

Identify the factors of creep behavior on small clear wood

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
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Context and objectives



Wood has been used in architecture scene to ancient time. As a structure material, its long-term behavior be considered and needs controlled.

In controlled conditions, wood is a liner viscoelastic material which shows a delay deformation during loading and dynamic mechanical analysis.

Dynamic mechanical analysis






Vibration test


E: Dynamic MOE ρ: Density 1: Length of the specimen h: thickness of the specimen f: resonance frequency m = 4.73

Vibration tests



A series of vibration signal was given by the electromagnet to the metal piece at the end of the specimen. The signal was collected by the lasertriangulation sensor. The Q⁻¹ was calculated by the LabVIEW and the specific modulus was calculated by the resonance frequency and the size, density of the specimen in Microsoft Excel.


✓ Data collected: Density, specific modulus, $Q^{-1} \rightarrow Sampling$

Sampling

The vibration test results and the information of the specimens were considered in the sampling. In this study, 9 specimens were selected to have the most wiled density diversity and the closest specific modulus for the creep test. There were 3 Douglas fir, 2 Poplar, 3 European Beech, and 1 European Oak.


The matching calculation was done by Microsoft Excel. The criteria value (C) was definded as the variation of the target factor minus all the variation of the control factors. The group with the highest C value was selected for the experiment.


$$C = Variation target - \sum Variation controls$$





Wood creep behavior


The specimens were placed in the environment 20 °C and RH = 85% testing when they were stable. A 4-point bending test was done in the same condition. The distance of the support was 110 mm and the $\frac{1000}{5}$ 1000 distance of the loading was 60 mm. 2 gauges collected the deformation at the same time.












Results and Discussion



Conclusion

In this study, we can find a linear relationship between dynamic and static MOE. It means that vibration tests can well measure the characteristics of wood, and we can also observe the rheological behavior. Under stable environment, when the specific modulus of the specimens was controlled, we can assume that all the wood specimens have similar cell wall structure. In this case, density was a strong predictor of creep behavior.

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
