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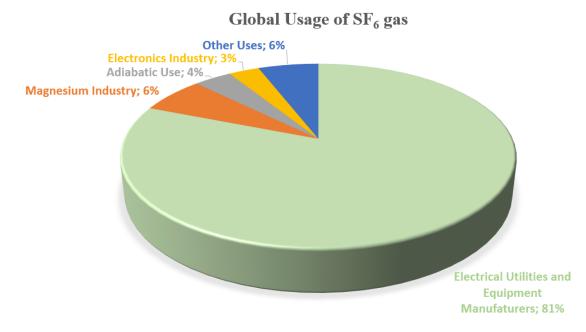




Introduction

Motivation

- Industrial applications of SF_6 and the need to replace it in electro technical applications
- Strong greenhouse warming potential (23900 on a 100 year time horizon)
- Search for replacement ongoing for 20 years especially in medium voltage applications with compressed air a promising candidate.

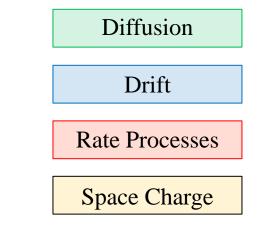

Streamer Modelling – Plasma Fluid Model

- Hydrodynamic model + Individual Reactions
- Mass conservation equations for electrons and ions: $\frac{\partial n_{xl}}{\partial t} + \nabla \cdot (-D_x \nabla n_{xl} - \mu_x n_{xl} E) = R_{xl}$ $n_{xl} = \ln(n_{e,p,n})$



• Poissons equation for electric potential ϕ :

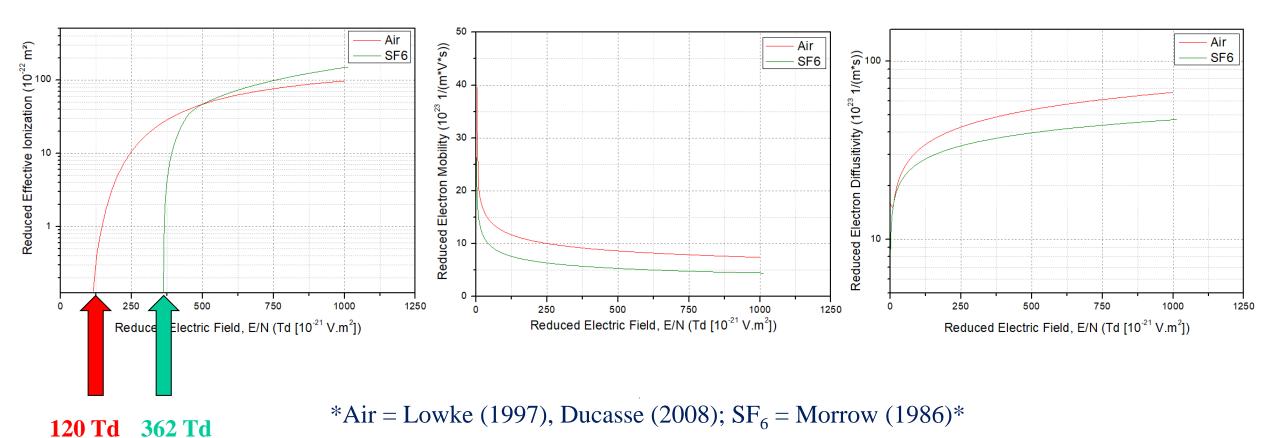
$$\nabla (\varepsilon_0 \varepsilon_r \, \nabla \phi) = -\frac{e(n_p - n_e - n_n)}{E}, \vec{E} = -\nabla \phi$$

• Photoionization model / Background ionization term.

