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## 1. General information

All reactions were carried out under inert atmosphere, in oven-dried glassware, using dry solvents unless otherwise specified. All commercially available compounds were purchased from Aldrich Chemical Co., Acros Organics, Alfa Aesar or Carbosynth and used as received. Analytical thin layer chromatography (TLC) was performed on silica gel plates (Merck $60 \mathrm{~F}_{254}$ ) visualized either with a UV lamp ( 254 nm ) or by using solutions of $p$-anisaldehyde/sulfuric acid/acetic acid ( AcOH ) in ethanol (EtOH) or $\mathrm{KMnO}_{4} / \mathrm{K}_{2} \mathrm{CO}_{3} / \mathrm{AcOH}$ in water followed by heating. Flash chromatography was performed on silica gel (60-230 mesh) unless otherwise specified. Organic extracts were dried over anhydrous $\mathrm{MgSO}_{4} .{ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR and ${ }^{13} \mathrm{C}$ NMR spectra were recorded on Bruker Avancell 500 spectrometer, at 500 MHz (H value) or 125 MHz (C value) in $\mathrm{CDCl}_{3}$ unless otherwise specified. Spectra were referenced to residual chloroform ( $7.26 \mathrm{ppm},{ }^{1} \mathrm{H} ; 77.0 \mathrm{ppm},{ }^{13} \mathrm{C}$ ). Chemical shifts are reported in ppm, multiplicities are indicated by s (singlet), d (doublet), t (triplet), q (quartet), p (pentet), and $m$ (multiplet or overlap of nonequivalent resonances), dd (doublet of doublet), td (triplet of doublet), sept (septuplet) and br (broad signal). Coupling constants, $J$, are reported in hertz (Hz). All NMR spectra were obtained at 300 K unless otherwise specified. IR spectra were obtained using a spectrum on FT-IR spectrometer (Perkin Elmer). High Resolution mass spectra were recorded on a ThermoFischer Exactive Orbitrap spectrometer.

In the case of the picolinate based derivatives, flash chromatography was performed with analytical-grade solvents using Aldrich silica gel (technical grade, pore size $60 \AA$, 230-400 mesh particle size). Flexible plates ALUGRAM® Xtra SIL G UV254 from MACHEREY-NAGEL were used for TLC. Compounds were detected by UV irradiation (Bioblock Scientific). NMR spectra were recorded with a Bruker AVANCE III $300\left({ }^{1} \mathrm{H}, 300 \mathrm{MHz}\right.$ and $\left.{ }^{13} \mathrm{C}, 75 \mathrm{MHz}\right)$ or a Bruker AVANCE DRX500 $(1 \mathrm{H}, 500$ $\mathrm{MHz} ;{ }^{13} \mathrm{C}, 125 \mathrm{MHz}$ ). Chemical shifts are given in ppm relative to TMS and coupling constants J in Hz. High resolution mass spectroscopy measurements were performed at Centre Commun de Spectrométrie de Masse (Villeurbanne, France). Column chromatography was performed using Acros Ogranics ( $0.035-0.70 \mathrm{~mm}$ ) silicagel.

## 2. Synthetic procedures and characterization data

## 4-bromo-16-hydroxy[2.2]paracyclophane (( $\pm$ )-2).



To a solution of $\mathbf{1}$ ( 1 eq., $0.7 \mathrm{~g}, 1.91 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) in THF ( 70 mL ) was slowly added the solution of $n-B u L i\left(2.75 \mathrm{eq} ., 2.5 \mathrm{M}, 2.1 \mathrm{~mL}, 5.25 \mathrm{mmol}\right.$ ) at $-78{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. After 30 min , $\mathrm{B}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}(9.7$ eq., $1.92 \mathrm{~g}, 2.1 \mathrm{~mL}, 18.5 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) was added, the resulting mixture was allowed to warm to r.t and stirred overnight. Subsequently, $\mathrm{NaOH}_{\mathrm{aq}}(0.44$ eq., 1 M , $0.841 \mathrm{~mL}, 0.841 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) and aq $30 \% \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{O}_{2}(9.69 \mathrm{eq} ., 2.1 \mathrm{~g}, 2.1 \mathrm{~mL}, 18.5 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) were added and the mixture was stirred for 1 h . The reaction was quenched by the addition of a sat $\mathrm{NH}_{4} \mathrm{Cl}$ aqueous solution. The resulting mixture was extracted with DCM. The combined organic layers were dried over $\mathrm{MgSO}_{4}$ and concentrated under reduced pressure. 4-bromo-16-hexyloxy[2.2]paracyclophane (( $\pm$ )-3).


