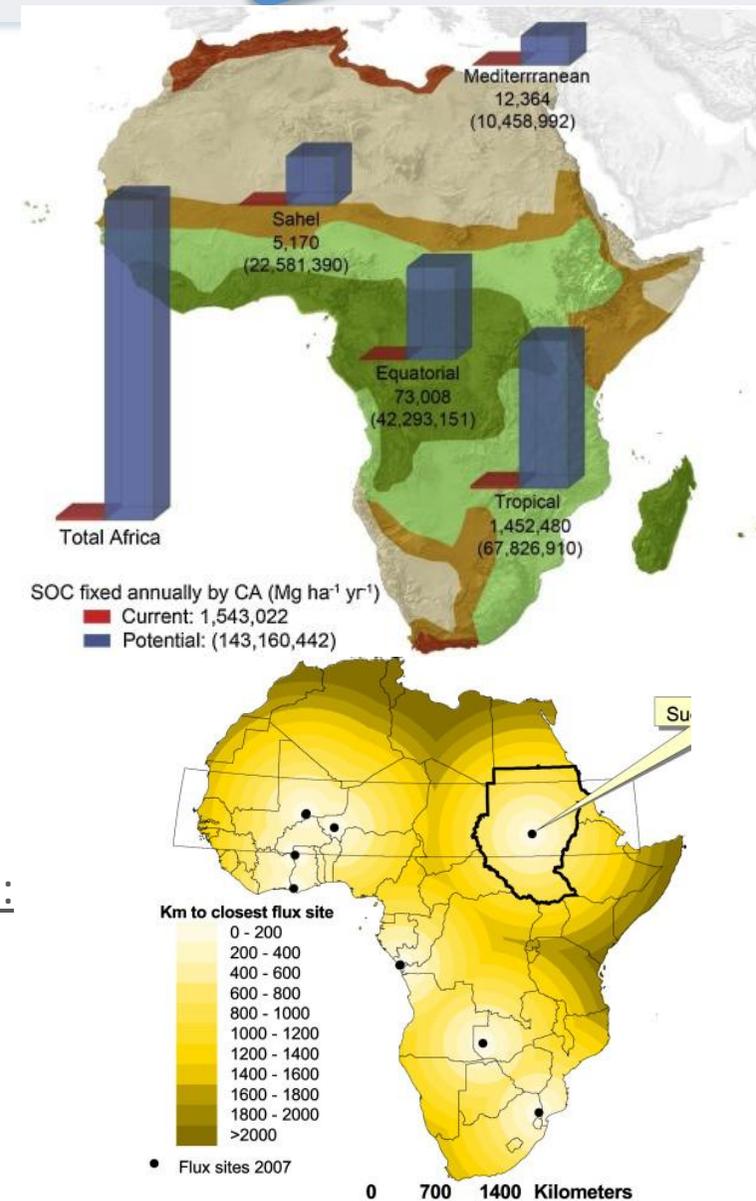
- ~ 50% of emerged land (IPCC, 2021)
- Very high levels of Net Ecosystem Exchanges (Tagesson et al., 2015)

Influence of sahelian agroecosystems on the continental carbon cycle:

- Strong dependencies to pluvial systems mixing agriculture with pastoralism
- High population rates = high needs
- Policies: re-forestation, setting up of Natural Regeneration Techniques and inscription within Rural Code (i.e. Republic of Niger)

Terrestrial carbon related metrics, indicators, products and analysis:

- Strong needs to be observed, surveyed, assessed, routined, mapped from a holistic way

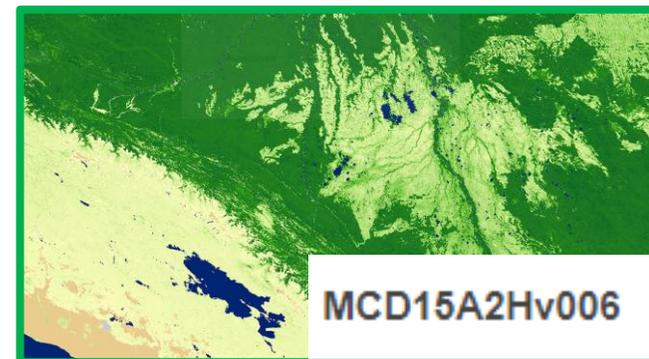
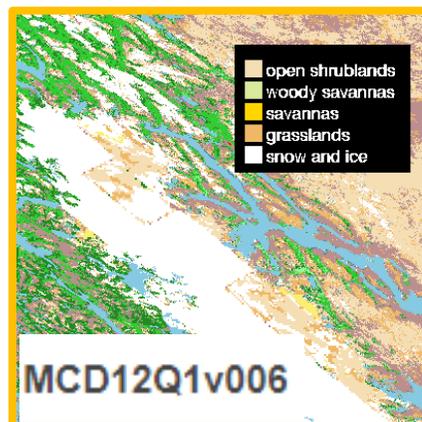
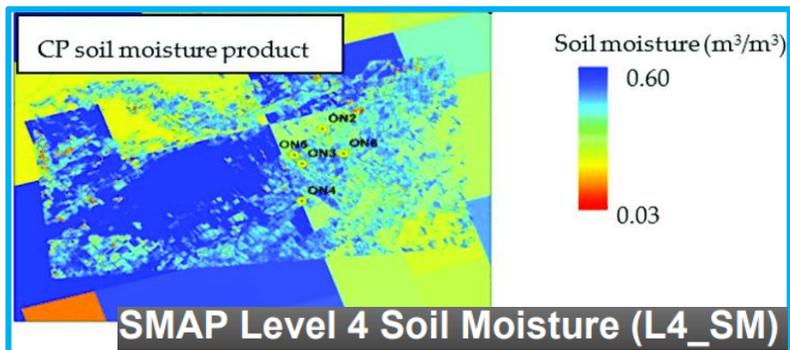

