

226Ra and 137Cs determination by inductively coupled plasma mass spectrometry: state of the art and perspectives including sample pretreatment and separation steps

65 **1. Introduction**

Among all existing radionuclides, interest in accurate determination of ²²⁶Ra and ¹³⁷Cs is strongly 66 67 related to radiological protection issues and to their use as contamination tracers, for the reasons given below. Indeed, over the past decades, human activities contributed to their release in the 68 environment at different concentration levels and via different sources, thereby increasing potential 69 risks of ionizing radiation exposure to human and his environment. In the case of ²²⁶Ra which is a 70 71 Naturally Occurring Radioactive Material (NORM), release sources namely include uranium, coal and 72 phosphate mining, and fracking (International Atomic Energy Agency, 2014). For the anthropogenic isotope ¹³⁷Cs, main releases come from global fallout, nuclear accidents (Chernobyl, Fukushima), and 73 to a lesser extent from regulated releases from nuclear facilities (Burger and Lichtscheidl, 2018; 74 75 Gupta, 2016). Since Ra²⁺ and Cs⁺ share similar properties with respectively Ca²⁺ and K⁺, once released to the environment, they are likely to replace them in biological and physico-chemical processes, 76 77 thus promoting their accumulation in living organisms and consequently increasing the internal dose. 78 By taking into account their high specific activities and the type of radiations they induce, their 79 tracing from contamination sources constitutes a major concern in radiological environmental 80 monitoring (Jia and Jia, 2012; Russell et al., 2015). However, current challenges are related to the 81 understanding of the geochemical behavior and more specifically of the transport mechanisms of these radionuclides in the environment and between environment and humans, which implies being 82 83 able to precisely measure their concentration at ultra-trace level in complex matrices and sometimes in small sample volumes. 84

As many radionuclides, both ²²⁶Ra and ¹³⁷Cs are still often measured by radiometric techniques 85 according to their emission properties. Hence, the determination of ²²⁶Ra can be performed with 86 alpha (Song et al., 2017; Straub et al., 2018) and gamma spectrometry (van Beek et al., 2010; Molina 87 Porras et al., 2017), or through the determination of its daughter nuclides namely by ²²²Rn emanation 88 (Perrier et al., 2016) and liquid scintillation (Godoy et al., 2016; Idoeta et al., 2018). About ¹³⁷Cs, 89 90 gamma-spectrometry and beta-counting techniques are commonly employed but gamma 91 spectrometry remains by far the current preferred detection method (Haller et al., 1967). Indeed, 92 gamma rays are slightly attenuated by the sample matrix contrary to alpha and beta particles 93 meaning that direct measurement can be carried out (Lariviere et al., 2006; Zheng et al., 2013). 94 Moreover, since alpha and beta counting techniques require long equilibration and counting times to achieve low detection limits, they are not well adapted to process a large number of samples, and 95 they may also not be efficient for applications targeting samples of low activities and small volumes 96 97 (Abbasi, 2018).

98 For some years now, mass spectrometric techniques have also proven their worth in the 99 quantification of radionuclides (Hou and Roos, 2008; Zheng et al., 2013). Among them, Inductively 100 Coupled Plasma Mass Spectrometry (ICP-MS) is the most widely used analytical technique, especially for ²²⁶Ra, but other techniques such as Thermal Ionization Mass Spectrometry (TIMS) and Accelerator 101 102 Mass Spectrometry (AMS) have also been employed (Zheng et al., 2013; International Atomic Energy 103 Agency, 2010; Lehto and Hou, 2011; Bu et al., 2016; Croudace et al., 2017; Thakur et al., 2021). ICP-104 MS is indeed more accessible than the other two techniques cited and continuous progresses in instrumentation regularly enlarge the panel of applications and issues it can help to address. Initially, 105 this analytical technique focused on longer-lived radionuclides (²³⁸U, ²³²Th, etc.) whose low specific 106 107 activities favor atom-counting over radiometric techniques (Croudace et al., 2017; Lariviere et al., 108 2006). In the past few decades, improvements in instrument sensitivity achieved through advances in 109 sample introduction systems, mass spectrometer configuration, and vacuum pump technologies have opened up the possibility of using ICP-MS for quantification of shorter-lived radionuclides, 110 including ¹³⁷Cs (half-life, 30 years) (Amr et al., 2016; Bu et al., 2016; Cao et al., 2016; Ohno and 111 Muramatsu, 2014; Yang et al., 2016; Zheng et al., 2014b, 2014a). Indeed, ICP-MS offers multiple 112 advantages such as measurement of the 137 Cs/ 135 Cs isotope ratio enabling to identify the origin of 113 radioactive cesium (Bu et al., 2016; Russell et al., 2015) and simultaneous determination of the stable 114 115 ¹³³Cs isotope allowing to assess extraction yield of the sample pretreatment step.

116 However, to reach low detection limits and perform accurate and precise measurements of radium 117 and cesium by ICP-MS, removing spectral and non-spectral interferences is mandatory. As far as we know, direct analysis remains limited and rare studies manage to overcome those interference issues 118 using only artifacts related to advances in instrumentation such as Collision Reaction Cell (CRC) or 119 tandem mass spectrometry (MS/MS) (Ben Yaala et al., 2019; Epov et al., 2003; Ohno and Muramatsu, 120 121 2014; Wærsted et al., 2018; Xiao et al., 2020). If such a methodology can be applied on a case-by-122 case basis to certain samples, depending on the matrix and concentrations targeted as well as on the 123 instrument, it is far from being generalizable to any kind of samples and applications yet. This is why sample pretreatment is an essential stage of the analytical process. Several methods and strategies 124 125 have been employed in the past decades with the aim of extracting and preconcentrating radium and 126 cesium and/or eliminating elements causing major interferences, notably the most abundant alkali and alkaline-earth cations in nature (Na⁺, Ba²⁺, Ca²⁺, and Mg²⁺). These methods include sample 127 128 pretreatment techniques (Liquid-Liquid Extraction (LLE) (Beklemishev et al., 1994; van Leeuwen et al., 129 2005; Wang and Zhuang, 2019a), precipitation, and Solid Phase Extraction (SPE)), but also separation 130 techniques (Liquid Chromatography (LC) and Capillary Electrophoresis (CE)), or a combination of 131 these different possibilities. It is sometimes possible to hyphenate them with ICP-MS to perform a so-132 called on-line analysis, which usually results in a substantial saving of time and enhanced repeatability. Among the abovementioned techniques, SPE is the most widely used due to its easy
handling, the variety of sorbents available and the selectivity of which is constantly increasing.
Furthermore, it is worth mentioning its automation ability and high design flexibility that allow it to
meet the diverse application requirements. Nevertheless, some application fields need to push
current sample pretreatment and detection methods over the edge in order to achieve the lowest
detection limits.

139 In our knowledge, to this date, literature reports only four reviews dealing with radium or cesium isotopes determination, but none of them is dedicated specifically to their detection by ICP-MS. A 140 first short review on ²²⁶Ra and ²²⁸Ra that briefly describes some preconcentration methods and 141 142 radiometric or mass spectrometric techniques available for their detection was published in 2018 143 (Abbasi, 2018). In 2021, a comprehensive review has been focused on depicting and comparing the 144 efficiency of various analytical techniques used to collect, pretreat, and analyze radium isotopes both by radiometry and mass spectrometry (Thakur et al., 2021). It has also pointed out challenges arising 145 from the analysis of Ra in gas and oil waste from hydraulic fracking processes. Russell et al. have 146 published in 2015 a review only focused on the determination of ¹³⁵Cs, ¹³⁷Cs and their isotopic ratio in 147 environmental samples (Russell et al., 2015). They detail some general information on radiocesium 148 149 (source, variation and behavior in environment), and provide the common methods to separate it 150 from the sample matrix before performing measurements by neutron activation analysis or mass spectrometry. In 2016, another group made a review on the determination of fission products ¹³⁵Cs 151 and ¹³⁷Cs in combination with ⁹⁰Sr, summarizing strategies available for eliminating interferences by 152 chemical separation and mass spectrometry with a special focus on application of ¹³⁵Cs/¹³⁷Cs 153 154 measurement in real samples (Bu et al., 2016). Through this review, we contribute to a complete and 155 detailed state of the art of preconcentration and separation approaches based on SPE and 156 alternative procedures associated with ICP-MS analysis of radium and cesium over the last 30 years, 157 providing a critical overview of the performances of the different approaches applied either to environmental or biological matrices. Since total chemical purification is never fully achieved, 158 solutions to improve ²²⁶Ra and ¹³⁷Cs signal detection and quantification taking advantage of ICP-MS 159 instrumentation are in turn discussed. After a quick outline of current limitations and future outlooks 160 161 of the different analytical process steps, the last section makes an overview of applications involving the determination of ²²⁶Ra and ¹³⁷Cs. 162

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164 **2.** Sample handling: a critical stage of the analytical methodology

165 The term "sample handling" can be used to refer to all steps between sampling and separation by 166 chromatographic methods or detection (e.g. sample drying, grinding, sieving, ashing, matrix

decomposition, extraction, purification, and preconcentration). Here, we will however restrict its use
to the process step enabling analyte(s) extraction, matrix cleaning (i.e. purification), and/or
enrichment. Indeed, the purpose of a sample handling step preceding an ICP-MS analysis is two-fold:
eliminate fully or partly major elements in order to prevent matrix effects but also elements that can
lead to formation of isobaric or polyatomic interferences, as illustrated in Table 1 for ¹³⁷Cs and ²²⁶Ra
ICP-MS detection.

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2.1. Solid phase extraction: the most spread technique

SPE is nowadays a well-established technique for radionuclides as for many other application fields, 175 176 and its working principle which is similar to the one of chromatography, and related terminology 177 have been well described by the community (Buszewski and Szultka, 2012; Poole et al., 2016; Poole, 178 2019). The usual SPE protocol includes an initial conditioning step of the sorbent followed by 179 percolation of the sample, washing of the non-retained components and finally elution of the target. 180 It has in particular replaced traditional LLE processes which were time-consuming, poorly 181 automatable, generally consumed large amounts of organic reagents, and therefore didn't meet the 182 requirements of green chemistry. Moreover, LLE is not well suited upstream to ICP-MS detection 183 since in the final stage, ions stand in the organic phase jointly with the chelating agent. SPE 184 overcomes the abovementioned drawbacks.

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2.1.1. Ra and Cs extraction using variety of SPE supports

187 The choice of the SPE support is usually driven by its specificity towards the targeted ions or towards 188 interfering ions which need to be removed prior to analysis. Table 2 gathers characteristics of SPE sorbents encountered in Ra and Cs sample preparation protocols followed by ICP-MS detection 189 190 which are expanded in Table 3 (an extended form of this table is available in supplementary 191 information) and whose performances will be discussed in next sections. SPE sorbents can be 192 classified according to many possible criteria such as the nature of the phase, the specificity, and 193 interaction mechanism(s) between analytes and sorbent. In Table 2, we chose to classify them 194 according to the retention mechanism involved (ion-exchange or surface complexation), exemplifying 195 the chemical structure of the interaction site(s) when known. Looking then on the right hand column 196 of each category, readers can get a general idea of their specificity. The goal of this section is to 197 understand and discuss sorbent popularity in light of current knowledge about their application 198 through years: specificity, cost, and limitations.

199 The most used resins in Ra SPE procedures are the cation-exchange resin AG50W-X8 alone (Bonin et 200 al., 2020; Dalencourt et al., 2018; Hodge and Laing, 1994; Park et al., 1999; E.M. van Es et al., 2017; 201 Yang et al., 2020) or in combination with an Sr-spec resin (Copia et al., 2015; Evans et al., 2015; 202 Lagacé et al., 2017; Larivière et al., 2007, 2005; Zhang et al., 2015) containing a crown ether chelating 203 agent, both not being designed to specifically extract Ra. Ra-specific sorbents include MnO₂-based resins, Radium specific disks named RAD disks and resin AnaLig Ra-01. Historically, the affinity of Ra²⁺ 204 205 for Mn-based resins (MnO₂ resin (Moon et al., 2003; Varga, 2007, 2008), Mn-fibers (Bourquin et al., 206 2008), MnO_2 -Polyacrylonitrile (PAN) (Dulanská et al., 2015), and MnO_2 -SiO₂ (Dulanská et al., 2018)) 207 was exploited extensively for its determination in water samples owing to their low price, high 208 adsorption coefficient and the possibility to be prepared homemade. Nevertheless, experience has 209 shown that extraction efficiency can be greatly affected by factors such as extreme pH values, salt 210 concentrations, or use in reducing environment that leads to destruction of the support, making Mn-211 based resins not sufficiently robust for radium pre-concentration in complex matrices (International 212 Atomic Energy Agency, 2010; Varga, 2007). The other two sorbents stated, RAD disks and AnaLig Ra-01, contain macrocyclic ligands whose structures are undisclosed by the supplier and which can 213 214 selectively entrap Ra²⁺ based on the Molecular Recognition Technology (MRT), i.e. the ion is selectively recognized related to the cavity size, the nature and number of chemical functions and 215 216 charges present, as well as the ligand conformation (Dalencourt et al., 2020; Joannon and Pin, 2001; 217 Schettler et al., 2015; Verlinde et al., 2019). To the best of our knowledge, the AnaLig Ra-01 resin is 218 the only specific resin towards Ra that is currently available on the market and deserves thus to be 219 better known and employed in the future despite its substantial cost (price excluding tax: 1940€ for 220 10 g) (Dalencourt et al., 2020; Verlinde et al., 2019). Indeed, since Pedersen's early observations on 221 the ability of crown ethers to complex alkali and alkaline earth ions (Izatt, 2007; Pedersen, 1988), 222 great efforts have been made to increase the stability and selectivity of cation -ligand complexes (van 223 Leeuwen et al., 2005) giving rise to molecules such as highly substituted crown ethers (Chiarizia et al., 224 1999; Dietz et al., 1997), calixarenes (AlHaddad et al., 2020) or calixarene-crown ethers (Chen et al., 225 n.d.) whose syntheses are in return costly and time-consuming. This research of selectivity is all the more challenging in case of Ra²⁺ since from the alkaline earth cations, it has the lowest tendency to 226 form complexes (van Leeuwen et al., 2005) and behave the same way as Ba²⁺, main competitor for 227 interaction sites. Recently, a new calixarene-based ligand called macropa (18-membered 228 bispicolinate diazacrown macrocycle) proved to be an efficient Ra²⁺ chelator for nuclear medicine 229 230 applications (Abou et al., 2021).

