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# Upper bounds on residues of Dedekind zeta functions of non-normal totally real cubic fields

1. Introduction. Various bounds on the absolute values of $L$-functions of number fields at $s=1$ and on residues at $s=1$ of Dedekind zeta functions of a number field $\mathbb{L}$ are known. Also, better bounds depending on the splitting behavior of given prime ideals of $\mathbb{L}$ of small norms are known. These bounds involve a term $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}$ in the series expansion at $s=1$ of the Dedekind zeta function of $\mathbb{L}$. We explain why one should expect to have bounds on $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}$ which also depend on the splitting behavior in $\mathbb{L}$ of given prime integers. We explicitly do that for $\mathbb{L}$ a real quadratic number field. We deduce very good upper bounds on the residue at $s=1$ of the Dedekind zeta function of a non-normal totally real cubic number field $\mathbb{K}$, bounds depending on the splitting behavior of the prime $p=2$ in $\mathbb{K}$. We have almost reached in Theorem 1.7 an explicit bound

\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right) & \leq \frac{Q_{2}}{8}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+c_{2}\right)\left(\log \left(d_{\mathbb{K}}^{2} / d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)+c_{2}^{\prime}\right)  \tag{1}\\
& \leq \frac{Q_{2}}{8}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{K}}+\left(c_{2}+c_{2}^{\prime}\right) / 2\right)^{2}
\end{align*}
$$

for the residue at $s=1$ of the Dedekind zeta function of a non-normal totally real cubic number field $\mathbb{K}$ of discriminant of absolute value $d_{\mathbb{K}}$, where $d_{\mathbb{L}}$ is the absolute value of the discriminant of the real quadratic subfield $\mathbb{L}=\mathbb{Q}\left(\sqrt{d_{\mathbb{K}}}\right)$ of the normal closure of $\mathbb{K}$. Here, $Q_{2} \in\{1,1 / 2,1 / 3,1 / 4,1 / 7\}$ defined in (15) depends on the splitting behavior of the prime $p=2$ in $\mathbb{K}$ and $c_{2}$ and $c_{2}^{\prime}$ would also depend explicitly on the splitting behavior of the prime $p=2$ in $\mathbb{K}$. Unfortunately, the sizes of the error terms in Theorem 1.1

[^0]and Proposition 2.1 prevent us from getting such a simple bound and we only get the bound
$$
\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right) \leq \frac{Q_{2}+o(1)}{8}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\left(\log \left(d_{\mathbb{K}}^{2} / d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\right) \leq \frac{Q_{2}+o(1)}{8}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{K}}\right)^{2}
$$
as $d_{\mathbb{L}}$ tends to infinity and $d_{\mathbb{K}} / d_{\mathbb{L}} \geq \log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{K}}$. We hope somebody could deal nicely with these error terms or could find a completely different approach to get an explicit bound as close as possible to (1). Combined with the results obtained in Lou15, this would have great consequences on the solution of the class number one problem for the non-normal sextic CM-fields (see [Lou08, Remark 10]).
1.1. Notation. Let us set the notation we will be using throughout the paper.

Let $\mathbb{K}$ be a number field, of degree $m=r_{1}+2 r_{2}$, absolute discriminant $d_{\mathbb{K}}$ and Dedekind zeta function $\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)$. Set

$$
Z_{\mathbb{K}}(s)=\left(\frac{d_{\mathbb{K}}}{4^{r_{2}} \pi^{m}}\right)^{s / 2} \Gamma^{r_{1}}(s / 2) \Gamma^{r_{2}}(s) \zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)
$$

In particular, $Z_{\mathbb{Q}}(s)=\pi^{-s / 2} \Gamma(s / 2) \zeta(s)$. Then $Z_{\mathbb{K}}(s)$ is a meromorphic function satisfying the functional equation $Z_{\mathbb{K}}(1-s)=Z_{\mathbb{K}}(s)$, with only two poles, at $s=0$ and $s=1$, both simple. We define (see [Lou98b, (22)] for the positivity)

\begin{aligned}
& 0<\lambda_{\mathbb{K}}:=\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(Z_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right)=\frac{\sqrt{d_{\mathbb{K}}}}{(2 \pi)^{r_{2}}} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right) \\
& 0<\mu_{\mathbb{K}}:=\lim _{s \rightarrow 1}\left\{\frac{1}{\lambda_{\mathbb{K}}} Z_{\mathbb{K}}(s)-\frac{1}{s(s-1)}\right\} \\
& 0<\nu_{\mathbb{K}}:=\mu_{\mathbb{K}} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

In particular, $\lambda_{\mathbb{Q}}=1$ and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}=(2+\gamma-\log (4 \pi)) / 2=0.02309 \ldots \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

Whereas we have the positivity of $\lambda_{\mathbb{K}}, \mu_{\mathbb{K}}, \nu_{\mathbb{K}}$ and explicit bounds (see [Lou01, Theorem 1])

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right) \leq\left(\frac{e \log d_{\mathbb{K}}}{2(m-1)}\right)^{m-1} \quad \text { and } \quad \nu_{\mathbb{K}} \leq\left(\frac{e \log d_{\mathbb{K}}}{2 m}\right)^{m} \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

obtaining explicit bounds on $\mu_{\mathbb{K}}$ is not easy. In fact, recalling that the EulerKronecker constant $\gamma_{\mathbb{K}}$ of $\mathbb{K}$ is defined by

$$
\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)=\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right)\left(\frac{1}{s-1}+\gamma_{\mathbb{K}}+O(s-1)\right),
$$

we have

$$
\mu_{\mathbb{K}}=\gamma_{\mathbb{K}}+1+\frac{1}{2}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{K}}-m(\gamma+\log (4 \pi))+r_{2} \log 4\right)
$$

and only conditional upper bounds (under the assumption of the Generalized Riemann Hypothesis) for $\gamma_{\mathbb{K}}$ are known:

$$
\gamma_{\mathbb{K}} \ll \log \log d_{\mathbb{K}}
$$

where the implied constants are absolute (see [IM, Theorem 3 and Corollary 3.3.2]).
1.2. Bounds on $L(1, \chi)$. In Lou93 (see also Ram01, Edd and [PE]), we obtained the explicit bound

$$
\begin{equation*}
|L(1, \chi)| \leq \frac{1}{2} \log f_{\chi}+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}} \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

for the value at $s=1$ of the $L$-function associated with a primitive and even Dirichlet character $\chi$, of conductor $f_{\chi}>1$ (see also [GS] and [Pin] for better non-explicit bounds).

