The dataset includes 14 amino-acid side chain analogs (methane, butane, isobutane, isopropane, butan-1-amine, methanethiol, methanol, ethanol, toluene, pyrrolidine, p-cresol, acetamide, propionic acid, acetic acid) + quinoline + cyanuric acid and 1,2-dinitroxyethane (the two molecules having the smallest, negative hydrophobic free-energy in the Mobley database) + octafluorocyclobutane and ethion (the ones with the largest hydrophobic, positive free-energies). In Fig. 11 of the manuscript, those molecules are sorted by decreasing hydration free energies, thus from hydrophobic ($\Delta G_{solv} > 0$) to hydrophilic ($\Delta G_{solv} > 0$) solutes (see Fig 3 below).
