24 **ABSTRACT**

25 Our investigations hereby involve the effects of ionizing radiation as a 26 sterilization method, and especially electron beams, on a medical grade 27 Polyethylene Terephthalate (PET). Ionizing radiations are known to induce free 28 radicals formation in the polymer that will then either degrade or crosslink, 29 depending on its chemical nature, ionizing type and irradiation atmosphere [1-3]. 30 The evaluation of packaging material modifications under radiation sterilization is 31 of great interest and the objective of our paper is to focus on both PET volume 32 modifications and extractable analyses after electron beam sterilization. As 33 regards the polymeric matrix and after sterilization, we did not observe by means of spectral analyses, any single chemical modification whatsoever, whereas by 34 35 thermal techniques we evidenced polymer chain scissions. As for the non-volatile 36 organic extractables, we further substantiate the presence of numerous 37 compounds, namely oligomers and trimers especially, along with benzoic and 38 terephthalic acids in particular. With respect to pharmaceutical stakes however, 39 we claim herein that the 25 kGy sterilization dose used, triggers oligomers and 40 extractables formation, a result which is promising for further risk analysis.

42 RÉSUMÉ

44 Nous nous intéressons aux effets des rayonnements ionisants, utilisés comme
45 méthode de stérilisation, et notamment les électrons accélérés, sur un
46 poly(éthylène téréphtalate) (PET) de grade médical. Les rayonnements ionisants
47 sont connus pour induire la formation de radicaux libres dans le polymère qui,

48 selon sa nature chimique, le type de rayonnements et d'atmosphère d'irradiation, 49 va ensuite soit subir une dégradation soit une réticulation de ses chaînes 50 macromoléculaires [1-3]. Il est alors important d'évaluer la modification du 51 matériau de conditionnement sous stérilisation ionisante et l'objectif de ce travail 52 est d'étudier à la fois les modifications dans le volume du PET ainsi que 53 d'analyser les extractibles issus de la stérilisation par électrons accélérés. En ce 54 qui concerne la matrice polymérique et après stérilisation, nous n'avons pas 55 observé de modification chimique par analyse spectrale, en revanche, nous avons pu mettre en évidence la coupure de chaînes par analyse thermique. De même, 56 57 pour les composés extractibles organiques non volatiles, nous confirmons 58 la présence de nombreux composés, en particulier des oligomères et des trimères, 59 avec en particulier les acides benzoïque et téréphtalique. En ce qui concerne les 60 recommandations pharmaceutiques, nous prétendons ici que la dose de stérilisation de 25 kGy utilisée, engendre la formation d'oligomères et de 61 62 substances extractibles, un résultat qui semble prometteur pour une future analyse 63 de risque.

72 INTRODUCTION

73

74 Polyethylene Terephthalate (PET) is widely used in the food packaging industry 75 thanks to its high-strength barrier and easy thermoforming (e.g.: bottles, frozen 76 products as well as packaged goods intended for microwave and convection oven 77 use). In the field of the medical and pharmaceutical industry, because of its 78 distinctive physical assets such as resistance, crystallinity, heat and solvent 79 resilience as well as its biological characteristics such as biostability and 80 promotion of tissue ingrowth, PET's applications include bottles, primary 81 packaging material as well as implantable sutures, surgical mesh, vascular grafts, 82 sewing cuffs for heart valves and components for percutaneous access devices. 83 For these purposes, PET can be submitted to ionizing radiation sterilization. The 84 evaluation of packaging material modifications under radiation sterilization is of 85 great interest. The objective of our paper is to study the electron beam effects on 86 the physico-chemical properties of PET as well on the formation of extractables. 87 This PET material comes from of a multi-layer laminated film with amorphous 88 polyethylene terephthalate (PET) combined with linear low density polyethylene. 89 A primer is applied to the PET film during the lamination process thus helping the 90 bonding between both films. This complex allows reservoir manufacturing for 91 BD-UnijectTM medical device. BD-UnijectTM prefillable injection device is for 92 packaging and administering parenteral drugs through intra-muscular or sub 93 cutaneous injections. It is aseptically filled, sealed and packaged by a 94 pharmaceutical manufacturer. It consists in the following components assembled 95 in open and ready to fill form ; reservoir which contains parenteral solution and 96 needle assembly with a port, a valve disc combined with valve seat, a hub and