This was considerably generalized in Lou04, Theorem 1] and Ram04, Corollary 1], leading to better explicit bounds taking into account the behavior of $\chi$ at given prime integers (see also [Toy] for better non-explicit bounds). Our present approach based on Lemma 3.1 will give a simpler proof of these latter bounds (see the first item of Theorem 1.3).

In Lou00, Theorem 7], we generalized (4) to the case of $L$-functions associated with primitive characters on ray class groups of a given number field $\mathbb{L}$. Focussing on characters unramified at all the infinite places of $\mathbb{L}$, we obtained

$$
\begin{align*}
|L(1, \chi)| & \leq \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \times\left(\frac{1}{2} \log f_{\chi}+\mu_{\mathbb{L}}\right)+o(1)  \tag{5}\\
& =\frac{1}{2} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \log f_{\chi}+\nu_{\mathbb{L}}+o(1),
\end{align*}
$$

where $f_{\chi}=N\left(\mathcal{F}_{\chi}\right)$ is the norm of the finite part $\mathcal{F}_{\chi}$ of the conductor of $\chi$. It took us some time to generalize (5), i.e. to obtain better bounds taking into account the behavior of $\chi$ at given prime ideals of $\mathbb{L}$. In 2018, we eventually obtained a generalization of [Lou04, Theorem 1] and [Ram04, Corollary 1] (see Proposition 2.1 below for the size of the present error terms):

Theorem 1.1 (see [Lou18, Theorem 2]). Let $P$ be a given finite set of prime ideals of a given number field $\mathbb{L}$ of degree $m$. Let $N(\mathcal{P})=N_{\mathbb{L} / \mathbb{Q}}(\mathcal{P})$ be the norm of $\mathcal{P} \in P$. Let $\chi$ range over the non-trivial and primitive characters on ray class groups for $\mathbb{L}$ which are unramified at all the infinite real places of $\mathbb{L}$. Set $P_{1}(\chi)=\left\{\mathcal{P} \in P ; \mathcal{P} \nmid \mathcal{F}_{\chi}\right\}$. Then

$$
\begin{aligned}
|L(1, \chi)| \leq & B_{P}(\chi) \times \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \times\left(\frac{1}{2} \log f_{\chi}+\mu_{\mathbb{L}}+S_{P}(\chi)\right) \\
& +O\left(\frac{\left(\log \left(e d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\right)^{m-1}\left(\log \left(e d_{\mathbb{L}} f_{\chi}\right)\right)}{\sqrt{f_{\chi}}}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

where the implied constant depends only on $m$ and the norms of the prime ideals in $P$ and where

$$
0 \leq B_{P}(\chi)=\prod_{\mathcal{P} \in P}\left|\frac{N(\mathcal{P})-1}{N(\mathcal{P})-\chi(\mathcal{P})}\right| \leq 1
$$

and

$$
0 \leq S_{P}(\chi)=\log 2^{\left|P_{1}(\chi)\right|}+\sum_{\mathcal{P} \in P} \frac{\log N(\mathcal{P})}{N(\mathcal{P})-1}
$$

Hence, by (3), whenever $f_{\chi} \geq\left(\log \left(e d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\right)^{2}$ we have

$$
\begin{equation*}
|L(1, \chi)| \leq B_{P}(\chi) \times\left(\frac{1}{2} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \log f_{\chi}+\nu_{\mathbb{L}}\right)+O\left(\log ^{m-1}\left(e d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\right) \tag{6}
\end{equation*}
$$

1.3. Main results: bounds on $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}$ for real quadratic number fields and on $\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right)$ for non-normal totally real cubic number fields. Let $\mathbb{K}$ be a non-normal totally real cubic number field. The best explicit known bound is

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right) \leq \frac{1}{8}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{K}}+\lambda_{3}\right)^{2}, \tag{7}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\lambda_{3}:=2+2 \gamma-2 \log (4 \pi)=-1.90761 \ldots$ (see Lou11], where it is said to hold true for $d_{\mathbb{K}} \geq 146$, but according to [Coh, Appendix B4] there are only two totally real cubic number fields of discriminant less than 146, both of them being abelian). In [Lou08, Theorem 8] we obtained a better bound depending on the behavior of the prime 2 in $\mathbb{K}$ :

\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right) \leq \frac{Q_{2}}{8}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{K}}+5\right)^{2} \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $Q_{2} \in\{1,1 / 2,1 / 3,1 / 4,1 / 7\}$ defined in 15 below depends explicitly on the splitting behavior of the prime $p=2$ in $\mathbb{K}$. In Theorem 1.7, we will obtain still better bounds. Let $\mathbb{N}$ be the normal closure of $\mathbb{K}$. Hence $\mathbb{N}$ is a totally real sextic field with Galois group isomorphic to the symmetric group of order 6 . Let $\mathbb{L}$ be the unique (real) quadratic subfield of $\mathbb{N}$. The cubic extension $\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}$ is cyclic. Let $\chi_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}$ denote any of the two complex conjugate cubic characters associated with $\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}$. Let $f_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}=N_{\mathbb{L} / \mathbb{Q}}\left(\mathcal{F}_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}\right)$ be the norm of the conductor $\mathcal{F}_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}$ of $\chi_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}$.

We have

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s) / \zeta(s)\right)^{2}=\zeta_{\mathbb{N}}(s) / \zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)=L\left(s, \chi_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}\right) L\left(s, \bar{\chi}_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}\right) \tag{9}
\end{equation*}
$$

which gives $d_{\mathbb{K}}^{2}=d_{\mathbb{N}} / d_{\mathbb{L}}=d_{\mathbb{L}}^{2} f_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}^{2}$, i.e.

$$
\begin{equation*}
f_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}=d_{\mathbb{K}} / d_{\mathbb{L}} \quad \text { and } \quad \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right)=\left|L\left(1, \chi_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}\right)\right| . \tag{10}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now, let $\mathbb{L}$ be a real quadratic number field, hence associated with a primitive even Dirichlet character $\chi_{\mathbb{L}}$ of conductor $d_{\mathbb{L}}$. By (4), we have

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right)=L\left(1, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right) \leq \frac{1}{2} \log d_{\mathbb{L}}+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}} \tag{11}
\end{equation*}
$$

While we have no explicit upper bounds on $\mu_{\mathbb{L}}$ in (5), we do have one on

$$
\begin{equation*}
\nu_{\mathbb{L}}:=\mu_{\mathbb{L}} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \leq \frac{1}{8} \log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{L}}, \tag{12}
\end{equation*}
$$

by Lou98a, Proposition 6] or Lou01, Theorem 2], a better bound than the one in (3) for $m=2$.

