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ARTIN PERVERSE SHEAVES

ABSTRACT. We show that the perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on the category $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ of Artin ℓ -adic complexes when S is an excellent scheme of dimension less than 2 and provide a counter-example in dimension 3. The heart $\operatorname{Perv}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ of this t-structure can be described explicitly in terms of representations in the case of 1-dimensional schemes.

When S is of finite type over a finite field, we also construct a perverse homotopy t-structure over $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ and show that it is the best possible approximation of the perverse t-structure. We describe the simple objects of its heart $\mathrm{Perv}^A(\mathrm{S},\mathbb{Q}_\ell)^\#$ and show that the weightless truncation functor ω^0 is t-exact. We also show that the weightless intersection complex $EC_S=\omega^0 IC_S$ is a simple Artin homotopy perverse sheaf. If S is a surface, it is also a perverse sheaf but it need not be simple in the category of perverse sheaves.

INTRODUCTION

In this paper, we aim to define abelian categories of Artin perverse sheaves. Those categories should be categories of perverse sheaves which come from finite schemes over the base scheme. Letting S be a noetherian finite dimensional scheme, we study to this end the stable ∞ -category of Artin ℓ -adic complexes $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ which is defined as the thick stable ∞ -subcategory of the stable ∞ category $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ of ℓ -adic complexes generated by the complexes of the form $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ for $f: X \to S$ finite, where $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ denotes the constant sheaf with value \mathbb{Z}_ℓ over X. To define categories of perverse sheaves, we will define perverse t-structures on those categories.

The motivation for this problem comes from the conjectural motivic t-structure. We have at our disposal several stable ∞ -categories of constructible étale motives $\mathcal{DM}_{\acute{e}t,c}(-)$ endowed with Grothendieck's six functors formalism and with ℓ -adic realization functors [Voe92, VSF11, Ayo07, Ayo14, CD19, CD16]. Let S be a noe-therian finite-dimensional scheme. One of the major open problems regarding the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{DM}_{\acute{e}t,c}(S)$ is the existence of a motivic t-structure, whose heart would be the abelian category of mixed motivic sheaves that satisfies Beilinson's conjectures [Jan94].

More precisely, working by analogy with the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, there are two possible versions of the motivic t-structure: the *perverse motivic t-structure* and the *ordinary motivic t-structure*. As Beilinson proved in [Bei87b] that the category $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_\ell)$ is the bounded derived category of the abelian category of perverse sheaves over S, the category $\mathcal{DM}_{\text{ét},c}(S)$ is by analogy conjectured to be the derived category of the conjectural abelian category of *perverse motives* which would be the heart of the conjectural motivic t-structure. In [Bon15], Bondarko has shown that the perverse motivic t-structure on the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{DM}_{\text{ét},c}(S)$ can be recovered from the ordinary motivic t-structures on the stable ∞ -categories $\mathcal{DM}_{\text{ét},c}(K)$ (assuming they exist) when K runs through the set of residue fields of S.

Proving that the motivic t-structure exists seems completely out of reach at the moment. However, if n = 0, 1, the ordinary motivic t-structure has been constructed in [Org04, Ayo11, ABV09, BVK16, Leh19b, Leh19a, Vai19] on the subcategory $\mathcal{DM}^n_{\text{ét},c}(S,\mathbb{Q})$ of *constructible n-motives*, which is the thick stable ∞ subcategory generated by the cohomological motives of proper S-schemes of dimension less than n. We state their main result:

Theorem. (Voevodsky, Orgogozo, Ayoub, Barbieri-Viale, Kahn, Pepin Lehalleur, Vaish) Let S be a noetherian excellent finite dimensional scheme admitting resolution of singularities by alterations. Let ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. Let n = 0, 1.

Then, there exists a non-degenerate t-structure on the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{DM}^n_{\text{ét},c}(S,\mathbb{Q})$ such that the ℓ -adic realization functor:

$$\mathcal{DM}^n_{\mathrm{\acute{e}t},c}(S,\mathbb{Q}) \to \mathcal{D}^b_c(S,\mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

is t-exact when the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{D}^b_c(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ is endowed with its ordinary t-structure.

In the case of the dimensional subcategories $\mathcal{DM}_{c}^{n}(S,\mathbb{Q})$, Bondarko's approach, which defines the perverse t-structure motivic from the ordinary motivic t-structure, does not apply. It indeed requires to use Grothendieck's six functors formalism and some of the six functors do not behave well with respect to the dimensional subcategories. Therefore, the existence of the perverse motivic t-structure on the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{DM}_{\text{ét},c}^{n}(S,\mathbb{Q})$ does not follow formally from the existence of the ordinary motivic t-structure on the stable ∞ -categories $\mathcal{DM}_{\text{ét},c}^{n}(K,\mathbb{Q})$ when K runs through the set of residue fields of S.

Another natural problem is to determine whether those results can be extended to the case of étale motives with integral coefficients: Voevodsky has shown in [VSF11, 4.3.8] that it is not possible to construct a reasonable motivic t-structure on the stable ∞ -category of *Nisnevich motives* $\mathcal{DM}_{Nis,c}(S,\mathbb{Z})$; however, nothing is known about the t-structure on the stable ∞ -category of étale motives.

Hence, the above theorem leaves two open questions:

(1) Is there a t-structure on the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{DM}^n_{\text{ét},c}(S,\mathbb{Z})$ such that the ℓ -adic realization functor:

$$\mathcal{DM}^n_{\mathrm{\acute{e}t},c}(S,\mathbb{Z}) \to \mathcal{D}^b_c(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$$

is t-exact when $\mathcal{D}^b_c(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ is endowed with its *ordinary* t-structure ?

(2) Let $R = \mathbb{Z}$ or \mathbb{Q} . Is there a t-structure on the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{DM}^n_{\mathrm{\acute{e}t},c}(S,R)$ such that the ℓ -adic realization functor:

$$\mathcal{DM}^n_{\text{\'et}\ c}(S,R) \to \mathcal{D}^b_c(S,R_\ell)$$

is t-exact when $\mathcal{D}_{c}^{b}(S, R_{\ell})$ is endowed with its *perverse* t-structure ?

One of the goals of this paper is to determine what answer to this question could reasonably be expected in the case when n = 0, looking at the analogous situation in the setting of ℓ -adic complexes. Namely, the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is the ℓ -adic analog of the stable ∞ -category of 0-motives (sometimes called Artin motives). The analog of the above problem is then to determine whether the ordinary and the perverse t-structures on the stable ∞ -category of constructible ℓ -adic complexes induce a t-structure on the stable ∞ -category of Artin ℓ -adic complex. The advantage of this setting is that the ordinary and the perverse t-structure exist while they are still conjectural in the motivic world.

To investigate this problem and to state some of our results, we need to introduce the stable ∞ -subcategory $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of smooth Artin ℓ -adic complexes which is the stable ∞ -subcategories of $\mathcal{D}^b_c(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ generated by the $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$, for $f: X \to S$ finite and étale. This category plays in our paper the role that the category of lisse ℓ -adic complexes plays in the theory of perverse sheaves. It is closely linked to a subclass of representations of the proétale fundamental group of S.

To explain this link, we use two ingredients. On the first hand, we need Bhatt and Scholze's construction of the category of constructible ℓ -adic complex: they defined it in [BS15] as the category of constructible objects of the derived category $\mathcal{D}(\mathrm{Sh}(S_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))$ of sheaves of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,S}$ -modules on the proétale site of S. In the spirit of [BS15, 7], if ξ is a geometric point of S and if S is connected, the abelian category of continuous representations of the proétale fundamental group $\pi_1^{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$ is equivalent to the abelian category of *lisse* ℓ -adic sheaves.

On the second hand, letting π be a topological group, we introduce the abelian category of representations of Artin origin of π as the category of iterated extensions of Artin representations of π in the category of continuous representations. We then say that a lisse ℓ -adic sheaf is smooth Artin if it corresponds to a representation of Artin origin of $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(S,\xi)$. We can extend this definition to non-connected schemes by asking the sheaf to be smooth Artin when restricted to every connected component. We can now state the link between smooth Artin ℓ -adic sheaves and representations more precisely:

Proposition. (Proposition 2.2.1) Let S be a noetherian finite dimensional scheme and let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Then, the category $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is the category of those ℓ -adic complexes whose ordinary cohomology sheaves are smooth Artin. In particular, the ordinary t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ whose heart is the category of smooth Artin ℓ -adic sheaves.

To answer our question regarding the ordinary t-structure, we introduce the notion of Artin ℓ -adic sheaves by mimicking the definition of constructible sheaves: an ℓ -adic sheaf is *Artin* if there is a stratification of S such that its pullback to any stratum is smooth Artin.

Proposition. (Corollary 2.4.3) Let S be a noetherian finite dimensional scheme and let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Then, the category $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is the category of those ℓ -adic complexes whose ordinary cohomology sheaves are Artin. In particular, the ordinary t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ whose heart is the category of Artin ℓ -adic sheaves.

Our main result concerns the perverse t-structure:

Theorem. (Theorem 3.3.4 and Proposition 3.4.1) Let S be a noetherian finite dimensional excellent scheme and let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Assume that S is of dimension at most 2, or that S is of dimension 3 and that the residue fields of the closed points of S are separably closed or real closed. Then, the perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

We let $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ be the heart of the induced perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ when it is defined.

The above result seems rather optimal: if k is a finite field and ℓ is a prime number invertible on k, we prove (see Example 3.5.2) that the perverse t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_{c}^{b}(\mathbb{A}_{k}^{3},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ does not induce a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{A}(\mathbb{A}_{k}^{3},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

To circumvent this negative result, we introduce another notion of Artin perverse sheaves inspired by the approach of [Leh19b, Vai19], [Ayo07, 2.2.4] and [BD17]. More precisely, we define a *perverse homotopy t-structure* on the category $\mathcal{D}_{\text{Ind}}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ of *Ind-Artin l-adic complexes* formally by specifying the set of t-negative objects. It has the following properties (see Proposition 4.5.1).

• When the perverse homotopy t-structure induces a t-structure on the subcategory $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$, the induced t-structure is final among those such that the inclusion functor

$$\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^b_c(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$$

is t-exact when the right hand side is endowed with its perverse t-structure.

• When the perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, then so does the perverse homotopy t-structure and both induced t-structures coincide.

The properties of this t-structure are closely related to the properties of the right adjoint ω^0 of the inclusion functor

$$\iota \colon \mathcal{D}^A_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$$

of Ind-Artin ℓ -adic complexes into Ind-cohomological ℓ -adic complexes. The motivic analog of this functor was first introduced in [AZ12] to study the reductive Borel-Serre compactification of a symmetric variety.

When S is of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p and working with coefficients \mathbb{Q}_ℓ , the functor ω^0 is more tractable. We have at our disposal the stable ∞ -category of mixed ℓ -adic sheaves $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ of [BBDG18, 5] and Deligne's theory of weights (see [Del80]). Using the truncation functors defined by Morel in [Mor05], Nair and Vaish defined in [NV15] a weightless truncation functor

$$\omega^0 \colon \mathcal{D}^b_m(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^b_m(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

(denoted by $w_{\leqslant \mathrm{Id}}$ in [NV15]) which they claim to be the $\ell\text{-adic}$ analog of Ayoub and Zucker's functor.

We show the following results:

Proposition. (Propositions 4.6.1 and 4.7.1 and Remarks 4.6.2 and 4.7.3) Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number.

(1) The two functors denoted above by ω^0 induce equivalent functors

$$\mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}).$$

In particular, both functors send cohomological ℓ -adic complexes to Artin ℓ -adic complexes.

- (2) The perverse homotopy t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$. We denote its heart by $\operatorname{Perv}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{\#}$ and call it the abelian category of Artin homotopy perverse sheaves.
- (3) The abelian categories $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ and $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\#}$ coincide when they are both well defined.

To study the abelian category $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\#}$, we would like to show that the functor ω^{0} is t-exact. However, this t-exactness statement does not make sense as

is: it is unknown whether the perverse truncation functors preserve cohomological complexes. To get around this issue, we define the stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{D}^{\leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ of weightless ℓ -adic complexes as the essential image of the weightless truncation functor. The main insight leading to this definition is that Artin ℓ -adic complexes are the cohomological complexes which are also weightless. This stable ∞ -category $\mathcal{D}^{\leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ is then endowed with a t-structure such that the inclusion of $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ equipped with its perverse homotopy t-structure is t-exact (see Proposition 4.8.8(3)). We can now provide a meaningful t-exactness statement:

Theorem. (Theorem 4.8.10) Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p and let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let

$$\iota \colon \mathcal{D}^{w \leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}^{b}_{m}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$$

be the inclusion. When the left hand side is endowed with the weightless perverse t-structure and the right hand side is endowed with the perverse t-structure, the adjunction (ι, ω^0) is a t-adjunction and the functor ω^0 is t-exact.

A consequence of this result is that the abelian category $\text{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\#}$ is similar to the abelian category of perverse sheaves and contains the weightless intersection complex of [NV15]:

Proposition. (Propositions 4.9.4 and 4.9.7 and Example 4.9.8) Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p and let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number.

- All the objects of Perv^A(S, Q_ℓ)[#] are of finite length. Its simple objects can be described as the ω⁰j_{!*}(L[dim(V)]) where j: V → S runs through the set of inclusions of smooth subschemes of S and L runs through the set of simple smooth Artin ℓ-adic sheaves over V.
- (2) Let IC_S be the intersection complex of S. The weightless intersection complex $EC_S = \omega^0 IC_S$ of [NV15] is a simple object of the abelian category $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\#}$.
- (3) If S is a surface, then, the complex EC_S is also a perverse sheaf, but it need not be simple in the category of perverse sheaves.

Finally, we describe the category $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ when C is an excellent scheme of dimension 1. Let Γ be the set of generic points of C. Let $\nu \colon \widetilde{C} \to C$ be the normalization of C. In this setting, we introduce a residue map ∂_{y} for any closed point y of \widetilde{C} in Lemma 5.1.5. The category $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is equivalent to the category $\operatorname{P}^{A}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ (see Definition 5.2.1) which is defined as follows:

- An object of $\mathbb{P}^A(C, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ is a quadruple $(U, (M_\eta)_{\eta \in \Gamma}, (M_x)_{x \in C \setminus U}, (f_x)_{x \in C \setminus U})$ where
 - (1) U is a nil-regular open subset of C such that the immersion $U \to C$ is affine,
 - (2) for all $\eta \in \Gamma$, M_{η} is an ℓ -adic representation of Artin origin of $\pi_1^{\text{\'et}}(U_{\eta}, \overline{\eta})$,
 - (3) for all $x \in C \setminus U$, M_x is a complex of ℓ -adic representations of $G_{k(x)}$ placed in degrees [-1, 0],
 - (4) for all $x \in C \setminus U$, f_x is an element of

$$\operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{D}(\operatorname{Rep}(G_{k(x)},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))}\left(M_{x},\bigoplus_{\nu(y)=x}\operatorname{Ind}_{G_{k(y)}}^{G_{k(x)}}\left(\partial_{y}\left[\phi_{y}^{*}(M_{\eta(y)})\right]\right)\right)$$

such that $H^{-1}(f_x)$ is injective.

• An element of $\operatorname{Hom}_{P^A(C,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)}((U,(M_\eta),(M_x),(f_x)),(V,(N_\eta),(N_x),(g_x)))$ is a couple $((\Phi_\eta)_{\eta\in\Gamma},(\Phi_x)_{x\in(C\setminus U)\cap(C\setminus V)})$ where $\Phi_\eta\colon M_\eta\to N_\eta$ is a map of representations of $G_{K_\eta}, \Phi_x\colon M_x\to N_x$ is a map of representations of $G_{k(x)}$ and the diagram:

$$\begin{array}{ccc} M_x & \xrightarrow{f_x} & \bigoplus_{\nu(y)=x} \operatorname{Ind}_{G_{k(y)}}^{G_{k(x)}} \left(\partial_y \left[\phi_y^*(M_{\eta(y)}) \right] \right) \\ & \downarrow^{\Phi_x} & \downarrow_{\nu(y)=x} \operatorname{Ind}_{G_{k(y)}}^{G_{k(x)}} \left(\partial_y \left(\phi_y^*(\Phi_{\eta(y)}) \right) \right) \\ N_x & \xrightarrow{g_x} & \bigoplus_{\nu(y)=x} \operatorname{Ind}_{G_{k(y)}}^{G_{k(x)}} \left(\partial_y \left[\phi_y^*(N_{\eta(y)}) \right] \right) \end{array}$$

is commutative.

In [Rui22], which can be regarded as a sequel to this paper, we study the motivic case and prove that we have similar results. One of the main interests of this paper is that the motivic constructions will realize into our constructions.

1. Preliminaries

All schemes are assumed to be **noetherian** and of **finite dimension**; furthermore all smooth (and étale) morphisms and all quasi-finite morphisms are also implicitly assumed to be separated and of finite type.

In this text we will freely use the language of $(\infty, 1)$ -categories of [Lur09, Lur17]. The term *category* will by default mean $(\infty, 1)$ -category, and the term 2-category will mean $(\infty, 2)$ -category. When we refer to derived categories, we refer to the ∞ -categorical version.

There are several definitions of the derived category of constructible ℓ -adic sheaves. The first definition was given in [BBDG18] over schemes over a field. This definition was then extended to all noetherian finite dimensional schemes in [Eke07] [CD16, 7.2], [BS15] and [LYF14, XIII.4]. In this paper, we will use the model of [BS15]. We will use the theorems of [BBDG18, 4] over excellent schemes; in particular, to use the affine Lefschetz theorem [BBDG18, 4.1.1] and its consequences, one has to replace [AGV73, XIV.3.1] in the proof of [BBDG18, 4.1.1] with [LYF14, XV.1.1.2].

We adopt the cohomological convention for t-structures (*i.e.* the convention of [BBDG18, 1.3.1] and the opposite of [Lur17, 1.2.1.1]): a t-structure on a stable category \mathcal{D} is a pair ($\mathcal{D}^{\leq 0}, \mathcal{D}^{\geq 0}$) of strictly full subcategories of \mathcal{D} having the following properties:

- For any object M of D^{≤0} and any object N of D^{≥0}, π₀ Map(M, N[-1]) = 0.
 We have inclusions D^{≤0} ⊆ D^{≤0}[-1] and D^{≥0}[-1] ⊆ D^{≥0}.
- For any object M of \mathcal{D} , there exists an exact triangle $M' \to M \to M''$ where M' is an object of $\mathcal{D}^{\leq 0}$ and M'' is an object of $\mathcal{D}^{\geq 0}[-1]$.

A stable category endowed with a t-structure is called a t-category. If \mathcal{D} is a t-category, we denote by $\mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} = \mathcal{D}^{\ge 0} \cap \mathcal{D}^{\le 0}$ the heart of the t-structure which is an abelian category and by \mathcal{D}^b the full subcategory of bounded objects which is a stable t-category.

Let $i: Z \to X$ be a closed immersion and $j: U \to X$ be the complementary open immersion. We call localization triangles the exact triangles of functors on ℓ -adic sheaves over X:

(1.0.1)
$$j_! j^* \to \operatorname{Id} \to i_* i^*$$

$$(1.0.2) i_! i^! \to \mathrm{Id} \to j_* j^*.$$

Let S be a scheme. A stratification of S is a partition \mathcal{S} of S into non-empty equidimensional locally closed subschemes called *strata* such that the topological closure of any stratum is a union strata.

If S is a scheme and ξ is a geometric point of S, we denote by $\pi_1^{\text{ét}}(S,\xi)$ the étale fundamental group of S with base point ξ defined in [GR71] and $\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$ the pro-étale fundamental group of S with base point ξ defined in [BS15, 7].

If k is a field, we denote by G_k its absolute Galois group.

If p is a prime number, we denote by \mathbb{F}_p the field with p elements, by \mathbb{Z}_p the ring of p-adic integers, by \mathbb{Q}_p the field of p-adic numbers and by $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_p$ its algebraic closure.

If $\phi: H \to G$ is a map of group, we denote by ϕ^* the forgetful functor which maps representations of G to representations of H.

If H is a finite index subgroup of a group G, we denote by $\operatorname{Ind}_{H}^{G}$ the induced representation functor which maps representations of H to representations of G.

1.1. Notions of abelian and stable subcategories generated by a set of objects. Recall the following definitions (see [Sta23, 02MN]).

Definition 1.1.1. Let A be an abelian category.

(1) A Serre subcategory of A is a nonempty full subcategory B of A such that given an exact sequence

$$M' \to M \to M''$$

such that M' and M'' are objects of B, then M is an object of B.

(2)A weak Serre subcategory of A is a nonempty full subcategory B of A such that given an exact sequence

$$M_1 \to M_2 \to M_3 \to M_4 \to M_5$$

such that for all $i \in \{1, 2, 4, 5\}$, M_i is an object of B, then M_3 is an object of B.

(3) Let \mathcal{E} be a set of objects of A, the Serre (resp. weak Serre) subcategory of A generated by \mathcal{E} is the smallest Serre (resp. weak Serre) subcategory of A whose set of objects contains \mathcal{E} .

Note that a Serre subcategory of an abelian category A is also a weak Serre subcategory of A and that if B is a weak Serre subcategory of A, then B is abelian and the inclusion functor $B \rightarrow A$ is exact and fully faithful.

Recall that a strictly full subcategory is a full subcategory whose set of objects is closed under isomorphisms.

Proposition 1.1.2. Let A be a strictly full abelian subcategory of an abelian category B. Assume that A is closed under subobject and quotient in B.

Let A^* be the full subcategory of B spanned by the objects obtained as successive extensions of the objects A. Then

(1) The category A^{*} is the smallest weak Serre subcategory of B containing A.

(2) The category A^* is a Serre subcategory of B.

Proof. Any weak Serre subcategory containing A is closed under extensions and therefore contains A^* . Hence it suffices to show that A^* is a Serre subcategory of B.

The subcategory A^* is strictly full, contains the zero object and any extension of objects of A^* is an object of A^* . Therefore using [Sta23, 02MP], it suffices to show that A^* is closed under subobject and quotient.

We first define subcategories of B by induction. Let $A_0 = A$ and if $n \ge 0$ is an integer, let A_{n+1} be the full subcategory of B whose objects are the objects M of B such that there exists an exact sequence

$$0 \to M' \to M \to M'' \to 0$$

where M' and M'' are objects of A_n .

By definition, A^* is the full subcategory of B whose objects are objects of A_n for some non-negative integer n. Therefore it suffices to show that for all $n \ge 0$, the subcategory A_n is closed under subobject and quotient.

The case where n = 0 is the hypothesis on A. Assume that any subobject and any quotient of any object of A_n lies in A_n and let M be an object of A_{n+1} . Let N be a subobject of M, we show that N and M/N are objects of A_{n+1} .

We have an exact sequence

$$0 \to M' \to M \xrightarrow{\pi} M'' \to 0$$

where M' and M'' are objects of A_n . This yields exact sequences:

$$0 \to \ker(\pi|_N) \to N \xrightarrow{\pi|_N} \pi(N) \to 0,$$

$$0 \to M' / \ker(\pi|_N) \to M/N \to M'' / \pi(N) \to 0.$$

Since $\pi(N)$ is a subobject of M'', it is an object of A_n and since ker $(\pi|_N)$ is a subobject of M', it is also an object of A_n . Thus N is an object of A_{n+1} . Similarly, M/N is an object of A_{n+1} .

Definition 1.1.3. Let C be a stable category

- A thick subcategory of C is a full subcategory D of C which is closed under finite limits, finite colimits and retracts.
- (2) A localizing subcategory of C is a full subcategory D of C which is closed under finite limits and arbitrary colimits.
- (3) Let \mathcal{E} be a set of objects. We call thick (resp. localizing) subcategory generated by \mathcal{E} the smallest thick (resp. localizing) subcategory of \mathcal{C} whose set of objects contains \mathcal{E} .

