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Problems of Buffon type with multiple intersections for lattices of isoscele trapeziums

Abstract

In this paper we study problems of Bufoon type with multiple intersections for a lattice of isoscele trapeziums, having angles $\frac{\pi}{3}$ and $\frac{2\pi}{3}$, and body test a line segment.

1 Preliminaries

In the two works [1] and [2] are studied problems of Buffon type with multiple intersections for lattices of parallelograms and of equilater triangles taking as test body a line segment of constant length s . For the same test body we consider a lattice \mathfrak{R} with elementary tile a trapezium \mathfrak{G} of parallel sides A and $A - B$ and of sides B and B , that form an angle equal to $\frac{\pi}{3}$ with the side A .



We want to determine the probability of multiple intersections of the test body s with the sides of lattice \mathfrak{R} , that is the probability p_1, p_2, \dots that the test body intersects respective one time, two times, ... the sides of lattice.

Because of the different relations between the geometric objects of the trapezium \mathfrak{I} , that is between sides A, B , the heights $h = \frac{B\sqrt{3}}{2}$ and $H = \frac{A\sqrt{3}}{2}$, and the diagonal $\delta = \sqrt{A^2 - AB + B^2}$ we must consider the following cases:

Case 1 : $B \leq A \leq \frac{2B}{\sqrt{3}}$. In this case we have:

$$A - B \leq h \leq H \leq B < \delta < A;$$

Case 2 : $\frac{2B}{\sqrt{3}} \leq A \leq \left(1 + \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}\right)B$. In this case we have:

$$A - B \leq h \leq B \leq H < \delta < A;$$

Case 3 : $\left(1 + \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}\right)B \leq A \leq 2B$. In this case we have:

$$h \leq A - B \leq B \leq H \leq \delta < A;$$

Case 4 : $2B \leq A \leq (4 + 2\sqrt{3})B$. In this case we have:

$$h \leq B \leq A - B \leq H \leq \delta < A;$$

Case 5 : $(4 + 2\sqrt{3})B \leq A$. In this case we have:

$$h \leq B \leq H \leq A - B < \delta < A.$$

The length needle s is small (in the given sense in [3]) respectively if and only if $l \leq A - B$ in the cases 1 and 2 and $l \leq B \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}$ in the cases 3, 4 and 5.

2 The length needle

We consider that l is small respect to \mathfrak{R} . Under this hypothesis we don't have to distinguish between the 5 previous cases. The test body can intersect one time, two times or three times the sides of lattice; therefore we want to calculate the probabilities p_1, p_2, p_3 .

Theorem 1 Let s a line segment of length l small regarding the lattice \mathfrak{R} , uniformly distributed in a bounded region of the Euclidean plane. The probabilities that s intersects one time, two times or three times the sides of \mathfrak{R} are respectively

$$p_1 = \frac{4}{\pi\sqrt{3}} \cdot \frac{2A+B}{2A-B} \cdot \frac{l}{B} - \left(\frac{7}{2\pi\sqrt{3}} + \frac{5}{18}\right) \cdot \frac{l^2}{(2A-B)B}; \quad (1)$$

$$p_2 = \left(\frac{4}{9} + \frac{2}{\pi\sqrt{3}}\right) \cdot \frac{l^2}{(2A-B)B} \quad (2)$$

$$p_3 = \left(\frac{1}{\pi\sqrt{3}} - \frac{1}{9}\right) \cdot \frac{l^2}{(2A-B)B}. \quad (3)$$