2. Material (1)

SMAP L4 Global Daily Carbon Net Ecosystem Exchange

- Global Primary Productivity (GPP), Net Ecosystem Exchange (NEE), Heterotrophic Respiration (HR), Soil Organic Carbon (SOC)
- Time series : 2015-2020, daily measurement; Spatial resolution : 9 km
- Model output: fusion of
 - GMAO/GEOS5 meteorological data (daily, spatial res. 27 km)
 - **SMAP L4 Surface & Root Zone Soil Moisture (3 hours, 9 km)**
 - **Plant Functional Types MOD12Q1 (yearly, 500 m)**
 - **fPAR & LAI MOD15A2 (8 days, 500 m)**

Regional & local consistency of SMAP C products

- Match with literature findings on related ecosystems
 - Strong periodicity of NEE-RMSE : RMSE comprised within 0,5; 1,5 at the end of the wet season
- => Reinforcing dataset trustability by comparing with local eddy fluxes towers

Assignments of regional and local trends: too soon for now, but...

- 7 years (e.g. peaks and lows)
 - Other components to explain such geographical heterogeneity ?
- ⇒ Longer time series to confirm results (i.e. MODIS GPP)

Conclusions

1. What are SMAP Carbon products? What could(nt) they say?
⇒ **Daily assimilation dataset, giving main C fluxes at a 9 km level (2015-today)**
2. Pre-processing of SMAP Carbon products for applied uses?
⇒ **Geo selection: local or regional (e.g. point/area)**
⇒ **Spatial and temporal QA assessment (NEE-RMSE)**
3. Carbon exchanges increasing/decreasing in central Sahel?
⇒ **NEE is decreasing for the studied area...**
4. Interannual variability? Differences between landscapes?
⇒ **... but a lot of spatial heterogeneity (locally)**

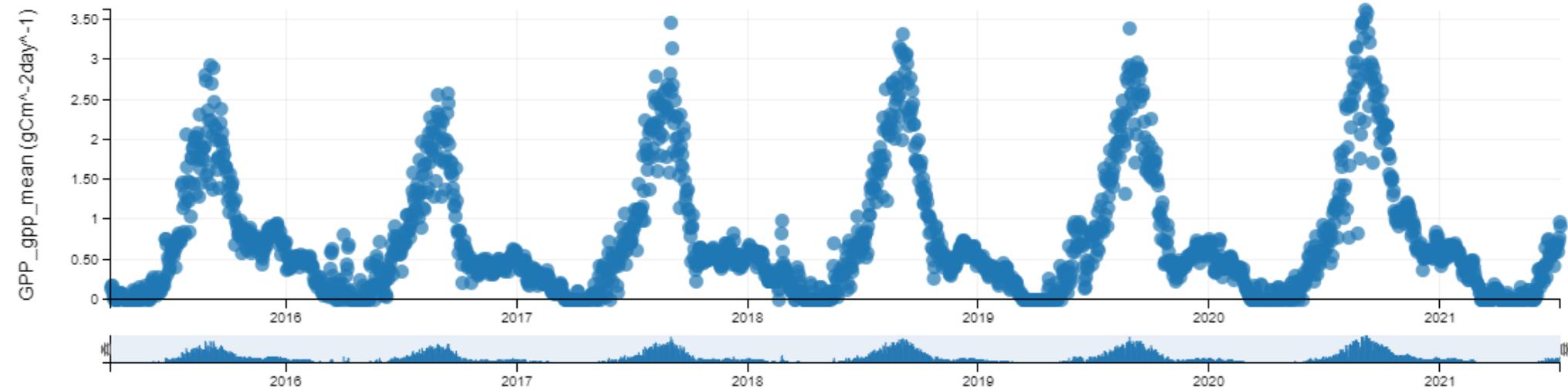
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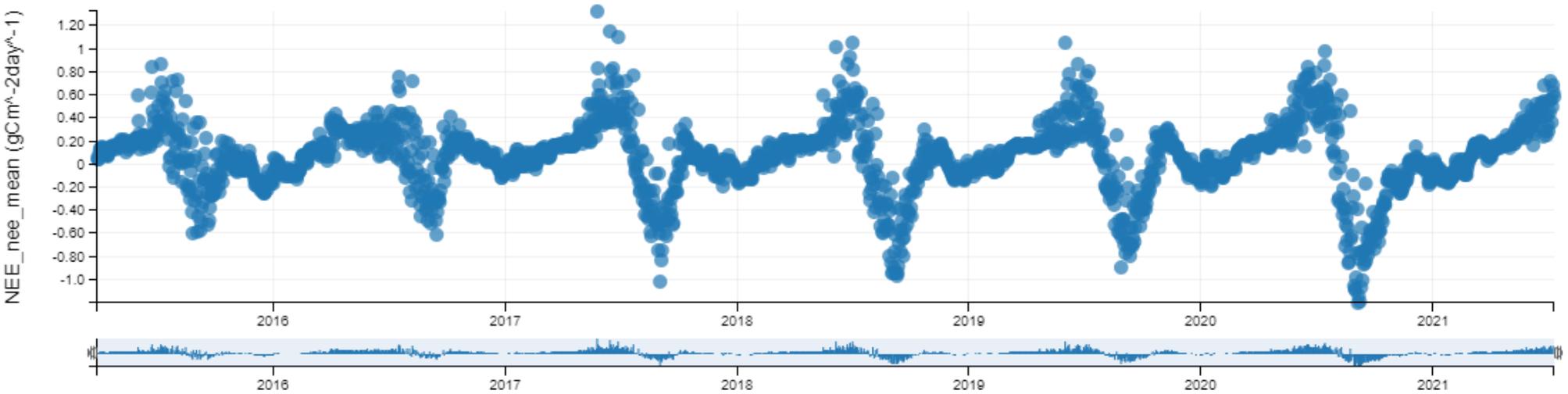

