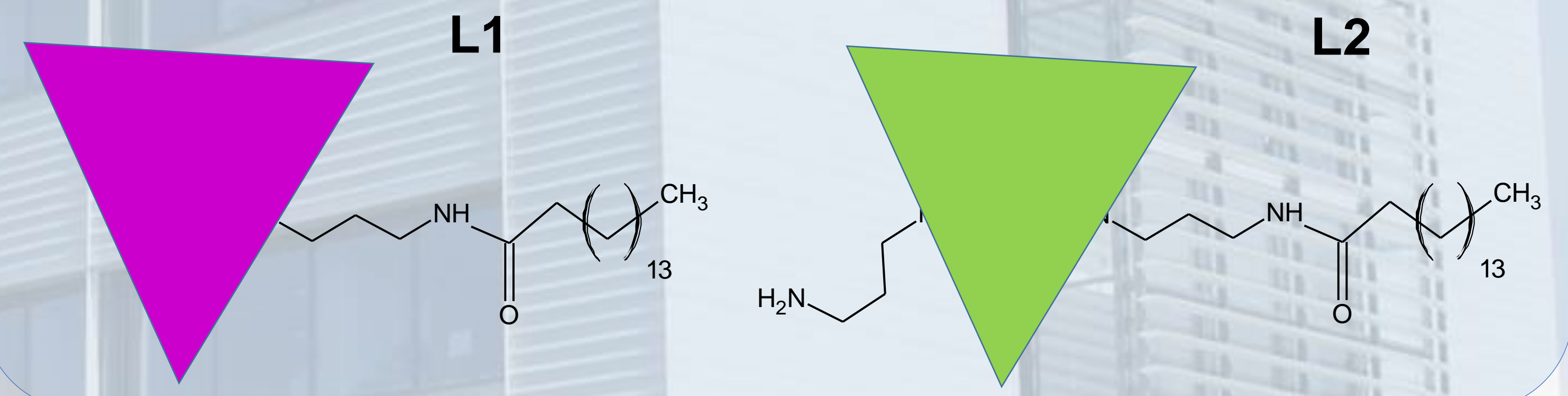

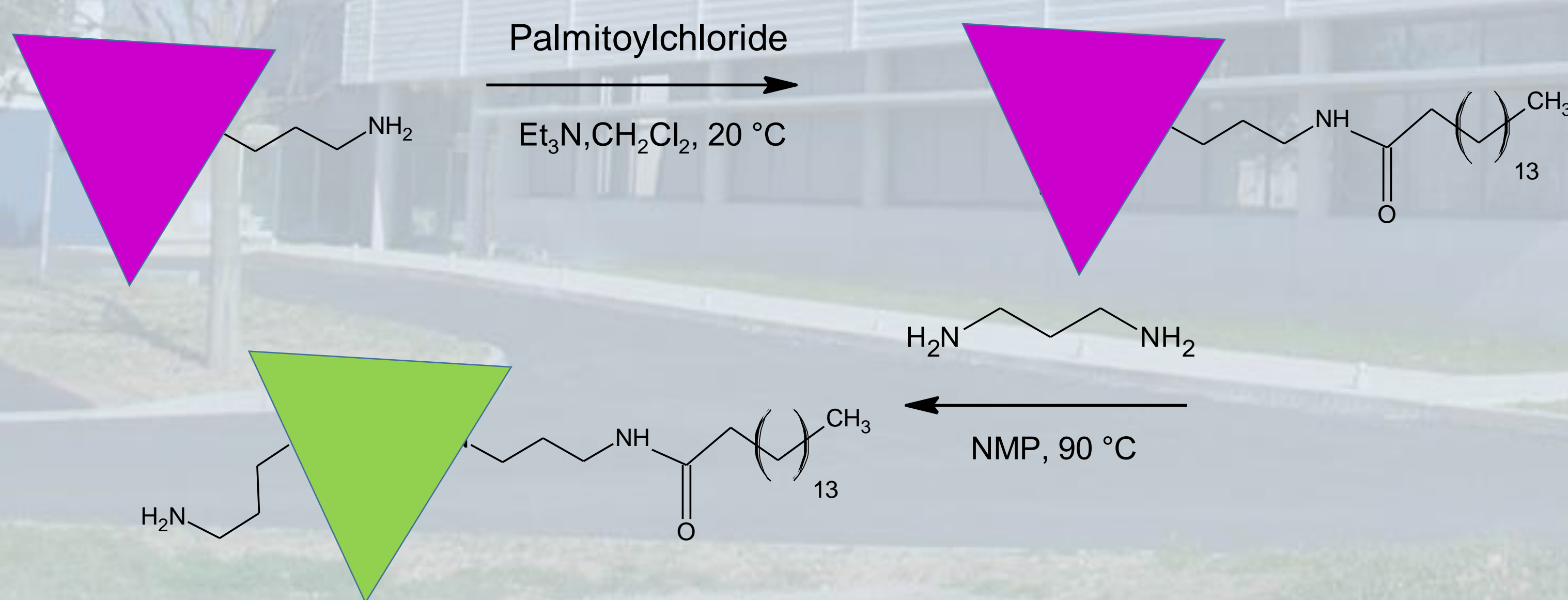
Context

Here we are interested in the incorporation of new polytopic fluorescent molecules in cells/membranes.