Remark 1.2. Let $\mathbb{L}$ be a real quadratic number field of discriminant $d_{\mathbb{L}}$. Then

$$
\begin{aligned}
\nu_{\mathbb{L}} & =L\left(1, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\left(\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+\frac{\Lambda^{\prime}\left(1, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right)}{\Lambda\left(1, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right)}\right) \\
& =L\left(1, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\left(\frac{1}{2} \log d_{\mathbb{L}}+1-\log (4 \pi)\right)+L^{\prime}\left(1, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right),
\end{aligned}
$$

by (25). Starting from this formula it would be difficult to end up with the factor $1 / 8$ in 12 , as by (11) it would be difficult to have anything better than a factor $1 / 4$.

Using (10), (5), 11), and (12) we obtain a bound on $\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right)$ which is better than the one in (7) if $d_{\mathbb{K}} \geq d_{\mathbb{L}}^{2}$ Lou18, p. 255]. In this paper we improve upon (12) by taking into account the behavior of small prime integers in $\mathbb{L}$ : see (14) and Corollary 1.5. Then, using (10), (5), (13) for $\chi=\chi_{\mathbb{L}}$, and (14) we obtain a bound on $\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right)$ which is better than the one in (8) if $d_{\mathbb{K}} \geq d_{\mathbb{L}} \log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{L}}$-see Theorem 1.7 .

In other words, the aim of this paper is to prove Theorem 1.3 below. Not only does our present approach based on Lemma 3.1 give a simpler proof of (13) than the ones in Lou04 and Ram04; it also enables us to get (13) and (14) in one stroke.

THEOREM 1.3. Let $d_{1}, d_{2} \geq 1$ be coprime square-free positive integers.
(i) Let $\chi$ range over the primitive and even Dirichlet characters of conductor $f_{\chi}>1$ for which $\operatorname{gcd}\left(d_{1}, f_{\chi}\right)=1$ and $d_{2} \mid f_{\chi}$. Setting $c_{1}\left(d_{1}, d_{2}\right)=\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+$ $\omega\left(d_{1}\right) \log 2+\sum_{p \mid d_{1} d_{2}} \frac{\log p}{p-1}$, we have an effective bound with a negative error term for $\omega\left(d_{2}\right) \leq 1$ and $f_{\chi}$ large enough:

$$
\begin{equation*}
|L(1, \chi)| \leq \frac{1}{2}\left\{\prod_{p \mid d_{1} d_{2}}\left|\frac{p-1}{p-\chi(p)}\right|\right\} \times\left\{\log f_{\chi}+2 c_{1}\left(d_{1}, d_{2}\right)\right\}+O\left(\frac{\log f_{\chi}}{\sqrt{f_{\chi}}}\right) . \tag{13}
\end{equation*}
$$

(ii) Let $\mathbb{L}$ range over the real quadratic fields for which $p \mid d_{1} \Rightarrow \chi_{\mathbb{L}}(p)=-1$ and $p \mid d_{2} \Rightarrow \chi_{\mathbb{L}}(p)=0$. For $c_{2}\left(d_{1}, d_{2}\right)=2 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-1+\sum_{p \mid d_{1}} \frac{2 p \log p}{p^{2}-1}+$ $\sum_{p \mid d_{2}} \frac{\log p}{p-1}$ and $c_{3}\left(d_{1}, d_{2}\right)$ some explicit constant depending only on $d_{1}$ and $d_{2}$ given in Section 3.1, we have an effective bound with a negative error term for $\omega\left(d_{2}\right) \leq 2$ and $d_{\mathbb{L}}$ large enough:

$$
\begin{align*}
\nu_{\mathbb{L}} \leq \frac{1}{8}\left\{\prod_{p \mid d_{1} d_{2}} \frac{p-1}{p-\chi_{\mathbb{L}}(p)}\right\} \times\left\{\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+2 c_{2}\left(d_{1}, d_{2}\right)\right)^{2}\right. & \left.+4 c_{3}\left(d_{1}, d_{2}\right)\right\}  \tag{14}\\
& +O\left(\frac{\log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{L}}}{\sqrt{d_{\mathbb{L}}}}\right)
\end{align*}
$$

From the effectiveness of these bounds we obtain
Corollary 1.4 (compare with (4)). For any real quadratic field $\mathbb{L}$ we have

$$
\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \leq \begin{cases}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+2+\gamma-\log (4 \pi)\right) / 2 & \text { in all cases, } \\ \left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+2+\gamma-\log \pi\right) / 4 & \text { if } 2 \text { is ramified in } \mathbb{L}, \\ \left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+2+\gamma-\log (\pi / 4)\right) / 6 & \text { if } 2 \text { is inert in } \mathbb{L} .\end{cases}
$$

Corollary 1.5 (compare with (12)). Set $\kappa=4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-2+(8 \log 2) / 3=$ $-0.05922 \ldots$ and $\kappa^{\prime}=4 \kappa_{2}=19.52508$ as defined in (39). For any real quadratic field $\mathbb{L}$ we have

$$
\nu_{\mathbb{L}} \leq \begin{cases}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)^{2} / 8 & \text { in all cases, } \\ \left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)^{2} / 16 & \text { if } 2 \text { is ramified in } \mathbb{L}, \\ \left(\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+\kappa\right)^{2}+\kappa^{\prime}\right) / 24 & \text { if } 2 \text { is inert in } \mathbb{L}, \\ \left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)^{2} / 24 & \text { if } 2 \text { is inert in } \mathbb{L} \text { and } d_{\mathbb{L}} \geq 5 \cdot 10^{71}\end{cases}
$$

Remark 1.6. Numerical computations of $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}$ based on Lou98b, Section 4.2 ] suggest that the fourth bound (which follows from the third one) holds true whenever 2 is inert in $\mathbb{L}$ and $d_{\mathbb{L}} \geq 5$. Indeed, with a $24 h 30 \mathrm{mn}$ long high precision computation on a 3 GHz PC using UBASIC, we checked that $\max \left\{24 \nu_{\mathbb{L}} / \log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{L}} ; d_{\mathbb{L}} \equiv 5(\bmod 8)\right.$ and $\left.d_{\mathbb{L}} \leq 10^{5}\right\}=0.9055 \ldots$ for $d_{\mathbb{L}}=$ 62269. Notice that $\chi_{\mathbb{L}}(p)=1$ for $p \in\{3,5,7,11,13,17,19,23,29\}$ and $d_{\mathbb{L}}=$ 62269.