Proof. Let φ the angle formed from s with the the straight parallels of the lattice, we observe that for reasons of simmetry is sufficient to consider the direction of φ in the interval $[0, \frac{\pi}{2}]$. Let M the set of the length segments l that have the barycentre m in the trapezium \mathfrak{I} and the arbitrary direction $\varphi \in [0, \frac{\pi}{2}]$. For $k = 0, 1, 2, 3$ let \mathbb{N}_k set of segments s length l that have the barycentre m in the trapezium \mathfrak{I} , the direction φ such that che s intersects \mathfrak{R} k times. Therefore $M = \mathbb{N}_1 \cup \mathbb{N}_2 \cup \mathbb{N}_3$ is a three-dimensional set and if φ is the direction s , then $s \in \mathbb{N}_k$ if and only if the centre m of s is founded in a set of \mathfrak{I} , that will be denote by $\mathfrak{I}_k(\varphi)$. If μ is the Lebesgue measure in the Euclidean space, then Stoka's formula gives to us

$$p_k = \frac{\mu(\mathbb{N}_k)}{\mu(M)} = \frac{\int_0^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_k(\varphi) d\varphi}{\frac{\pi}{2} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}} = \frac{4 \int_0^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_k(\varphi) d\varphi}{\pi (AB\sqrt{3} - B^2\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2})}, \quad (4)$$

hence $\text{Area } \mathfrak{I} = \frac{1}{2}(2A - B) \cdot h = \frac{AB\sqrt{3}}{2} - \frac{B^2\sqrt{3}}{4}$.

For $\varphi \in [0, \frac{\pi}{3}]$ the set $\mathfrak{I}_3(\varphi)$ is empty; the set $\mathfrak{I}_2(\varphi)$ is the union of two parallelograms and of two trapezoids with height $\frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi$ and sides $\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi) =: l_1(\varphi)$, $\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\frac{\pi}{3} + \varphi) =: l_2(\varphi)$, like in Fig. 2.



Then we obtain:

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_2(\varphi) &= \left(l_1(\varphi) + l_2(\varphi) + 2 \cdot \frac{l_1(\varphi) + l_2(\varphi)}{2} \right) \frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi = \\ &= 2 \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \left(\sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) + \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} + \varphi \right) \right) \frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi = l^2 \sin \varphi \cos \varphi. \end{aligned} \quad (5)$$

The set $\mathfrak{I}_1(\varphi)$ is composed from four parallelograms; the two "horizontal" have the height $\frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi$ and horizontal sides $A - 2l_2(\varphi)$ respectively $A - B -$

$2l_1(\varphi)$; the two "oblique" have the oblique sides $B - \frac{2}{\sqrt{3}}l \sin \varphi$ and the height $\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}l_1(\varphi)$ respectively $\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}l_2(\varphi)$. Then:

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_1(\varphi) &= 2A - B - 2(l_1(\varphi) + l_2(\varphi)) \frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi + \\ &\quad \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} \left(B - \frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \varphi \right) (l_1(\varphi) + l_2(\varphi)) = \\ &= Al \sin \varphi + Bl \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) - 2l^2 \sin \varphi \cos \varphi. \end{aligned} \quad (6)$$

For $\varphi \in [0, \frac{\pi}{3}]$ and $\varphi \in [\frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{\pi}{2}]$ we have two different geometric situation as we can see in Fig. 2 and 3.



For $\varphi \in [\frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{\pi}{2}]$ the set $\mathfrak{I}_3(\varphi)$ is composed by a little equilateral triangle with side $l_1^*(\varphi) = \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3})$, by a trapezium that have the sides $l \cos \varphi$ e $l_2(\varphi) = \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3})$, and height $\frac{l}{2} \sin(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3})$, and by two triangle that entirely forms a parallelogram with sides $l_2(\varphi)$ and $l_1^*(\varphi)$ havig height $\frac{l}{2} \sin(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3})$.

