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Introduction

Plastic waste and the products of its fragmentation (microplastics or "MPs", <5mm) pose a global and persistent threat to all ecosystems due to their ease of ingestion by a wide variety of species (Thompson, 2015). Monitor the occurrence of MPs is a necessary step to perform accurate risk assessment and elaborate prevention and remediation actions. However, for complex environmental matrices, such as sediments, the quantification of MPs is particularly challenging. MPs have to be separated from sediments prior to be analyzed. A broad diversity of protocols have been proposed in order to achieve this essential operation. Among them, density separation methods have been extensively used.

solutions (water, oil, water+oil, NaCl, NaCl+oil and Nal) in combination with to 3 agitation methods (manual stirring, centrifugation and air insuflation). Tests were performed with low (PE and PE-ABS) and high (PET, PA and PES) density polymers of four shapes (pellet, fragment, fiber and foam) for two kind of sediments (coarse and fine). not influence drastically separation efficiencies. Low density polymers were relatively well extracted with all solutions, at the exception of oil alone. High density polymers were more significantly recover with Nal. Finally, recoveries. According to this study, a 5 steps extracting procedure with a NaI solution at 1.8 g/L seems to be the most promising process.



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
