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Sequence of construction of Ciomadùl dacitic lava domes, East Carpaathians, by unspiked K-Ar Cassignol-Gillot technique in comparison with other radiometric methods

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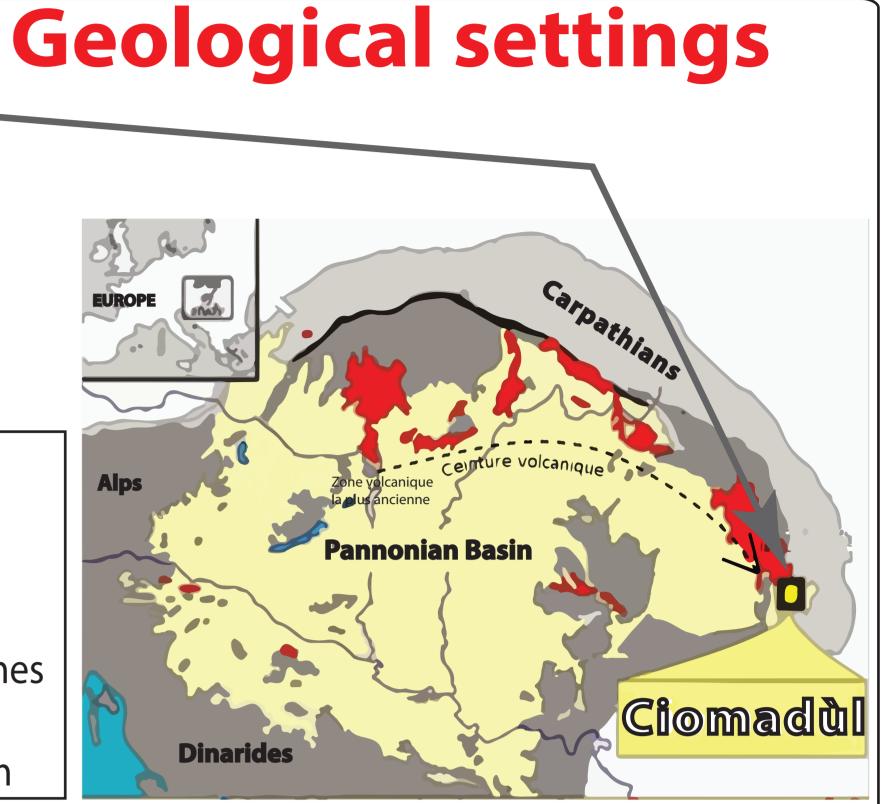
## **Abstract**

Located at the southern tip of the Intra-Carpathian Volcanic Range in Romania, the Ciomadul (Csomád) volcanic complex (CVC) is the youngest eruptive center of the Carpatho-Pannonian Region (CPR). It consists of a dozen of dacitic lava domes that encompass two youngest explosive craters. Whereas, in the last decade, the Ciomadul explosive history for the last 50 ka was well constrained by numerous studies, the chronology of the dome sequence still lacks robust chronological constraints, since it is based on biased K-Ar ages. Here, we provide a detailed K-Ar dating approach to refine the chronology of the domes, using the unspiked K-Ar Cassignol-Gillot techniques for the first time in Carpathian Range. New eruption ages were performed on groundmass, the only material the cooling of which is doubtlessly contemporaneous with the eruption. Each age obtained is found to be younger than those proposed on previous whole rock K-Ar datings. Our analysis shows that the K-Ar ages in the previous studies suffer from the unsuitability of the material used to obtain eruptive ages, since dating whole rock gives a mixed age due to various mineral fractions with different individual ages. A correlation between excess argon from these whole-rock measurements and the abundance of glomerocrysts is established. we also investigated the sequence of crystallisation of phenocrysts present in the lavas, with respect to the modification of the eruptive ages. We dated different phases containing potassium, i.e. feldspar, amphibole, biotite, plagioclase microlites, and groundmass. Ages obtained on feldspar, amphibole, biotite are systematically older than those obtained on the groundmass illustrating that these phenocrysts were formed before (or well before) the eruption, and brought up by the magma during the eruption. On the other hand, plagioclase microlites display a complex range of ages, from the age of groundmass to the age of plagioclase phenocrysts. The newly applied methodology, mainly consisting in a double full preparation first at larger grain size and next at < 100 micrometres, allows us to propose an appropriate procedure to separate the adequate material in order to obtain the K-Ar age of the eruption, i.e. the groundmass, in which there is no risk of presence of older, inherited phenocrysts.

