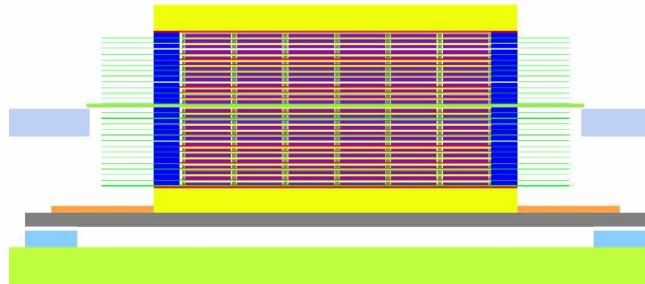
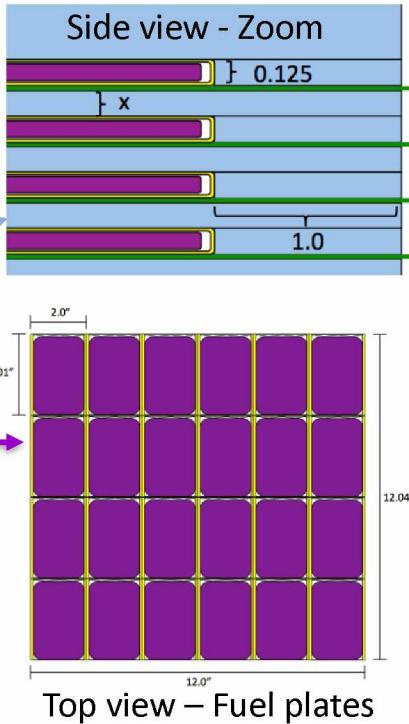
## TEX-Pu experiments

- 5 baseline TEX (Thermal Epithermal eXperiments) published in ICSBEP Handbook 2020 (PMM002)
- Polyethylene moderator and reflector with varying thicknesses
- Plutonium metallic plates



PLANET machine at NCERC

The experiment 1 of the PMM-2 series modelled with code MORET5.

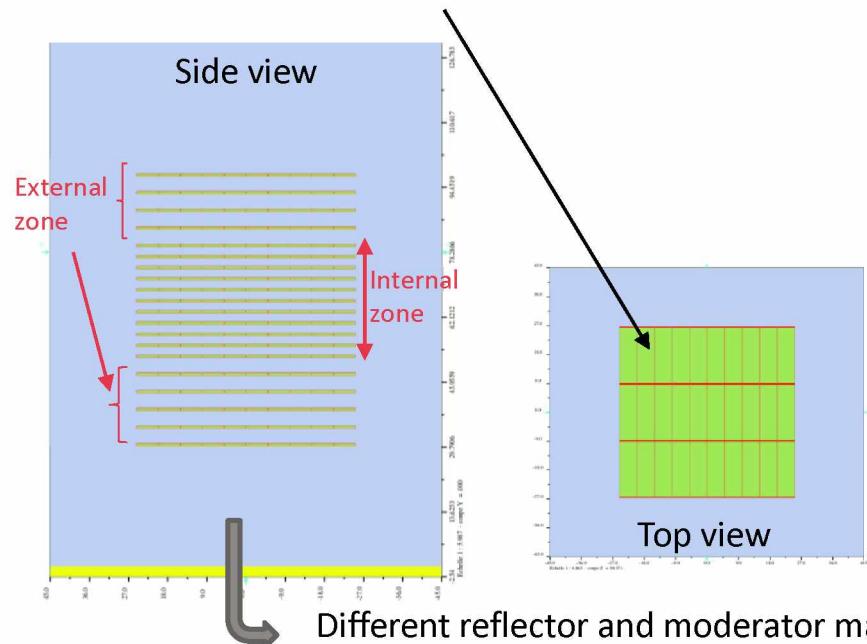


# TEX-MOX designs

- PUMN plates (Pu-U-Mo-NUMEC):

Pu (wt%of U+Pu)	U235 (%wt of U)	Pu240 (%w of Pu)
28.8	0.2	11.6

- Multi-parametric design optimization (*Proceedings ANS Winter Meeting 2016*)



Different reflector and moderator materials tested (graphite, borated polyethylene,... )  
This work: configurations only with  $\text{Al}_2\text{O}_3$  and polyethylene