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_3(\varphi) &= \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin^2 \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) + \frac{l^2}{4} \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \left[\cos \varphi + \frac{1}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right] + \\ &\quad \frac{l^2}{2\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) = \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) + \\ &\quad \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) + \frac{l^2}{2\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) = \\ &\quad \frac{l^2}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) = -\frac{l^2}{2\sqrt{3}} \left[\frac{1}{2} + \cos 2\varphi \right]. \end{aligned} \quad (7)$$

The set $\mathfrak{S}_2(\varphi)$ is the union of an equilateral of side $l \cos \varphi$, a trapezium with parallel sides $l_1^*(\varphi)$ and $2l_1^*(\varphi)$ and height $\frac{l}{2} \sin(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3})$, of an equilateral triangle with side $l_2(\varphi)$, and of a pentagon that with a little equilateral triangle with side $l_1^*(\varphi)$ they form a parallelogram with sides $l_2(\varphi)$, $l_3(\varphi) := \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \varphi$ and angles $\frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{2\pi}{3}$.

In the figure 3 we see again that the set $\mathfrak{S}_1(\varphi)$ is the union of a pentagon and of three parallelograms with angles $\frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{2\pi}{3}$. The sides of the parallelogram are respectively $l_1^*(\varphi)$ and $B - 2l_3(\varphi)$, $A - B$ and $\frac{l}{2}$, and $l_2(\varphi)$ and $B - 2l_3(\varphi)$. The pentagon is the difference between a trapezium with parallel sides $A - [l_1^*(\varphi) + l_2(\varphi)]$ and $A - 2[l_1^*(\varphi) + l_2(\varphi)]$ and height $\frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi$ and a little equilateral triangle with sides $l_1^*(\varphi)$. Consequently:

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_2(\varphi) = & \left[\frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} \cos^2 \varphi + \frac{1}{\sqrt{3}} \sin^2 \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) + \frac{1}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin^2 \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right. \\ & \left. + \frac{1}{2\sqrt{3}} \sin \varphi \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) - \frac{1}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin^2 \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right] l^2 = \\ & \left[\frac{1}{\sqrt{3}} + \frac{\sqrt{3}}{8} \cos 2\varphi - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{8} \cos \left(2\varphi - \frac{2\pi}{3} \right) - \right. \\ & \left. - \frac{1}{8\sqrt{3}} \cos \left(2\varphi + \frac{2\pi}{3} \right) - \frac{1}{4\sqrt{3}} \cos \left(2\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right] l^2 \quad (8) \end{aligned}$$

and

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_1(\varphi) = & (A - B) \frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi + \\ & \left(B \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} - l \sin \varphi \right) \left(\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) + \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right) + \\ & \left[A - \frac{3}{2} \left(\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3} \right) + \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right) \right] \frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi - (l \cos \varphi)^2 \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} = \\ & Al \sin \varphi - \frac{7}{4\sqrt{3}} l^2 \sin^2 \varphi - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} l^2 \cos^2 \varphi = Al \sin \varphi + \frac{\cos 2\varphi}{2\sqrt{3}} l^2 - \frac{5l^2}{4\sqrt{3}}. \quad (9) \end{aligned}$$

We calculate the integrals of these areas:

$$\begin{aligned} \int_0^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_1(\varphi) d\varphi = & \int_0^{\frac{\pi}{3}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_1(\varphi) d\varphi + \int_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_1(\varphi) d\varphi = \\ & \left(-Al \cos \varphi + Bl \cos \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) - l^2 \sin^2 \varphi \right) \Big|_0^{\frac{\pi}{3}} + \left(-Al \cos \varphi + \frac{\sin 2\varphi}{4\sqrt{3}} l^2 - \frac{5l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \varphi \right) \Big|_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} = \\ & Al + \frac{1}{2} Bl - \left(\frac{7}{8} + \frac{5\pi}{24\sqrt{3}} \right) l^2. \quad (10) \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
\int_0^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_2(\varphi) d\varphi &= \int_0^{\frac{\pi}{3}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_2(\varphi) d\varphi + \int_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_2(\varphi) d\varphi = \\
&\frac{l^2}{2} \sin^2 \varphi \Big|_0^{\frac{\pi}{3}} + \frac{\pi}{6\sqrt{3}} l^2 + l^2 \left[\left(\frac{\sqrt{3}}{16} \sin 2\varphi \right) \right]_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} - \\
&\frac{\sqrt{3}}{16} \sin \left(2\varphi - \frac{2\pi}{3} \right) \Big|_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} - \frac{1}{16\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(2\varphi + \frac{2\pi}{3} \right) \Big|_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} - \\
&\left[\frac{1}{8\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(2\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right]_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} = \left(\frac{\pi}{6\sqrt{3}} + \frac{1}{4} \right) l^2, \tag{11}
\end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
\int_0^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_3(\varphi) d\varphi &= \int_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_3(\varphi) d\varphi = \\
&- \frac{l^2}{2\sqrt{3}} \left[\frac{\pi}{12} - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} \right] = \left(\frac{1}{8} - \frac{\pi}{24\sqrt{3}} \right) l^2. \tag{12}
\end{aligned}$$