For Cs⁺ extraction, inorganic ion-exchange resins constituted of pure ammonium molybdophosphate
(AMP) or AMP-PAN were mainly employed, followed by subsequent extraction on resin AG50W-X8
functionalized with sulfonate moieties (Amr et al., 2016; Epov et al., 2004; Zhu et al., 2021a, 2020).

234 However, it is worthwhile to notice that pure AMP was preferentially used in batch mode (see 235 section 2.2.1) than in cartridge because the material consists of fine particles, leading to AMP leakage 236 from the cartridge and limiting the loading flow rate (< 1 mL min⁻¹) to avoid back pressure (Epov et 237 al., 2004). To solve these issues, Epov et al. tried to load AMP on different kind of supports (glass 238 wool, Teflon beads or silicagel) (Epov et al., 2004). Small particle size of the silicagel prevented them to work at flow rates greater than 1 mL min⁻¹ and they found out that in addition to the flow rate 239 value, Cs recovery was also highly dependent on the amount of support material. The best 240 241 compromise was achieved using 100 to 250 mg of glass wool plus 25 mg of AMP since recoveries between 95% and 99% could be reached working at flow rates in the range 1 to 8 mL min⁻¹. More 242 243 recent papers rather use AMP-PAN sorbents (Zhu et al., 2021a, 2020). Potassium nickel ferrocyanate 244 (KNiFC) is another inorganic material known to possess high affinity for Cs but it is less used because 245 less selective than AMP-based sorbent. Zheng et al. effectively observed that KNiFC-PAN adsorbed 246 circa two times more Ba (21.1%) and three times more Sn (60%) than AMP-PAN (Zheng et al., 2014a), 247 elements that are source of isobaric and polyatomic interferences, respectively. Valuable research on the design of specific macrocyclic chelating agent has also been carried out in case of Cs⁺ (Dozol et 248 249 al., 1999; Frensdorff, 1971; Simonnet et al., 2018; Wang and Zhuang, 2019a), but contrary to Ra²⁺, no 250 commercial sorbent containing Cs specific macrocyclic extractants exists at this time. To take 251 advantage of the great potential of these molecules, one group however solubilized the commercial 252 ligand MacroLig 209R in octanol and loaded it onto a commercial Amberchrom CG-71 resin (Russell 253 et al., 2014b). Bearing two crown-6 groups, one MacroLig 209R ligand can in theory binds two Cs⁺ 254 ions (Cs coordination number being 6) but comparison between theoretical and experimental 255 capacities rather revealed a 1:1 stoichiometry. Thus, the capacity of the resin could be improved by 256 increasing the calixarene concentration into the impregnated resin but this solution may be limited 257 by the high cost of the molecule.

One can finally notice that apart from rare authors that make their resins themselves (Russell et al., 2014b), sorbents used for Ra and Cs SPE are commercial. They can be purchased already packed in cartridges, with different options, or even in powder form enabling users to develop custom applications: adaptation of the amount of phase and cartridge format (e.g. AnaLig Ra-01 resin packed into a 2 x 40 mm tube (Verlinde et al., 2019) or AG50W-X8 resin loaded into a 10 mL Eppendorf pipette tip (Yang et al., 2020)) or modification of the initial phase to design tailor-made sorbents (Russell et al., 2014b).

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2.1.2. Key parameters for an optimal SPE

267 SPE procedure development must be guided by the objective of removing a maximum of interfering 268 elements while minimizing at most the number of manipulations and the sample processing time. As 269 a proof of efficiency, a common practice consists in exhibiting the decontamination factor (DF) values 270 (Figure 1) or the elution profiles obtained with the optimized method. Basically, the minimum DF to 271 reach is dictated by the ICP-MS instrument, and more precisely by concentrations from which 272 spectral interferences induce an overestimation of the targeted radionuclide signal. For example, measurement of the DF of multiple elements (solutions at 100 ng L⁻¹) from a cartridge containing 273 274 0.02 M of calixarene ligand (MacroLig 209R) demonstrated the high specificity of the resin: apart 275 from Cs (1), Rb (30) led to the lowest DF among the alkali metals (K (1,100), Na (2,100), and Li 276 (7,100)) and all other elements tested including Ba, which is responsible for isobaric interferences (DF 277 values ranging from 880 to 12,000). DF can also be used to compare efficiency of different methods, 278 so long as they are applied on similar sample matrices.

279 As a first step, one need to know the affinity, maximum capacity, and breakthrough volumes of the 280 supports that will be used. These parameters may be provided by the supplier, found in previous 281 papers or have to be estimated former in the lab. The support affinity is most of the time evaluated 282 by batch experiments to avoid collecting several fractions at this stage of development. For instance, 283 a valuable set of data on distribution coefficients (K_d) of Ra and a large panel of elements (alkali, 284 alkaline-earth, poor, and transition metals, lanthanides, and actinides) for the resin AnaLig Ra-01 in 285 acidic medium (HNO₃ and HCl concentrated from 0.01 to 10 M) was determined by batch experiments (50 mg of resin, 20 h of contact time under stirring) by Gourgiotis and coll. while until 286 287 now, poor knowledge about this resin was available (Verlinde et al., 2019). Also knowing the matrix composition and the order of magnitude of the concentration of targeted radionuclides in the 288 289 sample, the parameters aforementioned constrain the amount of sorbent and the sample loading 290 volume required. Usually, the optimization is carried out using simulated samples, sometimes also 291 called artificial or synthetic samples, which refer as pure solutions mimicking the matrix composition 292 of the targeted real samples and spiked with the radionuclides of interest.

293 Then the most important part of the procedure development is based on determining the best 294 conditions for fixing ions and next their desorption, playing essentially on the nature of solutions and 295 the volumes used. Adding one or more washings before elution can greatly improve the selectivity of 296 the extraction protocol by eliminating some interfering elements also retained during sample 297 loading. Obviously, when more than one resin is used (e.g. need to improve the decontamination 298 factors depending on the concentration targeted, or several targeted elements with different 299 chemical properties to extract and measure), new constraints may result. In the best case, elution 300 fraction from a resin can directly be percolated on the next one, as realized for instance with 301 successive extractions on AG50W-X8 and Sr-spec resins (Copia et al., 2015; Lagacé et al., 2017). But 302 this is far from being always the case since the elution solution is generally not a suitable medium for 303 fixing ions on the following resin; an evaporation to dryness is thus often needed before re-304 dissolution in the appropriate medium (Larivière et al., 2005, 2003; Pietruszka et al., 2002; Zhang et 305 al., 2015). This increases the risk of contaminations and losses and the total analysis time. It is worth 306 noting that most of the time, authors only adapt a procedure from an existing one so that it meets 307 the requirements of their samples and application, but uncommon are papers in which an advanced 308 optimization is conducted. Hereafter, you will find some developments or facts that deserve to be 309 pointed out.

The first SPE procedure on AnaLig Ra-01 resin was established from K_d values in different media 310 311 which allowed to select the nature of solutions to apply as well as their order (Verlinde et al., 2019). 312 Since apart from Ra and Ba, the most retain elements, Pb and Tl, were weakly adsorbed at 6 M HCl, 313 and Sr at 0.1 M HCl, the SPE procedure was thus realized by loading the sample in 0.1 M HCl to 314 minimize Sr retention and washing the cartridge with 0.1 M HCl and 6 M HCl, therefore achieving to purify the sample from more than 70% of Sr and 80% of Tl and Pb before elution of Ra and Ba with 315 0.12 M of nitrilotriacetic acid (NTA) adjusted to pH 10. Residual amounts of Sr and Ba in the elution 316 fraction did not induce formation of polyatomic interference ⁸⁸Sr¹³⁸Ba, even with solution containing 317 circa 300 µg L⁻¹ of each element, thus making this procedure that requires only one resin quite simple 318 319 to implement. Though in that case, selective Ra elution was achieved with the help of a chelating 320 agent, sometimes element affinity to the support is so strong that finding a competitive stripping 321 agent is not easy. For instance, Ra elution from RAD disks prior to radiometric detection (application 322 for which these disks have first been conceived) involve the use of ethylenediaminetetraacetic acid 323 (EDTA) (Fons-Castells et al., 2016; Purkl and Eisenhauer, 2003) or diammonium hydrogen citrate (DHC) (Ďurecová, 1997). However, to reach quantitative Ra recovery, it requires high concentrations 324 325 and large volumes of these reagents. Thus rather than performing a tough elution step that could 326 degrade the procedure blank, one group decided to recover Ra by digesting the resin with strong 327 acids (hydrofluoric acid, aqua regia containing H_2O_2 and $HCIO_4$) (Joannon and Pin, 2001). Although 328 specific to Ra and attractive for radiochemical analyses, RAD disks appear rather a burden prior to 329 ICP-MS introduction, due to the use of chelating agents, which probably explains why they occur only 330 twice in Table 3 (Joannon and Pin, 2001; Schettler et al., 2015). Concerning procedures on other kind of sorbents, most of the groups applied HCl or HNO₃ solutions at various molarities to separate Ra²⁺ 331 332 or Cs⁺ from interfering elements (Bi et al., 2016; Granet et al., 2008; Hodge and Laing, 1994; Kim et 333 al., 1999; Park et al., 1999; Russell et al., 2014b; Tsai et al., 2010; E.M. van Es et al., 2017; E. M. van Es 334 et al., 2017; Yang et al., 2020). Working with the resin AG50W-X8, Larivière et coll. were the first ones 335 who exclusively employed complexing agents (EDTA, NTA, and 1,2-diaminocyclohexanetetraacetic 336 acid (CDTA)) all along their procedure, thus taking advantage of the different complexation

337 properties of these agents to compensate the lack of resin selectivity (Dalencourt et al., 2018). 338 Nevertheless, some elements competitors for interaction sites (Na, Cs, Ca, Ba, Cr, Zn, and Th) were 339 still present, up to 40% of their initial amount, in the radium fraction. Note that if chelating agent 340 may be useful to perform selective elution, their presence in the elution fraction may cause 341 important matrix effects in ICP-MS. Gourgiotis et coll. observed the presence of NTA entailed a decrease of the signal, but they were able to take into account the derive by the use of ¹⁰³Rh as 342 internal standard (Verlinde et al., 2019). Another group noticed that apparent signal generated at 343 m/z 226 by the presence of the polyatomic interferences ⁸⁸Sr¹³⁸Ba⁺ was 7 to 22-fold higher in NTA 344 solution than in HNO₃, reinforcing the need to remove those elements before elution to avoid 345 346 mistakes during quantification (Dalencourt et al., 2018). Using the same resin, Yang et al. (Yang et al., 347 2020) managed for their part to remove Na, K, Mg, Ca, and Sr elements using a low amount of 348 organic solvent (20% ethanol) in 4 M HCl as washing solution. These conditions were selected to 349 make a compromise between cation exchange distribution coefficients for Ba and Sr in mixtures of 350 HCI with variable percentage of solvents (methanol, ethanol, ace tone, and dioxane) (Strelow, 1968), 351 and the fact that the presence of solvent can slow down the flow rate and rate of exchange between 352 solution and resin, and also induce Ba precipitation as chlorides.

353 Considering Cs extraction on AMP support, Cs elution is most of the time achieved by applying an 354 alkaline solution but this one also entails decomposition of the AMP support, which results in 355 contaminations of Mo coming from the resin in the elution fraction, as well as varying amounts of Sn, Sb, and Ba coming from the sample and retained to some extent during percolation. Since some of 356 those elements may interfere with detection of ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁷Cs forming polyatomic interferences 357 $(^{119}Sb^{16}O^{+}, ^{121}Sb^{16}O^{+}, ^{120}Sn^{17}O^{+}, ^{95}Mo^{40}Ar^{+}, and ^{97}Mo^{40}Ar^{+})$ or leading to the presence of isobaric 358 interferences (stable ¹³⁵Ba and ¹³⁷Ba isotopes), this explains why, further purification on AG50W-X8 359 360 was made (Amr et al., 2016; Epov et al., 2004). Rather than dissolving the AMP-PAN resin and 361 introducing high amount of interfering elements in the sample, Zhu et al. achieved to elute Cs with 4 362 M NH₄Cl (Zhu et al., 2020). But, since presence of large amount of NH₄⁺ could compete with Cs⁺ for interaction sites on AG50W-X8 resin, a sublimation step was introduced to remove NH₄Cl (heating at 363 364 350°C for 1-2 h in presence of 60 mg of LiCl as protective agent to prevent loss of Cs) before 365 proceeding further in sample purification.

