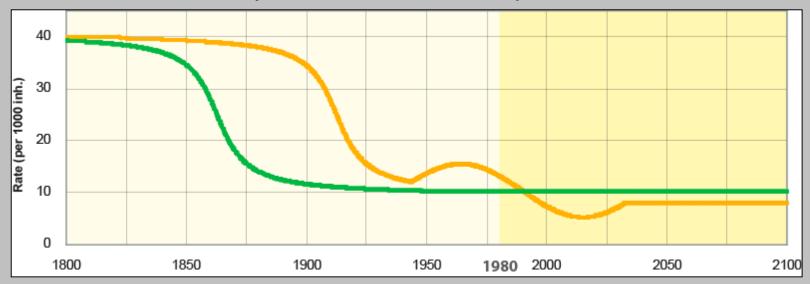


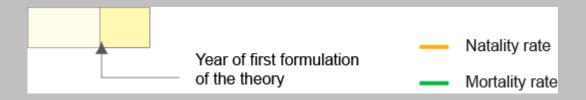




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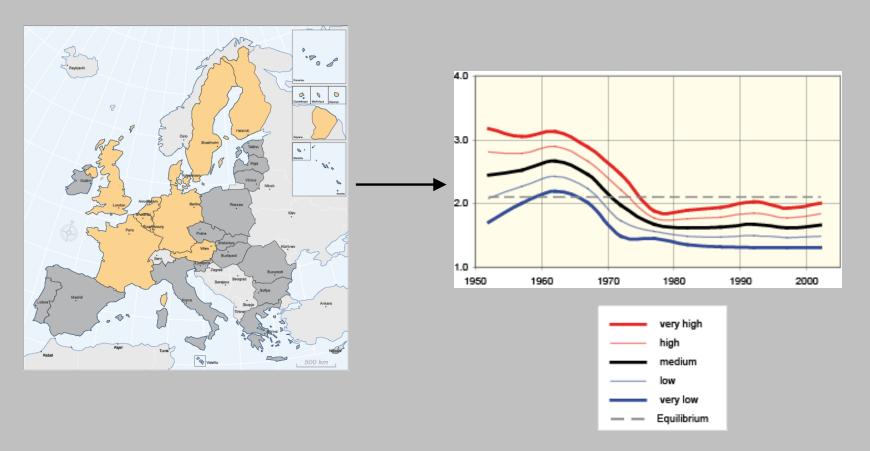