1.2. Induced t-structure. Recall the following definition of [BBDG18, 1.3.19]:

Definition 1.2.1. Let \mathcal{D} be a t-category and \mathcal{D}' be a full stable subcategory of \mathcal{D} . If $(\mathcal{D}^{\leq 0} \cap \mathcal{D}', \mathcal{D}^{\geq 0} \cap \mathcal{D}')$ defines a t-structure on \mathcal{D}' , we say that \mathcal{D}' is a sub-t-category of \mathcal{D} , that the t-structure of \mathcal{D} induces a t-structure on \mathcal{D}' and call the latter the induced t-structure.

First notice the following properties on sub-t-categories:

Proposition 1.2.2. Let \mathcal{D} be a t-category and \mathcal{D}_0 be a strictly full sub-t-category of \mathcal{D}^b . Then,

- (1) The subcategory \mathcal{D}_0 is thick.
- (2) The category $\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}$ is a weak Serre subcategory of \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} .

Proof. We first prove (1). Since \mathcal{D}_0 is a strictly full stable subcategory of \mathcal{D} , it is closed under finite limits and colimits.

Let M be an object of \mathcal{D}_0 . Assume that $M = M' \bigoplus M''$ in \mathcal{D} . We prove that M' is an object of \mathcal{D}_0 .

Since M is bounded, so is M'. Hence, by dévissage, it suffices to show that $H^k(M')$ lies in \mathcal{D}_0 for any integer k. Therefore, we can assume that M lies in \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} .

Let $p: M \to M$ be the projector corresponding to M'. Let C be the cone of p. Then, $M' = \ker(p) = H^{-1}(C)$ lies in $\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}$ which proves (1). We now prove (2). Since the inclusion functor $\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit} \to \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit}$ is fully faithful and

We now prove (2). Since the inclusion functor $\mathcal{D}_0^{\vee} \to \mathcal{D}^{\vee}$ is fully faithful and exact, by [Sta23, 0754], it suffices to show that $\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}$ is closed under extensions. But if

$$0 \to M' \to M \to M'' \to 0$$

is an exact sequence in \mathcal{D}^\heartsuit with M' and M'' objects of $\mathcal{D}_0^\heartsuit,$ the triangle

$$M' \to M \to M'$$

is exact in \mathcal{D} . Since \mathcal{D}_0 is a stable subcategory of \mathcal{D} , this proves that M is an object of \mathcal{D}_0 and thus of $\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}$. This finishes the proof. \Box

The following lemma will allow us to restrict t-structures to thick subcategories.

Lemma 1.2.3. Let \mathcal{D} be a t-category. Let \mathcal{D}' be a thick subcategory of \mathcal{D}^b . Assume that $\mathcal{D}' \cap \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit}$ contains a set of generators of \mathcal{D}' as a thick subcategory of \mathcal{D} . Then, the following conditions are equivalent.

- (1) The t-structure of \mathcal{D} induces a t-structure on \mathcal{D}' .
- (2) If $f: M \to N$ is a map in $\mathcal{D}' \cap \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit}$, ker(f) is an object of \mathcal{D}' .
- (3) If $f: M \to N$ is a map in $\mathcal{D}' \cap \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit}$, $\operatorname{coker}(f)$ is an object of \mathcal{D}' .

Proof. Condition (1) implies conditions (2) and (3). If $f : M \to N$ is a map in $\mathcal{D}' \cap \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit}$ and C is the cone of f, we have an exact triangle:

$$\ker(f) \to C \to \operatorname{coker}(f)[-1].$$

Thus, conditions (2) and (3) are equivalent.

Assume now that conditions (2) and (3) hold. First notice that $\mathcal{D}' \cap \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit}$ is closed under extensions since \mathcal{D}' is. Therefore, the subcategory $\mathcal{D}' \cap \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit}$ of \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} is weak Serre using [Sta23, 0754].

We consider the full subcategory \mathcal{C} of \mathcal{D}' made of those objects M such that for all integer n, the object $H^n(M)$ lies in \mathcal{D}' . The subcategory \mathcal{C} is closed under suspensions and direct factors. We now show that it is closed under extensions.

Let

$$M' \to M \to M''$$

be an exact triangle in \mathcal{D}' such that M' and M'' are objects of \mathcal{C} . Then, if n is an integer, we get an exact sequence in \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} :

$$H^{n-1}(M'') \to H^n(M') \to H^n(M) \to H^n(M'') \to H^{n+1}(M')$$

Since $\mathcal{D}' \cap \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit}$ is a weak Serre subcategory of \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} and since M' and M'' are objects of \mathcal{C} , the object $H^n(M)$ lies in \mathcal{D}' .

Therefore, the subcategory \mathcal{C} is thick and contains a set of generators of \mathcal{D}' , whence, we have $\mathcal{C} = \mathcal{D}'$. This shows that the subcategory \mathcal{D}' of \mathcal{D}^b is stable under the truncation functor $\tau_{\geq 0}$, thus by [BBDG18, 1.3.19], the t-structure of \mathcal{D} induces a t-structure on \mathcal{D}' .

In fact, Lemma 1.2.3 implies that weak Serre subcategories of the heart of a t-category one the one hand and strictly full bounded sub-t-category of the same t-category on the other hand are in one-to-one correspondence. More precisely, we define the following particular sub-t-categories:

Definition 1.2.4. Let \mathcal{D} be a t-category. Let A be a weak Serre subcategory of \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} . We will denote by \mathcal{D}^{b}_{A} the full subcategory of \mathcal{D} spanned by those bounded objects C of \mathcal{D} such that for all integer n, the object $H^{n}(C)$ is in A.

Remark 1.2.5. Be careful that in general, the category \mathcal{D}^b_A need not coincide with the category $\mathcal{D}^b(A)$. However, by [Lur17, 1.3.3.2], there is a canonical t-exact functor:

$$\mathcal{D}^b(\mathbf{A}) \to \mathcal{D}^b_{\mathbf{A}}$$

We then have the following proposition:

Proposition 1.2.6. Let \mathcal{D} be a t-category. Then,

- (1) Let A be a weak Serre subcategory of \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} . Then, the category \mathcal{D}^{b}_{A} is a strictly full sub-t-category of \mathcal{D}^{b} . Moreover, we have $(\mathcal{D}^{b}_{A})^{\heartsuit} = A$ as subcategories of \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} .
- (2) Let \mathcal{D}_0 be a strictly full sub-t-category of \mathcal{D}^b . Then, the category $\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}$ is a weak Serre subcategory of \mathcal{D}^{\heartsuit} and $\mathcal{D}_{\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}}^b = \mathcal{D}_0$ as subcategories of \mathcal{D} .

Proof. The first assertion follows from Lemma 1.2.3 and from the fact that A generates \mathcal{D}^b_A as a thick subcategory of \mathcal{D}^b .

The first part of the second assertion follows from Proposition 1.2.2.

Finally, the cohomology objects of any object of \mathcal{D}_0 lie in $\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}$. Thus, any object of \mathcal{D}_0 lies in $\mathcal{D}_{\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}}^b$. Moreover, if M is an object of $\mathcal{D}_{\mathcal{D}_0^{\heartsuit}}^b$, to show that it lies in \mathcal{D}_0 , it suffices by dévissage to show that for all n, the object $H^n(M)$ is an object of \mathcal{D}_0 . This is true by definition.

1.3. Finite permutation resolutions. In this paragraph, we recall a result of Balmer and Gallauer (see [BG23]). If G is a finite group, R is a ring and H is a subgroup of G, the R-module R[G/H] is endowed with a left R[G]-module structure letting G act on G/H by left multiplication.

Proposition 1.3.1. Let G be a finite group. Let R be a regular ring and let M be a representation of G with coefficients in R. Then, the complex $M \oplus M[1]$ of R[G]-modules is quasi-isomorphic as a complex of R[G]-modules to a complex

 $\cdots \to 0 \to P_n \to P_{n-1} \to \cdots \to P_0 \to 0 \to \cdots$

where each P_i is placed in degree -i and is isomorphic to $R[G/H_1] \oplus \cdots \oplus R[G/H_m]$ for some subgroups H_1, \ldots, H_m of G.

Proof. We say that a bounded complex P of R[G]-modules is a *permutation complex* if the P_i are isomorphic to $R[G/H_1] \oplus \cdots \oplus R[G/H_m]$ for some subgroups H_1, \ldots, H_m of G.

Let $\mathcal{P}(R,G)$ be the subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^b(R[G])$ made of those complexes N which admit a quasi-isomorphism $P \to N$, where P is permutation complex. Then, [BG23, 4.6] states that the idempotent completion of $\mathcal{P}(R,G)$ is the category $\mathcal{D}^b(R[G])$ itself.

Moreover, using [BG23, 2.13], the idempotent completion of $\mathcal{P}(R, G)$ is the subcategory made of those complexes N such that $N \oplus N[1]$ lies in $\mathcal{P}(R, G)$. Thus, the complex $M \oplus M[1]$ admits a quasi-isomorphism $P \to M \oplus M[1]$, where P is permutation complex.

Finally, noting that $M \oplus M[1]$ lies in nonpositive degree, we can modify P so that the P_i vanish for i > 0 by [BG23, 2.4] which yields the result.

1.4. Artin representations, representations of Artin origin. Let ℓ be a prime number. The topology on \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} induces a topology on every \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -module of finite type.

In this paragraph and in the following paragraphs, we only consider the case of \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -coefficients for simplicity, however, all the definitions can be formulated with coefficients \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} (or even a finite extension of \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} , its ring of integers, $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ or the subring of elements of $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ which are integral over \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ}) and all the propositions still hold.

Recall the following definitions:

Definition 1.4.1. Let π be a topological group and let ℓ be a prime number.

- (1) A continuous representation of π with coefficients in \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} is a \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -module of finite type endowed with a continuous action of π . We will denote by $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ the abelian category of continuous representation of π with coefficients in \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} .
- (2) An Artin representation of π is a continuous representation of π which factors through a finite quotient of π . We will denote by $\operatorname{Rep}^{A}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ the abelian category of Artin representation of π with coefficients in \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} .

The category $\operatorname{Rep}^{A}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is a strictly full abelian subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$; in general, it is not a weak Serre subcategory. Indeed, consider an additive character $\chi : \pi \to \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$ that does not factor through a finite quotient (for example if $\pi = \hat{\mathbb{Z}}$, write $\hat{\mathbb{Z}} = \prod_{\substack{p \text{ prime}}} \mathbb{Z}_{p}$ and take the projection to \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ}). Then, we have a morphism $\pi \to GL_2(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ given by

$$\begin{pmatrix} 1 & \chi \\ 0 & 1 \end{pmatrix}$$

which defines a continuous representation M of π on \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ}^2 . The exact sequence:

$$0 \to \mathbb{Z}_{\ell} \to M \to \mathbb{Z}_{\ell} \to 0$$

is an exact sequence of representations if π acts trivially on both copies of \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} . Hence, this gives an extension of Artin representations which is not Artin.

This leads us to the following definition:

Definition 1.4.2. Let π be a topological group and let ℓ be a prime number. A continuous representation is of Artin origin if it is obtained as a successive extension of Artin representations in $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. We denote by $\operatorname{Rep}^{A}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{*}$ the category of representation of Artin origin.

Proposition 1.1.2 implies the following proposition.

Proposition 1.4.3. Let π be a topological group and let ℓ be a prime number. Then,

- (1) The category $\operatorname{Rep}^{A}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{*}$ is the smallest weak Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ containing $\operatorname{Rep}^{A}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.
- (2) The category $\operatorname{Rep}^{A}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{*}$ is a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

The following proposition shows that the Artin origin condition can be checked with coefficients \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} .

Proposition 1.4.4. Let π be a topological group. Let M be a continuous representation with coefficients \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} . Assume that $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}$ is a representation of Artin origin with coefficients \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} . Then, M itself is of Artin origin.

Proof. Let $A_0 = \operatorname{Rep}^A(\pi, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ and if n is a non-negative integer, let A_{n+1} be the full subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ whose objects are the extensions of the objects of A_n in $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$. There is a non-negative integer n such that $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_\ell} \mathbb{Q}_\ell$ is an object of A_n .

Let *n* be a non-negative integer. We prove by induction on *n* that if *M* is a continuous representation with coefficients \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} such that $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}$ lies in A_n , then *M* is of Artin origin.

Notice first that we can assume M to be torsion free. Indeed, let M_{tors} be the sub- \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -module of torsion elements of M. Then, the representation on M induces a sub-representation on M_{tors} . Moreover, we have an exact sequence of representations:

$$0 \to M_{\rm tors} \to M \to M/M_{\rm tors} \to 0$$

Now, the abelian group M_{tors} is a finite. Therefore, the representation on M_{tors} is an Artin representation. Moreover, we have

$$M/M_{\mathrm{tors}} \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell} = M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}.$$

Thus, we can assume that M is torsion free.

Now, if, n = 0, the representation $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}$ is an Artin representation. Since M is torsion free, the group homomorphism

$$\operatorname{Aut}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}}(M) \to \operatorname{GL}_{\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}}(M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$$

is injective. Therefore, the morphism $\pi \to \operatorname{Aut}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}}(M)$ which gives rise to the $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[\pi]$ -module structure of M factors through a finite quotient and thus M is an Artin representation.

Assume now that n > 0. We get an exact sequence:

$$0 \to N' \xrightarrow{i} M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_\ell} \mathbb{Q}_\ell \xrightarrow{p} N'' \to 0$$

such that N' and N'' are objects of A_{n-1} .

Let M' (resp. M'') be the inverse image (resp. the image) of M along the map i (resp. through the map p).

There is a \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} -basis of N' whose image lies in M. Therefore,

$$N' = M' \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}.$$

Furthermore, there is a \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} -basis of N'' who lies in the image of M. Thus,

$$N'' = M'' \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}.$$

Hence, by induction, M' and M'' are of Artin origin.

The map i and p induce maps $i_0 : M' \to M$ and $p_0 : M \to M''$ such that $p_0 \circ i_0 = 0$. Letting K be the kernel of p_0 , the map i_0 factors through K.

Moreover, the rank of K as a \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -module is $\dim_{\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}}(M) - \dim_{\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}}(M'')$ which is also the rank of M'. This yields two exact sequences:

$$0 \to K \to M \to M'' \to 0$$
$$0 \to M' \to K \to F \to 0$$

where F is of rank 0.

Since F is finite as an abelian group, it is an Artin representation. Thus, K is of Artin origin and finally M is of Artin origin.

Artin representations are contained in a more explicit Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ which we will call *strongly of weight* 0. To prove that a representation is not of Artin origin, it is often convenient to prove that it is not strongly of weight 0.

Definition 1.4.5. Let π be a topological group and ℓ be a prime number. Let M be a continuous representation of π with coefficients in \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} . We say that M is strongly of weight 0 if for all $g \in \pi$, the eigenvalues of the matrix defined by the action of g on $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \overline{\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}}$ are roots of unity. We will denote by $\operatorname{Rep}^{w=0}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ the abelian category of representations that are strongly of weight 0.

Remark 1.4.6. In the theory of weights developed by Deligne in [Del80], letting k be a finite field and letting $\pi = G_k = \hat{\mathbb{Z}}$ be its absolute Galois group, an ℓ -adic representation of G_k is of weight 0 if the action of the topological generator F of G_k are algebraic numbers such that all their conjugates are of module 1 as complex numbers. Hence, representations that are strongly of weight 0 of G_k are contained in representations of weight 0 of G_k .

Finally, note that by a theorem of Kronecker, an algebraic integer such that all its conjugates are of module 1 is a root of unity.

Proposition 1.4.7. Let π be a topological group and ℓ be a prime number. The abelian category $\operatorname{Rep}^{w=0}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ and contains the category representation of Artin origin.

Proof. First, any sub-representation and any quotient of a representation that is strongly of weight 0 is strongly of weight 0. Now, if

$$0 \to M' \to M \to M'' \to 0$$

is an exact sequence of continuous representations where M' and M'' are strongly of weight 0, the sequence

 $0 \to M' \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_\ell} \overline{\mathbb{Q}_\ell} \to M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_\ell} \overline{\mathbb{Q}_\ell} \to M'' \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_\ell} \overline{\mathbb{Q}_\ell} \to 0$

is still exact and if g is an element of π , its action on M is the action of a matrix of the form $A = \begin{bmatrix} A' & * \\ 0 & A'' \end{bmatrix}$ where A' (resp. A'') is the matrix of the action of g on M' (resp. M''). The set of eigenvalues of A is the union of the set of eigenvalues of A' and A'' and those are roots of unity. Hence, the category $\operatorname{Rep}^{w=0}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Now, it suffices to show that Artin representations are strongly of weight 0. Let M be an Artin representation of π . Then, the representation $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$ is an Artin representation of π with coefficients in $\overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$. Since it factors through a finite quotient G of π , if $g \in \pi$, the element $g^{|G|}$ of π acts trivially on $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \overline{\mathbb{Q}}_{\ell}$.

1.5. Categories of ℓ -adic sheaves and complexes. In this paragraph, we recall the definitions of [BS15, HRS20] of various ℓ -adic categories. If S is a scheme, denote by $S_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}$ the proétale site of S introduced in [BS15, 4].

Any totally disconnected topological space M induces a sheaf on $S_{\text{proét}}$:

$$U \mapsto \mathcal{C}^0(U, M) = \mathcal{C}^0(\pi_0(U), M)$$

we denote this sheaf by M_S and call it the constant sheaf of value M. If $M = \Lambda$ is a topological ring, then, the sheaf Λ_S is a sheaf of rings on $S_{\text{pro\acuteet}}$.

Definition 1.5.1. Let S be a scheme (noetherian by conventions) and ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. We define:

- The abelian category of ℓ-adic sheaves Sh(S, Zℓ) as the abelian category of sheaves of Zℓ,S-modules on Sproét.
- (2) The abelian category of lisse ℓ -adic sheaves $\operatorname{Loc}_S(\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ as the category of sheaves of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,S}$ -modules L such that there exists a proétale cover $\{S_i \to S\}$ such that for all i, there exists a \mathbb{Z}_ℓ -module of finite type M such that $L|_{S_i}$ is isomorphic to M_{S_i} .
- (3) The abelian category of constructible ℓ-adic sheaves Sh_c(S, Z_ℓ) as the category of sheaves of Z_{ℓ,S}-modules L such that there exists a stratification of S such that for any stratum T, the sheaf L|_T is lisse.
- (4) The derived category of ℓ -adic sheaves $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ as the derived category of $\mathrm{Sh}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.
- (5) The derived category of lisse ℓ -adic sheaves $\mathcal{D}_{\text{lisse}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ as category of dualizable objects of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.
- (6) The derived category of constructible ℓ -adic sheaves $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ as the category of complexes of sheaves of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,S}$ -modules C such that there exists a stratification of S such that for any stratum T, the sheaf $C|_T$ is lisse.

Remark 1.5.2. Beware that in [BS15], they denote by $\text{Loc}_S(\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ the category of locally free sheaves of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,S}$ -modules of finite rank. In this paper, we want the category of lisse sheaves to be abelian, hence we chose to include all sheaves that are locally of finite type. This is also the convention of [Del77].

These categories are related each other by the following proposition.

Proposition 1.5.3. ([HRS20, 3.28]) Let S be a scheme and ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. The canonical t-structure of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_{c}^{b}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ (resp. $\mathcal{D}_{\text{lisse}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$) whose heart is $\text{Sh}_{c}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ (resp. $\text{Loc}_{S}(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$).

The above proposition shows in particular that $\operatorname{Sh}_c(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ and $\operatorname{Locs}(\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ are weak Serre subcategories of $\operatorname{Sh}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. Furthermore, we have the following characterization of lisse sheaves:

Proposition 1.5.4. Let S be a connected scheme and ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. Let ξ be a geometric point of S. The fiber functor associated to ξ induces an equivalence of abelian monoidal categories

$$\xi^* : \operatorname{Loc}_S(\mathbb{Z}_\ell) \to \operatorname{Rep}(\pi_1^{\operatorname{protet}}(S,\xi),\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$$

where $\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$ is the proétale fundamental group of S with base point ξ of [BS15, 7.4.2]

Remark 1.5.5. The proposition above with coefficients \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} still holds with the étale fundamental group by [Del77, Chapitre 2, 2.4]; we need the proétale fundamental group only in the case when the ring of coefficients is an algebraic extension of \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} . In this setting, the proposition does not follow from the proof below. However, it is a consequence of [BS15, 7.4.7,7.4.10].

Proof. Let Loc_S be the infinite Galois category (see [BS15, 7.2.1]) of locally constant sheaves of sets on $S_{pro\acute{e}t}$. By definition of the proétale fundamental group, the fiber functor

$$\xi^* : \operatorname{Loc}_S \to \pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi) - \operatorname{Set}$$

is an equivalence.

The constant sheaf $(\mathbb{Z}/\ell^n\mathbb{Z})_S$ is sent to the set $\mathbb{Z}/\ell^n\mathbb{Z}$ endowed with the trivial action of $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(S,\xi)$. Thus, ξ^* induces an equivalence

$$\operatorname{Loc}_{S}(\mathbb{Z}/\ell^{n}\mathbb{Z}) \to \operatorname{Rep}(\pi_{1}^{\operatorname{proet}}(S,\xi),\mathbb{Z}/\ell^{n}\mathbb{Z}).$$

The proposition follows by passing to the limit in the 2-category of categories. \Box

Recall that Bhatt and Scholze defined using the theory of infinite Galois categories of $[\mathrm{BS15},\,7.3]$ a map

$$\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi) \to \pi_1^{\operatorname{\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$$

that exhibits $\pi_1^{\text{ét}}(S,\xi)$ as the profinite completion of $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(S,\xi)$ by [BS15, 7.4.3], and which is a group isomorphism when S is geometrically unibranch. We now claim that the formation of $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(S,\xi)$ can be upgraded into a functor with respect to (S,ξ) which is compatible with the map above.

Lemma 1.5.6. Let $f : T \to S$ be a map of schemes. Let $\xi' : \operatorname{Spec}(\Omega) \to T$ be a geometric point of T and let $\xi = f \circ \xi'$. Then,

(1) The map f induces a continuous map of groups

$$\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(f): \pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(T,\xi') \to \pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$$

such that $\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}$ is a functor and the map $\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}} \to \pi_1^{\acute{e}t}$ is a natural transformation.

(2) Assume that f is finite and étale, then, the map $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(f)$ is injective and its image is a finite index subgroup.

(3) Let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Then, the square

$$\begin{array}{c} \operatorname{Loc}_{S}(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) & \xrightarrow{f^{*}} & \operatorname{Loc}_{T}(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \\ & \downarrow^{\xi^{*}} & \downarrow^{(\xi')^{*}} \\ \operatorname{Rep}(\pi_{1}^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi), \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{\pi_{1}^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(f)^{*}} \operatorname{Rep}(\pi_{1}^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(T,\xi'), \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \end{array}$$

is commutative.

Proof. If X is a scheme, let Loc_X (resp. $\text{Loc}_X^{\text{ét}}$) be the infinite Galois category (see [BS15, 7.2.1]) of locally constant sheaves of sets on $X_{\text{proét}}$ (resp. $X_{\text{ét}}$).

Now, if $f: T \to S$ is a map of schemes, let $\operatorname{Loc}_f(\operatorname{resp.Loc}_f^{\operatorname{\acute{e}t}})$ be the map $f^*: \operatorname{Loc}_S \to \operatorname{Loc}_T$. This defines contravariant functors Loc and $\operatorname{Loc}^{\operatorname{\acute{e}t}}$ from the category of schemes to the category of infinite Galois category. Moreover, the map of Bhatt and Scholze between the proétale and the étale fundamental group is induced by the natural map $\operatorname{Loc}^{\operatorname{\acute{e}t}} \to \operatorname{Loc}$. Thus, the first assertion follows from the structure theorem of infinite Galois categories [BS15, 7.2.5].

Now, by definition of the map $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(f)$, the square:

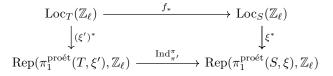
$$\begin{array}{ccc} & & \stackrel{f^*}{\longrightarrow} & \operatorname{Loc}_T \\ & & \downarrow_{\xi^*} & & \downarrow_{(\xi')^*} \\ \pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi) - \operatorname{Set}^{\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(f)^*} \pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(T,\xi') - \operatorname{Set} \end{array}$$

is commutative which implies the third assertion.

