What are SSSEP?

A sustained vibrotactile stimulus of the skin produces resonance-like evoked potentials Steady-State Somatosensorynamed Evoked Potentials or SSSEP. They appear as an increase of activity at the frequency of stimulation.

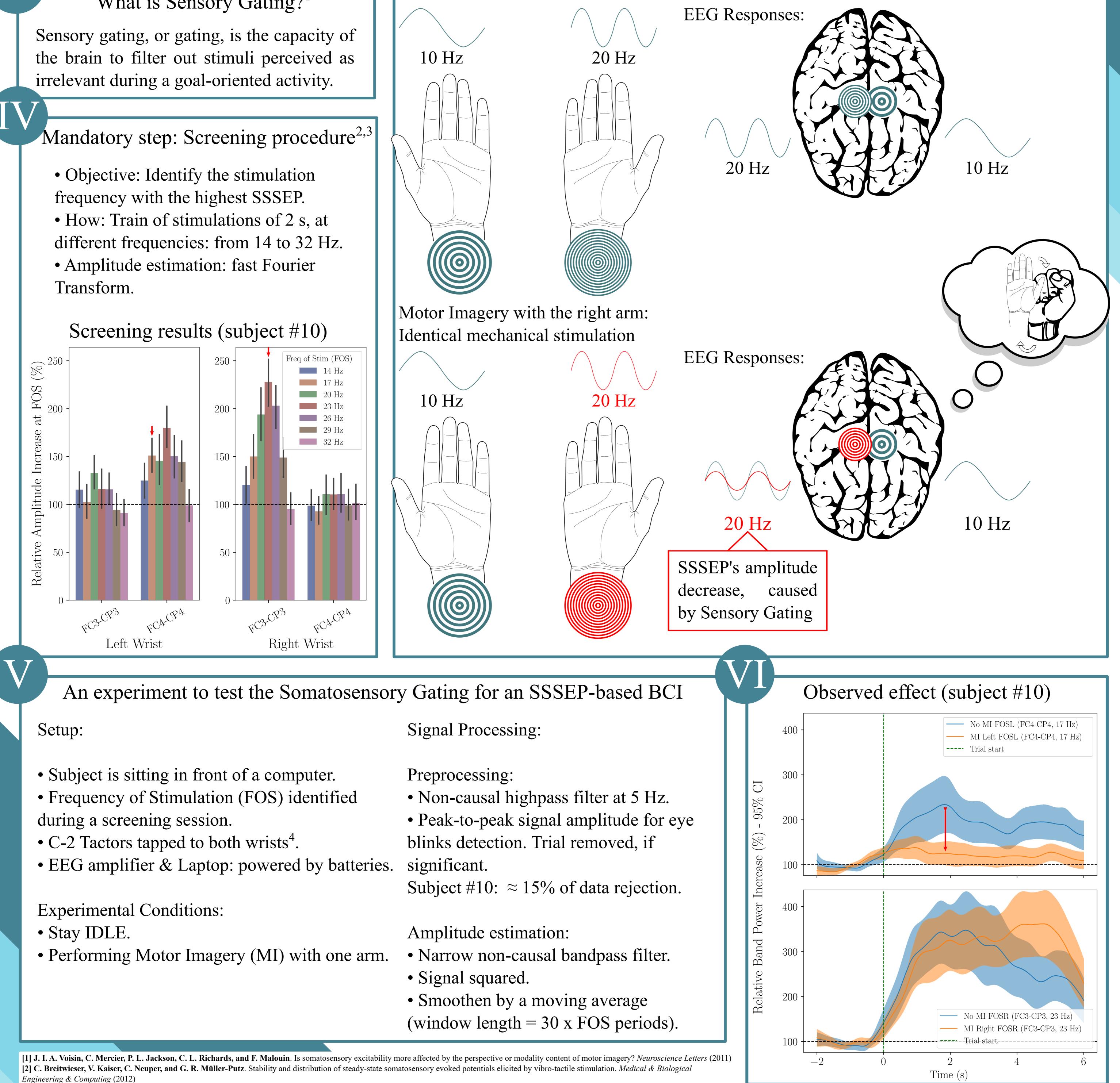
What is Sensory Gating?<sup>1</sup>

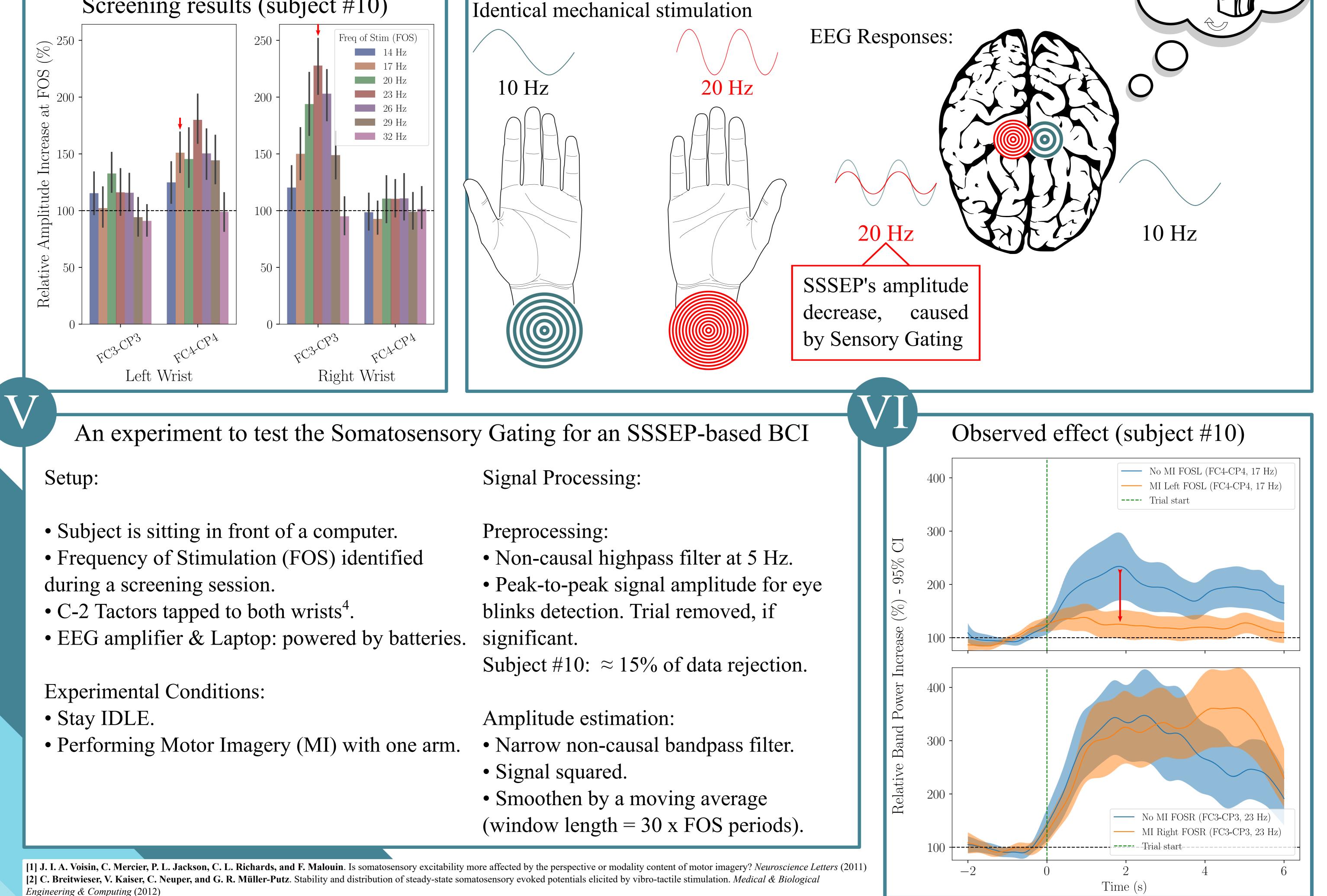
Idea of an SSSEP-based BCI exploiting Somatosensory Gating

- Performing Motor Imagery (MI) with one or two arms.
- Sustained vibrotactile stimuli on both wrists produces two SSSEP.
- The Gating resulting from the MI should decrease the amplitude of the respective SSSEP. • The amplitude of the two SSSEP are used as classification features.