When the final elution volume does not allow sufficient Ra or Cs enrichment or if the elution medium is not suitable for introduction in ICP-MS, a final evaporation/re-dissolution step can be applied (Granet et al., 2008; Hodge and Laing, 1994; Joannon and Pin, 2001; Kim et al., 1999; Park et al., 1999; Tsai et al., 2010; E.M. van Es et al., 2017; Verlinde et al., 2019; Yang et al., 2020). Sometimes, it is also preceded by treatments with oxidizing agents to remove any residual organic matter present prior to analysis (Hodge and Laing, 1994; Tsai et al., 2010; Verlinde et al., 2019). In complement to the optimization of volume and nature of solutions, it can be useful to evaluate the impact of the flow-rate on the recovery (minimum contact time necessary between sample-support so that interactions can occur) in order to increase the sample handling throughput. This is however not much studied in literature.

376 Reliable manners to quantify possible loss during sample handling, concentrations of radionuclides of 377 interest, and to estimate the method detection limit must be used, especially when a complex procedure is realized. The best approach for precise yield calculation remains isotopic dilution. For 378 ²²⁶Ra, a radiochemical tracer such as ²²⁸Ra (Kayzar and Williams, 2016; Kim et al., 1999; Larivière et 379 al., 2007; Pietruszka et al., 2002; Scott et al., 2019), which is the most used, or ²²⁵Ra (Schettler et al., 380 2015), is added before starting the procedure. The use of ²²⁸Ra demands to remove its daughter ²²⁸Th 381 just before the analysis to avoid isobaric interference. This often involves addition of an extra TRU 382 cartridge at the end of the extraction procedure. Due to the short half-life of ²²⁵Ra ($T_{1/2} \sim 14.9$ days), 383 Schettler et al. determined the recoveries by gamma spectrometry, requiring a wait of about 12 days 384 after SPE and analysis of ²²⁶Ra by ICP-MS (Schettler et al., 2015). It is however worth noting that such 385 tracers cannot be bought as pure solution, they always contain ²²⁶Ra to some extent, and nowadays 386 there is still no Ra source certified in isotopic ratio available on the market. Thus, the main difficulties 387 388 lie first of all in finding a source with a high 228/226 ratio to avoid adding uncertainty during determination of ²²⁶Ra concentration in the sample. Secondly, in characterizing precisely the 389 390 composition of the spike, and determining the ideal amount of spike to add in the sample to 391 minimize uncertainties. In-house spikes may for instance been prepared from an old thorium salt 392 (Chabaux et al., 1994) or commercial Th standard solution (Vieira et al., 2021). An alternative to isotopic dilution is based on measuring the level of ¹³³Ba before and after sample purification (Tsai et 393 al., 2010; Yang et al., 2020). In the case of ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁷Cs, common practice consists in using the 394 stable isotope ¹³³Cs (Amretal., 2016; Zhu et al., 2021a). Isotopic dilution was also used to determine 395 low concentrations of ¹³⁵Cs in soil samples based on gamma spectrometry measurements of ¹³⁷Cs 396 already present in the sample (Zhu et al., 2020). In that case, except for the tracer, the principal 397 398 analysis of the target radionuclide was made by ICP-MS.

399 In many cases, the instrumental detection limit (IDL) was determined by measuring the signal of the 400 target analyte in clean blanks (diluted HNO₃ solutions) (Table 3), which does not take into account 401 the matrix composition (eluent solution and presence of remaining interfering elements) of the 402 fraction injected in ICP-MS after sample purification. This results in an overestimated IDL. Though not 403 perfect, the following approach was used by Wang and coworkers to take into account matrix effects: they quantified ²²⁶Ra in several matrices with the standard addition methods and used the 404 405 different slopes of the curves to estimate impact of the amount of total dissolved solids (TDS) on the IDL, which ranged from 0.12 to 2.2 pg L⁻¹ for matrix containing up to 12% of TDS (W. Wang et al., 406

407 2021). Sometimes, IDL calculation is also based only on three times the standard deviation of the 408 blank solution, omitting thus the non-negligible contribution of the mean of the blank, which is not 409 acceptable since it leads to overestimation. Comparison of data from literature is thus a bit biased by 410 the lack of homogeneity of practices and the different analyzers used. The overall Method Detection 411 Limit (MDL) can be either experimentally determined applying the sample preparation method 412 before ICP-MS analysis, or calculated (theoretical MDL) by dividing the IDL by the theoretical 413 enrichment factor. Though an experimental MDL is closer to the real value, it remains an 414 overestimation because it is difficult to make a solution truly representative of the composition of 415 the real sample for its determination; none of the published studies has attempted to reconstitute 416 the sample matrix. As it can be seen, for many of the values presented in Table 3, the nature of the 417 solution used was not specified in articles. In addition, when only an MDL value was provided by 418 authors, it is not always clear to know if they correspond to theoretical or experimental data since 419 too little information about detection limit estimation was given. From all these data, the lowest MDL reached for ²²⁶Ra is 0.009 pg L⁻¹ (Bonin et al., 2020). It was assessed by applying their SPE 420 421 procedure on 500 mL of a 0.25 M HCl solution adjusted to pH 2, taking thus into account only 422 background noise that can arise from residual contaminants coming from the resin and reagents used. This value is five times higher than the calculated theoretical MDL (0.002 pg L⁻¹) although it still 423 424 does not consider matrix effects.

425 Once the method is optimized, the last step is to determine whether it is robust by applying it to 426 different kind of matrices allowing thus to identify the limits of the proposed methodology and 427 assess improvement options. As an example, Lagacé et al. attained the limit of their procedure trying 428 to percolate increasing volumes of spiked seawaters (from 10 to 90 mL and containing from 0.26 to 429 2.34 g of salts on 1 g AG50W-X8 + 1 g Sr-spec) (Lagacé et al., 2017). They indeed managed to recover 430 99 ± 4% (n=3) of Ra when loading 10 mL of seawater, but when treating larger volumes, the Ra-431 recovery gradually decreased from $85 \pm 9\%$ (n=3) for 30 mL to $57 \pm 8\%$ (n=3) for 90 mL, showing that 432 either the capacity of the resin or the breakthrough volume were exceeded with such kind of matrix. From all the sorbents, the AnaLig Ra-01 resin is the only one that presents a very high affinity for Ra 433 434 since only 50 mg of the resin was enough to recover up to 73% of Ra by loading 100 mL of spiked 435 seawater, with no dependence of the matrix composition on the efficiency of the procedure 436 (Verlinde et al., 2019).

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2.1.3. Figures of merit of SPE procedures for Ra and Cs in literature

438 It can be seen from Table 3 that despite the complexity of some of the procedures, most of the time,
439 global recoveries greater than 70% were obtained. Therefore, the recovery yield is not a pertinent

criterion to distinguish a method from another. In addition, when no standard deviation or relativestandard deviation is specified, the question of the repeatability remains unanswered.

So far, large sample amounts are still needed to succeed in accurately measuring ²²⁶Ra or ¹³⁷Cs, 442 especially in water samples where radionuclides concentrations are known to be lower. Apart from 443 444 two groups which were able to perform Ra extraction from well waters and wastewater from shale 445 gas extraction with volumes as low as 2 mL (Larivière et al., 2005; Zhang et al., 2015), Ra or Cs single 446 and sequential SPE procedures were mainly applied to liquid samples between 0.01 and 1 L 447 (Benkhedda et al., 2005; Bi et al., 2016; Copia et al., 2017, 2015; Dalencourt et al., 2020, 2018; Epov 448 et al., 2004; Evans et al., 2015; Hodge and Laing, 1994; Joannon and Pin, 2001; Lagacé et al., 2017; 449 Larivière et al., 2003; Park et al., 1999; Schettler et al., 2015; E. M. van Es et al., 2017; E.M. van Es et 450 al., 2017; Verlinde et al., 2019; W. Wang et al., 2021; Yang et al., 2020), and sometimes even several 451 L (Kim et al., 1999; Tsai et al., 2010); as well as on solid samples (between 0.004 and 100 g) after 452 digestion and re-dissolution in different volumes of percolation solution (between 1 and 500 mL) 453 (Amr et al., 2016; Bonin et al., 2020; Dalencourt et al., 2018; Granet et al., 2008; Kim et al., 1999; 454 Larivière et al., 2007, 2003; Pietruszka et al., 2002; Russell et al., 2014b; Tsai et al., 2010; Zhu et al., 455 2020). Hence, significant discrepancies in terms of theoretical enrichment factors (EF, ratio of 456 percolated volume to elution or re-dissolution volume calculated for a maximum recovery of 100%) 457 between methods can be noticed, values ranging from several tens to several hundreds. Though 458 starting from a high sample volume is comfortable to exceed the IDL, it is not always a feasible 459 option. Indeed, the lack of protocols adapted to small volumes makes currently difficult, if not 460 impossible, the determination of these two radionuclides in samples whose volumes are intrinsically 461 limited (e.g. pore water, biological samples), and thus is a barrier to progresses on understanding 462 their geochemical behavior or health impact. In addition, the price to pay when loading such sample volumes is the use of large amounts of resins (up to 10 or 25 mL or g sometimes (Bi et al., 2016; Kim 463 et al., 1999; Larivière et al., 2007; Pietruszka et al., 2002; Tsai et al., 2010; Yang et al., 2020)) and 464 465 reagents to accomplish purification and elution, which can be detrimental to the chemical procedure blank and often induce addition of extra purification or enrichment steps. As illustration, 100 mL of 466 467 solution were required to recover Ra after percolation of 5 L of geothermal water on 10 g of AG50W-468 X12 resin. But as the EF was not enough, an additional evaporation/re-dissolution step was 469 performed to increase it to 1,000, which of course was time-consuming in view of the volume to 470 treat. Other cases can be found in supplementary information in the extended form of Table 3 where 471 more details on the procedures are available.

Those last years, groups working on Ra and Cs have more and more tended to develop rapid and
straightforward SPE procedures, thus avoiding as far as possible the association of several resins.
Single resin extraction procedures represent almost 50% of the works presented in Table 3 (Bi et al.,

2016; Bonin et al., 2020; Dalencourt et al., 2018; Granet et al., 2008; Hodge and Laing, 1994; Joannon 475 and Pin, 2001; Kim et al., 1999; Park et al., 1999; Russell et al., 2014b; Tsai et al., 2010; E.M. van Es et 476 477 al., 2017; E. M. van Es et al., 2017; Verlinde et al., 2019; Yang et al., 2020). Note however that among 478 them, rare are papers which trialed their final method to aqueous samples highly charged in salts 479 such as seawater (Verlinde et al., 2019), or to solid extracts (Bonin et al., 2020; Russell et al., 2014b), 480 and even more to both solid extracts and liquid samples (Dalencourt et al., 2018); which makes quite 481 limited comparison between methods in terms of robustness. Labor-intensive protocols that employ 482 2 to 5 different sorbents were in particular developed to extract Ra from aqueous samples with high 483 level of TDS (e.g. seawater, fracking or mine waters (Dalencourt et al., 2020; Epov et al., 2004; Evans 484 et al., 2015; Lagacé et al., 2017; W. Wang et al., 2021; Zhang et al., 2015)) and from complex solid 485 matrices (e.g. soils and sediments (Amr et al., 2016; Larivière et al., 2007; Zhu et al., 2020), rocks and 486 ores (Larivière et al., 2003; Pietruszka et al., 2002; Scott et al., 2019), or biological solid samples (spruce twigs and needles) (Larivière et al., 2003)), or when other radionuclides than ²²⁶Ra needed to 487 be measured: determination of uranium and thorium series nuclides (Dalencourt et al., 2020; Scott et 488 al., 2019), of ²²⁶Ra and ²²⁷Acto establish model age of nuclear materials (Kayzar and Williams, 2016), 489 or of ²²⁶Ra–²³⁰Th–²³⁸U disequilibria in volcanic rocks (Pietruszka et al., 2002). In the case of multi-SPE 490 491 procedures, we observed these last years some effort being made on better thinking the procedures 492 to reduce the sample preparation time, and to facilitate the treatment of several samples 493 simultaneously or else procedure automation. Though in the past, each SPE could be intersected by an evaporation step (Larivière et al., 2007, 2005, 2003; Pietruszka et al., 2002; Schettler et al., 2015; 494 495 Zhang et al., 2015), nowadays some authors manage to do fully without any evaporation step, even combining 3 different sorbents (Dalencourt et al., 2020; W. Wang et al., 2021). The following smart 496 497 trick was also implemented by Larivière et coll. in order to minimize the sample pretreatment time: a 498 common sample matrix was loaded on 3 cartridges connected in series and containing a total of 4 499 resins in the order TRU (for selective U and Th extraction), Sr resin (for selective Pb and Po 500 separation) and a mixture of AnaLig Ra-01 and AG50W-X8 resins (for selective Ra extraction) 501 (Dalencourt et al., 2020). After applying a common washing step, cartridges were separated to 502 perform specific elution steps on each one. Comparing all procedures from Table 3, the sample 503 processing time ranges, when it is specified, from several minutes (Benkhedda et al., 2005; Evans et 504 al., 2015; Larivière et al., 2003) to several hours (<3 h in (Dalencourt et al., 2020, 2018; Epov et al., 505 2004; Larivière et al., 2005; Verlinde et al., 2019) and >7 h in (Lagacé et al., 2017; Park et al., 1999; 506 Zhang et al., 2015)), and even days (Hodge and Laing, 1994; Larivière et al., 2007; Zhu et al., 2020), 507 showing that many of the procedures are still very time-consuming, even when only one or two 508 resins are employed.