Let $p \geq 2$ be a given prime. Take $P$ equal to the set of prime ideals of $\mathbb{L}$ dividing $p$. To simplify the presentation, we assume that $d_{\mathbb{L}}$ goes to infinity and that $f_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}=d_{\mathbb{K}} / d_{\mathbb{L}} \gg \log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{L}}$, to be allowed to use (6). By $\sqrt{10}, \sqrt{6}$ and Theorem 1.3, we have
$\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right) \leq B_{P}\left(\chi_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}\right) \times\left\{\frac{1}{2} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \log \left(d_{\mathbb{K}} / d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)+\nu_{\mathbb{L}}\right\}+O\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)$ with

$$
\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \leq B_{\{p\}}\left(\chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right) \times \frac{1+o(1)}{2} \log d_{\mathbb{L}}
$$

and

$$
\nu_{\mathbb{L}} \leq B_{\{p\}}\left(\chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right) \times \frac{1+o(1)}{8} \log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{L}} .
$$

Hence,

\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{K}}(s)\right) \leq \frac{Q_{p}+o(1)}{8}\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\left(\log \left(d_{\mathbb{K}}^{2} / d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\right)+O\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}\right),
$$

where

Q_{p}:=B_{\{p\}}\left(\chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right) \times B_{\{\mathcal{P} ; \mathcal{P} \mid(p) \text { in } \mathbb{L}\}}\left(\chi_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}\right)
$$

From (9) and the uniqueness of the Euler product of Dirichlet series, we have

& =\prod_{\mathcal{P} \mid(p) \mathrm{in} \mathbb{L}}\left(1-\frac{\chi_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}(\mathcal{P})}{N_{\mathbb{L} / \mathbb{Q}}(\mathcal{P})}\right)^{-1}\left(1-\frac{\bar{\chi}_{\mathbb{N} / \mathbb{L}}(\mathcal{P})}{N_{\mathbb{L} / \mathbb{Q}}(\mathcal{P})}\right)^{-1}
\end{aligned}
$$

Hence,

Q_{p} & =\frac{\left(1-\frac{1}{p}\right)^{3}}{\prod_{\mathfrak{P} \mid(p) \text { in } \mathbb{K}}\left(1-\frac{1}{N_{\mathbb{K} / \mathbb{Q}}(\mathfrak{P})}\right)}  \tag{15}\\
& = \begin{cases}1 & \text { if }(p)=\mathfrak{P}_{1} \mathfrak{P}_{2} \mathfrak{P}_{3} \text { splits in } \mathbb{K}, \\
\frac{p-1}{p} & \text { if }(p)=\mathfrak{P}_{1} \mathfrak{P}_{2}^{2} \text { is partially ramified in } \mathbb{K}, \\
\frac{p-1}{p+1} & \text { if }(p)=\mathfrak{P}_{1} \mathfrak{P}_{2} \text { in } \mathbb{K}, \\
\frac{(p-1)^{2}}{p^{2}} & \text { if }(p)=\mathfrak{P}^{3} \text { is totally ramified in } \mathbb{K}, \\
\frac{(p-1)^{2}}{p^{2}+p+1} & \text { if }(p)=\mathfrak{P} \text { is inert in } \mathbb{K} .\end{cases}
\end{align*}
$$

Putting everything together and using $X Y \leq((X+Y) / 2)^{2}$ for $X, Y \geq 0$, we obtain

THEOREM 1.7 (compare with (7) and Lou08, Theorem 8]). Let $p \geq 2$ be a given prime integer. Let $\mathbb{L}$ be the real quadratic subfield of the normal closure $\mathbb{N}$ of a non-normal totally real cubic number field $\mathbb{K}$. Let $Q_{p}$ be as in 15). Then

where the effective error terms tend to 0 as $d_{\mathbb{L}} \rightarrow \infty$, and $d_{\mathbb{K}} / d_{\mathbb{L}} \geq \log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{L}}$.

## 2. Proof of the size of the error term in Theorem 1.1

Proposition 2.1 (see Lou18, Proposition 9]). Let $\mathbb{L}$ be a totally real number field of degree $m$. Let $P_{1}$ and $P_{2}$ be two disjoint finite sets of prime ideals of $\mathbb{L}$. For $a>0$ and $X>0$, set

\end{aligned}
$$

and

F_{\mathbb{L}}(s, X)=\Pi_{\mathbb{L}}(s) X^{s-1} Z_{\mathbb{L}}(s) / \sqrt{d_{\mathbb{L}}}
$$

a meromorphic functions with at most two poles, a double one at $s=1$ and an at most double one at $s=0$. Define

(which does not depend on $\alpha>1$ ), where

& =\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha} \frac{\Pi_{\mathbb{L}}(1-s) Z_{\mathbb{L}}(s)}{X^{s} \sqrt{d_{\mathbb{L}}}} \mathrm{d} s=O\left(\frac{\log ^{m}\left(e d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)}{X}\right) .
\end{align*}

Let $\chi$ be a non-trivial, primitive and character on a ray class group for $\mathbb{L}$, unramified at all the infinite places of $\mathbb{K}$. Assume that $\mathcal{P} \in P_{1}$ implies $\mathcal{P} \nmid \mathcal{F}_{\chi}$ and $\mathcal{P} \in P_{2}$ implies $\mathcal{P} \mid \mathcal{F}_{\chi}$. Then

\end{align*}
$$

The implied constants in (17)-(18) depend only on $a, m$ and the norms of the prime ideals in $P$.

Proof. Only the sizes of the error terms in (17) and 18) require proof. For $1<\sigma=\Re(s)=1+\epsilon \leq 4$ we have $\left|\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right| \leq \zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(\sigma) \leq \zeta(\sigma)^{m}$,

\end{aligned}
$$

and $\left|Z_{\mathbb{L}}(s) /\left(X^{s} \sqrt{d_{\mathbb{L}}}\right)\right| \leq \epsilon^{-m} d_{\mathbb{L}}^{\epsilon / 2}|\Gamma(\sigma / 2)|^{m}(4 / \sqrt{\pi})^{m} / X$. By Lou00, Lemma 10], taking $\epsilon=2 m / \log \left(e d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)$ we have $\epsilon \leq 3$ and 17) follows.