Radius of curvature: 0.1 mm Gap Distance: 5 mm Background Ionization: Sb = 1e23 (1/m³.s)

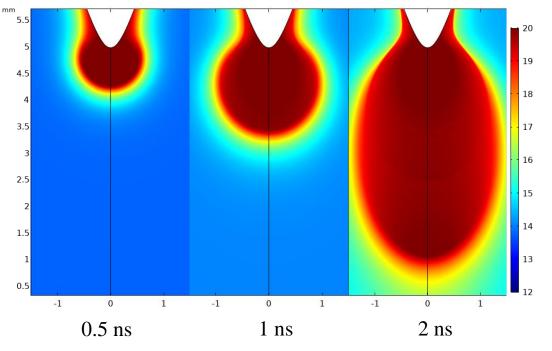

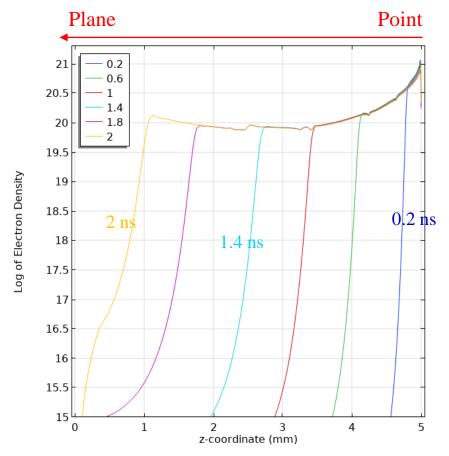

Streamer in Air at Atmospheric Pressure (Electron Density) $V_0 = +20 \text{ kV}, d = 5 \text{ mm}, \text{ rc} = 0.1 \text{ mm}, \text{ Sb} = 1e23 (1/m^3.s)$



- Two phases: Initiation and Radial Expansion phase; Propagation phase.
- Electron density in streamer $\sim 10^{20}$ m⁻³

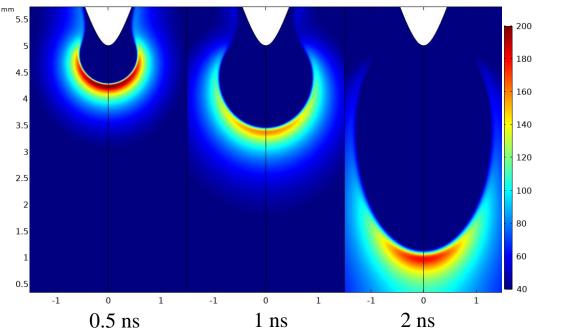


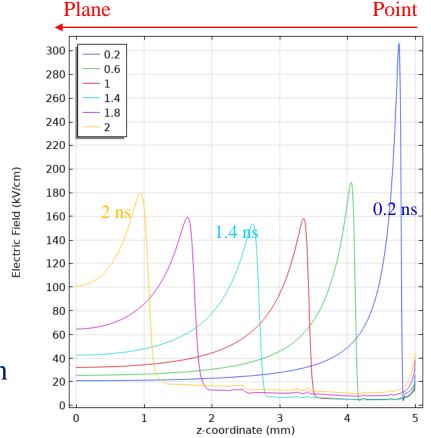

Conclusion

Streamer in Air at Atmospheric Pressure (Electric Field) $V_0 = +20 \text{ kV}, d = 5 \text{ mm}, \text{ rc} = 0.1 \text{ mm}, \text{ Sb} = 1e23 (1/m^3.s)$





- Electric field in streamer head at stable propagation between 140 and 160 kV/cm.
- Interaction with cathode results in increase in electric field.
- Channel radius of ~900 μ m and streamer velocity 2.27 mm/ns.