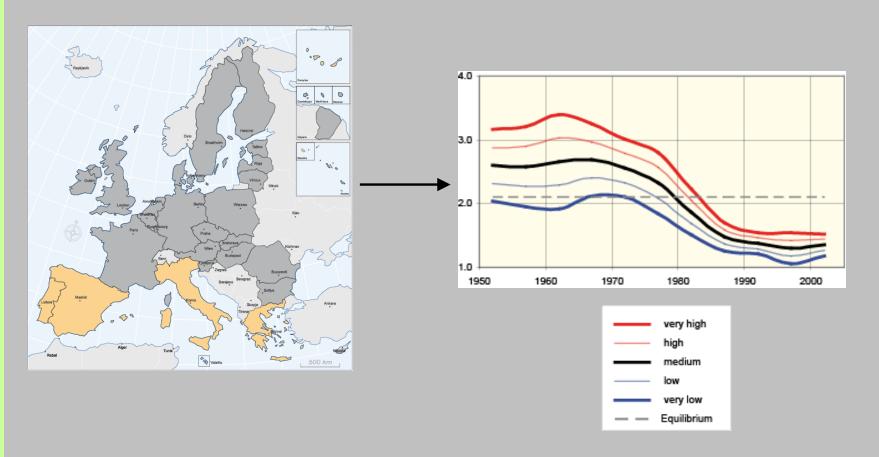


### Fertility rates 1950-2005 in Northern and Western Europe



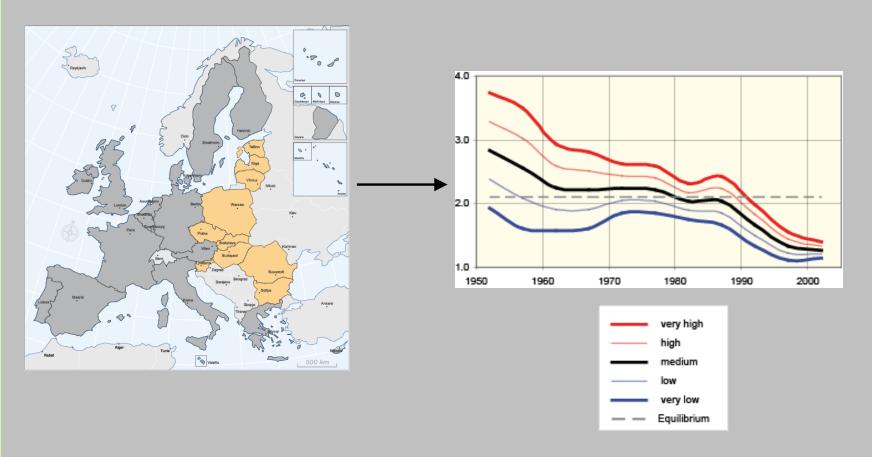


### Fertility rates 1950-2005 in Southern Europe



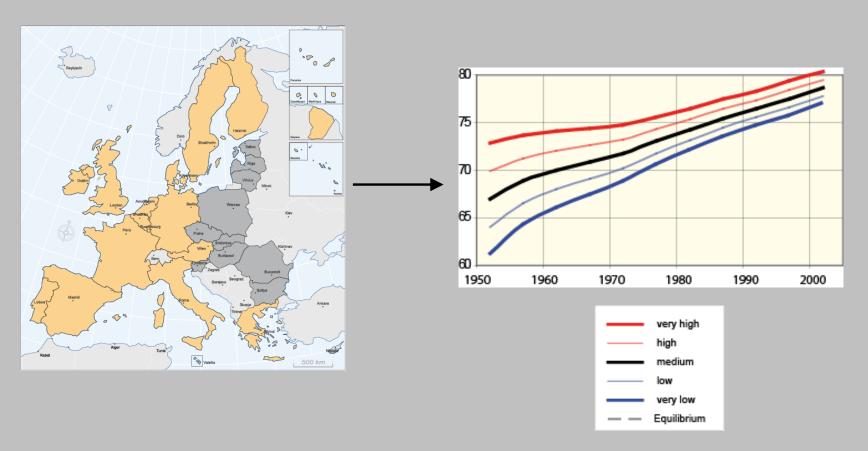


### Fertility rates 1950-2005 in Eastern Europe



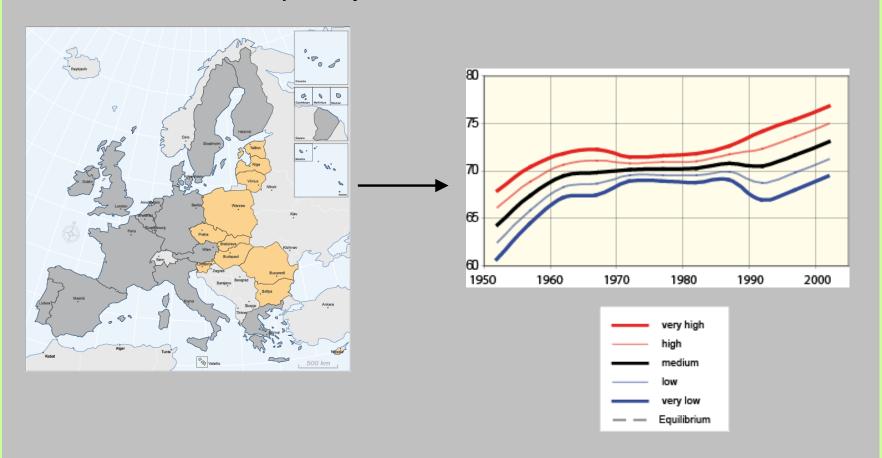


### **Life expectancy 1950-2005 in Old Member States**



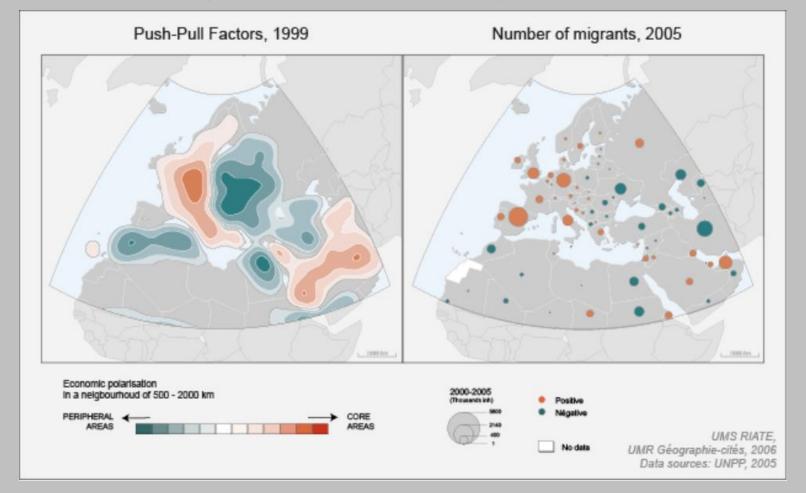


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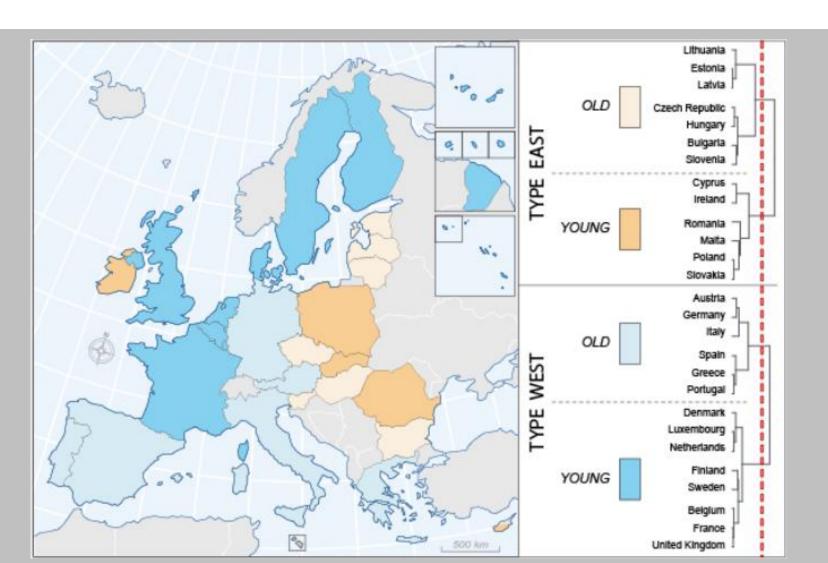