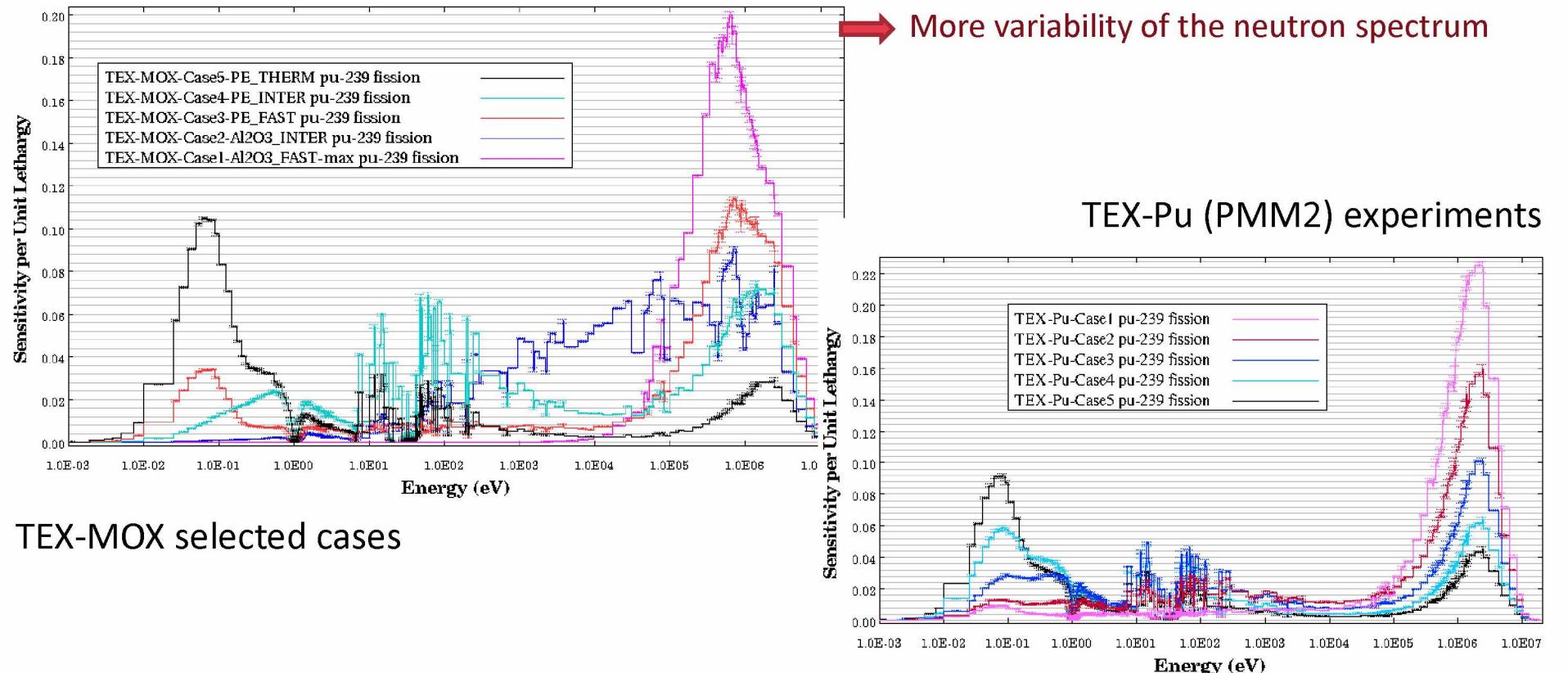

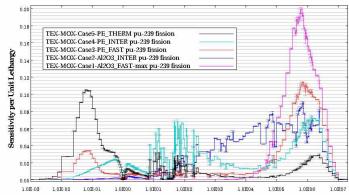

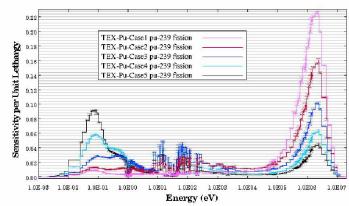
## Varying spectrum – $k_{\text{eff}}$ sensitivities

