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Highly-Doped Er:LiYF₄ Waveguiding Epitaxial Films for ~2.7 μm Laser Sources

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Abstract: Single-crystalline oriented highly-doped 9.6 at.% Er^{3+} :LiYF₄ waveguiding thin films (30-50 µm) are grown by Liquid Phase Epitaxy. Their polarized spectroscopic properties are studied. The maximum stimulated-emission cross-section is 1.61×10^{-20} cm² at 2720 nm for π -polarization. © 2020 The Author(s)

Erbium (Er^{3+}) ions are well-known due to their mid-IR emission at ~2.7 µm owing to the ${}^{4}\text{I}_{11/2} \rightarrow {}^{4}\text{I}_{13/2}$ transition. ~2.7 µm Er lasers are of practical importance for medicine, infrared countermeasures, spectroscopy and pumping of mid-infrared OPOs. The difficulty in developing ~2.7 µm Er lasers is the self-terminating nature of the ${}^{4}\text{I}_{11/2} \rightarrow {}^{4}\text{I}_{13/2}$ transition. It is typically overcome by using high Er doping levels [1]. Among the gain media for mid-IR Er lasers, fluoride crystals have attracted a lot of attention. For example, Er^{3+} -doped yttrium lithium fluoride (LiYF₄) crystal was successfully employed in ~2.7 µm lasers [2].

Waveguide lasers emitting in the near- and mid-IR are of interest for the development of compact ultrafast oscillators [3]. Few results concerning ~2.7 μ m waveguide lasers have been already reported [4]. Rare-earth-doped LiYF₄ is well-known for fabrication of active waveguides by Liquid Phase Epitaxy (LPE) [5]. However, so far, Er³⁺:LiYF₄ active layers were not fabricated. In the present work, we aimed to grow highly Er³⁺-doped LiYF₄ single-crystalline oriented waveguiding films and to study their spectroscopic properties relevant for ~2.7 μ m laser operation.

Er³⁺:LiYF₄ thin-films were grown on (001)-oriented bulk undoped LiYF₄ substrates by LPE using a batch with a composition of 73 mol% LiF – 27 mol% (YF₃ + ErF₃); LiF was used as a solvent also entering into the composition of the solute. The growth temperature was 729.5 – 730.5 °C and the growth duration was 45 min. The Er³⁺ doping level in the flux was 11 at.% and the segregation coefficient for Er³⁺ ions $K_{\rm Er}$ was 0.88. The thickness of the films was in the range 30 – 50 µm (growth rate: 0.7-1.1 µm/min). The structure (cubic, sp. gr. C⁶_{4h} – *I*4₁/*a*) and orientation of the films were confirmed by single-crystal XRD. The film composition was studied by EDX.

Figure 1(a) shows an optical image of a polished end-facet of the $Er^{3+}:LiYF_4/LiYF_4$ epitaxy. The film / substrate interface is clear, there are no cracks nor secondary phases in the film. The film thickness, $t = 38\pm 2 \mu m$, is nearly constant over the substrate area deep in the flux. The morphology of the as-grown top surface reveals smooth "hills and valleys" landscape and crystallized residual LiF solvent which is typical for LPE films, Fig. 1(b).

The absorption cross-section, σ_{abs} , spectra for transitions of Er^{3+} ions from the ground-state ${}^{4}I_{15/2}$ to the excited-states ${}^{4}I_{13/2}$, ${}^{4}I_{11/2}$ and ${}^{4}I_{9/2}$ are shown in Fig. 2(a) for the available σ -polarization. For the most common pump transition (${}^{4}I_{15/2} \rightarrow {}^{4}I_{11/2}$), $\sigma_{abs} = 0.46 \times 10^{-20} \text{ cm}^2$ at 972.3 nm and the absorption bandwidth (FWHM) is 6.2 nm. For the ${}^{4}I_{15/2} \rightarrow {}^{4}I_{9/2}$ one, σ_{abs} is much lower, $\sim 0.05 \times 10^{-20} \text{ cm}^2$ at 781 nm, but the absorption band is broader.

The stimulated-emission (SE) cross-sections, σ_{SE} , for the ${}^{4}I_{11/2} \rightarrow {}^{4}I_{13/2}$ transition in emission were calculated using the Füchtbauer–Ladenburg (F-L) equation, Fig. 2(b), based on the polarized luminescence spectra and using a radiative lifetime $\tau_{rad} = 6.7$ ms and a luminescence branching ratio $\beta = 15\%$ determined from the Judd-Ofelt theory. As the

considered transition has both electric-dipole (ED) and magnetic-dipole (MD) contributions, three polarization states were considered: σ ($E \perp c, k \perp c$), α ($E \perp c, k \parallel c$) and π ($E \parallel c, k \perp c$) - LiYF₄ is optically uniaxial with the optical axis parallel to the *c*-axis. The maximum σ_{SE} is 1.61×10^{-20} cm² at 2720 nm and at longer wavelengths where the laser operation is expected (owing to the ESA), it is 0.69×10^{-20} cm² at 2812 nm (both values correspond to π -polarization).

The crystal-field splitting of the multiplets involved in the ~2.7 μ m laser transition (⁴I_{11/2} and ⁴I_{13/2}) is revealed using LT (12 K) spectroscopy, Fig. 2(c).

The luminescence lifetimes τ_{lum} of different multiplets of Er^{3+} ions (from ${}^{4}I_{13/2}$ to ${}^{4}S_{3/2} + {}^{2}H_{11/2}$) were systematically studied, Fig. 3. For the levels involved in the ~2.7 µm laser transition, $\tau_{lum}({}^{4}I_{11/2}) = 2.71$ ms and $\tau_{lum}({}^{4}I_{13/2}) = 8.36$ ms.

The fabricated films exhibit a positive refractive index contrast, $\Delta n = n_{\text{film}} - n_{\text{substrate}} \approx 2 \times 10^{-3}$ owing to the effect of Er^{3+} dopant ions. The waveguiding properties of the films are confirmed by coupling the pump radiation at 972 nm from a Ti:sapphire laser. The waveguide laser experiments are in progress.

To conclude, highly-doped single-crystalline oriented Er^{3+} :LiYF₄ thin-films (thickness: up to 50 µm) of high optical quality are grown on bulk LiYF₄ substrates by LPE. They exhibit intense mid-IR emission at ~2.7 µm and weak quenching of the ⁴I_{11/2} lifetime, as well as waveguiding properties. Er^{3+} :LiYF₄ epitaxial films are promising for mid-IR waveguide lasers. Further work will focus on laser experiments and adjustment of the Er^{3+} doping level in order to optimize energy-transfer processes populating the upper laser level.

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