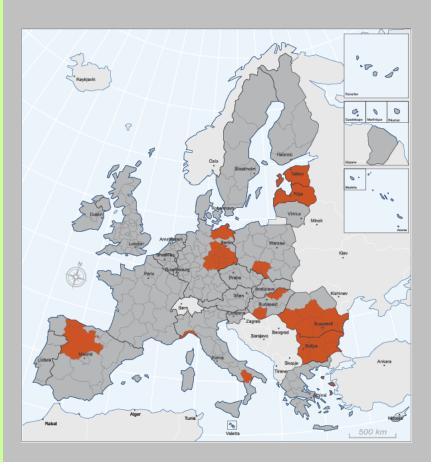
### MAIN CONCLUSIONS

- Without immigration EU27 population could decline quickly.
- ❖ The share of EU in world population has remained stable since 1960 only because of enlargement.
- ❖ Fertility and mortality has followed different paths in Old and New member states during the last 50 years
- **❖** Ageing and depopulation will be especially strong in east and central Europe after 2030.





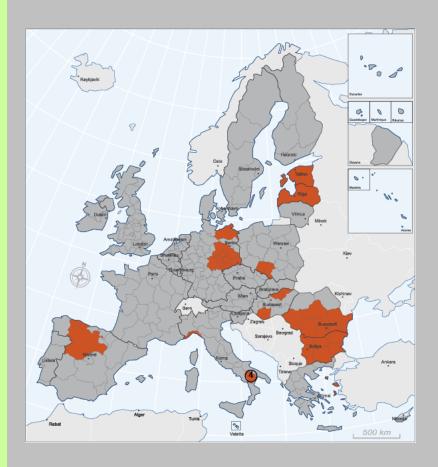

### **EVOLUTION OF POPULATION 1980 – 2000 AND PROJECTIONS IN UPPER NORRLAND (Sweden)**

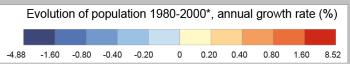


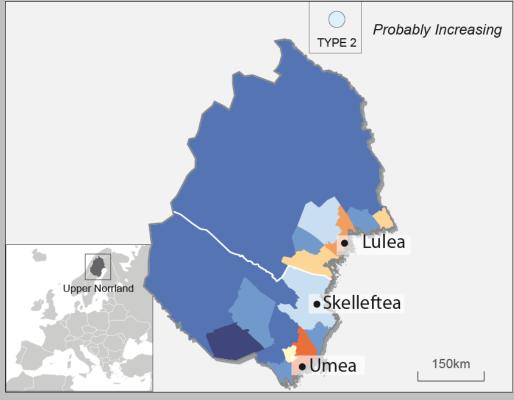


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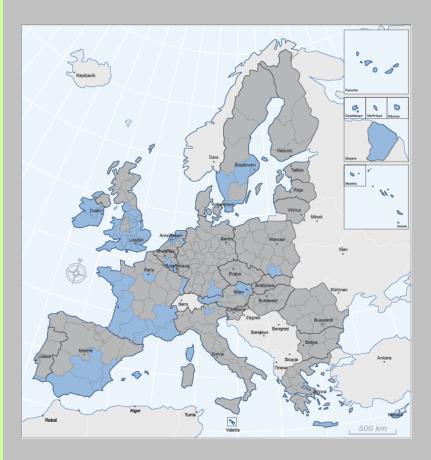








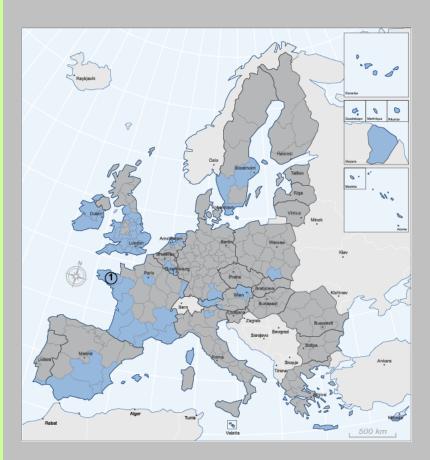
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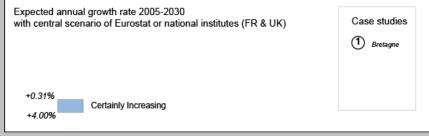