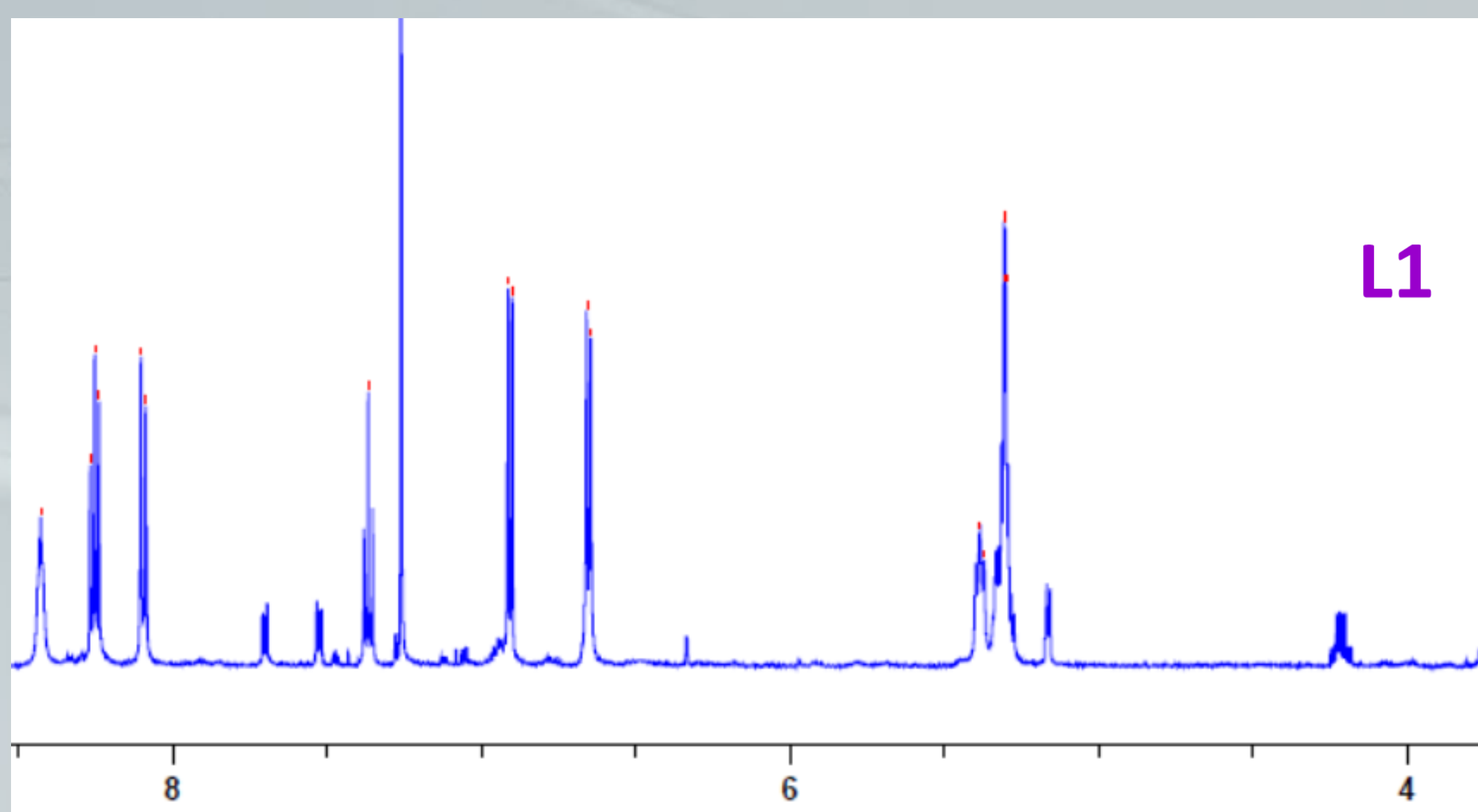
