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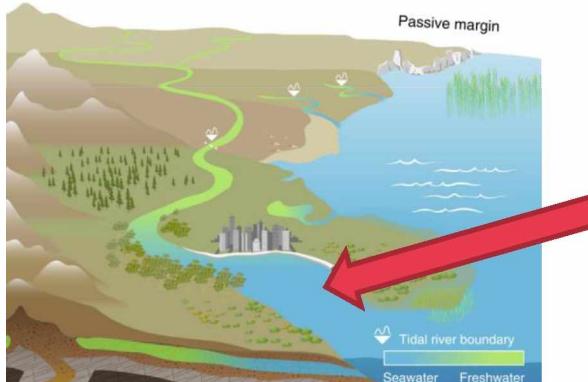
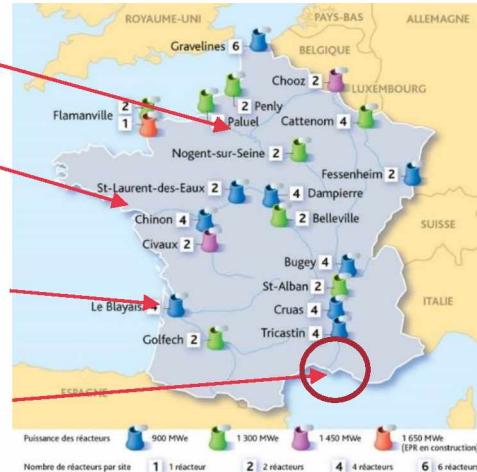
# Estuaries are hot spot areas for the transfer of radionuclides

Seine 380 m<sup>3</sup>/s

Loire 825 m<sup>3</sup>/s

Garonne 545 m<sup>3</sup>/s

Rhône, 1500 m<sup>3</sup>/s



- 13 nuclear plants are installed in France along four major rivers.
- Scenario of accidental releases of radionuclides (in the river or through atmospheric deposits) must take into account a potential contamination of the coastal areas.
- Estuaries are **hot spot areas** where specific physico-chemical processes must be correctly simulated for the evaluation of fluxes and activities transferred to the sea, and for the estimation of the potential impact on the ecosystems.

- Particles aggregation, deposit and resuspension
- Salinity changes
- Desorption from particles to dissolved phase
- Specific ecosystems
- Fisheries

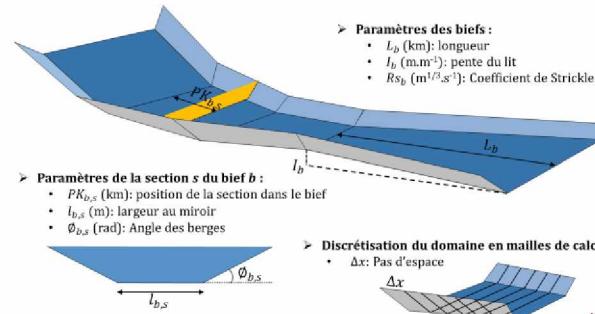


# IRSN Numerical models for radionuclide transfers in aquatic systems

## CASTEAUR: 1D numerical model for radionuclides transfers in rivers

### Inputs:

- Hydrographic parameters
- Chronics of :
  - water flows and suspended particles
  - Radionuclides by direct releases, atmospheric deposition and catchment erosion
- Sediments and radionuclides properties, ...



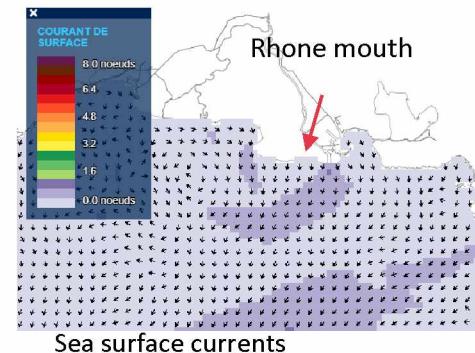
### Outputs:

- Hydraulic variables : water flow, water height, ...
- Particulate matter content in water and sediment deposition
- Radionuclides concentrations and fluxes** : dissolved (Bq/l) and particulate (Bq/kg) in water column and sediments

## STERNE: 3D numerical model for radionuclides dispersion in the ocean

### Inputs:

- Hydrodynamic data from oceanographic model
- Chronics of :
  - Radionuclides by direct releases or atmospheric deposition
  - Chemical and radioecological parameters (FC, Tp, Tb<sub>1/2</sub>...)