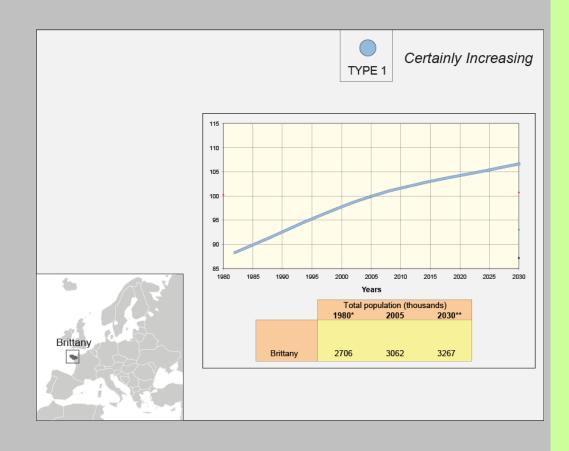
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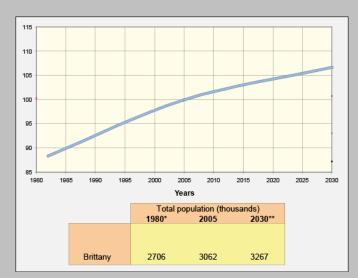
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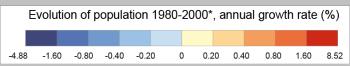
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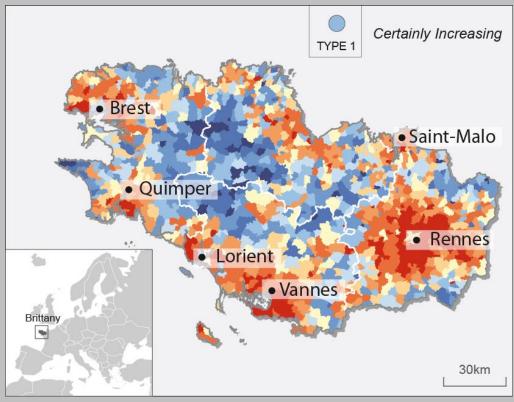

### **EVOLUTION OF POPULATION 1980 – 2000 AND PROJECTIONS BRITTANY (France)**

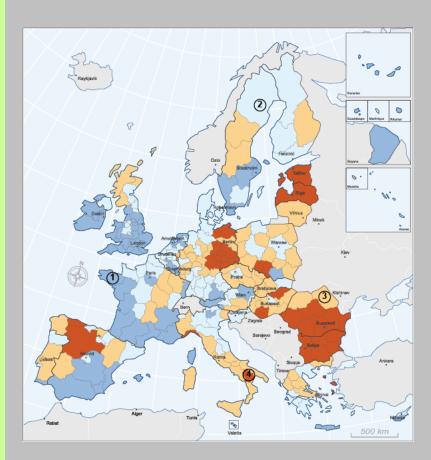


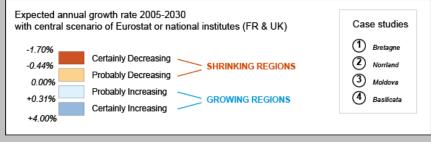

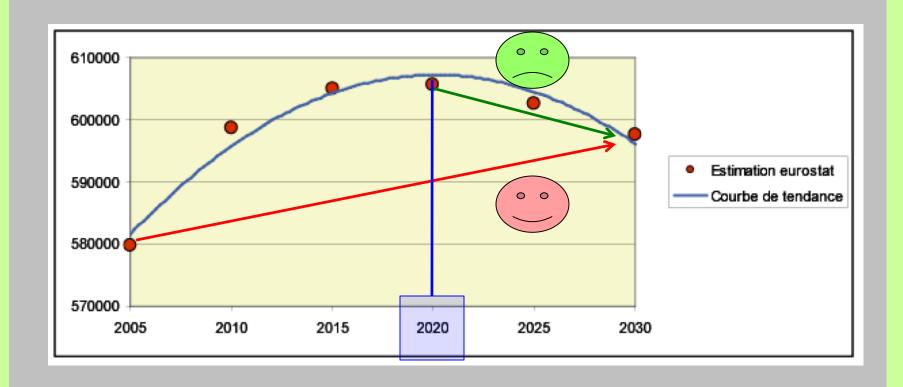

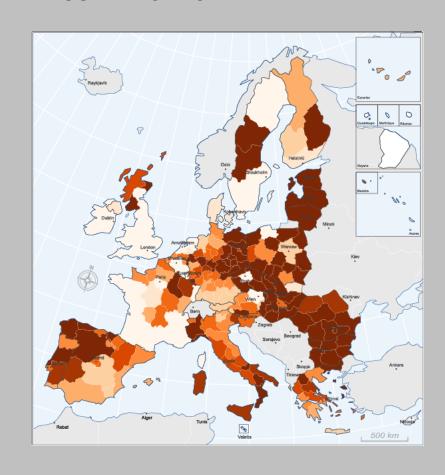

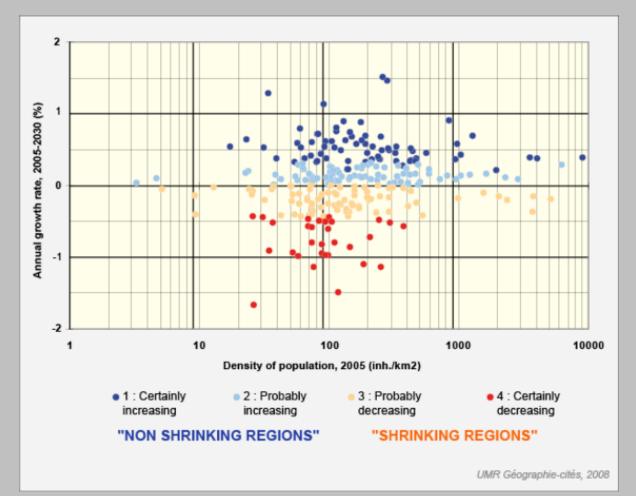
### SPATIAL DISTRIBUTION OF DEMOGRAPHIC DECLINE