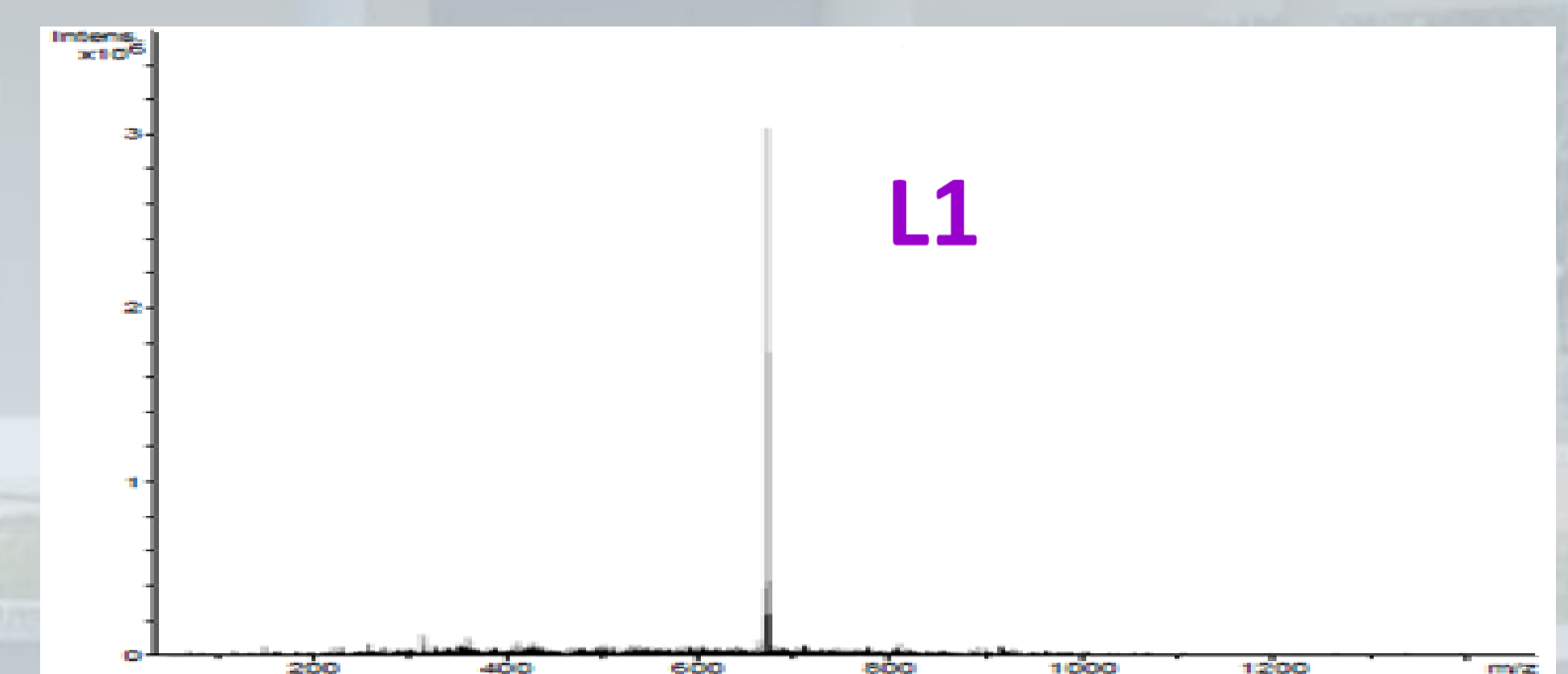
Amphiphilic Fluorophores L1 and L2