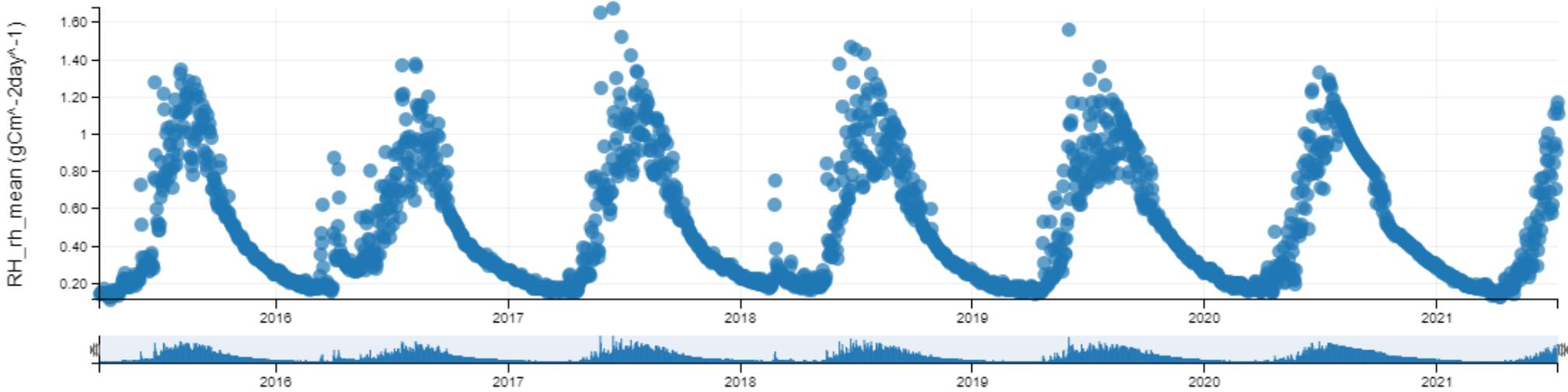
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NEE – Wankama site



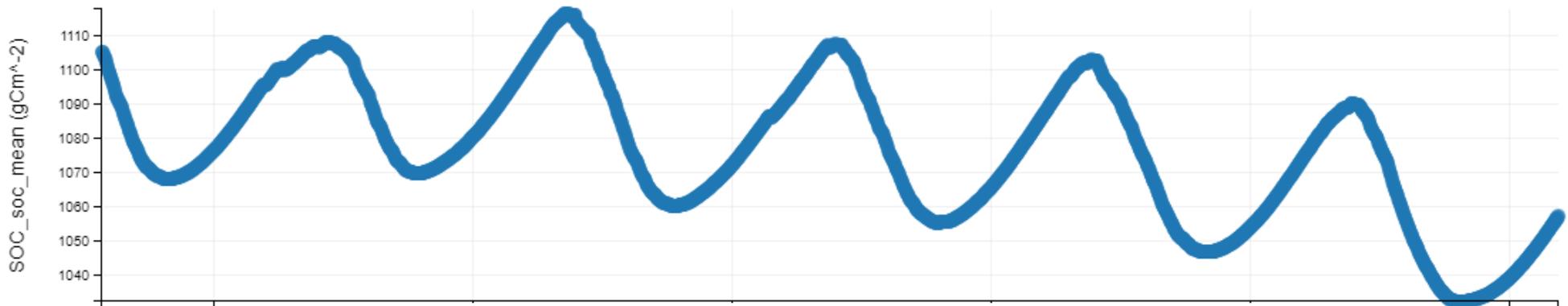