97 cannula assembly, and finally the needle shield. The ready to fill form implies that 98 the product is radiosterilised. To anticipate the likely interaction between 99 container and content, we have to understand the effect of radiation among other 100 topics. We focused on the reservoir because of an immediately contact with 101 parenteral drug. Indeed, the effect of radiation can induce physical modifications 102 in PET such as change in the mechanical properties due to scission/cross-linking 103 of the macromolecular chains, oxidation, change of crystallinity and as a 104 consequence of permeability; but radiation can also induce degradation of the 105 additives into smaller molecules that have higher mobility through the 106 macromolecular chains and as a consequence become potential leachables. 107 Moreover, it is noteworthy that in the context of pharmaceutical packaging 108 sterilization processes, degradation products and oligomers are likely to appear 109 [4–7] and further, they may spread from the container/closure system into the 110 drug solution itself. Those compounds might have a bad effect on the stability of 111 the formulation and the adsorption of the formulation on the plastic container can 112 be modified. Hence, any thorough compatibility assessment needs to consider the 113 sterilization impact on physical properties and potential leaching impurities [5–9]. 114 Polyethylene Terephthalate (PET) is a thermoplastic polyester synthesized by 115 polycondensation of ethylene glycol and dimethyl terephthalate [10–12]. 116 Numerous publications to date provide extensive information as regards PET 117 oligomers identification, quantification [13-23] and migration in food simulants 118 [24]. However, few research papers have probed as yet the effects of sterilization 119 on PET used in medical or pharmaceutical applications. Within the realm of 120 pharmaceutical implementation, PET is used in containers intended for a wide 121 range of preparations but not in direct contact with parenteral drugs, where 122 acetaldehyde is solely referenced as a manufacturing residue: therefore its content must never exceed 10 ppm in granules as a rule [25]. Whenever containers or
delivery-systems require proper sterilization before use, the above-mentioned
critical pre-requisite must be observed unequivocally.

126 Consequently, our goal is to evaluate the effects of electron-beam sterilization on 127 Polyethylene Terephthalate (PET) used as a medical device for drug delivery, and 128 subsequently to further lay the ground for compatibility studies involving a 129 pharmaceutical and/or a biological medium. Insofar as sterilization induces 130 modifications affecting all at once the polymeric bulk as well as the additives and 131 oligomers, an integrative two-fold approach had to be implemented (one slant of 132 approach focused on the matrix and the other slant concentrated on the additives, 133 the degradation products and oligomers).

135 MATERIAL and METHODS

136

137 Materials and reagents

Medical grade PET films, about 130 µm thick, 15 cm width were supplied byBecton Dickinson Medical (France).

140 Tetrahydrofuran (THF) and Methanol (both HPLC grade) as well as benzoic and

- 141 orthophosphoric acids were provided by Prolabo, terephthalic acid was supplied
- 142 by Acros Organics.

144 Irradiations

145 The samples were irradiated at room temperature under air by an industrial 146 electron beam accelerator (Energy of 10 MeV, power 10 kW, speed of the 147 conveyor belt under the electron beam of 0.85 m/min) (Ionisos – Chaumesnil, 148 France).

149 The PET films were placed between paper sheets in plastic bags before 150 irradiation. The mean incident doses on the sample packages amounted to 25, 50 151 and 150 kGy. Around 140 g of PET films is dedicated for each dose. Chromic 152 dosimeters were used to measure the dose. 25 kGy is the sterilization dose that is 153 recommended by the Pharmaceutical authorities [26,27]. Once irradiated and 154 before being studied, samples were maintained 3-4 weeks at 5°C, so as to slow 155 down at best the decay of the radicals formed during irradiation, and to further 156 restrict potential component migration.