The last assertion follows from (16), 17) and the formula (see Lou18, Lemma 10])

& \quad \times \begin{cases}\log X-\mu_{\mathbb{L}}+1+\log a-a & \text { if } P_{2}=\emptyset \text { and } P_{1}=\emptyset, \\
\log X-\mu_{\mathbb{L}}+1+\log a+\sum_{\mathcal{P} \in P} \frac{\log N(\mathcal{P})}{N(\mathcal{P})-1} & \text { if } P_{2}=\emptyset \text { and } P_{1} \neq \emptyset, \\
\log N\left(\mathcal{P}_{0}\right) & \text { if } P_{2}=\left\{\mathcal{P}_{0}\right\}, \\
0 & \text { otherwise. }\end{cases}
\end{aligned}
$$

which yields $\operatorname{Res}_{s=0}\left(F_{\mathbb{L}}(s, X)\right) \ll\left(\log ^{m-1}\left(e d_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\right)\left(\log \left(e d_{\mathbb{L}} X\right)\right) / X$, by (3). Theorem 1.1 follows from the last assertion and the fact that

is minimal for $a=1 / 2^{\left|P_{1}\right|}$.
3. Proof of Theorem 1.3. In this section we use Lemma 3.1 below to prove Theorem 1.3.

Notice that the present proof of (13) drastically shortens the one of Lou04, Theorem 1] and that the use of Lemma 3.1 would also drastically shorten the proof of [Lou18, Theorem 2].

First, in (24) and (25) we give integral representations on the vertical line $\Re(s)=\alpha>1$ of $\bar{L}(1, \chi)$ and $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}$, respectively. Second, in Lemma 3.2 we prove the positivity of some inverse Mellin transforms appearing in these integral representations. Third, in (29) we deduce bounds for $|L(1, \chi)|$ and $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}$ as inverse Mellin transforms of some $G_{1}(s)=\Pi_{1}(s) Z_{\mathbb{Q}}(s)$ and $G_{2}(s)=$ $\Pi_{2}(s) Z_{\mathbb{Q}}(s)$ for some explicit factors $\Pi_{1}(s)$ and $\Pi_{2}(s)$ depending on both $d_{1}$ and $d_{2}$. Fourth, in (32) we reduce the proof of Theorem 1.3 to the computation of $\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(G_{1}(s)\right)$ and $\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(G_{2}(s)\right)$. Finally, in (33) and (34) we compute these residues.

By Stirling's formula, in any given vertical strip we have

for some $M=M\left(\alpha_{1}, \alpha_{2}\right)$ (e.g. see Dav, Chapter 12] and Lou01, Sec-
tion 4.1]). Recall also the functional equation

for some complex root number $W_{\chi}$ of absolute value equal to one (see e.g. [Dav, Chapter 9]). The bounds (19) and (20) show that all the integrals on vertical lines of the complex plane below are absolutely convergent and that we are allowed to move these lines to the left, provided that we take into account the residues at the poles encountered.

Lemma 3.1. Let $d_{1} \geq 1$ be a square-free integer. Set

(the L-function associated with the character modulo $d_{1} f$ induced by $\chi$ ) and

\Lambda\left(s, \chi, d_{1}\right)=(\pi / f)^{-s / 2} \Gamma(s / 2) L\left(s, \chi, d_{1}\right)=P\left(s, \chi, d_{1}\right) \Lambda(s, \chi)
$$

For $a>0$ and $\alpha>1$, we have

& \Lambda\left(1, \chi, d_{1}\right)=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha}\left\{\frac{\Lambda\left(s, \chi, d_{1}\right) a^{1-s}}{s-1}+\frac{\Lambda\left(1-s, \chi, d_{1}\right) a^{s}}{s}\right\} \mathrm{d} s  \tag{22}\\
& \Lambda^{\prime}\left(1, \chi, d_{1}\right)=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha}\left\{\frac{\Lambda\left(s, \chi, d_{1}\right)}{(s-1)^{2}}-\frac{\Lambda\left(1-s, \chi, d_{1}\right)}{s^{2}}\right\} \mathrm{d} s \tag{23}
\end{align*}
$$

where these integrals are absolutely convergent and do not depend on $\alpha$, by (20). Moreover,

where $\chi_{\mathbb{L}}$ is the real primitive quadratic Dirichlet character of conductor $d_{\mathbb{L}}$ associated with $\mathbb{L}$.

Proof. Set

The bound (20) allows us to move the vertical line of integration $\Re(s)=\alpha>1$ to the left to $\Re(s)=1-\alpha<0$. Noticing that we pick up residues at $s=1$ and $s=0$, both simple and of residue $\Lambda\left(1, d_{1}, \chi\right)$, we obtain

by making the change of variables $s \mapsto 1-s$ to come back to the line $\Re(s)=\alpha$ and then using $G(1-s)=-G(s)$. Identity 22$)$ follows. In the same way, we have

which for $a=1$ gives (23).
Now, let $\mathbb{L}$ be a real quadratic number field. Then $W_{\mathbb{L}}=1, \Lambda\left(1-s, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right)$ $=\Lambda\left(s, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right)$,

& \quad=\frac{\lambda_{\mathbb{L}}}{\lambda_{\mathbb{Q}}} P\left(1, \chi, d_{1}\right)\left\{1+\left(\mu_{\mathbb{L}}-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+\frac{P^{\prime}\left(1, \chi, d_{1}\right)}{P\left(1, \chi, d_{1}\right)}\right)(s-1)+O\left((s-1)^{2}\right)\right\} .

Then $\sqrt{25}$ follows by using $\lambda_{\mathbb{Q}}=1$ and $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}=\lambda_{\mathbb{L}} \mu_{\mathbb{L}} / \sqrt{d_{\mathbb{L}}}$, for any totally real number field $\mathbb{L}$.

Lemma 3.2. For $X>0$, $c$ real, $m \geq 1$ an integer and $k \in\{1,2\}$, set

(move the line of integration $\Re(s)=\alpha$ of this absolutely convergent integral to the right to infinity for $0<u<1$ and to the left to infinity for $u>1$, in which case you pick up a residue at the pole $s=c$ ). Therefore, by Fubini's theorem, we have