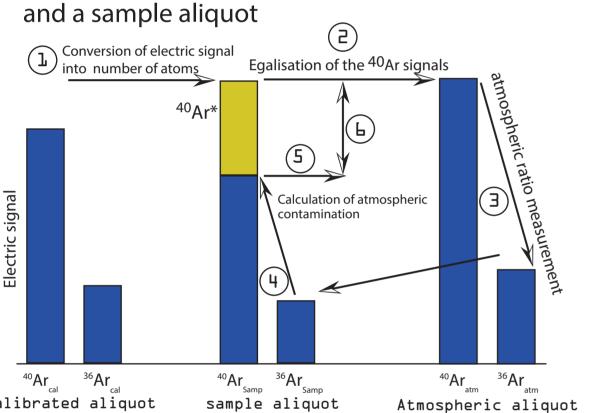


K-Ar dating Method with Cassignol-Gillot Technique

- 1) Potassium content ➤ Measured by flame absorption spectrometry
- ➤ Compared with extrapolated curve from different standard

### 2) Argon

Measured by mass spectrometry ➤ Based on the double comparison of 36 and 40 isotopes of an atmospheric

Groundmass age = last phase to crystallize during eruption

Atmospheric aliquot

Main issue is to separate by using heavy liquid in association with magnetic separator the groundmass from the important presence of inherited phenocrysts such as: biotite, amphibole, feldspars (plagioclase). **Density range** of groundmass in this study is between **2.40-2.51**; felspar (**2.55-2.65**); Biotite/amphibole (**2.8-3.17**).

**Observations** 

> Presence of mixed grains i.e grains composed with groundmass/plagioclase and/or groundmass biotite, amphibole ➤ Groundmass density is to close to density of plagioclase: this could **biaised** our results For example grain with 2.50 of density could be composed of 2/3 of a 2.45 dense groundmass and a 1/3 of 2.60 dense plagioclase.

To avoid such problems, we proceeded to a double full steps separation

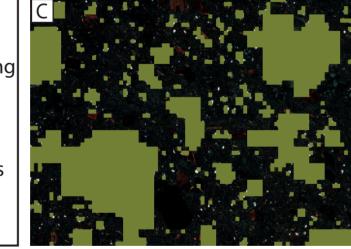
### **➤** Double full steps separation

Goals: separate from the groundmass any fraction of inherited mineral having an age not contemporaneous to the dome eruption. It also allows to minimize the potential risk to keep grain affected by fluid circulation.

### **Groundmass Preparation based on double full steps separation**

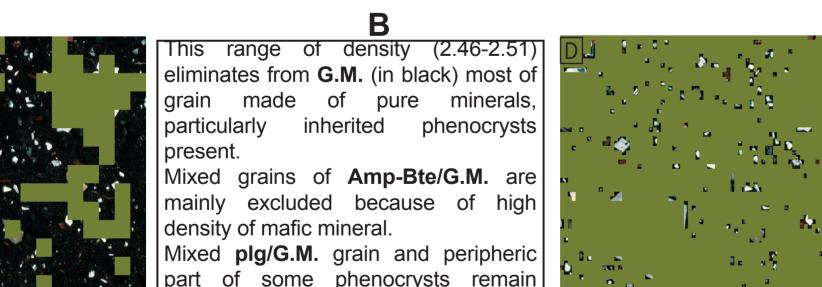


Whole rock: crushed and sieved at 250-500um **200 g** of this is cleaned and separated using heavy liquid in association with magnetic separator in order to isolate with typical narrow density range of density for the dacitic domes of **2.46-2.51** of groundmass but not only.



Remaining grain from step (B) was crushed and sieved again at: 63-125µm

Grains are then separated by heavy liquid a second time in order to separate the pure **G.M.** fraction (**C**), typically (2.46-2.50 of density) from the remaining plagioclasic



Plagioclasic grains not excluded from G.M. during the 1st step but removed during 2nd step

**G.M.**= groundmass **Amp**=Amphibole **Bte**= Biotite **Plg**= Plagioclase

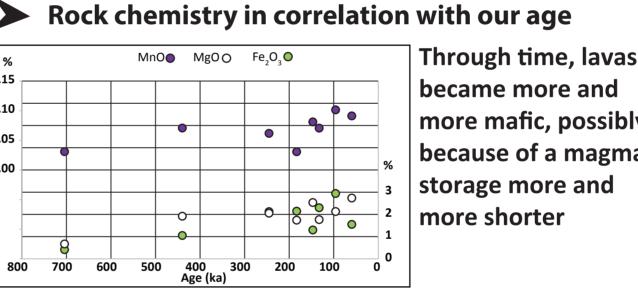
After purification of G.M. (+ magnetic separation), samples are hand-picked to check its 100 percent purity.