157 In order to check radiation effects on PET, we used specific analytical techniques. 158 Hence, we chose to further elicit in a first step, the effects of irradiation on the 159 polymer, subject to both chain scissions and cross-linking: such phenomena were 160 singled out by means of analytical techniques such as spectral (Fourier Transform 161 InfraRed spectroscopy (FTIR)) and thermal analyses (Differential Scanning 162 Calorimetry (DSC), Thermogravimetric Analysis (TGA)). In a second step, we 163 concentrate on the additives, the degradation products and oligomers, known as 164 extractables: they can be analyzed by means of weighing measurements along 165 with chromatographic methods, namely Size Exclusion Chromatography (SEC) 166 (providing some idea as regards oligomers molecular masses, albeit unspecific), 167 and Reversed Phase- High Performance Liquid Chromatography (RP-HPLC) 168 (more specific). In terms of compatibility studies involving the polymer combined with pharmaceutical or biological media, toxicity tests still require furtherdevelopments to date.

171 Characterization of the polymeric bulk

172

173 Fourier Transform InfraRed (FTIR) analysis

FTIR spectra were recorded with a Perkin Elmer 2000 spectrometer (16 scans, 4 cm⁻¹ resolution) equipped with a deuteriated triglycerine sulphate (DTGS) detector. In transmission mode, the sample holder was tilted at the Brewster's angle (also called the polarization angle) in order to eliminate interference fringes. Ten different samples were analyzed for statistical reasons.

180 Differential Scanning Calorimetry (DSC) analysis

181 The DSC curves were recorded with a TA Q1000 calorimeter, under nitrogen 182 blanketing, for a temperature ranging between 35 and 280°C. The scanning rate 183 was optimized and finally set at 10°C/min. The calorimeter was calibrated before 184 use with indium and tin standards. For all PET samples a sequence was set as 185 follows: the temperature was initially set at 300°C over a 5 minute period in order 186 to melt the polymer and improve its contact with the crucible; subsequently a first 187 heating and cooling cycle was performed and the second heating scan was chosen, 188 since further heating scans gave the same DSC curve. For each dose, three 189 samples were analyzed.

190

191 Thermogravimetric analysis (TGA)

192 The TGA curves were recorded with a TA Q500 calorimeter, under nitrogen 193 blanketing, for a temperature ranging between 30 and 600°C at a scanning rate 194 optimized for 20°C/min. For each dose, three samples were analyzed. 195

196 Characterization of the non-volatile extractables

197

Soxhlet extractions

199 The soxhlet extraction was carried out on 20 g of PET accurately weighted, placed 200 in cellulose extraction thimbles, over a 2-hour period in methanol under reflux. 201 The extraction solution evaporated until dry. The 250 mL glass flask used for 202 collecting extracts were weighted before extraction and after evaporation, once 203 cooled. When ready for HPLC measurements, dry extracts collected in the glass 204 flask, were dissolved in 1 mL methanol (40°C) and 1 mL mobile phase. For each 205 dose, three extractions were performed and each extraction solution was injected 206 (20 µL) three times in the HPLC apparatus. In the case of SEC analysis, 207 extractables were solubilized in methanol (40°C) prior to SEC analysis.

209 Weighing

An analytical Denver Instrument M-220D scale, capable of weighing from 1 mg up to 31 g with a 0.01 mg sensitivity level was used to evaluate the quantity of oligomers, additives and degradation products extracted from the polymer, by calculating the difference of weight of the glass ampoules used before and after extraction.

216 Size Exclusion Chromatography (SEC) analysis

217 Chromatograms were recorded with a PL-GPC 220 high temperature 218 chromatograph (Polymer Laboratories, UK), equipped with a refractometer (RI) 219 (Polymer Laboratories, UK) and an UV detector whose wavelength was set at 220 240 nm and 280 nm.

221 The chromatographic system had its temperature set at 35°C. Flow rate reached 222 1 mL/min in THF. The SEC system was controlled by the PL-GPC 220 Control 223

software (2.01 version). Acquisition and analysis were controlled by a Viscotek

- 224 software (Omnisec 4.0 version).
- 225 Two Polymer Laboratories (PL) 5 µm-mixed C and 100 Å-3 µm SEC columns
- 226 were set up in series. Their molecular weights linear range ranked between 200 -
- 2×10^{6} for the first one, and 4000 2×10^{5} for the second one, their length reached 227
- 228 300 mm and their internal diameter, 7.5 mm (supplier's data).
- 229 Six polystyrene (PS) standards (Polymer Laboratories, UK) of narrow molecular 230 weights (Mp) were used to perform a universal calibration.
- 231 Non irradiated PET extraction samples were obtained as described earlier and 232 extracts, containing oligomers and small weight molecules, was solubilized in hot 233 methanol prior to SEC analysis. Three different samples were analyzed such a 234 way for statistical reasons.

