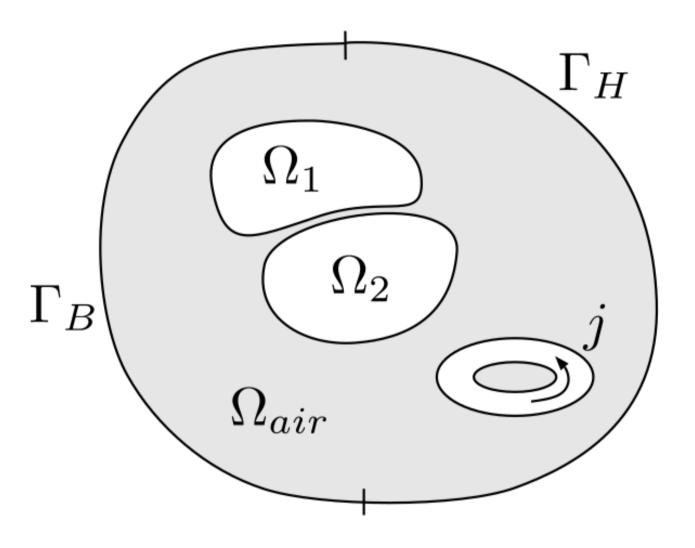

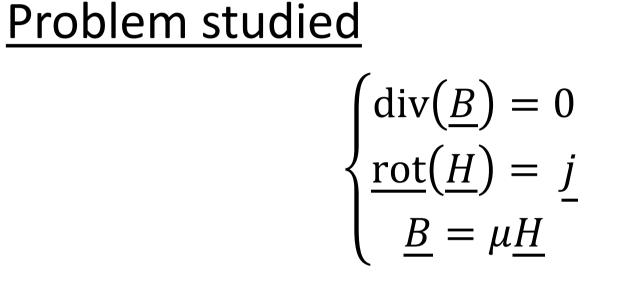
Abstract

In this work, a mixed domain decomposition method (LATIN) is proposed to improve the efficiency of magnetostatic simulation of rotating machines. This strategy relies on a decomposed formulation of the problem considering both primal and dual fields on the interfaces. From this formulation, the LATIN solver method gives a powerful iterative scheme to build a solution. A first implementation using the magnetic vector potential formulation in 2D is developed and is illustrated on two test cases: a ferromagnetic 2D bar and a switched reluctance motor.

1 - Problem statement

Objective: propose an innovative computational strategy based on a domain decomposition method

Decomposition

- Sub-domains Ω_i
- Interfaces Γ between each sub-domains

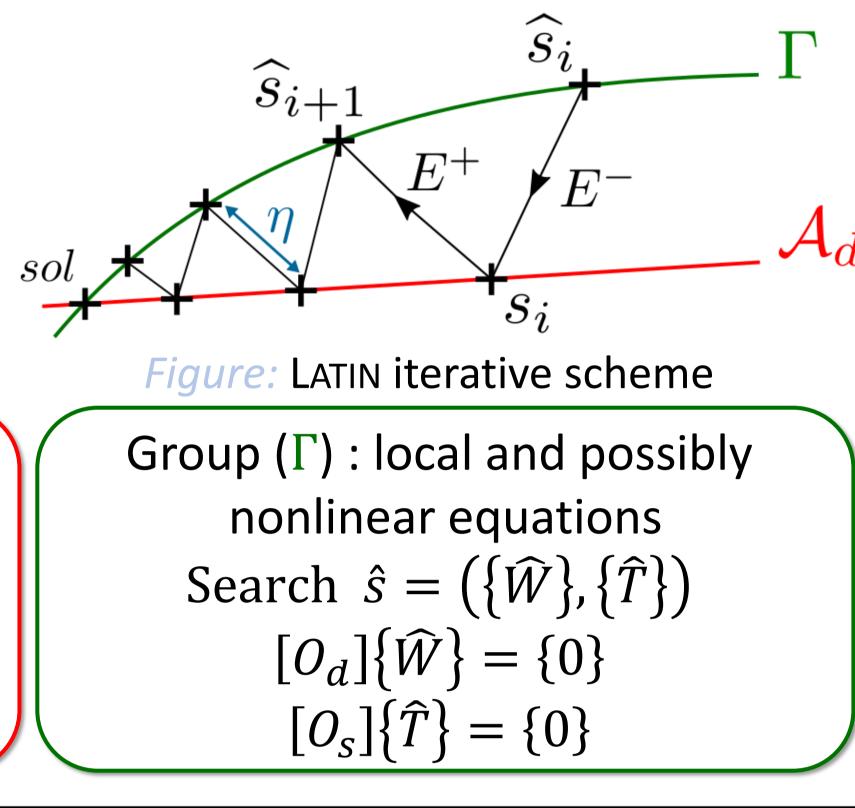
2 - The mono-scale LATIN method

Principles

- Separate equations into two groups A_d and Γ
- Solve with a two stage iterative algorithm according to search directions E^+ and E^-
- Group (A_d) : linear and possibly global equations Search $s = (\{W\}, \{T\})$ $[K]{A} = {J} + [t]^T {T}$ $\{W\} = [t]\{A\}$