### Estuarine model

### Outputs:

- Radionuclides concentrations** in water (Bq/l) and biota (Bq/kg fresh)



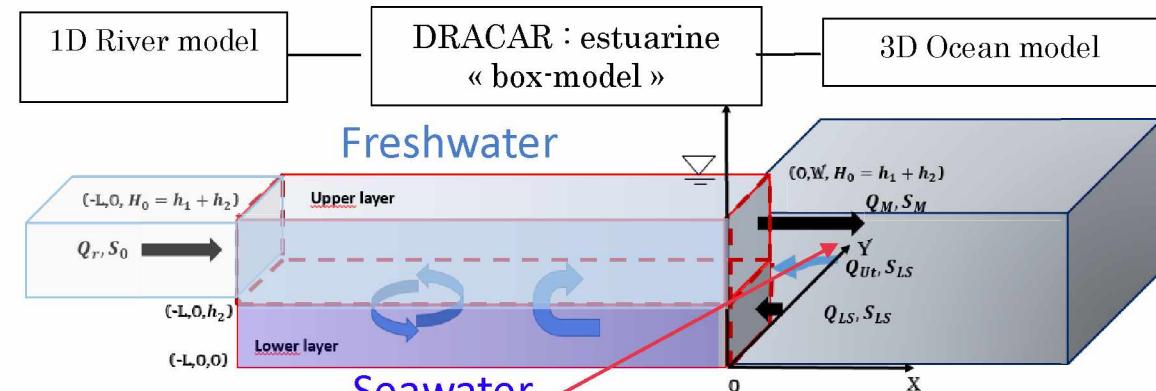


# DRACAR : Désorption des RAdionuCléides à l' interfAce littorale

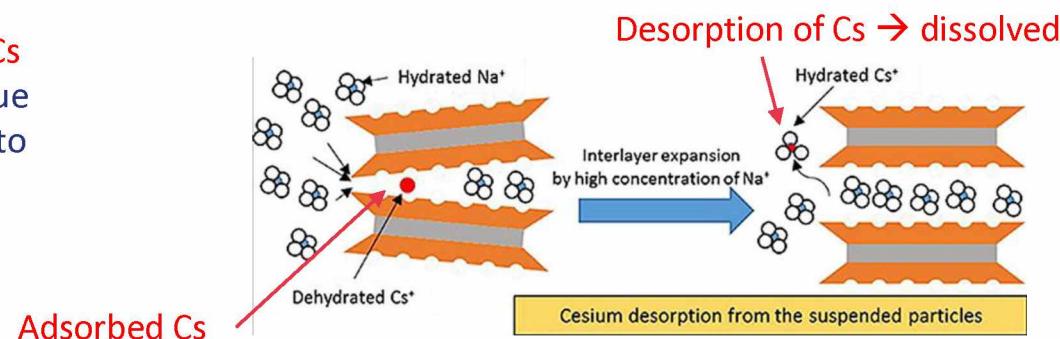
DRACAR: box-model able to simulate the freshwater-seawater mixing within an estuary and the physical structure of the water masses, in order to couple CASTEAUR and STERNE.



**Physical Outputs:** Physical structure of the water masses  
Water residence time in the estuary  
2D salinity, water and salinity fluxes at sea