236 **Reversed Phase High Performance Liquid Chromatography (RP-HPLC)** 237 analysis

238 The liquid chromatograph was a Thermo Spectra Physics (TSP) system, involving 239 a P4000 pump, a Rheodyne sampling valve with a 20 µL loop, an AS 1000 240 automatic sampler, and was coupled with a photodiode array UV 6000 detector, 241 with pre-selected wavelength set at 240 nm. The software used was ChromQuest 242 (3.0 version) from Thermo Finnigan. The separation was achieved on a 250 by 243 4.6 mm inner diameter, 5 µm Lichrosphere, 60 RP Select B column (C8) (Merck), heated at 30°C. 244

The elution gradient was a solvent mixture (phosphoric acid buffer / methanol) with a 50/50 volume ratio. The phosphoric acid buffer was obtained from an orthophosphoric acid solution prepared at 0.1 M and added to a 0.1 M NaOH solution. The mobile phase had a pH adjusted to 2.8 with a 1 N HCl solution. The flow rate of the mobile phase was set at 1 mL/min.

251 **RESULTS and DISCUSSION**

252 There is substantial existing evidence to the effect that irradiation induces 253 physical and chemical modifications in the polymeric bulk (e.g. chain scissions 254 and cross-linking), as well as oxidation groupment formation [1-3,28,29]. 255 Irradiation also endorses a critical role in terms of extractable (oligomers and 256 additives) degradation. The entities formed thereby, display high mobility levels 257 in keeping with their low molecular weight, thus allowing for swift migration 258 capacity into the pharmaceutical and biological media. Both the effect of the 259 electron-beam radiation on PET bulk and non-volatile extractables are here 260 presented. It is worse notice here that the effect of radiation on polymer might be 261 different depending on the radiation type (electron-beam, gamma-ray, swift heavy 262 ions, X-rays), especially because of the dose rate and the depth of induced 263 radiation.

264

265 1- Effect of the sterilization on PET bulk – Physico-chemical 266 methods.

267 Several papers have been published on radiation effects on PET by means of high 268 energy ions beam [30–36] and gamma rays [28,29,37–41], but electron-beam sterilization on PET is less described in the literature. Apel *et al.* [36] and Buchalla *et al.* [37] mentioned the formation of a large amount of polar lowmolecular weight compounds. Buchalla *et al.* studied in depth the non-volatile radiolysis products of PET by means of Liquid Chromatography - Mass spectrometry (LC-MS). In their case, PET was irradiated by gamma rays at doses of 25 and 50 kGy. They evidenced that every radiation resistant polymer can lead to the formation of low-molecular weight degradation products.

276 1. 1- FTIR analysis

FTIR measurements enabled film structural analysis as a function of the radiation dose. As shown on Figure 1, the transmission mode results revealed identical spectra within the dose. Such a result underscored the lack of any volume-based modification of PET chemical functions following irradiation (namely oxidation), even at the highest dose. Likewise, authors such as Aytac *et al.* [38] evidenced no change in the FTIR spectra of 150 kGy gamma irradiated cords used as tyre reinforcing material.

284 PET is known to be radiation resistant, owing to the presence of aromatic groups 285 along with ester linkages in its backbone [39,42]. In keeping with findings released by Liu et al. for doses above 6 MGy [30,31], we found that the 1579 cm⁻¹ 286 287 band intensity assigned to the aromatic skeletal stretching band of benzene rings, 288 remained constant during irradiation. Several papers deal with the modification of 289 PET under high energy heavy ions irradiations: Steckenreiter et al. [32] as well as 290 Singh et al. [33] studied swift heavy ion effects over PET by FTIR and showed 291 alkyne formation near the track core and evidenced an enhanced degradation due 292 to the presence of oxygen. Zhu et al. [34] showed that a single ion bombardment 293 damaged the phenyl ring and the crystallinity of PET. As previously reported by Dole [3], carbonyl groups are formed under radiation in oxygen atmosphere. In our case, we observed no alkyne end group formation nor any oxidation functions. It is noteworthy however, that we used a different radiation framework. Moreover, we resorted to very small doses compared to the cited authors. Indeed, our goal was to be the closest as possible to the sterilization dose.