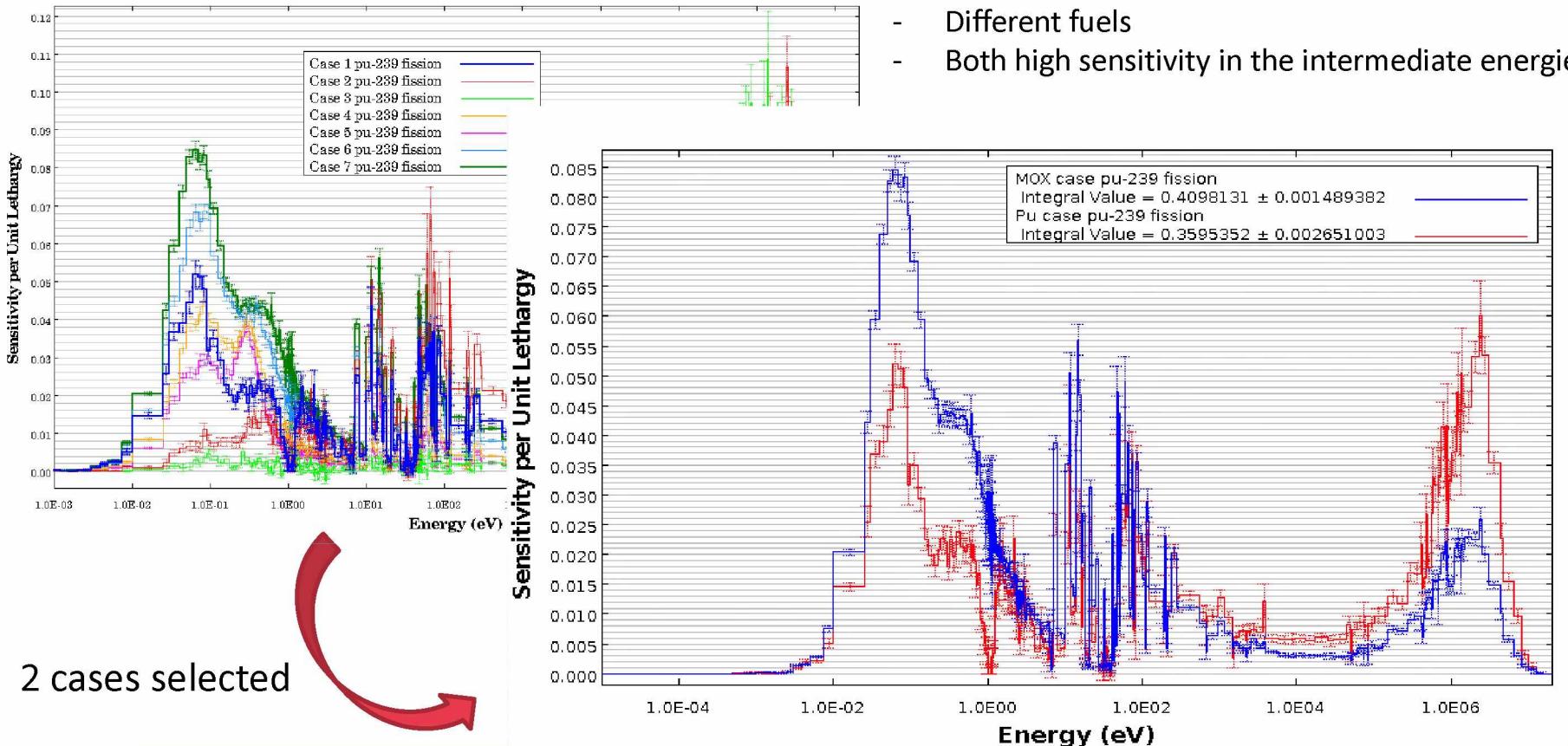

7 cases were selected involving PuO<sub>2</sub> or PuO<sub>2</sub> with UO<sub>2</sub> where intermediate energy range plays a role

# Similarity coefficient $C_k$

The  $C_k$  similarity coefficients between 7 application cases and a selection of experimental benchmarks or working designs proposals.

