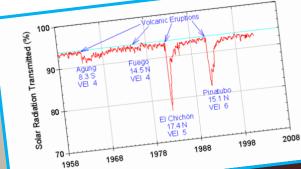

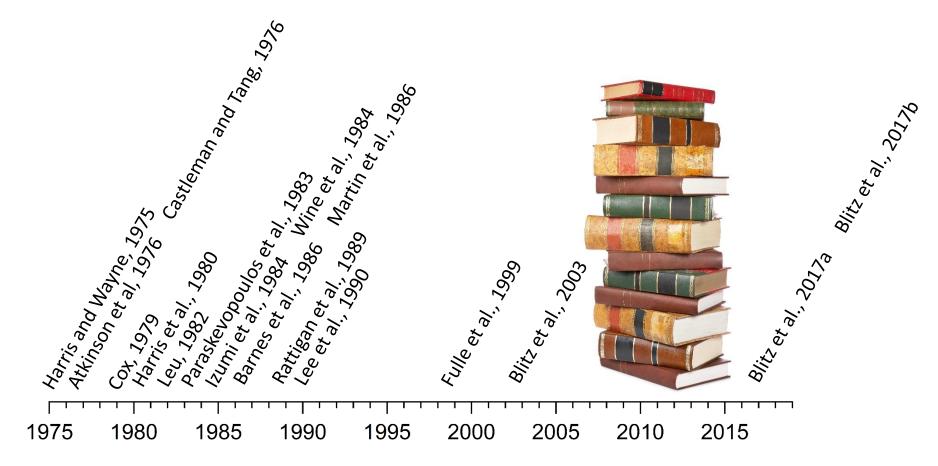

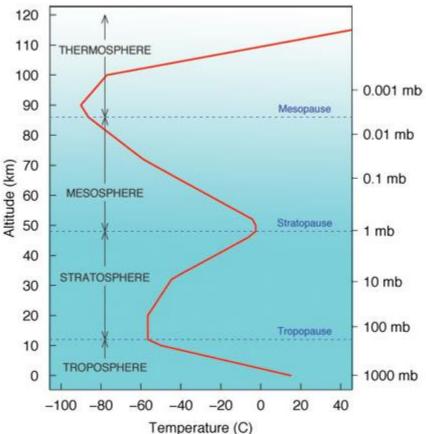


## The atmosphere: it's structure and composition

• The atmosphere is composed of a mixture of gases:

N<sub>2</sub>: 78%, O<sub>2</sub>: 21%, Ar: 1%, and trace gases: <1%

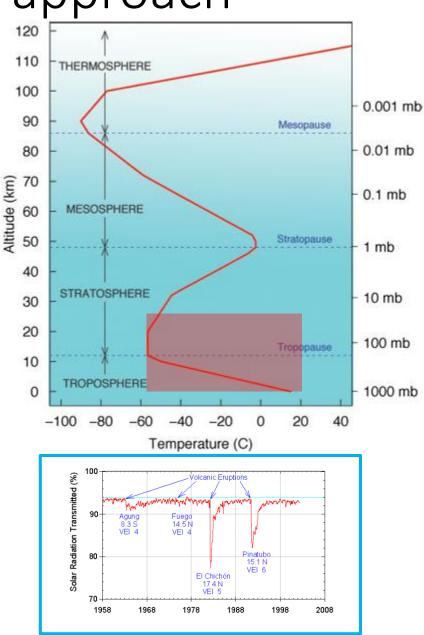
- The atmosphere experiences a range of temperatures (-90–40°C)
- And pressures
  (0.0076–760 Torr)



#### Two approaches are possible...

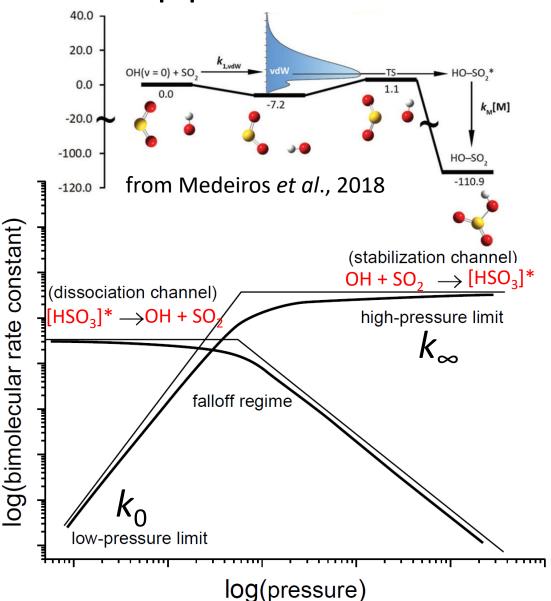
### 1. The pragmatic approach

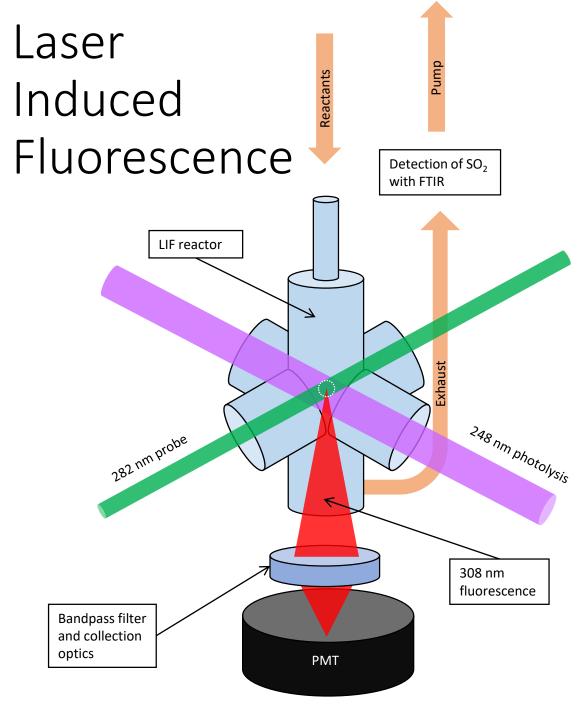
- Sources of SO<sub>2</sub> are at ground level:
- Fuel burning/ volcanic eruptions/ DMS oxidation
- Lifetime of SO<sub>2</sub> (and precursors) is short (days)
- Transport up to the stratosphere takes time (5–10 years)
- Large volcanic eruptions can inject SO<sub>2</sub> <25 km</li>
- So, ~-50–20°C and 25–760 Torr (air)