We now prove the second assertion. We have a functor $f_* : \operatorname{Loc}_T \to \operatorname{Loc}_S$ which is both left and right adjoint to f^* and sends a locally constant sheaf L to the sheaf $X \mapsto L(X \times_S T)$. Moreover, if L is a locally constant sheaf on S, the map $L \to f_*f^*L$ is injective. Therefore, using [Lar21, 2.37], the map $\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(f)$ is a topological embedding.

Now, the profinite completion of a quotient of topological groups is the quotient of the profinite completions of those groups. Thus, the profinite completion of $\pi_1^{\text{profet}}(S,\xi)/\pi_1^{\text{profet}}(T,\xi')$ is $\pi_1^{\text{ét}}(S,\xi)/\pi_1^{\text{ét}}(T,\xi')$ which is finite by [GR71, V.6.3]. \Box

Corollary 1.5.7. Let $f: T \to S$ be a finite étale map and let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Let ξ' be a geometric point of T and let $\xi = f \circ \xi'$. Then, the functor $f_* : \operatorname{Sh}(T, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \operatorname{Sh}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces a map $\operatorname{Loc}_T(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \operatorname{Loc}_S(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ and the square:



where $\pi' = \pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(T,\xi')$ and $\pi = \pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$ is commutative.

Proof. The functor f_* is left adjoint to the functor f^* . On the other hand, the functor $\operatorname{Ind}_{\pi'}^{\pi}$ is left adjoint to the functor $\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(f)^*$ which yields the result. \Box

Finally, recall that the fibered category $\mathcal{D}_c^b(-,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ over the category of noetherian excellent schemes is endowed with the 6 functors formalism (see [BS15, 6.7]).

Remark 1.5.8. If k is a field, the topos $\widetilde{k}_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}$ is equivalent to the topos $(BG_k)_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}$ where $(BG_k)_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}$ is the site of profinite continuous G_k -sets with covers given by continous surjections (see [BS15, 4.1.10]). Therefore, the abelian category $\text{Sh}(k_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ identifies with the abelian category $\text{Sh}((BG_k)_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of modules over the profinite G_k -set \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} endowed with trivial action (in the case of coefficients \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} , the topological ring \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} with its trivial action still defines a sheaf of rings on $(BG_k)_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}$ using [BS15, 4.3.2]).

Finally, the stable category $\mathcal{D}_{c}^{b}(k, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ identifies with the stable subcategory of \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -perfect complexes $\mathcal{D}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\text{perf}}^{b}(\operatorname{Sh}((BG_{k})_{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))$ of $\mathcal{D}^{b}(\operatorname{Sh}((BG_{k})_{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))$ which is the full subcategory made of those complexes whose restriction to $\mathcal{D}^{b}(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is perfect (i.e. whose cohomology sheaves are finite when seen as \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -modules).

The heart of $\mathcal{D}^b_c(k, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ then identifies with $\operatorname{Rep}(G_k, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

1.6. Reminders on cdh-descent and Mayer-Vietoris for closed immersions.

Definition 1.6.1. We say following [Voe10, 2] and [CD19, 2.1.11] that a cartesian square of schemes:

$$\begin{array}{c} E \longrightarrow F \\ \downarrow & \downarrow^i \\ Y \stackrel{f}{\longrightarrow} X \end{array}$$

is cdh-distinguished if f is proper and i is a closed immersion such that, letting U be its open complement in X, the map $f^{-1}(U) \to U$ induced by f is an isomorphism.

The definition of [CD16, 7.2] of ℓ -adic complexes (which is equivalent to the definition of [BS15] by [CD16, 7.2.21]) yields the following:

Proposition 1.6.2. (cdh-descent) Let ℓ be a prime number. A cdh-distinguished squareof $\mathbb{Z}[1/\ell]$ -schemes:

$$\begin{array}{ccc} E & \stackrel{p}{\longrightarrow} & F \\ \downarrow^{i_E} & & \downarrow^i \\ Y & \stackrel{f}{\longrightarrow} & X \end{array}$$

induces an exact triangle:

$$\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X} \to f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} \oplus i_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,F} \to i_*p_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,E}.$$

The following formulas are consequences of [DDØ21, 5.1.7]. They are closely linked to the Rapoport-Zink complex [RZ82, 2.5] and are generalizations of the Mayer-Vietoris exact triangle for closed immersions [Ayo07, 2.2.31].

Proposition 1.6.3. Let $i: E \to Y$ be a closed immersion and let ℓ be a prime number invertible on Y. Assume that $E = \bigcup_{i \in I} E_i$ with I a finite set and $(E_i)_{i \in I}$ a family of closed subschemes of E. If $J \subseteq I$, write $E_J = \bigcup_{i \in J} E_i$ and write $i_J :$ $E_J \to Y$ the canonical closed immersion. Then, the canonical maps $(i_J)_* i_J^! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} \to$ $i_* i^! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ exhibit $i_* i^! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ as the colimit

$$\operatorname{colim}_{p\in (\Delta^{\operatorname{inj}})^{op}} \left(\bigoplus_{\substack{J\subseteq I\\|J|=p+1}} (i_J)_* i_J^! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} \right).$$

where Δ^{inj} is the category of finite ordered sets with morphisms the injective maps.

Proposition 1.6.4. Let $i : E \to Y$ be a closed immersion and let ℓ be a prime number invertible on Y. Assume that $E = \bigcup_{i \in I} E_i$ with I a finite set and $(E_i)_{i \in I}$ a family of closed subschemes of E. If $J \subseteq I$, write $E_J = \bigcup_{i \in J} E_i$ and write $i_J :$ $E_J \to Y$ the canonical closed immersion. Then, the canonical maps $i_*i^*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} \to$ $(i_J)_*i_J^*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ exhibit $i_*i^*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ as the colimit

$$\lim_{p \in (\Delta^{\operatorname{inj}})^{op}} \left(\bigoplus_{\substack{J \subseteq I \\ |J| = p+1}} (i_J)_* i_J^* \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} \right).$$

where Δ^{inj} is the category of finite ordered sets with morphisms the injective maps.

1.7. **Perverse sheaves.** In this paragraph, we recall the definition of the perverse t-structure over base scheme endowed with a dimension function following [Gab08]. First recall the definition of dimension functions (see for instance [BD17, 1.1.1]):

Definition 1.7.1. Let S be a scheme. A dimension function on S is a function δ : $S \to \mathbb{Z}$ such that for any immediate specialization y of a point x (i.e a specialization such that $\operatorname{codim}_{\overline{\{x\}}}(y) = 1$), we have $\delta(x) = \delta(y) + 1$.

Two dimension functions on a scheme differ by a Zariski-locally constant function. Moreover, if S is universally catenary and integral, $\delta(x) = \dim(X) - \operatorname{codim}_X(x)$ is a dimension function on S. Finally, any S-scheme of finite type $f: X \to S$ inherits a canonical dimension function by setting

$$\delta(x) = \delta(f(x)) + \text{tr.deg } k(x)/k(f(x)).$$

The auto-dual perversity $p_{1/2} : Z \mapsto -\delta(Z)$ induces two t-structures $[p_{1/2}]$ and $[p_{1/2}^+]$ on $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. In this paper, we only consider the t-structure $[p_{1/2}]$. We now recall its definition over a general base scheme.

Definition 1.7.2. (Compare with [Gab08, 2]) Let S be a scheme endowed with a dimension function and ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. For every point $x \in S$, let $i_x : \{x\} \to S$ be the inclusion. We define

- the full subcategory ${}^{\mathbf{p}}\mathcal{D}^{\leq 0}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ as the subcategory of those complexes K such that for any point $x \in S$, we have $i_x^*K \leq p_{1/2}(\overline{\{x\}}) = -\delta(x)$ with respect to the ordinary t-structure of $\mathcal{D}(k(x),\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.
- the full subcategory ${}^{\mathbf{p}}\mathcal{D}^{\geq 0}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ as the subcategory of those complexes K such that for any point $x \in S$, we have $i_x^! K \geq p_{1/2}(\overline{\{x\}}) = -\delta(x)$ with respect to the ordinary t-structure of $\mathcal{D}(k(x),\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

In the case when the ring of coefficients is $\mathbb{Z}/\ell\mathbb{Z}$, [Gab08, 6] implies that this defines a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}/\ell\mathbb{Z})$ and [Gab08, 8.2] implies that $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}/\ell\mathbb{Z})$ is a

sub-t-category of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}/\ell\mathbb{Z})$. The proofs of [Gab08] actually apply with coefficients \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} which defines a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_{c}^{b}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Alternatively, when the scheme S is assumed to be excellent, this is a t-structure for the same reasons as in [BBDG18, 2.2.9-2.2.17] (see [Mor18, 2.2] for a more precise explanation; the proof uses the absolute purity property [LYF14, XVI.3.1]). This alternative definition yields the following:

Proposition 1.7.3. Let S be a regular connected scheme and ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. The perverse t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_{lisse}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ which coincides with the ordinary t-structure shifted by $\delta(S)$. In particular, the heart of this t-structure is $Loc_S(\mathbb{Z}_\ell)[\delta(S)]$.

If n is an integer, we will denote by ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^n$ the n-th cohomology functor with respect to the perverse t-structure.

Definition 1.7.4. Let S be a scheme endowed with a dimension function and ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S. The category $\text{Perv}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of perverse sheaves is the heart of the perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_{c}^{b}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Finally, note that Propositions 1.2.2 and 1.7.3 imply that $\text{Loc}_S(\mathbb{Z}_\ell)[\delta(S)]$ is a weak Serre subcategory of $\text{Perv}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ when the scheme S is regular and connected.

2. Artin ℓ -adic complexes

In this section, we define abelian categories of Artin ℓ -adic sheaves and stable categories of Artin ℓ -adic complexes. We show that the ordinary t-structure on the derived category of ℓ -adic sheaves induces a t-structure on the category of Artin ℓ -adic complexes such that the heart of this t-structure is the category of Artin ℓ -adic sheaves.

2.1. Artin ℓ -adic sheaves and complexes.

Definition 2.1.1. Let S be a scheme and ℓ a prime number that is invertible on S.

- (1) We define the abelian category $\operatorname{Sh}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of smooth Artin ℓ -adic sheaves over S as the Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Loc}_S(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ made of those objects M such that for any geometric point ξ of S, the representation ξ^*M of $\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$ is of Artin origin.
- (2) We define the abelian category $\operatorname{Sh}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of Artin ℓ -adic sheaves over S as the category of constructible ℓ -adic sheaves such that there exists a stratification of S such that for any stratum T, the ℓ -adic sheaf $L|_{T}$ is smooth Artin.

Remark 2.1.2. Let S be a connected scheme and ℓ a prime number invertible on S. Let ξ be a geometric point of S. Then, the functor ξ^* induces an equivalence from $\operatorname{Sh}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ to $\operatorname{Rep}^A(\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S, \xi), \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^*$ by Proposition 1.5.4.

Definition 2.1.3. Let S be a scheme and ℓ a prime number which is invertible on S.

(1) The stable category $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ of Artin ℓ -adic complexes is the thick stable subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^b_c(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ generated by the complexes $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ with $f: X \to S$ finite.

ARTIN PERVERSE SHEAVES

- (2) The stable category $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of smooth Artin ℓ -adic complexes over S with coefficients \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} is the thick stable subcategory of $\mathcal{D}_{c}^{b}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ generated by the complexes $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ with $f: X \to S$ étale and finite.
- (3) The stable category $\mathcal{D}_{\mathrm{Ind}}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ (resp. $\mathcal{D}_{\mathrm{Ind}}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$) is the localizing subcategory of $\mathcal{D}(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ with the generators as in (1) (resp. (2)).

2.2. Description of smooth Artin ℓ -adic complexes.

Proposition 2.2.1. Let S be a scheme and ℓ a prime number which is invertible on S. The ordinary t-structure of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. The heart of this t-structure is equivalent to $\mathrm{Sh}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. In particular, the subcategory $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is the subcategory made of those complexes C of ℓ -adic sheaves such that for all integer n, the sheaf $H^n(C)$ is smooth Artin.

Proof. We can assume that S is connected. By Lemma 1.2.3 and Proposition 1.2.6, it suffices to show that

$$\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})\cap \mathrm{Sh}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})=\mathrm{Sh}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}).$$

Let $f: X \to S$ be étale and finite. Recall that f_* is t-exact with respect to the ordinary t-structure of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. Therefore, using Corollary 1.5.7, the object $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ lies in $\mathrm{Sh}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Thus, by Propositions 1.2.2, 1.2.6 and 1.4.3, the category $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is included in $\mathcal{D}^{b}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})_{\mathrm{Sh}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})}$ (see Definition 1.2.4). Thus, we have

$$\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \cap \mathrm{Sh}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \subseteq \mathrm{Sh}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$$

Take now M a smooth Artin ℓ -adic sheaf. It corresponds to a representation of Artin origin of $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(S,\xi)$ that we still denote by M.

Assume first that M is an Artin representation. Let G be a finite quotient of $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(S,\xi)$ through which M factors. Then, by Proposition 1.3.1 the complex $M \oplus M[1]$ of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G]$ -modules is quasi-isomorphic as a complex of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G]$ -modules to a complex

$$P = \dots \to 0 \to P_n \to P_{n-1} \to \dots \to P_0 \to 0 \to \dots$$

where each P_i is placed in degree -i and is isomorphic to $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G/H_1] \oplus \cdots \oplus \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G/H_m]$ for some subgroups H_1, \ldots, H_m of G.

The exact functor

$$\operatorname{Rep}(G, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \operatorname{Rep}(\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S, \xi), \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \operatorname{Sh}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$$

induces an exact functor

$$\mathcal{D}^b(\operatorname{Rep}(G,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)) \to \mathcal{D}(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell).$$

If H is a subgroup of G, the finite set G/H is endowed with an action of $\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$ and therefore corresponds to a finite locally constant sheaf on $S_{\acute{e}t}$, and therefore to a finite étale S-scheme $f: X \to S$. The image of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G/H]$ through the functor above is then $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$.

Thus, the object $M \oplus M[1]$, and therefore the object M itself, is in the thick category generated by the $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ with $f: X \to S$ finite and étale, which is $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Now, since $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is closed under extensions, any representation of Artin origin of $\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(S, \xi)$ lies in $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ which finishes the proof. \Box

Corollary 2.2.2. If k is a field and ℓ is a prime number that is distinct from the characteristic of k, then, the category $\mathcal{D}^A(k,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ is equivalent to the category of the complexes C in $\mathcal{D}^{b}(\mathrm{Sh}((BG_{k})_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))$ (see Remark 1.5.8) such that the sheaf $H^n(C)$ identifies with a representation of Artin origin for all n.

2.3. Six functors formalism. Artin ℓ -adic complexes are stable under some of the six functors of constructible ℓ -adic complexes. The results of this paragraph could also have been formulated with the categories $\mathcal{D}^A_{\text{Ind}}(-,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, replacing thick subcategories with localizing subcategories when needed. We will first show the following lemma which was proved by Ayoub and Zucker in the motivic setting and in the case of schemes of finite type over a field of characteristic 0 and was generalized to arbitrary schemes by Pepin Lehalleur.

Proposition 2.3.1. Let S be a scheme and ℓ a prime number which is invertible on S. The category $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ is the thick subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^b_c(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ generated by any of the following families of objects:

(1) $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ for $f: X \to S$ finite.

(2) $f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ for $f: X \to S$ étale. (3) $f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ for $f: X \to S$ quasi-finite.

Proof. We follow the proof of [Leh19b, 1.28].

Let $j: U \to S$ be an open immersion. Let $i: F \to S$ be the reduced complementationtary closed immersion. By localization (1.0.1), we have an exact triangle

$$j_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,U} \to \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,S} \to i_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,F}.$$

Thus, $j_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,U}$ is an Artin ℓ -adic complex.

Now, let $f : X \to S$ be quasi-finite. Using Zariski's Main Theorem [Gro67, 18.12.13] and the case of open immersions, we get that $f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ is an Artin ℓ -adic complex.

Let $\mathcal{C}(S)$ be the thick subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^b_c(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ generated by the $f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ with $f: X \to S$ étale. To prove the proposition, it suffices to show that if $g: Y \to S$ is finite, $q_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ is in $\mathcal{C}(S)$.

Notice that the fibered category $\mathcal{C}(-)$ is closed under the functor p^* for any morphism p and the functor q_1 for any quasi-finite morphism q.

Furthermore, when g is a universal homeomorphism, we have $g_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} = \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,S}$ by topological invariance of the small étale site (see [Sta23, 04DY]).

We now prove this claim by noetherian induction on S. We can assume that Yis reduced using our since using topological invariance of the small étale site once again, we have

$$g_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} = g'_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y_{\mathrm{red}}}$$

where Y_{red} is the reduction of Y and $g': Y_{\text{red}} \to S$ is the canonical morphism.

Moreover, there is an open immersion $j: U \to S$ such that the pullback map $g_U: Y \times_S U \to U$ is the composition of a finite étale map and a purely inseparable morphism. Thus, $j^*g_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} = (g_U)_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y\times_SU}$ lies in $\mathcal{C}(U)$.

Furthermore, if $i: Z \to S$ is the reduced complementary immersion $i^*g_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ is in $\mathcal{C}(Z)$ by noetherian induction and proper base change. Finally, by localization, it suffices to prove the lemma below.

Lemma 2.3.2. Keep the same notations, then, the functor i_* sends $\mathcal{C}(Z)$ to $\mathcal{C}(S)$.

Proof. We follow the proof of [Leh19b, 1.18(ii), 1.14(iii)]. It suffices to show that if $f: X \to Z$ is étale, $i_*f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ lies in $\mathcal{C}(S)$. As in the proof of [Leh19b, 1.14] we use Mayer-Vietoris exact triangles to reduce to the case where S = Spec(A), Z = Spec(A/I) and X = Spec(B) where A is a ring, I is an ideal of A and B is a standard étale A/I-algebra, *i.e.* B is of the form

$$B = (A/I)[x_1, \dots, x_n]/(P_1, \dots, P_n)$$

and the determinant of the matrix $(\frac{\partial P_i}{\partial x_j})_{1 \leq i,j \leq n}$ is invertible in A/I.

We can then lift the equations P_i to $\tilde{P}_i \in A[x_1, \ldots, x_n]$. The open subset V of S over which the map

$$\widetilde{f}: X' = \operatorname{Spec}(A[x_1, \dots, x_n]/(\widetilde{P}_1, \dots, \widetilde{P}_n)) \to \operatorname{Spec}(A) = S$$

is étale contains Z and \tilde{f} extends f. Since the functor $(V \to S)_!$ sends $\mathcal{C}(V)$ to $\mathcal{C}(S)$, we can replace S with V and therefore assume that \tilde{f} is étale.

We then have a localization triangle:

$$j_! j^* f_! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell, X'} \to f_! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell, X'} \to i_* f_! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell, X}.$$

Therefore, $i_* f_! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell, X}$ lies in $\mathcal{C}(S)$ as wanted.

Corollary 2.3.3. Let ℓ be a prime number. The six functors from $\mathcal{D}(-,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induce by restriction the following functors on $\mathcal{D}^{A}(-,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$:

- (1) f^* for any morphism f,
- (2) $f_!$ for any quasi-finite morphism f_i ,
- (3) A monoidal structure \otimes .

Remark 2.3.4. Notice that on the categories $\mathcal{D}_{Ind}^A(-,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, we have formal right adjoints to the three functors that we have described.

In the case of smooth Artin ℓ -adic complexes, we also have functors \otimes , f^* for any morphism f and $g_* = g_!$ for any finite étale morphism g. Since f^* and g_* are t-exact, they induce functors on the hearts. Furthermore, the monoidal structure on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces a monoidal structure on its heart: map two objects M and N to $H^0(M \otimes N)$. Using Lemma 1.5.6, corollary 1.5.7, and proposition 2.2.1, we identify those functors with classical constructions on categories of representations:

Proposition 2.3.5. Let $f: T \to S$ be a map between connected schemes and let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Let ξ' be a geometric point of T and let $\xi = f \circ \xi'$. Then,

(1) The functor $f^* : \mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}^{smA}(T, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces the forgetful functor

$$\pi_1^{\text{proce}}(f)^* : \operatorname{Rep}^A(\pi_1^{\text{proce}}(S,\xi), \mathbb{Z}_\ell)^* \to \operatorname{Rep}^A(\pi_1^{\text{proce}}(T,\xi'), \mathbb{Z}_\ell)^*$$

by restriction.

- (2) Furthermore, if f is finite and étale, the map induced by f_* by restriction is the induced representation functor $\operatorname{Ind}_{\pi'}^{\pi}$ where $\pi = \pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$ and $\pi' = \pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(T,\xi')$.
- (3) The monoidal structure of $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces by restriction a monoidal structure on $\operatorname{Rep}^{A}(\pi_{1}^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(S), \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{*}$ which is the usual monoidal structure.

2.4. Artin ℓ -adic complexes as stratified complexes of representations. In this paragraph, we show that for any Artin ℓ -adic complex, there is a stratification of the base scheme such that the restriction of the complex to any stratum is smooth Artin. We then deduce that the ordinary t-structure of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ whose heart is Sh^A (S, \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ}) .

Proposition 2.4.1. Let S be a scheme, ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S and M be an ℓ -adic complex. Then, the complex M is an Artin ℓ -adic complex if and only if there is a stratification of S such that for any stratum T, the complex $M|_T$ is a smooth Artin ℓ -adic complex.

Proof. To prove the only if part of the proposition, proceed by induction on the number of strata and use Corollary 2.3.3. We now prove the converse starting with a lemma:

Lemma 2.4.2. Let S be a scheme, ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S and M be an Artin ℓ -adic complex. Then, there is a dense open subscheme U of S such that $M|_U$ is smooth Artin.

Proof. Let \mathcal{C} be the full subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ made of those objects M such that there is a dense open subscheme U of S such that $M|_U$ is smooth Artin. Then, the subcategory \mathcal{C} is closed under finite (co)limits and retracts and is therefore thick.

Furthermore, if $f: W \to S$ is étale, there is a dense open immersion $j: U \to S$ such that the pull-back morphism $g: V \to U$ is finite étale.

Therefore, the complex

$$(f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,W})|_U = j^* f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,W} = g_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,V}$$

is smooth Artin. Thus, the complex $f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,W}$ lies in \mathcal{C} . Hence, using the description of generators of Proposition 2.3.1, the category \mathcal{C} is equivalent to $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. \Box

To finish the proof, we proceed by noetherian induction on S. Let M be an Artin ℓ -adic sheaf over S.

The lemma gives a dense open subscheme U of S such that $M|_U$ is smooth Artin. Using the induction hypothesis, there is a stratification \mathcal{S}_F of $F = S \setminus U$ such that the restriction of $M|_F$ to any stratum of \mathcal{S}_F is smooth Artin.

Corollary 2.4.3. Let S be a scheme, ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S. The canonical t-structure of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. The heart of this t-structure is equivalent to $\mathrm{Sh}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. In particular, the subcategory $\mathcal{D}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is the subcategory made of those complexes C of ℓ -adic sheaves such that for all integer n, the sheaf $H^{n}(C)$ is Artin.

Proof. Let M be an Artin ℓ -adic complex. Let $\tau_{\geq 0}$ be the truncation functor with respect to the ordinary t-structure on $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. To show that the canonical t-structure of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$, it suffices to show that $\tau_{\geq 0}M$ is Artin.

Let S be a stratification of S such that for all $T \in S$, the complex $M|_T$ is smooth Artin. Since the pullback to T functor is t-exact, we have $(\tau_{\geq 0}M)|_T = \tau_{\geq 0}(M|_T)$. The latter is smooth Artin by Proposition 2.2.1. Therefore, the complex $\tau_{\geq 0}M$ is Artin.