Search directions

 $[k^+]$ and $[k^-]$ operators representing sub-domains behavior



Algorithm: Mono-scale LATIN **Input:** $\widehat{s}_0 \in \Gamma$ (generally set to 0) while $\eta \geq criteria$ do

Particularity of the method:

Primal **and** dual fields on the interfaces

- $\{W\}$ restriction of vector potential $\{A\}$ on Γ
- $\{T\}$ tangential component of magnetic field $\{H\}$ on Γ
- Operator [t]: restriction on Γ

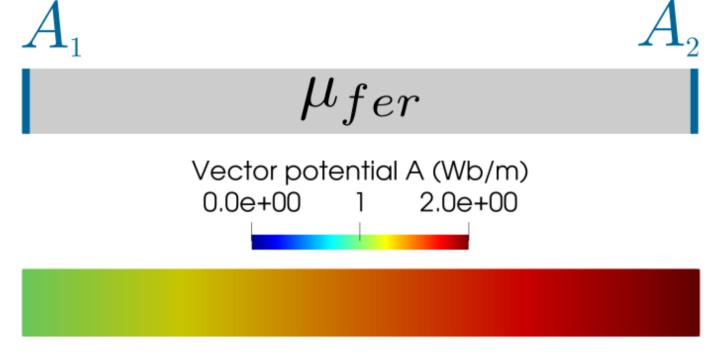
 $\{T\} - \{\widehat{T}\} + [k^{-}](\{W\} - \{\widehat{W}\}) = \{0\}$ $\{\widehat{T}\} - \{T\} + [k^+](\{\widehat{W}\} - \{W\}) = \{0\}$ end

Linear stage for each sub-domain knowing $\widehat{s}_i \in \Gamma$ search for $s_i \in \mathcal{A}_d \cap E^-$ **Local stage** for each interface knowing $s_i \in \mathcal{A}_d$ search for $\widehat{s}_{i+1} \in \Gamma \cap E^+$ **Convergence indicator** compute η