& =\frac{1}{2} \int_{\substack{t_{1}, \ldots, t_{m}>0 \\
t_{1} \cdots t_{m}>1}} \cdots e^{-X^{2 / m}\left(t_{1}+\cdots+t_{m}\right)}\left(t_{1} \cdots t_{m}\right)^{c / 2} \log \left(t_{1} \cdots t_{m}\right) \frac{\mathrm{d} t_{1} \cdots \mathrm{~d} t_{m}}{t_{1} \cdots t_{m}} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Finally, fix $X>0$ and $\alpha>0$. Let $c$ range in $(-\infty, \alpha)$. Clearly,

c \mapsto I_{m}(X, c):=\int_{\substack{t_{1}, \ldots, t_{m}>0 \\ t_{1} \cdots t_{m}>1}} \cdots e^{-X^{2 / m}\left(t_{1}+\cdots+t_{m}\right)}\left(t_{1} \cdots t_{m}\right)^{c / 2} \frac{\mathrm{~d} t_{1} \cdots \mathrm{~d} t_{m}}{t_{1} \cdots t_{m}}
$$

is differentiable on $(-\infty, \alpha)$, with derivative $c \mapsto J_{m}(X, c)=F_{2}(X, c, m)$. Using Stirling's formula (19), it is clear that $c \mapsto F_{1}(X, c, m)$ is differentiable on $(-\infty, \alpha)$, with derivative $c \mapsto F_{2}(X, c, m)$. Hence, $c \mapsto I_{m}(X, c)-F_{1}(X, c, m)$ is constant on $(-\infty, \alpha)$. Since $\lim _{c \rightarrow-\infty} I_{m}(X, c)=\lim _{c \rightarrow-\infty} F_{1}(X, c, m)=0$, by Lebesgue's dominated convergence theorem we obtain

## 4. Proof of Corollary 1.4

Remark 4.1. Take $c \in\{0,1\}, k \in\{1,2\}$ and $X>0$. Taking $\alpha=2$ in (27) and using $|\zeta(2+i t)| \leq \zeta(2)=\pi^{2} / 6$, we have

ThEOREM 4.3. Let $p \geq 2$ be a prime. Let $\chi$ be a primitive even Dirichlet character of conductor $f$ divisible by $p$. Assume that $f \geq\left(\frac{5 p}{12 \log p}\right)^{2}$, which is the case for $2 \leq p \leq 139$. Then

|L(1, \chi)| \leq\left|\frac{p-1}{p-\chi(p)}\right| \times\left(\frac{1}{2} \log f+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+\log 2+\frac{\log p}{p-1}\right) \tag{37}
\end{equation*}
$$

Proof. We apply (24), (29), (30), (31) and Lemma 3.6 with $a=1 / 2$, $d_{1}=p$ and $d_{2}=1$. We obtain

$$
\left|\left(1-\frac{\chi(p)}{p}\right) L(1, \chi)\right| \leq I(\sqrt{f})
$$

where $I(X)=\rho(X)+R(X)$ with

\rho(X) & =\left(1-\frac{1}{p}\right)\left\{\left(\log X+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+\log 2+\frac{\log p}{p-1}\right)-\frac{\log X+\frac{\log \pi-\gamma}{2}+\frac{\log p}{p-1}}{X}\right\} \\
R(X) & =\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha}\left\{\frac{2^{-s}}{s}\left(p^{s-1}-1\right)-\frac{2^{s-1}}{s-1}\left(1-\frac{2}{p}+\frac{1}{p^{s}}\right)\right\} X^{-s} Z_{\mathbb{Q}}(s) \mathrm{d} s \\
& =\frac{1}{p} Z_{1}(2 X / p, 0)-Z_{1}(2 X, 0)-\frac{p-2}{2 p} Z_{1}(X / 2,1)-\frac{1}{2} Z_{1}(p X / 2,1) \\
& \leq \frac{1}{p} Z_{1}(2 X / p, 0) \leq \frac{p}{24 X^{2}}
\end{aligned}
$$

by Remark 4.1. Hence,

\begin{aligned}
&-\left(1-\frac{1}{p}\right) \frac{\log \sqrt{f}+\frac{\log \pi-\gamma}{2}+\frac{\log p}{p-1}}{\sqrt{f}}+R(\sqrt{f}) \\
& \leq \frac{p-12 \sqrt{f}\left(1-\frac{1}{p}\right)\left(\log f+\log \pi-\gamma+\frac{2 \log p}{p-1}\right)}{24 f} \\
& \leq \frac{p-11 \sqrt{f}(\log f+\log \pi-\gamma)}{24 f} \quad \text { if } p \geq 13
\end{aligned}
$$

The first bound is negative for $f \geq 5$ and $2 \leq p \leq 61$. The second bound is negative for $\sqrt{f} \log \left(\pi e^{-\gamma} f\right) \geq p / 11$, hence for $f \geq\left(\frac{p}{6 \log p}\right)^{2}$ and $p \geq 67$.

## 5. Proof of Corollary 1.5

5.1. Proof of the first and second bounds in Corollary 1.5. First assume that $d_{1}=1$. Then $\Lambda\left(s, \chi, d_{1}\right)=\Lambda(s, \chi)$. Lemma 3.1 with $a=1$ and $d_{1}=1$ gives

\Lambda^{\prime}\left(1, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right) & =\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha} \Lambda\left(s, \chi_{\mathbb{L}}\right)\left\{\frac{1}{(s-1)^{2}}-\frac{1}{s^{2}}\right\} \mathrm{d} s
\end{aligned}
$$

By Lemma 3.2, for $X>0$ we have

\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha} X^{-s} \Gamma(s / 2)\left\{\frac{1}{s-1}+\frac{1}{s}\right\} \mathrm{d} s=F_{1}(X, 1,1)+F_{1}(X, 0,1)>0 \\
\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha} X^{-s} \Gamma(s / 2)\left\{\frac{1}{(s-1)^{2}}-\frac{1}{s^{2}}\right\} \mathrm{d} s=F_{2}(X, 1,1)-F_{2}(X, 0,1)>0 .
\end{array}
$$

Hence, by 25 , we have $\nu_{\mathbb{L}} \leq I\left(d_{2}, \sqrt{d_{\mathbb{L}}}\right)$, where

I\left(d_{2}, X\right) & :=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha} G\left(s, d_{2}, X\right) \mathrm{d} s \\
& =\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(G\left(s, d_{2}, X\right)\right)+\operatorname{Res}_{s=0}\left(G\left(s, d_{2}, X\right)\right)+R\left(d_{2}, X\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

with
$G\left(s, d_{2}, X\right):=\left\{\prod_{p \mid d_{2}}\left(1-\frac{1}{p^{s}}\right)\right\}\left\{\frac{1}{(s-1)^{2}}-\frac{1}{s^{2}}+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}\left(\frac{1}{s-1}+\frac{1}{s}\right)\right\} X^{s-1} Z_{\mathbb{Q}}(s)$,
$\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(G\left(s, d_{2}, X\right)\right)=\frac{P\left(d_{2}\right)}{2} \times\left\{\left(\log X+2 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-1+S_{1}\left(d_{2}\right)\right)^{2}-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}^{\prime \prime}-S_{2}\left(d_{2}\right)\right\}$,
$\operatorname{Res}_{s=0}\left(G\left(s, d_{2}, X\right)\right)=\frac{1}{2 X} \times \begin{cases}\left(\log X-2 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+1\right)^{2}-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}^{\prime \prime} & \text { if } d_{2}=1, \\ (\log p)\left(2 \log X-4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+2-\log p\right) & \text { if } d_{2}=p, \\ 2(\log p)(\log q) & \text { if } d_{2}=p q, \\ 0 & \text { otherwise },\end{cases}$
where $P(d), S_{1}(d)$ and $S_{2}(d)$ are as in Lemma 3.6 and where
$\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}^{\prime \prime}=1+\left(1-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}\right)^{2}-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}^{\prime}=1+\left(1-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}\right)^{2}-\pi^{2} / 8+\gamma^{2}+2 \gamma(1)=0.90818 \ldots$
and (by taking $\alpha=2$ )