Furthermore, using Propositions 2.2.1 and 2.4.1, we get that any Artin ℓ -adic sheaf is an Artin ℓ -adic complex, in other words, we have

$$\mathrm{Sh}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell) \subseteq \mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell).$$

Finally, if M is an object of $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)^{\heartsuit}$, there exists a stratification \mathcal{S} of S such that for all $T \in \mathcal{S}$, the complex $M|_T$ is smooth Artin and thus, it is a smooth Artin ℓ -adic sheaf.

Corollary 2.4.4. Let S be a scheme, ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S. Let M be a constructible ℓ -adic complex with coefficients in \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} . Then, M is Artin if and only if $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}$ is Artin as an ℓ -adic complex with coefficients in \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} .

Proof. Since M is constructible, there is a stratification S of S such that for all $T \in S$, the complex $M|_T$ is lisse. Thus, for any integer n, the sheaf $H^n(M|_T)$ is lisse.

Refining the stratification if needed, we can assume the strata to be connected. Let ξ_T be a geometric point of T. Then, $H^n(M|_T)$ corresponds through the equivalence of Proposition 1.5.4 to an object of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(T,\xi_T),\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ that we denote by $E^n(M,T)$.

Since the functor $-\otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}$ is t-exact, we have

$$H^n(M|_T) \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_\ell} \mathbb{Q}_\ell = H^n((M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_\ell} \mathbb{Q}_\ell)|_T)$$

Since $M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}$ is Artin, refining the stratification further, we can assume the $H^n((M \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})|_T)$ to be smooth Artin ℓ -adic sheaves by Corollary 2.4.3.

Therefore, $E^n(M,T) \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_\ell} \mathbb{Q}_\ell$ is an object of $\operatorname{Rep}^A(\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(T,\xi_T), \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^*$. Thus, by Proposition 1.4.4, the representation $E^n(M,T)$ is an object of $\operatorname{Rep}^A(\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(T,\xi_T), \mathbb{Z}_\ell)^*$. Therefore, by Corollary 2.4.3, the complex M is Artin.

3. Perverse t-structure

From now on, all schemes are assumed to be excellent and endowed with a dimension function δ (see for instance [BD17, 1.1.1]). One of the main goals of this paper is to understand when the perverse t-structure can be restricted to Artin ℓ -adic complexes and to study Artin perverse sheaves when that is the case.

3.1. The smooth Artin case. Using Propositions 1.7.3 and 2.2.1, we have:

Proposition 3.1.1. Let S be a regular connected scheme and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Then, the perverse t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a tstructure on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. This t-structure coincides with the ordinary t-structure of $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ (see Proposition 2.2.1) shifted by $\delta(S)$. In particular, the heart of this t-structure is $\mathrm{Sh}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)[\delta(S)]$ which is equivalent to $\mathrm{Rep}^A(\pi_1^{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}}(S, \xi), \mathbb{Z}_\ell)^*$ if ξ is a geometric point of S.

In particular the case of fields translates to:

Corollary 3.1.2. Let k be a field and ℓ a prime number which is distinct from the characteristic of k. Then, the perverse t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_c^b(k, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a tstructure on $\mathcal{D}^A(k, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. This t-structure coincides with the ordinary t-structure of Corollary 2.2.2 shifted by $\delta(k)$. In particular, the heart of this t-structure is equivalent to $\operatorname{Rep}^A(G_k, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)^*$.

In the case where the base scheme is not connected but is still regular, we have:

Corollary 3.1.3. Let S be a regular scheme and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Then, the perverse t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. If T is a connected component of S, denote by $i_T: T \to S$ the clopen immersion. The heart of this t-structure is then the full subcategory made of those objects of the form

$$\bigoplus_{T \in \pi_0(S)} (i_T)_* L_T[\delta(T)]$$

where L_T is an object of $\operatorname{Sh}^{smA}(T, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Remark 3.1.4. Keeping the notations of Corollary 3.1.3, the heart of the perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is equivalent (as an abelian category) to $\mathrm{Sh}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Definition 3.1.5. Let S be a regular scheme. We define the category $\operatorname{Perv}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of smooth Artin perverse sheaves to be the heart of the perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

3.2. General properties. We have the following restriction property:

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Proposition 3.2.1. Let S be a scheme and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Let T be a locally closed subscheme of S. Then, if the perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, then, the perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_c^b(T, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(T, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$

Proof. We can assume that T is either an open subset or a closed subset of S.

Assume first that T is open and denote by $j: T \to S$ the canonical immersion. Let M be an Artin ℓ -adic complex over T. It suffices to show that ${}^{p}\tau_{\geq 0}M$ is an Artin ℓ -adic complex. But since the functor j^{*} is t-exact with respect to the perverse t-structure, we have

$${}^{p}\tau_{\geq 0}M = j^{*}({}^{p}\tau_{\geq 0}j_{!}M).$$

Therefore, using the stability properties of Artin ℓ -adic complexes of Corollary 2.3.3, the ℓ -adic complex ${}^{p}\tau_{\geq 0}M$ is Artin.

Assume now that T is closed and denote by $i: T \to S$ the canonical immersion. Let M be an Artin ℓ -adic complex over T. Since the functor i_* is t-exact with respect to the perverse t-structure, we have

$${}^{p}\tau_{\geq 0}M = i^{*}({}^{p}\tau_{\geq 0}i_{*}M).$$

Therefore, using the stability properties of Artin ℓ -adic complexes of Corollary 2.3.3, the ℓ -adic complex ${}^{p}\tau_{\geq 0}M$ is Artin.

Definition 3.2.2. Let S be a scheme and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Assume that the perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. Then, we define the category $\operatorname{Perv}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ of Artin perverse sheaves to be the heart of this t-structure.

The following properties are analogous to the classical properties of perverse sheaves:

Proposition 3.2.3. Let ℓ be a prime number. Assume that all schemes below are defined over $\mathbb{Z}[1/\ell]$ and that the perverse t-structures on their categories of constructible ℓ -adic sheaves induce t-structures on their categories of Artin ℓ -adic sheaves.

(1) Let $f: T \to S$ be a quasi-finite morphism of schemes. Then, the functor

$${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{0}f_{!}: \operatorname{Perv}^{A}(T, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \operatorname{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$$

is right exact.

Furthermore, if f is affine, ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{0}f_{!} = f_{!}$ and this functor is exact.

(2) Let $g: T \to S$ be a morphism of schemes. Assume that $\dim(g) \leq d$. Then, the functor

$${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{d}g^{*}: \operatorname{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \operatorname{Perv}^{A}(T, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$$

is right exact.

Furthermore, if f is étale, ${}^{P}H^{0}f^{*} = f^{*}$ and this functor is exact. (3) Consider a cartesian square of schemes

$$\begin{array}{c} Y \xrightarrow{g} X \\ \downarrow^{q} & \downarrow^{l} \\ T \xrightarrow{f} S \end{array}$$

such that p is quasi-finite and $\dim(f) \leq d$. Then we have a canonical equivalence:

$${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{d}f^{*}({}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{0}p_{!}) \rightarrow {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{0}q_{!}({}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{d}g^{*}).$$

(4) Let S be a scheme. Let $i: F \to C$ be a closed immersion and $j: U \to C$ be the open complement. Let M be a perverse ℓ -adic sheaf on S. Then, we have an exact sequence of perverse Artin ℓ -adic sheaves:

 $0 \to i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}i^*M \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^0j_!j^*M \to M \to i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^0i^*M \to 0.$

When j is affine, we have an exact sequence of perverse Artin ℓ -adic sheaves:

$$0 \to i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}i^*M \to j_!j^*M \to M \to i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^0i^*M \to 0.$$

Proof. (1) and (2) follow from the analogous properties of perverse sheaves [BBDG18, 4.1.2, 4.2.4], from the stability properties of Artin ℓ -adic complexes of Corollary 2.3.3 and from general properties of t-structures described in [BBDG18, 1.3.17]. Note that [BBDG18, 4.1.2] still applies in this general setting (and not only when the base scheme is of finite type over a field) since it follows follows from the absolute purity property of [AGV73, XIV.3.1] which has been generalized by Gabber in [LYF14, XV.1.1.2] in the case of quasi-excellent base schemes.

Property (3) follows from base change, from properties (1) and (2) and from [BBDG18, 1.3.17]. Finally, property (4) follows from [BBDG18, 1.4.19] which is the analogous property on perverse sheaves and from (1) and (2). \Box

3.3. Construction of Artin perverse sheaves over schemes of dimension 2 or less. To prove the main theorem of this paper, we first need a few lemmas.

Lemma 3.3.1. Let k be a field, let ℓ be a prime number distinct from the characteristic of k and let $p: E \to \text{Spec}(k)$ be a proper morphism. Let

$$E \to \pi_0(E/k) \xrightarrow{q} \operatorname{Spec}(k)$$

be the Stein factorization of p. Then, $R^0 p_* \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X} = q_* \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,\pi_0(E/k)}$.

Proof. For any scheme X and any ring of coefficients R,

$$H^0_{\acute{e}t}(X,R) = R^{\pi_0(X)}.$$

The lemma follows from this result applied to $R = \mathbb{Z}/\ell^n \mathbb{Z}$ for all n.

One of our main tools will be the following lemma, which is closely linked to the Rapoport-Zink spectral sequence [RZ82, 2.8].

Lemma 3.3.2. Let ℓ be a prime number. Consider a diagram of $\mathbb{Z}[1/\ell]$ -schemes:

$$\begin{array}{c} E \xrightarrow{p} F \\ \downarrow_i \\ Y \end{array}$$

where p is a proper map and i is a closed immersion of a simple normal crossing divisor E into a regular scheme Y.

Write $E = \bigcup E_i$ where I is a finite set and for all $J \subseteq I$, the closed subscheme

 $E_J := \bigcap_{i \in J} E_i \text{ of } Y \text{ is a regular subscheme of codimension } |J|.$ For all $J \subseteq I$, let $p_J : E_J \to F$ be the natural map. Then, there is a spectral sequence such that:

$$\mathbf{E}_{1}^{p,q} = \begin{cases} \bigoplus_{\substack{J \subseteq I \\ |J| = p+1 \\ 0}} {}^{\mathbf{p}} H^{q-p-2} \left((p_{J})_{*} \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,E_{J}} \right) (-p-1) & \text{ if } p \geqslant 0 \\ \implies {}^{\mathbf{p}} H^{p+q} (p_{*} i^{!} \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}). \end{cases}$$

Proof. Denote $i_J: E_J \to Y$ the inclusion. Proposition 1.6.3 asserts that $i_*i^!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ is the colimit:

$$\operatorname{colim}_{p \in \Delta^{inj}} \left(\bigoplus_{\substack{J \subseteq I \\ |J| = p+1}} (i_J)_* i_J^! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y} \right).$$

where Δ^{inj} is the category of finite ordered sets with morphisms the injective maps.

We can truncate (naively) this diagram in each degree to write $i_*i!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ as the colimit of a sequential diagram $(M_p)_{p \ge 0}$ such that the cofiber of the map $M_{p-1} \rightarrow$ M_p is

$$M(p-1,p) := \bigoplus_{\substack{J \subseteq I \\ |J|=p+1}} (i_J)_* i_J^! \mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}.$$

Pulling back to E, pushing forward to F and using the absolute purity [LYF14, XV.1.1.2], we can write $p_*i^!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}$ as the colimit of a sequential diagram $(N_p)_{p\geq 0}$ such that the cofiber of the map $N_{p-1} \to N_p$ is

$$N(p-1,p) := \bigoplus_{\substack{J \subseteq I \\ |J| = p+1}} (p_J)_* \mathbb{Z}_{\ell, E_J}(-p-1)[-2p-2].$$

But by [Lur17, 1.2.2.14] such a sequential diagram gives rise to a spectral sequence such that

$$\mathbf{E}_{1}^{p,q} = \bigoplus_{\substack{J \subseteq I \\ |J|=p+1}} {}^{\mathbf{p}} H^{p+q}(N(p-1,p)) \Longrightarrow {}^{\mathbf{p}} H^{p+q}(p_{*}i^{!}\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}).$$

Finally,

$${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{p+q}(N(p-1,p)) = {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{q-p-2}((p_J)_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,E_J})(-p-1)$$

which finishes the proof.

The following consequence of this lemma will be useful:

Corollary 3.3.3. Keep the notations of the lemma. Take the convention that $\delta(F) = \dim(F)$. Then,

- (1) ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^k(p_*i^!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y})$ vanishes for k=0,1.
- (2) Write $I_0 = \{i \in I \mid \delta(p_i(E_i)) = 0\}$. If $i \in I_0$, let

$$E_i \to Z_i \stackrel{q_i}{\to} F.$$

be the Stein factorization of p_i , so that the map q_i is finite. Then,

- (a) The image of q_i is a finite subset of closed points of codimension $\delta(F)$ of F if $i \in I_0$.
- of F if $i \in I_0$. (b) We have ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^2(p_*i^!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Y}) = \bigoplus_{i\in I_0} (q_i)_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,Z_i}(-1).$

Proof. Let $J \subseteq I$ be a finite subset. We denote by W_J the image of E_J through the map p and by $x_J \in F$ the generic point of W_J .

Notice first that if $x \in F$, we have

$$\delta(x) \ge \dim(F) - \operatorname{codim}_F(x) \ge \dim(\{x\}).$$

Applying this to the point of x_i for $i \in I_0$ proves (2)(a). We now prove the remaining statements.

Letting y be a closed point of E_J of maximal codimension, We have

$$\delta(E_J) - \dim(E_J) = \delta(E_J) - \operatorname{codim}_{E_J}(x) = \delta(y) \ge \delta(p(y)) \ge 0$$

Since the relative dimension of p_J is at most dim (E_J) , using [BBDG18, 4.2.4] and the fact that \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ,E_J} lies in degree $\delta(E_J)$ with respect to the perverse t-structure, we get that ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^q((p_J)_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,E_J})$ vanishes if q is a negative integer.

Therefore, the only non-vanishing term of the spectral sequence of Lemma 3.3.2 such that $p + q \leq 2$ is the term

$$\mathbf{E}_{1}^{0,2} = \bigoplus_{i \in I} {}^{\mathbf{p}} H^{0}((p_{i})_{*} \mathbb{Z}_{\ell, E_{i}})(-1).$$

Now, if $i \notin I_0$, we claim that ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^0((p_i)_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,E_i})$ vanishes.

Assume first that W_i is of positive dimension. Then, no fibers of p_i can be of dimension dim (E_i) because the map $E_i \to W_i$ is surjective and because E_i is irreducible. Therefore, the relative dimension of p_i is at most dim $(E_J) - 1$ and therefore, the sheaf ${}^{\mathrm{P}}H^0((p_i)_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,E_i})$ vanishes.

In the case where $W_i = \{x_i\}$, we get as before that

$$\delta(E_J) - \dim(E_J) \ge \delta(x_i) > 0$$

and therefore, the sheaf ${}^{p}H^{0}((p_{i})_{*}\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,E_{i}})$ vanishes. The corollary then follows from Lemma 3.3.1.

The following is the main result of our paper:

Theorem 3.3.4. Assume that S is an excellent scheme of dimension 2 or less and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S, then, the perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Proof. We can assume that S is reduced and connected. We proceed by noetherian induction on S. If $\dim(S) = 0$, the result follows from Corollary 3.1.2.

Assume now that dim(S) > 0. Using Lemma 3.3.5 below, it suffices to show that if $j: U \to S$ is a dense affine open immersion with U regular, letting $i: F \to S$ be the reduced closed complementary immersion, for any object M of $\text{Perv}^A(F, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, any object N of $\text{Perv}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ and any map

$$f: M \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N),$$

the kernel K of f is an Artin ℓ -adic complex on F.

If dim(S) = 1, the scheme F is 0-dimensional. Thus, Corollary 3.1.2 implies that the subcategory $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(F, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\operatorname{Perv}(F, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is Serre. Since K is a subobject of M, it is an object of $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(F, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ and thus it is an Artin ℓ -adic complex.

If $\dim(S) = 2$, the scheme F is of dimension at most 1.

Let $Z \to F$ be a closed immersion such that the open complementary immersion is affine. Then, Z is of dimension at most 0 and therefore, by Corollary 3.1.2, the subcategory $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is Serre. Furthermore, by Lemma 3.3.10 below, the perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N))$ is Artin.

Finally, using Lemma 3.3.8 below, those two facts imply together that K is an Artin perverse sheaf over F which finishes the proof.

Lemma 3.3.5. Let S be a reduced excellent scheme and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Assume that:

- (i) The perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(F, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ where F is any closed subscheme of S which is of positive codimension.
- (ii) If $j: U \to S$ is a dense affine open immersion with U regular, letting $i: F \to S$ be the reduced closed complementary immersion, for any object M of $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(F,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$, any object N of $\operatorname{Perv}^{smA}(U,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ and any map

$$f: M \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N)$$

the kernel of f is an Artin ℓ -adic complex over F.

Then, the perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

Remark 3.3.6. The notation $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(F, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ in (ii) makes sense because of (i) and the notation $\operatorname{Perv}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ makes sense because of Corollary 3.1.3.

Proof. Step 1: Let $j: U \to S$ be a dense affine open immersion with U regular. Let $i: F \to S$ be the reduced closed complementary immersion. Let M be an object of $\operatorname{Perv}^A(F, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, let N be an object of $\operatorname{Perv}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. Recall that the ℓ -adic complex i_*M is a perverse sheaf over S. Furthermore, recall that because of the Affine Lefschetz Theorem, the ℓ -adic complex $j_!N$ is also a perverse sheaf over S. Let $f: i_*M \to j_!N$ be an arbitrary morphism of perverse sheaves. In this step we prove that the perverse sheaves $\ker(f)$ and $\operatorname{coker}(f)$ are Artin ℓ -adic complexes.

30

The localization triangle (1.0.1) applied to j_*N yields an exact triangle:

$$j_!N \to j_*N \to i_*i^*j_*N$$

which, since j is affine (and therefore therefore, the functors $j_{!}$ and j_{*} are perverse t-exact by the Affine Lefschetz Theorem), yields an exact sequence:

$$0 \to i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N) \to j_!N \to j_*N.$$

Since $j^*i_* = 0$, we have $\text{Hom}(i_*M, j_*N) = 0$, thus, the map f factors through the pervserse sheaf $i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N)$. Since the functor i_* is perverse t-exact, we get

$$\ker(f) = i_* \ker\left(M \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N)\right).$$

Therefore, our second assumption implies that the ℓ -adic complex ker(f) is Artin. To finish the first step, let C be the kernel of the map $j_!N \to \operatorname{coker}(f)$. We have exact triangles:

$$\ker(f) \to i_* M \to C$$
$$C \to j_! N \to \operatorname{coker}(f).$$

The first exact triangle shows that C is an Artin ℓ -adic complex. Thus, using the second exact triangle, $\operatorname{coker}(f)$ is also an Artin ℓ -adic complex.

Step 2: We now prove the lemma. First notice that since $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ is a subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^b_c(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, the objects of $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ are bounded with respect to the perverse t-structure. Thus, by dévissage, it suffices to show that if P is an Artin ℓ -adic complex and n is an integer, then, the ℓ -adic complex ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^n(P)$ is Artin.

Using Lemma 2.4.2 we have $j: U \to S$ a dense open immersion such that j^*P is a smooth Artin ℓ -adic complex. Shrinking U if needed, we can assume that U is regular since S is excellent. Using Lemma 3.3.7 below, we may assume that j is affine.

Let $i: F \to S$ be the reduced complementary closed immersion of j. The localization triangle (1.0.1) yields an exact sequence:

$$i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{n-1}(i^*P) \xrightarrow{\alpha} j_!{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^n(j^*P) \xrightarrow{} {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^n(P) \xrightarrow{} i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^n(i^*P) \xrightarrow{\beta} j_!{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{n+1}(j^*P)$$

which yields an exact triangle:

$$\operatorname{coker}(\alpha) \to {}^{\operatorname{p}}H^n(P) \to \operatorname{ker}(\beta).$$

For any integer m, the ℓ -adic complex ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^m(i^*P)$ lies in $\operatorname{Perv}^A(F, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ by our first assumption and the ℓ -adic complex ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^m(j^*P)$ lies in $\operatorname{Perv}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ by Corollary 3.1.3. Thus, using our first step, the ℓ -adic complexes $\operatorname{coker}(\alpha)$ and $\operatorname{ker}(\beta)$ are Artin and therefore, so is the ℓ -adic complex ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^n(P)$ which finishes the proof. \Box

Lemma 3.3.7. Let S be a (noetherian) scheme. Let $U \subseteq S$ be an open subscheme. Then, there is a dense open subscheme V of U such that the map $V \to S$ is affine.

Proof. The proof of the existence of affine stratifications on noetherian schemes of [Sta23, 0F2X] provides a dense open affine subscheme W of S such that the immersion $W \to S$ is affine. Since a composition of affine morphisms is affine, we may replace S with W. Therefore we can assume that S is an affine scheme. By the prime avoidance lemma [Sta23, 00DS], there is an affine open V contained in U which contains the generic points of S. The map $V \to S$ is affine and thus, we are done.

Lemma 3.3.8. Let F be a reduced excellent scheme and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on F. Assume that the t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_c^b(F, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(F, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. Let M be an Artin perverse sheaf over F, let P be a perverse sheaf over F and let $f: M \to P$ be an arbitrary map of perverse sheaves.

Assume that for any reduced closed immersion $\iota : Z \to F$ such that the open complementary immersion is dense and affine,

(i) The subcategory $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is Serre.

(ii) The perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*P)$ over Z is an Artin perverse sheaf.

Then, the kernel of f is an Artin perverse sheaf over F.

Remark 3.3.9. The notation $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ in (i) makes sense by Proposition 3.2.1.

Proof. Let K be the kernel of f.

Using Lemma 2.4.2 we have $\gamma: V \to F$ a dense open immersion such that $\gamma^* M$ is a smooth Artin ℓ -adic complex. Shrinking V if needed, we can assume that V is regular and that $\gamma^* P$ is a lisse perverse sheaf. Using Lemma 3.3.7, we may assume that γ is affine.

Let $\iota : Z \to F$ be the complementary closed immersion of γ . By splitting the last exact sequence of Proposition 3.2.3(4) in two pieces, we have commutative diagrams with exact rows in the category of perverse sheaves over F:

$$0 \longrightarrow \iota_*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*M) \longrightarrow \gamma_!\gamma^*M \longrightarrow Q \longrightarrow 0$$
$$\downarrow_{\iota_*\iota} \qquad \qquad \qquad \downarrow_{\gamma_!\upsilon} \qquad \qquad \qquad \downarrow_g$$
$$0 \longrightarrow \iota_*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*P) \longrightarrow \gamma_!\gamma^*P \longrightarrow R \longrightarrow 0$$
$$0 \longrightarrow Q \longrightarrow M \longrightarrow \iota_*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^0(\iota^*M) \longrightarrow 0$$
$$\downarrow_g \qquad \qquad \qquad \downarrow_f \qquad \qquad \qquad \downarrow_{\iota_*w}$$
$$0 \longrightarrow R \longrightarrow P \longrightarrow \iota_*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^0(\iota^*P) \longrightarrow 0$$

which, by the snake lemma, yield exact sequences:

$$0 \to \iota_* \ker(u) \xrightarrow{a} \gamma_! \ker(v) \to \ker(g) \xrightarrow{b} \iota_* \operatorname{coker}(u)$$
$$0 \to \ker(g) \to K \xrightarrow{c} \iota_* \ker(w).$$

Since by Corollary 3.1.3, the subcategory $\operatorname{Perv}^{smA}(V, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\mathcal{D}_{\operatorname{lisse}}(V, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{\heartsuit}$ is Serre, the lisse perverse sheaf ker(v) is smooth Artin.

Moreover, the perverse sheaves ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{0}(\iota^{*}M)$, ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*}M)$ and ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*}P)$ are Artin perverse sheaves over Z (the last one is by our second assumption).

Our first assumption being that the subcategory $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is Serre, the perverse sheaves $\ker(w)$, $\ker(u)$ and $\operatorname{coker}(u)$ over Z are also Artin. Since we have an exact triangle:

$$\iota_* \ker(u) \xrightarrow{a} \gamma_! \ker(v) \to \operatorname{coker}(a),$$

the perverse sheaf coker(a) is therefore Artin.