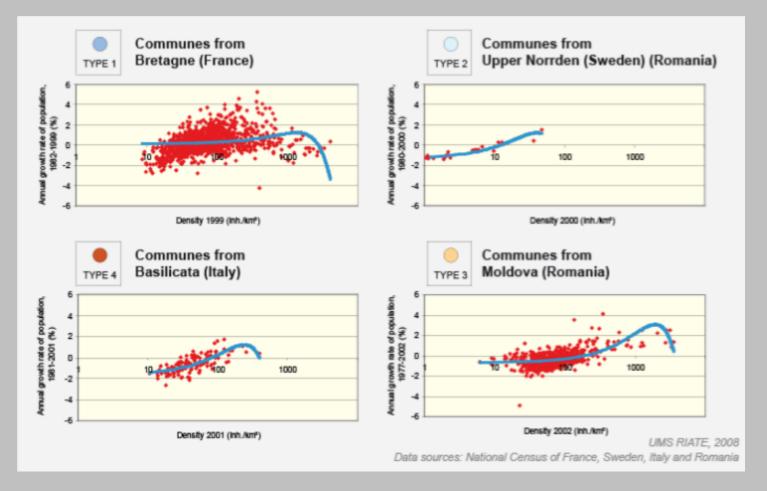

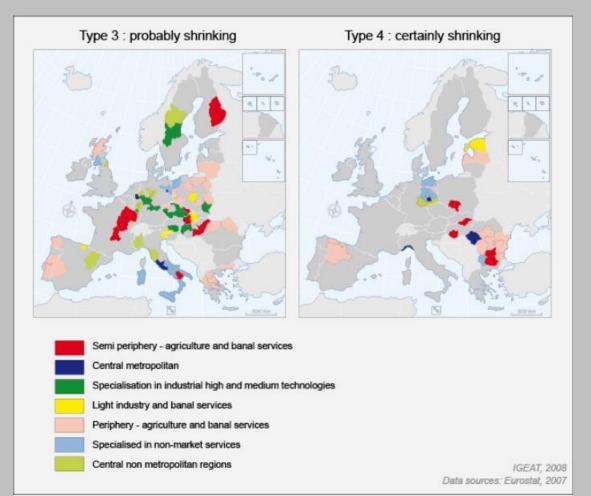

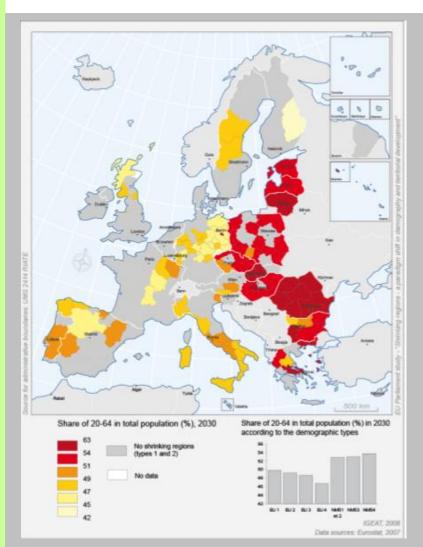
#### MAIN CONCLUSIONS

- ❖ 40 % of EU regions will experiment population decline between 2005 and 2030
- ❖ 70 to 80% of regions will start do decline before 2040
- **❖Shrinking regions are not necessary peripheral regions with rural orientation and low density.**
- ❖ Case studies indicates that all regions are concerned by population decline at local level, in particular in rural areas.
- ❖ The regional (NUTS2) level is not sufficient to catch the impact of population decline on EU territory.





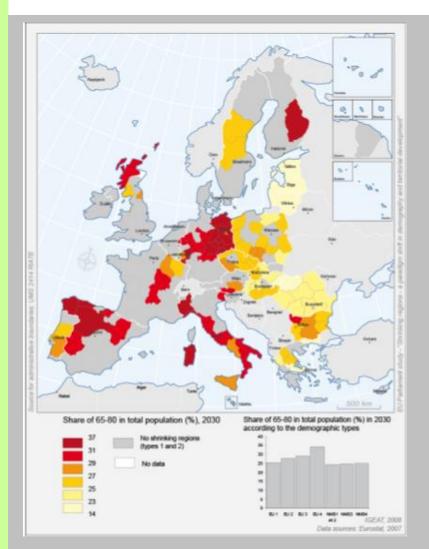




## Potential of active population in 2030 (% of 20-64 years)

- ➤ Old member states: Low proportion of active population, in particular in shrinking regions
- ➤ New member states: High proportion of active population. No differences between shrinking regions and the others





## Potential pressure on pension in 2030 (% of 65-80 years)

- > Old member states: High proportion of old people at pension age, especially in shrinking regions
- ➤ New member states: Low proportion of old people at pension age. No differences between shrinking regions and the others