Finally, under irradiation conditions used in our study, no chemical modificationwas observed with reference to PET films.

302 1. 2- Thermal analysis

303 Thermal characteristics and especially crystallinity yield is an important parameter 304 to check after irradiation because a highly crystalline polymer will be more 305 efficient against the molecular diffusion than an amorphous one. Figure 2 gives 306 the DSC curve overlay obtained at the second heating stage for both non-307 irradiated and irradiated samples. Glass transition was readily observed and 308 measured at a glass temperature (Tg) of 81°C, regardless of the dose. Radiation 309 effects were displayed with both subsequent thermal events, namely: the 310 endothermic transition emerging at about 176°C, and the shape of the melting 311 peak at 242°C approximately. Following irradiation, the endothermic transition 312 increases as well as the shoulder in the melting peak at a temperature below the 313 maximum level (about 228°C). Chain scissions may account for such a 314 phenomenon, insofar as they induce the formation of smaller molecular chains 315 involving a lower melting point compared to initial chains.

Jeon *et al.* [29] have referenced gamma irradiation PET degradation. Through
Size Exclusion Chromatography (SEC), they evidenced the molecular weights
decrease. Findings are congruent with results released by Buttafava *et al.* [28].

319 The latter carried out viscosity measurements, thus disclosing the following 320 trends: molecular weights decrease at 50-150 kGy gamma-rays doses, followed by 321 an increase up to 300 kGy, prior to a subsequent decrease recorded at higher doses 322 within the reach of 1000 kGy. In the course of our investigations, however, we 323 observed no single Tg value variation within our dose range, whereas Buttafava et 324 al. [28] and Kattan [40] reported a T_g decrease at higher gamma-rays doses (up to 325 3500 kGy): such a finding points out to a chain scission-induced macromolecules 326 mobility increase. Kattan took his research a step further: He calculated the number of chain scissions by evaluating T_g decrease, a significant point when 327 328 considering the dose range used then.

329 Many semi-crystalline polymers exhibit multiple melting behaviors from different 330 sources depending on authors. Regarding the issue of endothermic transition at 331 about 176°C, Kong [43] and Wang alike [44] argued that depending on PET 332 thermal treatment, a minor endotherm is likely to emerge due to secondary 333 lamellae melting processes. Authors evidenced the formation of two distinctive 334 lamellar thickness populations during the isothermal crystallization process at 335 long times: the thicker lamellae formed first, and the thinner lamellae formed both 336 during and after primary crystallization. Using isothermally crystallized PET, 337 Woo *et al.* [45] demonstrated the existence of doublet melting peaks in addition to 338 a series of multiple minor peaks. These results were related to the presence of 339 multiple lamellae population, a distinctive semi-crystalline polymer feature. Liu et 340 al. [46] used both morphological and calorimetric analyses to evidence such 341 multiple melting processes: hence, the lowest endotherm was attributed to the 342 melting of lesser quality subsidiary crystals and the highest endotherm to the 343 major crystallites.

344 Jeon et al. [29] proposed, from Nuclear Magnetic Resonance (NMR) results on a 345 10 kGy gamma-irradiated PET, a mechanism of formation of diethylene glycol 346 segments whereas Yoo et al. [47] worked on the cyclic tris (ethylene 347 terephthalate) (CTET), a widely spread PET oligomer. Authors showed that the 348 316 °C melting endotherm, a distinctive CTET feature, would evolve to a double 349 melting behavior (252 and 313°C) depending on heat treatment. Insofar as melting 350 temperatures were substantially different from the endotherm observed in our 351 research (i.e.176 °C), we attributed it to the emergence of a new lamellar 352 population due to irradiation-induced polymer chain scissions. The formation of 353 small molecules did not seem to influence the Tg, presumably owing to their 354 scarcity. The high-temperature melting peak was construed as resulting from the 355 melting of thick lamellae generated during the industrial film process, whereas the 356 low-temperature melting peak was attributed to thin lamellae formed during 357 irradiation.