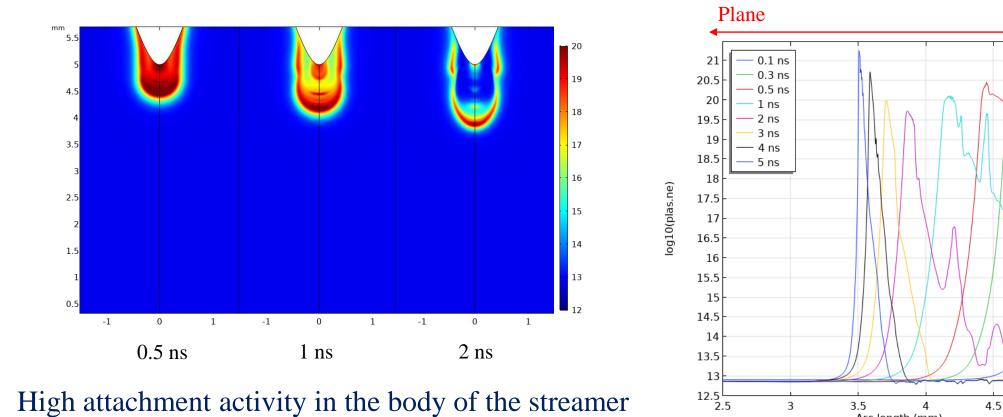

- High attachment activity in the body of the streamer • eventually leading to a stop in propagation.
- Gradual loss of conduction channel. ۲

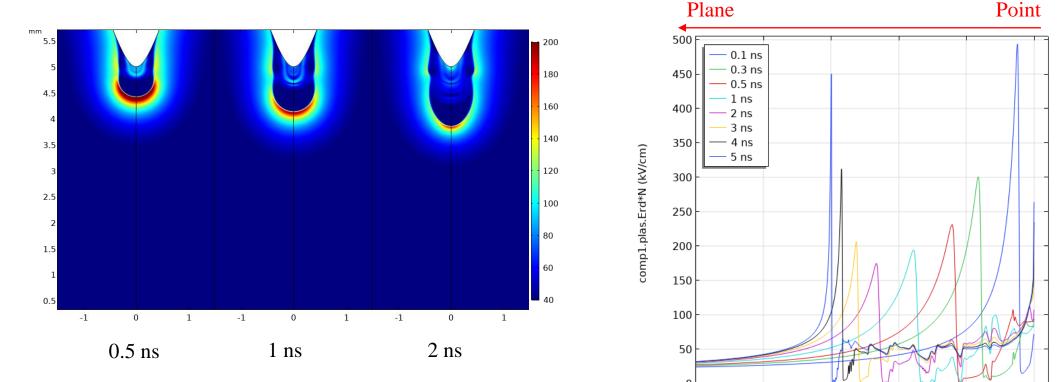

Streamer in SF₆ at Atmospheric Pressure (Electric Field) $V_0 = +20$ kV, d = 5 mm, rc = 0.1 mm, Sb = 1e23 (1/m³.s)



- When the propagation is halted, there is a thinning of the streamer head and an increase in electric field.
- Electric field in channel < 90 kV/cm required for propagation.

Streamer in SF₆ at Atmospheric Pressure Conclusion

- Streamer in Air with comparable results to literary works; velocity of 1 mm/ns.
- Streamer in SF_6 halts propagation about 1 mm into the 5 mm gap as opposed to in air where it crosses the gap.
- High loss processes in highly electronegative gases result in less conductive streamer channels and in the case of SF_6 , the total loss of conduction.
- To maintain propagation in SF_6 , the field in the channel should be equal to the field at which ionization = attachment.
- This is ~90 kV/cm in SF₆ at atmospheric pressure and from the simulations, fields of ~50 kV/cm are observed.
- In air, field is ~30 kV/cm but because of lower attachment rates, propagation can still occur even with lover fields in channel, fields of ~10 kV/cm observed in simulations.

