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22 Supplementary Figure S1. Assessment of the "morphological score" endpoint on zebrafish embryos (120 hpf). To assess morphological changes, simple scoring system, modified from 23 (Panzica-Kelly et al., 2010) was used. No malformations, 0 point (A); Mild craniofacial 24 25 malformation, 1 point (B); Non-inflated swimming bladder and mild malabsorption of yolk 26 sac, 2 points (C); Severe craniofacial malformation, malabsorption of yolk sac, no swimming bladder, 3 points (D); Severe craniofacial malformation, malabsorption of yolk sac, no 27 28 swimming bladder, heart edema, 3 points (E); Severe craniofacial malformation, 29 malabsorption of yolk sac, non-inflated swimming bladder, spinal and tail deformation, 3 30 points (F);

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45 Analytical method details: Concentrations were measured by LC-MS/MS. Samples of 46 medium were first filtered using centrifuge filter (cellulose acetate; $0.22 \mu m$) to purify them 47 from chorion and other debris and filtrates were stored in glass vials at 20 °C upon the 48 analysis. Analysis by LC-MS/MS was performed with a Waters LC chromatograph (Waters, 49 Manchester, U.K.) and the chromatographic separation was achieved using a column Acquity 50 BEH C18 of 100 x 2.1 mm ID and 1.7 µm particle size. A gradient elution method was set 51 with a phase A (0.1% formic acid in water) and phase B (0.1% formic acid in methanol). The gradient elution started with 20% B, increased to 90% B over 9 min, held (90% B) to 11 min, 52 53 then decreased to 20% B in 11 min and held for 4 min to equilibrate the system before the 54 next injection. The flow rate was set at 0.3 mL/min and the injection volume at 5 μ L. The 55 column and sample temperatures were set at 35 °C and 10 °C, respectively.

56 Detection was performed on a Xevo TQ-S quadrupole mass spectrometer (Waters 57 Manchester, U.K.) and analytes after ESI ionisation were detected in positive ion mode using 58 tandem mass spectrometry. The following m/z transitions were monitored, for metolachlor: 59 m/z 284.1 > 176.1, (quant.: cone voltage 30V; collision energy 25V) and m/z 284.1 > 252.160 (qual.: cone voltage 30V; collision energy 15V); for metabolite MOA: m/z 280.3 > 146.2, (quant.: cone voltage 20V; collision energy 25V) and m/z 280.3 > 131.0 (qual.: cone voltage 61 62 20V; collision energy 30V) and m/z 280.3 > 119.0 (qual.: cone voltage 20V; collision energy 30V); for metabolite MESA: m/z 330.4 > 160.2, (quant.: cone voltage 25V; collision energy 63 64 30V) and m/z 330.4 > 145.5 (qual.: cone voltage 25V; collision energy 50V) and m/z 330.4 > 65 132.1 (qual.: cone voltage 25V; collision energy 50V). The capillary voltage was set at 3 kV and the cone, desolvation and collision gas flows were set at 150 (L/h), 700 (L/h) and 0.15 66 (mL/min), respectively. The source and desolvation temperature were set at 150 °C and 400 67 °C, respectively. Data were processed by MassLynxTM software (Manchester, U.K.). The 68 analytes were quantified using external calibration of metolachlor, MOA and MESA (0.1 -69 70 500 μ g/L in 20% of methanol) and the limit of detection (LOD, signal to noise ratio S/N>3) 71 and quantification (LOQ, S/N>10) were 0.05 and 0.1 µg/L, respectively for each analyte.

73 Supplementary Material S2: Results of the locomotion analysis

Total distance swam by the zebrafish larvae after five days of exposure to pesticides was measured. High variability among tested organisms (32 fish per condition) was observed and

76 mean values of distance swam by control fish were different in the independent experiments.

- 77 The final values are reported as fold changes compared to control (Fold-change=1).
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80 **Supplementary Figure 2**. Total distance swam by zebrafish larvae exposed for five days to 81 S-metolachlor (SM), metolachlor oxanilic acid (MOA), metolachlor ethanesulfonic acid 82 (MESA) and mixture of the three substances (MIX)* presented as fold changes of the exposed 83 group vs control group. Each bar represents mean \pm SEM of three independent experiments. 84 One trial consisted of four 15 minutes light stimulation periods (L1 1st light period, D1 1st 85 dark period, L2 2nd light period, D2 2nd dark period). No significant difference was observed. 86 *The concentration in the mixture is 1 and 30 µg/L of each substance.

No significant differences were observed in any of the conditions tested. Exposed fish swam similar distances as control fish (the fold changes values are all situated around 1) with the minimal and maximal value respectively 0.74 (MOA 100 μ g/L, L2 phase) and 1.25 (MESA 100 μ g/L, L1 phase).

91 Statistical differences from control were observed within some of the independent 92 experiments (Supplementary Figure S3) but they were not repeated during independently run 93 repetitions. For example, Figure 2 shows the results of a single experiment - the total distance 94 swam by zebrafish *larvae* exposed to two concentrations of MESA and subjected to four 15 minutes alternating trials of light-dark-light-dark. Zebrafish is triggered by switching off the 95 96 light and instantly become more active (more than 3 times fold) and gradually calms down 97 during the dark period. Statistical difference (Kruskall-Wallis test with Mann-Withney post-98 hoc with Bonferroni correction p < 0.025) is observed between control and 30 µg/L of MESA

99 in the dark 1 phase (16-30 minutes of the trial).

105 Supplementary Material S3: Results of the heart rate analysis

106 No significant effects were found on the heart rate of zebrafish larvae. The heartbeat of non-107 exposed larvae was 150.2 ± 7.2 bpm. The lowest (147.5 ± 4.3) and the highest (152.7 ± 5.4) 108 heartbeat was measured respectively in larvae exposed to environmental concentration of 100 MIX (1 ug/L of each compound) and to the concentration of 100 ug/L of MESA

109 MIX (1 μ g/L of each compound) and to the concentration of 100 μ g/L of MESA.