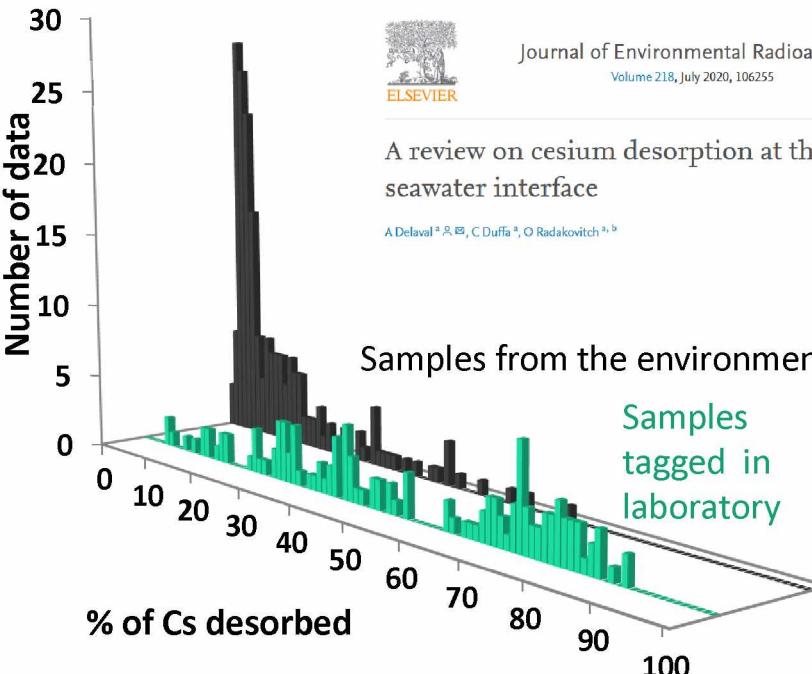
Missing process: the intensity of  $^{137}\text{Cs}$  desorption (particles  $\rightarrow$  dissolved) due to the exchange of radionuclides onto solid phase with dissolved seawater cations





# Desorption of $^{137}\text{Cs}$ at the fresh-seawater interface

Compilation of 32 studies from 1963 to 2017



- No clear trend with salinity
- Existence of an ageing effect

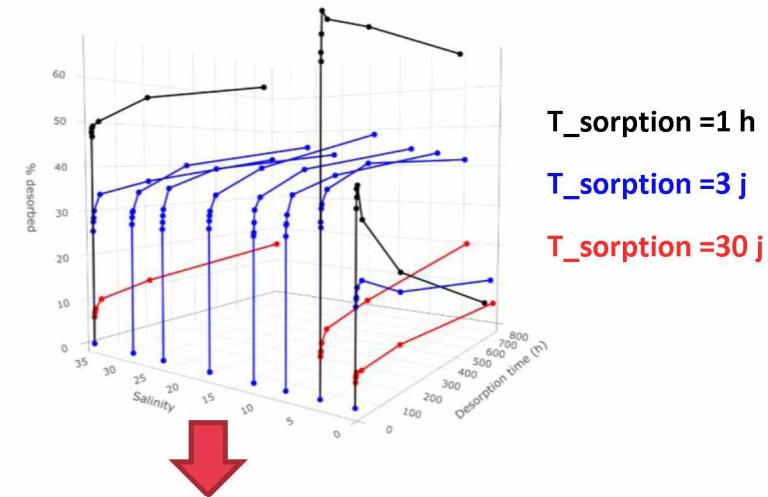

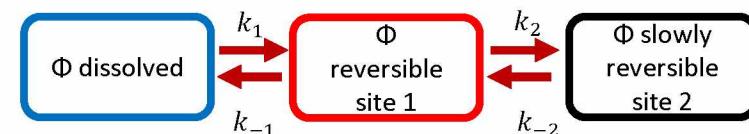
A review on cesium desorption at the freshwater-seawater interface

Experimental desorption in laboratory to test the influence of salinity and ageing effects



- Desorption initiates at 0,2-4 g/L salt
- Ageing effect influences desorption
- Two kinetics model simulates well the process

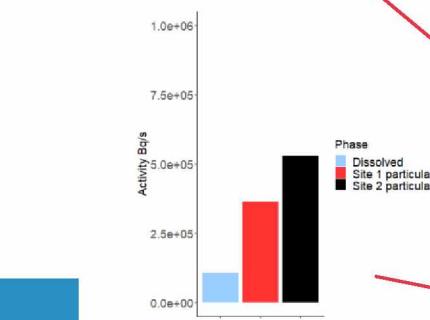
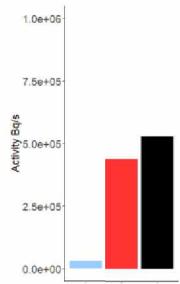
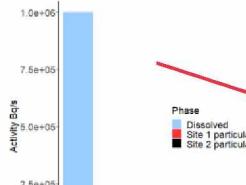