358 Crystallinity yields were calculated from the ratio of the melting enthalpy (Δ H) 359 measured by the total area under the melting peak to the melting enthalpy of a 360 fully crystalline PET, i.e. Δ H₀=138 J.g⁻¹ [48]. Integrations were conducted with a 361 linear function. Results are displayed in Table 1.

362 Considering the crystallinity yield calculated from both endotherms (between 140 up to 259 °C), a slight increase was observed over 50 kGy, due to secondary 363 364 lamellae formation. Congruent with our earlier statements, as irradiation dose 365 increased chain scissions developed, fostering thereby secondary lamellae formation. Liu et al. [35] have reported crystallinity stability up to 4.0 MGy 366 367 absorbed doses delivered by swift heavy ions. On the contrary, Zhu et al. [34] 368 showed by both FTIR and X-rays Diffraction (XRD) that high energy heavy ions 369 could damage the benzyl ring of PET and induce a loss of crystallinity. According to our research, as crystallinity increased permeability decreased, a double-fold trend which entailed a valuable consequence, namely a lesser migration of low molecular weight molecules. Small molecules are less likely to spread through crystalline areas than through amorphous ones. Indeed, crystalline areas act as barriers fending off any risk of spreading.

From TGA measurements, we obtained the sample degradation temperature from the derivative curves. Results are given in Table 2. As dose increased, we observed no single temperature variation or any degradation percentage alteration, a fact which implies that even 150 kGy irradiation had no impact whatsoever over PET temperature stability. Degradation temperature was akin to the one claimed by Kinoshita *et al.* [49]: using TGA/FTIR simultaneous analysis, authors evidenced the main gases from PET, i.e. benzoic acid and carbon dioxide.

383

Finally, in the first part, dedicated to the matrix, we have shown that for the dose range used here, no chemical modifications were observed, whereas thermal analysis evidenced physical modifications attributed to chains scissions.

387 Then, we chose to further extend our investigations on irradiation effects over388 non-volatile organic extractables.

389

390 2- Effect of the sterilization on PET's non-volatile extractables – 391 global analysis.

392

First, we aimed at achieving a global analysis of extractables in PET films bymeans of weight measurements. Extractables emerged following irradiation and

were chain scission-related, as stated earlier. Hence, we resorted to SEC in order
to determine extractable molecular weights. RP-HPLC was also used on account
of its enhanced separating efficiency.

398

399 2. 1- Weight measurements

400 PET is known to be radiation-resistant. Regarding mechanical features, authors
401 showed that PET and (High Density Polyethylene /Polyamide) HDPE/PA were
402 the most radiation-resistant and displayed moderate concentration of leachables.
403 Goulas *et al.* [39] have studied the overall migration of several gamma-irradiated
404 packaging materials in aqueous simulants and isooctane by weighing the samples.

We carried out three weight measures. As a result, the trend evidenced a significant weight decrease ranging between 0 and 25 kGy (i.e. from 0.040 \pm 0.006 g down to 0.018 \pm 0.010 g). The loss of volatile compounds involving low molecular weight molecules may indeed account for such a fact. Villain *et al.* [50] reported aldehyde formation following PET thermal degradation. Komolprasert *et al.* [41] argued that a 25 kGy gamma irradiation on PET triggered a significant volatile compound increase, as opposed to non-volatile compounds.

412 50 and 150 kGy doses used in our investigations induced weight increase up to 413 0.056 ± 0.003 g. Chain scission-related oligomers formation may indeed account 414 for such an upward trend.