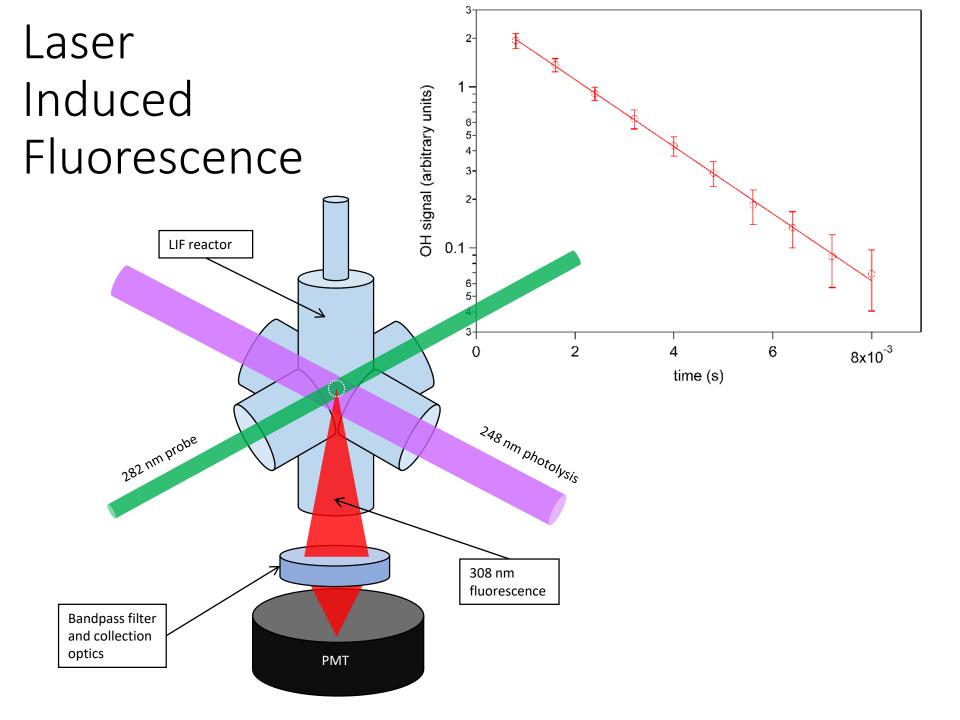
### 2. The fundamental approach

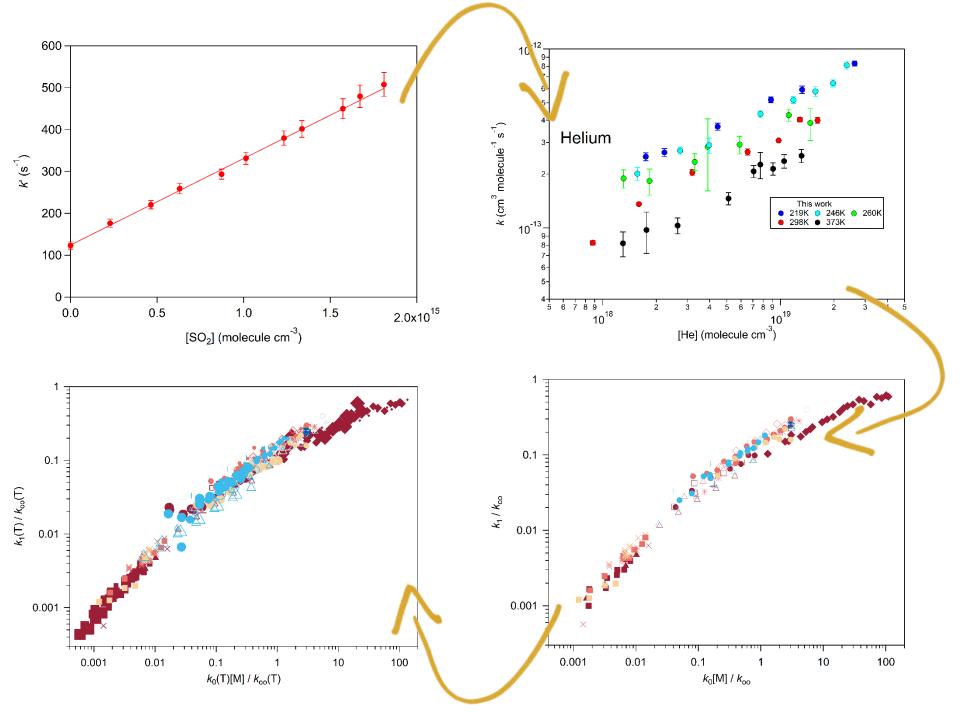
- Direct experimental measurements need to be performed at v. high and v. low P
- Knowledge of k<sub>∞</sub>(T) and k<sub>0</sub>(T) constrains fit to P
- Observation of a positive temperature dependence to k<sub>∞</sub> indicates a barrier to this reaction
- Why is this reaction so slow?