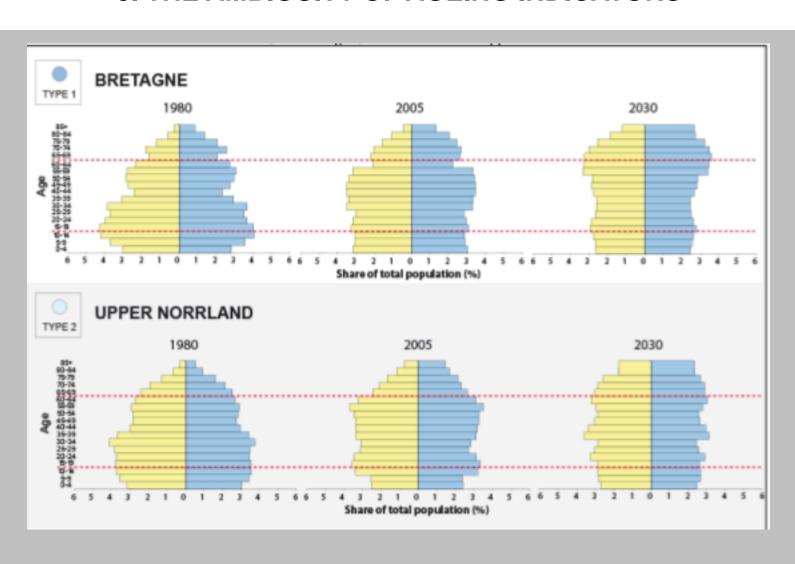


# THIS CLASSICAL INDICATORS OF LISBON STRATEGY ARE QUESTIONNABLE BECAUSE:

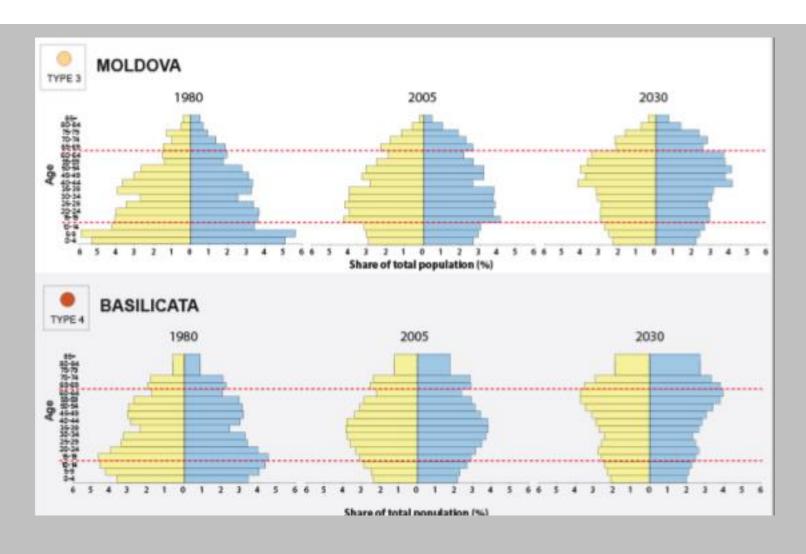
- (1) They do not take into account the internal differences of regions at local level.
- (2) They are based on a normative approach of life cycle that is mainly oriented to economic productivity without any consideration of social welfare.



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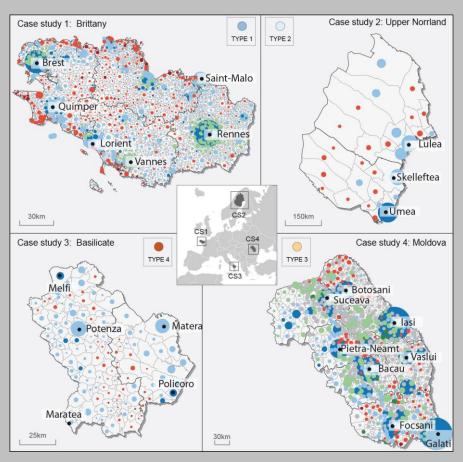
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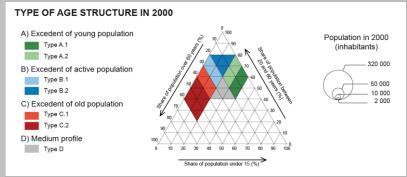

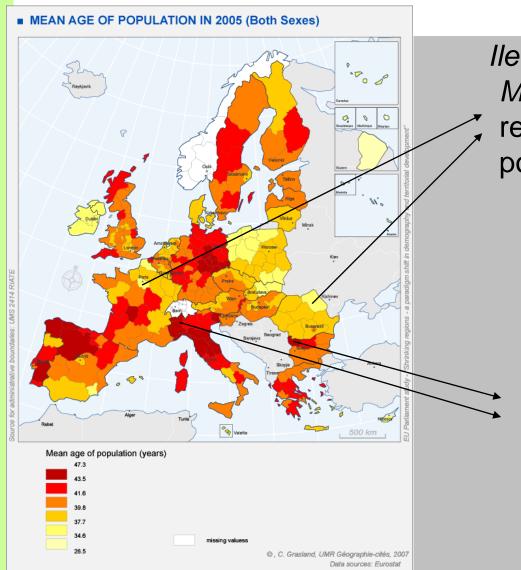

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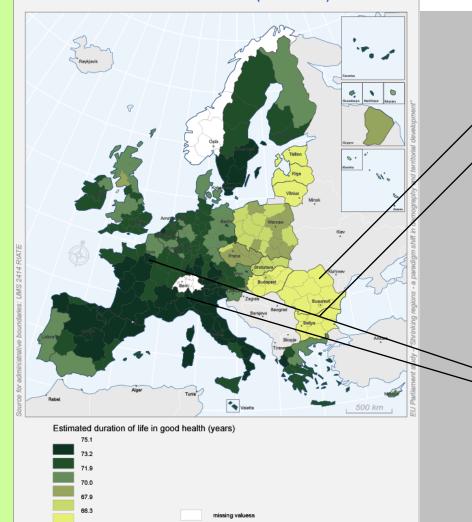