415

416 2. 2- SEC analysis

417 After weight analysis, we turned to SEC analysis. Although not specific, SEC418 analysis stands as a semi-separative technique suited to releasing further

419 extractable-related information. Figure 3 shows the chromatograms obtained with 420 the RI and UV detectors set at 240 nm which is PET's most specific wavelength, 421 and at 280 nm specific of phenolic groupments. Several peaks are presented in 422 Figure 3. We determined molecular masses (Mp) based on calibration. Table 3 423 displays the masses of the different peaks. Peak n°1 was evidenced by 424 refractometry only, and corresponds to high weight extractables with a 34390 g.mol⁻¹ approximately Mp. As regards retention times exceeding 15 425 426 minutes, several peaks exhibit molecular weight variations within the 1275 to 221 g.mol⁻¹ Mp range. Regardless of the detector used, the top ranking peak 427 corresponds to peak number 3 with a 657 g.mol⁻¹ Mp (Figure 3). Chromatographic 428 429 profiles are similar for both wavelengths even though at 240 nm peaks are far 430 more distinctive.

431 Considering that the monomer molecular weight is of 192 g.mol⁻¹, we can propose
432 that oligomers observed have a polymerization degree varying from 2 to 6 approx.
433 (i.e. peaks 5 to 2, respectively).

434

435 Shiono et al. [21,22] used preparative SEC and mass spectroscopy on PET films 436 to demonstrate the presence of oligomers, as well as cyclic dimers and trimers in particular. Molar masses reach 384 and 576 g.mol⁻¹, respectively. Cyclic trimer is 437 438 predominant because of ring tension [20,51,52]. Insofar as mass spectroscopy is 439 more acute, weight determination is therefore much more accurate. We may hence 440 consider that the top ranking peak in our study (peak number 3) corresponds to the 441 cyclic trimer, that has the highest concentration, and that the accuracy of the 442 calculation method accounts for the molecular mass difference (i.e. Mp= 576 g.mol^{-1} instead of 657 g.mol⁻¹). 443

Ultimately, SEC used on non-irradiated PET enabled us to evidence the presence
of oligomers obtained after extraction. Indeed, the medical grade PET used in our
research remains as such, additive-free, according to the European
Pharmacopoeia's specifications.

449

To extend further probing of extractables, we performed RP-HPLC analyses. The
latter prove far more acute than SEC. Hence, they stand as a relevant preparatory
task towards proper mass spectrometry coupling.

453

454 2. 3- HPLC analysis

455

456 To date, numerous researchers have granted special attention to PET oligomers on 457 the following grounds: highly radiation-resistant polymers such as PET, yield 458 measurable amounts of low molecular weight products. Cyclic n-mers (n=1 to 8) 459 have thus been identified. Among them, the cyclic trimer has been referenced as 460 the most concentrated form. Different methods have been developed and catered 461 to effective PET oligomer identification. As a case in point: Shiono *et al.* [21,22] as well as Nasser et al. [20] carried out preparative SEC. They singled out 462 oligomers from dimer to pentamer (by ¹H and ¹³C NMR). Küppers *et al.* [18] 463 464 implemented the Supercritical Fluid Extraction (SFE) technique towards selective 465 oligomers extraction in PET. Bartle et al. [53] demonstrated that cyclic trimer 466 molecules are not SFE accessible and that soxhlet extraction allows for enhanced 467 extraction yields. Others [17] studied oligomer extracts through Microwave Assisted Extraction given its distinctive time-efficient and solvent saving features. 468 469 Mostly cyclic trimers and heptamers were thus extracted. HPLC coupled with UV

has also been used [16,19]. Lately, mass spectrometry involving thermospray [54]
and Positive Ion Atmospheric Pressure Chemical Ionization has been
implemented to study PET oligomers [14,55]. Such soft ionization, coupled with
an HPLC/MS method enables the identification of oligomers from n=3 to 8.

474 It is noteworthy however, that few researchers have issued to date studies 475 dedicated to low molecular weight compounds in irradiated PET. As a rare 476 example, Buchalla et al. [37] evidenced non-volatile PET radiolysis products such 477 as terephthalic acid methyl and ethylesters such as benzoïc acid. They showed that 478 the concentration of terephthalic acid ethylester increased by a factor 2 after a 479 50 kGy gamma-irradiation (to ca. 2mg/kg) with a limit of detection of their 480 method of 10 µg/L. Moreover, pure ethylene terephthalate oligomers are neither 481 commercially available nor easy to prepare. In the framework of our 482 investigations, we focused therefore on terephthalic and benzoic acids exhibiting 483 close molecular structures (Figure 4): indeed, they stem from PET synthesis and 484 degradation respectively.