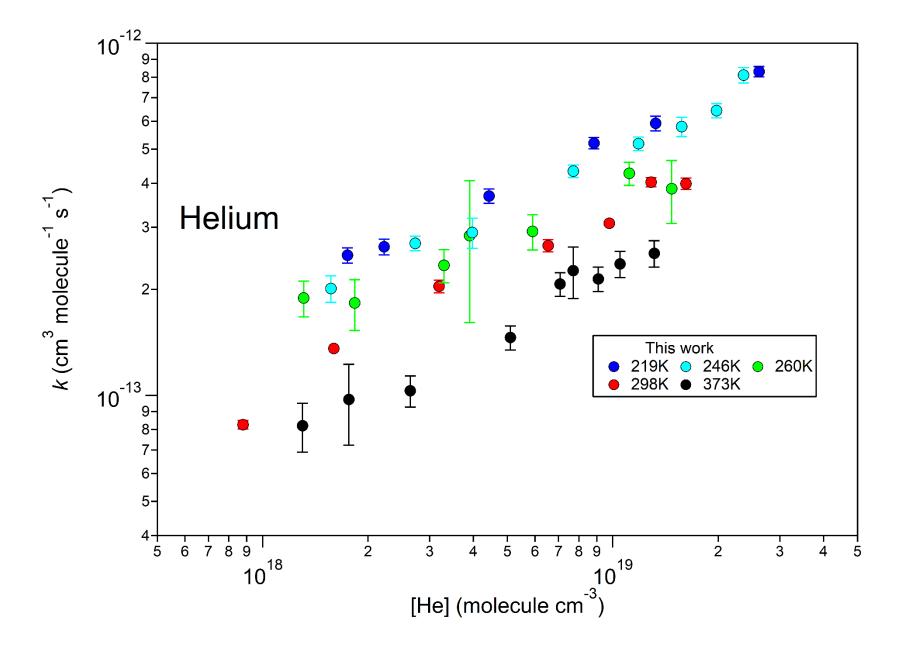


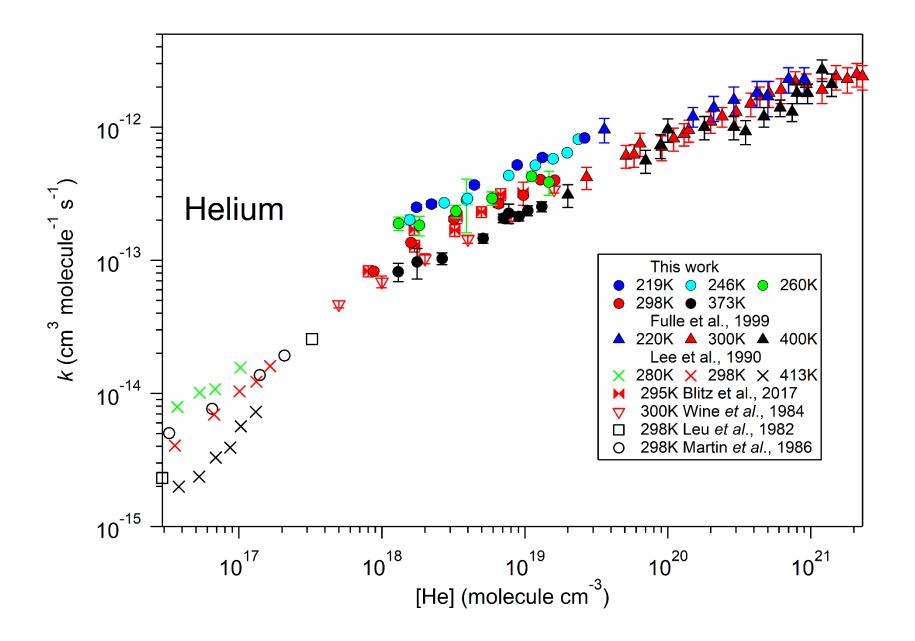


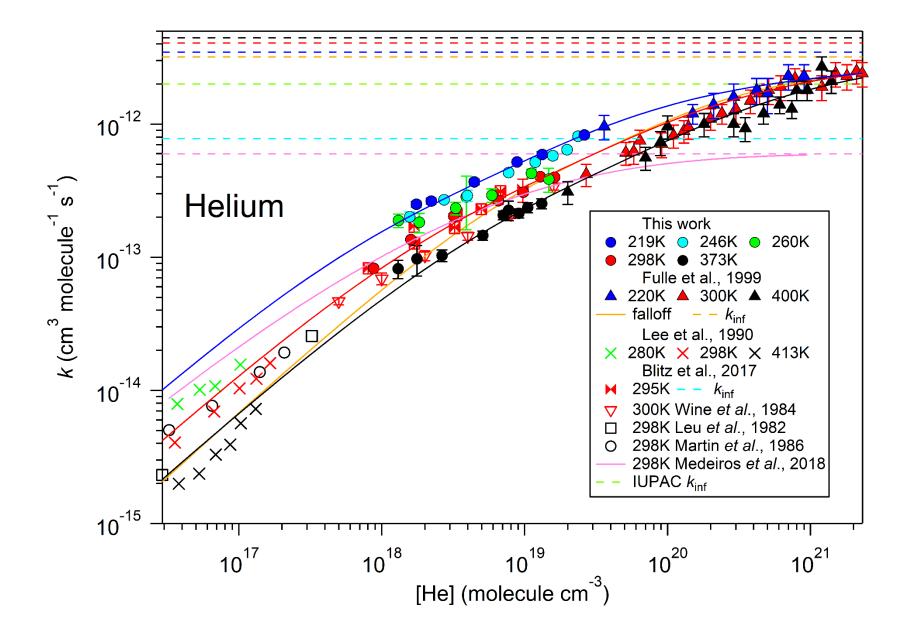
- Temperature range: 220–373 K
- Pressure range:
  30–600 Torr
  - Bath gases: He, Ar, N<sub>2</sub>, O<sub>2</sub>
- OH precursors: H<sub>2</sub>O<sub>2</sub>, HNO<sub>3</sub>
  - On-line
    measurement of
    - [SO<sub>2</sub>]
- Supporting RR measurements (N<sub>2</sub>, Ar, O<sub>2</sub>, Air)