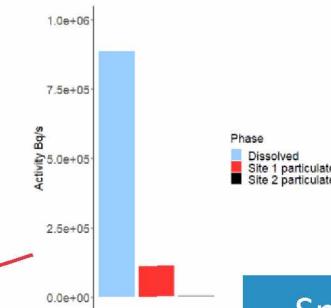
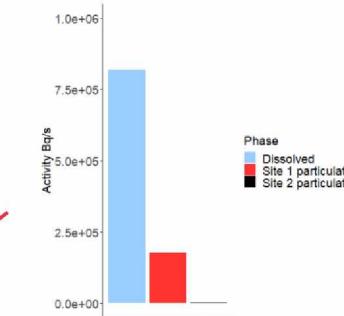

| Fuzzy clustering classification applied to liquid discharges of the Rhone, wind direction and intensity (Mesurho buoy)

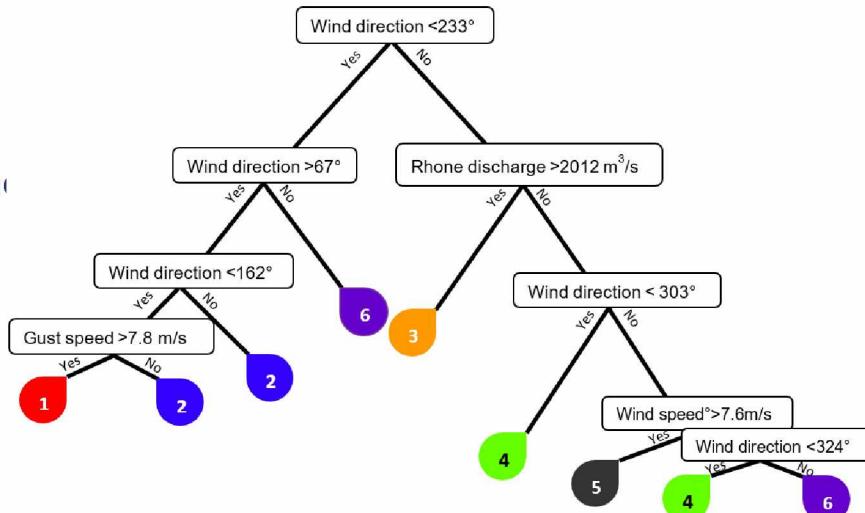
| 10 years of surveys at time step of  $\frac{1}{2}$  h : 120,000 observations

| 6 main scenario of hydrodynamic conditions evidenced. They can be anticipated using a classification tree and online data from river and meteorological surveys



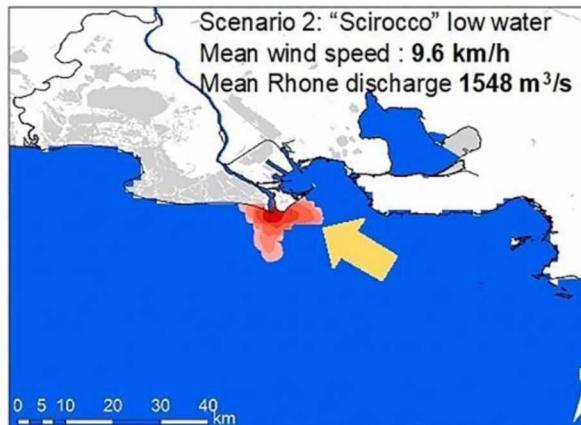
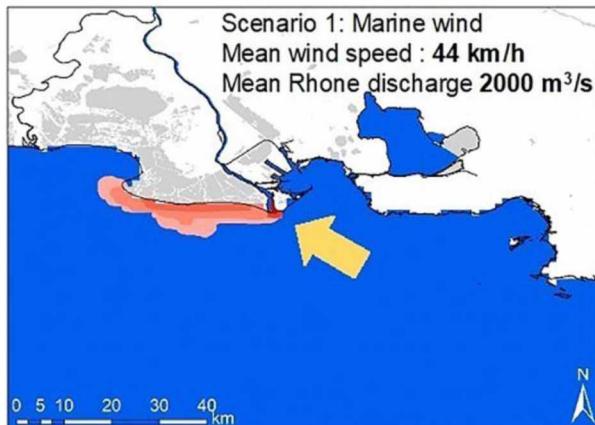