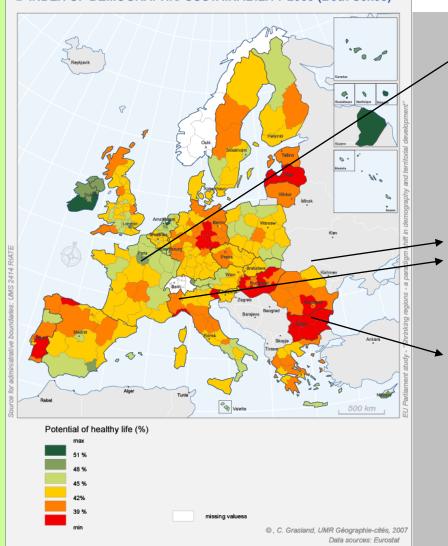
The level of healthy life expectancy is low and equal to 65 years in Moldova (RO) and Severozapaden (BU)

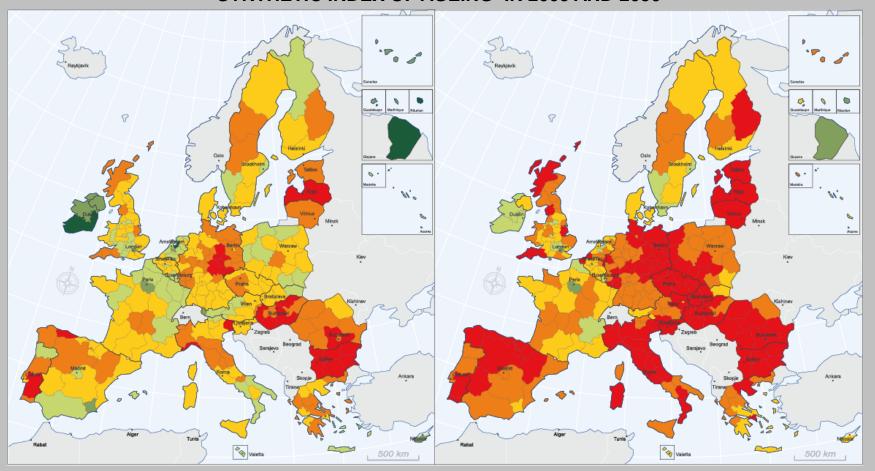

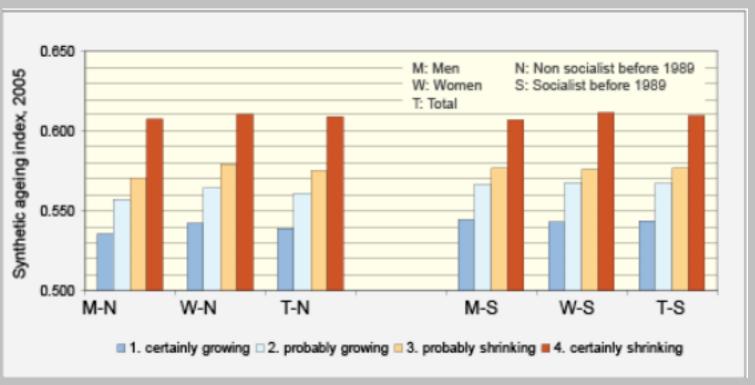
#### **SYNTHETIC INDEX OF AGEING IN 2005 AND 2030**

Shrinking regions are always characterised by a stronger level of ageing. When it is measured by a correct index, they are no differences between old and new member states.

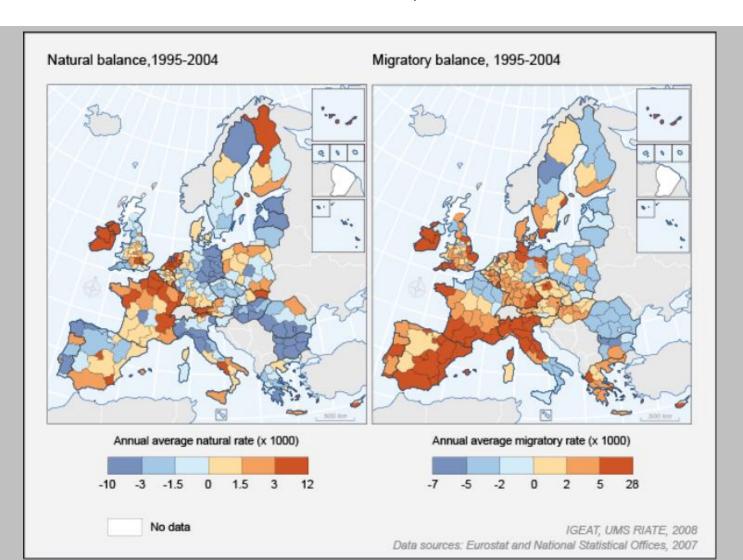


#### MAIN CONCLUSIONS

- ❖ Classical indicators of ageing are based on a normative vision of life oriented by economic assumptions.
- ❖ According to this classical indicators, demographic situation is better in New Member States than in Old member states.
- ❖ Better measure of social ageing are obtained by a combination of mean age and life expectancy.
- \*According to this new indicator, the situation of shrinking regions appears equally difficult in old and new member states.