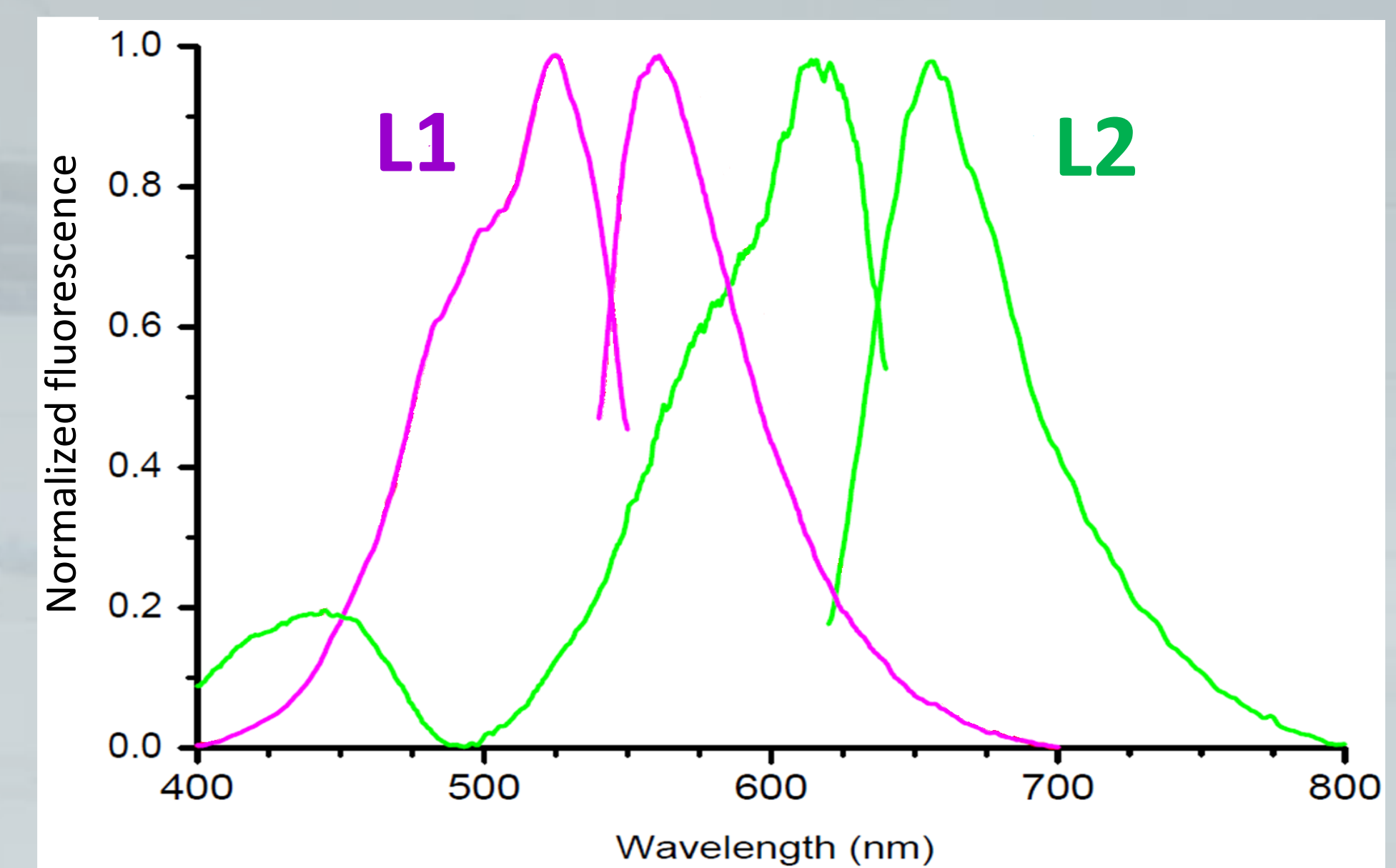
Synthesis and Characterization of L1 and L2