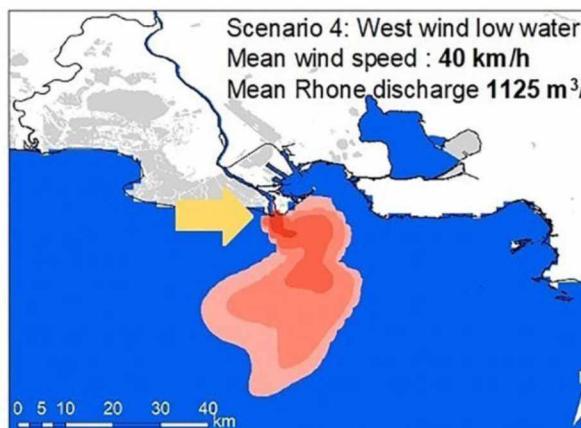
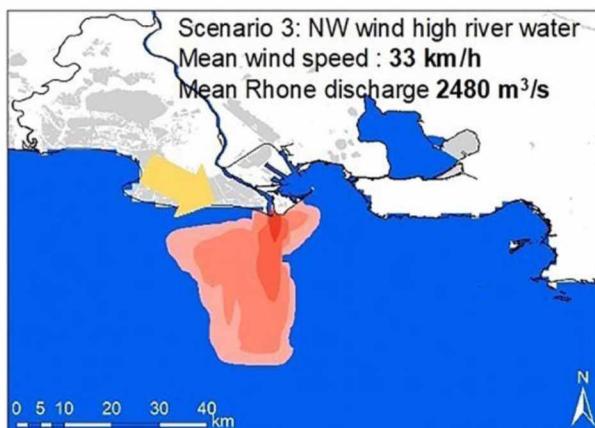


# Scenarios of dispersion of a $^{137}\text{Cs}$ release at the Rhone estuary (1TBq, 48h)

10 000 - 100 000



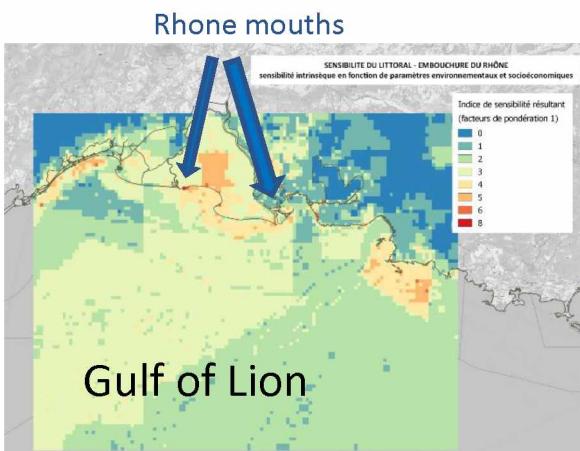
The impacted areas depends on hydrodynamic scenarios and coastal areas can be directly affected



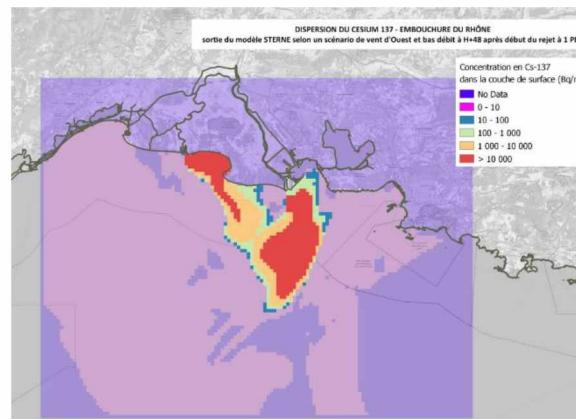
# How to evaluate the coastal vulnerability for a radionuclide release ?



Socio-economic, sedimentological and ecological parameters compiled onto GIS database with weighting factors



Simulation of  $^{137}\text{Cs}$  dissolved activities after an accidental release weighted by seawater-fish transfer factor



1PBq  $^{137}\text{Cs}$ , h+48, western wind, low flow

Combination of both maps to determine a final risk index