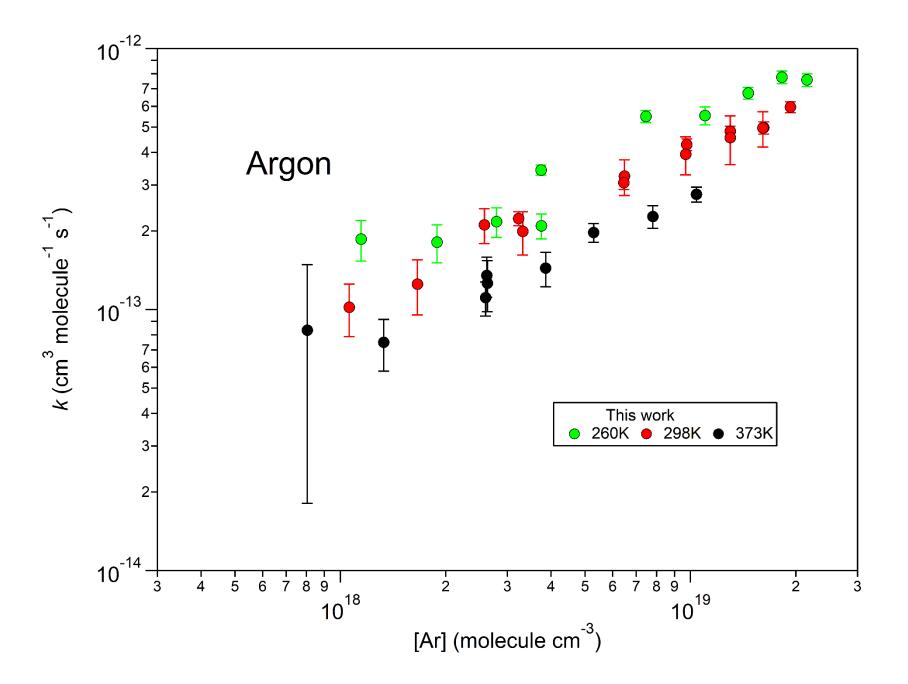


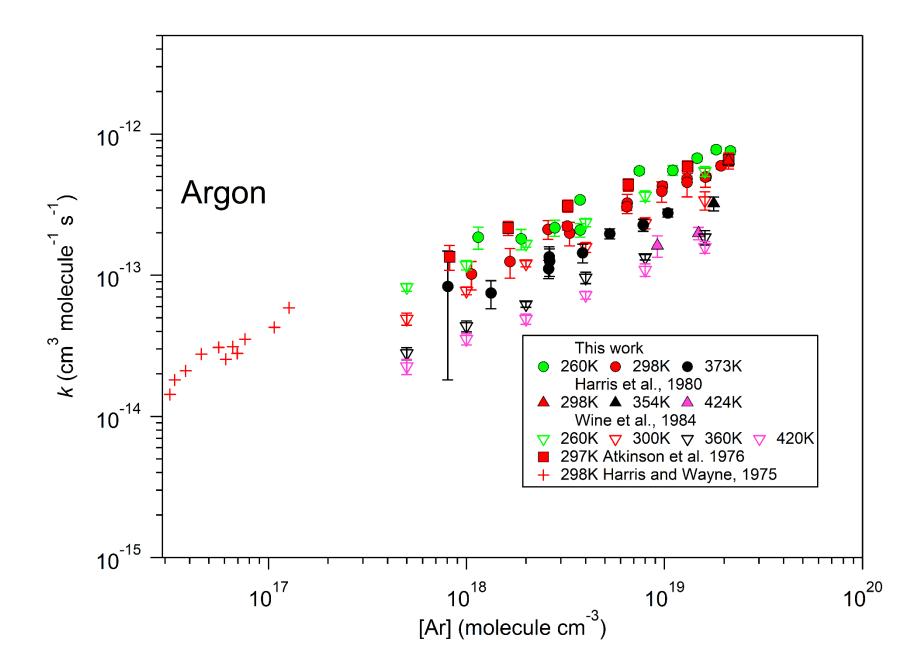


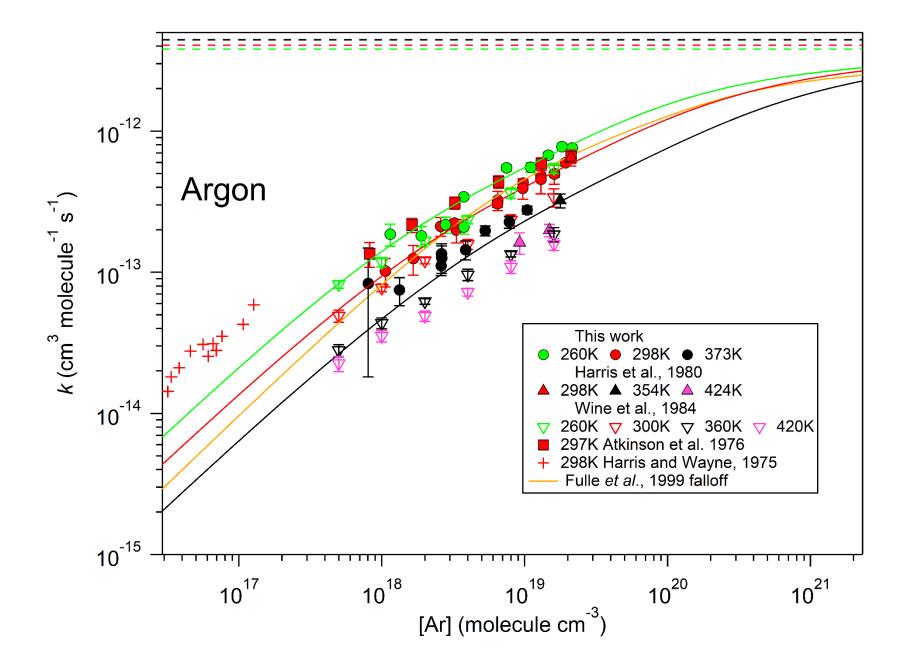


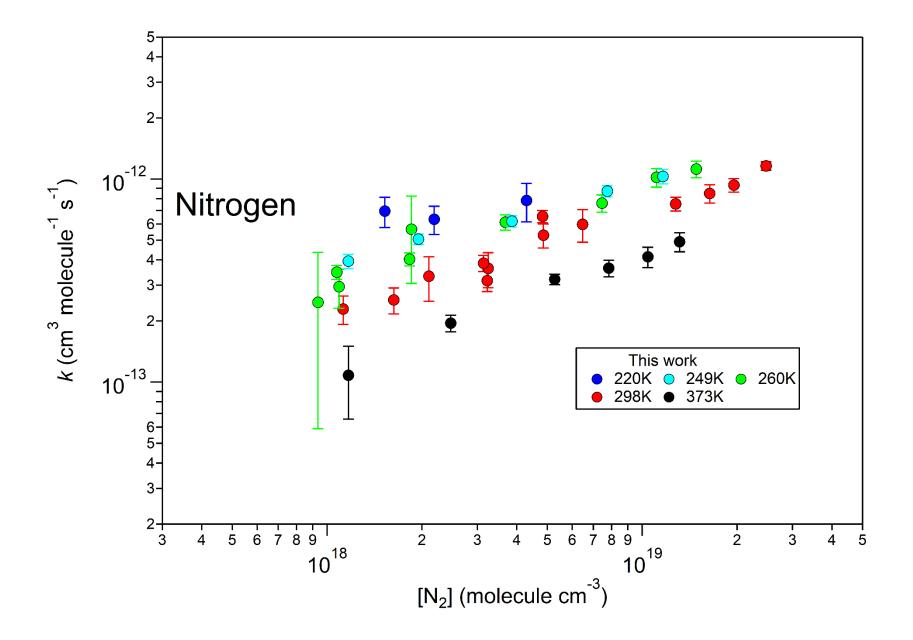


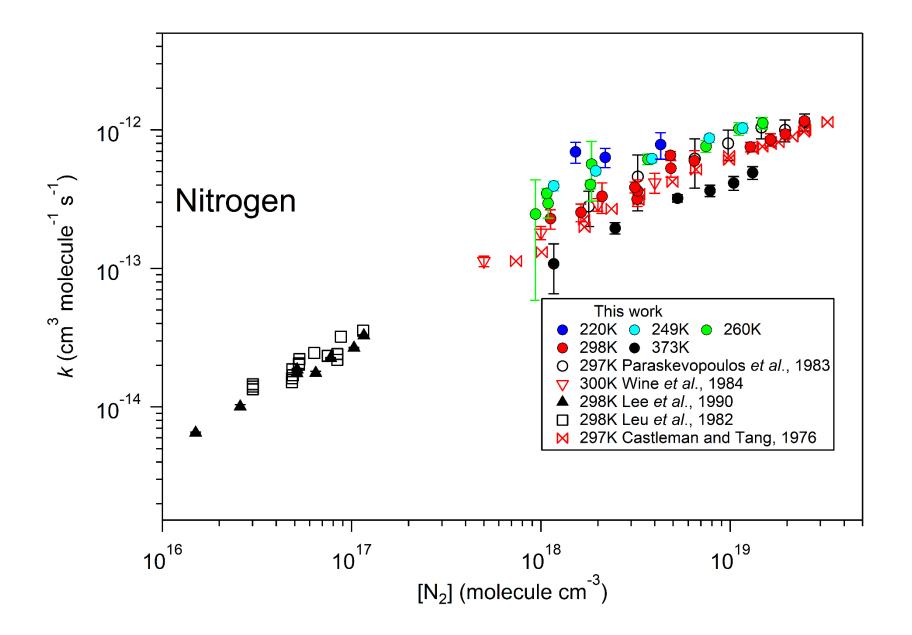