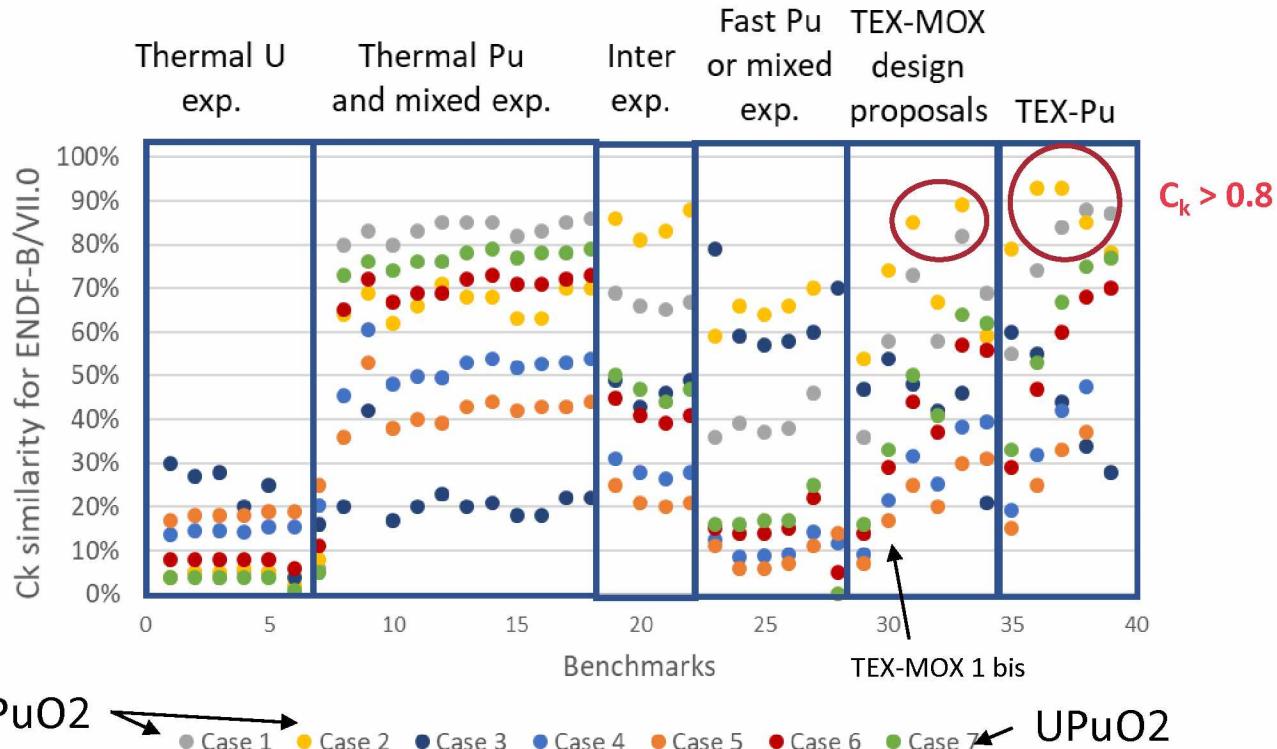
$$C_k = \frac{S_{exp}^T C_\sigma S_{app}}{\sqrt{S_{exp}^T C_\sigma S_{app}} \sqrt{S_{app}^T C_\sigma S_{app}}}$$

Calculated with TSURFER

$C_\sigma$  = covariance matrix ENDF/B-VII.0 in  
44 groups provided with the SCALE  
code system

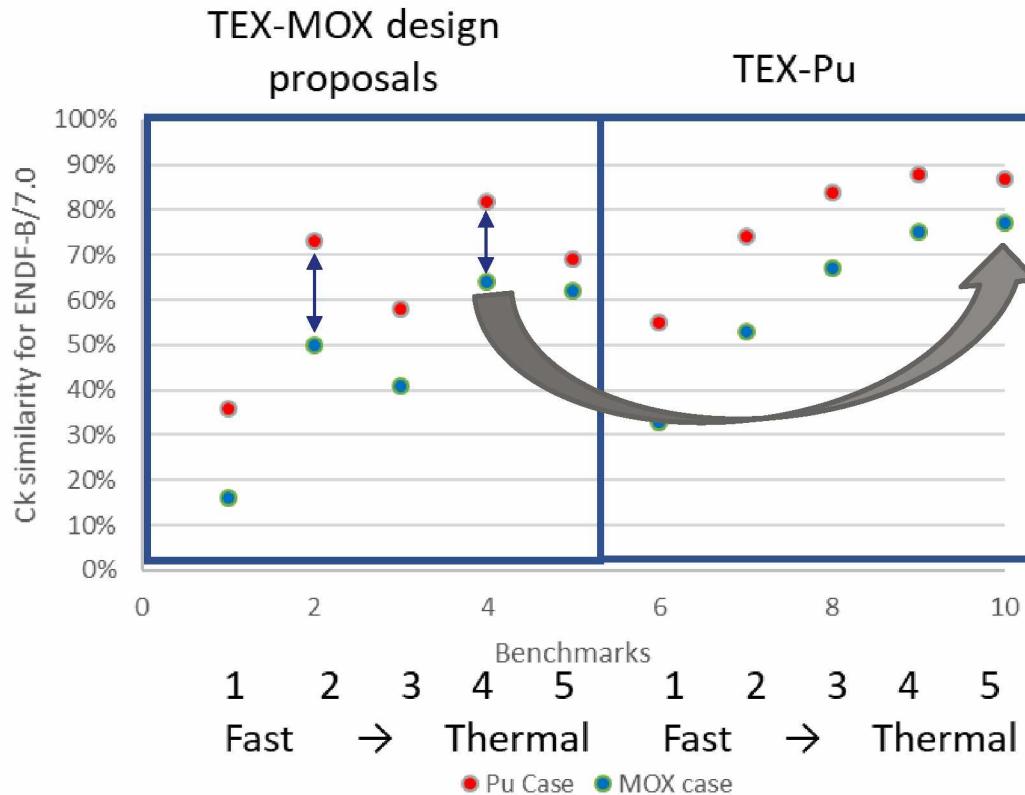
$S$  = sensitivities calculated with MORET