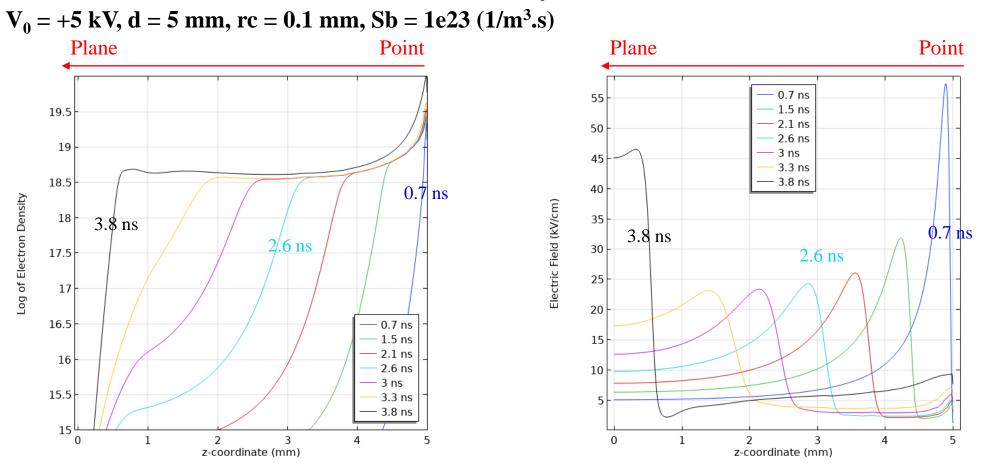

Radius of curvature: 0.1 mm Gap Distance: 5 mm Background Ionization: Sb = 1e23 (1/m³.s)

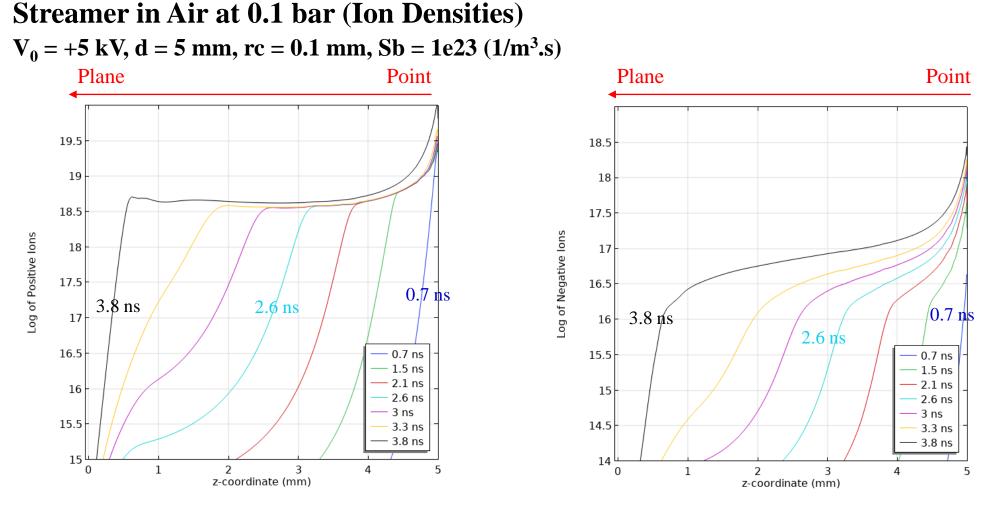
Streamer in Air at 0.1 bar (Electron Density and Electric Field)



- Electric field in streamer head is between 23 and 27 kV/cm.
- Channel radius of ~ 1.6 mm and streamer velocity 1.3 mm/ns