509 Considering all the performance criteria available (see Table 3 and extended form of Table 3: 510 recovery yield, enrichment factor, procedure complexity, sample preparation time, and suitability to 511 diverse matrices), we believe that SPE procedures developed by Larivière et coll. (Dalencourt et al., 512 2018) and Amr et al. (Amr et al., 2016) (first developed by Epov et al. (Epov et al., 2004)), respectively 513 for targeted Ra and Cs extraction, are to this day the most performing. In addition, they have both 514 the potential to be automated to perform on-line SPE, which refers to the introduction of SPE 515 support(s) into column(s) whose outputs are directly connected to ICP-MS. Such automated systems 516 for on-line purification, preconcentration, and detection are advantageous in many ways: they can avoid time-consuming laboratory bench work and reduce risks of exposition to ionizing radiations, 517 which is all the more important when extracting Cs from samples containing ¹³⁴Cs and ¹³⁷Cs isotopes 518 519 that are short-lived gamma ray radionuclides (half-lives of 2.1 and 30 years, respectively).

520 To the best of our knowledge, only three groups developed on-line SPE coupled to ICP-MS for measurement of ²²⁶Ra, performing a fast sequential extraction (< 30 min) on two to three different 521 522 sorbents by the use of a flow-injection (FI) introduction system (Benkhedda et al., 2005; Evans et al., 523 2015) or a lab-on-valve (LOV) and multi-syringe flow injection analysis system (LOV-MSFIA) (W. Wang 524 et al., 2021). In the latter case, we are not convinced that the term LOV used by authors is 525 appropriate since no monolithic structure comprising channels (including incorporation of sorbent 526 phase in microconduits) is shown on the setup, and reagents are used above the milliliter levels 527 contrary to definitions on that technology available in literature since its invention by J. Ruzicka (Luque de Castro, 2014; Ruzicka, 2000; Yu et al., 2011). It is rather also a FI system since sorbents 528 529 seem to be in cartridges linked to several valves and syringes. Currently, the great majority of Ra and Cs extraction procedures are still performed off-line (Table 3), with flow rates generally ranging 530 between 1 and 4 mL min⁻¹ with cartridges (Bi et al., 2016; Bonin et al., 2020; Dalencourt et al., 2020; 531 Lagacé et al., 2017; Larivière et al., 2005; E. M. van Es et al., 2017; Yang et al., 2020) and up to 50 mL 532 min⁻¹ on Radium RAD specific disks (Joannon and Pin, 2001; Schettler et al., 2015). Ra extraction at a 533 534 lower flow rate (0.1 mL min⁻¹) was also applied off-line on 50 mg of AnaLig Ra-01 resin packed into a 535 2 x 40 mm column and the use of a peristaltic pump in order to minimize back pressure and increase 536 the interaction time with the sorbent (Verlinde et al., 2019). Since flow rates up to about 1 mL min⁻¹ 537 can be compatible with ICP-MS inlet and since the tendency is to move toward procedures 538 simplification, the on-line SPE approach should spread in next years. Note however that the main 539 constrain during on-line SPE is to introduce only compatible effluents to the plasma. This implies 540 being able to elute target elements with sufficiently low HNO₃ molarities from the last support, or 541 alternatively choose to dilute the elution solution and consequently decrease the enrichment factor. 542 As seen in extended form of Table 3, few elution media from the off-line procedures would be 543 compatible without modification for direct analysis, which explain why an evaporation step stands as final step. Procedures need also to be better thought in that way. And contrary to traditional introduction system, the use of an on-line SPE system generates transient signals the duration of which depends on the loop size, meaning that when carrying a multielement analysis, more compromises have to be taken during selection of measurements parameters.

548 As a final remark, the reuse of resins is not common in articles, mainly for two reasons (Russell et al., 549 2014b; W. Wang et al., 2021). For many application fields such as precise isotopic ratio measurement 550 for dating purpose, any memory effect of sorbents is not tolerated and sorbent washing to remove 551 residual traces of elements may be very time-consuming and may also consume lots of reagents. In a 552 study, a kind of reuse was made reprocessing the separation of Ra from Ba two times on the same Sr-553 spec resin to improve the decontamination factor. But no contamination issues, neither extensive 554 cleaning are involved in that case since it concerns the same sample. The only true reuse example 555 refers to a calixarene impregnated resin (Russell et al., 2014b). Due to the high cost of the MacroLig 556 209R ligand impregnated, Russell et al. investigated the possibility to regenerate (with 20 mL of 0.5 557 mM HNO₃) and reuse their custom made cartridge, demonstrating that about 2% of Cs remained on 558 the cartridge after extraction of Cs from leached sediments. This could be solved by further washing 559 but obviously, a compromise must be found between cost of regeneration and cost of using a new 560 sorbent.

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2.2. Other purification techniques

2.2.1. Dispersive solid phase extraction alone or associated with SPE

Unlike conventional SPE, in dispersive solid phase extraction (dSPE), also named batch extraction, 564 565 sorbent particles are not packed in a cartridge but dispersed in the sample. This implies to separate particles from the sample solution before changing the solution for next extraction steps (washing 566 and desorption). For this purpose, three approaches may be implemented: filtration through a 567 568 syringe filter (Cao et al., 2016; Russell et al., 2014a; Varga, 2008; Yang et al., 2016; Zheng et al., 2016, 569 2014b, 2014a), centrifugation, or use of a magnetic field when sorbent particles have magnetic 570 properties. In any case, it requires a lot of manipulations and increases the risk of loss of the target 571 analyte as encountered by Zhu et al. (AMP powdered adsorbed on the flask walls and thus impacting 572 the Cs recovery yield) (Zhu et al., 2021b). The main parameter influencing the dSPE recovery yield, 573 and that should therefore be optimized, is the contact time between sorbent and sample to reach an 574 equilibrium state. Generally, adsorption times of 1 (Cao et al., 2016; Russell et al., 2014a; Varga, 575 2008; Yang et al., 2016; Zheng et al., 2016, 2014b, 2014a; Zhu et al., 2021b; Zok et al., 2021) or 2 h 576 (Asai et al., 2020) were applied by authors, meaning that sorption kinetics is quite fast. This was

proved by Russell *et al.* who specified that under 30 min, Cs ions were still detected in solution while
Cs uptake was maximum after 60 min and remained unchanged after 24 h (Russell et al., 2014a).

579 dSPE was mainly applied for Cs extraction and only inorganic resins were employed, namely AMP 580 (Cao et al., 2016; Yang et al., 2016; Zheng et al., 2016, 2014b, 2014a; Zhu et al., 2021b; Zok et al., 581 2021), AMP loaded on silicagel (Russellet al., 2014a), or KNiFC embedded in a PAN matrix (Cs resin) 582 (Asai et al., 2020) in case of Cs, and MnO₂ resin (Varga, 2008) for Ra. Adsorption is generally 583 performed under stirring to favor ion diffusion towards sorbent. Mass transfer is also facilitated with 584 small sorbent's particles (nanoparticles being the best) that have a high surface-to-volume ratio 585 (Poole, 2019) and depends on temperature. Asai et al. used Cs resin with particle size distribution of 586 100-600 µm and realized extraction at room temperature but in other articles, temperature is not 587 given, meaning the effects of temperature was not explored in any paper though it could result in a 588 further decrease of the procedure time (Asai et al., 2020).

It can be seen from Table 4 (an extended form of this table is available in supplementary 589 information) that except in one paper, dSPE was combined to conventional SPE for further sample 590 591 purification, resulting in the use of a total number of 1 to 4 different sorbents (Asai et al., 2020; Cao 592 et al., 2016; Russell et al., 2014a; Varga, 2008; Yang et al., 2016; Zheng et al., 2016, 2014b, 2014a; 593 Zok et al., 2021). As mentioned previously, the use of AMP in dSPE prior to other purification steps 594 often demand to dissolve the AMP sorbent to recover Cs, which also leads to introduction of 595 interfering elements such as Mo, in the sample. As an alternative, Zhu et al. did not dissolve the AMP sorbent with a conventional strong basis solution, but with Sr(OH)₂, which allowed to recover free Cs⁺ 596 in solution while MoO_4^{2-} and PO_4^{3-} were precipitated in the forms $SrMoO_4$ and $Sr_3(PO_4)_2$ (Zhu et al., 597 598 2021b).

Zheng *et al.* developed a method enabling to measure ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁵Cs/¹³⁷Cs isotope ratio in highly 599 radioactive samples (¹³⁷Cs activity more than 1,000 Bq kg⁻¹) requiring the use of 3 steps (one in dSPE 600 followed by two in SPE) and 3 sorbents (35 mg of AMP + AGMP-1M and AG50W-X8 in the form of 2 601 602 mL cartridges) for 2 to 10 g of sample (Zheng et al., 2014a). However, they demonstrated 2 years later that the same method was not suitable when treating low radioactive samples ($20 < {}^{137}$ Cs 603 604 activity < 1,000 Bq kg⁻¹) (Zheng et al., 2016). To compensate the low activities, they were indeed 605 forced to increase the sample amount up to 40 g sometimes, inducing the presence of main matrix elements (AI, Ca, K, Mg, and Na) in the final fraction at concentrations up to 70 mg L⁻¹ which would 606 607 cause severe matrix effects in ICP-MS. The purification was improved by replacing the 2 mL AG50W-608 X8 cartridge by a bigger one (10.5 mL) and by adding also an extra Sr-spec resin (concentrations of matrix elements in the analyzed fraction were reduced from 0.02 to 2.3 mg L⁻¹ this way), making this 609 610 extensive but powerful purification method in combination with an APEX-Q-ACM and ICP-MS/MS detection system, one of the most sensitive of Table 4 (MDL of 2 pg L^{-1}), and even of Table 3 and 5, 611

for the determination of ¹³⁵Cs, ¹³⁷Cs, and ¹³⁵Cs/¹³⁷Cs. The method was wellvalidated by measuring Cs isotopes and 135/137 isotopic ratio in 7 CRM and comparing values obtained by TIMS measurements of the same samples available in literature. The lowest MDL (1.5×10^{-4} pg L⁻¹) was however recently achieved by a procedure also involving 3 steps (one in dSPE followed by two in SPE) with 3 sorbents (10 g of AMP + 2 mL AMP-PAN cartridge + 10 mL AG50W-X8 cartridge) and enabling to assess both ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁵Cs/¹³⁷Cs in large volumes of seawater (40-50 mL) by ICP-MS/MS (Zhu et al., 2021b).

In order to limit radiation dose arising from treatment of liquid wastes containing ¹³⁷Cs, Asai *et al.* (Asai et al., 2020) only performed a dSPE procedure with a Cs resin (10-30 mg) and including two steps (Cs accumulation and washing), on a very low sample volume (0.03-0.3 mL) before subsequent Cs analysis by Laser Ablation ICP-MS (LA-ICP-MS) directly on the resin. In all other dSPE procedures, no washing step was realized prior to desorption (often on the top of a SPE cartridge by passing an eluent solution from the syringe filter used to collect sorbent particles), probably to minimize ion loss and extraction procedure duration.

Due to a lack of data related to extraction and re-dissolution volumes, only two high theoretical EF 625 values of 300 and 25,000, were estimated, respectively for procedures involving Ra and Cs extraction 626 627 from seawater, where activities are much lower than in other matrices (Varga, 2008; Zhu et al., 628 2021b). Recoveries of generally more than 70% were achieved using either dSPE alone or combined 629 to SPE. However, except when highly specific sorbents towards Ra and Cs will exist and will enable to 630 reach high enough DF by only performing an adsorption and a desorption step, dSPE could not be used as a stand-alone technique and in any case, will remain less convenient than cartridge-based 631 632 SPE with the same sorbent. It should be noted that the direct analysis by LA-ICP-MS on the resin after 633 dSPE can be as well an interesting alternative when difficulties for eluting the target analyte from the 634 sorbent are encountered. In such a case, enrichment is indeed no longer possible if large volumes of 635 eluents are necessary, and matrix effects may occur during ICP-MS analysis when exotic and 636 concentrated chelating agents are used.

