Introduction

Oxalyl chloride, $(CICO)_2$, is commonly used as a photolytic CI atoms precursor for kinetic and photochemical studies. Previous studies of the $(CICO)_2$ photodissociation at 193, 248, and 351 nm suggest that UV photodissociation proceeds via a two-step mechanism involving the formation of an excited CICO^{*} radical (1) and prompt dissociation of a fraction of the CICO* depending on the photolysis wavelength to CI + CO(2)[1-5]:

$(CICO)_2 +$	$hv \rightarrow CICO^* + CO + CI$	(1)
CICO*	\rightarrow CI + CO	(2)

The CICO radical formed with the energy lower than its dissociation barrier has been found to undergo thermal unimolecular dissociation (3) on the time scale of several microseconds at room temperature and atmospheric pressure [5,6]:

CICO + M \rightarrow CI + CO + M (3)

An additional (COCI)₂ dissociation pathway via molecular Cl₂ elimination has been proposed on the basis of Cl₂ detection from 248 nm photolysis of $(COCI)_2$ [7]:

 $(CICO)_2 + hv \rightarrow 2CO + CI_2$ (1a)

In this work the photodissociation of $(COCI)_2$ by solar irradiation (λ > 300 nm) has been studied in the HELIOS environmental chamber of ICARE (CNRS, Orléans).