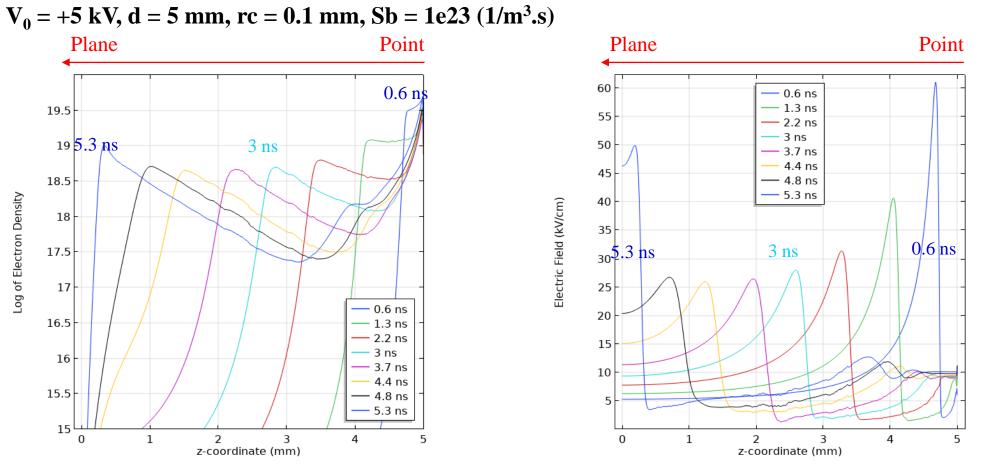
Conclusion



• Higher ionization rate compared to attachment rate results in a 2 order of magnitude difference between positive ion density and negative ion density

Streamer in SF₆ at 0.1 bar (Electron Density and Electric Field)



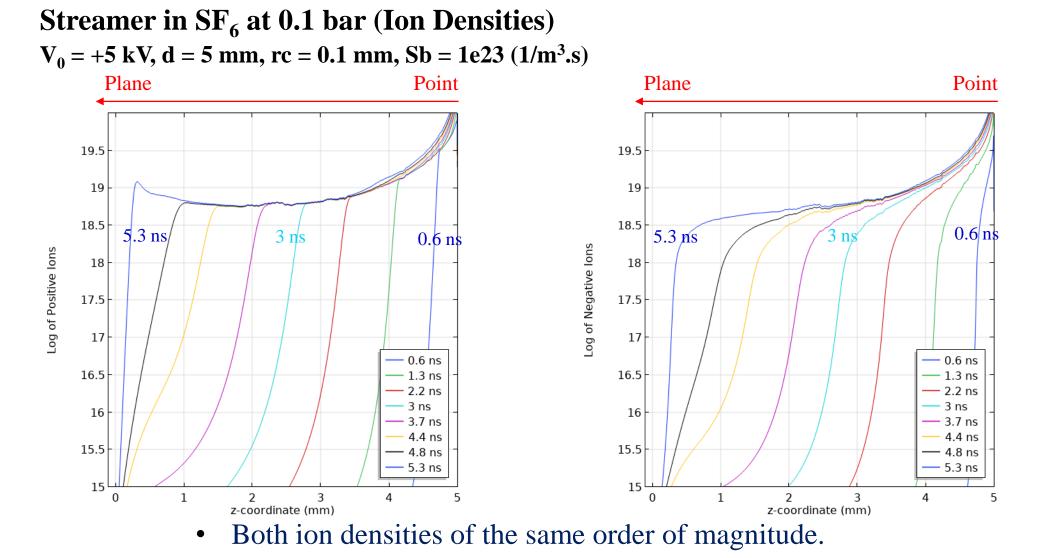
- Electric field in streamer head is between 25 and 30 kV/cm.
- Channel radius of ~ 800 μ m and streamer velocity 0.96 mm/ns.