485

486 Figures 5a and 5b display the chromatographic profiles of both the acid standard 487 solutions and the extraction solutions at the 240 nm wavelength (wavelength 488 chosen from the maximum absorbance at 240 nm for the major peaks). Regarding 489 the chromatographic profiles of PET extraction solutions, the overall profile 490 remains complex and exhibits several major peaks. From the chromatographic 491 system characteristics, firstly held compounds disclose polar properties and/or 492 small molecular masses. As retention time increases, more apolar or larger 493 compounds are separated. Whenever retention times exceed 25 minutes, the major 494 peaks appear with regular 7-8 minutes approximative time intervals (25, 32, 41 495 and 48 min), while their dose-dependant intensities increase markedly. Such peaks

result most likely from the presence of oligomers with increasing polymerizationorder as their 3D chromatograms display the same UV spectrum.

498 Retention times under 25 minutes yield numerous peaks that correspond to the 499 most polar compounds. We can observe in Figures 5a and 5b that very intense 500 peaks stand at about 4.5 minutes and 9 minutes. Those quickly eluted peaks 501 certainly correspond to dimer and trimer oligomers observed earlier by SEC.

502

503 Although low retention times generate numerous peaks, only terephthalic and 504 benzoic acids have been identified at 5.5 and 7.3 minutes retention times, 505 respectively. We performed a calibration with a linear regression on both acids 506 (n=3). Quantification results are presented in Figure 6. Acid concentrations were 507 calculated on the basis of calibration equation parameters. Concentrations were 508 further rationalized to the mass of PET extracted and to the volume of methanol 509 used to dissolve extraction products. Since extraction was performed in methanol, 510 we hypothesized therefore that trans-esterification could possibly affect acids 511 [16]. Hence, we chose to test such an assumption as follows: we let them boil 512 separately in methanol for two hours; subsequent analysis revealed no difference 513 whatsoever in HPLC with reference to native standards.

514

Figure 6 presents data pertaining to terephthalic acid concentrations: a slight decrease is recorded between 0 and 25 kGy, before rising to 150 kGy. Benzoic acid concentrations are about three times below terephthalic concentrations while displaying similar dose-dependant trends. Since benzoic acid is considered as a terephthalic acid degradation product, such a difference in terms of concentration makes sense.

To the extent that terephthalic acid is a synthesis residue, concentration increase stems therefore from the fact that extractables are easily forced out of the bulk whenever macromolecular chains are degraded. Once should notice that regulation $n^{0}10/2011$ [56], devoted to plastic materials and articles intended to come into contact with food, specifies a specific migration limit of 7.5 ppm for terephthalic acid.

528 CONCLUSION

529 Our investigations performed on electron beam irradiated PET films, demonstrate 530 that chain scissions can be evidenced. Thermal analyses reveal that the latter 531 reduce crystallite size without altering either global crystallinity yield, or stability 532 temperature. Findings are congruent with the study performed on PET 533 extractables which exhibit a dose-dependant extraction yield increase. Indeed, as 534 chain scissions occur, extractables prove more numerous; moreover, they are 535 likely to migrate swiftly towards the polymer matrix and may be easily extracted. 536 Further, we substantiated the presence of terephthalic and benzoic acids. Even 537 though concentration increase proves dose-dependant; the latter remain however far below official pharmaceutical recommendations. 538

539

Within the framework of our experiments, we evidenced two kinds of organic non-volatile extractables: low molecular weight extractables and oligomers, both obtained under low irradiation doses. Concentrations increase, while mobility becomes easier as crystallite size tends to decrease. SEC analysis singled out the trimer as the predominant oligomer. HPLC further substantiated the presence of oligomers. Any acute identification of extractable composition will however require in the future, extended probing through mass spectroscopy coupled withHPLC.

With respect to extractables, leachables do also require further scrutiny. Hence, ageing of materials under accelerated conditions needs to be experimented and mathematical migration models developed accordingly. Ultimately, such results provide a valuable contribution towards pharmaceutical and biological applications: indeed, low molecular weight compounds can migrate out of the polymer bulk and thus interact with the contact medium and we can wonder if they are not able to induce potential toxicity-related risks.