Considering the formulas (4), (10), (11) and (12) we obtain the probabilities (1), (2) e (3). ■

3 The not small needle

Now we consider that the needle of length l is not little respect to \mathfrak{R} , but minor or equal to A . For each of the five previous cases we must disinguish others five undercases, for example in the case 1 the undercases are: $A - B \leq l \leq h$; $h \leq l \leq H$; $H \leq l \leq B$; $B \leq l \leq \delta$; $\delta \leq l \leq A$. The cases 1 and 2 have got two identical undercases ($A - B \leq l \leq h \wedge \delta \leq l \leq A$) and the cases 2 and 3 have got three identical undercases ($B \leq l \leq H, H \leq l \leq \delta \wedge \delta \leq l \leq A$), and so on. We observe that for $l \leq A$ exactly 16 undercases are different. In order to simplify we will make the calculations on the undercase $A - B \leq l \leq h$. In this case we must distinguish between the following situations:

$$i) h \leq 2(A - B); \quad ii) 2(A - B) \leq h.$$

In this last situation two possibilities exist:

$$i)_1 A - B \leq l \leq 2(A - B); \quad ii)_2 2(A - B) \leq l \leq h.$$

Now we consider the situations *i)* and *ii)*₁. The interval $[0, \frac{\pi}{2}]$ is the union of $[0, \varphi_0]$, $[\varphi_0, \frac{\pi}{3}]$ and $[\frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{\pi}{2}]$, where $\varphi_0 \in [0, \frac{\pi}{3}]$ is defined by the relation

$$\sin\left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi_0\right) = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} \cdot \frac{A - B}{l}.$$

So for $\varphi \in [\varphi_0, \frac{\pi}{3}] \cup [\frac{\pi}{3}, \frac{\pi}{2}]$ we can be useful for the calculations of the areas maked for the little case, it remain to determine *Area* $\mathfrak{I}_1(\varphi)$, *Area* $\mathfrak{I}_2(\varphi)$ and *Area* $\mathfrak{I}_3(\varphi)$ when $\varphi \in [0, \varphi_0]$, and for this we observe the Fig. 4:



Area $\mathfrak{I}_3(\varphi)$ is the area of parallelogram with sides $\frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin\left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi\right) - (A - B)$, $\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \varphi$ and angles $\frac{\pi}{3}$, $\frac{2\pi}{3}$; therefore we have:

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_3(\varphi) &= \frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi \left[\frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin\left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi\right) - (A - B) \right] = \\ &= \frac{l^2}{2\sqrt{3}} \cos\left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi\right) - \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} - \frac{l(A - B)}{2} \sin \varphi, \\ \int_0^{\varphi_0} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_3(\varphi) d\varphi &= \frac{l(A - B)}{2} (\cos \varphi_0 - 1) + . \\ &= \frac{l^2}{8} - \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \left(\varphi_0 + \sin\left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0\right) \right). \end{aligned} \quad (13)$$

