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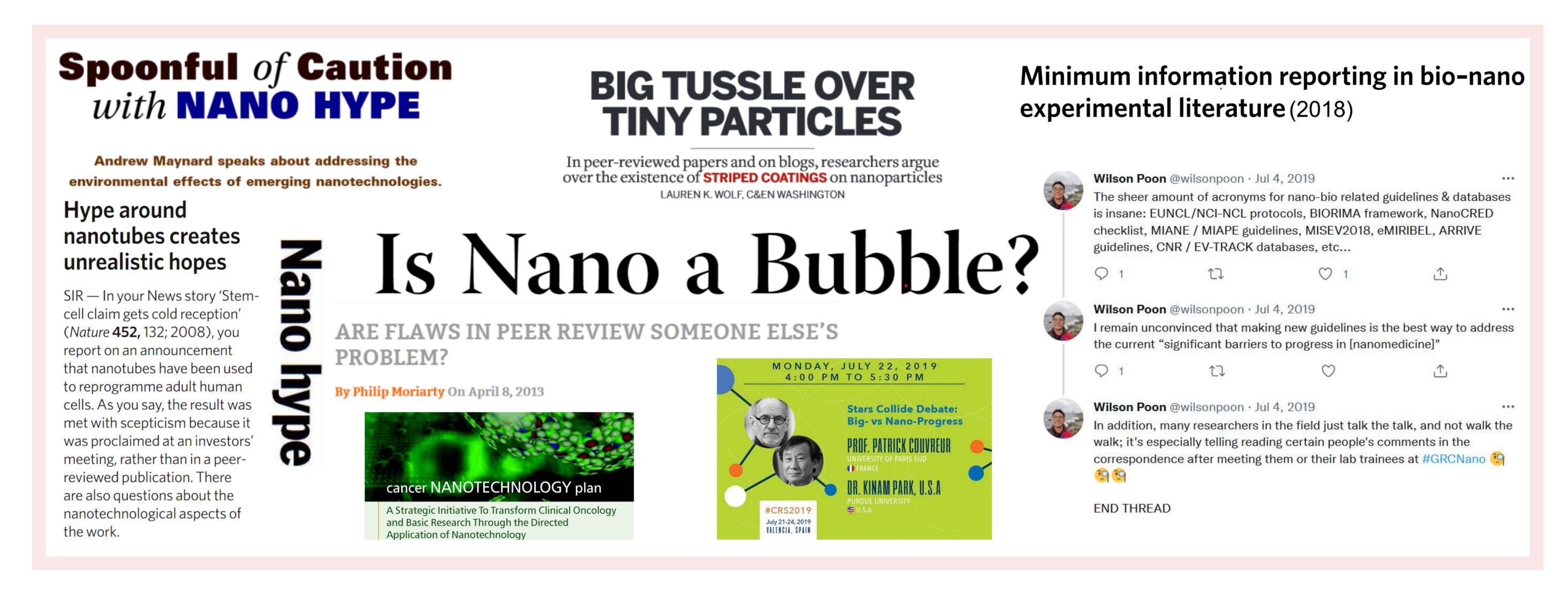
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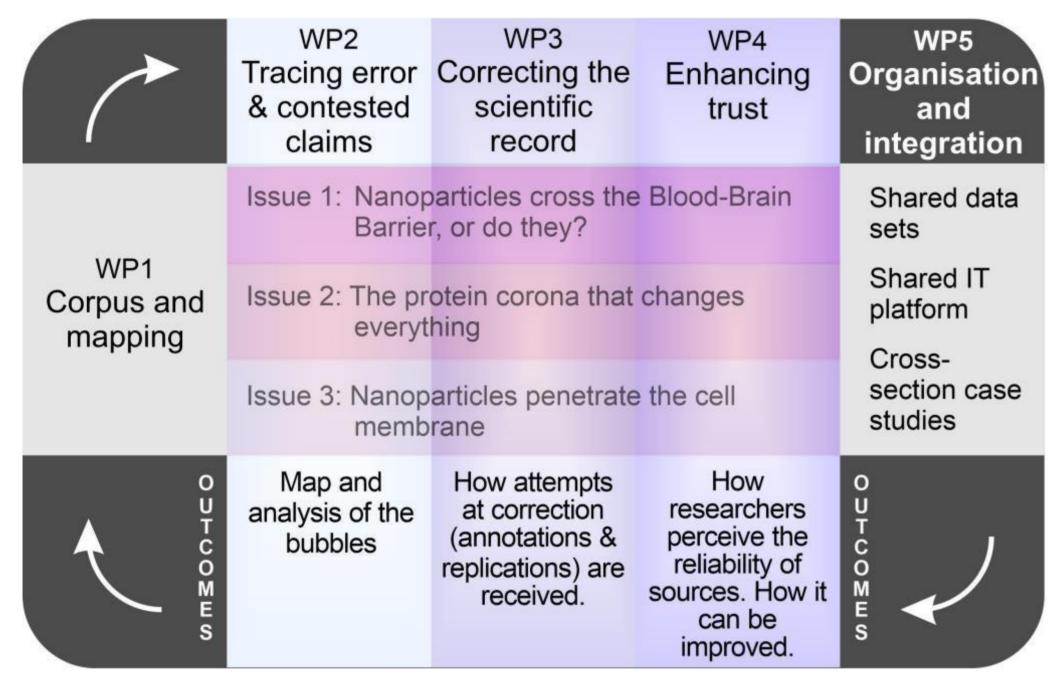

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ABOUT NANOBUBBLES

The project focuses on how, when and why science fails to correct itself. To understand how the correction of science works or fails, the NanoBubbles project combines approaches from the natural sciences, engineering (natural language processing) and humanities and social sciences (linguistics, sociology, philosophy and history of science).

HOW TO KNOW IF AN ARTICLE IS GOOD AND RELIABLE?

We need to read critically but this is difficult, takes time, and each of us may not be a specialist of the techniques involved in the study.



What if for most articles you want to read, you could at the same time read the opinion and analysis of others?

HOW DO WE KNOW IF AN ARTICLE IS REPRODUCIBLE?

The only way is to attempt a replication. This has not yet been done in any systematic way in bionano. We aim to do that. The focus will be imaging/sensing inside cells with nanoparticles.

We will partner with the community to:

- **Identify** the articles/experiments that will be replicated
- **Publish and optimize** the protocols prior to the experiments being conducted
- **Organise** synthesis, materials characterizations and biological investigations in multiple sites
- **Share** the data and the data analysis