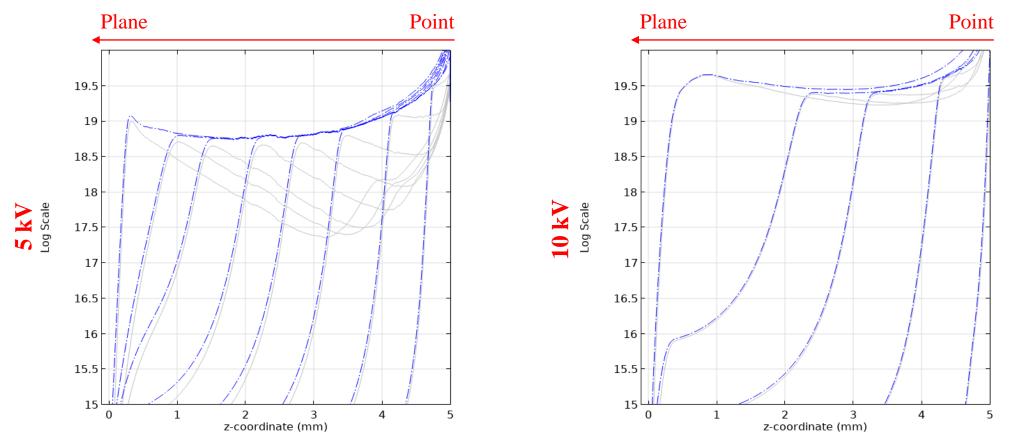
Conclusion



• Positive ion density almost constant. Negative ion density increases marginally with time. 14/18

Streamer in SF₆ at 0.1 bar (Positive Ion and Electron Densities)

 $V_0 = +5 \text{ kV}, +10 \text{ kV}, d = 5 \text{ mm}, \text{ rc} = 0.1 \text{ mm}, \text{ Sb} = 1e23 (1/m^3.s)$



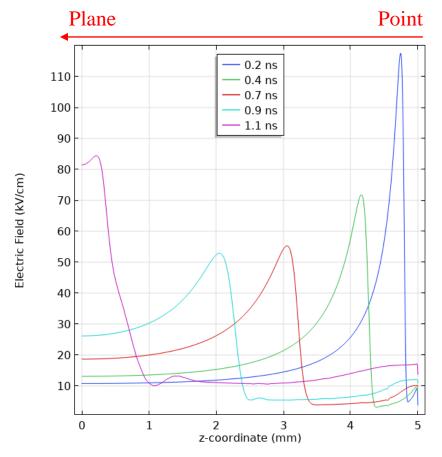
• Higher applied voltages result in higher electron density in the streamer channel because of an increase in the efective ionization

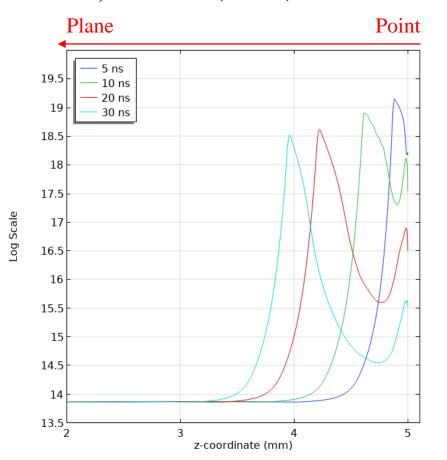


- Higher electric fields in the streamer head observed with increased applied voltage.
 - At stable propagation, electric field in streamer head between 50 and 60 kV/cm

Conclusion

Streamer in SF₆ at 0.1 bar (Electron Density) $V_0 = +2 \text{ kV}, d = 5 \text{ mm}, \text{ rc} = 0.1 \text{ mm}, \text{ Sb} = 1e23 (1/\text{m}^3.\text{s})$



• Same reduced electric field at at 0.1 bar and 1 bar, the loss of the conduction channel and the halt of the streamer propagation was observed.

- On summarising:
 - ✓ The drift diffusion approach for streamer modelling cannot accurately capture the discharge in SF_6 at 1 bar due to the stepped leader transition.
 - ✓ In lower pressures, < 0.3 bar, the hydrodynamic approach can be used to analyse streamer discharges as have been done for 0.1 bar.
 - ✓ High electronegativity of SF_6 plays a role in the discharge formation as it results in higher loss processes in the channel and a reduction in it's conduction.
 - ✓ Comparing to streamers in air at same pressure, the diameter is about half that of air but the velocity of the streamer in both gases is ~1 mm/ns.
 - ✓ When the reduced electric field is scaled according, similar behaviour at atmospheric pressure is observed for sub atmospheric pressure also.
- Perspectives
 - □ Using hydrodynamic approach to quantify streamer to leader transition
 - \Box Leader propagation in SF₆ gas.













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