Furthermore, using [BBDG18, 1.4.17.1], the exact and fully faithful functor

$$\iota_* \colon \operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_\ell) \to \operatorname{Perv}(F, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$$

maps $\operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ into a Serre subcategory. Thus, the image of $\ker(g)$ through b is of the form ι_*C , where C is a sub-perverse sheaf of $\operatorname{coker}(u)$ over Z and is thus an Artin perverse sheaf over Z using our first assumption again.

Likewise, the image of K through c is of the form $\iota_* K'$ where K' is a sub-perverse sheaf of ker(w) and is therefore an Artin perverse sheaf over Z.

Thus, we get exact triangles:

$$\operatorname{coker}(a) \to \operatorname{ker}(g) \to \iota_* C$$

$$\ker(g) \to K \to \iota_* K'$$

Thus, the perverse sheaf $\ker(g)$ is Artin and therefore, so is K which finishes the proof.

Lemma 3.3.10. Let S be a reduced excellent connected scheme of dimension 2 and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Let $j: U \to S$ be a dense affine open immersion with U regular. Let $i: F \to S$ be the reduced closed complementary immersion. Let N be an object of Perv^{smA} (U, \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ}) . Let $\iota: Z \to F$ be a reduced closed immersion of positive codimension. Then, the perverse sheaf $^{P}H^{-1}(\iota^{*P}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N))$ is Artin.

Proof. We use the convention that $\delta(S) = 2$. Using Corollary 2.4.4, it suffices to show the same result with coefficients \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} . Furthermore, replacing S with the closure of a connected component of U, we may assume that U is connected. Thus, since U is regular, Proposition 3.1.1 ensures that

$$\operatorname{Perv}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) = \operatorname{Sh}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})[2].$$

Step 1: We show that we can assume that the image of N through the equivalence of Proposition 1.5.4 is an Artin representation of $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(U)$ (throughout this proof, we omit the choice of a base point to lighten the notations).

Assume the result for the objects whose image through the equivalence of Proposition 1.5.4 is an Artin representation. Let $A_0 = \operatorname{Rep}^A(\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(U), \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ and if $n \ge 0$ is an integer, let A_{n+1} be the full subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(U), \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ whose objects are the extensions of objects of A_n in $\operatorname{Rep}(\pi_1^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(U), \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$. There is a non-negative integer n such that the image of N through the equivalence of Proposition 1.5.4 is an object of A_n .

We now prove the result by induction on n. If n = 0, this is our assumption. Suppose that the result holds for an integer n. Let N be an object of A_{n+1} . We have an exact sequence

$$0 \to N' \to N \to N'' \to 0$$

where N' and N'' are objects of A_n .

This exact sequence yields an exact triangle:

$$i^*j_*N' \to i^*j_*N \to i^*j_*N''.$$

Since $i^* j_*$ is of cohomological amplitude [-1, 0], this yields an exact sequence:

$$0 \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N') \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N) \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N'').$$

Letting C be the image of the map ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N) \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N'')$ and C' be the cokernel of the map $C \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N'')$, we get two exact triangles:

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N') \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N) \to C$$
$$C \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N'') \to C'.$$

Applying ι^* to the first exact triangle yields an exact sequence:

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N')) \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N)) \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*}C)$$

Furthermore, since ι^* has cohomological amplitude [-1, 0], the second exact triangle yields an exact sequence:

$$0 \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*C) \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N''))$$

Since Z is at most 0-dimensional, Corollary 3.1.2 implies that $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(Z, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ is a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$. Furthermore, by our induction hypothesis, the perverse sheaves ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N''))$ and ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N'))$ are objects of $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(Z, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$. Thus, so is ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*}C)$ and therefore, so is ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N))$.

Step 2: In this step we prove that we can assume S to be normal and that we can assume that $N = \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}[2]$.

Since the category $\operatorname{Rep}^{A}(\pi_{1}^{\operatorname{pro\acute{e}t}}(U), \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ is semisimple by Maschke's lemma, the the image of N through the equivalence of Proposition 1.5.4 is a direct factor of an object whose image is of the form

$$\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}[G_1] \bigoplus \cdots \bigoplus \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}[G_n]$$

where G_1, \ldots, G_n are finite quotients of $\pi_1^{\text{proét}}(U)$.

Thus, N is a direct factor of an object of the form $f_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,V}$ where $f: V \to U$ is a finite étale map. Therefore, we can assume that $N = f_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,V}$.

Let \overline{V} be the relative normalization of S in V. Since S is excellent and noetherian, it is Nagata by [Sta23, 033Z]. Thus, [Sta23, 0AVK] ensures that the structural map $\nu: \overline{V} \to S$ is finite. Furthermore, the scheme \overline{V} is normal by [Sta23, 035L].

Consider the following commutative diagram

$$V \xrightarrow{\gamma} \overline{V} \xleftarrow{\psi} F' \\ \downarrow^{f} \qquad \downarrow^{\nu} \qquad \downarrow^{\nu_{F}} \\ U \xrightarrow{j} S \xleftarrow{i} F$$

made of cartesian squares (the left-hand square is cartesian by construction of the relative normalization). In particular, the map ψ is a closed immersion and the map γ is the open complementary immersion.

Now, we have $i^* i N$

$${}^{*}j_{*}N = i^{*}j_{*}f_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,V}[2] = i^{*}\nu_{*}\gamma_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,V}[2] = (\nu_{F})_{*}\psi^{*}\gamma_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,V}[2].$$

Since ν_F is finite, it is perverse t-exact. Thus,

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N)) = {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*(\nu_F)_*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\psi^*\gamma_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,V}[2])).$$

Let $\nu_Z : Z' \to Z$ be the pullback of ν_F along the map ι and $\varepsilon : Z' \to F'$ be the structural map. Since ν_Z is finite, we get

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*}(\nu_{F})_{*}{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\psi^{*}\gamma_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,V}[2])) = (\nu_{Z})_{*}{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\varepsilon^{*\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\psi^{*}\gamma_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,V}[2])).$$

Therefore, we can replace S with \overline{V} , U with V, Z with Z' in order to assume that S is normal and that $N = \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}[2]$.

Step 3: In this step, we study the singularities of S. We want to prove that the perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathrm{p}}H^{1}(i^{*}j_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}))$ is Artin.

First, notice that if $Y \to S$ is a closed immersion and $Z \cap Y = \emptyset$, letting $\xi \colon F \setminus (Y \cap F) \to F$ be the canonical open immersion, and letting $u \colon Z \to F \setminus (Y \cap F)$

be the canonical closed immersion, we have $\iota = \xi \circ u$. Since ξ is an open immersion, we get

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathbf{p}}H^{1}(i^{*}j_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U})) = {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(u^{*\mathbf{p}}H^{1}(\xi^{*}i^{*}j_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U})).$$

Notice that the immersion $i \circ \xi$ induces a closed immersion $F \setminus (Y \cap F) \to S \setminus Y$. We can therefore remove any closed subset which does not intersect Z from S without changing ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathrm{p}}H^{1}(i^{*}j_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}))$.

Since S is normal, we can therefore assume that its singular locus is contained in Z. Moreover, we can assume that the irreducible components of F only cross at points of Z.

Since S is excellent, Lipman's Theorem on embedded resolution of singularities applies (see [Sta23, 0BGP,0BIC,0ADX] for precise statements). We get a cdh-distinguished square:

$$\begin{array}{c} E \xrightarrow{i_E} \widetilde{S} \\ \downarrow^p & \downarrow^f \\ F \xrightarrow{i} S \end{array}$$

such that the map f induces an isomorphism over $S \setminus Z$, the scheme \widetilde{S} is regular and the subscheme E of \widetilde{S} is a simple normal crossing divisor. By removing a closed subset from S which does not intersect Z, we can assume that crossings only occur over Z.

Let $\gamma: U \to \widetilde{S}$ be the complementary open immersion of i_E . We have $j = f \circ \gamma$. Therefore, we get

$$i^*j_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U} = i^*f_*\gamma_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U} = p_*i^*_E\gamma_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}.$$

We have a localization exact triangle:

$$(i_E)_* i_E^! \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,\widetilde{S}} \to \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,\widetilde{S}} \to \gamma_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}.$$

Applying $p_*i_E^*$, we get an exact triangle:

$$p_*i_E^! \mathbb{Q}_{\ell \widetilde{S}} \to p_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E} \to i^* j_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}.$$

Since E is a simple normal crossing divisor, Corollary 3.3.3 ensures that the perverse sheaf ${}^{p}H^{1}(p_{*}i_{E}^{!}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,\widetilde{S}})$ is trivial. Furthermore, since p induces an isomorphism over $F \setminus Z$, the only irreducible components of E whose image through p is 0-dimensional have their image contained in Z. Therefore, Corollary 3.3.3 also ensures that

$$^{\mathcal{D}}H^2(p_*i^!_E\mathbb{Q}_{\ell \widetilde{S}}) = \iota_*M$$

where M is a perverse sheaf over Z.

Hence, we have an exact sequence:

$$0 \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}) \to H^1(i^*j_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}) \stackrel{\alpha}{\to} \iota_*M.$$

Using [BBDG18, 1.4.17.1], the exact and fully faithful functor

$$\iota_* : \operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \operatorname{Perv}(F, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

maps $\operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ to a Serre subcategory. Thus, the image of $H^1(i^*j_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U})$ through α is of the form ι_*M' where M' is an object of $\operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$.

Thus, we have an exact triangle:

$${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}) \to H^1(i^*j_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}) \to \iota_*M'.$$

Applying ι^* , we get an exact triangle:

$$\iota^{*\mathrm{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}) \to \iota^*H^1(i^*j_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}) \to M'.$$

Since M' is placed in degree 0, we get:

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*}H^{1}(i^{*}j_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U})) = {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^{*\mathbf{p}}H^{1}(p_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E})).$$

Step 4: In this step we compute ${}^{p}H^{1}(p_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E})$ and we finish the proof.

There is a finite set I and regular 1-dimensional closed subschemes E_i of \widetilde{X} for $i \in I$, such that $E = \bigcup_{i \in I} E_i$. Chose a total order on the finite set I. If i < j, write $E_{ij} = E_i \cap E_j$. Consider for $J \subseteq I$ of cardinality at most 2 the obvious diagram:

$$E_J \xrightarrow[p_J]{u_{E_J}} E$$

Proposition 1.6.4 then yields an exact triangle:

$$\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E} \to \bigoplus_{i \in I} (u_{E_i})_* (u_{E_i})^* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E} \to \bigoplus_{i < j} (u_{E_{ij}})_* (u_{E_{ij}})^* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}.$$

Applying p_* , we get an exact triangle:

$$p_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E} \to \bigoplus_{i \in I} (p_i)_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i} \to \bigoplus_{i < j} (p_{ij})_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_{ij}}.$$

Since crossings only occur over Z, the map p_{ij} factors through Z for any i < j. Write $p_{ij} = \iota \circ \pi_{ij}$. The morphism π_{ij} is then finite.

Let

$$I_0 = \{ i \in I \mid \delta(p(E_i)) = 0 \}.$$

If $i \in I \setminus I_0$, we have $\delta(E_i) = 1$ and p_i is finite. If $i \in I_0$, the map p_i factors through Z and we can write $p_i = \iota \circ \pi_i$. Finally, notice that $\delta(Z) = 0$ and thus, for any i < j, we have $\delta(E_{ij}) = 0$. Hence, we get an exact sequence:

$$0 \to \iota_* P \to {}^{\mathbf{p}} H^1(p_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}) \to R \oplus \iota_* Q \to 0$$

where

$$P = \operatorname{coker}\left(\bigoplus_{i \in I_0} {}^{\mathrm{p}} H^0((\pi_i)_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell, E_i}) \to \bigoplus_{i < j} (\pi_{ij})_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell, E_{ij}}\right),$$
$$Q = \bigoplus_{i \in J} {}^{\mathrm{p}} H^1((\pi_i)_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell, E_i}) \text{ and } R = \bigoplus_{i \in I \setminus I_0} (p_i)_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell, E_i}[1].$$

Therefore, we get an exact triangle:

/

$$\iota_*P \to {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}) \to R \oplus \iota_*Q$$

which yields an exact triangle:

$$P \to \iota^{*p} H^1(p_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}) \to \iota^* R \oplus Q_{\ell,E}$$

Thus, the perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}))$ over Z is a subobject of ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*R)$. Now, we have

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*R) = \bigoplus_{i \in I \setminus I_0} {}^{\mathbf{p}}H^0((q_i)_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i^Z})$$

where for all $i \in I \setminus J$, the map $q_i : E_i^Z \to Z$ is the pullback of p_i along ι . Since p_i is finite, so is q_i and thus, we have

$${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{0}((q_{i})_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_{i}^{Z}}) = (q_{i})_{*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_{i}^{Z}}.$$

Thus, the perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*R)$ is Artin. Hence, the perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(\iota^*H^1(i^*j_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}))$ is also Artin.

3.4. The case of 3-folds with real closed or separably closed closed points. In the case of 3-folds, we will show that the perverse t-structure can be restricted to Artin ℓ -adic complexes in some cases, and that it is impossible in other cases.

Proposition 3.4.1. Let S be an excellent 3-fold such that all the closed points of S have a separably closed or real closed residue field and ℓ be a prime number (which is automatically invertible on S). Then, the perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

Remark 3.4.2. In the proof, we only use that the residue fields of the closed points of S have finite absolute Galois groups. Recall that a field has a finite absolute Galois group if and only if it is separably closed or real closed.

Proof. The proof is almost the same as the proof of Theorem 3.3.4 but we need to use Lemma 3.4.3 below.

Using Lemma 3.3.5, it suffices to show that if $j: U \to S$ is a dense affine open immersion with U regular, letting $i: F \to S$ be the reduced closed complementary immersion, for any object M of $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(F, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$, any object N of $\operatorname{Perv}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ and any map

$$f: M \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N),$$

the kernel K of f is an Artin ℓ -adic complex on F.

The scheme F is of dimension at most 2. Let $Z \to F$ be a closed immersion such that the open complementary immersion is dense and affine. Then, Z is of dimension at most 1 and therefore, Lemma 3.4.3(2) below ensures that the subcategory $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\operatorname{Perv}(Z, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is Serre.

Lemma 3.3.8 shows that to finish the proof, it suffices to prove that the perverse sheaf ${}^{p}H^{-1}(\iota^{*p}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N))$ is Artin.

Using Lemma 3.4.3(1) below, we only need to prove that if η is a generic point of Z, and $i_{\eta}: \{\eta\} \to Z$ is the canonical immersion, the perverse sheaf $i_{\eta}^{*p}H^{-1}(\iota^{*p}H^{-1}(\iota^{*j}N))$ over $k(\eta)$ is Artin. We have a commutative diagram:

$$\{\eta\} \xrightarrow{u_{\eta}} \operatorname{Spec}(\mathcal{O}_{F,\eta}) \xrightarrow{\psi} \operatorname{Spec}(\mathcal{O}_{S,\eta}) \xleftarrow{\gamma} U \times_{S} \operatorname{Spec}(\mathcal{O}_{S,\eta}) \downarrow_{i_{\eta}} \qquad \downarrow_{\xi} \qquad \downarrow_{\alpha} \qquad \downarrow_{\beta} \\ Z \xrightarrow{\iota} F \xrightarrow{\iota} F \xrightarrow{i} S \xleftarrow{j} U$$

made of cartesian squares and such that the vertical maps are filtering limits of open immersions with affine transition maps. If f is such a filtering limit, the functor f^* is perverse t-exact by definition of the perverse t-structure. Thus, we have

$$i_{\eta}^{* \mathbf{p}} H^{-1}(\iota^{* \mathbf{p}} H^{-1}(i^{*} j_{*} N)) = {}^{\mathbf{p}} H^{-1}(u_{\eta}^{*} \xi^{* \mathbf{p}} H^{-1}(i^{*} j_{*} N)) = {}^{\mathbf{p}} H^{-1}(u_{\eta}^{* \mathbf{p}} H^{-1}(\psi^{*} \alpha^{*} j_{*} N)).$$

Now, since j is of finite type and since α is filtering limits of open immersions with affine transition maps, Lemma 3.4.4 below yields

$$i_{\eta}^{*p}H^{-1}(\iota^{*p}H^{-1}(i^{*}j_{*}N)) = {}^{p}H^{-1}(u_{\eta}^{*p}H^{-1}(\psi^{*}\gamma_{*}(\beta^{*}N))).$$

We can now apply Lemma 3.3.10: the scheme $\operatorname{Spec}(\mathcal{O}_{S,\eta})$ is of dimension 2, the perverse sheaf β^*N is a smooth Artin over $U \times_S \operatorname{Spec}(\mathcal{O}_{S,\eta})$, the open immersion γ is affine and dense and the complementary open immersion of u_{η} is also affine and dense.

Thus, the perverse sheaf $i_{\eta}^{*p}H^{-1}(\iota^{*p}H^{-1}(i^*j_*N))$ over $k(\eta)$ is Artin. This finishes the proof.

Lemma 3.4.3. Let C be an excellent 1-dimensional connected scheme and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on C. Assume that the closed points of C have finite absolute Galois groups. Then,

- (1) Let M be a constructible ℓ -adic complex over C. Then, the complex M is Artin if and only if for any generic point η of C, the complex η^*M is over $k(\eta)$ is Artin.
- (2) The subcategory $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\operatorname{Perv}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is Serre.

Proof. We first claim that if F is a 0-dimensional scheme such that the residue fields of F have finite absolute Galois groups, then

$$\mathcal{D}^b_c(F,\mathbb{Z}_\ell) = \mathcal{D}^A(F,\mathbb{Z}_\ell).$$

To prove this claim, we can assume that F is reduced and connected and therefore that F = Spec(k) where k is a field with finite Galois group. Since every continuous representation of G_k is in fact an Artin representation, Corollary 2.2.2 then implies our claim.

We now prove the first assertion. The "only if" part follows from the usual stability properties of Artin complexes of Corollary 2.3.3. We now prove the "if" part.

Let M be a constructible ℓ -adic complex over C. Assume that for any generic point η of C, the ℓ -adic complex $\eta^* M$ is Artin. The above claim implies that the ℓ -adic complex $M|_F$ is Artin for any closed subset F of C of positive codimension. Thus, using Proposition 2.4.1, it suffices to find a dense open subset U such that the ℓ -adic complex $M|_U$ is Artin. By Corollary 2.4.3, we can assume that M is concentrated in degree 0 with respect to the ordinary t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_c^b(C, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ *i.e.* that it lies in $\mathrm{Sh}_c(C, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

Let U be a dense open subset such that $M|_U$ is lisse *i.e.* lies in $\text{Loc}_U(\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. Since C is excellent, we can assume that U is regular. We now claim that $M|_U$ lies in $\text{Sh}^{smA}(U,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. To show this, we can assume that U is connected and therefore only has one generic point η . Since U is regular, by [BS15, 7.4.10], we have

$$\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(U,\overline{\eta}) = \pi_1^{\text{\acute{e}t}}(U,\overline{\eta}).$$

Let ϕ be the canonical group homomorphism $G_{k(\eta)} \to \pi_1^{\text{ét}}(U,\overline{\eta})$. The fiber functor associated to the separable closure $\overline{\eta}$ of η induces by Proposition 1.5.4 a

commutative square

$$\begin{array}{cccc}
\operatorname{Loc}_{U}(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) & \longrightarrow \operatorname{Rep}(\pi_{1}^{\operatorname{\acute{e}t}}(U,\overline{\eta}),\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \\
& & \downarrow^{\eta^{*}} & \downarrow^{\phi^{*}} \\
\operatorname{Loc}_{\eta}(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) & \longrightarrow \operatorname{Rep}(G_{k(\eta)},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})
\end{array}$$

where the horizontal arrows are equivalences. By [GR71, V.8.2], the homomorphism ϕ is surjective. Thus, a continuous representation N of $\pi_1^{\text{ét}}(U, \overline{\eta})$ is of Artin origin if and only if $\phi^* N$ is of Artin origin as a representation of $G_{k(\eta)}$. Hence, since $\eta^* M$ lies in $\text{Sh}^{smA}(\eta, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$, the lisse sheaf $M|_U$ is smooth Artin which proves the first assertion.

Finally, the first assertion implies the second one using that

$$\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) = \mathcal{D}^{A}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \cap \operatorname{Perv}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}),$$

that the functor η^* is perverse t-exact and that $\operatorname{Perv}^A(k(\eta), \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ is a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Perv}(k(\eta), \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

Lemma 3.4.4. Let ℓ be a prime number. Let

$$\begin{array}{ccc} X' & \stackrel{g}{\longrightarrow} & Y' \\ \downarrow^p & & \downarrow^q \\ X & \stackrel{f}{\longrightarrow} & Y \end{array}$$

be a cartesian square of $\mathbb{Z}[1/\ell]$ -schemes such that f is a filtering limit of étale morphisms with affine transition maps and q is of finite type. Then, the exchange transformation

$$f^*q_* \to p_*p^*f^*q_* \simeq p_*g^*q^*q_* \to p_*g^*$$

is an equivalence of functors from $\mathcal{D}^b_c(Y', \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ to $\mathcal{D}^b_c(X, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

Proof. If S is a scheme and ℓ is invertible on S, the functor

$$-\otimes_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}} \mathbb{Z}/\ell\mathbb{Z} \colon \mathcal{D}^b_c(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}(S_{\mathrm{\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}/\ell\mathbb{Z})$$

is conservative. Thus, the result follows from [CD16, 1.1.14].

3.5. A counter-example.

Proposition 3.5.1. Let X be a normal scheme of dimension 3 with singular locus a closed point x of codimension 3. Let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on X. Assume that the field k(x) is finite. Let $f : \tilde{X} \to X$ be a resolution of singularities of X and assume that the exceptional divisor E is smooth over k(x) and has a non-zero first ℓ -adic betti number.

Then, taking the convention that $\delta(X) = 3$, the ℓ -adic complex ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^2(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X})$ is not an Artin ℓ -adic complex over X.

Proof. We have a cdh-distinguished square:

$$E \xrightarrow{i_E} \widetilde{X}$$

$$\downarrow^p \qquad \qquad \downarrow^f$$

$$\{x\} \xrightarrow{i} X$$

which by Proposition 1.6.2 yields an exact triangle:

$$\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X} \to f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell} \underset{X}{\sim} \oplus i_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,x} \to i_*p_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,E}.$$

Letting $j: U \to X$ be the complementary open immersion of i, the localization triangle (1.0.2) associated to the immersions $U \to \tilde{X}$ and i_E yields after applying f_* an exact triangle:

$$i_*p_*i_E^!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,\widetilde{X}} \to f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,\widetilde{X}} \to j_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,U}.$$

Now, since j is of relative dimension 0, the functor j_* is perverse left t-exact. Since U is regular and $\delta(U) = 3$, the complex $j_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,U}$ is in perverse degree at least 3. Hence, applying Corollary 3.3.3, the perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^2(f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,\widetilde{X}})$ is trivial and

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{2}(f_{*}\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}_{\widetilde{X}}) = i_{*}{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{2}(p_{*}i_{E}^{!}\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}_{\widetilde{X}})$$

Using [BBDG18, 1.4.17.1], the fully faithful exact functor i_* maps $\operatorname{Perv}(k(x), \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ to a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Perv}(X, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. Therefore, we get an exact sequence:

$$0 \to i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X})) \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^2(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}) \to i_*M \to 0$$

where M is a perverse sheaf over k(x).

Hence, once again using [BBDG18, 1.4.17.1], there is a perverse sheaf P over k(x) such that ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^2(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}) = i_*P$. The perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}))$ is a subobject of P.

It now suffices to show that ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X})$ does not correspond to representation of Artin origin of $G_{k(x)}$. By Proposition 1.4.7 and Remark 1.4.6, it suffices to show that it is not of weight 0 as a perverse sheaf over k(x).