\begin{aligned}
R\left(d_{2}, X\right) & :=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=1-\alpha} G\left(s, d_{2}, X\right) \mathrm{d} s \\
& =\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha} G\left(1-s, d_{2}, X\right) \mathrm{d} s=O\left(X^{-2}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Hence we get a neat asymptotic and effective bound which we will make explicit in Theorems 5.2 and 5.3 .

ThEOREM 5.1. Let $d_{2} \geq 1$ be a square-free integer. Let $\mathbb{L}$ range over the real quadratic fields of discriminants divisible by $d_{2}$. Then for $d_{\mathbb{L}}$ effectively large enough we have

\nu_{\mathbb{L}} \leq \frac{1}{8}\left\{\prod_{p \mid d_{2}}\left(1-\frac{1}{p}\right)\right\} \times\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-2+2 \sum_{p \mid d_{2}} \frac{\log p}{p-1}\right)^{2}
$$

In particular, for $d_{1}=d_{2}=1$, we have $G(1-s, 1, X)=-G(s, 1,1 / X) / X$ and $R(1, X) \leq 0$, as in the proof of Theorem 4.2. Hence, we obtain (compare with Theorem 4.2):

Theorem 5.2 (First bound of Corollary 1.5). Let $\mathbb{L}$ be a real quadratic number field of discriminant $d_{\mathbb{L}}$. Then

\nu_{\mathbb{L}}=\mu_{\mathbb{L}} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \leq \frac{1}{8} \log ^{2} d_{\mathbb{L}}

and $\nu_{\mathbb{L}} \leq\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-2\right)^{2} / 8$ for $d_{\mathbb{L}}>145$.
Take $d_{2}=p$ a prime integer. Then

I(p, X) \leq & \frac{1}{2}\left(1-\frac{1}{p}\right) \times\left\{\left(\log X+2 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-1+\frac{\log p}{p-1}\right)^{2}-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}^{\prime \prime}-\frac{p \log ^{2} p}{(p-1)^{2}}\right\} \\
& +\frac{\log p}{2 X}\left(2 \log X-4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+2-\log p\right)+R(p, X)
\end{aligned}
$$

where

$$
\begin{aligned}
& R(p, X) \\
&=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha}\left(p^{s-1}-1\right)\left\{\frac{1}{(s-1)^{2}}-\frac{1}{s^{2}}+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}\left(\frac{1}{s-1}+\frac{1}{s}\right)\right\} X^{-s} Z_{\mathbb{Q}}(s) \mathrm{d} s \\
& \leq \frac{Z_{2}(X / p, 1)+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}\left(Z_{1}(X / p, 1)+Z_{1}(X / p, 0)\right)}{p} \\
& \leq \frac{p\left(M_{2}(1)+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}\left(M_{1}(1)+M_{1}(0)\right)\right)}{12 X^{2}} \leq \frac{p}{5 X^{2}}
\end{aligned}
$$

by Remark 4.1. Hence, we get

Theorem 5.3 (second bound of Corollary 1.5). Let $p \geq 2$ be a prime integer. Let $\mathbb{L}$ be a real quadratic number field of discriminant $d_{\mathbb{L}}$. Assume that $p$ divides $d_{\mathbb{L}}$. Assume that $d_{\mathbb{L}} \geq 4 p$, which is the case for $p=2$, or that $p \geq 337$. Then

\nu_{\mathbb{L}}=\mu_{\mathbb{L}} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \leq \frac{1}{8}\left(1-\frac{1}{p}\right) \times\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-2+\frac{2 \log p}{p-1}\right)^{2}
$$

For $p=2$ we have $4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-2+\frac{2 \log p}{p-1}=2(1+\gamma-\log (2 \pi))=-0.52132 \ldots$
Proof. Recall that we take $X=\sqrt{f} \geq \sqrt{p}$, since $p$ divides $f>1$. Consider the function

\end{aligned}

Then

f^{\prime}(X)=-\frac{\log p}{2 X^{2}}\left(2 \log X-4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-\log p\right)-\frac{2 p}{5 X^{3}}
$$

is negative for $X \geq \sqrt{p}$. Finally, $f(\sqrt{p}) \leq 0$ for $p \geq 337$ and $f(\sqrt{4 p}) \leq 0$ for $p \geq 2$.

### 5.2. Proof of the third and fourth bounds in Corollary 1.5

THEOREM 5.4. Let $p \geq 2$ be a prime integer. Let $\kappa_{p} \leq 5.14084$ be as in (39) below. Let $\mathbb{L}$ be a real quadratic number field of discriminant $d_{\mathbb{L}} \geq$ $\left(4 \frac{\frac{p+21}{21}}{\log ^{2} \frac{p+21}{21}}\right)^{2}$. Assume that $\chi_{\mathbb{L}}(p)=-1$. Then
$\nu_{\mathbb{L}}=\mu_{\mathbb{L}} \operatorname{Res}_{s=1}\left(\zeta_{\mathbb{L}}(s)\right) \leq \frac{1}{8} \times \frac{p-1}{p+1} \times\left\{\left(\log d_{\mathbb{L}}+4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-2+\frac{4 p \log p}{p^{2}-1}\right)^{2}+4 \kappa_{p}\right\}$. If $p=2$, this bound holds true for $d_{\mathbb{L}} \geq 5$. Since $4 \kappa_{2}=19.52507 \ldots$ and $4 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-2+\frac{4 p \log p}{p^{2}-1}=-0.059224 \ldots$, we get the third and fourth bounds in Corollary 1.5 .

