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Impact of Fission Spectrum Modeling on Aging Estimations of Pressurized Water Reactor Vessels

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Study context

- Extension of PWRs operation duration
 - Vessel = 2nd confinement barrier → essential to accurately characterize its structural integrity
 - Neutron irradiation → embrittlement of the vessel material

Monitoring of embrittlement : Surveillance Programs

• Accelerated irradiation of vessel material samples \rightarrow mechanical strength tests



Usual calculation scheme for vessel fluence assessments

<u>First step</u>: fission neutron source term evaluation

Where are the fission neutrons emitted and what is their energy ?

Approximations on the fission spectrum modeling



<u>Second step</u>: modeling of neutron attenuation from the core to the sites of interest (vessel, capsules)

For a quantity of emitted neutrons, how many reach the vessel and what is their energy ?



Questioning and objectives



Case of study

Representative of a French 900 MW_e PWR

- Fuel composition → end of a UOX/MOX equilibrium cycle
- Several in-vessel detectors*
 - Neutron flux > 1 MeV
 - Neutron flux > 100 keV



* : axially located at the middle of the active height of the core



Modeling and Methods



One-step reference calculation

MCNP6 eigenvalue calculation : no spatial or energy averaging



- Variance reduction method: Direct Statistical Approach (DSA)
 - Based on splitting and Russian roulette
 - Optimization of local detectors while maintaining the fundamental mode
 - Usage of neutron superhistories
- Simulation parameters
- 150 active cycles
- 2E+6 neutrons histories per cycle
- 10 fission generation per superhistory









Decoupled approach – second step



- Reactor scale and isotopic fission spectrum → a single fixed source calculation
- Assembly scale fission spectrum → one fixed source calculation per assembly (for a total of 42)

Capabilities

- neutron flux + displacements per atom (dpa)
- wide axial and azimuthal range in the vessel and capsules of the French surveillance program
- · consideration of the history of the reactor

DSA – Direct Statistical Approach

Basic Idea (Dubi '81):

The DSA theory is based on the possibility to obtain <u>exact explicit</u> <u>expressions for the dependence</u> of the second moment and calculation time on the splitting parameters.

- Implemented in MCNP6.1
- > Automatic optimization of the splitting parameters to maximize the FOM

FOM = 1/(Variance * Time)

- > Application of DSA method for multi-detectors problem:
 - Fixed source problem

Assembly case: Response reconstruction

IRSN

$$D_{tot} = \sum_{a} \left(\sum_{i} R_{f,i,a} \cdot \nu_i \right) / \left(\sum_{a} \sum_{i} R_{f,i,a} \cdot \nu_i \right) \cdot D_a \qquad (4)$$

$$\leftrightarrow D_{tot} = \sum_{a} W_a \cdot D_a \tag{5}$$

where, for an isotope *i* and an assembly *a*, $R_{f,i,a}$ is the fission rate (s^{-1}) , v_i is the number of neutrons emitted per fission, W_a is the weight of the assembly *a* and D_a is the detector response for the fixed source calculation of the assembly *a*.

Then, the uncertainty of this total detector response is evaluated according to Eq. (6). All detector responses calculated obtained with the decoupled scheme have a relative standard deviation inferior to 0.5%.

$$\sigma(D_{tot}) = \sqrt{\sum_{a} (W_a \cdot \sigma(D_a))^2}$$

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where W_a is the weight of the assembly *a* (defined in Eq. (5)) and $\sigma(D_a)$ is the uncertainty of the detector response for the fixed source calculation of the assembly *a*.