But by [BBDG18, 5.1.14, 5.4.4], the perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X})$ is pure of weight 1. Since the first ℓ -adic Betti number $b_1(E)$ is non-zero, the perverse sheaf ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^1(p_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X})$ is non-zero and thus, it is not of Artin origin. \Box

Example 3.5.2. Let E be an elliptic curve over a finite field k and X be the affine cone over $E \times \mathbb{P}^1_k$. Let ℓ be a prime number distinct from the characteristic of k. The scheme X has a single singular point x and the blow-up \widetilde{X} of X at x is a resolution of singularities of X with exceptional divisor $E \times \mathbb{P}^1_k$.

As $b_1(E \times \mathbb{P}^1_k) = 1$, the proposition applies and therefore, the perverse t-structure does not induce a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(X, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

Finally, notice that by Noether's normalization lemma, there is a finite map $X \to \mathbb{A}^3_k$. Thus, the perverse t-structure does not induce a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(\mathbb{A}^3_k, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. As \mathbb{A}^3_k is a closed subscheme of \mathbb{A}^n_k for $n \ge 3$, the perverse t-structure does not induce a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(\mathbb{A}^n_k, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ if $n \ge 3$.

Remark 3.5.3. The condition that $\dim(S) \leq 2$ or $\dim(S) \leq 3$ and the residue field of closed points of S are separably closed or real closed seems rather optimal: loosely speaking, if X becomes more singular, the perverse cohomology sheaves of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ should become more complicated. Here, the simplest possible singularity on a scheme of dimension 3 over a finite field already renders the cohomology sheaf not Artin.

4. Perverse Homotopy T-structure

Recall (see Proposition 4.2.1 below) that we can formally define t-structures on a presentable stable category by setting a certain set of objects to be the tnegative objects of our t-structure. Thus, an other attempt to define a t-structure

on $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ is to define it by generators on $\mathcal{D}^A_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ and then to see when this t-structure can be restricted to $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$.

4.1. Cohomological ℓ -adic complexes and the six functors for them.

Definition 4.1.1. Let S be a scheme and ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. The category of cohomological (resp. ind-cohomological) ℓ -adic complexes over S is the thick (resp. localizing) subcategory $\mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ (resp. $\mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$) of $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ generated by the objects $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ for $f: X \to S$ proper.

In [Leh19b, 1.12], Pepin Lehalleur proved that (constructible) cohomological motives are stable under some of the six operations when the base schemes have resolution of singularities by alterations. In [CD16, 6.2], using Gabber's method, Cisinski and Déglise showed that constructible étale motives are endowed with the six functors formalism when the base schemes are quasi-excellent. One can mimic their proof in the case of cohomological ℓ -adic complexes. We outline how to do this:

- (1) The fibred subcategory $\mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}(-,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\mathcal{D}(-,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is closed under the tensor product operation, negative Tate twists, the functors f^* for any morphism f and the functors f_1 for any separated morphism of finite type f.
- (2) From the absolute purity property and the stability of \mathcal{D}^{coh} under negative Tate twists and Proposition 1.6.3, we deduce that if i is the immersion of a simple normal crossing divisor with regular target X, the ℓ -adic complex $i^{!}\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ is cohomological.
- (3) We want to prove Gabber's lemma for cohomological complexes: if X is quasi-excellent, then for any dense open immersion $U \to X$, the ℓ -adic complex $j_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,U}$ is cohomological. Notice that the fibred stable category $\mathcal{D}^{coh}(-,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ has the properties [CD16, 6.2.9(b)(c)] replacing $\mathcal{DM}_{h}(-,R)$ with $\mathcal{D}(-,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. It does not necessarily have property [CD16, 6.2.9(a)]; however, in the proof of Gabber's lemma of [CD16, 6.2.7], we only need the following weaker version: for any scheme X, the subcategory $\mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}(X,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $\mathcal{D}(X, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is thick and contains the object $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell, X}$.
- (4) Follow the proofs of [CD16, 6.2.13, 6.2.14] to prove that $\mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}(-,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is stable under the following operations:
 - tensor product and negative Tate twists.
 - f^* for any morphism f.
 - f* and f! for any separated and of finite type morphism f.
 f! for any quasi-finite morphism f.

4.2. Definition for Ind-Artin ℓ -adic complexes.

Proposition 4.2.1. Let C be a presentable stable category which admits small coproducts and push-outs. Given a family \mathcal{E} of objects, the smallest subcategory \mathcal{E}_{-} closed under extensions, small coproducts and positive shifts is the set of nonpositive objects of a t-structure.

Proof. [Lur17, 1.2.1.16].

In the setting of Proposition 4.2.1 we will call this t-structure the t-structure generated by \mathcal{E} . In the motivic setting, t-structures given by a set of generators have been used to define the ordinary homotopy t-structure in [Ayo07, 2.2.3], the perverse homotopy t-structure in [Ayo07, 2.2.3] or [BD17] and the ordinary motivic

t-structure on 0-motives and 1-motives in [Leh19b]. Our perverse homotopy tstructure is similar to a "shifted" version of Pepin Lehalleur's ordinary motivic t-structure.

Definition 4.2.2. Let S be a scheme and ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S. Then, the perverse homotopy t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is the t-structure generated by the complexes $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}[\delta(X)]$ for $f: X \to S$ finite.

We use the notation hp to denote any object related to the perverse homotopy t-structure. For instance, letting n be an integer, we denote by ${}^{hp}H^n$ the n-th cohomology functor with respect to this t-structure.

Using the same method as in Proposition 2.3.1, the perverse homotopy t-structure is also generated by the $f_!\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}[\delta(X)]$ for $f: X \to S$ quasi-finite. By definition, an object M of $\mathcal{D}^A_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ lies in ${}^{\mathrm{hp}}\mathcal{D}^A_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{\geq n}$ if and only if for any finite map $f: X \to S$ and any integer p > -n, we have

$$\operatorname{Hom}_{\mathcal{D}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})}(f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}[\delta(X)+p],M) = 0.$$

In other words, the object M lies in ${}^{\mathrm{hp}}\mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{\geq n}$ if and only if the chain complex $\mathrm{Map}(f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X},M)$ is $(n-\delta(X)-1)$ -connected.

To study this t-structure, we need to introduce the Artin truncation functor:

Definition 4.2.3. Let S be a scheme and ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S. The adjunction theorem [Lur09, 5.5.1.9] gives rise to a right adjoint functor to the inclusion of Ind-Artin ℓ -adic complexes into Ind-cohomological complexes of ℓ -adic sheaves:

$$\omega^0 \colon \mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^A_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell).$$

We call this functor the Artin truncation functor.

Remark 4.2.4. In the motivic setting, this functor was first introduced in [AZ12, 2.2]. Ayoub and Zucker predicted that the ℓ -adic realization of their functor was a punctual weightless truncation of the ℓ -adic realization functor.

Such a punctual weightless truncation functor $w_{\leq \text{Id}}$ was then introduced when S is of finite type over a finite field in [NV15] by Vaish and Nair over the category $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ of mixed ℓ -adic complexes of [BBDG18, 5]. Finally, by giving an explicit description of Ayoub and Zucker's functor which mimics the construction of [NV15], Vaish showed in [Vai16] that the ℓ -adic realization of Ayoub and Zucker's functor is the weightless truncation of its ℓ -adic realization.

We will show that when restricted to cohomological ℓ -adic complexes, our functor coincides with Vaish and Nair's (see Section 4.6 below).

Proposition 4.2.5. Let ℓ be a prime number. Let f be a quasi-finite morphism of $\mathbb{Z}[1/\ell]$ -schemes and g be morphism of $\mathbb{Z}[1/\ell]$ -schemes which essentially of finite type. Then, with respect to the perverse homotopy t-structure,

- (1) The adjunction $(f_{!}, \omega^{0} f^{!})$ is a t-adjunction.
- (2) If M is t-non-positive, the functor $-\otimes_S M$ is right t-exact.
- (3) If dim(g) $\leq d$, the adjunction $(g^*[d], \omega^0 g_*[-d])$ is a t-adjunction.

Proof. The full subcategory of those Ind-Artin ℓ -adic complexes N such that $f_!N$, $g^*N[d]$ and $N \otimes M$ are perverse homotopy t-non-positive is closed under extensions, small coproducts and negative shifts and contains the set of generators of the

t-structure. Thus, by definition of the perverse homotopy t-structure, this subcategory contains all perverse homotopy t-non-positive objects. Hence, the functors f_1 , $g^*[d]$ and $-\otimes M$ are right t-exact with respect to the perverse homotopy t-structure and the result follows.

Corollary 4.2.6. Let ℓ be a prime number. Let f be a morphism of $\mathbb{Z}[1/\ell]$ -schemes. Then, with respect to the perverse homotopy t-structure,

- (1) If f is étale, the functor $f^* = f^! = \omega^0 f^!$ is t-exact.
- (2) If f is finite, the functor $f_! = f_* = \omega^0 f_*$ is t-exact.

4.3. The smooth Artin case. Compare the following with Proposition 3.1.1.

Proposition 4.3.1. Let S be a regular scheme and ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on S. Then, the perverse homotopy t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ which coincides with the t-structure induced by the perverse t-structure. When S is connected, it coincides with the ordinary t-structure shifted by $\delta(S)$.

Proof. It suffices to show that the inclusion functor

$$\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$$

is t-exact when the left hand side is endowed with the perverse t-structure given by Proposition 3.1.1 and the right hand side is endowed with the perverse homotopy t-structure.

We can assume that S is connected. By dévissage, it suffices to show that

$$\mathrm{Sh}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})[\delta(S)] \subseteq \mathcal{D}^{smA}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \cap {}^{\mathrm{hp}}\mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})^{\heartsuit}$$

Let M be an object of $\operatorname{Sh}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})[\delta(S)]$. The object M is in perverse degree 0 by Proposition 3.1.1. If $f: X \to S$ is finite, the complex $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$ is in perverse degree at most $\delta(X)$. Thus, the complex $\operatorname{Map}(f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}, M)$ is $(-\delta(X)-1)$ -connected. Hence M is non-negative with respect to the perverse homotopy t-structure.

We now show that M is non-negative with respect to the perverse homotopy t-structure. It suffices to show that M can be obtained from the set of generators of the t-structure by successively taking negative shifts, coproducts and extensions.

Let ξ be a geometric point of S. The sheaf $M[-\delta(S)]$ corresponds to a representation of Artin origin of $\pi_1^{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}(S,\xi)$ that we denote by N. We can assume that N is an Artin representation, as representations of Artin origin are obtained as a successive extensions of Artin representations.

Let G be a finite quotient of $\pi_1^{\text{prooft}}(S,\xi)$ through which N factors. Then, by Proposition 1.3.1, the complex $N \oplus N[1]$ of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G]$ -modules is quasi-isomorphic to a complex

$$P = \dots \to 0 \to P_n \to P_{n-1} \to \dots \to P_0 \to 0 \to \dots$$

where each P_i is placed in degree -i and is isomorphic to $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G/H_1] \oplus \cdots \oplus \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G/H_m]$ for some subgroups H_1, \ldots, H_m of G.

If H is a subgroup of G, there is a finite étale S-scheme $f: X \to S$ such that the image of $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[G/H]$ through the exact functor

$$\Psi \colon \mathcal{D}^b(\operatorname{Rep}(G, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)) \to \mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$$

is $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}$. Hence, the image Q_i of $P_i[\delta(S)]$ is t-non-positive with respect to the perverse homotopy t-structure.

Furthermore, we have exact triangles

$$Q_n[n] \to M \oplus M[1] \to Q_{< n}$$

$$Q_k[k] \to Q_{< k+1} \to Q_{< k} \text{ if } 0 < k < n$$

where $Q_{\leq k}[-\delta(S)]$ is the image of the truncated complex

$$\cdots \rightarrow 0 \rightarrow P_{k-1} \rightarrow P_{k-2} \rightarrow \cdots \rightarrow P_0 \rightarrow 0 \rightarrow \cdots$$

through Ψ .

Since $Q_{<1} = Q_0$, a quick induction shows that $Q_{<k}$ is t-non-positive with respect to the perverse homotopy t-structure. Thus, the complex $M \oplus M[1]$ is t-non-positive and therefore, the complex M itself is.

4.4. Gluing formalism.

Proposition 4.4.1. Let S be a scheme. Let ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S. Let $i: F \to S$ be a closed immersion and $j: U \to S$ be the open complement. Then, the sequence

$$\mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(F,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \xrightarrow{i_{*}} \mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \xrightarrow{j^{*}} \mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(U,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$$

satisfies the axioms of the gluing formalism (see [BBDG18, 1.4.3]), i.e.

- (1) The functors i_* and j^* both have exact left and right adjoints i^* , $\omega^0 i^!$, $j_!$ and $\omega^0 j_*$.
- (2) We have $j^*i_* = 0$.
- (3) The functors i_* , j_* and $j_!$ are fully faithful.
- (4) We have exact triangles:

$$j_!j^* \to 1 \to i_*i^*$$

and

$$i_*\omega^0 i^! \to 1 \to \omega^0 j_* j^*.$$

Moreover, the perverse homotopy t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is obtained by gluing the t-structures of $\mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(U,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ and $\mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(F,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$, (see [BBDG18, 1.4.9]) i.e. for all object M of $\mathcal{D}^{A}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$, we have

- (1) $M \ge_{\mathrm{hp}} 0$ if and only if $j^*M \ge_{\mathrm{hp}} 0$ and $\omega^0 i^! M \ge_{\mathrm{hp}} 0$.
- (2) $M \leq_{\mathrm{hp}} 0$ if and only if $j^*M \leq_{\mathrm{hp}} 0$ and $i^*M \leq_{\mathrm{hp}} 0$.

Proof. This follows from Proposition 4.2.5, Corollary 4.2.6 and the usual properties of the six functors. \Box

Corollary 4.4.2. Let S be a scheme. Let ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S. Let M be an object of $\mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$. Then, we have

- (1) $M \ge_{hp} 0$ if and only if there is a stratification of S such that for any stratum $i: T \hookrightarrow S$, we have $\omega^0 i! M \ge_{hp} 0$.
- (2) $M \leq_{\text{hp}} 0$ if and only if there is a stratification of S such that for any stratum $i: T \hookrightarrow S$, we have $i^*M \leq_{\text{hp}} 0$.

In particular if S is excellent and M is an object of $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, then, $M \leq_{\mathrm{hp}} 0$ if and only if there is a stratification of S with nil-regular strata, such that for any stratum $i: T \hookrightarrow S$, the ℓ -adic complex i^*M is smooth Artin and $i^*M \leq_{\mathrm{p}} 0$.

Proof. Recall that an excellent scheme admits a stratification with nil-regular strata. Therefore, the last point follows from Proposition 2.4.1 and Proposition 4.3.1. \Box

4.5. The perverse homotopy t-structure and the perverse t-structure.

Proposition 4.5.1. Let S be a scheme and ℓ be a prime number that is invertible on S. Then,

- (1) Let M be an object of $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, then M is perverse homotopy t-negative if and only if it is perverse t-negative.
- (2) Let M be an object of $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, then if M is perverse t-positive, then it is perverse homotopy t-positive.
- (3) If the perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^b_c(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, then the perverse homotopy t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{A}_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. When this is the case, both induced t-structures coincide.

Remark 4.5.2. We can reformulate the first point: when the perverse homotopy t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, it is final among those t-structures such that the inclusion $\mathcal{D}^A(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^b_c(S,\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ is right t-exact when the right hand side is endowed with the perverse t-structure.

Proof. The first point follows from Corollary 4.4.2(2). To prove the second assertion, let be M a perverse t-positive constructible ℓ -adic complex. Then, it is in the right orthogonal of the set of non-positive objects of the perverse t-structure. Thus, it is in the right orthogonal of the set of non-positive objects of the perverse homotopy t-structure that are Artin ℓ -adic complexes; in particular for any finite map $f: X \to S$ and any p > -n, the complex M is right orthogonal to $f_*\mathbb{Z}_{\ell,X}[\delta(X) + p]$ and hence M is perverse homotopy t-positive.

If the perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, the objects of $\mathcal{D} = \mathcal{D}^A_{\mathrm{Ind}}(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)^{\leq 0} \cap \mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$ are the t-non-positive objects of a t-structure. Furthermore, the subcategory \mathcal{D}^+ of positive objects of this t-structure is contained in the subcategory of perverse homotopy t-positive objects. But \mathcal{D}^+ contains the perverse homotopy t-positive objects since they are orthogonal to the elements of \mathcal{D} . This finishes the proof. \square

4.6. Comparison of ω^0 and $w_{\leq Id}$ for schemes of finite type over a finite field and with coefficients \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} . Let S be a scheme of finite type over a finite field. In this paragraph and in the following ones, we set $\delta(S) = \dim(S)$ which is a consistent choice for any such S. Recall that Vaish and Nair introduced in [NV15,[3.1.1, 3.1.5] an exact functor

$$w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}} : \mathcal{D}^b_m(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^b_m(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

where $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ is the category of mixed ℓ -adic complexes of [BBDG18, 5]. It is a truncation functor with respect to a t-structure $(\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}, \mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{>\mathrm{Id}})$. Furthermore, the subcategories $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}$ and $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{>\mathrm{Id}}$ are thick stable

subcategories of $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$. Therefore, the induced functor

$$w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}} : \mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}$$

is exact and is right adjoint to the inclusion functor $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{\leq \mathrm{Id}} \to \mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$.

Proposition 4.6.1. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Then, the functors ω^0 and $w_{\leq Id}$ induce equivalent functors

$$\mathcal{D}^{\operatorname{coh}}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}).$$

Remark 4.6.2. A priori, the functor ω^0 sends cohomological ℓ -adic complexes to Ind-Artin ℓ -adic complexes. This proposition proves that in fact, it sends cohomological ℓ -adic complexes to Artin ℓ -adic complexes.

Proof. Recall that in [CD16, 5.1, 7.2.10], Cisinski and Déglise constructed a triangulated category $DM(S, \mathbb{Q})$ endowed with a realization functor

$$\rho_{\ell} \colon \mathrm{DM}(\mathrm{S}, \mathbb{Q}) \to \mathrm{D}(\mathrm{S}, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$$

that commutes with the six operations by [CD16, 7.2.24]. We can promote their construction to a stable ∞ -categorical one following [Kha16] and [Rob14].

Now, recall that Vaish constructed a functor (see [Vai16, 3.1]) $w_{\leq \text{Id}}^{mot}$ from the category of cohomological motives to the category of Artin motives over S.

Lemma 4.6.3. Keep the same notations, then, $\rho_{\ell} w_{\leq \text{Id}}^{mot} = w_{\leq \text{Id}} \rho_{\ell}$

Proof. We follow the ideas of [Vai16, 4.2.4]. The proof of [Vai16, 4.2.4] tells us that $\rho_{\ell} \mathcal{DM}^{\mathrm{coh}}(S, \mathbb{Q})^{\leq \mathrm{Id}} \subseteq \mathcal{D}_{m}^{b}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}$ and that $\rho_{\ell} \mathcal{DM}^{\mathrm{coh}}(S, \mathbb{Q})^{>\mathrm{Id}} \subseteq \mathcal{D}_{m}^{b}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{>\mathrm{Id}}$. Applying ρ_{ℓ} to the canonical 2-morphism $\varepsilon^{mot} : w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}}^{mot} \to \mathrm{Id}$ yields a 2-morphism

Applying ρ_{ℓ} to the canonical 2-morphism ε^{mot} : $w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}}^{mot} \to \mathrm{Id}$ yields a 2-morphism $\rho_{\ell}\varepsilon^{mot}$: $\rho_{\ell}w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}}^{mot} \to \rho_{\ell}$. Since $\rho_{\ell}w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}}^{mot}$ factors through $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}$, the functor $\rho_{\ell}\varepsilon^{mot}$ factors as

$$\rho_{\ell} w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}}^{mot} \xrightarrow{\alpha} w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}} \rho_{\ell} \xrightarrow{\varepsilon \rho_{\ell}} \rho_{\ell}$$

where $\varepsilon \colon w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}} \to \mathrm{Id}$ is the canonical 2-morphism. Therefore, we have a commutative square:

$$\begin{array}{c|c} \rho_{\ell} w_{\leqslant \mathrm{Id}}^{mot} \xrightarrow{\rho_{\ell} \varepsilon^{mot}} \rho_{\ell} \\ \downarrow^{\alpha} & & \\ w_{\leqslant \mathrm{Id}} \rho_{\ell} \xrightarrow{\varepsilon_{\rho_{\ell}}} \rho_{\ell} \end{array}$$

This yields a morphism of exact triangles:

We want to show that α is an equivalence. It suffices to show that α is an equivalence when applied to a set of generators of cohomological motives.

Now, if X is a scheme, let $\mathbb{1}_X$ be the constant object of $\mathcal{DM}(X, \mathbb{Q})$. The motives $f_*\mathbb{1}_X$ when $f: X \to S$ runs through the set of proper maps generates the category of cohomological motives as a thick subcategory of $\mathcal{DM}(S, \mathbb{Q})$.

We have a morphism of exact triangles:

$$\begin{array}{cccc}
\rho_{\ell} w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}}^{mot} f_* \mathbb{1}_X & \longrightarrow & f_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,X} & \longrightarrow & \rho_{\ell} w_{<\mathrm{Id}}^{mot} f_* \mathbb{1}_X \\
& & \downarrow^{\alpha(f_* \mathbb{1}_X)} & & \downarrow \\
& & w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}} f_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,X} & \longrightarrow & f_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,X} & \longrightarrow & w_{<\mathrm{Id}} f_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,X}
\end{array}$$

As $\rho_{\ell} w^{mot}_{\leq \mathrm{Id}} f_* \mathbb{1}_X$ lies in $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}$ and $\rho_{\ell} w^{mot}_{>\mathrm{Id}} f_* \mathbb{1}_X$ lies in $\mathcal{D}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{>\mathrm{Id}}$, by uniqueness of the truncation, the map $\alpha(f_* \mathbb{1}_X)$ is an isomorphism. \Box

Using the lemma, we see that if $f: X \to S$ is proper, the ℓ -adic complex $w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}} f_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,X}$ is Artin. Hence, the functor $w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}}$ has its essential image included in $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$.

Recall that the functor $w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}} \colon \mathcal{D}^b_m(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^b_m(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}$ is exact and is right adjoint to the inclusion functor. Now, if $g: Y \to S$ is finite, the motive $g_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,Y}$ lies in $\mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}$ by [NV15, 3.1.8], hence, if M is a cohomological ℓ -adic complex, the adjunction map

$$\operatorname{Map}(g_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,Y}, w_{\leq \operatorname{Id}}M) \to \operatorname{Map}(g_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,Y}, M)$$

is an equivalence. Therefore, if N is an ind-Artin ℓ -adic complex and M is a cohomological ℓ -adic complex, the adjunction map

$$\operatorname{Map}(N, w_{\leq \operatorname{Id}}M) \to \operatorname{Map}(N, M)$$

is an equivalence. Proposition 4.6.1 follows.

Using the Artin truncation functor ω^0 , we prove that there is a trace of the six functors formalism on Artin ℓ -adic sheaves with coefficients \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} over a finite field.

Corollary 4.6.4. Let $\ell \neq p$ be prime numbers. Then, on schemes of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p , the six functors from $\mathcal{D}^{\operatorname{coh}}(-,\mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ (see Section 4.1) induce the following adjunctions on $\mathcal{D}^A(-,\mathbb{Q}_\ell)$:

- (1) $(f^*, \omega^0 f_*)$ for any separated morphism of finite type f, (2) $(f_1, \omega^0 f^!)$ for any quasi-finite morphism f,
- (3) $(\otimes, \omega^0 \underline{\mathrm{Hom}}).$

Remark 4.6.5. These functors have quite remarkable features. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let X be a scheme of finite type over k.

First, Vaish and Nair used them to define the weightless intersection complex $EC_X = \omega^0 j_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}$ with $j: U \to X$ the open immersion of a regular subscheme of X (see [NV15, 3.1.15]). This is an analog of Ayoub and Zucker's motive \mathbb{E}_X (see [AZ12, 2.20]).

