Implementation of interstate fisheries management program American Shad Benchmark Stock Assessment (ASMFC, 2020)

## > Main knowledge gaps

#### Allee Effect:

Positive relationship between aspects of fitness and population size Decreased per capita growth rate at small population sizes (Encyclopedia of Ecology, 2008)



#### Iteroparity

Reproducing several times during a life time

#### Log Likelihood

Provide information on the global model accuracy regarding presences and absences

#### □ Spawner abundances

Number of spawners entering the river in spring to reproduce across the entire species distribution range

### □ Number of emerging

metapopulations (Hanski 1998) Populations that exchange more than 5% of fish are grouped into the same metapopulation until there is less than 5% of fish exchanges between metapopulations







**<u>RI</u>**: Shads do not mix in the ocean and stay in the vicinity of their natal river to grow at sea (*Rougier et al. 2014*) **<u>RIO</u>**: Shads display seasonal trophic migrations at sea to find more suitable conditions to grow (*Dadswel et al. 1987*)

Observation of the pristine distribution of American shad over 1900-1950



Simulated distribution of American shad in summer 1925 using the GR3D model under the RI hypothesis



Simulated distribution of American shad in summer 1925 using the GR3D model under the RIO hypothesis

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#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- Consideration of trophic migration routes at sea important for more realistic models
- □ Large-scale modeling approach consider the interdependencies between river basins through dispersal abilities
- In a climate change context, dispersal abilities are closely related to range-shift dynamics (Thomas et al. 2004)