To a solution of ( $\mathbf{\pm}$ )-2 ( 1 eq., $300 \mathrm{mg}, 0.989 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) in DMF ( 18 mL ) was added $\mathrm{K}_{2} \mathrm{CO}_{3}$ ( 2 eq., $273 \mathrm{mg}, 1.98 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) and 1-bromohexane ( $1.5 \mathrm{eq} ., 244 \mathrm{mg}, 0.209 \mathrm{~mL}$, 1.48 mmol ). The reaction mixture was stirred for 48 h at r.t under Ar , then poured into water, and extracted with ethyl acetate. The combined organic layer were washed with brine, dried over $\mathrm{MgSO}_{4}$, and concentrated in vacuo to give a crude mixture.

## 4-hexyloxy-16-formyl[2.2]paracyclophane (( $\pm$ )-4).

To a flame-dried round-bottomed flask was added ( $\pm$ )-3 ( 1 eq., $265 \mathrm{mg}, 0.684 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) and THF ( 26 mL ). The solution was cooled to $-78{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ in a dry ice/acetone bath and $n-\mathrm{BuLi}$ ( 2 eq., $2.5 \mathrm{M}, 0.547 \mathrm{~mL}, 1.37 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) was added dropwise via syringe turning the mixture yellow. The reaction was stirred for 1 h 30 min , then DMF ( $8 \mathrm{eq} ., 400 \mathrm{mg}$, $0.423 \mathrm{~mL}, 5.47 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) was added dropwise via syringe turning the mixture colourless. The solution was allowed to warm to r.t and stirred overnight. The mixture was quenched with a saturated aqueous $\mathrm{NH}_{4} \mathrm{Cl}$ solution, and THF was removed under vacuum. The resulting solution was taken up with DCM and washed three times with distilled water. The organic layer was collected, dried over $\mathrm{MgSO}_{4}$ and concentrated under reduced pressure. ## Synthesis of Bestmann-Ohira reagent:



NaH ( $1.5 \mathrm{eq} ., 144 \mathrm{mg}, 3.6 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) was suspended in toluene ( 6 ml ) and THF ( 1.4 mL ) at $0{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. Dimethyl acetylmethylphosphonate ( $1 \mathrm{eq} ., 420 \mathrm{mg}, 0.349 \mathrm{~mL}, 2.4 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) previously dissolved in toluene ( 3.5 mL ) was added to the suspension. The mixture was stirred for 1 h at $0{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. Then $p$-Toluenesulfonyl azide ( $1 \mathrm{eq} ., 473 \mathrm{mg}, 2.4 \mathrm{mmol}$ ) dissolved in toluene ( 2.5 mL ) was added. The reaction was stirred overnight at r.t, then the mixture was filtered over Celite ${ }^{\circledR}$, and the filtrate was concentrated under reduced pressure without heating. The desired product ( $460 \mathrm{mg}, 2.39 \mathrm{mmol}$, quantitative yield) was isolated as a yellow oil and used in the next synthetic steps without any further purification. Synthesis of 4-hexyloxy-16-ethynyl[2.2]paracyclophane (( $\pm$ )-5).


To a solution of $( \pm)-4(1 \mathrm{eq} ., 120 \mathrm{mg}, 0.357 \mathrm{mmol})$ and $\mathrm{K}_{2} \mathrm{CO}_{3}(2 \mathrm{eq} ., 98.6 \mathrm{mg}, 0.713$ mmol ) in $\mathrm{MeOH}(5.35 \mathrm{~mL}$ ) was added the Bestmann-Ohira reagent ( $5 \mathrm{eq} ., 342 \mathrm{mg}$, 1.78 mmol ) under an argon atmosphere. The resulting solution was stirred at rt for 48 h. The reaction mixture was then diluted with $\mathrm{Et}_{2} \mathrm{O}$, washed with a saturated aqueous solution of $\mathrm{NaHCO}_{3}$, and dried over $\mathrm{MgSO}_{4}$. ## Procedure for the synthesis of lanthanide complexes



All complexes were synthesised by first diluting the corresponding ligand (1 eq.) in $\mathrm{THF} / \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{O}$ ( $1: 1$ mixture, 4 mL ). Then, 1 M NaOH was added ( 1.5 mL ), and the reaction was heated at $40^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ until complete consumption of the starting material (followed by mass-spectrometry). Then, the pH was adjusted to 6.0 with HCl 0.2 M followed by the addition of the correspondent lanthanide salt $\mathrm{LnCl}_{3} \cdot 6 \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{O}$ ( 1.5 eq .). The mixture
was stirred at room temperature for 16 h . THF was then removed by evaporation, and the water layer was extracted with DCM ( 3 x 5 mL ). The organic phase was evaporated, and the resulting solid dried under vacuum to obtain the desired complexes in $92-94 \%$ yield.