Furthermore, if $f: X \to X$ is a resolution of singularities, then we have $EC_X =$ $\omega^0 f_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,\widetilde{X}}$ (see [NV15, 4.1.2]). The proof amounts to the following fact: if $i: F \to C$ S is a closed immersion of dense complement and S is regular, the functor $\omega^0 i^!$ vanishes on $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ (see the proof of [NV15, 4.1.1]).

4.7. The perverse homotopy t-structure for schemes of finite type over a finite field and with coefficients \mathbb{Q}_{ℓ} . We will now show that the perverse homotopy t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ when S is of finite type over a finite field. To show this, we will construct a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ by gluing the perverse t-structure on smooth Artin objects along stratifications and show that it coincides with the perverse homotopy t-structure.

Proposition 4.7.1. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Then,

- (1) The perverse homotopy t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$.
- (2) Let $i: F \to S$ be a closed immersion and $j: U \to S$ be the open complement. The sequence

$$\mathcal{D}^A(F, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \xrightarrow{i_*} \mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \xrightarrow{j^*} \mathcal{D}^A(U, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

satisfies the axioms of the gluing formalism (see [BBDG18, 1.4.3] and Proposition 4.4.1) and the perverse homotopy t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ is obtained by gluing the t-structures of $\mathcal{D}^{A}(U, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ and $\mathcal{D}^{A}(F, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$, (see [BBDG18, 1.4.9]).

Proof. We can assume that S is reduced. The first part of (2) is a direct consequence of Proposition 4.4.1 and Corollary 4.6.4. To prove the rest of the proposition, we need to adapt the ideas of [BBDG18, 2.2.10] to our setting.

We first need a few definitions:

- If S is a stratification of S, we say that a locally closed subscheme X of S is an S-subscheme of S if X is a union of strata of S.
- A pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is *admissible* if
 - -S is a stratification of S with smooth strata everywhere of the same dimension.
 - for every stratum T of S, $\mathcal{L}(T)$ is a finite set of isomorphism classes of smooth Artin perverse sheaves (see Definition 3.1.5).
- If $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is an admissible pair and X is an S-subscheme of S, the category $\mathcal{D}_{\mathcal{S},\mathcal{L}}(X,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ of $(\mathcal{S},\mathcal{L})$ -constructible Artin ℓ -adic complexes over X is the full subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^{A}(X,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ made of those objects M such that for any stratum T of \mathcal{S} contained in X, the restriction of M to T is a smooth Artin ℓ -adic complex and its perverse cohomology sheaves are successive extensions of objects whose isomorphism classes lie in $\mathcal{L}(T)$.
- A pair $(\mathcal{S}', \mathcal{L}')$ refines a pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ if every stratum S of \mathcal{S} is a union of strata of \mathcal{S}' and any perverse sheaf M over a stratum T of \mathcal{S} whose isomorphism class lies in $\mathcal{L}(T)$ is $(\mathcal{S}', \mathcal{L}')$ -constructible.

If $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is an admissible pair and X is an \mathcal{S} -subscheme of S, the category $\mathcal{D}_{\mathcal{S},\mathcal{L}}(X,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ is a stable subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^{A}(S,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ (*i.e.* it is closed under finite (co)limits).

If $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is an admissible pair and $i: U \to V$ is an immersion between \mathcal{S} -subschemes of S, the functors $i_{!}$ and i^{*} preserve $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructible objects.

Now, we say that an admissible pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is *superadmissible* if letting $i: T \to S$ be the immersion of a stratum T of \mathcal{S} into S and letting M be a perverse sheaf over

T whose isomorphism class lies in $\mathcal{L}(T)$, the complex $\omega^0 i_* M$ is $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructible. The proof of [AZ12, 3.16] yields equivalences $\omega^0 i_* \omega^0 \simeq \omega^0 i_*$ and $\omega^0 i^! \omega^0 \simeq \omega^0 i^!$ for any quasi-finite morphism i.

We now claim that an admissible pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ can always be refined into a superadmissible one.

Assume that this is true when we replace S with the union of the strata of dimension n or more. Let $i: T \to S$ and $i': T' \to S$ be immersions of a strata of S. Let M be a perverse sheaf over T whose isomorphism class lies in $\mathcal{L}(T)$. If T and T' are of dimension at least n, then, the perverse cohomology sheaves of $(i')^* \omega^0 i_* M$ are obtained as successive extensions of objects of whose isomorphism classes lie in $\mathcal{L}(T')$ by induction.

If T = T', then

$$(i')^* \omega^0 i_* M = \omega^0 i^* \omega^0 i_* M = \omega^0 i^* i_* M = M$$

whose isomorphism class lies in $\mathcal{L}(T)$.

Otherwise, if T is of dimension n-1, we can always replace T with an open subset, so that the closure of T is disjoint from T'. Then,

$$(i')^* \omega^0 i_* M = \omega^0 (i')^* i_* M = 0.$$

Assume now that T is of dimension at least n and that T' is of dimension n-1. We can replace T' with an open subset so that for any M in $\mathcal{L}(T)$, the complex $(i')^*\omega^0 i_*M$ is smooth Artin by Corollary 4.6.4 and Proposition 2.4.1. We can also add all the isomorphism classes of the ${}^{\mathrm{P}}H^n\left((i')^*\omega^0 i_*M\right)$ to $\mathcal{L}(T')$ because there are finitely many of them. This proves our claim when we replace S with the union of the strata of dimension n-1 or more.

Hence, any admissible pair can be refined into a superadmissible one.

If $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is a superadmissible pair and $i : U \to V$ is an immersion between \mathcal{S} -subschemes of S, we claim that the functors $\omega^0 i_*$ and $\omega^0 i^!$ preserve $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructibility. The proof is the same as [BBDG18, 2.1.13] using as above the commutation of ω^0 with the six functors.

Hence, if $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is a superadmissible pair, we can define a t-structure on $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ constructible objects by gluing the perverse t-structure on the strata. By Corollary 4.4.2, the positive (resp. negative) objects of this t-structure are the positive (resp. negative) objects of the perverse homotopy t-structure that are $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ constructible.

Thus, the perverse homotopy t-structure induces a t-structure over $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructible objects. Therefore, $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructible objects are stable under the truncation functors of the perverse homotopy t-structure.

Any object M of $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ is $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructible for some superadmissible pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$. Indeed, by Proposition 2.4.1, there is an admissible pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ such that M is $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructible. Such a pair is can always be refined into one that is superadmissible.

Hence $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ is stable under the truncation functors of the perverse homotopy t-structure. Therefore, the perverse homotopy t-structure induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$.

Now, the second part (2) follows from Proposition 4.4.1.

Definition 4.7.2. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. We denote by $\operatorname{Perv}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)^{\#}$ and call abelian category of Artin homotopy perverse sheaves over S the heart of the perverse homotopy t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$.

Remark 4.7.3. When both are defined, the abelian categories $\text{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\#}$ and $\text{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ coincide (see Definition 3.2.2). Recall that this is the case if S is of finite type over \mathbb{F}_{p} and $\dim(S) \leq 2$ according to our main theorem.

With the assumptions of the definition, there is a right exact functor

$$\iota : \operatorname{Perv}^{\mathcal{A}}(\mathcal{S}, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})^{\#} \to \operatorname{Perv}(\mathcal{S}, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}).$$

It is exact if and only if the perverse t-structure induces a t-structure on Artin ℓ -adic complexes.

4.8. Weightless perverse t-structure. In the next section, we will study a functor akin to the intermediate extension functor of [BBDG18]. To show that this functor behaves nicely, one would like to restrict the perverse t-structure over $\mathcal{D}^{\mathrm{coh}}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ and to show that the functor ω^0 is t-exact.

However, it is not known to the author of this paper whether the perverse tstructure preserves cohomological motives. To circumvent this issue, notice however that, using [BBDG18, 5.1.7], the perverse t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_c^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ induces a tstructure on $\mathcal{D}_m^b(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ and that the heart $\operatorname{Perv}_m(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ of this t-structure is a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Perv}(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$. Furthermore, notice that using [BBDG18, 5.1.6], the fibered category $\mathcal{D}_m^b(-, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ is endowed with the six operations. We will now define a t-structure on a certain subcategory of *weightless complexes* such that the inclusion of Artin complexes into this category is t-exact and the right adjoint functor of the inclusion of weightless complexes into mixed complexes is t-exact.

Definition 4.8.1. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. We denote by $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ and call category of weightless ℓ -adic complexes the subcategory of the non-positive objects of the t-structure $(w_{\leq \mathrm{Id}}, w_{>\mathrm{Id}})$ of Vaish and Nair.

Remark 4.8.2. We chose the notation $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ rather than the notation $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq \mathrm{Id}}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$, because as stated in Proposition 4.8.5 below, the punctual weight of the standard co-homology sheaves of lisse weightless complexes are non-positive.

Since the functor $w_{\leq \text{Id}}$ of Vaish and Nair was proved in Section 4.6 to coincide with ω^0 over cohomological motives and is right adjoint to the inclusion of weightless complexes into the category of mixed complexes, we will from this point on denote the functor $w_{\leq \text{Id}}$ by ω^0 .

We have an analog of Corollary 4.6.4:

Proposition 4.8.3. Let $\ell \neq p$ be prime numbers. Then, on schemes of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p , the six functors from $\mathcal{D}_m^b(-, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ induce the following adjunctions on $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq 0}(-, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$:

- (1) $(f^*, \omega^0 f_*)$ for any separated morphism of finite type f,
- (2) $(f_1, \omega^0 f^!)$ for any quasi-finite morphism f,
- (3) $(\otimes, \omega^0 \underline{\mathrm{Hom}}).$

Proof. The first stability assertion follows from [NV15, 3.1.10] while the third follows from [NV15, 3.2.3].

In the case when f is finite, the second stability assertion follows from [NV15, 3.1.8]. Using Zariski's Main Theorem [Gro67, 18.12.13], it suffices to prove that if $j: U \to S$ is an open immersion and M is weightless over U, then $j_!M$ is still weightless over S.

Recall that a mixed complex N defined over a scheme X is weightless if and only if there is an adapted stratification \mathcal{X} of X in the sense of [NV15, 3.1.6] such that for each stratum Y of \mathcal{X} , the perverse cohomology sheaves of the restriction of N to Y are of weight at most dim(Y).

Take an adapted stratification of S such that U is a union of strata. Then, perverse cohomology sheaves of the restriction of $j_!M$ to any stratum T contained in U is of weight at most dim(T) since M is weightless, while the restriction of $j_!M$ to any stratum disjoint from U vanishes. Therefore, the complex $j_!M$ is weightless, which yields the result.

Definition 4.8.4. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number.

ARTIN PERVERSE SHEAVES

- (1) We denote by $\operatorname{Loc}_{S}^{w \leq 0}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ and call category of weightless lisse ℓ -adic sheaves the full subcategory of lisse mixed ℓ -adic sheaves over S that are of nonpositive weight in the sense of [BBDG18, 5].
- (2) We denote by $\mathcal{D}_{lisse}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ and call category of weightless lisse ℓ -adic complexes the subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ made of those objects which are lisse as ℓ -adic complexes.

Since representations of weight at most 0 of $\hat{\mathbb{Z}}$ form a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Rep}(\hat{\mathbb{Z}}, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$, the category $\operatorname{Loc}_{S}^{w \leq 0}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ is a Serre subcategory of $\operatorname{Loc}_{S}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$.

Proposition 4.8.5. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Then, the ordinary t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_{\text{lisse}}(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_{\text{lisse}}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$. The heart of this t-structure is $\text{Loc}_S^{w \leq 0}(\mathbb{Q}_\ell)$. In particular, $\mathcal{D}_{\text{lisse}}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ is the subcategory of those complexes C of ℓ -adic sheaves such that for all integer n, the sheaf $H^n(C)$ is weightless and lisse.

Proof. Using Lemma 1.2.3, it suffices to show that

$$\mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(S,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})\cap \mathrm{Loc}_{S}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})=\mathrm{Loc}_{S}^{w\leqslant 0}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}).$$

Let M be an object of $\operatorname{Loc}_{S}^{w \leq 0}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$. It lies in $\operatorname{Loc}_{S}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ by definition. Furthermore, if a stratification S is adapted to M in the sense of [NV15, 3.1.6] and T is a stratum of S, since $M|_{T}$ is lisse and T is smooth, for any integer n, we have

$${}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{n}(M|_{T}) = \begin{cases} M|_{T}[\dim(T)] & \text{if } n = \dim(T) \\ 0 & \text{otherwise} \end{cases}$$

Since the ℓ -adic complex $M|_T$ is of weight at most 0, the ℓ -adic complex $M|_T[\dim(T)]$ is of weight at most dim(T). Therefore, for any integer n, the ℓ -adic complex ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^n(M|_T)$ is of weight at most dim(T). Hence, the complex M lies in $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$

Conversely, if M is lies in $\mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \cap \operatorname{Loc}_{S}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$, letting S be adapted to Mand T be a stratum of M, the complex ${}^{p}H^{\dim(T)}(M|_{T}) = M|_{T}[\dim(T)]$ is of weight at most $\dim(T)$. Thus, the sheaf $M|_{T}$ is of weight at most 0 and therefore, the sheaf M lies in $\operatorname{Loc}_{S}^{w\leqslant 0}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$.

Corollary 4.8.6. Let S be a smooth scheme over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Then, the perverse t-structure of $\mathcal{D}_{\text{lisse}}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ induces a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}_{\text{lisse}}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$. If S is connected, the heart of this t-structure is $\text{Loc}_S^{w \leq 0}(\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})[\dim(S)]$.

If S is a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p and $\ell \neq p$ is prime, we now define a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ by gluing the perverse t-structures over strata. Proceeding as in Proposition 4.7.1, we define the following:

- A pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is *admissible* if
 - $\mathcal S$ is a stratification of S with smooth strata everywhere of the same dimension.
 - for every stratum T of S, $\mathcal{L}(T)$ is a finite set of isomorphism classes of weightless lisse perverse sheaves (see Corollary 4.8.6).
- If $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is an admissible pair and X is an S-subscheme of S, the category $\mathcal{D}_{\mathcal{S},\mathcal{L}}(X,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ of $(\mathcal{S},\mathcal{L})$ -constructible weightless ℓ -adic complexes over X is the full subcategory of $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq 0}(X,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ made of those objects M such that for any stratum T of S contained in X, the restriction of M to T is a weightless lisse ℓ -adic complex and its perverse cohomology sheaves are successive extensions of objects whose isomorphism classes lie in $\mathcal{L}(T)$.

• An admissible pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is superadmissible if letting $i: T \to S$ be the immersion of a stratum T of \mathcal{S} into S and letting M be a perverse sheaf over T whose isomorphism class lies in $\mathcal{L}(T)$, the complex $\omega^0 i_* M$ is $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructible.

As before, an admissible pair (S, \mathcal{L}) can always be refined into a superadmissible one, replacing Proposition 2.4.1 with the fact that weightless complexes admit a stratification over which they are weightless and lisse.

If $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ is a superadmissible pair and $i: U \to V$ is an immersion between \mathcal{S} -subschemes of S, the functors $i_!, i^*, \omega^0 i_*$ and $\omega^0 i^!$ preserve $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructibility.

Hence, if (S, \mathcal{L}) is a superadmissible pair, we can define a t-structure on (S, \mathcal{L}) constructible objects by gluing the perverse t-structure on the strata.

Any object M of $\mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ is $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ -constructible for some superadmissible pair $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$. If $(\mathcal{S}', \mathcal{L}')$ refines $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$, the t-structure defined on $\mathcal{D}_{\mathcal{S}', \mathcal{L}'}(X, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ induces the t-structure defined on $\mathcal{D}_{\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L}}(X, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$. Hence, we can define non-ambiguously a t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$.

Notice that if M is Artin, we can chose $(\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{L})$ above to be such that the $\mathcal{L}(T)$ are smooth Artin for any stratum T of \mathcal{S} . Therefore, our t-structure induces the perverse homotopy t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$.

Definition 4.8.7. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number.

- (1) We call weightless perverse t-structure the t-structure defined above on $\mathcal{D}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}).$
- (2) We denote by $\operatorname{Perv}^{w \leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ its heart and call it the abelian category of weightless perverse sheaves.

We use the notation wp to denote the objects related to the weightless perverse t-structure.

By construction, we have:

Proposition 4.8.8. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number.

(1) Let $i: F \to S$ be a closed immersion and $j: U \to S$ be the open complement. The sequence

$$\mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(F,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \xrightarrow{i_*} \mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(S,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \xrightarrow{j^*} \mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(U,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$$

satisfies the axioms of the gluing formalism (see [BBDG18, 1.4.3] and Proposition 4.4.1) and the weightless perverse t-structure on $\mathcal{D}^{w\leq 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ is obtained by gluing the t-structures of $\mathcal{D}^{w\leq 0}(U, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$ and $\mathcal{D}^{w\leq 0}(F, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$, (see [BBDG18, 1.4.9]).

- (2) Let M be an object of $\mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$. Then,
 - (a) $M \ge_{\text{wp}} 0$ if and only if there is a stratification of S such that for any stratum $i: T \hookrightarrow S$, we have $\omega^0 i^! M \ge_{\text{wp}} 0$.
 - (b) $M \leq_{wp} 0$ if and only if there is a stratification of S such that for any stratum $i: T \hookrightarrow S$, we have $i^*M \leq_{wp} 0$.
- (3) The inclusion functor

$$\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^{w \leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

is t-exact when the left hand side is endowed with the perverse homotopy t-structure and the right hand side is endowed with the weightless perverse t-structure.

Proceeding as in Proposition 4.5.1, this implies:

Corollary 4.8.9. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let M be a weightless ℓ -adic complex. Then,

- (1) The complex M is weightless perverse t-negative if and only if it is perverse t-negative.
- (2) The complex M be a weightless l-adic complex. If the complex M is perverse t-positive, then it is weightless perverse t-positive.

Theorem 4.8.10. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number.

Let

$$\iota \colon \mathcal{D}^{w \leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}^{b}_{m}(S, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$$

be the inclusion. When the left hand side is endowed with the weightless perverse t-structure and the right hand side is endowed with the perverse t-structure, the adjunction (ι, ω^0) is a t-adjunction and the functor ω^0 is t-exact.

Proof. Corollary 4.8.9 implies that the functor ι is right t-exact. Thus, the functor ω^0 is left t-exact. But by [NV15, 3.2.6], the functor ω^0 is perverse right exact, *i.e.* it sends perverse t-negative objects to perverse t-negative objects. But any such object is t-negative with respect to the weightless perverse t-structure using Corollary 4.8.9. Thus, the functor ω^0 is right t-exact and therefore, it is t-exact. \Box

We can now define the weightless truncation functor over mixed perverse sheaves.

Definition 4.8.11. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. We call weightless truncation the exact functor induced by ω^0 :

$$\omega^0 \colon \operatorname{Perv}_m(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \operatorname{Perv}^{w \leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell).$$

Finally, Theorem 4.8.10 implies an analog of the affine Lefschetz theorem for the perverse homotopy t-structure.

Corollary 4.8.12. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let $j: U \to S$ be an affine open immersion. Then, the functors

$$j_!, \omega^0 j_* \colon \mathcal{D}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

are t-exact with respect to the perverse homotopy t-structure on both sides.

Proof. The functor

$$\omega^0 j_* \colon \mathcal{D}^{smA}(U, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^{w \leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

identifies with the composition of t-exact functors:

$$\mathcal{D}^{smA}(U,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \xrightarrow{\iota} \mathcal{D}^{b}_{m}(U,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \xrightarrow{j_{*}} \mathcal{D}^{b}_{m}(S,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell}) \xrightarrow{\omega^{0}} \mathcal{D}^{w\leqslant 0}(S,\mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$$

and is therefore t-exact using Proposition 4.3.1 and Theorem 4.8.10. Since the inclusion functor

$$\mathcal{D}^A(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell) \to \mathcal{D}^{w \leqslant 0}(S, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$$

is t-exact by Proposition 4.8.8, the result follows for $\omega^0 j_*$. The case of the functor $j_!$ is similar.

4.9. Artin intermediate extension and simple Artin homotopy perverse sheaves. We now show that the abelian category of Artin homotopy perverse sheaves shares some features with the category of perverse sheaves.

Let $j: U \to S$ be an open immersion of schemes of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Recall (see [BBDG18, 1.4.22]) that the intermediate extension functor $j_{!*}$ is defined as the image of the map ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^0j_! \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^0j_*$. In fact, whenever the gluing formalism (see [BBDG18, 1.4.3]) is satisfied, [BBDG18, 1.4.22] provides an intermediate extension functor. Hence, Proposition 4.7.1 allows us to define an *Artin intermediate extension functor*:

Definition 4.9.1. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let $j: U \to S$ be an open immersion. The Artin intermediate extension functor $j_{!*}^A$ is the functor which associates to an Artin homotopy perverse sheaf M over U the image of the map

$${}^{\mathrm{hp}}H^0 j_! M \to {}^{\mathrm{hp}}H^0 \omega^0 j_* M.$$

Since the weightless truncation functor and the inclusion of Artin homotopy perverse sheaves into weightless perverse sheaves are exact, the following proposition holds.

Proposition 4.9.2. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let $j: U \to S$ be an open immersion. Then, we have $j_{1*}^A = \omega^0 j_{1*}$.

Using [BBDG18, 1.4.23], we have the following description of the intermediate extension functor (compare with [BBDG18, 2.1.9]):

Proposition 4.9.3. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let $i: F \to S$ be a closed immersion and $j: U \to S$ be the open complementary immersion. Let M be an Artin homotopy perverse sheaf over U. Then, the complex $j_{!*}^A(M)$ over S is the only extension P of M to S such that $i^*P < 0$ and $\omega^0 i^!P > 0$.

The following result is similar to [BBDG18, 4.3.1].

Proposition 4.9.4. Let S be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number.

- The abelian category of Artin homotopy perverse sheaves over S with coefficients in Qℓ is artinian and noetherian: every object is of finite length.
- (2) If j: V → S is the inclusion of a smooth subscheme and if L is an irreducible object of Sh^{smA}(V, Q_ℓ), then the Artin homotopy perverse sheaf j^A_{!*}(L[dim(V)]) is simple. Every simple Artin perverse sheaf over S is obtained in this way.

Proof. The proof is the same as in [BBDG18, 4.3.1] replacing [BBDG18, 4.3.2, 4.3.3] with the following lemmas.

Lemma 4.9.5. Let V be a smooth connected \mathbb{F}_p -scheme. Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let L be an irreducible object of $\operatorname{Sh}^{smA}(V, \mathbb{Q}_{\ell})$. Then, if $F = L[\dim(V)]$, for any open immersion $j: U \hookrightarrow V$, we have $F = j_{*}^A j^* F$.

Proof. We use Proposition 4.9.3. Let $i: F \to S$ be the reduced complementary closed immersion of j. Then, the ℓ -adic sheaf i^*L over F is smooth Artin. It

is therefore in degree at most $\dim(F)$ with respect to the perverse homotopy tstructure. Thus, the ℓ -adic complex i^*F is in degree at most $\dim(F) - \dim(V) < 0$.

Finally, the functor $\omega^0 i^!$ vanishes over $\mathcal{D}^{smA}(V, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$ since V is smooth (see the proof of [NV15, 4.1.1]).

Lemma 4.9.6. Let V be a smooth connected \mathbb{F}_p -scheme. Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Let L be a simple object of $\operatorname{Sh}^{smA}(V, \mathbb{Q}_\ell)$. Then, the Artin homotopy pervserse sheaf $L[\dim(V)]$ is simple.

Proof. The proof is exactly the same as [BBDG18, 4.3.3].

Proposition 4.9.7. Let X be a scheme of finite type over \mathbb{F}_p . Let $\ell \neq p$ be a prime number. Recall the construction of the weightless intersection complex EC_X of Vaish and Nair (see Remark 4.6.5). Let $j: U \to X$ be an open immersion with U regular. Then, we have

- (1) $EC_X = j_{!*}^A \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}[\dim(U)].$
- (2) EC_X is a simple Artin homotopy perverse sheaf.
- (3) If X is a surface, EC_X is an Artin perverse sheaf; in particular, it is a perverse sheaf.