- All TEX-Pu cases high  $C_k$  for PuO<sub>2</sub> appl. Cases
- TEX-MOX case 2 and 4 high  $C_k$  values for PuO<sub>2</sub> appl. case



Focus on 2 application cases  
Pu case (1) and MOX case (7)

## Similarity coefficient $C_k$



TEX-MOX: MOX case lower  $C_k$  than PU Case!

→ MOX case has higher iron sensitivity  
→ “complicated” application case may use separated benchmarks:

- iron ND assimilation
- fuel ND assimilation

(possibly no  $C_k > 0.8$ )

MOX application case has even higher  $C_k$  for TEX-Pu cases than for TEX-MOX designs !

→  $C_k$  similarity coefficients contain the information about the covariance data which « ponderates » the importance of some cross sections

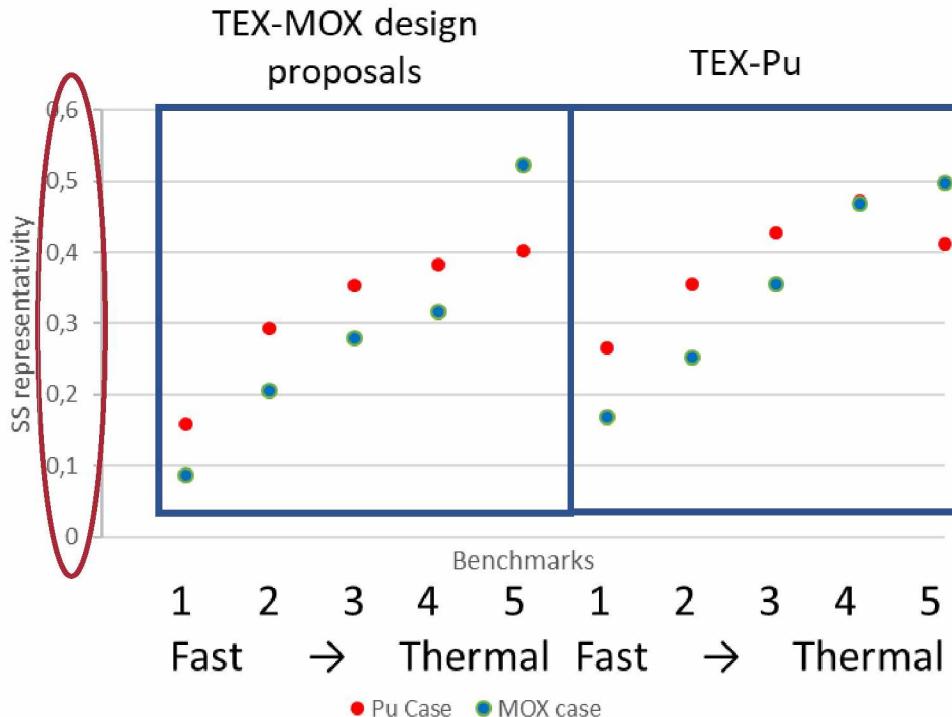

## Shared sensitivity ratio

New indice that does not take into account the covariance data, but focuses only on comparing the sensitivity profiles:

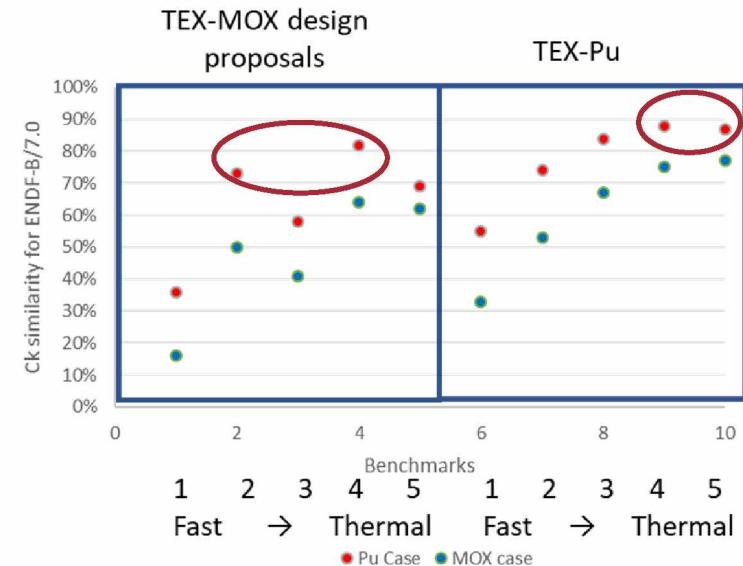
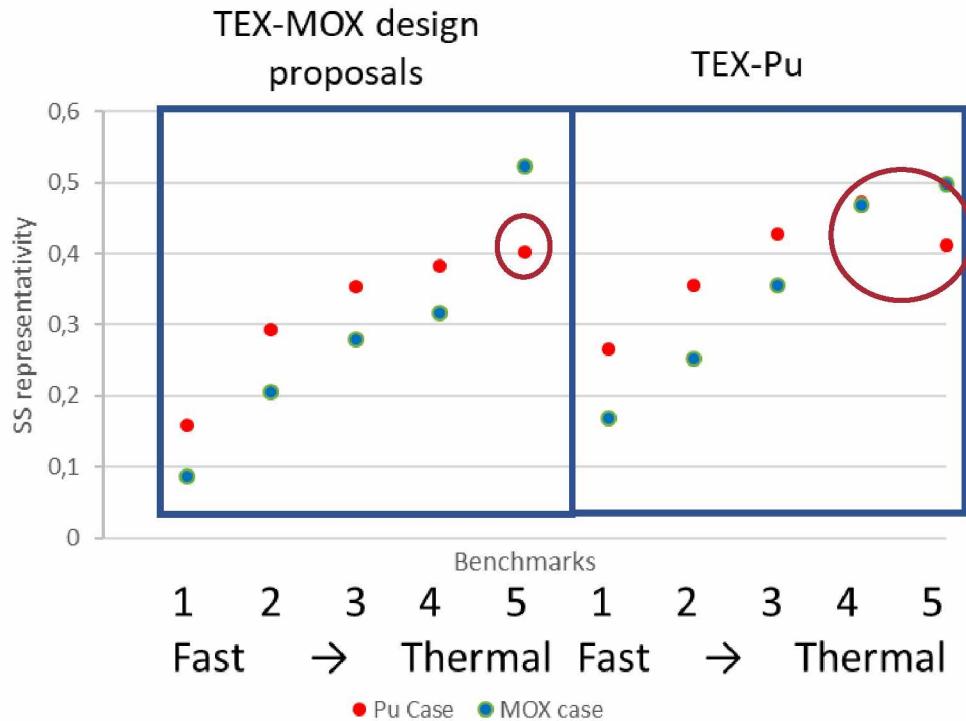
$$SS_{12} = \frac{\sum_{i,r} \sum_{Eg} \left\{ \begin{array}{ll} \text{if } S_1^{i,r,Eg} S_2^{i,r,Eg} > 0 : & \min(|S_1^{i,r,Eg}|, |S_2^{i,r,Eg}|) \\ \text{else :} & 0 \end{array} \right.}{\sum_{i,r} \sum_{Eg} S_1^{i,r,Eg}}$$