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2.2.2. Precipitation/co-precipitation associated with SPE

Precipitation consists in the conversion of the analyte in solution into an insoluble form by addition of a carrier that drives the formation of the so-called precipitate (Table 4). Since Ra abundance in environment is too low to overcome the solubility limit of any Ra solid compounds, co-precipitation of Ra is induced by the presence of other elements, such as Ba, Ca or Pb (International Atomic Energy Agency, 2010). Addition of a sulfate or a carbonate carrier therefore entails formation of respectively BaSO₄, PbSO₄ or CaCO₃ mineral phases, which incorporate Ra (and other elements) during precipitation process. Co-precipitation with manganese dioxide constitutes another alternative and

was mostly used by authors (Bourquin et al., 2011; Cozzella et al., 2011; Sharabi et al., 2010; Zoriy et
al., 2005). This technique consists in mixing the sample with potassium permanganate and
manganese dichloride. The formation of the MnO₂ precipitate is then driven by adjustment of the pH
to 8-9 (Sharabi et al., 2010; Vieira et al., 2021). Above 9 precipitation of Mg may occur (Vieira et al.,
2021).

651 Since MnO₂ can enclosed a variety of elements other than Ra (e.g. Th, U, Po, Ac, and Pb), procedures 652 include further purification by SPE using 1 (Cozzella et al., 2011; Zoriy et al., 2005) and up to 3 653 (Bourquin et al., 2011) or 4 (Sharabi et al., 2010) resins. According to Cozella et al., supernatant 654 contained most of Ca and part of Sr and subsequent SPE using AG50W-X8 resin was thus essentially 655 made to separate Mn, and Ba from Ra (Cozzella et al., 2011). Dissolution of the MnO₂ precipitate 656 prior to SPE was performed using HCl from 6 M (Bourquin et al., 2011; Sharabi et al., 2010; Vieira et al., 2021) to 9 M (Cozzella et al., 2011). A representative and low experimental MDL of 0.17 pg L⁻¹ was 657 658 obtained by applying this procedure on six urine samples from unexposed workers of a research site 659 (Cozzella et al., 2011). The proposed method was also able to reach mean recoveries of up to 76% 660 with only 5% RSD (n=6), requiring a global time of 2 days for sample preparation and analysis of a 661 batch of 4 samples. The limiting step is co-precipitation since it requires one night to fully form the 662 precipitate and let it decant.

663 For the purification of digested soil samples, some groups opted for lead-sulphate co-precipitation 664 followed by additional extraction on AG50W-X12 resin (Kim et al., 1999; Tsai et al., 2010). The Pb(Ra)SO₄ co-precipitate obtained was then dissolved in a mixture of 0.1 M EDTA and 5 M 665 666 ammonium acetate adjusted to pH 4.5-5 before loading on the AG50W-X12 cation exchange resin to 667 eliminate other cations also entrapped in the precipitate and including Pb whose presence may lead to the formation of hydride $({}^{208}Pb{}^{16}O{}^{1}H_{2}^{+})$ and oxide $({}^{208}Pb{}^{18}O{}^{+})$ at m/z 226 in the ICP plasma. The 668 669 carbonate co-precipitation method was employed twice, by addition of a NaCO₃ carrier resulting in 670 the formation of Ca(Ra)CO₃ (Foster et al., 2004; Hsieh and Henderson, 2011). This method is however 671 not recommended for very large sample volumes since carbonates are known to be more soluble 672 than sulphate-compounds (International Atomic Energy Agency, 2010).

In case of Cs, Ba removal by precipitation of Ba(OH)₂ was employed only once without performing
other purification technique (Meeks et al., 1998). No conclusion on the efficiency of this one-stage
approach can however be drawn since no recoveries are mentioned.

676 Precipitation or co-precipitation are in particular well suited to preconcentrate analytes from large 677 sample volumes by the use of common reagents. This cannot always be achieved by conventional 678 SPE since sorbent capacity and/or breakthrough volume can be outreached when loading samples of 679 several hundreds of mL. Ra preconcentration from diverse sample matrices (mineral and ground 680 water (Zoriy et al., 2005), natural and saline water (Sharabi et al., 2010), seawater (Bourguin et al., 2011; Foster et al., 2004; Hsieh and Henderson, 2011), urine (Cozzella et al., 2011) but also sediments and soils (Kim et al., 1999; Tsai et al., 2010)) of volumes of sample or extract ranging from 20 mL to 60 L was accomplished using this technique combined to SPE, leading sometimes to extremely high theoretical enrichment factors (between 4 and 20,000). However, as dSPE, precipitation and coprecipitation techniques require lots of manipulations and thus cannot be automatized; and moreover, cannot be used as stand-alone techniques as they do not sufficiently purify the sample.

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2.3. Research on emerging sorbents to improve extraction techniques

As previously mentioned, extraction of ²²⁶Ra and ¹³⁷Cs at ultra-trace level in complex matrices is at 689 690 the moment limited by the lack of capacity and specificity of available commercial sorbents. This 691 results in the implementation of complex and time-consuming multi-steps and multi-SPE procedures. 692 New developments are therefore focusing on the design of innovative sorbents, on the one hand 693 playing on the nature of the material to increase the reactive surface and thus the capacity (e.g. 694 nanostructured materials or composite sorbents), and on the other hand, playing on the binding site 695 to make the support more specific (e.g. ion-imprinted polymers (IIPs)). Note that sorbents presented 696 below may not have been specifically designed for purification prior to analysis by ICP-MS but it is 697 interesting to spend a little time examining these new trends which could help improving SPE 698 extraction techniques and open-up new application perspectives.

699 Nanometer-sized materials are particularly interesting as they exhibit large surface area. Depending 700 on the preparation method, they can be prepared in different forms including nanoparticles, 701 nanofibers, nanoribbons or nanowires. Recently, Alby et al. (Alby et al., 2018) published a 702 comprehensive review in which they compare different inorganic nanostructured materials, namely 703 titanate, vanadate, tungsten, manganese oxides, hexacyanoferrates, metal sulfides, and ammonium 704 molybdophosphates in order to fix Cs. Though the coefficient distribution values did not seem to vary 705 significantly from one family to another, due to their structures, the sorption capacities were really 706 different, vanadate oxides and metal sulfides-based materials presenting the best ones (i.e. 4.00 mmol g^{-1} for a potassium metal sulfide framework $K_{2x}Mg_xSn_{3-x}S_6$ (x = 0.5–1) also known as KMS-2 707 (Mertz et al., 2013) and 3.29 mmol g⁻¹ for vanadate nanofibers (Sarina et al., 2014)). Nevertheless, 708 709 some of them can only be used over a limited pH range otherwise their sorption capacities are 710 altered (e.g. pH 1 for vanadosilicates, pH 6 for vanadate nanotubes and pH 7-9 for titanate 711 nanotubes and silicotitanates). This may constitute a limit for some applications. In a more general 712 review about radionuclides trapping, a state of the art of progress in synthesis and application for 713 other types of nanomaterials was done: Metal-Organic Frameworks (MOFs, formed by a network of 714 coordination bonds between metal ions and organic ligands) and covalent organic frameworks,

graphene oxides, carbon nanomaterials, nanoscale zerovalent iron, MXene and polymer brushes
(Wang et al., 2019). Authors also provide insight of advantages and disadvantages of each material as
well as limitations that make them currently available for laboratory applications rather than large
scale studies (e.g. pollution management).

719 Development of composite or hybrid sorbents was also investigated for Ra and Cs extraction, the 720 objective being to create a more performant solid support by taking advantage of the specific 721 properties of two different materials or more (synergic effect). Two Ra composite sorbents made of a 722 PAN polymer coated with MnO₂ (Dulanská et al., 2015) or of a silica gel and MnO₂ (Dulanská et al., 2018) were studied for the determination of ²²⁶Ra in natural waters. Contrary to procedures 723 724 developed with previous commercial or self-prepared MnO₂ resins which often employ a mixture of 725 HCl/H₂O₂ to elute Ra that entails destruction of the resin and leaching of high amount of Mn in the extract, they were able to elute Ra with HCl or HNO₃ solutions. In the study on MnO₂-PAN sorbent, 726 727 they only evaluated the effect of calcium concentration (from 70 to 2,070 mg L^{-1}) on Ba recovery (analogue of Ra used during the optimization step) whereas experiments were done on a larger panel 728 of potential competitors (0.07-5.07 g L^{-1} for Ca and Mg and 1-300 g L^{-1} for K and Na) for MnO₂-SiO₂ 729 730 sorbent. In both cases, salt content did not entail a significant decrease, Ba recovery being higher 731 than 95% for the whole concentration range tested, and above 77% in case of Ra extraction from 732 spiked mineral waters. No additional information on the sorption capacity was available.

733 In a review, Wang and Zhuang also mentioned the growing interest for cesium composite sorbents made of a carbon substrate, including activated carbon, carbon nanotubes, graphene, and graphene 734 735 oxides (Wang and Zhuang, 2019b). As an example, a new Cs sorbent was prepared, which combined 736 the Cs-selective binding properties of potassium copper hexacyanoferrate with the intrinsic advantages of a porous carbon activated substrate material (e.g. large surface area, high thermal and 737 738 mechanical stability, and strong resistance even in extreme chemical environment) (Wang et al., 2009). In presence of interfering elements, the cesium capacity measured was 0.38 mmol g⁻¹ while 739 the support selectivity followed the order Cs >> Na > Co > Sr > Fe > Ni. No application on real samples 740 741 was however conducted. Additional chemical modification of the particles to provide them magnetic 742 properties was sometimes made (Kim et al., 2018; Xia et al., 2020). Magnetic particles can indeed be 743 of a great interest for dSPE applications since they can easily be collected using a magnetic field after 744 their immersion in the sample.

Due to their large specific surface area, adjustable pore size, and ease-of-functionalization, MOFs have also been investigated for Cs removal (Asgari et al., 2019; Naeimi and Faghihian, 2017). A MOF based on Nd-benzene tricarboxylic acid was designed to have high sorption capacities for Cs⁺ and Sr²⁺ and achieved maximum capacities around 0,7 mmol g⁻¹ for both ions (Asgari et al., 2019). Its performances were not tested in presence of interfering elements nor on a real medium. Group of

750 Naeimi et al. even synthesized a composite porous magnetic sorbent, namely a magnetized Cu-751 benzene tricarboxylic acid MOF (known as HKUST-1) impregnated with potassium nickel 752 hexacyanoferrate (Naeimi and Faghihian, 2017). It showed moderate sorption kinetics (adsorption equilibrium reached in 45 min), high distribution coefficient for Cs^+ (1,500 mL g^{-1}) and high adsorption 753 capacity (1.15 mmol g^{-1}) over a broad range of pH. They however noticed Cs⁺ uptake was greatly 754 affected in the presence of high concentrations of K^+ and Na^+ (> 50 mg L⁻¹ of interfering ions), thus 755 demonstrating a limited specificity in presence of these competitors that can be present with 756 concentrations in the range 10^4 mg kg⁻¹ in the earth's crust (Darnley et al., 1995). Here also, the 757 758 proposed adsorbent and adsorption conditions developed were not confronted to a real sample.

Note that most of these new materials are at the moment evaluated by dSPE, measuring the distribution coefficients of various elements, but no elution step is performed. We thus have no idea on how difficult it is to achieve elution of Ra or Cs, a necessary step to perform ICP-MS analysis by classical solution nebulization rather than by laser ablation of the sorbent, nor if implementing flow conditions affect the results. Consequently, even if some of them seem to have interesting features, they are still far from an application on real samples, and characterizations need to be pushed further.

766 To improve the specificity, some authors examined potential of ion-imprinted polymers, which 767 possess cavities designed to specifically recognize a target ion. IIP recognition capability is a result of 768 the synthesis process that uses the targeted ion or a chemical analogue as template. Cavities are 769 obtained by forming a complex between several molecules of one or more monomers of different 770 natures and the template ion, in a solvent. Then, in the presence of a cross-linking agent and a 771 polymerization initiator, polymerization occurs around the template ion, thus creating specific 772 cavities, complementary to the ion in terms of size, shape, and complexing groups. The template ion 773 is finally removed by washing to free the polymer matrix cavities. IIPs can be obtained in bulk or in 774 the form of (nano)particles according to the polymerization method employed. Though the use of 775 this technology has been previously reported in the field of radiochemistry such as for selective 776 uranium removal (Ahmadi et al., 2010; Kusumkar et al., 2021; Metilda et al., 2007; Preetha et al., 777 2006), nobody has yet investigated the possibility to design Ra-IIP and only a few groups synthesized 778 Cs-IIPs to use them either as sensor (Iwasaki and Yoshikawa, 2016; Z. Wang et al., 2021) or as SPE 779 sorbents (Meng et al., 2015; Shamsipur and Rajabi, 2013; Yang et al., 2017; Zhang et al., 2010), but 780 not for radiocesium determination purpose.