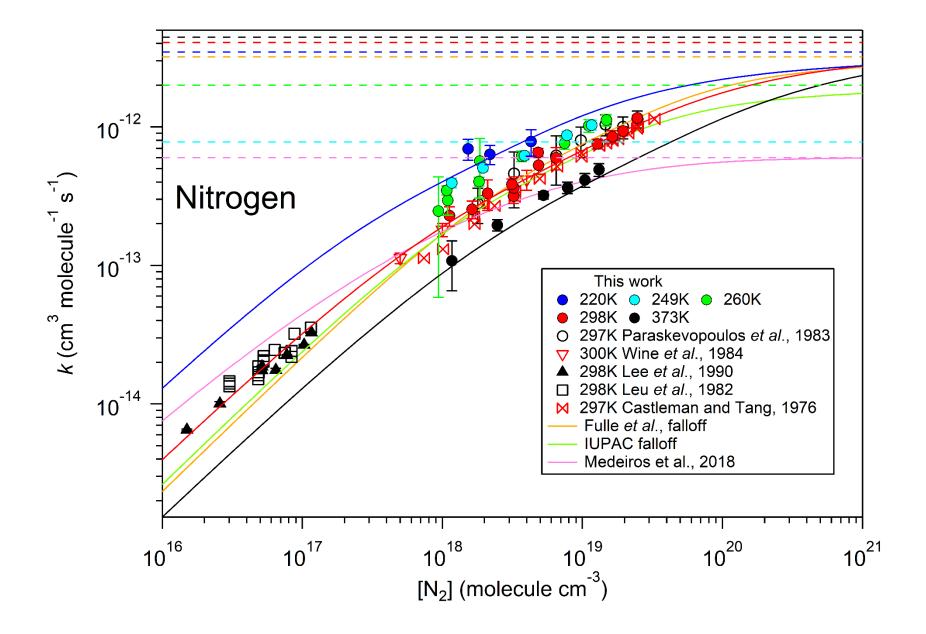


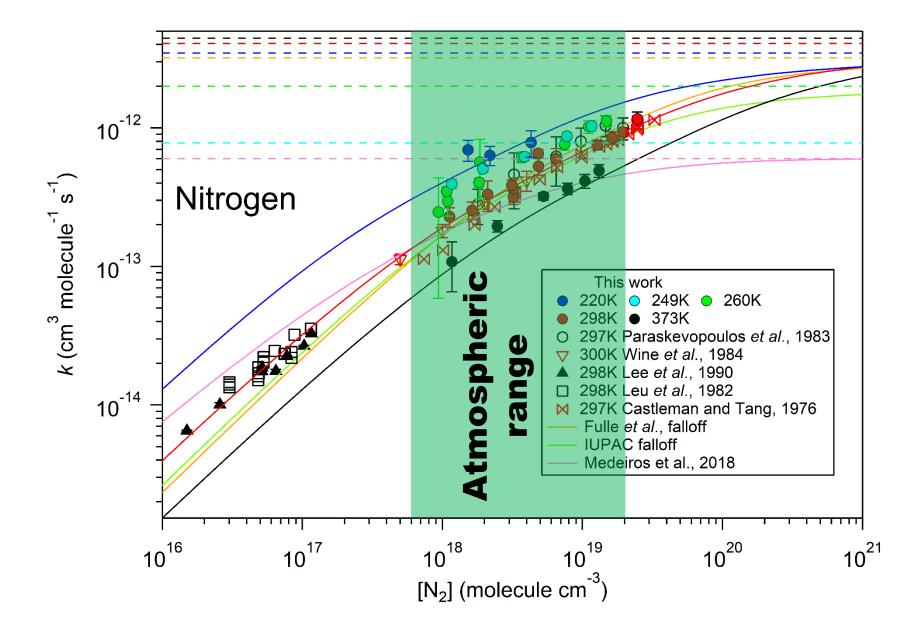


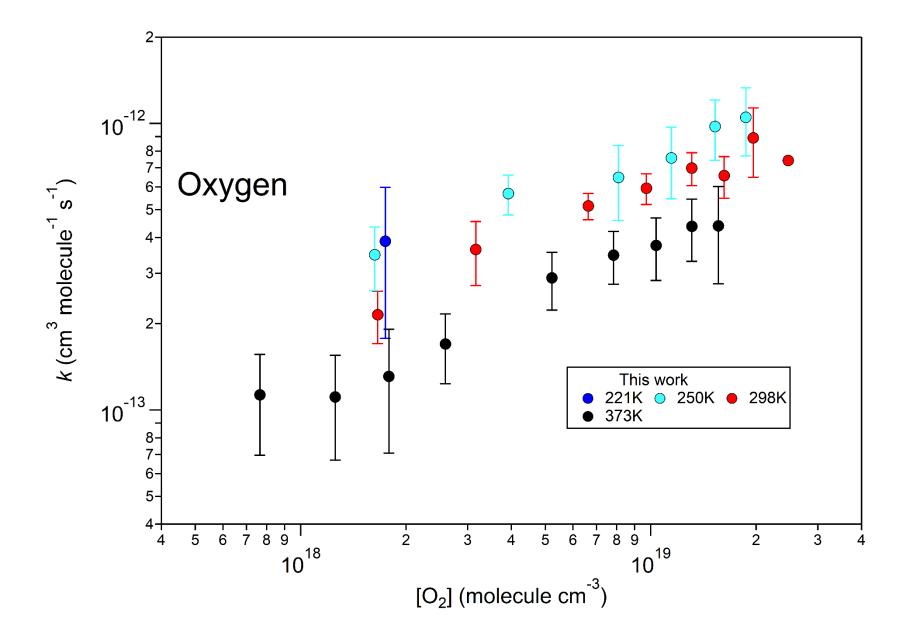


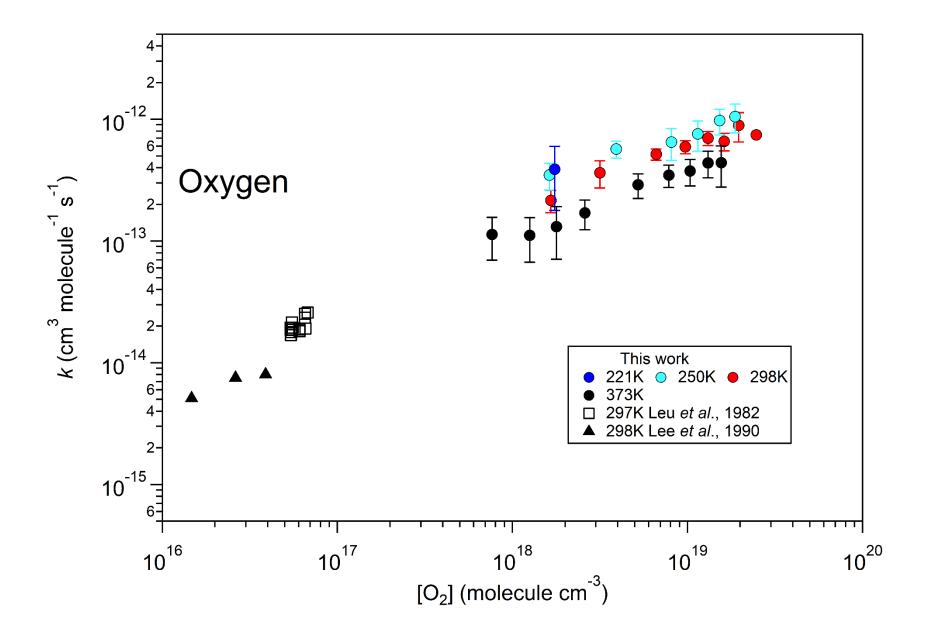


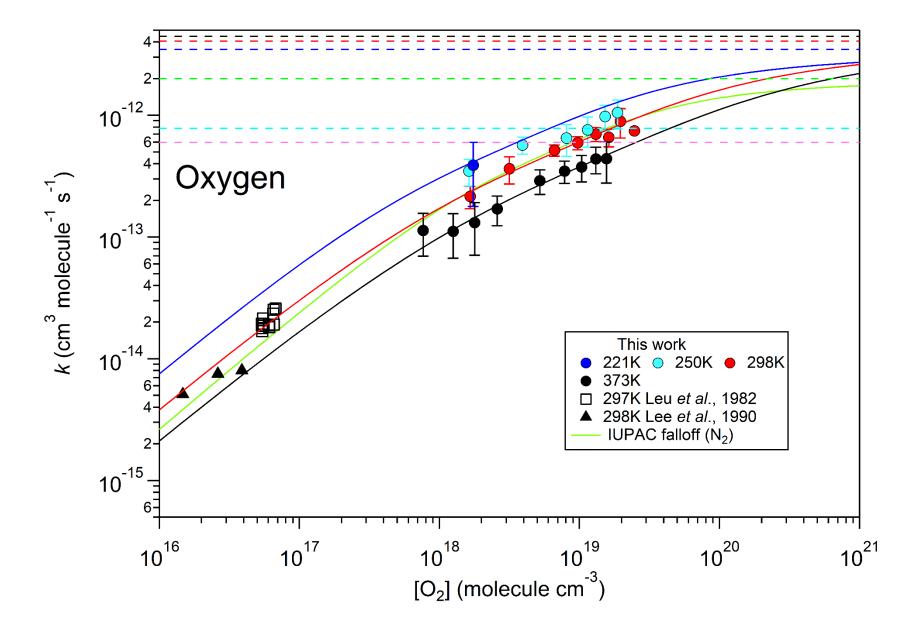