3 - Multi-scale strategy

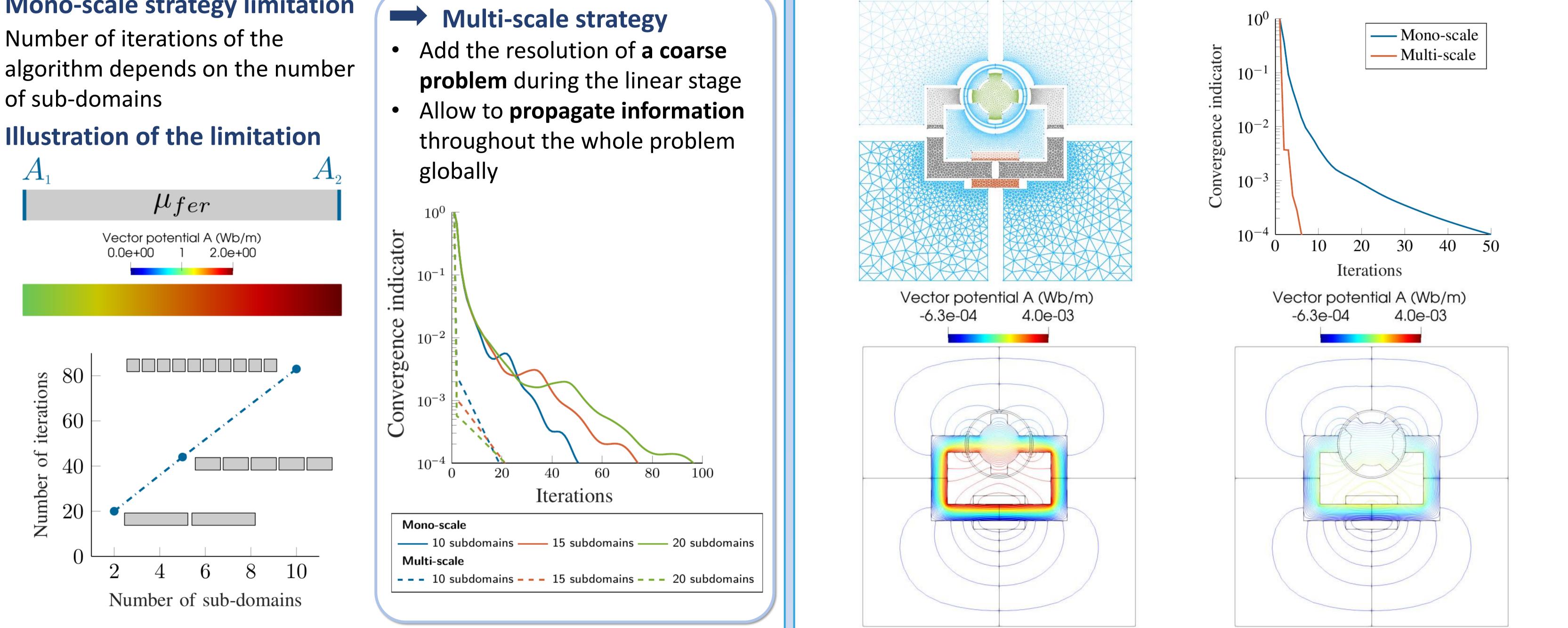
Mono-scale strategy limitation

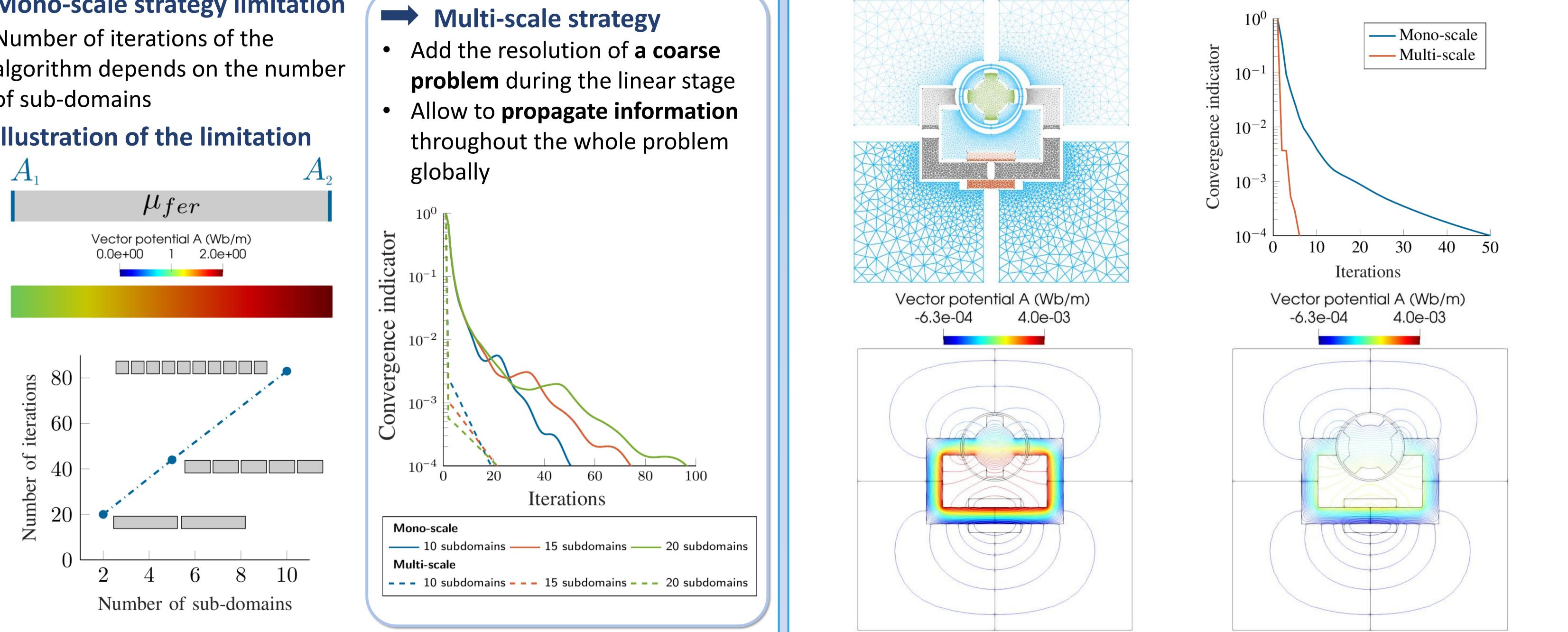
Number of iterations of the of sub-domains



- Add the resolution of a coarse **problem** during the linear stage
- throughout the whole problem globally

- Implementation of a **multi-scale** computational to address the dependence on the number of sub-domains

Upcoming work

- Integrate **nonlinearities** without impacting the structure of the algorithm
 - **3D** simulations with Whitney elements