Shamsipur *et al.* (Shamsipur and Rajabi, 2013) synthesized for instance Cs-IIP nanoparticles (50-90 nm) by precipitation polymerization using dibenzo-24-crown-8 ether and methacrylic acid as monomers, ethyleneglycol dimethacrylate as crosslinker, and a mixture of acetonitrile and dimethylsulfoxyde as solvent. In order to evaluate the specificity of the material, distribution

785 coefficients of several metal cations were measured in dSPE, therefore by batch experiments with 50 mg of IIP. K_d value was 1,534 mL g⁻¹ for Cs⁺ whereas it did not exceed 10 mL g⁻¹ for all other 786 interfering ions tested (Li⁺, Na⁺, K⁺, Rb⁺, NH⁴⁺, Ag⁺, Mg²⁺, Ca²⁺, and Sr²⁺), highlighting the presence of 787 specific cavities. Presence of specific recognition sites was also confirmed by the fact that the 788 789 corresponding non-imprinted polymer exhibited a K_d value for Cs⁺ around two times less than the IIP. Batch measurements were conducted to estimate the IIP capacity (0.4 mmol g⁻¹). It was then 790 applied to the determination of Cs in spiked groundwater and tap water and the dSPE procedure 791 792 developed (200 mL of sample, adsorption at pH 9 for 20 min, and desorption with 2 mL HNO₃ 0.1 M 793 for 7 min) allowed to reach recoveries above 95% (n=3). Therefore, at first sight this approach seems 794 promising and it would be interesting in future years to inquire if it can be a viable alternative to 795 current sorbents.

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797 3. Use of separation techniques prior to ICP-MS detection

798 Potential of separation techniques such as LC (Alonso et al., 1995; Granet et al., 2008; Isnard et al., 799 2009; Liezers et al., 2009; Moreno et al., 1999, 1996; Plausinaitis et al., 2013; Taylor et al., 2008) and 800 CE (Pitois et al., 2008) were evaluated by a few groups to separate Cs from interfering elements but not in case of Ra (Table 5). In particular, they were used to perform complete separation of Cs from 801 Ba whose natural isotopes 135 and 137 can interfere with accurate determination of ¹³⁵Cs, ¹³⁷Cs, as 802 well as ¹³⁵Cs/¹³⁷Cs atomic ratios. All of these studies made an application on real samples (fuels 803 (Alonso et al., 1995; Granet et al., 2008; Isnard et al., 2009; Moreno et al., 1999, 1996; Pitois et al., 804 805 2008; Plausinaitis et al., 2013), groundwater (Liezers et al., 2009), and soil and sediment extracts 806 (Taylor et al., 2008)), but two approaches were implemented: few groups introduced a sample 807 pretreatment step prior to the separation technique in order to pre-clean the sample (Granet et al., 808 2008; Isnard et al., 2009; Taylor et al., 2008), otherwise the sample was directly injected into the separation system (Alonso et al., 1995; Liezers et al., 2009; Moreno et al., 1999, 1996; Pitois et al., 809 810 2008; Plausinaitis et al., 2013). In that case, the injection volumes mentioned were high (200 μ L 811 (Alonso et al., 1995; Moreno et al., 1999) or 1 mL (Plausinaitis et al., 2013)) compared to conventional values. In the first approach, the recovery of the sample pretreatment step was not 812 813 specified. LC was all the time performed using ion-exchange columns. A mobile phase gradient was applied once (Granet et al., 2008), otherwise authors realized isocratic separations of Cs isotopes 814 from Ba using either HNO₃ (Alonso et al., 1995; Liezers et al., 2009; Moreno et al., 1999, 1996; Taylor 815 816 et al., 2008) or a complexing agent (0.1 M oxalic acid at pH 4.8 (Plausinaitis et al., 2013) or 2-hydroxy-817 2-methylbutyric acid at pH 3.8 (Isnard et al., 2009)) as mobile phase eluent. In many cases, eluent 818 was compatible with ICP-MS introduction, thus the LC separation and the ICP-MS detection were made on-line (Alonso et al., 1995; Liezers et al., 2009; Moreno et al., 1999, 1996; Plausinaitis et al.,
2013; Taylor et al., 2008), by connecting the end of the column to the ICP detection system,
therefore avoiding risks of contaminations and losses induced by collection of fractions. Generally,
the separation time was less than 30 min (see extended form of Table 5 in supplementary
information).

Plausinetis *et al.* first optimized the separation working on stable isotopes (¹³³Cs, ⁸⁷Sr, ⁸⁸Sr, ⁸⁵Rb, ⁸⁸Rb, 824 ¹³⁴Ba, ¹³⁵Ba, ¹³⁷Ba, and ¹³⁸Ba) and studied the effect of several parameters, such as the stationary 825 826 phase nature and the eluent composition, on the quality of the separation (Plausinaitis et al., 2013). 827 Three acids, namely citric, tartaric, and oxalic acids, were tested and chromatograms obtained after 828 separation on an IonPac CS5A stationary phase showed retention times of Rb and Cs were 829 independent from the eluent nature because alkali metals do not form stable complexes with 830 carboxylic acids contrary to Sr and Ba. They also managed to improve their method detection limit by 831 increasing injected volume up to 1 mL without observing peak deformation.

In order to purify either UOx or MOx spent nuclear fuels, two groups carried out a first sample 832 833 preparation step involving purification of the sample from U and Pu by SPE on an AG1X4 resin, then 834 followed by separation of Cs from other fission products by an off-line LC – ICP-MS analysis (Granet 835 et al., 2008; Isnard et al., 2009). Granet et al. also compared the interest of performing both SPE 836 extraction and LC separation steps rather than only SPE prior to detection by MC-ICP-MS with N₂O in 837 the CRC to improve Baremoval from the sample matrix (Granet et al., 2008). It can be seen in Figure 2 that uncertainties are higher for the fraction analyzed after a single purification by SPE (FP Cs 838 839 fraction on the graph) than those of fraction purified by the sequential SPE-LC method (HPLC pure Cs 840 fraction on the graph). According to the authors, larger uncertainty in FP Cs fraction arises from the presence of more than 30 ionizable elements which may cause matrix effects. Average ¹³⁷Cs/¹³⁵Cs 841 842 isotope ratios obtained with both methods are in agreement within uncertainties: 3.263 ± 0.017 843 (n=20, coverage factor k=2 for FP Cs fraction) and 3.255 ± 0.010 (n=11, k=2 for HPLC pure Cs 844 fraction). These results were also in agreement with TIMS measurements on the same sample (3.245 845 \pm 0.007 (n=4)), thus demonstrating the reliable performances of the proposed methods.

846 In only one study, CE was hyphenated with two types of ICP-MS instruments (Single Quadrupole ICP-847 MS (ICP-Q-MS) and Sector Field Mass Spectrometer (SF-ICP-MS)) to determine fission products in nuclear fuel samples (Pitois et al., 2008). Optimization of the argon flow rate (0.7-1.2 L min⁻¹) at the 848 849 interface between CE and ICP-MS in order to obtain the best nebulization efficiency was made monitoring the signal of ¹¹⁵In. Additionally, influence of the phosphate buffer molarity (5-30 mM) and 850 851 pH (2.5-9.4) on ion migration times were studied. The migration time of barium was longer than that of cesium, which was not expected as barium is doubly charged and smaller than cesium. Ba²⁺ may 852 actually be complexed by the phosphate ion and therefore migrates in the form of $Ba(H_2PO_4)^+$ 853

whereas Cs⁺ remains uncomplexed. MDL values of 6×10^6 and 4×10^3 pg L⁻¹ were obtained by CE-ICP-854 Q-MS and CE-SF-ICP-MS, respectively, and ¹³⁷Cs measurement in a MOx fuel by CE-SF-ICP-MS (3.56 ± 855 0.19 μ g mL⁻¹) was in good agreement with measurement by gamma-spectrometry (3.56 ± 0.07 μ g mL⁻¹) 856 857 ¹). CE procedures have thus the advantage of allowing to separate Cs from isobaric Ba, of 858 necessitating very low samples volumes (dozens of µL versus hundreds of µL for chromatographic 859 separations), of limiting radiation dose to the analyst and of being as well very fast (6 min for the 860 above-mentioned method). However, regarding MDL specified in Table 5, methods based only on 861 separation techniques are generally not very sensitive. Separation techniques should therefore be 862 considered in complement to pretreatment methods for extensive Ba elimination prior to ICP-MS 863 introduction, or else, to study speciation of radium and cesium. In view of attractive binding ability 864 that possess some known cyclic compounds for alkali and alkaline-earth metals, rather than confining 865 to use poorly specific SCX stationary phases, the use of crown ethers-based columns or mobile phase 866 eluents containing a crown ether complexing agent should be a path to improve LC selectivity and explore in combination to ICP-MS detection in the future. 867

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4. ICP-MS instrumentation to help overcoming some analytical challenges

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4.1. Resolution of interference issues

The decontamination factors offered by the previously described sample handling or separation 872 873 procedures do not always lead to the sufficient elimination of the interferences, influencing 874 therefore the accurate quantification of the target radionuclide and the detection limit. A 875 complementary approach is based on the advances in ICP-MS instrumentation such as CRC or high 876 mass-resolution instruments to resolve spectral interferences. Resolution of current ICP-MS 877 instruments equipped with high mass resolution capabilities does not exceed 10,000 that is not sufficient to distinguish several of the isobaric and/or polyatomic interferences from ¹³⁷Cs and ²²⁶Ra 878 signals (Table 1). Depending on their concentration in the analyzed fraction, matrix elements may not 879 880 be responsible for forming spectral interferences in the plasma. Main interfering elements and the 881 concentration threshold from which they induce an overestimate of the target signal are generally 882 identified by preparing monoelemental solutions and mixtures of two elements at various concentrations and weight ratios. Therefore, if they are still present in the final purified fraction 883 884 above the identified concentration thresholds, mathematical corrections must be implemented. 885 As it can be seen from Table 3 and 4, since their appearance on the market in 2012, Triple

886 Quadrupole ICP-MS (ICP-QQQ-MS) have largely gain in popularity, last generation instruments

887 allowing improved ion transmission and focalization (Agilent 8900 versus 8800) (Balcaen et al., 2012; 888 Fernández et al., 2012). Recently, Waersted et al. showed that it was possible to carry out direct 889 quantitative analysis of ²²⁶Ra with such mass spectrometer analyzer functioning in tandem mass spectrometry and taking advantage of N₂O as reaction gas in the CRC (Wærsted et al., 2018). They 890 effectively noticed that N₂O reacted preferentially with ²²⁶Ra (only 0.6% of ²²⁶Ra do not react) 891 forming the molecular compound ²²⁶Ra¹⁶O⁺ (atom transfer inducing analyte shift). Thus, by filtering 892 the mass 226 in the first quadrupole and the mass 242 in the second one, they achieved to exclude 893 894 all possible polyatomic interferences at m/z 226. From the analysis of blanks corresponding to each 895 type of sample, in the extent that they are prepared and measured under the same conditions as real samples, they were able to reach detection limits of 0.42 pg L⁻¹ for water samples, 17 pg L⁻¹ for water 896 samples containing high amount of salts (conductivity > 100 mS cm⁻¹), and 750 pg kg⁻¹ for rock and 897 soil sample extracts. These values vary by a factor of 40 to 1,800 depending on the nature of the 898 blank analyzed, showing that sensitivity of direct analysis is affected by matrix effects and thus is not 899 yet a reliable option for the majority of applications. The same direct approach was implemented in 900 another study with the objective of quickly identifying ²²⁶Ra contamination in urine samples (Xiao et 901 902 al., 2020). In that case, the IDL met the application requirements as it was circa 6 times lower than 903 the action level set by the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements. Other groups 904 who used a CRC to mitigate polyatomic interferences employed He (Ben Yaala et al., 2019; E.M. van Es et al., 2017; Zhang et al., 2015) or a mixture of He and H₂ (Epov et al., 2003; Larivière et al., 2003). 905 When reading Table 3 and Table 4, it is clear that the use of CRC for the determination of ²²⁶Ra is not 906 907 widespread, probably because the main resulting challenges which include finding a gas that react 908 only with Ra (or conversely only with its interferences) and does not negatively affect signal 909 sensitivity, are not solved by any of the typical gases. The capacity of nitrous oxide to react with Ba 910 and not with Cs was also exploited by several authors in order to suppress isobaric Ba interferences (e.g. atom transfer inducing isobar shift such as formation of ¹³⁷Ba¹⁶O⁺ or ¹³⁷Ba¹⁶O¹H⁺ compounds 911 while ¹³⁷Cs remains unreacted) (Cao et al., 2016; Granet et al., 2008; Ohno and Muramatsu, 2014; 912 913 Yang et al., 2016; Zheng et al., 2016, 2016; Zhu et al., 2021a, 2021b, 2020). Indeed, contrary to Ba, 914 reaction between Cs and N₂O cannot happen because it is endothermic (heat of reaction: 106.3 kJ 915 mol⁻¹) and thus thermodynamically unfavorable (Yang et al., 2016). No significant drop in Cs isotopes 916 signals was observed in the different papers. As showed in Figure 3, gas flow rate must be adjusted 917 to maximize signal intensities of the recorded Cs isotopes while removing if possible the totality of 918 the present isobars. The use of other reaction gases, such as CH₃Cl (Taylor et al., 2008) or a mixture 919 of He and N_2O (Amr et al., 2016; Zheng et al., 2014b, 2014a; Zok et al., 2021) was also reported for ¹³⁷Cs determination but nitrous oxide remains the gas presenting the best performances. This 920 approach is highly recommended, especially for measurements of low level of ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁷Cs; it 921

allows to push further the DF of the sample preparation procedures, as demonstrated by Zhu and coworkers (DF for Ba improved from 6×10^9 to 10^{11} , leading to Ba CPS contribution at m/z 135 and 137 in the final fraction similar to CPS measured in the chemical procedure blank).