Proof. As in Section 3.1, we apply (25), (29), (30), (31) and Lemma 3.6 with $d_{1}=p, a=1 / 2$ and $d_{2}=1$. We obtain $\left(1+\frac{1}{p}\right) \nu_{\mathbb{L}} \leq I\left(\sqrt{d_{\mathbb{L}}}\right)$, where

I(X)=\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}(G(s, p, X))+\operatorname{Res}_{s=0}(G(s, p, X))+R(p, X)

with

G(s, p, X) & :=\left\{\left(\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+\frac{\log p}{p+1}\right) \Pi_{1}(s, 1 / 2)+\Pi_{2}(s, 1)\right\} X^{s-1} Z_{\mathbb{Q}}(s) \\
\Pi_{k}(s, a) & :=\frac{a^{1-s}}{(s-1)^{k}}\left(1-\frac{1}{p^{s}}\right)+\frac{a^{s}}{s^{k}}\left(1-\frac{2}{p}+\frac{1}{p^{1-s}}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

and
(38) $\quad R(p, X)$

$$
:=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Re(s)=\alpha}\left\{\left(\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+\frac{\log p}{p+1}\right) \Pi_{1}(1-s, 1 / 2)+\Pi_{2}(1-s, 1)\right\} X^{-s} Z_{\mathbb{Q}}(s) \mathrm{d} s
$$

Now,
$\operatorname{Res}_{s=1}(G(s, p, X))=\frac{1}{2}\left(1-\frac{1}{p}\right) \times\left\{\left(\log X+2 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-1+\frac{2 p \log p}{p^{2}-1}\right)^{2}+\kappa_{p}\right\}$, where

\begin{align*}
\kappa_{p}:= & -\left(\frac{1}{p-1}+\frac{1}{(p-1)^{2}}+\frac{1}{(p+1)^{2}}\right) \log ^{2} p  \tag{39}\\
& +\frac{\log (16 \pi)-\gamma}{p+1} \log p+6-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}^{\prime \prime}+2 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}} \log 2
\end{align*}
$$

satisfies $\kappa_{p} \leq \kappa_{7}=5.14083 \ldots$ and $\kappa_{2}=4.88126 \ldots$ (Notice that $2 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}}-1+$ $2 p(\log p) /\left(p^{2}-1\right)=A+C=c_{2}(p, 1)$ and $\kappa_{p}=c_{3}(p, 1)$, with the notation of Section 3.1.) Moreover,

\kappa_{p}^{\prime}:= & \left(\frac{1}{p-1}-\frac{1}{(p-1)^{2}}-\frac{1}{(p+1)^{2}}\right) \log ^{2} p  \tag{40}\\
& -\frac{2+\gamma-\log \pi}{p+1} \log p+\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}^{\prime}-2 \mu_{\mathbb{Q}} \log 2-\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}^{2}
\end{align*}
$$

satisfies $\kappa_{p}^{\prime} \geq \kappa_{2}^{\prime}=0.62924 \ldots$. Noticing that

& \Pi_{1}(1-s, a)=\frac{2^{-s}}{s^{k}}\left(p^{s-1}-1\right)-\frac{2^{s-1}}{(s-1)^{k}}\left(1-\frac{2}{p}+\frac{1}{p^{s}}\right) \\
& \Pi_{2}(1-s, a)=\frac{1}{s^{2}}\left(1-p^{s-1}\right)+\frac{1}{(s-1)^{k}}\left(1-\frac{2}{p}+\frac{1}{p^{s}}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

and using (38) and Remarks 4.1, we have

& +\left(1-\frac{2}{p}\right) Z_{2}(X, 1)+Z_{2}(p X, 1) \\
\leq & \left(\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+\frac{\log 3}{4}\right) \frac{p M_{1}(0)}{48 X^{2}}+\frac{M_{2}(0)}{12 X^{2}}+\frac{(p-1)^{2} M_{2}(1)}{12 p^{2} X^{2}} \\
\leq & \frac{p}{84 X^{2}}+\frac{M_{2}(0)+M_{2}(1)}{12 X^{2}}
\end{aligned}
$$

and

$$
\begin{aligned}
\operatorname{Res}_{s=0}(H(s, p, X))+R(p, X) & \leq-\frac{\log ^{2} X}{4 X}+\frac{p+21}{84 X^{2}} \\
& =-\frac{1}{4 X^{2}}\left(X \log ^{2} X-\frac{p+21}{21}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

is negative for $X \geq 4 \frac{\frac{p+21}{21}}{\log ^{2} \frac{p+21}{21}}$. Indeed, if $u>1$ and $X \geq \frac{4 u}{\log ^{2} u}=\left(\frac{\sqrt{u}}{\log \sqrt{u}}\right)^{2}$ then $X>1$, as $v / \log v \geq e$ for $v>1$, and since $X \mapsto X \log ^{2} X$ increases with $X>1$, we have

X \log ^{2} X \geq \frac{4 u}{\log ^{2} u} \log ^{2}\left(\frac{4 u}{\log ^{2} u}\right)=u\left(1+4 \frac{\log \left(\frac{u^{1 / 4}}{2 \log u^{1 / 4}}\right)}{\log u}\right)^{2} \geq 1
$$

as $v /(2 \log v) \geq e / 2 \geq 1$ for $v>1$.
Finally, for $p=2$, we have

R(2, X) \leq\left(\mu_{\mathbb{Q}}+\frac{\log 2}{3}\right) \frac{M_{1}(0)}{24 X^{2}}+\frac{M_{2}(0)}{12 X^{2}}+\frac{M_{2}(1)}{48 X^{2}} \leq \frac{3}{20 X^{2}}
$$

and $\operatorname{Res}_{s=0}(H(s, 2, X))+R(2, X) \leq-\frac{1}{4 X^{2}}\left(X \log ^{2} X-\frac{3}{5}\right)$ is negative for $X=\sqrt{d_{\mathbb{L}}} \geq \sqrt{5}$.

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#### Abstract

(will appear on the journal's web site only) Various bounds on the absolute values of $L$-functions of number fields at $s=1$ and on residues at $s=1$ of Dedekind zeta functions of a number field $\mathbb{L}$ are known. Also, better bounds depending on the splitting behavior of given prime ideals of $\mathbb{L}$ of small norms are known. These bounds involve a term $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}$ in the series expansion at $s=1$ of the Dedekind zeta function of $\mathbb{L}$. We explain why one should expect to have bounds on $\nu_{\mathbb{L}}$ which also depend on the splitting behavior in $\mathbb{L}$ of given prime integers. We explicitly do that for $\mathbb{L}$ a real quadratic number field. We deduce very good upper bounds on the residue at $s=1$ of the Dedekind zeta function of a non-normal totally real cubic number field $\mathbb{K}$, bounds depending on the splitting behavior of the prime $p=2$ in $\mathbb{K}$.


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