From (7) and (13) we obtain

$$\begin{aligned} \int_0^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_3(\varphi) d\varphi &= \left(\int_0^{\varphi_0} + \int_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \right) \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_3(\varphi) d\varphi = \frac{l(A-B)}{2} (\cos \varphi_0 - 1) + \\ &\quad \frac{l^2}{8} - \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \left(\varphi_0 + \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0 \right) \right) + l^2 \left(\frac{1}{8} - \frac{\pi}{24\sqrt{3}} \right) = \\ &\quad \frac{l(A-B)}{2} (\cos \varphi_0 - 1) + \frac{l^2}{4} - \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \left(\frac{\pi}{6} + \varphi_0 + \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0 \right) \right). \end{aligned} \quad (14)$$

$\mathfrak{S}_2(\varphi)$ is composed from two parallelograms with sides that are respectively $\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3})$ and $A - B - \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi)$ and the same correspondent height of length $\frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi$, from two trapeziums with parallel sides respectively $\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3})$, $\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{3})$ and $A - B + \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3}) - \frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi)$, $A - B - \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi)$ and the same correspondent height of length $\frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi$, and from an equilateral triangle with side $\frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi) - (A - B)$. It follows that

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Area } \mathfrak{S}_2(\varphi) &= \left[\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} + \varphi \right) + (A - B) - \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) + \frac{l}{2\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{l}{2\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) + (A - B) + \frac{l}{2\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) - \frac{3l}{2\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) \right] \frac{l}{2} \sin \varphi + \\ &\quad \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} \left[\frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) - (A - B) \right]^2 = \frac{l^2}{\sqrt{3}} \left[\sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) - \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) \right] \sin \varphi + \\ &\quad (A - B) l \left[\sin \varphi - \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) \right] + \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} (A - B)^2 + \frac{l^2}{\sqrt{3}} \sin^2 \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) = \\ &\quad \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} (A - B)^2 + \sqrt{3} (A - B) l \sin \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{6} \right) + \frac{l^2}{\sqrt{3}} \left[1 - \frac{1}{2} \cos \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi \right) \right], \\ \int_0^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \mathfrak{S}_2(\varphi) d\varphi &= \left| \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} (A - B)^2 \varphi_0 - \sqrt{3} (A - B) l \cos \left(\varphi - \frac{\pi}{6} \right) \right|_0^{\varphi_0} + \\ &\quad \left. \frac{l^2}{\sqrt{3}} \varphi_0 + \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0 \right) \right|_0^{\varphi_0} + \frac{l^2}{2} \sin^2 \varphi \Big|_{\varphi_0}^{\frac{\pi}{3}} + \frac{l^2 \pi}{6\sqrt{3}} + \left[\frac{\sqrt{3}}{16} \sin 2\varphi \right]_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} - \\ &\quad \left. \frac{\sqrt{3}}{16} \sin \left(2\varphi - \frac{2\pi}{3} \right) \right|_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} - \frac{1}{16} \sin \left(2\varphi + \frac{2\pi}{3} \right) \Big|_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} + \frac{1}{8\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(2\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \Big| + \\ &\quad \left. \frac{1}{8\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(2\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right|_{\frac{\pi}{3}}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} l = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} (A - B)^2 \varphi_0 + \sqrt{3} (A - B) l \left[\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} - \cos \left(\varphi_0 - \frac{\pi}{6} \right) \right] + \end{aligned}$$

$$l^2 \left[\frac{\varphi_0}{\sqrt{3}} + \frac{\pi}{6\sqrt{3}} + \frac{1}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0 \right) - \frac{1}{2} \sin^2 \varphi_0 + \frac{1}{8} \right]. \quad (15)$$

Finally the set $\mathfrak{I}_1(\varphi)$ if $\varphi \in [0, \varphi_0]$ is the union of three polygons: an horizontal parallelogram with sides $A - 2l_2(\varphi)$ and $\frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \varphi$, havig angles $\frac{\pi}{3}$ and $\frac{2\pi}{3}$, and two oblique parallelograms; of eachone of the parallelograms we eliminate an equilateral triangle of side $\frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) - (A - B)$. The horizontal sides of this parallelogram are $l_1(\varphi)$ and $l_2(\varphi)$; The vertical height have length $B \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} - l \sin \varphi$.