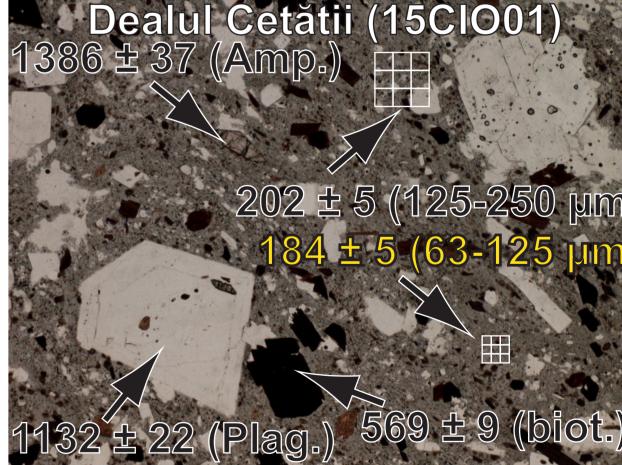

# Discussion

Age previously obtained on traditional K/Ar whole rock on the same lava dome (Dealul Cetății): 400±160 ka

**Known parameters** 'Pure' groundmass Age (a<sub>i</sub>): **184±5ka** Proportion (P<sub>i</sub>): **60%**; K% (K<sub>i</sub>): **3.72 Pure Plagiolase** Age: 1132±22 Ma Proportion: **11%**; K% (K<sub>i</sub>): **0.82%** Mixed grains Proportion (P<sub>i</sub>): **29**%

Whole-rock age simulation from Image analysis of thin section In order to test the whole rock incidence and show ,that, ages obtained on whole rock are biased. An image simulation of grain composition have been done from the thin section of 15ClO01 sample coming from **Dealul Cetatii** (**A**) in different steps:

Thin section image (A) is binarized on gray scale range (B1) and pixelated (B2) to simulate a 200 µm size grains

► Determination of each grain composition from their color (C): Blue (pure G.M. grain), Yellow (pure plagioclase grain), Range of red (Mixed grain)

➤ Estimation of age of whole rock and for each grains (D):  $\mathbf{Age} = \sum_{\mathbf{a_i}^* \mathbf{p_i}^* \mathbf{K_i}} / \sum_{\mathbf{p_i}^* \mathbf{K_i}} \mathbf{K_i}$  Where a parameter and K are the age, the proportion and

K content of each phase present in each grain i obtained age: **320 ka** → 74% elder than groundmass age

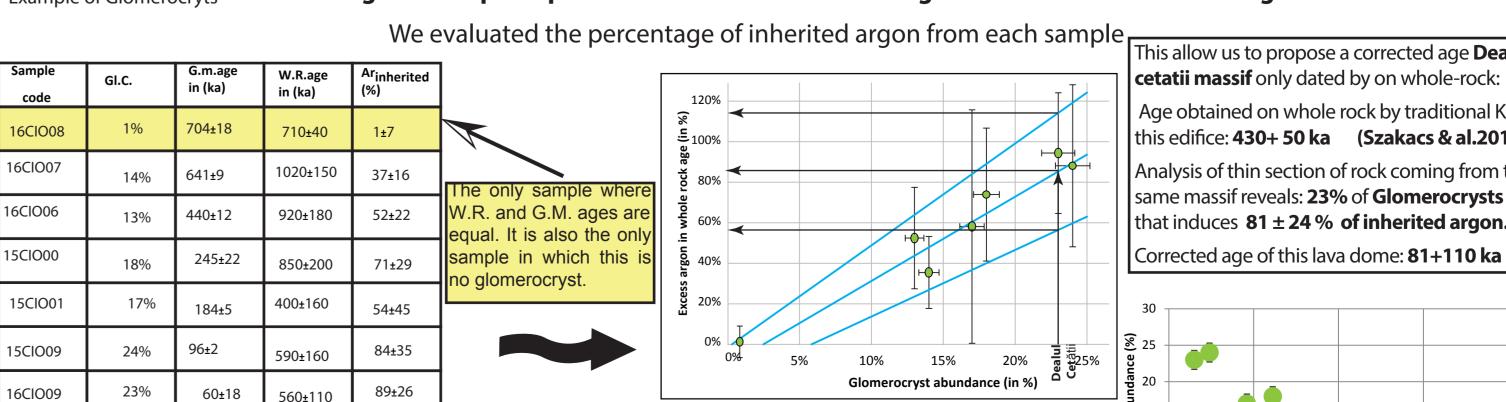
➤ Generally, fractionation occurs during rock crushing with a larger proportion of groundmass than phenocrysts being crushed at lower size than 200 µm. For instance if a third of G.M. is removed during crushing and no Plg is lose, the resulting proportion between G.M. and Plg would induce an age of **405 ka** 

### Quantification of the abundance of glomerocrysts on whole-rock age

Glomerocrysts are aggregates of phenocrysts (> 1 mm and up to 5 mm in size,), with cumulate texture containing mainly plagioclases and amphibole and secondarily Fe-Ti oxides, apatite, biotite and zircon.



Evaluation of percentage of glomerocrysts in each rock (thin section) dated on both whole-rock (previous studies) and pure separated groundmass (this work) Assuming that the principal reason of difference of our age with traditional K/Ar dating is due to inherited argon.

The work based on whole rock need to be proscribed in Carpathians volcanism context. It is even necessary to carry out for such samples a double full steps separation due to the presence of an abundant amount of minerals inherited from glomerocryst magmatic clots.