Proof. Let $IC_X = j_{!*}\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}[\dim(U)]$ be the intersection complex, then

$$EC_X = \omega^0 IC_X$$

by [NV15, 3.1.13]. This proves (1) by Proposition 4.9.2; (2) follows by the description of simple objects given in Proposition 4.9.4 and (3) follows from the comparison between Artin perverse sheaves and Artin homotopy perverse sheaves of Remark 4.7.3. $\hfill \Box$

However, when X is a surface, the weightless intersection complex EC_X need not be simple in the category of perverse sheaves:

Example 4.9.8. Let X be a normal surface with a single singular point $i: \{x\} \rightarrow X$. Let $f: Y \rightarrow X$ be a resolution of singularities such that the fiber of f above x is a simple normal crossing divisor with components of positive genus. Then, EC_X is not simple as a perverse sheaf.

Indeed, let $i_E: E \to X$ be the pull-back of i along f and $p: E \to \{x\}$ be the pull-back of f along i.

We have exact triangles:

$$EC_X \to f_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,Y}[2] \to w_{>\mathrm{Id}} f_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,Y}[2]$$

and

$$w_{>\mathrm{Id}}j_!\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U} \to w_{>\mathrm{Id}}f_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,Y} \to w_{>\mathrm{Id}}i_*p_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E}.$$

But as $j_! \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U}$ is Artin, we have $w_{>id} j_! \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,U} = 0$.

In addition, by [NV15, 3.1.8, 3.1.10], the functor i_* is t-exact with respect to the t-structure $(\mathcal{D}^{\leq \mathrm{Id}}(-,\mathbb{Q}_\ell), \mathcal{D}^{>\mathrm{Id}}(-,\mathbb{Q}_\ell))$. Thus, i_* commutes with $w_{>\mathrm{Id}}$. But over $\mathcal{D}^b_c(k(x),\mathbb{Q}_\ell)$, the functor $w_{>\mathrm{Id}}$ is defined as Morel's weight truncation functor $w_{\geq 1}$ (see [Mor05, 4.1]).

Now, write $E = \bigcup_{i \in I} E_i$ where E_i is regular. If $J \subseteq I$, write $E_J = \bigcap_{i \in J} E_i$ and $p_J : E_J \to \{x\}$ the structural morphism. Proposition 1.6.4 gives an exact triangle

$$p_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E} \to \bigoplus_{i \in I} (p_i)_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i} \to \bigoplus_{J \subseteq I, |J|=2} (p_J)_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_J}.$$

If |J| = 2, the ℓ -adic complex $(p_J)_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell, E_J}$ is pure of weight 0. Therefore, applying Morel's truncation functor $w_{\geq 1}$, we get an isomorphism:

$$w_{\geq 1}p_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E} = \bigoplus_{i\in I} w_{\geq 1}(p_i)_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i}$$
$$= \bigoplus_{i\in I} R^1(p_i)_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i}[-1] \oplus \bigoplus_{i\in I} R^2(p_i)_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i}[-2].$$

Hence, we have

$$w_{>id}i_*p_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E} = i_*\left(\bigoplus_{i\in I} R^1(p_i)_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i}[-1] \oplus \bigoplus_{i\in I} R^2(p_i)_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i}[-2]\right).$$

Now, using [DCM09, 1.8.1], we have

$$f_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,Y} = IC_X \oplus i_* \left(\bigoplus_{i \in I} R^2(p_i)_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i}\right) [-2].$$

Hence, we have an exact sequence of perverse sheaves:

$$0 \to i_* \left(\bigoplus_{i \in I} R^1(p_i)_* \mathbb{Q}_{\ell, E_i} \right) \to EC_X \to IC_X \to 0.$$

Therefore, since one of the E_i has positive genus, $i_*\left(\bigoplus_{i\in I} R^1(p_i)_*\mathbb{Q}_{\ell,E_i}\right)$ is non-zero and thus EC_X is not simple.

5. Explicit description of Artin perverse sheaves over 1-dimensional schemes

5.1. Perverse sheaves as gluing of representations over 1-dimensional schemes. The material in this section is a variation on Beilinson's method described in [Bei87a]. Let M be a perverse sheaf over an excellent base scheme S. Recall that there is a stratification S of S such that for all $T \in S$, $M|_T$ is lisse. We want to recover M from the $M|_T$ and additional data. This is possible using the nearby and vanishing cycle functors in general. However, in the case when S is 1-dimensional, we have another way of doing this.

We take the convention that $\delta(S) = 1$. Assume for simplicity that S is reduced. The scheme S is then the disjoint union of two regular strata U and F over which M is lisse and such that U is open and dense. Shrinking U, we can also assume that the open immersion $j: U \to S$ is affine by Lemma 3.3.7. Write $i: F \to S$ the closed immersion. The ℓ -adic complex $M|_U$ is a lisse perverse sheaf and the ℓ -adic complex $M|_F$ lies in perverse degrees [-1,0] by [BBDG18, 4.1.10].

By localization, we have an exact triangle:

$$j_!M|_U \to M \to i_*M|_F$$

which gives rise to an exact sequence:

$$0 \to i_*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^{-1}M|_F \to j_!M|_U \to M \to i_*{}^{\mathbf{p}}H^0M|_F \to 0.$$

Hence, we can recover M as the cone of a map $i_*M|_F[-1] \to j_!M|_U$ such that the induced map $i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}M|_F \to j_!M|_U$ is a monomorphism.

Applying the localization triangle (1.0.1) to the functor j_* , we have an exact triangle:

$$j_! \rightarrow j_* \rightarrow i_* i^* j_*.$$

Moreover, we have $j^*i_* = 0$. Therefore, we have

$$\operatorname{Hom}(i_*M|_F[-1], j_!M|_U) = \operatorname{Hom}(M|_F, i^*j_*M|_U)$$

and we have an exact sequence:

$$0 \to i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^*j_*M|_U) \to j_!M|_U \to j_*M|_U \to i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^0(i^*j_*M|_U) \to 0$$

Therefore, a map $i_*{}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}M|_F \to j_!M|_U$ is a monomorphism if and only if the ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}$ of the corresponding map $M|_F \to i^*j_*M|_U$ is a monomorphism.

Conversely, a lisse perverse sheaf M_U over U, a (lisse) ℓ -adic complex M_F over F which lies in perverse degrees [-1,0] and a map $M_F \to i^* j_* M_U$ such that the induced map ${}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(M_F) \to {}^{\mathrm{p}}H^{-1}(i^* j_* M|_U)$ is a monomorphism, give rise to a unique perverse sheaf M over S.

Since $\delta(S) = 1$, an ℓ -adic complex N is a lisse perverse sheaf over U if and only if N[-1] is a lisse sheaf. Moreover, since $\delta(F) = 0$, the perverse and ordinary t-structures coincide over $\mathcal{D}_c^b(F, \mathbb{Z}_\ell)$. Hence, the following data determine a unique perverse sheaf over S:

- (1) A dense affine open immersion $j: U \to S$ with U regular. Denote by $i: F \to S$ the complementary reduced closed immersion.
- (2) A locally constant ℓ -adic sheaf M_U over U.
- (3) A (lisse) ℓ -adic complex M_F over F placed in (ordinary) degrees [-1, 0].
- (4) A map $\phi: M_F \to i^* j_* M_U$ such that ${}^{\mathbf{p}} H^{-1}(\phi)$ is a monomorphism.

We can compute $i^* j_* M_U$ more explicitly. The first case to consider is the case of a regular 1-dimensional scheme. We first need some notations:

Notations 5.1.1. Let C be a regular connected 1-dimensional scheme and K be its field of functions. Then, if U is an open subset of C and x is a closed point of C.

- We let K_x be the completion of K with respect to the valuation defined by x on K.
- We let $\phi_x \colon \operatorname{Spec}(K_x) \to \operatorname{Spec}(K)$ be the induced map.
- We let $G_0(x)$ be inertia subgroup of G_{K_x} .

The following lemma is classical (use [GR71, V.8.2,X.2.1]):

Lemma 5.1.2. Let C be a regular connected 1-dimensional scheme of generic point η , U an open subset of C and x a closed point. Let $K = k(\eta)$ be the field of regular functions on C. Then,

(1) We have an exact sequence of groups:

$$1 \to G_0(x) \to G_{K_x} \to G_{k(x)} \to 1$$

(2) If $x \notin U$, the map

$$G_{K_x} \to G_K \to \pi_1^{\text{\'et}}(U, \overline{\eta})$$

is injective.

In this setting, we have a morphism of sites $(BG_{K_x})_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}} \rightarrow (BG_{k(x)})_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}$ given by $M \mapsto M^{G_0(x)}$. This morphism then induces a functor

$$\mathcal{D}^{b}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\mathrm{perf}}(\mathrm{Sh}((BG_{K_{x}})_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})) \to \mathcal{D}^{b}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\mathrm{perf}}(\mathrm{Sh}((BG_{k(x)})_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))$$

that we will denote by ∂_x .

Proposition 5.1.3. Let C be a regular connected 1-dimensional scheme of generic point η and field of regular functions K. Let $i: F \to C$ be a reduced closed immersion and let $j: U \to C$ be the open complement. If $x \in F$, let $i_x: \{x\} \to F$ be the closed immersion. Finally, let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on C.

Then, the diagram

 $is \ commutative.$

Proof. First, note that $i^*j_* = \bigoplus_{x \in F} (i_x)_* i_x^* i^* j_*$. We can therefore assume that F has a single point x.

Then, by [AGV73, VIII.5], if n is an integer and M lies in $\text{Loc}_U(\mathbb{Z}_\ell)$, the étale sheaf $H^n(i^*j_*M)$ over $\{x\}$ identifies with the $G_{k(x)}$ -module:

$$H^n_{\text{ét}}(\text{Spec}(L), \phi^*_x \overline{\eta}^* M) = H^n(G_0(x), \phi^*_x \overline{\eta}^* M)$$

where L is the maximal unramified extension of K_x . This yields the result.

We will now tackle the case of a general 1-dimensional scheme.

Notations 5.1.4. Let C be an excellent 1-dimensional scheme. Let $\nu : \widetilde{C} \to C$ be the normalization of C. Let Γ be the set of generic points of \widetilde{C} . Let U is an open subset of C, let y be a closed point of \widetilde{C} and let $\eta \in \Gamma$.

- We let $U_{\eta} = \overline{\{\eta\}} \cap \nu^{-1}(U) \subseteq \widetilde{C}$.
- We let K_{η} be the field of regular functions on C_{η} . •
- We let $\eta(y)$ be the unique element of Γ such that $y \in C_{\eta(y)}$.
- We let K_y be the completion of $K_{\eta(y)}$ with respect to the valuation defined by y on $K_{\eta(y)}$. • We let $\phi_y : \operatorname{Spec}(K_y) \to \operatorname{Spec}(K_{\eta(y)})$ be the induced map.
- We let $G_0(y)$ be the inertia subgroup of G_{K_y} .

The following lemma follows from Lemma 5.1.2.

Lemma 5.1.5. Let C be a 1-dimensional excellent scheme. Let $\nu : \widetilde{C} \to C$ be the normalization of C. Let Γ be the set of generic points of \widetilde{C} . Let U be a nil-regular open subset of C, let y be a closed point of \widetilde{C} and let $\eta \in \Gamma$. Then,

(1) We have an exact sequence of groups:

$$1 \to G_0(y) \to G_{K_y} \to G_{k(y)} \to 1$$

(2) If $y \notin U_{\eta(y)}$, the map

$$G_{K_y} \to G_{K_{\eta(y)}} \to \pi_1^{\text{\'et}}(U_{\eta(y)}, \overline{\eta(y)})$$

 $is \ injective.$

In this setting, we have a morphism of sites $(BG_{K_y})_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}} \to (BG_{k(y)})_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}$ given by $M \mapsto M^{G_0(y)}$. This morphism then induces a functor

$$\mathcal{D}^{b}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\mathrm{perf}}(\mathrm{Sh}((BG_{K_{y}})_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})) \to \mathcal{D}^{b}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\mathrm{perf}}(\mathrm{Sh}((BG_{k(y)})_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))$$

that we will denote by ∂_{y} .

Corollary 5.1.6. Let C be a 1-dimensional excellent scheme and let ℓ be a prime number which is invertible on C. Let $\nu : \widetilde{C} \to C$ be the normalization of C. Let Γ be the set of generic points of C. Let $i : F \to C$ be a closed immersion and $j : U \to C$ be the open complement. Assume that U is nil-regular.

Then, the diagram

is commutative.

Proof. Let $\nu_U : U_{\text{red}} \to U$ (resp. $\nu_F : \widetilde{F} \to F$) be the inverse image of ν along j (resp. i). Let \tilde{j} (resp. \tilde{i}) be the inclusion of U_{red} (resp. \tilde{F}) in \tilde{C} . Recall that ν_U^* is an equivalence of categories. Thus,

$$i^* j_* = i^* j_* (\nu_U)_* \nu_U^* = i^* \nu_* j_* \nu_U^* = (\nu_F)_* i^* j_* \nu_U^*.$$

The result then follows from Proposition 5.1.3 and Proposition 2.3.5. \Box

This discussion leads us to the following definition:

Definition 5.1.7. Let C be a 1-dimensional excellent scheme and let ℓ be a prime number invertible on C. Let Γ be the set of generic points of C. Let $\nu \colon \widetilde{C} \to C$ be the normalization of C. We define an abelian category $P(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ as follows:

- An object of $P(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is a quadruple $(U, (M_{\eta})_{\eta \in \Gamma}, (M_x)_{x \in C \setminus U}, (f_x)_{x \in C \setminus U})$ where
 - (1) U is a nil-regular open subset of C such that the immersion $U \to C$ is affine,
 - (2) for all $\eta \in \Gamma$, M_{η} is an ℓ -adic representation of $\pi_1^{\text{ét}}(U_{\eta}, \overline{\eta})$,
 - (3) for all $x \in C \setminus U$, M_x is a complex of ℓ -adic representations of $G_{k(x)}$ placed in degrees [-1, 0],
 - (4) for all $x \in C \setminus U$, f_x is an element of

$$\operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{D}(\operatorname{Rep}(G_{k(x)},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))}\left(M_{x}, \bigoplus_{\nu(y)=x} \operatorname{Ind}_{G_{k(y)}}^{G_{k(x)}} \left(\partial_{y} \left[\phi_{y}^{*}(M_{\eta(y)})\right]\right)\right)$$

such that $H^{-1}(f_x)$ is injective.

• An element of $\operatorname{Hom}_{P(C,\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})}((U,(M_{\eta}),(M_{x}),(f_{x})),(V,(N_{\eta}),(N_{x}),(g_{x})))$ is a couple $((\Phi_{\eta})_{\eta\in\Gamma},(\Phi_{x})_{x\in(C\setminus U)\cap(C\setminus V)})$ where $\Phi_{\eta}\colon M_{\eta}\to N_{\eta}$ is a map of representations of $G_{K_{\eta}}$, where $\Phi_{x}\colon M_{x}\to N_{x}$ is a map of representations of $G_{k(x)}$ and such that the diagram:

is commutative.

Our discussion then yields the following proposition.

Proposition 5.1.8. Let C be an excellent 1-dimensional scheme and ℓ be a prime number invertible on C. Then, the category $\text{Perv}(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is equivalent to $P(C, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

5.2. Artin perverse sheaves over 1-dimensional schemes. Let M be an Artin perverse sheaf over an excellent 1-dimensional base scheme S. Recall that there is a stratification S of S such that for all $T \in S$, $M|_T$ is smooth Artin. We want to recover M from the $M|_T$ and additional data. This is possible in the case when S is 1-dimensional using the method of the previous paragraph.

We again take the convention that $\delta(S) = 1$.

Definition 5.2.1. Let S be a 1-dimensional excellent scheme. Let ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. Let Γ be the set of generic points of S. We define the full subcategory $P^A(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ of $P(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ as the subcategory made of those quadruple $(U, (M_{\eta})_{\eta \in \Gamma}, (M_x)_{x \in C \setminus U}, (f_x)_{x \in C \setminus U})$ such that for all $\eta \in \Gamma$, the representation M_{η} is of Artin origin and for all $x \in S \setminus U$, the representations $H^{-1}(M_x)$ and $H^0(M_x)$ are of Artin origin.

Proposition 5.2.2. Let S be an excellent 1-dimensional scheme and ℓ be a prime number invertible on S. Then, $\operatorname{Perv}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ is equivalent to $\operatorname{P}^{A}(S, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$.

Remark 5.2.3. It is possible that the nearby and vanishing cycle preserve the Artin condition over 1-dimensional schemes which would give a description of Artin perverse sheaves which is more in the spirit of [Bei87a]. In the case of Artin homotopy

perverse sheaves, it may even be possible to have a similar description for every scheme of finite type over a finite field by using the Artin truncation of nearby and vanishing cycles.

Example 5.2.4. Let k be an algebraically closed field of characteristic 0. A perverse Artin ℓ -adic sheaf over \mathbb{P}^1_k is a quadruple $(\mathbb{P}^1_k \setminus F, M, (M_x)_{x \in F}, (f_x)_{x \in F})$ where F is a finite set of points of \mathcal{P}^1_k , where M is a representation of Artin origin of $\pi_1^{\text{\'et}}(\mathbb{P}^1_k \setminus F)$, where M_x is a perfect complex of \mathbb{Z}_ℓ -modules placed in degrees [-1,0] and where

$$f_x: M_x \to \partial_x[\phi_x^*(M)]$$

is a map in the category $\mathcal{D}(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ such that $H^{-1}(f_x)$ is injective.

We can always assume that the point at infinity is in F. Write $F = \{\infty\} \sqcup F'$. Let m = |F'|.

Let $x \in F'$, then, the field k((X - x)) is the completion of the field k(X) of regular functions on \mathbb{P}^1_k with respect to the valuation defined by x.

On the other hand, the field k((1/X)) is the completion of the field k(X) with respect to the valuation of the point at infinity.

Furthermore, recall that the absolute Galois group of the field k((X)) is $\hat{\mathbb{Z}}$ since k is algebraically closed and of characteristic 0.

The étale fundamental group of the scheme $\mathbb{P}^1_k \setminus F$ is the profinite completion of the free group over F'; we denote by g_x for $x \in F'$ its topological generators. The map

$$G_{k((X-x))} \to \pi_1^{\text{\acute{e}t}}(\mathbb{P}^1_k \setminus F)$$

is the only continuous map that sends the topological generator of $\hat{\mathbb{Z}}$ to g_x . Moreover, the map

$$G_{k((1/X))} \to \pi_1^{\text{\acute{e}t}}(\mathbb{P}^1_k \setminus F)$$

is the map that sends the topological generator to a certain product $(g_{x_1} \cdots g_{x_m})^{-1}$ where $F' = \{x_1, \ldots, x_m\}$.

Now, the action of $\pi_1^{\text{\'et}}(\mathbb{P}_k^1 \setminus F)$ on M factors through a finite quotient G and is therefore uniquely determined by the representation of a finite group with m marked generators which are the images of the g_x for $x \in F'$.

Finally, let

$$\partial \colon \operatorname{Rep}(\hat{\mathbb{Z}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}^b(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$$

be the functor that sends a continuous $\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}[\hat{\mathbb{Z}}]$ module M to the derived module of fixed points under the action of the topological generator.

A perverse Artin ℓ -adic sheaf over \mathbb{P}^1_k is equivalent to the following data:

- A finite number of distinct points x_1, \ldots, x_m of \mathbb{A}^1_k (i.e of elements of k).
- A finite group G generated by m elements g_1, \ldots, g_m ; let $\phi_i : \hat{\mathbb{Z}} \to G$ be the map given by g_i and $\phi_{\infty} : \hat{\mathbb{Z}} \to G$ be the map given by $g_{\infty} = (g_1 \cdots g_m)^{-1}$.
- A \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -linear representation M of G which is finite as a \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -module.
- Perfect complexes of \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -modules $M_1, \ldots, M_m, M_{\infty}$ placed in degrees [-1, 0].
- Maps $f_i: M_i \to \partial(\phi_i^*M)$ for $i = 1, \dots, m, \infty$, such that the maps

$$H^{-1}(f_i): H^{-1}(M_i) \to M^{g_i}$$

are injective.

Example 5.2.5. Let $S = \text{Spec}(\mathbb{Z}_p)$. A perverse Artin ℓ -adic sheaf over S is given by a triple (M, N, f) where M is a representation of Artin origin of $G_{\mathbb{Q}_p}$, where

N is a complex of continuous representations of \mathbb{Z} placed in degrees [-1,0] with cohomology of Artin origin and where $f: N \to \partial(M)$, where ∂ is the map

$$\mathcal{D}^{b}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\mathrm{perf}}(\mathrm{Sh}((BG_{\mathbb{Q}_{p}}))_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})) \to \mathcal{D}^{b}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\mathrm{perf}}(\mathrm{Sh}((B\mathbb{Z})_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))$$

induced by the map $M \mapsto M^{G_0}$ and $H^{-1}(f)$ is injective.

Example 5.2.6. Let k be an algebraically closed field of characteristic 0. Let A be the localization of the ring k[X,Y]/(XY) at the prime ideal (X,Y). It is the local ring at the intersection point of two lines in \mathbb{P}_k^2 .

Let S = Spec(A). The scheme S has two generic points of residue field k(X)and the residue field at the only closed point is k. the normalization of S is given by the scheme

$$\operatorname{Spec}(k[X]_{(X)} \times k[Y]_{(Y)}).$$

Let $\partial : \operatorname{Rep}(\hat{\mathbb{Z}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}) \to \mathcal{D}^{b}(\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})$ be the derived functor of fixed points and let

$$\phi \colon \hat{\mathbb{Z}} = G_{k(X)} \to G_{k(X)}$$

be the inclusion.

Now, an Artin perverse sheaf over S is given by a quadruple (M_1, M_2, N, f) where M_1 and M_2 are representations of Artin origin of $G_{k(X)}$, where N is a complex of \mathbb{Z}_{ℓ} -modules placed in degrees [-1,0] and where $f: N \to \partial(\phi^*(M_1 \oplus M_2))$ is such that $H^{-1}(f)$ is injective.

Example 5.2.7. Let $S = \operatorname{Spec}(\mathbb{Z}[\sqrt{5}]_{(2)})$. This scheme has two points: its generic point has residue field $\mathbb{Q}(\sqrt{5})$ and its closed point has residue field \mathbb{F}_2 . The normalization of S is $\operatorname{Spec}\left(\mathbb{Z}\left[\frac{1+\sqrt{5}}{2}\right]_{(2)}\right)$ which is a discrete valuation ring. The residue field of its closed point is the field \mathbb{F}_4 with 4 elements. The completion of $\mathbb{Q}(\sqrt{5})$ with respect to the valuation defined by 2 is the field $\mathbb{Q}_2(\sqrt{5})$.

Let ∂ be the map

$$\mathcal{D}^{b}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\mathrm{perf}}(\mathrm{Sh}((BG_{\mathbb{Q}(\sqrt{5})})_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell})) \to \mathcal{D}^{b}_{\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}-\mathrm{perf}}(\mathrm{Sh}((B\hat{\mathbb{Z}})_{\mathrm{pro\acute{e}t}},\mathbb{Z}_{\ell}))$$

induced by the map $M \mapsto M^{G_0}$.

Let $\phi: \hat{\mathbb{Z}} \to \hat{\mathbb{Z}}$ be the multiplication by 2 map. The map ϕ^* has right adjoint functor.

Ind_{$$\phi$$}: Sh($(B\hat{\mathbb{Z}})_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$) \rightarrow Sh($(B\hat{\mathbb{Z}})_{\text{pro\acute{e}t}}, \mathbb{Z}_{\ell}$)

Thus an Artin perverse sheaf over S is the same as a triple: (M, N, f) where M is a representation of Artin origin of $G_{\mathbb{Q}(\sqrt{5})}$, where N is a complex of continuous representations of $\hat{\mathbb{Z}}$ placed in degrees [-1, 0] with cohomology of Artin origin and where

$$f: N \to \operatorname{Ind}(\partial(M))$$

is such that $H^{-1}(f)$ is injective.