Hence for $\varphi \in [0, \varphi_0]$ we have

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_1(\varphi) &= \left[A - \frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) \right] \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \varphi + \\ &\quad \left(B \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} - l \sin \varphi \right) \left(\sin \left(\varphi + \frac{\pi}{3} \right) + \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) \right) \frac{l}{\sqrt{3}} - \\ &\quad 2 \cdot \frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} \left[\frac{2l}{\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) - (A - B) \right]^2 = \frac{Al}{2} \sin \varphi + \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} Bl \cos \varphi - \\ &\quad \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} (A - B)^2 + 2(A - B) l \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi \right) - \\ &\quad l^2 \left[\frac{5}{4\sqrt{3}} + \frac{1}{2\sqrt{3}} \cos \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi \right) \right], \\ \int_0^{\varphi_0} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_1(\varphi) d\varphi &= \frac{Al}{2} (1 - \cos \varphi_0) + \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} Bl \sin \varphi_0 - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} (A - B)^2 \varphi_0 + \\ &\quad 2(A - B) l \left[\cos \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi_0 \right) - \frac{1}{2} \right] - l^2 \left[\frac{5}{4\sqrt{3}} \varphi_0 + \frac{1}{8} - \frac{1}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0 \right) \right] \end{aligned}$$

and therefore it is had that:

$$\begin{aligned} \int_0^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \text{Area } \mathfrak{I}_1(\varphi) d\varphi &= \frac{Al}{2} (1 + \cos \varphi_0) + Bl \left(1 - \frac{1}{2} \cos \varphi_0 \right) - \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} (A - B)^2 \varphi_0 + \\ &\quad 2(A - B) l \left[\cos \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi_0 \right) - \frac{1}{2} \right] - \\ &\quad l^2 \left[\frac{5}{4\sqrt{3}} \varphi_0 + \frac{5\pi}{24\sqrt{3}} + \cos^2 \varphi_0 - \frac{1}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0 \right) \right]. \quad (16) \end{aligned}$$

Form the formulas (14), (15),(16) and (4) follows:

Theorem 2 Let s a line segment of length l , that respect to the dimension of lattice \mathfrak{R} satisfies the relations $A - B \leq l \leq h \leq 2(A - B)$ or $A - B \leq l \leq 2(A - B) \leq h$. Let $\varphi_0 \in [0, \frac{\pi}{3}]$ is the only angle with the property $\sin(\frac{\pi}{3} - \varphi_0) = \frac{A-B}{l} \cdot \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}$. The line segment s is uniformly distributed in a bounded region of the Euclidean plane, then the probability that s intersects one time, two times or three times the sides of lattice \mathfrak{R} are respectively

$$p_2 = \frac{4}{\pi\sqrt{3}(A - \frac{B}{2})B} \left[\frac{\sqrt{3}}{4} (A - B)^2 \varphi_0 + \sqrt{3}(A - B)l \left(\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2} - \cos \left(\varphi_0 - \frac{\pi}{6} \right) \right) + l^2 \left(\frac{\varphi_0}{\sqrt{3}} + \frac{\pi}{6\sqrt{3}} + \frac{1}{4\sqrt{3}} \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0 \right) - \frac{1}{2} \sin^2 \varphi_0 + \frac{1}{8} \right) \right], \quad (18)$$

$$p_3 = \frac{4}{\pi\sqrt{3}(A - \frac{B}{2})B} \left[\frac{l(A - B)}{2} (\cos \varphi_0 - 1) + \frac{l^2}{4} - \frac{l^2}{4\sqrt{3}} \left(\frac{\pi}{6} + \varphi_0 + \sin \left(\frac{\pi}{3} - 2\varphi_0 \right) \right) \right]. \quad (19)$$

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