925 To some extent, specific sample introduction systems may also help avoiding certain spectral 926 interferences. Introduction devices including a desolvation membrane module can for instance 927 reduce oxide and hydroxide-based interferences since less water molecules enter the plasma. An APEX-Q-ACM system containing an ACM Nafion fluoropolymer desolvation module has been 928 929 reported in order to avoid forming Pb and Bi interferences during ²²⁶Ra analysis (Yang et al., 2020). 930 But as pointed out by Zheng et al., introduction of a wet aerosol into the plasma may also entail a stronger impact of matrix effects (Zheng et al., 2016). This was experienced in a study in which 931 signals of ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁷Cs dropped from a factor of 4 when increasing the concentration of stable 932 cesium up to 80 mg L⁻¹ using the APEX-Q introduction system whereas they remained practically 933 unchanged without APEX-Q (Figure 4) (Zhu et al., 2021b). On the mentioned figure, one can notice 934 that signal suppression is a bit more pronounced for the lower mass isotope (135) above 20 µg L⁻¹ of 935 ¹³³Cs with APEX-Q system, which could lead to inaccurate determination of 135/137 isotope ratio. 936 937 Thus the use of such introduction system should be taken with caution, evaluating all possible side effects, even more when ¹³³Cs is chosen as a yield tracer for ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁷Cs determination. 938

939 Quick injection of Cs or Ra, and not of Ba and other elements, can alternatively be achieved using 940 ElectroThermal Vaporization (ETV) (Song et al., 2001; St. C. Mcintyre et al., 1997; Sturgeon et al., 1993). The required sample volume is no more than 10 to $100 \,\mu$ L. With such a system, the element 941 942 discrimination is based on differences in volatilization properties. Chemical modifiers might be used 943 to change analyte properties to enhance the signal and the difference in volatilization and also to 944 improve the transport efficiency to the ICP torch. A typical ETV heating program contains three steps: 945 drying of the solvent, pyrolysis of the sample matrix and/or activation of the chemical modifier, and 946 vaporization of the analytes. The three groups who exploited this kind of introduction system did not 947 perform any purification step upstream of detection, although applying their method to real or simulated samples (snow (Sturgeon et al., 1993), water samples with high salt content (Song et al., 948 949 2001), and seawater (St. C. Mcintyre et al., 1997)). Fast separation (6 min) of Cs from Ba in solutions 950 containing a 1000-fold excess barium was achieved by Song et al. after optimizing the nature and 951 concentration of the modifier (Sturgeon et al., 1993). 0.3 mM KSCN proved to be the most efficient 952 modifier among the 12 modifiers evaluated and the optimized pretreatment and volatilization temperatures were respectively 400 and 1,100°C. The resulting MDL for both ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁷Cs was 953 however high (200 pg L^{-1}) as compared to methods including a sample pretreatment step (MDLs < pg 954 955 L⁻¹ in (Liezers et al., 2009; Yang et al., 2016; Zhu et al., 2021a)). In addition, presence of matrix effects was noted in solutions containing 0.1 M of salt (NaCl, NH₄Cl, NaNO₃, and NH₄NO₃) thus limiting the 956

957 use of this direct analysis method in environmental samples with high salt content. Instead of KSCN, 958 a seawater reference material (NASS-3) was proposed as a modifier by two other groups (St. C. Mcintyre et al., 1997; Sturgeon et al., 1993). In paper dealing with ²²⁶Ra determination, the ETV-ICP-959 MS approach implemented was also less sensitive (MDL of 34 pg L⁻¹) (St. C. Mcintyre et al., 1997) 960 961 than methods based on SPE procedures prior to ICP-MS (experimental MDLs < pg L⁻¹ have been reached (Benkhedda et al., 2005; Bonin et al., 2020; Cozzella et al., 2011; Hsieh and Henderson, 962 963 2011; Lagacé et al., 2017; Larivière et al., 2003; Varga, 2008)). Nevertheless, papers that used ETV are 964 not recent; since, much progress has been done on ICP-MS and related instrumentation devices, thus 965 it could be interesting to "dust" this technique and see if it can be competitive to other approaches 966 when combined to a sample preparation step. Note that the small sample volume required for an 967 ETV-ICP-MS analysis could also allow to push further the EF of the previously reported methods.

To resolve unspectral interferences, authors employed most of the time the isotopic dilution method 968 (Bourguin et al., 2011; Foster et al., 2004; Hsieh and Henderson, 2011; Kayzar and Williams, 2016; 969 970 Larivière et al., 2007; Moreno et al., 1999, 1996; Pietruszka et al., 2002; Scott et al., 2019; Varga, 971 2008; Vieira et al., 2021; Zhu et al., 2020) or performed external calibration combined to the use of 972 an internal standard during analysis, the choice of the IS being really different from one study to another in case of Ra (e.g. ¹⁰³Rh (Ben Yaala et al., 2019; Varga, 2008; Verlinde et al., 2019; Yang et al., 973 2020), ¹¹⁵In (Ben Yaala et al., 2019), ¹⁹⁵Pt (Ben Yaala et al., 2019; Bonin et al., 2020), ²³²Th (E.M. van Es 974 et al., 2017; E. M. van Es et al., 2017), Tl (Dalencourt et al., 2018), ¹⁶⁹Tm (Wærsted et al., 2018), (Tb, 975 Ho, Bi) (Lagacé et al., 2017), Ir¹⁹³ (Xiao et al., 2020) or ²⁰⁹Bi (Joannon and Pin, 2001)). ²⁰⁹Bi was used by 976 977 Joannon and Pin (Joannon and Pin, 2001) whereas it can induce polyatomic interferences at mass 978 226 as experienced for instance by Gourgiotis et coll. (Verlinde et al., 2019) and Clarisse et coll. (Ben 979 Yaala et al., 2019) who recommended not to use it. They however do not mention control of the 980 presence of this possible interference. ¹⁶⁹Tm was chosen because it reacted as ²²⁶Ra with the reaction gas N₂O in the article in question. Only a few groups performed external calibration with matrix-981 982 matched standards (Larivière et al., 2005; Xiao et al., 2020) or used the standard addition method 983 (Benkhedda et al., 2005; Epov et al., 2003; Larivière et al., 2003; Park et al., 1999; W. Wang et al., 984 2021) since they are both more burdensome to implement than the abovementioned methods. 985 Matrix-matched standards are also never truly representative of the real samples and, as an example, Larivière et coll. (Larivière et al., 2005) only mimicked the alkaline-earth composition of a 986 987 real well water sample.

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4.2. Factors influencing sensitivity, detection limits, accuracy, and precision

990 Since the tendency is to be able to determine Cs and Ra radionuclides at ultra-trace levels, authors 991 are constantly looking for ways to improve the analytical sensitivity in order to lower the detection 992 limit of their method. It depends in first place on the choice of the mass spectrometer analyzer and 993 its configuration. As example, values of instrumental detection limits mentioned in literature for the analysis of ²²⁶Ra range from 0.045 to 433 pg L⁻¹ for ICP-MS with a Single Quadrupole analyzer (ICP-Q-994 MS or ICP-(CC)-Q-MS) (Johanna Sabine Becker et al., 1999; J. Sabine Becker et al., 1999; Cozzella et 995 996 al., 2011; Epov et al., 2003; Evans et al., 2015; Joannon and Pin, 2001; Lagacé et al., 2017; Tsai et al., 997 2010), from 0.053 to 100 pg L⁻¹ for Triple Quadrupole ICP-MS operating in MS mode (Bonin et al., 998 2020; Dalencourt et al., 2018; E. M. van Es et al., 2017; Verlinde et al., 2019; W. Wang et al., 2021), from 0.09 to 33 pg L⁻¹ for single collector ICP-MS (SF-ICP-MS or High Resolution ICP-MS (HR-ICP-MS)) 999 1000 (Becker and Dietze, 1999; Copia et al., 2015; Larivière et al., 2005; Park et al., 1999; Vieira et al., 2021; Yang et al., 2020; Zoriy et al., 2005) and from 0.05 to 1 pg L⁻¹ for multicollector ICP-MS (MC-1001 1002 ICP-MS) (Bourquin et al., 2011; Foster et al., 2004; Sharabi et al., 2010). It may seem surprising that 1003 similar and low IDL as these obtained with HR-ICP-MS and MC-ICP-MS can be obtained with ICP-Q-1004 MS or ICP-QQQ-MS since those instruments are known to be less sensitive. However, as mentioned 1005 before, IDL interpretation and comparison must be done considering the matrix used for its 1006 assessment. The impact of the analysis mode on ²²⁶Ra analysis was evaluated in a study by comparing 1007 instrumental sensitivity and IDL obtained in three different configurations: MS, MS/MS and MS/MS 1008 with CRC filled with He (Dalencourt et al., 2018). Slopes of the calibration curves obtained in MS/MS 1009 and MS/MS with CRC analysis modes were respectively 10 and 20 times lower compared to the MS configuration, with an increase in calculated IDL by a factor of 16 (8 pg L^{-1}) and 28 (14 pg L^{-1}), 1010 1011 respectively. A lower sensitivity is often effectively observed in MS/MS because some ions are 1012 deflected in their flight path before arriving to the second quadrupole and are thus not counted by 1013 the detector. When using a CRC, collisions between the target analyte and the collision gas may also be responsible for additional ion losses. Amr et al. (Amr et al., 2016) however measured comparable 1014 IDL for ¹³⁷Cs in MS (60 pg L⁻¹) and MS/MS mode (54 pg L⁻¹). Due to significant loss of sensitivity, 1015 MS/MS was not much employed for ²²⁶Ra measurement (Wærsted et al., 2018; Xiao et al., 2020), 1016 however when measuring low level of ¹³⁵Cs in presence of high concentration of stable ¹³³Cs, using 1017 1018 such analysis mode is almost inevitable in order to reduce peak tailing of mass 133 at mass 135, 1019 therefore minimizing abundance sensitivity (Zhu et al., 2020). Based on this approach, Zhu et al. achieved to improve the abundance sensitivity from 10⁻⁷ to 10⁻¹¹ (3 orders of magnitude greater than 1020 the theoretical value of 10⁻¹⁴) on ICP-QQQ-MS Agilent 8800 passing from the use of one quadrupole 1021 1022 to two successive quadrupoles (Zhu et al., 2021a). Note however that it is not always sufficient to correct the tailing contribution of ¹³³Cs depending on the ¹³⁵Cs/¹³³Cs ratio in the sample and of the 1023 intrinsic abundance sensitivity of the instrument. Indeed, as highlighted in the review of Bu *et al.*, 1024

¹³⁵Cs/¹³³Cs in environmental samples contaminated by global fallout from nuclear tests can be as low
as 10⁻⁹ (Bu et al., 2016). Though SF-ICP-MS has the advantage to be more sensitive than ICP-QQQ-MS,
its abundance sensitivity is not enough for such samples (up to 10⁻⁶ in medium resolution) whereas
abundance sensitivity of ICP-QQQ-MS compete well with these of TIMS (10⁻¹⁰-10⁻¹¹) and AMS (10⁻¹⁰)
(Bu et al., 2016).

1030 Similarly, magnetic sector field ICP-MS can be operated in three different modes, namely low (300), 1031 medium (4,000) and high resolution (10,000), but increasing the resolution has also for consequence 1032 to decrease the ion signal. Except Yang et al., Varga et al. (medium resolution) (Varga, 2008; Yang et 1033 al., 2020), and Vieira et al. ("intermediate" resolution R=2000 obtained by equipping the instrument 1034 with a "flattop peak medium resolution kit"), all groups that used a magnetic sector field mass 1035 spectrometer conducted analyses of Cs and Ra in low resolution to have the greatest sensitivity. 1036 Additionally, customization of the ICP-MS instrument by changing the sample introduction system 1037 (e.g. APEX desolvating nebulizers which exist in 4 different forms: APEX-Q, APEX-IR, APEX-HF, the 1038 latest one being APEX-omega, as it can be seen in the corresponding column in Tables 3, 4, and 5 for 1039 other examples) or by adding extra tools (e.g. guard electrode (Becker and Dietze, 1999), retardation 1040 energy filters (Scott et al., 2019)) can be implemented to push the instrument to its extreme 1041 detection capability. As an example, the coupling of an ICP-QQQ-MS with an APEX-HF desolvating nebulizer rather than with a conventional Scott spray chamber induced an improvement of the ²²⁶Ra 1042 signal sensitivity by a factor of 10 which allowed to reach an IDL of 0.2 pg L⁻¹ (Verlinde et al., 2019). A 1043 1044 similar sensitivity gain was also experienced in case of cesium isotopes determination and can be 1045 explained by an enhanced transportation of analytes combined to the fact that less water molecules 1046 enter the plasma (Zheng et al., 2016). In several articles, Dietze et coll. compared the efficiency in 1047 terms of sensitivity, IDL, and precision of various sample introduction systems coupled either to SF-1048 ICP-MS (Meinhard nebulizer (1 mL min⁻¹) with Scott spray chamber, microconcentric nebulizer (0.085 mL min⁻¹) with minicyclonic spray chamber, and ultrasonic nebulizer with an aerosol desolvation unit 1049 (2 mL min⁻¹)) (Becker and Dietze, 1999) or ICP-Q-MS (cross-flow nebulizer (1 mL min⁻¹) with Scott 1050 spray chamber, microconcentric nebulizer (0.085 mL min⁻¹ or 0.2 mL min⁻¹) with minicyclonic or Scott 1051 1052 spray chamber, direct injection high efficiency nebulizer (DIHEN, 0.1 mLmin⁻¹), and ultrasonic nebulizer (2.2 mL min⁻¹)) (Johanna Sabine Becker et al., 1999; J. Sabine Becker et al., 1999) for the 1053 analysis of long-lived radionuclides including ²²⁶Ra. These experiments were conducted on pure 1054 1055 standard solutions, and since the different nebulizers were not operated at the same flow rate, one 1056 should compare the absolute sensitivity achieved rather than the sensitivity. Experiments with the ICP-Q-MS demonstrated the DIHEN offers the best performances (IDL: 110 pg L⁻¹, RSD: 0.8%). 1057 1058 However, with such an introduction system, the totality of the sample enters in the plasma as 1059 compared to conventional concentric nebulizers (only 1-2% of the sample), and spectral and non1060 spectral interferences have therefore a stronger impact. To reduce risks of forming interferences one 1061 should be tempted to reduce the solution uptake rate, but a decrease of the uptake rate from 100 to 1062 $1 \,\mu$ L min⁻¹ was accompanied by a loss in sensitivity and precision, respectively by a factor of 14 and 6 1063 (Johanna Sabine Becker et al., 1999). The use of guard electrode to attenuate the plasma discharge 1064 to the cone (Becker and Dietze, 1999) and retardation lenses (Scott et al., 2019) were also reported 1065 in order to reduce wide spread of ion energies of the ion beam and thus enhance ion transmission 1066 and sensitivity and reduce background.