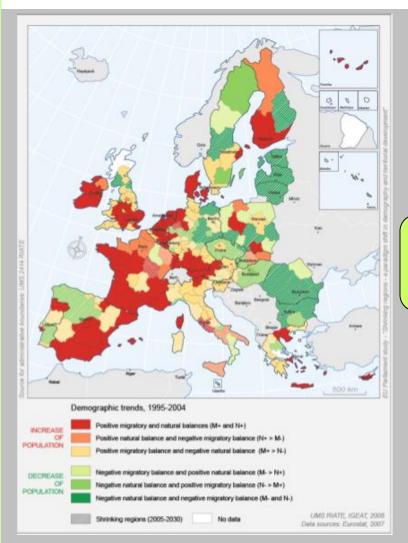


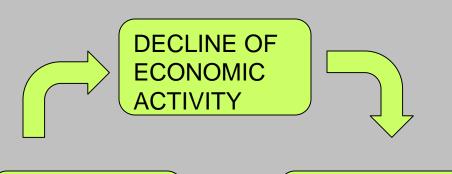

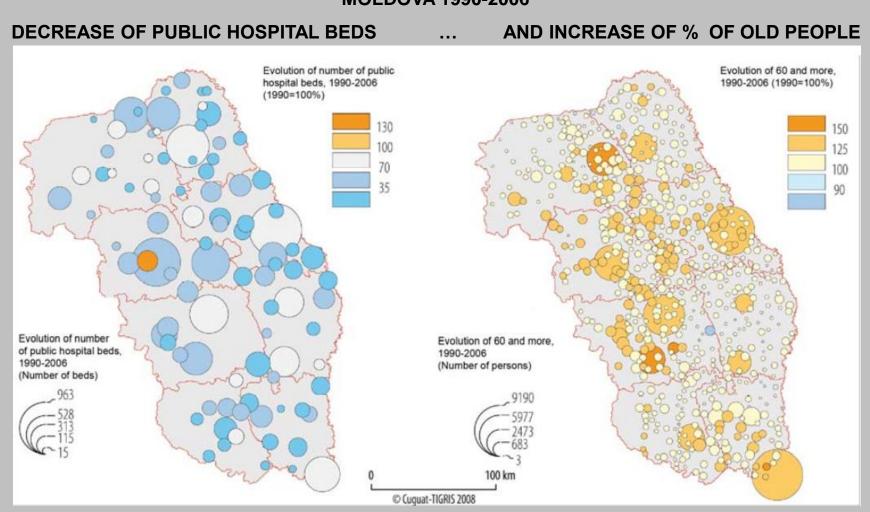
- ❖ The shrinking regions are losing their young active ...
- ... but they are not necessary able to develop a « grey economy » ...
- ... and can also lose their richest citizen and the related economic transfers (pensions, health system).

## 4. VICIOUS CIRCLES: ECONOMY, MIGRATION AND AGEING

#### MAIN CONCLUSIONS

- ❖ Population decline is correlated with lower economic performance at national and EU level.
- ❖ Shrinking regions are losing their young active that increase population decline
- ❖ Social transfer are not able to break the vicious circle that links population decline, emigration and ageing

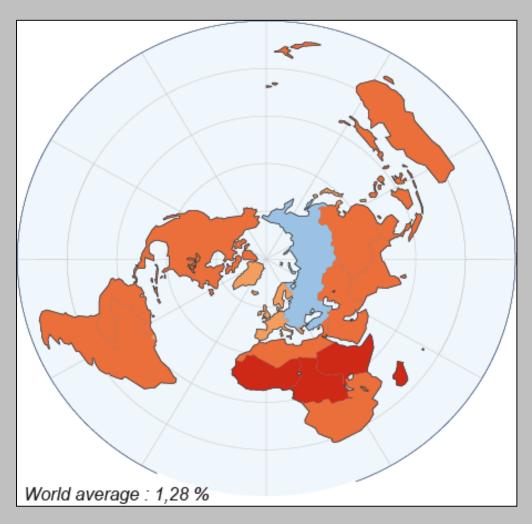


❖The assumption of « grey economy » are questionnable as old and rich people are generally not attracted by shrinking regions.

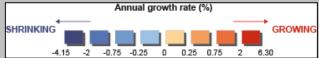

#### **Evolution of population 1995-2005**



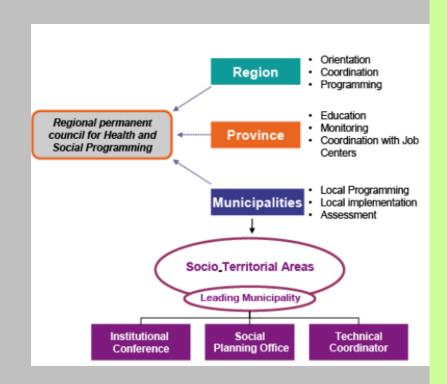

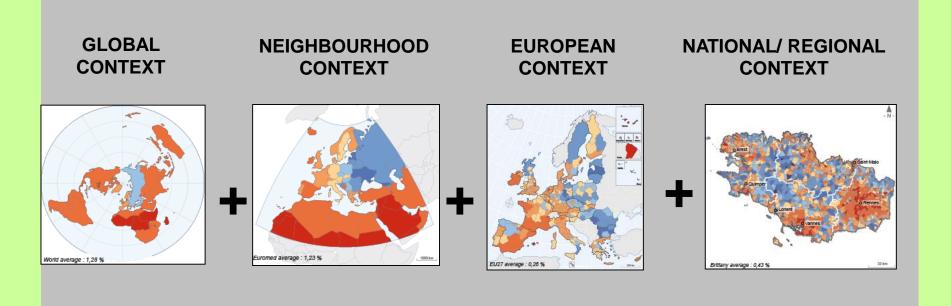