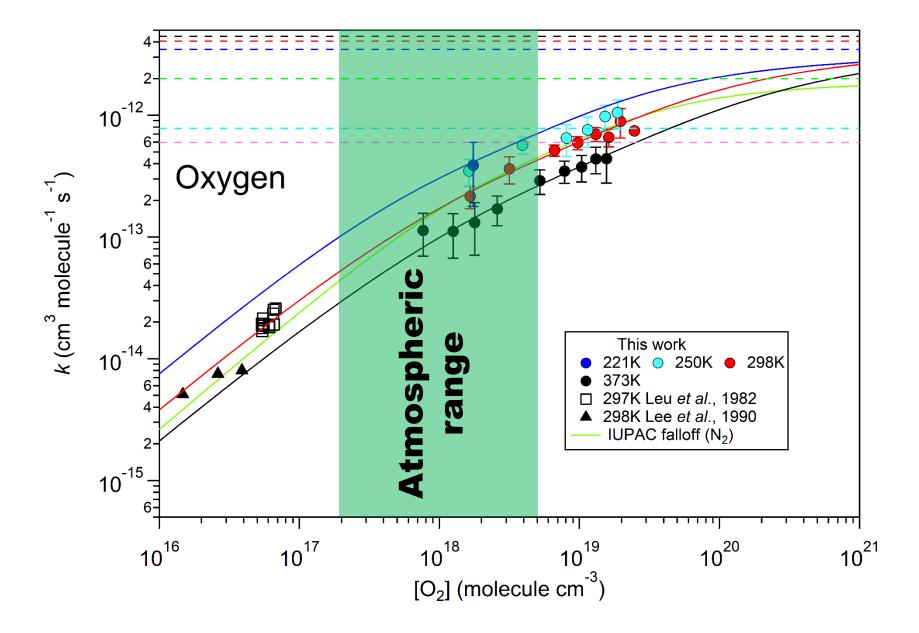


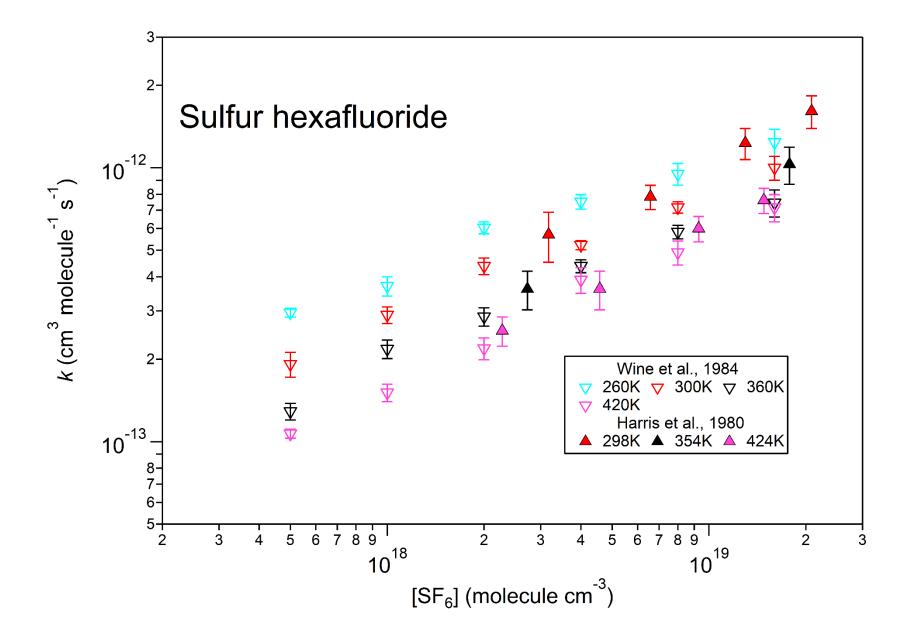


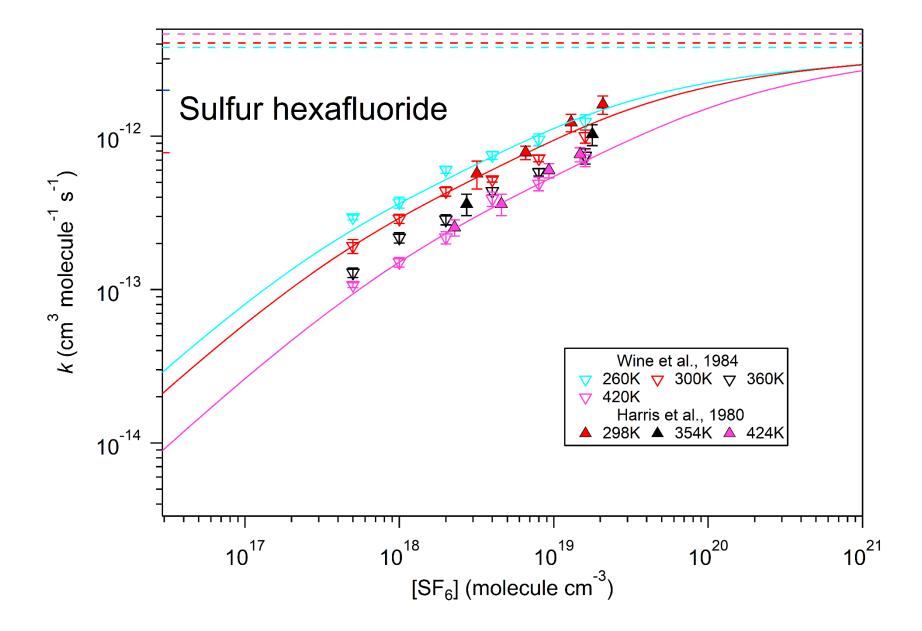


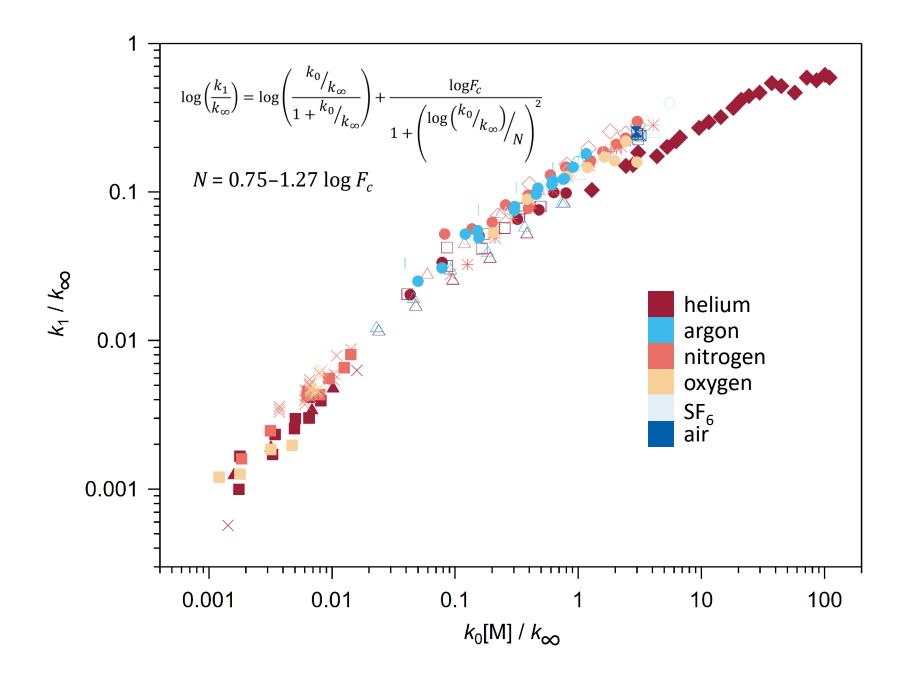


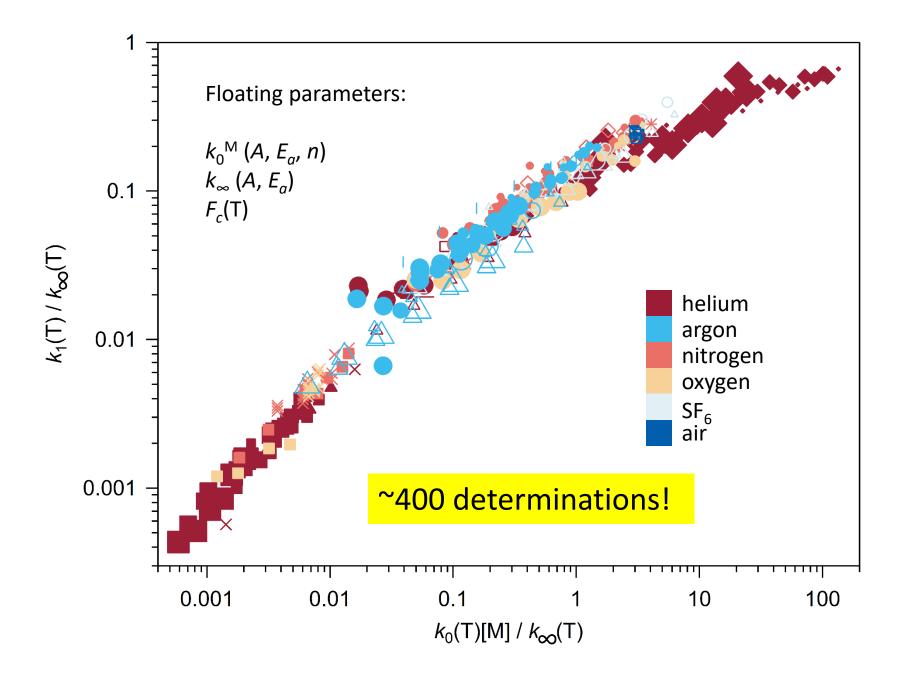