- 1067 Measurement parameters, such as integration time and number of sweeps, have also a great impact 1068 on the quality and relevance of the produced data and should therefore be adjusted to meet the 1069 application requirements (e.g. multielement analysis, volume of sample at disposal, detection limit required, precision). The effect of integration time on the measurement of ²²⁶Ra in standard solutions 1070 1071 spiked at various concentration levels was studied (Dalencourt et al., 2018). The longest integration 1072 time (30 s) was chosen since it led to the lowest uncertainty (RSD < 10%) even in poorly concentrated solutions (some pg L^{-1}). It can be seen in extended forms of Tables 3, 4, and 5 in supplementary 1073 information that integration times for ²²⁶Ra measurement varied from 4 to 30 s whereas a typical 1074 value of 5 s was employed by most of authors when specified in case of ¹³⁴Cs, ¹³⁵Cs, and ¹³⁷Cs. 1075
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1077 **5. Applications overview**

1078 The first application field involving the quantification of Ra and Cs isotopes by ICP-MS is related to 1079 radiological environmental monitoring. Legislations exist concerning Ra concentrations in drinking water but guidelines are slightly different from one agency to another. The World Health 1080 Organization (WHO) fixed a maximum permissible activity of 1 and 0.1 Bg L^{-1} (27.4 and 0.01 pg L^{-1}) for 1081 ²²⁶Ra and ²²⁸Ra, respectively ("Guidelines for drinking-water quality, fourth edition," 2011). The 1082 council directive 2013/51/Euratom recommended 0.5 and 0.2 Bq L^{-1} (13.7 and 0.02 pg L^{-1}) for ²²⁶Ra 1083 and ²²⁸Ra, respectively (Sands and Galizzi, 2006), and the United States Environmental Protection 1084 Agency (US EPA) established a maximum activity of 0.185 Bq L⁻¹ for combined ²²⁸Ra and ²²⁶Ra 1085 (Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), 2002), which corresponds to 5.06 and 0.02 pg L^{-1} for pure 1086 ²²⁶Ra and ²²⁸Ra, respectively. Based on precautionary principle, these guidelines are often expanded 1087 to other matrices, both liquid and solid. There is no legislation regarding ¹³⁷Cs, but the US EPA fixed a 1088 1089 maximum contamination threshold for beta and photon emitters in drinking water corresponding to 4 millirem per year (0.04 mSv per year) (US EPA, 2002). ²²⁶Ra concentration was for instance 1090 1091 determined by ICP-MS in different kinds of environmental waters (e.g. surface or ground waters 1092 more or less charged in salts) in various parts of the world including Italy (Copia et al., 2017), United 1093 Kingdom (Hsieh and Henderson, 2011), Germany (Zoriy et al., 2005), Canada (Benkhedda et al., 2005; 1094 Lagacé et al., 2017; W. Wang et al., 2021), Central Asia (Schettler et al., 2015), Japan (Yang et al., 1095 2020), Korea (Kim et al., 1999; Park et al., 1999), United Arab Emirates (Larivière et al., 2005), Israel 1096 (Sharabi et al., 2010), Azerbaijan (Varga, 2008), North Sea (Vieira et al., 2021), Pacific (Bourguin et al., 1097 2011), and Antarctic (Foster et al., 2004). The obtained values ranged from 0.0007 to 2.3 pg L^{-1} for 1098 lake and river waters (Benkhedda et al., 2005; Lagacé et al., 2017; Schettler et al., 2015; Sharabi et al., 2010; W. Wang et al., 2021; Yang et al., 2020), from 0.08 to 446 pg L⁻¹ for well and ground waters 1099 (Copia et al., 2017; Kim et al., 1999; Lagacé et al., 2017; Larivière et al., 2005; Park et al., 1999; 1100 1101 Schettler et al., 2015; Zoriy et al., 2005), and from 0.037 to 0.18 pg L⁻¹ for ocean and sea waters 1102 (Bourquin et al., 2011; Foster et al., 2004; Hsieh and Henderson, 2011; Varga, 2008; Vieira et al., 1103 2021), with significant variations worldwide as already reported by the International Atomic Energy 1104 Agency (IAEA) (International Atomic Energy Agency, 2014). Strangely, determination of Cs isotopes 1105 by ICP-MS has been rarely carried out in liquid samples (Amr et al., 2016; Asai et al., 2020; Epov et al., 2004; Ohno and Muramatsu, 2014; Song et al., 2001; Sturgeon et al., 1993; Zhu et al., 2021b). For 1106 1107 solid samples, additional sample preparation steps must be conducted before any purification and 1108 preconcentration procedure. Among them, the most crucial step consists in digesting the organic 1109 and/or mineral matrix to release analytes to the solution. In case of uncomplete release, 1110 concentrations and isotopic ratios will be underestimated, thus efficiency of the method employed 1111 for this step must also be evaluated. Different digestion techniques have been employed in papers, 1112 including acid leaching digestion using concentrated acids/oxidizing agents (e.g. HNO₃, HCl, HClO₄, H₂O₂ or HF) (Amr et al., 2016; Ben Yaala et al., 2019; Bonin et al., 2020; Cao et al., 2016; Dalencourt 1113 1114 et al., 2018; Epov et al., 2003; Granet et al., 2008; Kayzar and Williams, 2016; Larivière et al., 2003; 1115 Meeks et al., 1998; Moreno et al., 1999, 1996; Pietruszka et al., 2002; Russell et al., 2014b; Scott et 1116 al., 2019; Yang et al., 2016; Zheng et al., 2014b, 2014a; Zhu et al., 2020), microwave-assisted acid 1117 digestion (Kayzar and Williams, 2016; Kim et al., 1999; Larivière et al., 2007; Meeks et al., 1998; Tsai 1118 et al., 2010; Wærsted et al., 2018) or borate fusion (Russell et al., 2014a; Taylor et al., 2008; Zhu et 1119 al., 2020). As illustrated by Table 6 and Table 7, in order to validate their method, many groups have 1120 analyzed various types of CRMs, sometimes not necessarily certified in activity for the target analyte. Only one group conducted an interlaboratory comparison as another approach for method 1121 validation. This was made with two other laboratories who measured ²²⁶Ra in 5 sediments using 1122 alpha or gamma spectrometry while themselves realized direct ²²⁶Ra analysis in digested sediments 1123 1124 with an ICP-(CC)-Q-MS (Ben Yaala et al., 2019). Two quantification approaches were assessed, 1125 namely analysis in the standard (STD) or in the Kinetic Energy Discrimination (KED) configuration, followed by subtraction of the apparent ²²⁶Ra concentration measured in matrix-matched solutions 1126 1127 of each digested sediment sample to remove the contribution of polyatomic interferences. As shown 1128 in Figure 5, results obtained by all methods were in good agreement. However, it can be noticed that

uncertainty provided by radiometric methods was higher for the two samples containing a high level
 of ²²⁶Ra whereas when considering samples with the lowest ²²⁶Ra concentrations, uncertainties were
 smaller for radiometric methods than for the ICP-MS approaches, highlighting the complementarity
 of methods.

As part of the measurement of uranium series nuclides, Scott *et al.* have brought a new database on ²²⁶Ra concentration and ²²⁶Ra/²³⁰Th isotopic ratio in several rock standards not certified in ²²⁶Ra, which could serve other studies (Scott et al., 2019). It is also worth noting that CRMs are certified in concentration (e.g. ²²⁶Ra, ¹³⁴Cs, or ¹³⁷Cs), but no standard certified in isotopic ratio (226/228, 135/137) are available at this time. Therefore, validation of methods developed for measurement of ¹³⁵Cs or ¹³⁵Cs/¹³⁷Cs were often made comparing values by another group who analyzed the same CRM with another method, and sometimes even with another detection technique.

1140 Other application fields include the reconstitution of the history of a particular site, the identification of the origin of a contamination, or the study of ocean circulation. Copia et al. studied for instance 1141 1142 the uranium and radium hydrogeochemical background in groundwater samples collected from the 1143 Gran Sasso aquifer (Italy) between 2008 and 2014, with the aim of investigating correlations between 1144 the measured concentrations and the seismic activity of the region (Copia et al., 2017). An earthquake has effectively occurred in 2009 which is comprised across the time period of their study. 1145 1146 Isotopic ratios were measured by SF-ICP-MS after applying an optimized sample preparation procedure (Copia et al., 2015). The obtained results highlighted a rise of the ²²⁶Ra/²³⁸U ratios 1147 measured in samples collected after the ground shaking, which was interpreted as a change in 1148 water-rock interaction processes. Taylor et al. measured ratios of the fission products ¹³⁵Cs and ¹³⁷Cs 1149 1150 in various samples contaminated by three different sources (soils and sediments from the Chernobyl 1151 exclusion zone, sludge from a nuclear waste storage facility in Canada, and sediments collected in 1152 Ottawa river), and thus demonstrated that ¹³⁵Cs/¹³⁷Cs is an adequate indicator of radioactive contamination source (Taylor et al., 2008). In another example, the direct measurement of ¹³⁵Cs/¹³⁷Cs 1153 and ¹³⁴Cs/¹³⁷Cs was achieved in rainwaters collected after the Fukushima accident using ICP-QQQ-MS 1154 and nitrous oxide as reaction gas (Ohno and Muramatsu, 2014). The average measured value of the 1155 135 Cs/ 137 Cs ratio over 6 rainwater samples was 0.37 ± 0.03, which do not match either with the 1156 1157 isotopic signature of 1962 global fallout (2.7) nor with that of Chernobyl (0.46), thus indicating 1158 another contamination source.

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1160 **6. Conclusion**

Methods merging the latest progresses in SPE and in ICP-MS remain the best approaches to achieve
 measurement of Ra and Cs isotopes at ultra-trace levels. Development of sample preparation

1163 methods are however currently still conducted in the old-fashioned way, by optimizing one 1164 parameter at a time, which can be very time-consuming in view of the complexity of some 1165 procedures aforementioned, and most importantly, does not take into account that parameters are 1166 not necessarily independent. To gain in efficiency, new optimizations should be thought using design 1167 of experiments (e.g. factorial design), as this statistic tool proved to be very helpful in other 1168 application fields (Baig et al., 2009; Leardi, 2009). In the future, improvement of sorbent specificity as 1169 well as instrumental sensitivity (e.g. newer ion paths and sample introduction systems that for 1170 instance do not entail loss of 98% of the sample in the nebulization chamber) will also for sure open-1171 up new application opportunities. The use of specific sorbents combined to the development of 1172 simpler extraction procedures should for instance favor miniaturization of the methods enabling to 1173 further improve the sensitivity while requiring both less sample amounts and phases (Mariet et al., 1174 2019; Ou et al., 2019). This could boost the understanding of radium and cesium transfer pathways in 1175 the environment (e.g. soil to plants transfer through pore water, or accumulation in microorganisms), research fields which are currently hampered by the lack of suitable methods for 1176 1177 samples of both low volume and concentration. Increasing current set of data in these areas will 1178 serve to model dissemination of these radionuclides around contaminated sites which would also be 1179 valuable information and tool when making a diagnosis in view of former uranium mining sites 1180 rehabilitation. To manage to do this, emerging sorbents identified as the most promising in academic 1181 laboratories, and the technical know-how to prepare them, need to be exported to industry. In 1182 addition, a lack of CRM certified in isotopic ratios (226/228 and 135/137) has been highlighted by the 1183 community. In this regard, investment of laboratories making such kind of sources would bring 1184 significant benefits, especially to better evaluate and correct mass discrimination effect in ICP -MS, to 1185 avoid in-house tracers preparation, and to facilitate comparison between methods with or without 1186 the same detection technique. 1187

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