## 3. Photophysical properties of the pCp chromophores and

 corresponding antennasAbsorption spectra were recorded on a JASCO V-650 spectrophotometer in diluted solution (ca. $10^{-5}$ or $10^{-6} \mathrm{~mol} \mathrm{~L}^{-1}$ ), using spectrophotometric grade solvents. Emission spectra were measured using Horiba-Jobin-Yvon Fluorolog-3 fluorimeter. The steady-state luminescence was excited by unpolarised light from a 450 W xenon continuous wave (CW) lamp and detected at an angle of $90^{\circ}$ for measurements of dilute solutions ( 10 mm quartz cuvette) by using a Hamamatsu R928. Near infra-red spectra were recorded using a liquid nitrogen cooled, solid indium/gallium/arsenic detector ( $850-1600 \mathrm{~nm}$ ) protected with a RG780 filter. All spectra were corrected for both excitation source light-intensity variation and emission spectral responses. Luminescence quantum yields Q were measured in diluted solutions with an absorbance lower than 0.1, by using the following Equation (1):

where $A(\lambda)$ is the absorbance (or optical density) at the excitation wavelength, $n$ the refractive index of the solvent and $D$ the integrated luminescence intensity. " $r$ " and "x" stand for reference and sample, respectively. Here, the reference is coumarin-153 in methanol $(\mathrm{Qr}=0.45){ }^{3}$ Excitations of reference and sample compounds were performed at the same wavelength. The reported results are the average of 4-5 independent measurements at various absorbances (comprised between 0.01-0.1) for
both sample and reference. The plot of the integrated luminescence intensity vs. absorbance gives a straight line with excellent correlation coefficients and the slope S can be determined for both sample (x) and reference (r). Equation (1) becomes Equation (2).

For singlet oxygen quantum yield determination $\varphi_{\Delta}$, the principle is exactly the same except that the singlet oxygen luminescence emission band (D) is integrated for both sample ( x ) and reference (r) compounds. $\mathrm{A}(\lambda)$ is the absorbance (or optical density) at the excitation wavelength. In this case it is very important that both experiments are conducted in the same solvent at exactly the same excitation wavelength ( $\mathrm{nx}=\mathrm{nr}$ ). The reported results are the average of $4-5$ independent measurements at various absorbances (comprised between 0.01-0.1) for both sample and reference. The plot of the integrated singlet oxygen luminescence intensity vs. absorbance gives straight line with excellent correlation coefficients and the slope $S$ can be determined for both sample ( $x$ ) and reference (r). In the present case, the reference is phenalenone ( $\varphi_{\Delta r}=$ 0.98 in dichloromethane). ${ }^{4}$

## 4. Computational details

Molecular calculations were carried out with the Gaussian 16 code. ${ }^{5}$ The global hybrid functional CAM-B3LYP was used both for ground state and excited state geometry optimizations. ${ }^{6}$ Structural optimizations and subsequent frequency calculations for both the ground and excited states were performed using an all electron Pople triple zeta basis set with one polarization function on all atoms and one diffuse function of heavier atoms, known as $6-311+\mathrm{G}(\mathrm{d}, \mathrm{p})$, for $\mathrm{H}, \mathrm{C}, \mathrm{N}$ and O atoms. ${ }^{7}$ Dichloromethane was considered as solvent using a PCM approach. ${ }^{8}$ The fluorescence energies were obtained by relaxing the first excited state geometry in TD-DFT at the same level of theory.

The Dalton 41 program ${ }^{9}$ was used to compute the SOC between the triplet states lower in energy than $S_{1}$ and the $S_{1}$ state at the $S_{1}$ optimized geometry using the quadric-response TD-DFT at the CAM-B3LYP/PCM level with the cc-pVDZ-DK basis set adapted for the Douglas-Kroll calculations. ${ }^{10}$ The Spin-Orbit Coupling was computed using the Douglas-Kroll Hamiltonian along with the spin-orbit mean field approach. Dichloromethane was considered as solvent using a PCM approach.

## 5. Photophysical properties of the ligands and related complexes

Europium(III) luminescence lifetimes were measured using the integrated flash-lamp (Horiba Jobin-Yvon, Fluorolog 3), and the luminescence decay was fitted with Origin software. For ytterbium (III) luminescence lifetimes, the sample was excited using a pulsed Nd:YAG laser (SpectraPhysics), operating at 10 Hz . Light emitted at right angles to the excitation beam was focused onto the slits of a monochromator (PTI120), which was used to select the appropriate wavelength. The growth and decay of the luminescence at selected wavelengths was detected using a Ge photodiode (Edinburgh Instruments, EI-P), and recorded using a digital oscilloscope (Tektronix TDS320) before being transferred for analysis. Luminescence lifetimes were obtained by iterative reconvolution of the detector response (obtained by using a scatterer) with exponential components for growth and decay of the metal-centred luminescence.
