



insurance contract operating according to the fixed premium method is tainted by Gharar which renders it obsolete, and therefore illegal from the point of view of Muslim law. The alternative is the mutual insurance contract based on the principle of mutual assistance. The same is true for reinsurance in an Islamic framework based on the principle of mutuality."

For many years, a problem faced by Islamic financial institutions has been the absence of an appropriate legislative framework to support their establishment and promote their growth. This problem has been moderated by the emergence of AAOIFI and IFSB.



AAOIFI

The Accounting and Auditing Organization for Islamic Financial Institutions (AAOIFI) was created, by the agreement signed by Islamic financial institutions on February 26, 1990, in Algiers. AAOIFI is composed of more than 200 members (central banks, Islamic banks, audit firms, etc.).

- The AAOIFI standard n ° 26 promulgated on May 5, 2006, deals with Takaful insurance.

IFSB

The Islamic Financial Services Board (IFSB) is an international standards organization that was officially launched on November 3, 2002 and started operations on March 10, 2003. Its headquarters are in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Since 2009 four standards relating to Takaful have been promulgated by the IFSB:

- IFSB-8 Guiding Principles on Governance for Takâ ful (Islamic Insurance) Undertakings (2009)
- IFSB-11 Standard on Solvency Requirements for Takâful (Islamic Insurance) Undertakings (2010)
- IFSB-14 Standard On Risk Management for Takā ful (Islamic Insurance) Undertakings (2013)
- IFSB-18 Guiding Principles for Retakāful (Islamic Reinsurance) (2016)

Findings


- ✓ A General Takaful activity (property and liability) insurance) can only be exercised in the form of a Mutual **Insurance Company (SAM) or a Mutual Company** Insurance (SMA).
- ✓ A Family Takaful activity (life insurance) can only be exercised in the form of a Mutual Insurance Company (SAM).
- ✓ The management of contributions must reconcile a hybrid Shari'ah Solvency II compliant management.







(en millions d'euros)





FRENCH LAW



The Takaful operator must ensure that insurance operations comply with the rules and principles of Shari'ah.



To exercise takaful, it is necessary to transpose Islamic law in compliance with the legal framework of the country in which the operator wants to exercise (POG, IDD, etc.).

The solvency regime must reflect the risk nature.

If there is a deficit in the subscription fund, the insurer must grant an interest-free loan, or make a contribution reminder to the members.



Product Oversight and Governance

- Identification of co-designers

- Anticipation and detection of any conflict of interest
- Product review planification

Compliance to Islamic law


- The Fund must not be involved in a transaction in which there may be interest
- Any interest income, even if it is improperly earned by the Fund, must be distributed to charities
- No document of the Fund may contain any expression implying an interest charge or payment, ambiguity, excessive uncertainty or games of chance.
- It is strongly recommended to keep the funds collected from participants in a separate Sharī'ah compatible bank account