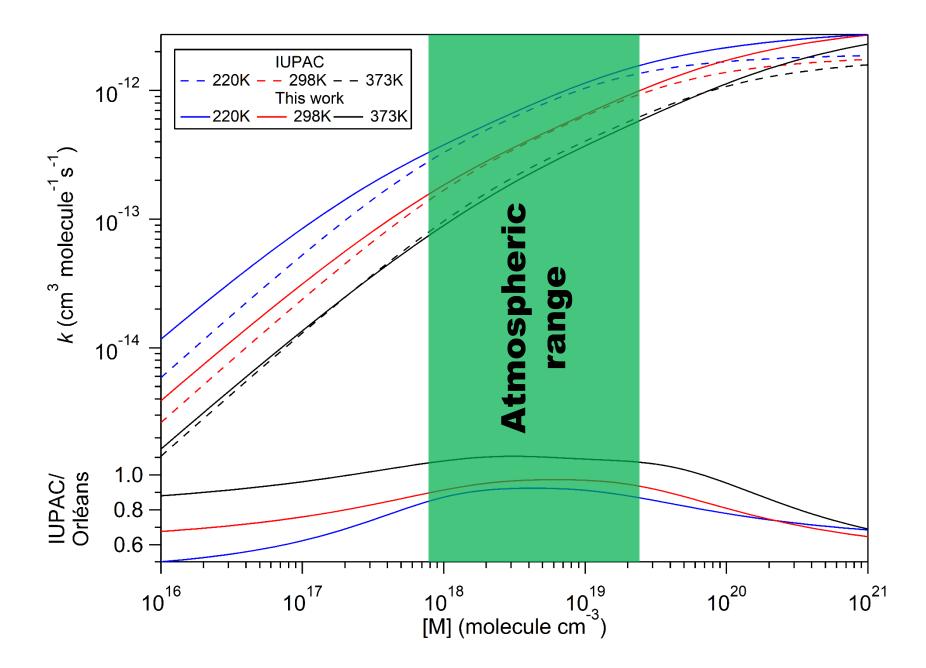












#### Conclusions

- First T-dependence under atmospherically relevant conditions
- Much of new data (M = N<sub>2</sub> and O<sub>2</sub>) inconsistent with reduced high pressure limit suggested by Blitz and co-workers
- Preliminary parameterizations indicates a good general consistency with IUPAC
- This result was obtained from a much larger pool of data (some old, and some new)