ES Mass Spectrometry Characterization

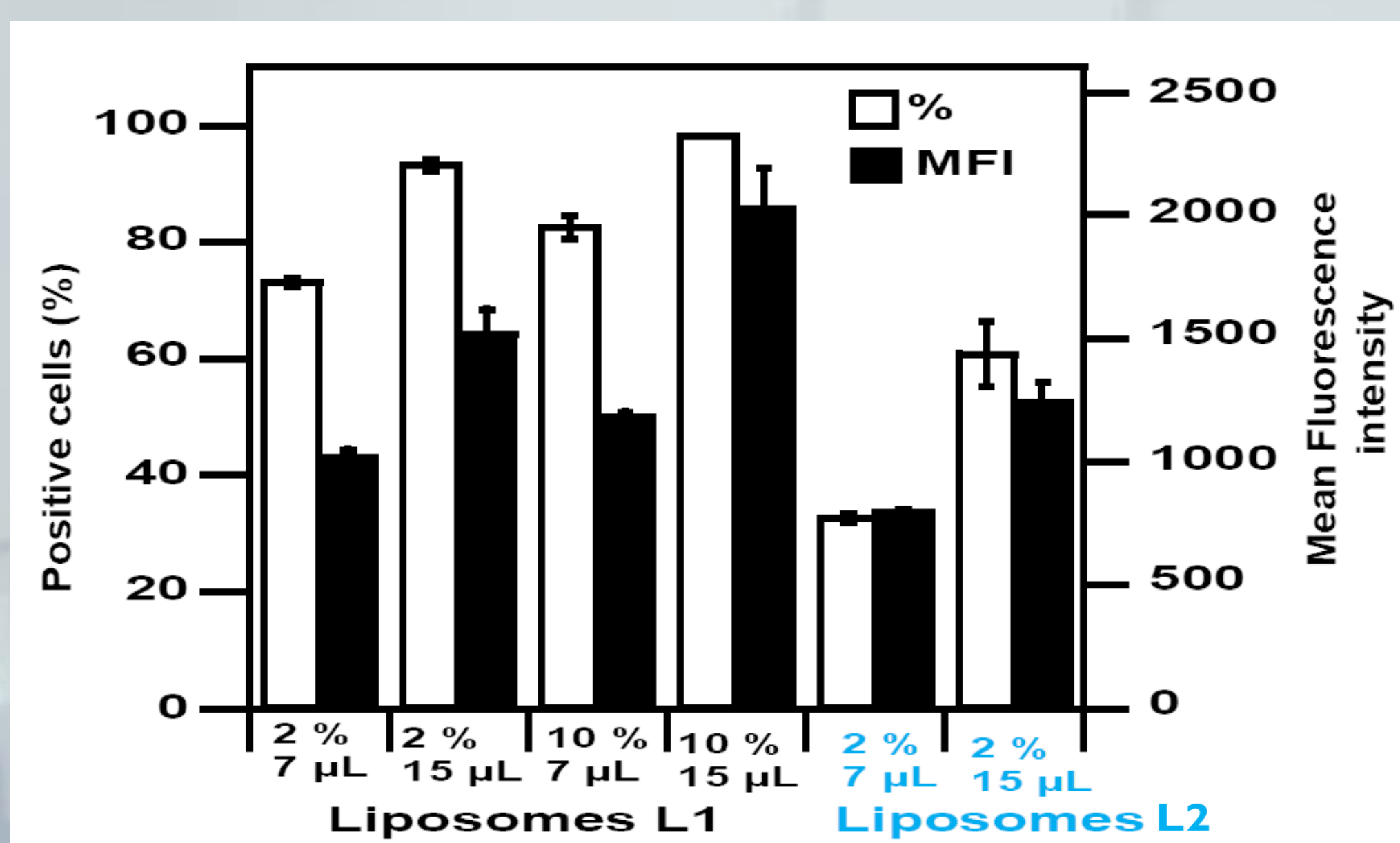


Part of the ^1H NMR spectrum of L1: characteristic aromatic signals



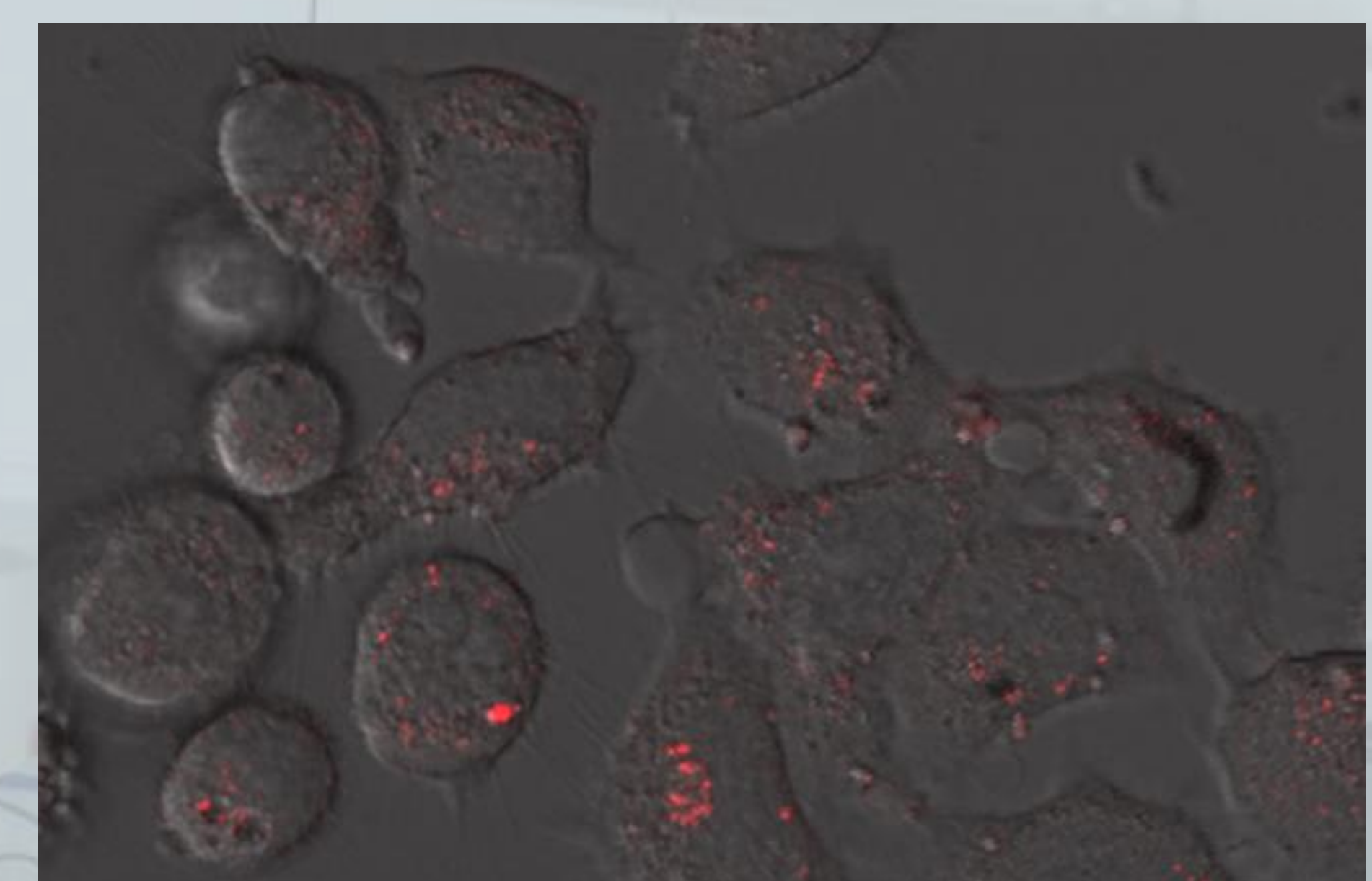
Normalized excitation and emission spectra of L1 and L2

Uptake of Liposomes



- Analysis of transfected cells with Flow cytometry

Fluorescence Imaging



- Uptake of liposomes by cells followed by confocal microscopy

Conclusions

- Water-stable intermediates and amphiphiles L1 and L2
- Multitopic fluorescent platforms/anchors
- Successful formation of liposomes and their uptake by cells

Perspectives

- Tests of cytotoxicity and stability in cellular media
- Synthesis of more complex lipides
- Optimization for drug delivery strategies