## Shared sensitivity ratio



- Absolut values in SS ratio are much lower than Ck's (max ~50%)
  - Other XS plays a role but have « small » covariances data
  - In this case probably iron 56 plays an important role  
Fe56  $n,\gamma$ : Pu case -0.05, MOX case -0.14
- Different trends compared to Ck's

## Shared sensitivity ratio



- Pu appl. case:
  - Best TEX-Pu: case 4 for SS cases 4-5 for Ck
  - Best TEX-MOX: case 5 for SS cases 2 and 4 for Ck

*Interpretation: spectral effects in the covariance data*

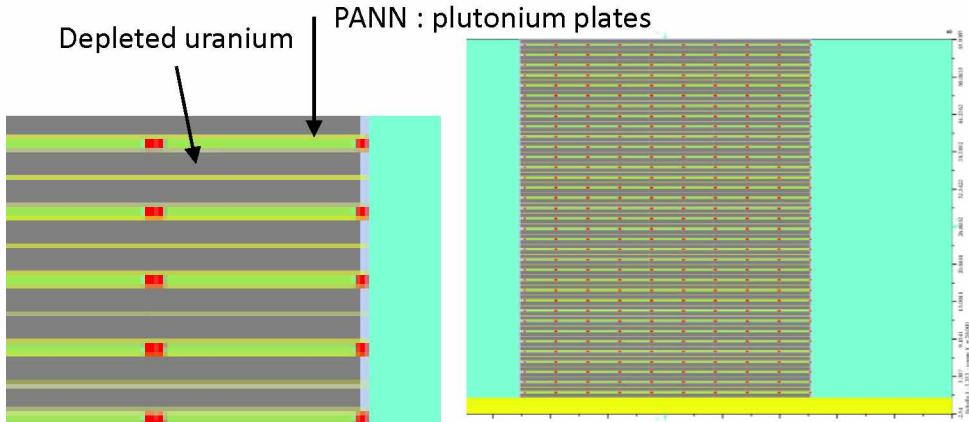
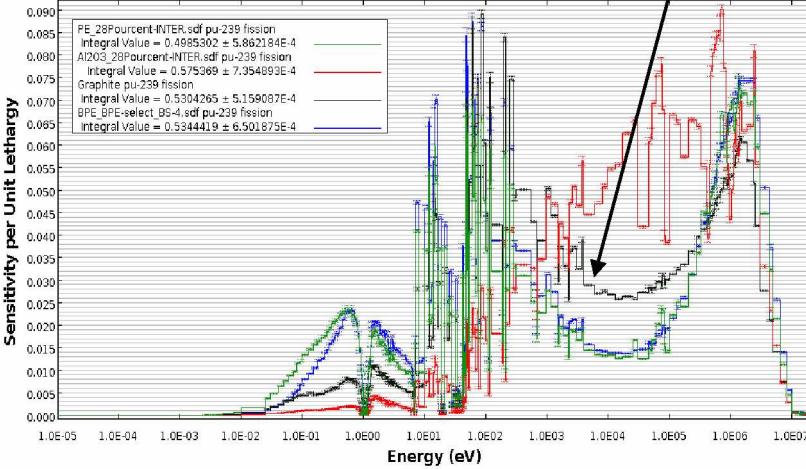
# Conclusion

- The analysis of the experimental benchmarks using both  $C_k$  and SS ratios allows a better understanding of the physics behind, separating the effects of:
  - Similarity between an experiment and the application case
  - Similarity pondered by the covariance data,
    - which evolves with time, is questionable, is sometimes just missing ...
- For « complex » application cases, having  $C_k > 0.8$  will not always be possible, so it is not a redhibitory criteria
- Analysis of design proposals for TEX-MOX :
  - Configurations with  $\text{Al}_2\text{O}_3$  and PE both useful for targeted application cases
  - especially polyethylene (INTER + THERM) – SS ratio
  - $\text{Al}_2\text{O}_3$  more interesting in area with higher ND uncertainties ( $C_k$  index)

# Prospects

- Due to possible experimental constraints (decay heat evacuation) with polyethylene moderator, the analysis of TEX-MOX designs proposals will be pursued including more designs (resulting from design optimization):
  - Other materials and configurations: graphite, PE + aluminum, ...
  - Other fuel plates: higher  $^{240}\text{Pu}$  content, separated plutonium and depleted uranium fuel plates
